Thanksgiving takes on new meaning after profound accident

Thanksgiving Day, Ashley Mehler found her husband, Eran, in a self-induced coma — a food coma — from indulging on the holiday feast.

“Don’t think for a second that ‘#foodcoma #notarealcoma’ wasn’t on Facebook,” Ashley quipped with her husband sitting next to her as the couple laughed at the humor.

Added Eran: “That’s hilarious.”

The good-natured ribbing between the two aside, they both realize it’s a far cry from where they found themselves in late July when Eran, a master mechanic, was caught underneath a vehicle lift at Eagle Buick GMC in Homosassa.

“No one really knows how it happened,” Eran said. “Judging by the tire tracks across my body and how I was pinned under the vehicle, it looked like when I was exiting out from under the vehicle, that my shirt, either the wind caught it or something, and my shirt got caught under the tire ...”

Duke Energy eyes 10 new solar plants

As utilities continue moving forward with plans to expand solar energy, state regulators are set to take up a Duke Energy Florida proposal that would add 10 solar plants in the coming years.

But like a similar plan approved this year for Florida Power & Light, the Duke proposal has drawn opposition because of the way it is structured and financed.

Duke’s proposal, called the Clean Energy Connection Program, would involve some customers voluntarily paying more upfront on their bills to help finance the projects and then receiving future bill credits.

Utility officials said the program would benefit all of its customers because the solar projects would ultimately reduce the need to build costly natural-gas plants and would help reduce carbon emissions.

Duke spokeswoman Ana Gibbs said the company plans to invest \$1 billion in new solar power plants across Florida in the next three years.

“We anticipate building approximately 10 solar power plants, which will each be just under 75 megawatts,” Gibbs said. “The first plants will go online in 2022 and more will follow through 2024.”

Farms near Crystal River still in development phase

California-based Pattern Development plans to build two solar farms on 500 acres each at the LafargeHolcim quarry north of Crystal River.

But construction plans are on hold, at least until after the holidays, said Joab Ortiz, who provides stakeholder management services at Burns & McDonnell.

“We’re still in the development phase,” said Ortiz, who chose not to comment further.

Pattern, a renewable energy company, plans to turn 1,000 acres at the quarry into a solar-power facility.

At the height of construction, the \$150-million project is expected to employ 190 workers, according to an earlier interview with Jenn Ritchey, senior manager of business development at Pattern.

When completed, the farms would generate 150 megawatts of electricity capable of powering about 17,500 local homes.

Ritchey has said Citrus County will realize economic benefits by way of property taxes and jobs.

“If you look around, some of these people have nice vehicles, but you don’t know what’s going on, what makes people come at five in the morning to wait for food,” said the Rev. Doug Alexander, pastor of the New Church Without Walls, at the Saturday, Nov. 21, 2020 food giveaway at the Crystal River Mall. “We don’t ask questions; we just do what we can.”

Christmas parades overhauled due to virus concerns

The coronavirus has changed everything, even the way we view parades.

This year, the two cities’ Christmas parades will still take place, but with a reverse twist: floats will remain stationary and viewers will drive by to view them from the safety of their vehicles.

Dates and times are the same: 6 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 5, in Crystal River and noon Saturday, Dec. 12, in Inverness. The locations will be changed.

The Chamber is working with the Citrus County Sheriff’s Office to route the floats in the Crystal River Christmas parade around a one-mile interior road at the Crystal River Mall.

In Inverness, the reverse parade will be along Highlands Boulevard, from Montgomery Avenue to Apopka Avenue.

“This has been done successfully in other communities and both cities seem to be on board with this idea,” said Josh Wooten, Citrus County Chamber of Commerce president and CEO.



New coronavirus tests available locally with results in 15 minutes

The wait for results of a coronavirus test can be long and stressful, especially if it takes more than a week to get results.

The long wait is over.

On Friday, Nov. 20, 2020, Brashear’s Pharmacy in Inverness began offering rapid response testing for the coronavirus with results in just 15 minutes.

Along with some basic health questions and paperwork before the test, customers can be out the door with test results in under half an hour.

Although the pharmacy has two locations, only the Inverness one on 206 W. Dampier St., offers the testing from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays.

Currently, the only other health care business in the county to offer the rapid test is Quick Care Med.

“This is just one more way we can keep our neighbors and families healthier and protect our community,” said Elis Brashear, pharmacist and manager of the store in Inverness.



Suncoast focus shifts to Citrus County route

Where should the Suncoast Parkway go? That’s the multi-million dollar question that a multi-county task force has spent 15 months meeting in person and virtually to discuss which route to use to extend the Suncoast Parkway north to I-10 in Jefferson County.

The conclusion: Better to use what’s there now than build an entire new roadway.

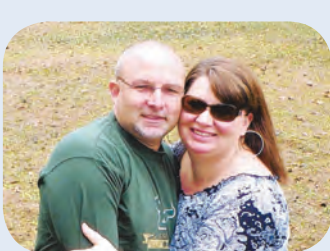
Senate President Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, whose district includes Citrus, said he supports using U.S. 19 and building bypasses around towns to move traffic north and south.

“I like the idea of being less impactful to the environment, especially if we can attain the same goals,” he said.

The section between U.S. 98 and State Road 44 in Lecanto is under construction and scheduled to open in early 2022.

Where does that leave Citrus County and its attempts to keep the parkway moving north?

County Commission Chairman Scott Carnahan, who served on the task force, said the focus should be on keeping the parkway onward to a quiet stretch of U.S. 19 at Red Level.



Community rallies to support woman with terminal cancer

For 22 years, Coach Deon Copeland and his wife, Amy, have been inseparable.

They went to Lecanto High School together, had classes together, although they didn’t really know each other until after they had graduated, Deon Copeland said.

Deon has worked for the school district as an assistant high school principal, teacher and coach. Amy worked for River Safaris in Homosassa.

Now, cancer threatens to separate them as Amy suffers with terminal metastatic breast cancer throughout her body.

A fundraising benefit is scheduled to take place from noon to 5 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 5, 2020, at Fat Daddy’s Roadhouse, 1470 S. Suncoast Blvd. (U.S. 19) in Homosassa.

Former school board member, dedicated churchgoer Mark Stone dies at 62

Representing Citrus County’s education system and serving one of its largest churches were roles Mark Stone performed with understanding and compassion.

Mark Henry Stone Sr., of Homosassa, died early Saturday, Nov. 14, 2020, during a single-vehicle crash in Hernando County. He was 62.

His tenure on the county school board eased tensions, and his time caring for the people and grounds of Seven Rivers Church was invaluable.

“He was very religious, very family-orientated and just a really nice, wonderful man,” said Pat Deutschman, who was elected to the school board alongside Stone in 1998.

“Mark was a great guy and had a really good sense of humor; he wasn’t a fake, he was an authentic guy,” said Adam Jones, one of the pastors at Seven Rivers Church in Lecanto, where Stone was a member for 27 years. “Some people live here, and Mark lived here but loved our community.”

Attorneys question 'trade secrets'

Florida regulators ponder excluding proprietary information from hearings

The Florida Public Service Commission (PSC) may ask legislators next year to adopt revisions to state law to allow them to hear some public hearing testimony in secret to safeguard utilities' proprietary information and confidential trade secrets.

The proposed measure was raised by PSC attorney Keith Hetrick last week before a public hearing on Duke Energy's Connection Program, noting the need for revision in PSC public hearing requirements was fostered by a September court ruling involving Duke Energy.

"As you know, our current processes for dealing with confidential information during the course of the hearing are very cumbersome, outdated and disjointed," Hetrick told the PSC board, which regulates utilities in Florida.

The PSC upheld in September an administrative law judge's recommendation that Duke Energy return \$16.1 million to customers after the

utility repaired a Wheedon Island power plant in 2012.

The utility charged customers for the extra power needed to replace the power offline during the repairs. The Office of Public Counsel (OPC), which represents ratepayers before the PSC, objected, and a public hearing was scheduled to discuss the issue.

Administrative Law Judge Lawrence Stevenson recommended in April that Duke return \$11.1 million in replacement power costs required during the outage.

Stevenson also recommended the utility refund about \$5 million to cover replacement energy costs created by a faulty 2017-19 turbine after coming back online.

During the subsequent PSC hearing, however, the commission, for the first time ever, agreed to Duke Energy's request to bar the public from hearing some testimony because it involved propriety trade secrets.

Under current law, the PSC must keep hearings open. When confidential information or proprietary concepts are key to discussions, the PSC can refer a case to the Florida Division of Administrative Hearings, which is allowed to close portions of hearings.

In outlining the tentative legislative proposal last week, Hetrick said the prospective 2021 bill would allow the commission to close portions of hearings to ask questions about confidential trade secrets and no longer would require the PSC to refer cases involving proprietary information to the Division of Administrative Hearings.

Hetrick said the bill would not seek to change the definition of what qualifies as proprietary or confidential information, and it would affect only a handful of cases.

OPC attorney J.R. Kelly objected to the proposed legislation, noting the public has the right to hear all information related to their bills.

This year, over 30 nonprofit and for-profit businesses and organizations came together in this effort. After months of planning and collaboration, it again resulted in success.

