Citrus County COVID-19 cases

According to the Florida Department of Health, 20 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Three new deaths were reported, for a total of 432. To date in the county, 10,355 people have tested positive (including 90 non-residents). Two new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 675 hospitalized. Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

Vaccine registration system open

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 40 and older and frontline health care workers is now available. Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036. Each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's number is 833-540-2058.

Motorcyclist dies in crash

Florida Highway Patrol released more information about a vehicle crash in South Dunnellon that led to the death of a motorcyclist. According to an FHP news release, which doesn't ID the motorists involved in the 2:01 p.m. collision Thursday, April 1, a 73-year-old man from Ludington, Michigan, was riding a motorcycle south on U.S. 41, approaching the intersection with West New Lenox Lane. At the same time, a 29-year-old Citrus Springs man driving a sedan north on U.S. 41 overtook another vehicle leaving the Personal Mini Storage driveway. In doing so, the sedan traveled into the motorcyclist's path and caused a head-on collision between the vehicles, ejecting the motorcyclist, who was wearing a helmet, according to FHP. Emergency responders transported the motorcyclist to a hospital, where he later died from his injuries, and the sedan's driver suffered minor injuries.

2 die in Capitol incident

Man rams car into 2 Capitol police at barricade; 1 officer, driver are killed

WASHINGTON—A Capitol Police officer was killed Friday after a man rammed a car into two officers at a barricade outside the U.S. Capitol and then emerged wielding a knife. It was the second line-of-duty death this year for a department still struggling to heal from the Jan. 6 insurrection. Video shows the driver of the crashed car emerging with a knife in his hand and starting to run at the pair of officers, Capitol Police Acting Chief Yogananda Pittman told reporters. Authorities shot the suspect, who died at a hospital. Two law enforcement officials told The Associated Press that the suspect stabbed one of the officers. The officials spoke to AP were not authorized to publicly discuss the pending investigation and spoke on condition of anonymity. "I just ask that the public continue to keep U.S. Capitol Police and their families in your prayers," Pittman said. "This has been an extremely difficult time for U.S. Capitol Police after the events of Jan. 6 and now the events that have occurred here today." Police identified the slain officer as William "Billy" Evans, an

Woman accused of getting painkillers using faked prescriptions

An Inverness woman was arrested on a Marion County warrant and now faces 19 charges alleging she obtained a controlled substance totaling nearly 900 oxycodone pills in three months. According to the Marion County Sheriff's Office arrest report, the investigating deputy reported that Cheyenne Morgan, 36, of Inverness filled out prescriptions from a doctor's office in Dunnellon where she worked and took them to the Winn-Dixie pharmacy in Dunnellon to get them filled. According to arrest documents, the Marion County investigating deputy reported Morgan obtained 897 oxycodone pills with the fraudulent prescriptions between October 2018 and December 2018. The deputy alleges that the written prescriptions showed her

Swagger returns to box office

NEW YORK — Once again, mayhem and mass destruction is back at the box office. It's almost like old times.

"Godzilla vs. Kong," one of the few tentpoles to dare release during COVID times, is poised this weekend to set a new high in ticket sales during the pandemic. It won't be the kind of blockbuster business such a big-budget release would typically manage, but experts forecast a launch of at least \$25 million.

Opening-day ticket sales on Wednesday for "Godzilla vs. Kong" totaled \$9.6 million, Warner Bros. said Thursday — a single-day pandemic record and more than most 2020-2021 opening weekend hauls. Last weekend, the monster mash pulled in an impressive \$123.1 million internationally. In China, where moviegoing is close to pre-pandemic levels, the movie made about \$70 million, double the debut of 2014's "Godzilla."

For the first time in a long time, there's the faint hint of a hit at the box office.

"It's a good omen that the tastes of the consumer have not shifted so much that there's no possibility of restarting the movie business," says Joshua Grode, chief executive of Legendary Entertainment, which produced "Godzilla vs. Kong." "This tells everybody: the moviegoing business is here, and yes, it may be different post-pandemic. But there is a viable industry there."

Huge challenges remain to the revival of moviegoing. With so many cinemas shuttered for nearly an entire year, many moviegoers are out of the habit. Some are unlikely to return to sitting indoors with strangers until they're vaccinated or the pandemic has ebbed. And even those who have been convinced of the safety of moviegoing by theaters' health protocols, they now have only more in-home options. "Godzilla vs. Kong" is streaming simultaneously on HBO Max in North America.

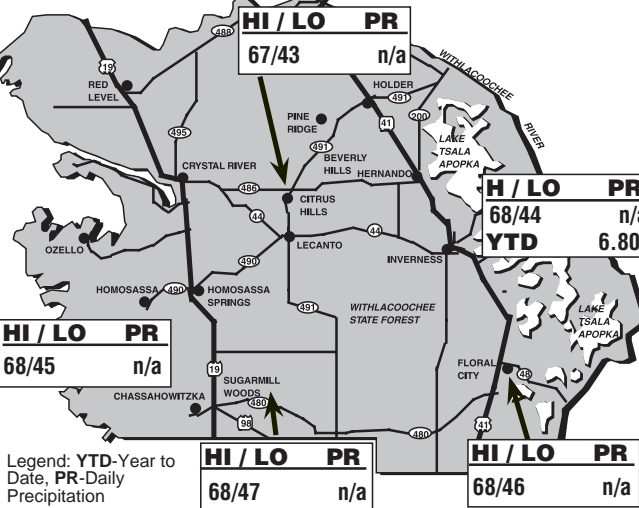
But few scream big screen as much as King Kong and Godzilla. To help kickstart moviegoing and bring back a little chest-thumping swagger to theaters, the industry is counting on two of the movies' most iconic, long-running leviathans. Laying another metropolis to waste might help movie theaters build themselves back up.