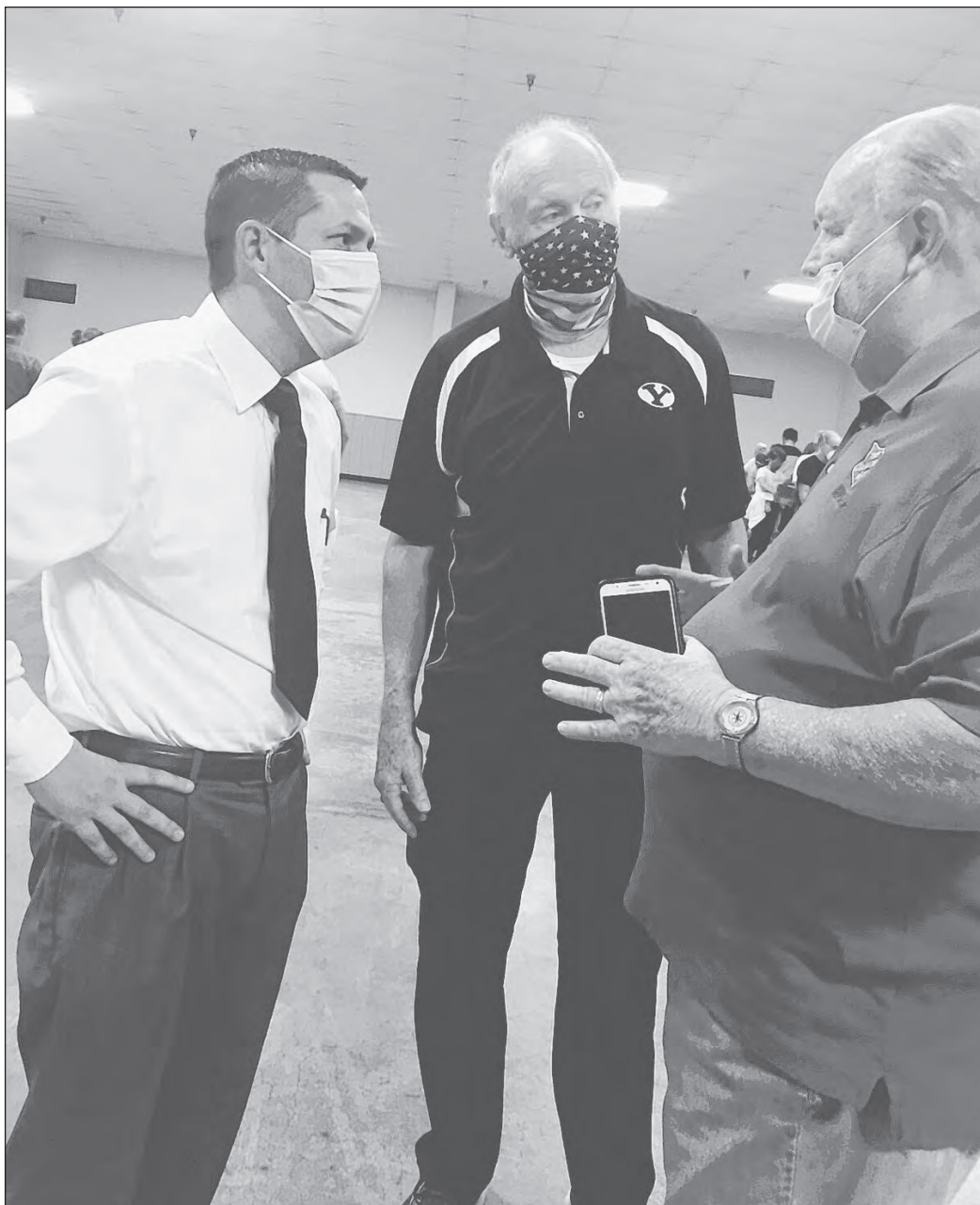

The following Saturday morning, volunteers loaded the boxes in the trunks and back seats of vehicles in an efficient drive-through distribution. Turkeys and over 400 boxes of food were given away to recipients who qualified through the Salvation Army.

The efforts and contributions of many make this unique effort truly a community event. Doug Lobel, president of the Thanksgiving Feeding Alliance, coordinated the efforts again this year. Richard Clay and Bishop Ed Nixon of the Lecanto Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints arranged for the donation of \$20,000 in nonperishable food items from the Church.

Publix donated \$1,000 in credit toward providing 600 turkeys. Black Diamond Foundation issued a \$5,000 matching donation challenge to the community. Brannen Bank collected monetary donations in all of its 11 branches.

“So then at some point, it pulled me under,” Eran said, standing no more than 15 feet from where the accident occurred.

“I still have some bruising on my left side from where the tires were up on my chest and arms,” he said. “I still have a scar on my lefthand side, it looks like two tires. It’s slowly fading away on the right side arm and ribs. It was such a deep contusion.”

His wife, Ashley, a former law enforcement officer, remembers going to the trauma room.

“Having seen so many people run over in my life already, they handed me his clothes,” she said. “I remembered parts of the shirt being shredded. It appeared as if he had been run over.”

Instead of celebrating Thanksgiving at home, Eran was initially supposed to be still be in the hospital, halfway through a six-month stay. He spent 12 days in a coma after being airlifted to Bayonet Point before doctors transferred him to Tampa General Hospital.

“He died twice,” Ashley said, pausing before explaining his heart stopped two separate times: once after the initial incident; the second time at Bayonet Point.

And for the Mehler family, Tampa General will always hold a special place in their hearts. It was there, through in-vitro fertilization, their 18-month-old daughter, Emma, was conceived and born. The first of two miracles, Ashley said; the second, they saved her husband’s life.

Three days after being transferred to the main floor, Eran was discharged, sent home to recover and work through the physical therapy.

“The only reason he made such a massive quick recovery, is because he was at home,” Ashley said, as Eran agreed.

“I was in a comfortable environment,” Eran, 41, said. “Who likes a hospital really? You’re always in there for the wrong reason unless it’s the birth of a child.”

New meaning

So as families wrap up the long Thanksgiving weekend, for the Mehler family, “Thanksgiving has a whole other meaning, it all does.”

“It sounds extremely cliché,” Eran admitted. “You don’t know what life really is until you die or you’re on your death bed. You have your regrets; it is kind of that way. Because now those little things that used to bother you and stuff like that, it’s like, who cares, who cares. It’s just like that in an instant. It’s funny how your brain blocks it out.”

It’s not the lone item his mind has blocked off; he remembers nothing from the incident which nearly cost him his life.

“That was my biggest fear,” said Ashley, who met Eran while she stationed in Virginia during her service time with the U.S. Navy. “Having come to close to death myself, I was scared he was going to be scared and have all of those memories flashing back to him. Just knowing what he’d gone through, being that close to death and thinking you’re going to die.

“I worried about his fear level and fear level coming up,” she said. “I remember talking to one of the men who was there that day and asking Eran, ‘do you remember anything?’ Eran said, ‘No.’ He told him, ‘thank God. I hope you never do.

“He did make Thanksgiving a year-round priority; every day is Thanksgiving and Valentine’s Day,” Ashley said. “Him being sweet, interested in everything I do. He’s going out of his way to do stuff for me. It’s like being married for the first time again.”

Eran said he gives thanks every day and attempts to show that same appreciation every day.

“That shouldn’t be reserved just for a singular

holiday,” he said. “It’s something you should do all year-round. I do it with her, the baby, myself, my friends and my coworkers.”

The accident “was like a massive reset on everything,” the couple said.

“You get to re-approach everything, your relationships, parenting, employment,” Eran said. “A lot of that stuff was kind of wiped out. You get to learn all of this stuff again, seeing it through new eyes, where you have so much greater appreciation for everything. The ability to breathe, see my wife, my daughter every day.”

Eran texts his wife every day from the driveway on his return home.

“Emma comes hurdling out of the house, stops, gets her necklaces, she’s gotta look pretty for daddy,” Eran said with an ear-to-ear grin, “then comes rocketing out of the house, yelling, screaming, laughing ... you cannot pass up on a feeling like that.”

Still joking

All Eran remembers is waking up in the hospital; a feeding tube running out of his nose, and that is his biggest complaint from his time in the hospital: the food.

“That’s what you remember?” his wife asked.

“I always remember food,” he jokingly said, rubbing his stomach.

Ashley, still sitting next to Eran, shakes her head.

“He was considered brain dead for 80 hours,” she said.

“She still thinks I’m brain dead,” Eran quipped.

“He still uses at it as excuse. For general male things, like this selective hearing,” she said.

“I had a hearing test and apparently everything is OK,” he responded.

That’s how their

relationship works — the jokes, back and forth. “That’s how we get along,” they said.

Because of the pandemic, Ashley wasn’t allowed to visit Eran in the hospital, and she wasn’t there when he woke up from the almost two-week-long coma. And that’s when Ashley might have won their often back-and-forth joking. Eran messaged her to get an explanation as to why he was in a hospital and where she was.

Ashley filled him in via text about everything up to that point. She jokingly and poignantly concluded her message with a meme of, “But did you die?” a sentence said in the popular movie “The Hangover” by the character Mr. Chow, played by actor Ken Jeong.

“That should still be in my messages,” Eran laughed.

New ‘normal’

“Normal” is slowly returning to the Mehler family, as Eran returned to work four weeks ago.

“The first couple of days, it was a little ... nerve wracking,” Eran said. “It was nice being around my friends, but being around the vehicles and having them up on the lifts ... at one point, I had to squeeze between two objects and put a little pressure on my chest. It kind of freaked me out a little bit.

“But everybody here has been so supportive, in the way a mechanic could be supportive. We give each other a lot of hazing. That really helps with easing the tension of being back. The wisecracks help alleviate the tension,” Eran said.

There were no reservations about returning to work, Eran said.

“That’s not true,” Ashley said, glaring at him. “Once you finally came back to work, you didn’t have any,

but before that, he did have some reservations.”

“I would say none now,” Eran corrected himself.

Ashley, however, admitted, life will never be “normal.”

“For me, things will never go back to the way they were pre-accident, there’s a new heightened level of alertness,” she said. “I still a lot of trauma from it. It will bring me back to those first 80 hours when I thought he wasn’t going to make it. Something is going to happen. We always thought it would me on that end; we never prepared for the reverse.”

The Mehlers credited Eagle Buick for its “fantastic” treatment of them during the incident and in the days, weeks and months afterward.

“I know all eyes are on me to make sure I am

doing well,” Eran said.

“It’s like a second family, everyone there is so cool, they have a vested interest in each other and the company. We’re working toward a common goal. It’s one of the best dealerships I have ever worked at. The best crew of people I’ve ever worked with. They’ve been nothing but great to us.”

New perspective

While Eran isn’t 100% recovered from the accident, the Mehler’s aren’t dwelling on what happened or what could have been. They’re focused on the here and now.

“You never know when you’re going to get that phone call,” Ashley said. “Don’t waste any of (the time), because it could all be gone in a second. It’s quick. It’s not the same.”

Eran used to take life

for granted, Ashley said.

“I’m kind of glad the accident happened,” she said. “He doesn’t take life for granted anymore.