"The issue is less

convincing consumers to go to the movies than it is convincing studios to open their movies," says Rich Gelfond, IMAX'S chief executive. "There's been a hesitancy on the part of Hollywood studios to release movies because they haven't been convinced the demand is there. What I really hope this weekend shows is that there is a lot of demand there and it convinces them to open a lot of movies that have been sitting on the shelf."

Since the launch of "Tenet" fizzled last August, and virus cases soared, most studios have been postponing or rerouting their biggest releases to streaming services. But as vaccinations have ramped up and restrictions have eased, more theaters have opened. About 60% of theaters will be open this weekend, according to data firm Comscore. On Monday, Los Angeles County will expand cinema capacity from 25% to 50%.

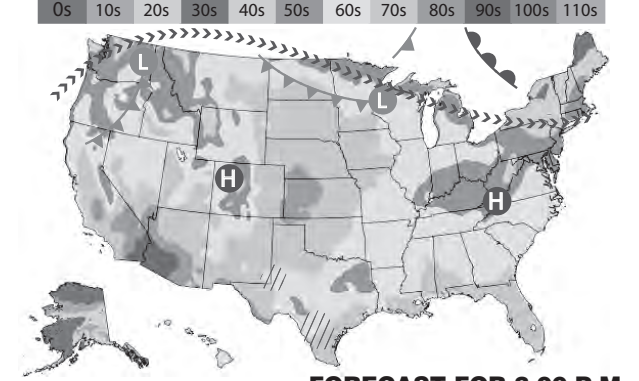

handwriting and not the doctor whom she worked for at the Dunnellon clinic.

According to the arrest documents, on March 26, Morgan spoke with the Marion County investigating deputy when he came to her Inverness home and first said she did not fill out the prescriptions, but later said she did fill out some. A short time later Morgan refused to speak anymore with the deputy.

Investigating deputies showed several photos to the pharmacy technician at Winn-Dixie. The photos included one of Morgan. The technician identified Morgan as the person who brought in the prescriptions, according to arrest documents.

She was arrested March 30 by Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies on a Marion County warrant.

18-year veteran who was a member of the department's first responders unit.

Authorities said that there wasn't an ongoing threat and that the attack did not appear to be related to terrorism, though the Capitol was put on lockdown as a precaution. There was also no immediate connection apparent between Friday's crash and the Jan. 6 riot.

The crash and shooting happened at a security checkpoint near the Capitol typically used by senators and staff on weekdays, though most are away from the building during the current recess. The attack occurred about 100 yards from the entrance of the building on the Senate side of the Capitol. One witness, the Rev. Patrick Mahoney, said he was finishing a Good Friday service nearby when he suddenly heard three shots ring out.

Law enforcement officials identified the slain suspect as 25-year-old Noah Green. Investigators were digging into the suspect's background and examining whether he had any mental health history as they tried to discern a motive. They were working to obtain warrants to access his online accounts.

Pittman said the suspect did not appear to have been on the police's radar. But the attack underscores that the building and campus — and the officers charged with protecting them — remain potential targets for violence.

It comes as the Washington region remains on edge nearly three months after a mob of armed insurrectionists loyal to former President Donald Trump stormed the Capitol as Congress was voting to certify Joe Biden's presidential win.

Five people died in the Jan. 6 riot, including Capitol Police officer Brian Sicknick, who was among a badly outnumbered force trying to fight off

insurrectionists seeking to overturn the election. Authorities installed a tall perimeter fence around the Capitol and for months restricted traffic along the roads closest to the building, but they had begun pulling back some of the emergency measures in recent weeks. Fencing that prevented vehicular traffic near that area was recently removed.

Evans is the seventh Capitol Police member to die in the line of duty in the department's history, according to the Officer Down Memorial Page, which tracks deaths of law enforcement. Two officers, one from Capitol Police and another from Washington's Metropolitan Police Department, died by suicide following the Jan. 6 attack.

Almost 140 Capitol Police officers were wounded then, including officers not issued helmets who sustained head injuries and one officer with cracked ribs, according to the officers' union. It took hours for the National Guard to arrive, a delay that has driven months of

finger-pointing between key decision-makers that day.

They were called upon soon afterward to secure the Capitol during Biden's inauguration and faced another potential threat in early March linked to conspiracy theories falsely claiming Trump would retake the presidency.

"Today, once again, these heroes risked their lives to protect our Capitol and our Country, with the same extraordinary selflessness and spirit of service seen on January 6," House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said in a statement. "On behalf of the entire House, we are profoundly grateful."

The suspect had been taken to the hospital in critical condition. One of the officers who was injured was taken by police car to the hospital; the other was transported by emergency medical crews.

The U.S. Capitol complex was placed on lockdown after the shooting, and staffers were told they could not enter or exit buildings.

**That's not modern technology**

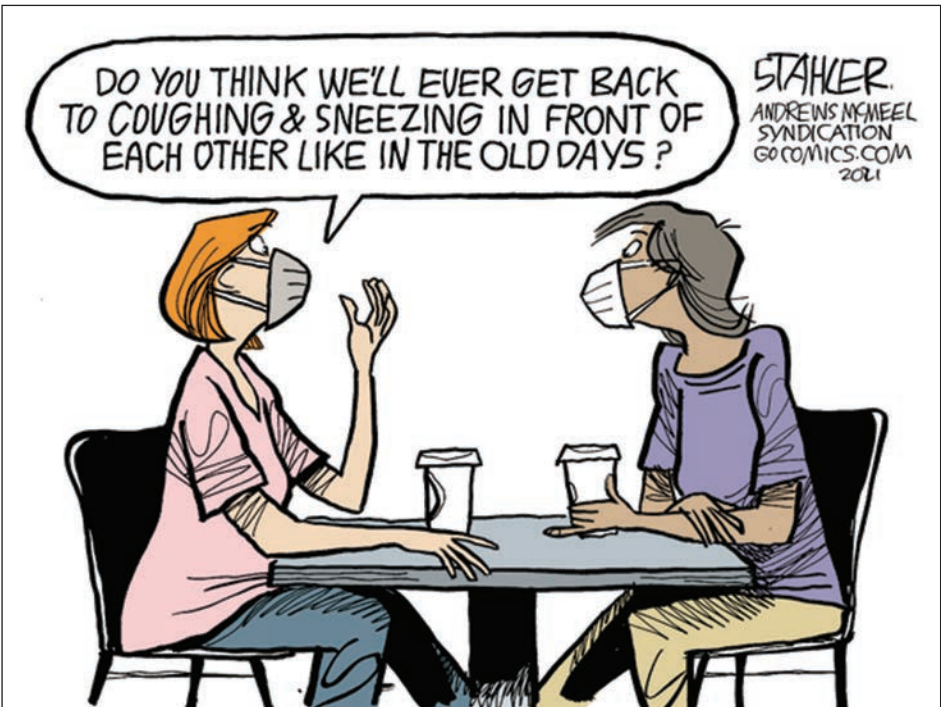

# Road repaving desires require some taxpayer sacrifice

Citrus County has some 2,400 miles of roads. To give you a sense of how 2,400 miles of roadway looks, that's roughly the distance between Los Angeles and Jacksonville. Hard to imagine, isn't it?

The Chronicle recently published tables listing 159 roads the county has scheduled for resurfacing in this fiscal year, at a cost of \$4 million. The tables, consuming more than half a newspaper page, were impressive, but that still represents just a sliver of the county's roads.

Complaining about the state of the county's roads is a year-round sport for many residents. Everyone wants good roads, but no one has a magic wand that can be waved to improve all the roads, immediately — and for free, of course.

Therein lies the basic problem: services cost, but no one wants to pay. When the Board of County Commissioners does its strategic planning, chances are good that getting the roads onto a 20- to 25-year residential resurfacing cycle — as opposed to our current 40 years — could be near the top of the list. It would take budgeting \$8 million to \$9 million annually, engineers say, instead of the current \$3 million.

Residents need to understand that "government" isn't "they" — it's "us." And if

we value a particular service highly, we need to understand the cost and figure out a way to fund it.

Nobody likes paying more for things, but a local option sales tax is one alternative. Only Citrus, among Florida's 67 counties, does not have one.

A sales tax to help pay for desired services — like residential road resurfacing — is paid by everyone, including visitors, as opposed to real estate tax, which hits only property owners.

People who complain that "government has plenty of money, they just want to use it for their special projects" just aren't doing the homework. Citrus County's annual budget is online, all 500-plus pages.

Reviewing it, residents will learn that offices of Constitutional Officers account for more than 40% of the county's general fund budget, and state-mandated programs consume another 32%. That doesn't leave a lot in the general fund for everything else.

Can the county be smarter about its planning and spending? Of course, everyone can. But in this case, to get our 2,400 miles of roadways into better shape, it will take some strategic thinking and some tradeoffs. And probably some sacrifice on the part of taxpayers.

## Bike paths are popular

I am calling in reference to recent calls complaining about the charges that our taxes are going to have to cover for bike paths that go along the highways, especially the toll roads and throughout Citrus County. People complaining may not have bicycles. Many, many county residents, such as myself, pay our taxes in the county to the county and love and enjoy using those bike paths.

I also have friends that come from downstate — Lee County, the Fort Myers area — who come up, rent motels, buy food at restaurants for the weekend, so they, too, can use Citrus County's wonderful bike paths. ## Stimulus stewardship

Biblical times show evidence of charity for the plight of the poor and needy. The Greeks gave as a matter of being the honorable thing to do. The Romans gave wheat without expectation of getting anything in return. When the empire ultimately fell, they may have had second thoughts since the poor Romans preferred staying at home and eating free food rather than joining the army.

The stewardship standards from the Judaic-Christian tradition of giving to the poor and needy essentially has had the greatest impact today with America's politicians, most of whom are from this tradition. The reasons for altruistic giving range from appreciation to God for his blessings to social-cultural expectations to simply feeling good about yourself. There is also the belief that everyone has something to give, even the poor, to preserve self-dignity.

These guidelines for the religious or not, have evolved from the practice of tithing — giving 10% of income to a place of worship or charitable institution. The evolving practices of such giving have expanded as to the who, when and why, including reciprocity expectations from the gift. There are even some cautions as to the percentage of what one should give so as not become poor oneself. What does this mean for America and our community?

You're poor in 2021 if your income is less than \$12,800, according to the Bureau of Census. If your income is less than \$75,000 and you receive a stimulus payment, there is the implication that you might be needy or even poor. With or without this payment, the average American family is in debt for around \$98,000. Such debt, when suddenly funds to pay are gone due to unforeseen situations such as COVID, has resulted in the need for the stimulus financial vaccination.

America is exceedingly generous to the poor and needy beyond other charitable sources. About 8% of the federal budget goes to welfare, 25% to Medicare/Medicaid/CHIP/ACA, and 23% to Social Security. All of this will cost a projected \$8.3 trillion this year resulting in a \$35 trillion projected national debt. This is likely to be slowly paid off through increased taxes or from Social Security, more jobs or simply receiving foreign loans. But given another major disruption, what then?

The great opportunity for America probably will have need of the great reconciliation for rethinking benefits versus costs in the budget.

Traffic jam eases further in Suez Canal after block

CAIRO — The maritime traffic jam on both ends of the Suez Canal eased further on Friday, four days after the dislodging of a massive containership that had blocked the waterway, authorities said.