“He doesn’t waste his time that are meaningless. He’s 100% focused on his family; just isn’t concerned with his past demons.”

Eran agreed, explaining he emancipated himself from his parents at the age of 13.

“I grew up disconnected from society,” he said. “So, I wasn’t taught a lot of social skills, value or appreciation of things, because I basically raised myself. I was an extremely selfish, self-centered person and it’s all about me.

“You don’t realize how many lives you touch; even with your selfish behavior, now it’s about doing whatever I can for everyone else.”

Members of the Citrus County Planning and Development Commission (PDC) in April voted unanimously to recommend county commissioners approve Pattern Development's conditional-use request for its Crystal River Solar 2 plant.

This \$100-million solar-panel field is one of two the company is trying to build on leased land that makes up the quarry, which neighbors Duke Energy's Crystal River Energy Complex.

Once Pattern's 35-year lease ends with the quarry, it will decommission its solar complex.

Pattern proposed an original design of Crystal River Solar 2 to the PDC in August, but made changes to its plans since then for approval.

Jenn Ritchey, Pattern's senior manager of business development, told PDC members changes include: an additional 30 acres of solar panels; a shorter and more direct access road from U.S. 19; and a electric transmission line that runs south to a nearby substation and the grid.

Gibbs said Duke is considering a number of sites across the state and could not confirm Citrus County is one of them.

"However, the program must still be approved by the Florida Public Service Commission (PSC)," she said. "Therefore, we are not at a point where we have specific sites yet."

Sen. Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, said he would support a solar plant in Citrus County as long as it doesn't hike customers' energy bills and they are built efficiently.

"I would like to see them built in the most efficient places and if that's Citrus County, then yes," Simpson said.

Solar energy, he said, is becoming a cost-effective alternative energy source

"At first glance, this looks like an attractive proposal," Josh Wooten, president/CEO

of the Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, said. "Clean energy is the way of the future. If it's affordable and fair to utility customers, we can get behind it."

Critics contend the program will have costs and financial risks for the vast majority of Duke customers who will not participate. For example, the bill credits for participants in the program will be financed through money that customers pay to cover power-plant fuel expenses.

"The CEC program as proposed is an inappropriate and fundamentally unfair means to increase solar generation on Duke's grid, and the (Public Service) Commission should accordingly reject Duke's petition," wrote attorneys for the Earthjustice legal group, which is representing the League of United Latin American Citizens in opposing the plan.

Gibbs said the Clean Energy Connection Program is

designed to be cost-effective for both participating and nonparticipating customers and will enable Duke Energy Florida customers to support the expansion of solar power.

It helps business and governmental customers meet their sustainability goals — all while lowering bills over time.

With program enrollment, low-income customers will see guaranteed savings on their bill every month, Gibbs said.

Those customers will pay an \$8.35 monthly per kW subscription fee and receive a \$9.03 monthly per kW bill credit, producing a savings of 68 cents for every kW subscribed, according to Duke.

In this case, a low-income customer subscribing to a 3-kW block will save \$2.04 every month, or \$24.48 annually.

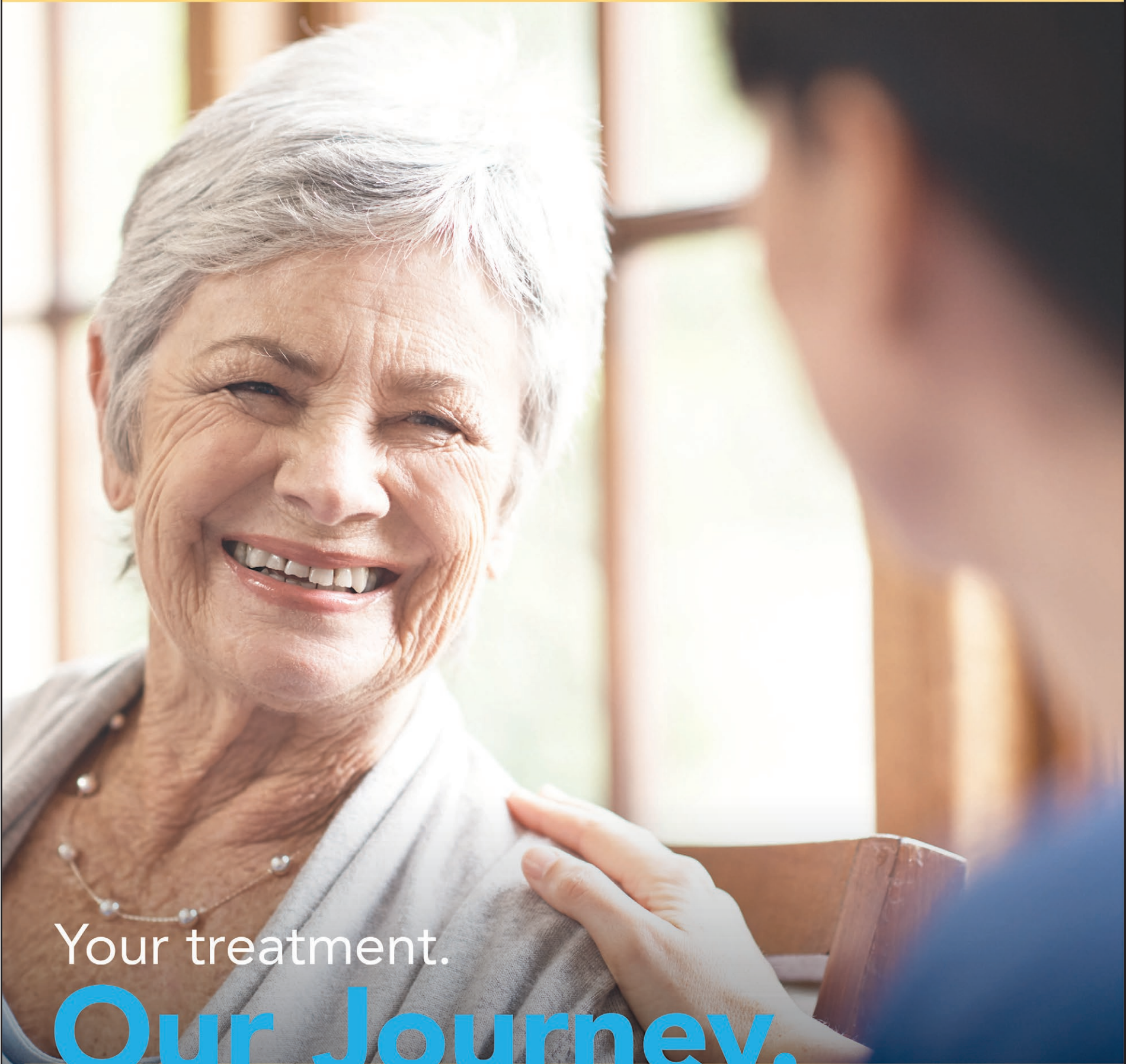

Florida quickly approaching 1 million COVID-19 cases

FORT LAUDERDALE — The Florida Department of Health confirmed 6,277 additional cases of COVID-19 on Saturday, bringing the state's known total of cases to 985,297.

The state also confirmed 81 new deaths on Saturday, bring Florida's total during the pandemic to 18,442.

Because of the Thanksgiving Day holiday the state didn't report numbers on Thursday, opting instead to provide a two-day tally of 17,344 on Friday evening. Many testing sites were closed for the holiday.

Hospitalizations related to COVID-19 continued to rise on Saturday morning, with 3,860 confirmed cases in hospitals. That number has steadily risen since October after plateauing at around 2,000 hospitalizations daily for weeks following the summer surge of the virus.

Unlike in the spring and summer, officials have not adopted additional restrictions in Florida to prevent the virus from spreading.

Virus keeps Black Friday crowds thin

NEW YORK — The raging coronavirus pandemic kept crowds thin at malls and stores across the country on Black Friday, but a surge in online shopping offered a beacon of hope for struggling retailers after months of slumping sales and businesses toppling into bankruptcy.

In normal times, Black Friday is the busiest shopping day of the year, drawing millions of people eager to get started on their holiday spending.

But these are not normal times: A spike in coronavirus cases is threatening the economy's fitful recovery from the sudden plunge in the spring. Crowds at stores were dramatically diminished as shoppers shifted online.

Game consoles, cookware, robotic vacuum cleaners, slippers and pajamas were popular among shoppers preparing to spend a lot of time indoors this winter. Many were still eager to get into the holiday spirit and delight their loved ones after a tough year.

Eric Kelly, a boxing gym owner, camped outside a store on Black Friday for the first time in his life, trying to

score a PlayStation 5 for his 13-year-old twin sons as a reward for persevering through remote learning during the pandemic.

"They've been away from their friends," said Kelly, who failed to get the console at a GameStop in New York City's Union Square but said he would keep trying online.

Before Black Friday, GameStop teased that it would have a limited supply of the new \$500 PlayStation 5 game console for sale only at its stores, in contrast to other retailers that sold it only online.