On Monday, salvage teams freed the skyscraper-sized Ever Given, ending a crisis that had clogged one of the world's most vital waterways and halted billions of dollars a day in maritime commerce. At the time, canal officials said that more than 420 ships had been waiting for the Panama-flagged, Japanese-owned ship to be freed so they could make the crossing.

Lt. Gen. Osama Rabie, head of the Suez Canal Authority said 80 cargo ships carrying carrying a total load of 4.7 tons transited through the canal on Friday, including the American aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Train hits truck on track in Taiwan, 51 die

HUALIEN COUNTY, Taiwan — A train barreled into an unmanned truck that had rolled onto the track Friday in Taiwan, leaving at least 51 people dead and dozens injured in the island's deadliest rail disaster. Many passengers were crushed, while some survivors were forced to climb out of windows and walk along the train's roof to safety.

The truck's emergency brake was not properly engaged, according to the government's disaster relief center, and the vehicle slid about 65 feet down a hillside. Minutes later, the train's lead car crashed into it, according to Railways Administration official Weng Hui-ping, just before the train entered a tunnel.

The train, which was carrying more than 400 people, derailed near the Taroko Gorge scenic area on the first day of a long holiday weekend when many people were using Taiwan's extensive rail system, including many families with children. Images from the scene showed the train's cars wedged against the tunnel's walls. Part of the wall of one car had smashed into a seat.

The National Fire Service confirmed the death toll — which included the train's young, newly married driver and the assistant driver — and said more than 100 people were injured.

Myanmar cuts wireless internet service

YANGON, Myanmar — Myanmar's wireless broadband internet services were shut down on Friday by order of the military, local providers said, as protesters continued to defy the threat of lethal violence to oppose the junta's takeover.

A directive from the Ministry of Transport and Communications on Thursday instructed that "all wireless broadband data services be temporarily suspended until further notice," according to a statement posted online by local provider Ooredoo.

After weeks of overnight cutoffs of internet access, the military on Friday shut all links apart from those using fiberoptic cable, which was working at drastically reduced speeds.

Access to mobile networks and all wireless — the less-costly options used by most people in the developing country — was blocked.

Making a 'first step'

US, Iran pledge to begin indirect nuclear compliance talks

The United States and Iran said Friday they will begin indirect negotiations with intermediaries next week to try to get both countries back into compliance with an accord limiting Iran's nuclear program, nearly three years after President Donald Trump pulled the U.S. out of the deal.

The announcement marks one of the first bits of tangible progress in efforts to return both nations to terms of the 2015 accord, which bound Iran to restrictions in return for relief from U.S. and international sanctions.

President Joe Biden came into office saying that getting back into the accord and getting Iran's nuclear program back under international

restrictions was a priority. But Iran and the United States have disagreed over Iran's demands that sanctions be lifted first, and that deadlock has threatened to become an early foreign policy setback for the new U.S. president.

Administration officials played down expectations for next week's talks. State Department spokesperson Ned Price called the resumption of negotiations, scheduled for Tuesday in Vienna, "a healthy step forward." But Price added, "These remain early days, and we don't anticipate an immediate breakthrough as there will be difficult discussions ahead."

"This is a first step," Biden Iran envoy Rob Malley tweeted. He said diplomats were now "on the right

path."

Trump pulled the U.S. out of the accord in 2018, accusing Iran of continuous cheating and opting for what he called a maximum-pressure campaign of stepped-up U.S. sanctions and other tough actions. Iran responded by intensifying its enrichment of uranium and building of centrifuges in plain violation of the accord, while maintaining its insistence that its nuclear development was for civilian and not military purposes.

Israel, Saudi Arabia and other U.S. allies and strategic partners are on perpetual alert against the possibility of their top rival, Iran, attaining nuclear arms, keeping tensions up in a region where the U.S. military is present and has often intervened.

Christians mark Good Friday, Holy Week under virus woes

JERUSALEM — Christians in the Holy Land marked Good Friday without the mass pilgrimages usually seen in the days leading up to Easter because of the coronavirus, and worshippers in many other predominantly Christian countries where the virus is still raging observed their second annual Holy Week with tight restrictions on gatherings.

In Jerusalem, many holy sites were open, thanks to an ambitious Israeli vaccination campaign. It was a stark contrast to last year, when the city was under lockdown. In neighboring Lebanon, Christians observed Good Friday under a lockdown and suffering a severe economic crisis.

In Latin America, penitents from Mexico and Guatemala to Paraguay carried tree branches covered with thorns and large crosses in Passion Plays reenacting the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. At the Vatican, Pope Francis presided over a torch-lit Way of the Cross ceremony in St. Peter's Square, foregoing for a second year the traditional Colosseum procession that draws thousands of pilgrims, tourists and Romans.

Worshippers in the Philippines and France marked a second annual Holy Week under movement restrictions amid outbreaks fanned by more contagious strains. In the U.S., officials urged Christians to celebrate outdoors, while social distancing, or in virtual ceremonies.

In Jerusalem's Old City, Franciscan friars in brown robes led hundreds of worshippers down the Via Dolorosa, retracing what tradition holds were Jesus' final steps, while reciting prayers through loudspeakers at the Stations of the Cross. Another group carried a large wooden cross, singing hymns and pausing to offer prayers.

Religious sites were open to limited numbers of faithful. The Church of the Holy Sepulchre, built on the site where Christians believe Jesus was crucified, died and rose from the dead, was open to visitors with masks and social distancing.

Despite one of the world's most successful vaccination campaigns, air travel to and from Israel is still limited by quarantine and other restrictions,

keeping away the foreign pilgrims who usually throng Jerusalem during Holy Week. In past years, tens of thousands of pilgrims would descend on the city's holy sites.