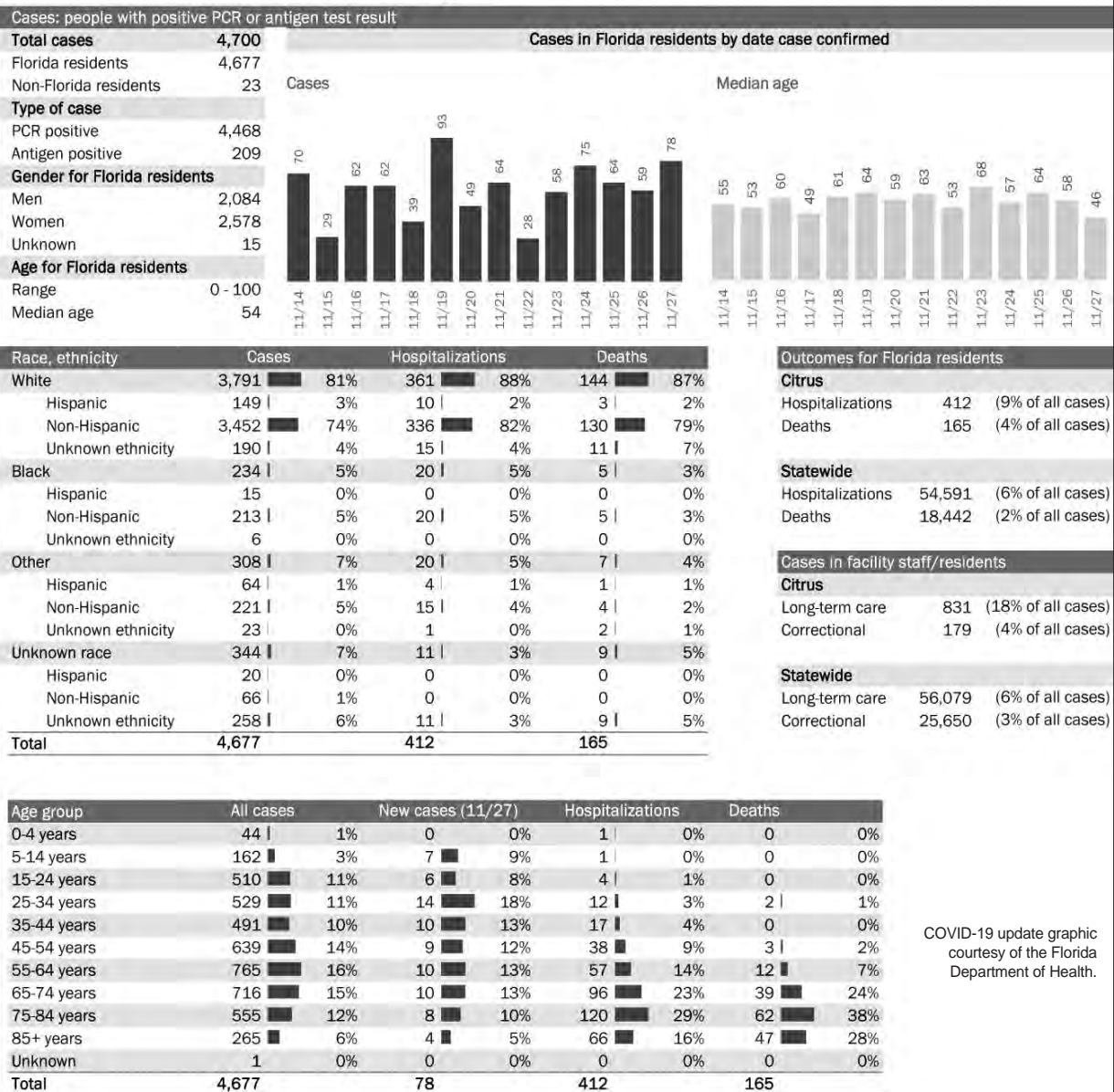
Kelly said "people were on top of each other" in the line. At a Garden State Plaza mall in Paramus, New Jersey, police monitored a crowd outside a GameStop, but few people kept their distance.

GameStop said it was taking several safety precautions, including contactless pickup.

Many retailers beefed up their safety protocols to reassure wary customers about coming in on Black Friday. But stores also catered to those shopping digitally by moving their doorbuster deals online and ramping up curbside pickup options.

Pope elevates 13 new cardinals then puts them in their place

ROME — Pope Francis raised 13 new cardinals to the highest rank in the Catholic hierarchy Saturday and immediately warned them not to use their titles for corrupt, personal gain, presiding over a ceremony marked from beginning to end by the coronavirus pandemic.

Two new “princes” of the church, from Brunei and the Philippines, didn’t make it to Rome because of COVID-19 travel restrictions, though they were shown on giant screens watching it from home in the nearly empty St. Peter’s Basilica. Throughout the socially distanced ceremony, which clocked in at an unusually quick 45 minutes, cardinals new and old wore protective masks.

Most removed their masks when they approached a maskless Francis to receive their red hats, but Cardinal Wilton Gregory, the first African-American cardinal, kept his on. Gregory also was one of the only new cardinals who kept his mask on when the group paid a singing courtesies visit to retired Pope Benedict XVI.

During his homily, Francis warned the new cardinals against falling into corruption or using their new rank for personal advancement, saying that just because they have a new title, “Eminence,” doesn’t mean they should drift from their people.

His comments reflected Francis’ constant complaint about the arrogance of the clerical class, as well as his current battles to fight corruption in the Vatican hierarchy.

“Let’s think of so many types of corruption in the life of the priesthood,” Francis told the new cardinals, deviating from his prepared text. If they think of themselves so grandly, “you won’t be pastors close to the people, you’ll just be ‘Eminence.’ And if you feel this way, you’ll have strayed off the road,” the pope warned.

The ceremony, known as a consistory, is the seventh of Francis’ pontificate and once again reflected the Argentine pope’s effort to name cardinals from places that have never had them before or whose service to the church he wants to highlight. Nine are under age 80 and eligible to vote in a conclave to elect a new pope, further solidifying the majority of Francis-appointed, voting-age prelates in the College of Cardinals.

Gregory, the new archbishop of Washington, told The Associated Press ahead of the ceremony that he viewed his appointment as “an affirmation of Black Catholics in the United States, the heritage of faith and fidelity that we represent.”

Gregory’s appointment comes after a year of racial protests in the U.S. sparked by the latest killing of a Black man by a white police officer. Francis has endorsed the protests and cited the American history of racial injustices.

“There is awareness now of the need for racial reconciliation, an awareness that I have not seen at this level and at this intensity before,” Gregory said.

Another social

justice-minded cardinal is the retired archbishop of Chiapas, Mexico, Cardinal Felipe Arizmendi Esquivel, who has championed the rights of Mexico’s indigenous peoples and spearheaded efforts to translate the Bible and liturgical texts into native languages.

Francis visited Chiapas in 2016 and has long championed the rights of indigenous peoples. “That could be one of the reasons (he made me a cardinal) but I can’t confirm it,” Esquivel said during a Zoom call.

The Vatican’s in-house theologian-preacher, Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, also got a red hat, but he successfully argued against being made a bishop as well, saying at his age - 86 - he couldn’t take on the responsibility. He also eschewed a red cassock for Saturday’s ceremony, using instead his brown hooded friar’s robes covered with a white “rochet” vestment.

After the ceremony, Francis and the new cardinals paid a visit to Benedict, who lives across the Vatican gardens in a converted monastery. Francis, again sans mask, greeted his predecessor warmly. The cardinals greeted Benedict, kissed his hand and sang a prayer as the retired pope, who is 93 and frail, listened. Only Gregory and one other new cardinal kept his mask on during the encounter.

The ceremony took place against the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, which erupted in Italy in February and has seen a resurgence this fall. The Vatican is under a modified lockdown, with the Vatican Museums shuttered and Francis’ public general audiences cancelled. Instead he holds them in private, livestreamed.

The cardinal candidates and others who came to Rome from afar for Saturday’s service were required to undergo 10 days of Vatican-mandated quarantine at the pope’s hotel, where meals were brought to their rooms.

Usually, consistories are full of parties and crowds, with days of receptions, Masses and dinners for the new cardinals and their friends. The consistory itself is normally followed by “courtesy visits,” where the new cardinals greet well-wishers and the general public from the grandeur of their own reception rooms in the Apostolic Palace or Vatican auditorium. This year, there were no courtesy visits, and each cardinal was given a 10-guest limit.

With Saturday’s new cardinals, Francis has named 73 of the 128 voting-age cardinals, compared to 39 for Pope Benedict XVI and 16 for St. John Paul II. While the outcome of a future conclave can never be predicted, it’s not a stretch to suggest that a hefty majority of today’s electors presumably share the pastoral and doctrinal attitudes of the pope who named them.

The geographical makeup of the College of Cardinals has also shifted under Francis away from Europe, though Europe remains the greatest voting bloc with 53 electors. The Americas - North, Central and South and the Caribbean - together have 37 cardinal electors, even

though an estimated 40% of the world’s Catholics live in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Francis has continued the trend of naming cardinals from the “peripheries” of the Catholic Church: Brunei got its

first-ever cardinal with the Vatican’s ambassador to the country, Cardinal Cornelius Sim.

Rwanda also got its only cardinal with the archbishop of Kigali, Antoine Kambanda, whose family was slaughtered during

the Rwandan genocide. Kambanda made the trip to Rome for the ceremony, Sim stayed home due to COVID-19 restrictions.

History’s first Jesuit pope has also increased the number of cardinals who belong to religious

orders, naming three Franciscans this time around in a year in which the pope, who named himself after St. Francis of Assisi, released an encyclical inspired by the saint’s call to fraternity and solidarity with the weakest.

Puppy pipeline runs from Georgia northward to adoptive homes

MACON, Ga. — Packed in a dog crate, a 3-year-old boxer mix named Sky took flight earlier this month. She was one of a half-dozen dogs who got the ride of their lives flying from Macon, Georgia, to new homes in Virginia.

Kim Williams, who volunteers for the Lost Dog and Cat Rescue Foundation of Arlington, Virginia, tells WMAZ-TV he has tapped into a puppy pipeline to bring some of Georgia's homeless pet population to the mid-Atlantic region, where demand is outrunning the number of dogs available for adoption.

"We have had the most incredible outpouring of people in the D.C. suburbs that have a strong desire to rescue dogs and cats during this pandemic," Williams wrote in an email.

Williams, who has family in Macon, met Kristin Reid during one of her visits with relatives.

Reid has a 30-acre horse farm in Forsyth and has rescued some unadoptable dogs from local shelters and tries to foster others to keep them from being euthanized.

Unable to hold fundraisers this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Reid found it difficult to take on more dogs. When she learned the Virginia foundation needed dogs to adopt out, the groups linked up with the Pilots N Paws volunteer pilot group.

Since the onset of COVID-19, the foundation has placed nearly 2,500 dogs in new homes.

Rough rescue: Storms, broken plane force layover for rare turtles

BOSTON — They might have gotten there faster by walking, but at any rate, these endangered turtles had a lot to be thankful for on Thanksgiving.

Bad weather, a damaged propeller and an unscheduled stop in Tennessee complicated the rescue of 30 critically endangered Kemp's

ridley sea turtles that were among hundreds recently found on the beaches of Cape Cod, stunned and almost killed by falling ocean temperatures.

Volunteers and conservation experts initially took the turtles to the New England Aquarium in Boston and the National Marine Life Center on Buzzards Bay, where they began the long rehabilitation process before being moved to wildlife centers along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts.

A batch of 30 New Orleans-bound turtles had a harder trip than most.

Their plane left Wednesday but had to change course and refuel twice because of storms and strong winds. A rock kicked up during takeoff after the second refueling, in Chattanooga, damaged the propeller and grounded the plane.

Staff members of the Tennessee Aquarium collected the animals and cared for them overnight. On Thanksgiving, the turtles were loaded onto a shuttle bus borrowed from the airport and driven the rest of the way to New Orleans, arriving on Thanksgiving Day.

The turtles appear to be in good condition at their new home, operated by the Audubon Nature Institute's Coastal Wildlife Network, but they will require significant care before they can be released back into the wild, according to the New England Aquarium.

2 shot, killed at Northern California mall on Black Friday

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Police are looking for a gunman who shot and killed two teens at a Northern California mall in the midst of Black Friday, sending shoppers running for safety, authorities said.

Arden Fair Mall in Sacramento was evacuated shortly after 6 p.m. when shots were fired

near one of the mall's entrances, police spokesman Karl Chan said.

A 19-year-old man was found dead at the mall and a 17-year-old boy was found critically wounded at a bank outside of the mall. He was taken to the hospital and succumbed to his injuries several hours later, police told the Sacramento Bee on Saturday.

Workers at the mall said they heard up to a dozen shots. "Heard a couple of shots go off, didn't really think anything of it," Antwon Martinez said. "And more and more kept going off, so everyone started running toward our back room. ... Everyone just started running."

He said customers and workers evacuated through the corridors and stairways in the back of the mall.

The coronavirus pandemic kept crowds thinner than usual on Black Friday, one of the busiest shopping days of the year, the newspaper reported.

Chan said the shooting appeared to be a targeted and isolated attack, though he didn't disclose the gunman's motive.

Overseeing inoculations

UK appoints vaccines minister

LONDON — The British government appointed a vaccines minister on Saturday as it prepares to inoculate millions of people against the coronavirus, potentially starting within days.

Prime Minister Boris Johnson said Conservative lawmaker Nadhim Zahawi will oversee the country's biggest vaccine program in decades.

The U.K. medicines regulator is currently assessing two vaccines — one developed by Pfizer and BioNTech, the other by Oxford University and AstraZeneca — to see if they are safe and effective. The Guardian newspaper reported that hospitals have been told they could receive the first doses of the Pfizer shot the week of Dec. 7, if it receives approval.

The U.K. says frontline health care workers and nursing home residents will be the first to be vaccinated, followed by older people, starting with those over age 80.

Britain has ordered 40 million

doses of the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine, enough for 20 million people, and 100 million doses of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine.

In all, the U.K. government has agreed to purchase up to 355 million doses of vaccine from seven different

producers, as it prepares to vaccinate as many of the country's 67 million people as possible.

Decisions about which, if any, vaccines to authorize will be made by the independent Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency.

Biden plans swift moves on rights

As vice president in 2012, Joe Biden endeared himself to many LGBTQ Americans by endorsing same-sex marriage even before his boss, President Barack Obama.

Now, as president-elect, Biden is making sweeping promises to LGBTQ activists, proposing to carry out virtually every major proposal on their wish lists. Among them: Lifting the Trump administration's near-total ban on military service for transgender people, barring federal contractors from anti-LGBTQ job discrimination, and creating high-level LGBTQ-rights positions at the State Department, the National Security Council and other federal agencies.

In many cases the measures would reverse executive actions by President Donald Trump, whose administration took numerous steps to weaken protections for transgender people and create more leeway for

discrimination against LGBTQ people, ostensibly based on religious grounds.

In a policy document, the Biden campaign said Trump and Vice President Mike Pence "have given hate against LGBTQ+

individuals safe harbor and rolled back critical protections."

Beyond executive actions he can take unilaterally, Biden says his top legislative priority for LGBTQ issues is the Equality Act, passed by the House of Representatives last year but stalled in the Senate. It would extend to all 50 states the comprehensive anti-bias protections already afforded to LGBTQ people in 21 mostly Democratic-governed states, covering such sectors as housing, public accommodations and public services.

Critics, including prominent religious conservatives, say the bill raises religious freedom concerns and could require some faith-based organizations to operate against their beliefs.

French protesters decry bill outlawing use of police images

PARIS — Tens of thousands of critics of a proposed security law that would restrict the filming of police officers protested across France on Saturday, and officers in Paris who were advised to behave responsibly during the demonstrations repeatedly fired tear gas to disperse rowdy protesters who set fire to France's central bank and threw paving stones.

The mood was largely peaceful, however, as dozens of rallies took place against a provision of the law that would make it a crime to publish photos or video of on-duty police officers with the intent of harming their "physical or psychological integrity."

Civil liberties groups, journalists, and people who have faced police abuse are concerned that the measure will stymie press freedoms and allow police brutality to go undiscovered and unpunished.

"We have to broaden the debate, and by doing that, we say that if there were no police violence, we wouldn't have to film violent policemen," Assa Traore, a prominent anti-brutality activist whose brother died in police custody in 2016, told The Associated Press.

She was among at least 46,000 people who packed the sprawling Republique plaza and surrounding streets carrying red union flags, French tricolor flags and homemade signs denouncing police violence, demanding media freedom or calling for the resignation of French President Emmanuel Macron or his tough-talking interior minister, Gerald Darmanin.

Police block Warsaw march against abortion ruling, force use

WARSAW, Poland — Police blocked protesters from marching in Poland's capital as demonstrations took place across the country against an attempt to restrict abortion rights and recent police violence.

Police and protesters played a game of cat and mouse in Warsaw as officers set up cordons which the protesters sought

POLAND to evade, pushing them to try to regroup elsewhere

in the city center.

At one point, protest participants gathered on a major thoroughfare, causing traffic to back up. As drivers honked, the protesters shouted: "We are sorry for the inconvenience, we have a government to overthrow."

Police issued warnings that the demonstration was illegal because it had not been registered ahead of time. It also violated a pandemic-related ban on large gatherings.

Officers at one point used tear gas against an opposition lawmaker, Barbara Nowacka, who had been intervening "in defense of peacefully protesting women," Borys Budka, the head of Poland's centrist Civic Platform party, said.

Protesters in the capital began their demonstration by symbolically "renaming" a downtown square to Women's Rights Roundabout. An activist climbed onto a ladder placed upon a van to hang a new street sign over the official one reading Roman Dmowski Roundabout.

Women's rights activists want authorities to formally approve the name change. They say it would honor a movement for equality rather than Dmowski, a statesman who had a key role in helping Poland regain national independence in 1918, but who was also an anti-Semite.

27 veterans die in COVID-19 outbreak Investigation underway at Illinois VA home

LASALLE, Ill. — State officials are investigating a coronavirus outbreak at a veterans nursing home in rural Illinois that has infected nearly 200 residents and staff, and killed 27 veterans.

Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker's office and the state's Department of Veterans Affairs are attempting to determine what caused the outbreak at the state-run LaSalle Veterans Home in LaSalle, about 90 miles southwest of Chicago.

The department on Tuesday requested an independent probe into the facility, which was the focus of a state Senate committee virtual hearing on the outbreak.

"The tragedy of what has unfolded at the veterans' home cannot be understated," said state Sen. Sue Rezin, who represents the district where the home is located. "I'm glad that the director has called for an independent investigation and agree that there are lessons to be learned from this terrible outbreak that has claimed the lives of 27 of our nation's heroes."

The current outbreak was identified in late October when a staff member and a resident tested positive for the virus. Since the beginning of November, two-thirds of residents and employees have tested positive, according to the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs.

"November 4th, there were only four cases of COVID within the home," Rezin said Monday. "Very quickly within the past 20 days, we've had almost 200 cases."

Dr. Avery Hart, a consultant for the state's Public Health department, said at the hearing that all 16 long-term care facilities in LaSalle County have had outbreaks.

"It is no coincidence that cases within the home began to rise just as cases rose dramatically within the surrounding community," Veterans Affairs Director Linda Chapa LaVia testified Tuesday at the hearing.

State officials have increased staff testing at the facility, and the governor said an infection control team was sent to the home. As of Tuesday morning, 40 of 101 residents and 24 staff members had tested positive for the virus.

Also Tuesday, the state's health director said Illinois will receive far fewer doses of the COVID-19 vaccine than originally estimated. Dr. Ngozi Ezike told reporters that she expects the state to receive about 80,000 initial doses instead of the 400,000 doses that Illinois officials had anticipated, pending FDA approval of the vaccines.

She also said she still expects health care and emergency workers who could come into direct contact with coronavirus patients to be vaccinated first.

Chiefs expect Bucs to be at best

Brady looking to shake off slump

TAMPA — The Kansas City Chiefs aren't buying all the talk about Tom Brady's struggles. They insist he's still playing at a high level and will have to be at their best to beat the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The reigning Super Bowl champions (9-1) visit the Bucs (7-4) on Sunday, with Patrick Mahomes facing Brady for the fourth time in his young career and Brady looking to shrug off a couple of subpar performances against playoff contenders.

"You can't take anything away from Tom Brady. He's still very smart, he's still trying to throw the ball downfield, he still has the weapons. We'll have our hands full," Chiefs safety Tyrann Mathieu said.

"He's played against our system a number of times, even going back to New England," Mathieu added. "He's familiar with us. Now we have to get familiar with him and the weapons he has."

Brady won two of the previous three matchups against Mahomes, including an overtime thriller in the AFC championship game two seasons ago.

The six-time Super Bowl champion played poorly in home losses to New Orleans and the Los Angeles Rams two of the past three weeks. Still, Kansas City coach Andy Reid cautioned against anyone writing off the 43-year-old quarterback.

Despite Brady's recent struggles, particularly on deep passes, the Bucs have already matched their victory total from all of last season and remain in prime position to end a 12-year playoff drought that's the second longest in the NFL.

"He's unbelievable. He's a great player, a Hall of Fame player. We're lucky enough to have a chance to be in this era where we get to play him," Reid said.