"In regular years we urge people to come out. Last year we told people to stay at home," said Wadie Abunassar, an adviser to church leaders in the

Holy Land. "This year we are somehow silent."

"We have to pray for those who can't be here," said Alejandro Gonzalez, a Mexican living in Israel. "Those of us who can be here have a responsibility to keep them in mind and to go in this Way of the Cross that they are going through as well."

April, the giraffe online star, dies with arthritis

HARPURSVILLE, N.Y. — April, the giraffe that became a sensation when a rural New York zoo livestreamed her 2017 pregnancy and delivery, was euthanized Friday because of advancing arthritis, the zoo said.

"She is a precious member of our family, and while we knew this day would eventually come, our hearts are hurting," Animal Adventure Park owner Jordan Patch said in a statement.

The 20-year-old giraffe started showing signs of mobility problems last summer, and veterinary imaging showed she had arthritis in her feet and problems in her left hind leg, the zoo's veterinarians said in a statement. They noted that animals as large as giraffes can deteriorate quickly from arthritis.

April attracted a huge online audience as she carried her fourth calf in 2017 at the privately owned zoo in Harpursville, a village about 130 miles northwest of New York City. The giraffe cam became the second most-watched livestream in YouTube history, at least at the time, with more than 232 million views and 7.6 billion minutes of live watch time over several months.

Man charged with 4 murders in Calif. shooting

ORANGE, Calif. — A man was charged Friday with murder and attempted murder in a shooting rampage at a Southern California office building that left four people dead, including a 9-year-old boy.

Orange County prosecutors said Aminadab Gaxiola Gonzalez, 44, was charged with the attempted murder of two police officers after firing at them when they reached the scene of the shooting late Wednesday and the attempted murder of a woman who was wounded but survived. Authorities said Gaxiola had chained the gates to the business complex closed with bicycle cable-type locks before the attack.

Reports of shots fired in the city of Orange sent officers to the scene within two minutes, and they exchanged gunfire with the shooter through the gate before the locks were cut, police said. A man was found dead inside an office, a woman in another office and a second woman was found on an outdoor landing upstairs.

7 Texas officers fired following death of inmate

McKINNEY, Texas — Seven officers involved in the in-custody death of a Black jail inmate in Texas whose family members say may have been suffering a mental health crisis have been fired, a sheriff said.

The detention officers violated sheriff's office policies and procedures leading up to the death of Marvin Scott III, Collin County Sheriff Jim Skinner said in a news release Thursday. An eighth officer resigned. The names and races of the officers haven't been released.

Scott, 26, was arrested March 14 at an outlet mall in Allen on a charge of possessing less than two ounces of marijuana, authorities have said. Allen officers took Scott to a hospital because he was reportedly acting erratically. Scott was released and police took him to the county jail.

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

## Restoring the years the locusts have eaten

If all goes as planned, my youngest daughter, who turns 38 this month, will start nursing school.

She has a little more than a year left until she gets her LPN.

This is nothing short of a miracle because it was only about two years ago that she was in active heroin addiction, frequently overdosing, sometimes on the sidewalk.

(She has given me permission to finally talk about it publicly.)

Each time she overdosed, someone found her. Someone gave her Narcan and saved her life.

As hard as she ran from God, he ran harder after her.

When she was in rehab, she called me and asked me to “pray the evil out of her — right now, out loud, over the phone.”

Addiction IS evil — and destructive. It nearly destroyed, not only my daughter’s life, but the lives of people around her, especially our family.

There’s an Old Testament verse I think about often: God is telling the suffering Israelites, “I will restore to you the years that the locusts have eaten” (Joel 2:25).

A locust (looks like a grasshopper) isn’t that big, about two or three inches long. But they move in swarms of millions, invading an area, devouring ALL the vegetation, stripping it bare for miles and miles.

That’s what the fallout from addiction feels like, a complete and utter invasion that strips you bare of everything except grief, fear, anxiety, mistrust and anger.

Until — unless — God steps in and begins to restore the devastation.

In “The Magician’s Nephew” by C.S. Lewis, there’s a story about Diggory, a young boy whose mother is gravely ill.

Aslan the Lion, the Christ figure in Lewis’ books, gives Diggory an apple from a magical healing tree to give to his mother.

She eats the apple, but nothing happens immediately. Over time, however, her face looks different, she’s able to sit up, and then a month later she’s well enough to sit in the garden with her son.

All this time, Diggory struggles to believe that his mom’s healing is really happening.

But when he remembers the face of Aslan, he feels hope.

Over the past year or so, I’ve seen glimpses of change in my daughter and I’m allowing myself to slowly trust that healing is really happening — in all of us.

I told her the other day that, because she’s 1,000 miles away in Ohio, we don’t see her in her everyday life so we don’t see how she’s changing. For us, the destruction of the locusts is still fresh in our memory.

That’s true of her, too, in different ways. Because of the destruction caused by her addiction, restoration and rebuilding looks daunting and at times she wonders if she’ll ever see it.

Sometimes when it seems she’s moving forward, something will happen to push her back a few steps and she gets frustrated and discouraged.

When she first enrolled at the nursing school and learned how much the tuition is, she worried about how she would pay for it, what the down payment would be, if she could get financial aid.

Her car needed repairs and she got an insanely high electric bill after a long, cold winter.

Then she met with the finance person at the college and sent me a copy of the results:

They gave her more than \$20,000 in Pell grants, and her down payment: \$179!

The tax returns they used to calculate her program were the years of her active addiction — the very years the locusts had eaten, the years she barely earned anything at all.

“Only God,” she told me.

Only God, indeed.