"He's old, and it's hard to tell he's old," Reid added. "And that's a tribute to how he takes care of himself, and the care and living he does all the way around, from diet to workout to everything."

Pitts scores 3 TDs in his return, No. 6 Florida tops Kentucky 34-10

GAINESVILLE — Kyle Pitts was feeling a little jittery before his first game in three weeks.

His chest "got hot" and his heart started beating fast. Once he stepped on the field and saw one-on-one coverage, his eyes had to widen as well.

Pitts scored three touchdowns in his return from a concussion and a broken nose — all on perfect passes from Heisman Trophy front-runner Kyle Trask — and No. 6 Florida overcame a sluggish start to beat Kentucky 34-10 Saturday in the Swamp.

The Gators (7-1) avenged a home loss to the Wildcats (3-6) two years ago and put themselves on the verge of returning to the Southeastern Conference championship game for the first time since 2016. Pitts and Trask look every bit ready for the big stage.

"It was just getting back in the groove and playing how I've been playing," Pitts said.

The junior tight end missed the last 10 quarters following a vicious hit against Georgia that knocked his helmet so sideways that his face mask fractured

his septum. He had surgery and sat out two full games. Trask wasted little time reconnecting with his favorite and most talented target.

They misfired on Florida's opening drive but Trask found Pitts for a 56-yard touchdown four plays later. Pitts ran away from starting cornerback Kelvin Joseph on the score.

"He causes a lot of mismatches for defenses and chaos in the back end trying to guard him," Trask said.

Pitts now has 11 touchdowns in 5 1/2 games.

"He's such a dynamic playmaker," coach Dan Mullen said. "He can turn some smaller gains into some pretty explosive, big plays. I think he does an amazing job of doing that. He creates matchup problems for you. He's hard to deal with one on one, and if you get him one on one, we can take advantage of it."

Trask's three TD passes gave him 34 on the season, moving him past 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow and into a tie for third on the school's single-season list. Only Danny Wuerffel (39 in 1996, 35 in 1995) is ahead of him. Rex Grossman also threw 34 in 2001.

Trask did break one of Wuerffel's records Saturday. He became the first

player in school history with at least three TD passes in eight consecutive games, topping Wuerffel's mark of seven set in 1996.

Trask is on pace to pass Wuerffel for TDs, too, and it could happen in his final two regular-season games. More importantly for Trask and the Gators, though, is clinching the East with a victory at Tennessee next week.

"The sky's the limit," Trask said. "We have huge goals for this team."

The Wildcats (3-6) kept Florida's high-scoring offense in check for the first half, thanks partly to a fumble and a dropped third-down pass.

Kadarius Toney turned the game by taking advantage of a huge mistake by All-American punter Max Duffy. Kicking from their own 10-yard line, the Wildcats called for a kick left, but Duffy shanked it right.

Kentucky's coverage unit surrounded Xzavier Henderson on one side while Toney caught the ball on the other with no one around him. He went untouched for a 50-yard score that put the Gators up 14-10 with 42 seconds left.

"We didn't execute good enough. We didn't coach good enough. Tough loss," See GATORS/Page B3

FSU game called off yet again

Outbreak may jeopardize season for Ohio State

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio State officials say they are unsure when the team can practice again, let alone play next week at Michigan State, after an outbreak of COVID-19 put the third-ranked Buckeyes' Big Ten title hopes in danger.

"I have no clue what this afternoon or tomorrow will bring or next week will bring," athletic director Gene Smith said Saturday.

Three more college football games across the country were canceled or postponed Saturday, including Florida State hosting Virginia. For the second straight week, the Seminoles had their home game called off hours before kickoff and after their opponent had already traveled to Tallahassee, Florida.

Last week the issue was Clemson and Florida State not agreeing on whether the game should be played after a Tigers player who was positive for COVID-19 traveled with the team to Florida.

This week, one positive test for a Florida State player returned Saturday morning led to contact tracing that left the Seminoles with only 44 scholarship players.

"We deeply regret that many Florida State and Virginia fans have already traveled to the game as well as Virginia's team," Florida State athletic director David Coburn said. "We simply had no way of knowing we would not be playing until this morning. We made every effort to play, but we could not do so in a way that was safe for the players."

Ohio State canceled its Saturday game at Illinois on Friday night. Across college football, 19 of the 58 games originally scheduled for this week were called off because of COVID-19 issues.

The Buckeyes' disruption could be the most significant, impacting the Big Ten and national championship race.

Jones, No. 1 Bama roll past No. 22 Auburn

Clemson, QB Lawrence throttle Pitt

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — Once the Iron Bowl kicked off, Nick Saban was just another passionate, heavily invested fan who was powerless to help his team win.

His team still won — big.

Mac Jones passed for 302 yards and a career-high five touchdowns, highlighted by two long ones to DeVonta Smith, and No. 1 Alabama rolled over rival No. 22 Auburn 42-13 on Saturday without Saban.

The Crimson Tide (8-0, No. 1 playoff rankings) continued a dominating march through a schedule of all-Southeastern Conference games even minus its six-time national champion coach on the sideline.

Saban tested positive for COVID-19 on Wednesday and watched the game feed from home, witnessing the usual array of big plays with offensive coordinator Steve Sarkisian running the show.

Saban said his staff “did a marvelous job.”

“Sark did a nice job of managing things, and I sat here and felt a little helpless,” he said in a post-game zoom from his home. “I could see things and yell at things and listen to (wife) Miss Terry yell downstairs. It’s a little different. It still feels good to win.”

The result was much of the same against the Tigers (5-3), who suffered the second-most lopsided loss of Gus Malzahn’s coaching tenure. The only bigger margin was Alabama’s 52-21 win in

the 2018 Iron Bowl.

“They’re a very, very talented team,” Malzahn said. “We knew that. Still we came in here with the mindset that we wanted to win the game. To beat a team like that on the road, you’ve got to make plays. We didn’t do that. We didn’t play our best. It’s obvious.”

Alabama started a string of three straight touchdowns with Jones’ 66-yard touchdown to Smith, who was streaking by himself downfield after Auburn defenders bit on a double move. He later added a 58-yard catch and run on a quick slant, sprinting away from the Tigers.

Smith had seven catches for 171 yards. Najee Smith ran for 96 yards, including a 39-yard touchdown, and

John Metchie III caught a pair of scoring passes.

“Not having Coach Saban is difficult and obviously he did a great job preparing all of us for a situation like this,” Jones said. “It was clear we were prepared for this situation.”

Bo Nix passed for 227 yards and ran for a late touchdown for the Tigers, but also threw two interceptions.

“It feels pretty terrible,” Nix said. “It’s not very fun. It just hurts because of everything that I’ve put into it, everything that I’ve done to get to this moment and just come up a lot short. It’s an awful feeling, to be honest with you.”

Saban, meanwhile, couldn’t talk to his team

starting 90 minutes before kickoff though he still led the preparation during the week. He spoke to the media in his home’s “recruiting room,” filled with Alabama memorabilia, including an elephant head on the wall and a pool table with a crimson playing surface.

“That was really hard, especially the fact that I feel great,” the 69-year-old said.

No. 4 Clemson 52, Pittsburgh 17

CLEMSON, S.C. — Trevor Lawrence threw for 403 yards and two touchdowns in his first game in five weeks — and likely last one at Death Valley — and Clemson throttled Pittsburgh.

Lawrence hadn’t seen the field on game day since beating Syracuse on Oct. 24. He tested positive for the coronavirus the following week and missed Clemson’s next two games, including its only loss this season — a 47-40 double OT defeat at No. 2 Notre Dame.

Lawrence led Clemson (8-1, 7-1 Atlantic Coast Conference; No. 3 CFP) a step closer to the league championship game and a likely rematch with the unbeaten Fighting Irish.

Cornell Powell had five catches for 176 yards, including a 43-yard TD catch off a flea-flicker pass from Lawrence. Powell also had an incredible, one-handed grab on a 70-yard pass to the Pitt 5 that set up Chez Mellusi’s 2-yard TD run for a 38-3 lead.

The Panthers (5-5, 4-5) were the last team to win at Clemson, 43-42 in 2016. Kenny Pickett threw four interceptions, three in the first eight minutes that all led to Clemson touchdowns.

No. 12 Indiana 27, Maryland 11

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Stevie Scott III had three touchdown runs and Indiana had three interceptions, three sacks and a game-changing safety.

Freshman Tim Baldwin Jr. ran for a season-high 106 yards for the Hoosiers (5-1).

The safety midway through the third quarter gave the Hoosiers a 9-3 lead, and Indiana extended the margin to 17-3 on the ensuing possession. Scott scored on a 1-yard plunge and backup quarterback Jack Tuttle completed his first throw of the day — a 2-point conversion to Peyton Hendershot. Tuttle also led the Hoosiers to two fourth-quarter scores after replacing injured starter Michael Penix Jr.

Maryland (2-2) was coming off a 21-day break stemming from a COVID-19 outbreak that caused the cancellation of two games.

No. 16 Coastal Carolina 49, Texas St. 14

SAN MARCOS, Texas — C.J. Marable ran for 157 yards and three touchdowns and Coastal Carolina wrapped up the Sun Belt Conference East Division title.

The Chanticleers (9-0, 7-0) had 572 yards of offense in extending their winning streak to 10 games. They moved up to the Football Bowl Subdivision three seasons ago.

Texas State (2-10, 2-6) closed its sixth straight losing season. It was the second-most points the Bobcats have allowed in regulation this season.

Michigan State holds off No. 11 Northwestern for win

Jackson’s 3 TD runs lead No. 21 Oklahoma St

EAST LANSING, Mich. — No. 11 Northwestern put itself in position to play for the Big Ten title, then it hit the road.

Michigan State was ready.

Matt Coghlin made a tiebreaking 48-yard field goal with 3:35 left, and the Spartans handed Northwestern its first loss of the season with a 29-20 victory Saturday.

The Wildcats (5-1, 5-1) were coming off a 17-7 victory over Wisconsin that moved them into contention for a spot in the College Football Playoff. That prospect likely was dashed with the loss to the Spartans, but they remain in control of the Big Ten West.

“Really disappointed in the outcome, but we have all our goals in front of us,” coach Pat Fitzgerald said. “We didn’t come up here and play clean football and Michigan State did and credit to them.”

The Spartans (2-3, 2-3) lost a 17-0 lead, but went back ahead by forcing three turnovers in the fourth quarter and making the most of two big kicks by Coghlin.

Michigan State had dropped consecutive games against Iowa and Indiana by a combined score of 73-7, including a 24-0 loss to the Hoosiers at home on Nov. 14. Last weekend’s matchup with Maryland was canceled because of a COVID-19 outbreak with the Terrapins.

“We needed this win as a team,” said Rocky Lombardi, who got the Spartans off to a fast start with a 75-yard touchdown pass to Jalen Nailor. “It’s good to get out there and beat a really good team like Northwestern because it’s just the kind of confidence boost we needed.

“We know we’re a good team and we know we can beat good teams, but it’s kind of hard to believe yourself until you do it.”

It was the second win for first-year coach Mel Tucker after the Spartans beat Michigan on

Oct. 31.

“Culture doesn’t change overnight — it just doesn’t,” Tucker said. “But wins like today show what we’re capable of.”

Northwestern grabbed a 20-17 lead on Cam Porter’s 3-yard run early in the fourth.

The Spartans rallied on Coghlin’s 44-yard field goal after forcing a turnover one snap following Lombardi’s interception.

Northwestern turned the ball over again, and receiver Berkeley Holman was carted off the field following the play.

Shakur Brown broke on Peyton Ramsey’s pass for his second interception and made contact with Holman, who lay motionless on the field while the school’s medical staff evaluated him.

Holman was carefully strapped to a backboard and lifted onto a cart. After Holman’s teammates surrounded him to offer support, he lifted his left arm and extended his thumb.

Holman was taken to a hospital as a precaution. He was talking, alert and moving.

“Great news about Berk,” Fitzgerald said.

The Wildcats punted on their next possession, facing a fourth-and-10 from their 22, with a few minutes left.

Lombardi converted a third-and-8 from his 38 with a run after Northwestern called a timeout, taking time off the clock until punting from midfield with 32 seconds left.

The Wildcats ended the game by throwing laterals from deep in their end, trying to extend the play as time expired, only to have the Spartans recover the ball in the end zone for a touchdown at a fan-free game.

“A lot of self-inflicted wounds on our end,” Fitzgerald said.

No. 21 Oklahoma State 50, Texas Tech 44

STILLWATER, Okla. — Dezmon Jackson rushed for career highs of 235 yards and three touchdowns and Oklahoma State bounced back from a disappointing loss to rival Oklahoma.

Jackson had 36 carries in part because the top two backs, Chuba Hubbard and LD Brown, did not play. The Cowboys still ran for a

season-high 317 yards. Hubbard was out with a right ankle injury, and Brown has been fighting through injuries.

Spencer Sanders passed for 222 yards and ran for 78, and Tylan Wallace caught seven passes for 129 yards and a score for Oklahoma State (6-2, 5-2 Big 12).

Alan Bowman passed for 384 yards and three touchdowns for the Red Raiders (3-6, 2-6).

No. 23 La.-Lafayette 70, La.-Monroe 20

MONROE, La. — Levi Lewis passed for three touchdowns and ran for two more in less than three quarters, and Louisiana-Lafayette routed winless Louisiana-Monroe.

Running backs Trey Regas and Elijah Mitchell each rushed for more than 90 yards and scored a touchdown apiece for Louisiana-Lafayette (8-1, 6-1 Sun Belt). Bralen Trahan returned an interception 53 yards for

a score during a second quarter in which ULL scored four straight touchdowns.

The Ragin’ Cajuns have won five straight since their lone loss to 16th-ranked and unbeaten Coastal Carolina, which is scheduled to host ULL in the Sun Belt title game Dec. 19.

Jeremy Hunt had one touchdown passing and one rushing for Louisiana-Monroe (0-9, 0-6).

Oregon State 41, No. 9 Oregon 38

CORVALLIS, Ore — Taking his first college snap after starting quarterback Tristan Gebbia limped off, Chance Nolan scored on a 1-yard, fourth-down run with 33 seconds left to give Oregon State a 41-38 upset victory over No. 9 Oregon on Friday night.

Jermar Jefferson ran for 226 yards and two touchdowns to help the Beavers (2-2) win their second straight game. Jefferson has run

for at least 100 yards in each of Oregon State’s four games and is on pace to hit 1,000 despite the short season.

Oregon (3-1) had won seven in a row and three straight over the rival Beavers. The loss dashed any slim hopes the Ducks had of a spot in the College Football Playoffs. The Ducks were ranked No. 15 in the first CFP rankings released Tuesday.

Tristan Gebbia threw for 263 yards and a score and had a touchdown run during the foggy game at Reser Stadium. While no fans were allowed in the game, cars passing near the stadium honked for the home team in the aftermath.

Tyler Shough threw for 266 yards and two touchdowns for Oregon.

It was the 124th edition of the rivalry that dates to 1894. This summer amid racial injustice protests nationwide, both schools decided to drop the “Civil War” nickname.

Colts-Titans game spices up Thanksgiving week

AFC South lead will be on the line

Both of the AFC South leaders won in overtime with comebacks last week. The Colts already won at Tennessee this month.

Tennessee has its best record after 10 games since going 10-0 in 2008, in part because the Titans have a league-low five turnovers. Derrick Henry became the first player in league history with multiple overtime rushing touchdowns in a single season and leads the NFL with 1,079 yards.

“That’s just what they do,” Colts defensive coordinator Matt Eberflus said of Tennessee’s run game. “They are just going to stay committed to it, and we have to stay — we feel like we’re in good shape in terms of our perseverance, in terms of our discipline and we will want to take that in the game and being able to finish.”

The Colts have won four of their past five overall and four of the past five in this series. QB Philip Rivers (right big toe) hopes to make his 235th consecutive start, which would break a tie with Eli Manning for the 10th-most starts in league history.

Baltimore (6-4) at Pittsburgh (10-0), Tuesday night

One of the NFL’s best and most physical rivalries, but the Ravens are struggling and lost their past two games, while, clearly, the Steelers are surging.

The Steelers are the 17th team since 1970 to start a season 10-0. Their 10-game winning streak is the second-longest single-season string in franchise history: The 1975 team won 11 straight on its way to the team’s second straight Super Bowl title. The Steelers can clinch a playoff berth with a win and losses by the Raiders and the Dolphins.

This game was moved from Thursday night to Sunday and then to Tuesday night because of the Ravens’ coronavirus issues. Baltimore apparently will be without several key players, including quarterback Lamar Jackson, running backs J.K. Dobbins and Mark Ingram, along with defensive tackle Brandon Williams and both centers, all of whom are on reserve/COVID-19 list.

Chicago (5-5) at Green Bay (7-3)

Neither side comes into this renewal of the league’s longest rivalry playing their best. Indeed, Chicago has dropped four in a row as its offense has disappeared. Green Bay is 3-3 after a 4-0 start.

The Packers have won their past four home matchups with the Bears. Green Bay has gone 19-5 against Chicago when Aaron Rodgers is the starting quarterback.

Seattle (7-3) at Philadelphia (3-6-1), Monday night

Clearly, the way the Eagles have played has made their NFC East lead a mirage. And they’re in the midst of the toughest part of their schedule.

The Seahawks, meanwhile,

are in the easiest portion, home meetings with both New York teams and a trip to Washington upcoming before finishing with divisional affairs with the Rams and 49ers. If Seattle’s defense that finally showed up in last week’s victory against Arizona is for real, Pete Carroll’s crew should be in good shape.

New York Giants (3-7) at Cincinnati (2-7-1)

A huge break for the Giants, who actually are playing the best among the dregs of the NFC East. They won’t have to face rookie sensation Joe Burrow after the quarterback and top overall draft choice tore knee ligaments in a loss at Washington.

“I think when you look at this division, this is really the starting point for the division,” Giants coach Joe Judge says. “We’re coming out of Thanksgiving after this weekend, everyone is really on equal ground. The only thing that matters is what we do from this point forward.”

Cleveland (7-3) at Jacksonville (1-9)

Like the Ravens and Bengals in their division, the Browns have had some COVID-19 issues and will be without their best player, edge rusher Myles Garrett, for the second consecutive week. Cleveland has built its record by beating whoever it should, and certainly the Jaguars, losers of nine in a row, fit that category.

Jacksonville will go with yet another QB, journeyman Mike Glennon, who steps in for Jake Luton, who stepped in when Gardner Minshew was injured.

Miami (6-4) at New York Jets (0-10)

Had the Dolphins not stumbled in Denver, this could be considered a trap game. Instead, look for a determined bunch from Miami, which figures to shut down the inept Jets with its strong defense.

New York, threatening to become the third franchise to go 0-16 in a dozen years, hopes to get the oft-injured Sam Darnold back behind center. The Jets really need to evaluate him over the final six weeks as they head toward major decisions.

Los Angeles Chargers (3-7) at Buffalo (7-3)

No major QB decisions ahead for these teams. Buffalo took Josh Allen four spots after Darnold went in 2018 and has no reason to regret it. The Chargers grabbed Justin Herbert with the sixth overall spot in April and are thrilled with him.

The Chargers finally overcame their late folds in beating the Jets last week, while the Bills had a bye. Watch the performances of outstanding wideouts Keenan Allen of LA and Stefon Diggs of Buffalo.

San Francisco (4-6) at Los Angeles Rams (7-3)

At least the 49ers had a week off to get somewhat healthier, but this is a shell of the conference championship squad. Its reward upon returning is perhaps the NFC’s most balanced squad.

The Rams don’t particularly run the ball well, but their dynamic passing attack makes up for that — and more. They won at Tampa Bay on Monday night even though Aaron Donald wasn’t quite the force he usually is. Keep an eye on No. 99 in

New Orleans (8-2) at Denver (4-6)

As Taysom Hill stepped in so admirably for the sidelined Drew Brees, the Saints seized the top spot in the NFC. It’s Hill’s show for now, and the New Orleans defense appears ready to keep things rolling. Considering the only remaining opponent with a winning record, albeit a formidable one, is Kansas City, the rest of the schedule could be, well, a Big Easy.