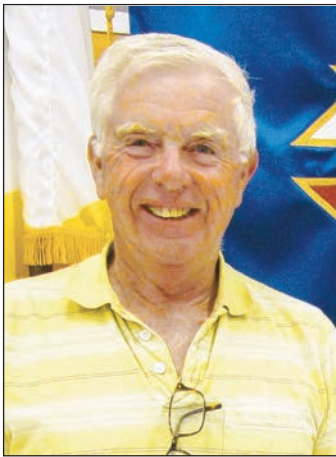

# MLB moving All-Star Game

## League responds to voting restrictions in Georgia

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball announced Friday it was moving this summer's All-Star Game from Atlanta's Truist Park, a response to Georgia enacting a new law last month restricting voting rights.

MLB had awarded the game to Atlanta in May 2019 and the game was scheduled for July 13 as part of baseball's midsummer break that includes the Futures Game on July 11 and Home Run Derby the following night.

Commissioner Rob Manfred made the decision to move the All-Star events and the amateur draft, which had been scheduled to be held in Atlanta for the first time. A new ballpark for this year's events wasn't immediately revealed.

MLB's announcement came eight days after Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp signed a sweeping Republican-sponsored overhaul of state elections that includes new restrictions on voting by mail and greater legislative control over how elections are run.

Manfred made the decision after discussions with the Major League Baseball Players Association, individual players and the Players Alliance, an organization of Black players formed after the death of George Floyd last year.

"I have decided that the best way to demonstrate our values as a sport is by relocating this year's All-Star Game and MLB draft," Manfred said in a statement. "Major League Baseball fundamentally supports voting rights for all Americans and opposes restrictions to the ballot box."

"Fair access to voting continues to have our game's unwavering support," Manfred said.

Other sports have moved high-profile events because of social issues.

Nats' COVID outbreak scraps Mets series

WASHINGTON — A COVID-19 outbreak affecting more than a third of the Washington Nationals' roster caused the postponement of the 2019 World Series champions' season-opening three-game series against the visiting New York Mets.

Four of Washington's players have tested positive for the illness caused by the novel coronavirus, and another five were quarantining after contact tracing determined they might have been exposed, general manager Mike Rizzo said Friday in a video call with reporters.

"We're in crisis management mode," Rizzo said.

His team is also in a holding pattern, uncertain when it actually will be allowed to play a game — or even hold workouts. After games against the Mets scheduled for Thursday, Saturday and Sunday at Nationals Park were scratched, the next possible contest for Washington would be at home against the NL East champion Atlanta Braves on Monday.

Orioles, Means win delayed opener over Red Sox 3-0

BOSTON — John Means pitched seven innings of one-hit ball, allowing a single to lead off the game and retiring the last 18 batters he faced on Friday to lead the Baltimore Orioles to a 3-0 victory over the Boston Red Sox in their rain-delayed opener.

Means struck out five and allowed just two baserunners — the other on an error — earning the win when Ryan Mountcastle doubled in two runs in the sixth to break a scoreless tie. Anthony Santander added an RBI single in the eighth.

Cedric Mullins and Pedro Severino each had two hits for Baltimore, which finished fourth in the AL East last season, one game ahead of the last-place Red Sox. Tanner Scott pitched one hitless inning and César Valdez got the last three outs for the save.

UF's rebuild begins with transfers McKissic, Felder

GAINESVILLE — After a week of departures that saw four of his players enter the transfer portal and two more turn pro, Florida coach Mike White took the first steps in replacing them Friday.

White got commitments from Kansas City guard Brandon McKissic and Boston

College forward CJ Felder. Both announced their landing spot on social media.

McKissic led the Roos with 17.2 points a game this season and was a finalist for the Lefty Driesell National Defensive Player of the Year Award. He will be a graduate transfer in Gainesville during the 2021-22 season.

Felder, a 6-foot-7 South Carolina native, averaged 9.7 points and 5.9 rebounds as a sophomore for the Eagles this season. Felder had offers from Cincinnati, Clemson, UConn, LSU, Murray State, Ole Miss, South Carolina, Texas A&M, Texas Tech, Vanderbilt, Virginia and Xavier.

# Raptors rout Warriors

The 53-point win was the biggest in the NBA this season, two points wider than the final margin of Dallas’ 124-73 win over the Los Angeles Clippers on Dec. 27. The last time an NBA game was decided by more: Dec. 8, 2018, when Boston beat Chicago 133-57.

Andrew Wiggins led Golden State with 15 points, all in the first half. It was the seventh loss in eight games for the the Warriors, who played without Steph Curry and Draymond Green, a late scratch with a left finger injury.

## Celtics 118, Rockets 102

BOSTON — Jayson Tatum scored 26 points, Robert Williams had a career-high 20 points, nine rebounds and eight assists, and Boston defeated Houston.

Trade deadline acquisition Evan Fournier hit a career-best seven 3-pointers to finish with 23 points, and Jaylen Brown scored 22 to help the Celtics snap a two-game skid.

Christian Wood led Houston with 19 points and 10 rebounds.

## Mavericks 99, Knicks 86

# Stanford women reach title game

*First time in final since 2010*

SAN ANTONIO — Haley Jones scored 24 points, including the go-ahead jumper with 32 seconds left, to help Stanford beat South Carolina 66-65 on Friday night and advance to the women’s NCAA Tournament championship game.

It’s Stanford’s first trip to the title game since 2010, which was also in San Antonio. The Cardinal lost to UConn in that contest, 53-47.

The Cardinal (30-2) will play the winner of UConn and Arizona for the title on Sunday night. Coach Tara VanDerveer will be looking for her third national championship at the school and first since 1992.

Trailing 65-64 with 32 seconds left, Jones hit a jumper from the corner off a rebound that gave the Cardinal a one-point lead.

“I just saw the ball bouncing around and most of my teammates were hitting some bodies to open it up. I just let it fly and I said, ‘Please, Jesus, go in,’ and it did,” Jones said. “And then we just had to go on to the next play, there’s no time to get hyped about, we had to get back on defense.”

Aliyah Boston had her shot blocked, but got her own rebound. Then, with 15 seconds left, Destanni Henderson threw a pass that was stolen by Ashten Prechtel.

After an inbounds, Cameron Brink lost the ball at midcourt to Boston, giving South Carolina a chance. Brea Beal missed a driving layup and Boston’s put-back at the buzzer also was off the rim, sending the Cardinal onto the court to celebrate.

“Bre had a great shot. Aliyah, we should’ve boxed her out, she had a great shot, thankfully, it didn’t go in and we’re

moving on to Sunday,” Jones said.

Jones and Fran Belibi ran to Boston, who was still standing under the basket and both embraced her with a long hug.

Henderson had scored six consecutive points to give the Gamecocks (26-5) a 65-64 lead with 38.8 seconds left. She had a three-point play and a 3-pointer.

Zia Cooke finished with 25 points to lead South Carolina.

Trailing 15-6 midway through the first quarter, Stanford scored the last nine points of the period to tie the game heading

into the second. The Gamecocks missed their final six shots of the quarter and were scoreless for the final 4:48.

“We know basketball team’s have runs, so we can’t let that first quarter or the first five minutes dictate the whole game,” said Stanford’s Lexie Hull, who had 18 points and 13 rebounds.

The drought continued in the second quarter as the Gamecocks missed their first five shots and didn’t hit a field goal until Zia Cooke’s 3-pointer in the quarter made it 22-20. She had hit the previous

basket nearly 9 1/2 minutes earlier.

The Cardinal had outscored the Gamecocks 16-2 since the early deficit.

Stanford led 31-25 at the half as Prechtel picked up where she left off from the win over Louisville in the Elite Eight. She had 16 points, all in the second half, to help the Cardinal rally to beat Louisville.

She had seven in the opening 20 minutes against South Carolina.

Boston had a solid first half with seven points, nine rebounds and four blocks for the Gamecocks. She finished

with 11 points, 16 rebounds and four blocks.

## BANGED UP

Brink came into the game banged up after tweaking her leg in the Elite Eight win over Louisville. She had six points and six blocks.

## RECORD SHOOTING

Jones hit the first 3-pointer of the second half for Stanford to break the record for most 3-pointers in the NCAA Tournament. That was the Cardinal’s 55th in the five games, giving them one more than UConn had in 2015.

# Sinner advances to Miami Open final

*19-year-old from Italy will face Poland’s Hurkacz*

MIAMI — Former junior skiing champion Jannik Sinner has joined some fast company at the Miami Open.

On Friday, the 19-year-old Italian became the fourth teenager to reach the Miami men’s final. The others: Novak Djokovic, Rafael Nadal and Andre Agassi.

“It’s nice, but it doesn’t mean anything,” Sinner said. “The road to have a big name is long. It’s not done in one week of a tournament.”

Sinner, who chose tennis over skiing at age 13, is playing in only his third top-level ATP event. He rallied in the semifinal to beat Spanish counterpuncher Roberto Bautista Agut, 5-7, 6-4, 6-4.

Sinner will next face No. 26-seeded Hubert Hurkacz of Poland, who advanced to his first ATP Masters 1000 final by beating No. 4 Andrey Rublev 6-3, 6-4. Hurkacz, 24, improved to 9-0 in Florida this year, including his second career ATP title in Delray Beach in January.

Djokovic, Nadal and Roger Federer skipped the tournament, creating opportunities for the four semifinalists.

“We knew many players were not coming here, especially the big three,” Sinner said. “I have a good team, and we approached this tournament to go very, very far.”

On the women’s side, No. 1-ranked Ash Barty will play for her second consecutive Miami title Saturday against No. 8 Bianca Andreescu, who edged No. 23 Maria Sakkari in a three-setter that ended at 1:35 a.m. Friday.

“I love a challenge,” Andreescu said, “and I know she’s going to challenge me on Saturday.”

The lanky Sinner, seeded 21st, has improved his ranking

from 78th at the start of last year. He created a buzz by reaching the quarterfinals in his French Open debut in September and is projected to climb to at least No. 24 next week.

“He has everything, no?” Bautista Agut said. “He has a big serve, he’s big, he moves well, he has very good groundstrokes. Mentally he’s also great and improving. He has a great future.”

Sinner’s matchup against the No. 7-seeded Bautista Agut was a contrast in styles, with Sinner’s overpowering groundstrokes gradually wearing down his dogged opponent.

Sinner caught a break at 3-all in the second set, when Bautista Agut let a ball go on break point,

and it landed on the line.

“I thought that ball was going out, and it touches the line by one millimeter,” Bautista Agut said. “Tennis, sometimes it’s crazy, no? One ball can make a big difference in the match.”

Sinner went on to hold and broke in the final game of the set to even the match.

Down a break in the final set, Sinner rallied again and closed out the win with one last crushing groundstroke to break at love.

A fist pump was the extent of his celebration. He has an impassive demeanor he attributes to his parents, who make their living at a restaurant in northern Italy — his dad as a cook, his mother as a server.

“They are working every day a simple job,” he said. “They know what it means to work hard.”

Sinner and Hurkacz are good friends and doubles partners, but they’ve never played each other on the tour.

“Obviously I’m super happy to be where I am,” Hurkacz said. “Jannik hits the ball very hard from both sides, and I’ll have to try to stay aggressive and play my best tennis.”

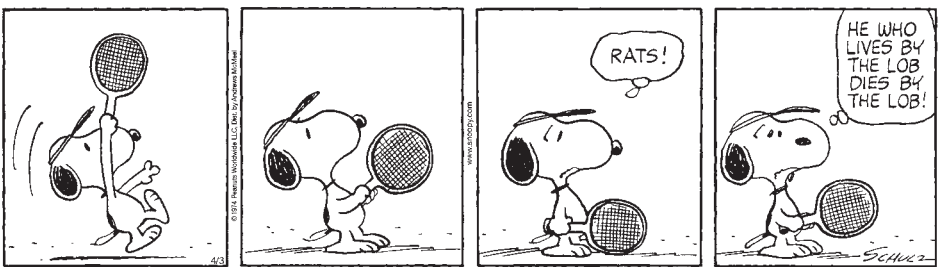
Hurkacz, who defeated No. 2-seeded Stefanos Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals, has beaten two top-10 opponents in the same tournament for the first time. He’s projected to move from No. 37 to a career-high No. 27 in next week’s rankings.

# Wie West tumbles out of ANA; Tavatanakit keeps lead

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. — Michelle Wie West tumbled out of the ANA Inspiration on a hot, breezy Friday afternoon in the desert. Patty Tavatanakit held onto the lead.

Playing for the second straight week after a 21-month break, Wie West followed an opening 2-under 70 with a birdie-less 79 to miss the cut in the first major championship of the year.

“Wasn’t a good day,” Wie West said. “Got a little mucky from the first hole. Was right up against a tree. ... I feel like I’ve had some really good moments and some really bad moments. Definitely a lot of positives to take from and definitely have my work cut out for me.”

The long-hitting Tavatanakit took the lead with an opening 66 and shot a 69 in 97-degree afternoon heat to reach 9 under, a stroke ahead of Shanshan Feng.

“I didn’t want to take it the way that like, ‘Oh, I’m leading a major championship,’” Tavatanakit said. “I just wanted to look at it as it’s another round, it’s another tournament, even though it’s a big tournament.”

Tavatanakit holed out from 115 yards for eagle on the par-4 15th on her first nine, with the ball flying into the hole.

“I thought it was just a good shot,” Tavatanakit said. “I thought it hit the pin and went somewhere else. No one clapped, there are no fans. We couldn’t figure it out. It was so bright we all couldn’t see. I walked up and looked in the hole and I was like, ‘Oh, it went in.’”

The 21-year-old former UCLA player from Thailand missed the cut last week in Carlsbad in the Kia Classic with rounds of 71 and 79. She tied for fifth in February in the Gainbridge LPGA for her best LPGA Tour finish.

Wie West bogeyed the first three par 5s — the lowlight a 100-yard drive into a left-side tree on No. 9. With only mask-less father B.J. following her with no spectators at Mission Hills, she opened with bogeys on Nos. 1-3 — a day after making long birdie putts on each of them to start her back nine.

The 31-year-old Wie West returned to competition in Carlsbad, missing the cut with rounds of 81 and 74. She was playing for the first time since marrying Jonnie West, the son of basketball great Jerry West, in August 2019 and giving birth to daughter Makenna last June.

“Making the right decision takes practice, too,” Wie West said. “That’s something that is hard to practice when you aren’t playing, and that’s probably where the rust really showed.”

Feng also is coming off a long layoff after sitting out 16 months because of the coronavirus pandemic and a recent visa delay. The Chinese star birdied the final two holes for a 69.

“Result-wise it doesn’t really matter because I’m very happy about what I’m doing as the first tournament coming back,” Feng said.

International players held the first 19 positions on leaderboard, with Moriya Jutanugarn of Thailand third at 7 under after a 69.

“Just have to be a lot of patient out there,” Jutanugarn said. “I’m not a long hitter, so I just have to take what I can and just trying to play smart.”

Two-time major champion Anna Nordqvist was 6 under after a 70. She birdied two of the last three holes.

“Having won two before, those are the ones that motivate me to go practice every day,” the 33-year-old Swede said. “If you got a little bit of a taste of it, like it’s just such an incredible feeling.”

Charley Hull also was 6 under after her second 69. She birdied three par 5s.

“I have great memories here,” Hull said. “I first played in this event I think when I was 15 years old as an amateur and my dad was here with me.”

Top-ranked Jin Young Ko, the 2019 winner who was unable to play the event last year because of travel restrictions, shot a 70 to join defending champion Mirim Lee (70) and fellow major champions Inbee Park (69), Lydia Ko (69), Sophia Popov (69) and Georgia Hall (70) at 5 under.

**Tringale takes 2-shot edge in Texas**

SAN ANTONIO — Cameron Tringale made a move for his first PGA Tour victory with a 3-under-par 69 and a two-shot lead after two rounds of the Valero Texas Open.

Tringale, a 12-year veteran, was at 9-under 135 after a round that included five-straight birdies and leads Jordan Spieth and Englishman Matt Wallace.

Spieth continued his comeback from a three-year winless slump and was at 7-under after a 70. Wallace shot 68. Kyle Stanley also shot 68 and was at 5-under with Brandt Snedeker (67), Kevin Stadler (70) and Erik van Rooyen (68).

First-round leader Camilo Villegas shot a 76 to fall five shots back in a group that includes Matt Kuchar, who shot his second 70.

Tringale led by as many as five strokes after he closed out his front nine with consecutive birdies on his fourth through eighth holes and then birdied his 11th. Three of those featured approach shots left him with putts of less than 5 feet.

“I just hit a lot of really good iron shots to those holes,” Tringale said. “I think my furthest putt was 4 feet, so just good approaches to the green. Still gotta roll those in, but was able to do it. I took advantage most of the time.”

His birdie run marked a quick turnaround from his start when he opened with bogeys on his first two holes.

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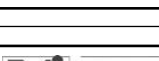
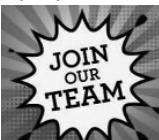
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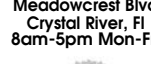