Denver, as up and down as anyone, ran all over Miami’s tough D last week. So the Broncos are no pushover.

Las Vegas (6-4) at Atlanta (3-7)

Lack of defense could be decisive here. The Raiders have

11 sacks in the first 10 games, ranking 31st in the league. They allowed Kansas City to score touchdowns on two drives of at last 90 yards last week after giving up none in the first nine games. And they lost that game for just the third time in the past seven seasons when scoring at least 30 points.

The Falcons have 17 sacks to rank 24th in the league. And they are vulnerable in protection: Matt Ryan was sacked eight times by the Saints last Sunday.

Arizona (6-4) at New England (4-6)

It’s been stunning to see the Patriots flop against mediocre or worse teams, with losses to injury-wrecked San Francisco, inconsistent Denver, and awful Houston last week. They seem to have little direction on offense,

and the last time we could say that was 20 years ago.

Arizona is right in the playoff mix in the NFC West and the conference, with two games against the division-leading Rams remaining. Cardinals quarterback Kyler Murray has to know that New England neutralized the similar style of Lamar Jackson two weeks ago.

Carolina (4-7) at Minnesota (4-6)

The Vikings truly blew an opportunity by losing at home to Dallas and are 1-4 at home. The Panthers had their first shutout in 82 games when they manhandled Detroit as Brian Burns had a career-high two sacks. He leads all defensive ends in total tackles with 42.

Like the Cowboys, Carolina has the receivers to damage Minnesota’s spotty secondary.

Lions fire Patricia, Quinn

Matt Patricia opened his final postgame news conference with the Detroit Lions by thanking his wife and children for their support.

Patricia probably knew what was coming.

His boss, general manager Bob Quinn, might not have expected the same fate.

The Lions fired Patricia and Quinn, who hired the coach to replace Jim Caldwell, and effectively ended the franchise's attempt to replicate the success the men helped Bill Belichick achieve in New England.

The moves were made Saturday, surprising no one.

"It clearly wasn't working," Lions owner Sheila Ford Hamp said on a Zoom call with reporters.

The duo joins a long list of general managers and coaches that failed to help the franchise win over the last several decades.

Since Detroit won the 1957 NFL title, it has won only one playoff game — and that was way back on Jan. 5, 1992.

"We can't hide our past,

that's for sure," said Hamp, who succeeded her mother in June to lead the franchise her late father bought in 1963. "But I'm very dedicated to turning this ship around and really making a difference."

Darrell Bevell, who has 14 seasons of experience as an offensive coordinator, will be the team's interim coach for the final five games. The general manager's duties will be handled on an interim basis by Kyle O'Brien, Lance Newmark, Rob Lohman and Mike Disner, all of whom worked for Quinn in the team's front office.

This season, the Lions (4-7) lost consecutive games for the third time and it cost Quinn and Patricia their jobs. Detroit collapsed in a 41-25 loss to Houston at home on Thursday after getting shut out for the first time in 11 years in the previous game at Carolina.

"I'm just really appreciative of my family, my wife, my kids," Patricia said Thursday before taking questions from reporters on a Zoom call. "My wife does a lot behind the scenes and from that standpoint I appreciate her a lot."

NFL dealing with more COVID issues

The Denver Broncos have no quarterbacks. The San Francisco 49ers have no home stadium or practice facility. And the Baltimore Ravens may not have enough players available for their next game, which has already been pushed back twice.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused major disruptions around the NFL on Saturday, again calling into question the league's plan to play a full schedule after several weeks that went relatively smoothly.

Multiple people familiar with the NFL's investigation told The Associated Press that all four of the quarterbacks on Denver's roster were ineligible to play Sunday against the New Orleans Saints.

One person told the AP that starter Drew Lock, backup Brett Rypien and practice squad veteran Blake Bortles were deemed high-risk close contacts with No. 3 quarterback Jeff Driskel on Wednesday, the day before Driskel tested positive for COVID-19.

Another person said the four quarterbacks apparently weren't wearing their masks the whole time they were together as required by the league's pandemic protocols.

The people spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the NFL and the Broncos hadn't made any announcements after Lock, Rypien and Bortles were ordered off the practice field Saturday and into isolation. The Broncos were scrambling to prepare practice squad rookie receiver Kendall Hinton and No. 3 running back QB Free-man to play QB against the Saints.

The Ravens, meanwhile, put six more players on the COVID-19 list, which is for players who've either tested positive for the virus or had close contact with an infected person. Baltimore had already disciplined an unidentified staff member for violating COVID-19 protocols, and the outbreak — the worst on any team this season — left the Ravens with three defensive linemen and one quarterback available.

The Ravens' game at rival Pittsburgh was initially scheduled for Thanksgiving night and

was moved to Sunday before being postponed again for Tuesday. Some Steelers players complained about their schedule being disrupted again because of another team's failure to contain an outbreak. But the Steelers placed starting running back James Conner on the COVID-19 list Saturday, joining three other teammates.

For the 49ers, the latest complication arose from the local government trying to contain the spread of the virus in the county where they practice and play their home games. Santa Clara County banned all contact sports from holding games and practices for the next three weeks.

The ban was to take effect Monday after the 49ers returned from their game at the Los Angeles Rams. It's set to last until Dec. 21.

The 49ers have home games scheduled for Dec. 7 against Buffalo and Dec. 13 against Washington at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara. The team also practices at that site.

Elsewhere in the league on Saturday:

— The active Ravens players placed on the COVID-19 list were outside linebacker Jaylon Ferguson, right tackle D.J. Fluker, defensive lineman Broderick Washington and offensive lineman Will Holden. Two others — defensive backs Khalil Dorsey and Tavon Young — were on injured reserve before also joining the list Saturday. Others on the list for Baltimore include quarterback Lamar Jackson and running backs Mark Ingram and J.K. Dobbins.

— The Saints placed starting left tackle Terron Armstead on their COVID-19 list, leaving him ineligible for Sunday's game at Denver.

— The Indianapolis Colts will be without running back Jonathan Taylor on Sunday. He is one of three Indy starters sitting out because of COVID-19 when Indianapolis hosts Tennessee for the AFC South lead.

— The Las Vegas Raiders said running backs coach Kirby Wilson won't coach this week because of COVID-19-related reasons. Senior offensive assistant John Morton will handle Wilson's duties on Sunday against the Falcons.

COLUMBIA, Mo. — Sarah Fuller was playing around with a teammate a couple months ago when she kicked a soccer ball through the uprights from 45 yards away. She joked about being able to kick a football with teammates during the Southeastern Conference soccer tournament.

On Saturday, she made history.

Fuller became the first woman to participate in a Power Five conference football game when she kicked off for Vanderbilt to start the second half at Missouri, a moment that may take some time to soak in for her.

"I just think it's incredible that I am able to do this, and all I want to do is be a good influence to the young girls out there because there were times like I struggled in sports," Fuller said. "But I am so thankful I stuck with it, and it's given me so many opportunities. I've met so many amazing people through sports, and I just want to say like literally you can do anything you set your mind to."

Fuller kicked with a holder rather than using a tee in a designed squib kick, and the senior sent a low kick to the 35-yard line where it was pounced on

by Missouri's Mason Pack. Fuller didn't get any other opportunities in Vanderbilt's 41-0 loss to Missouri.

Coach Derek Mason made clear that Fuller kicked for the Commodores due to need, not for history or publicity. COVID-19 protocols and restrictions left Mason with very few options, prompting him to reach out to the soccer team for help.

Fuller, a 6-foot-2 goalkeeper, decided she was up for the challenge.

"I'm not about making statements," Mason said. "This was out of necessity. You look at our week. Our students had gone home. The ability to have access to students and tryouts

was almost nil in terms of like what's available. ... That just happened to be the most viable option."

After Fuller's kick, she went straight to the sideline, where she high-fived some of her new teammates and swapped some elbow bumps. Fuller's parents watched and cheered from the stands along with her boyfriend and best friend.

Fuller practiced with the Commodores this week after helping the Commodores win the SEC Tournament last weekend. Fuller said her longest field goal in practice was 38 yards.

She wore "Play Like A Girl" on the back of her helmet. The senior will get

to keep the No. 32 jersey she wore Saturday, the same as her number when playing soccer.

Fuller even gave a half-time pep talk, which she usually left to her soccer teammates, telling her new teammates that Vandy won the SEC soccer tournament title by cheering for each other whether on the field or the sideline.


"We had a different mindset coming out the second half," quarterback Mike Wright said.

After her kickoff, reaction poured in on social media. Fuller was the No. 2 trending topic on Twitter, followed by Vandy. Her soccer team wrote on Twitter: "Glass. Everywhere."

As in glass ceiling. Pat McAfee, a former NFL punter, reviewed Fuller's squib kick, noting the ball didn't go out of bounds and there was no chance of a return, setting up the defense.

"Congrats to (at)Sarah-Fuller_27 for being THE FIRST EVER WOMAN TO KICKOFF A POWER 5 GAME," McAfee wrote. "Incredibly rare to be the '1st ever person to do something' these days..this is really cool."

No woman had appeared in an SEC football game or for any Power Five team. Liz Heaston became the first woman to score with two extra points for Willamette in NAIA on Oct. 18, 1997.



NBA gives teams health protocols for season

NBA players who test positive for the coronavirus this season may have to miss nearly two weeks in some instances before being allowed to return to the court, the league told its teams Saturday.

That revelation was one of many in a 63,000-word document, a copy of which was obtained by The Associated Press, that explained some of the health and safety protocols for the looming season. Preseason games begin Dec. 11 and regular-season contests start Dec. 22.

The document still needs to be ratified by the league and the National Basketball Players Association, but it at least provides some sort of blueprint for the start of training camps in the coming days. All players who will be part of training camp need to begin a testing program by Monday — many were expected to start it Saturday — and teams can begin holding mandated group workouts starting Dec. 6, the league said. Individual workouts can begin Tuesday, if players have three consecutive negative tests.

Players, coaches and other key staff are expected to be

tested daily in most cases.

The league, in a separate memo, also told teams that even with the detailed prevention and mitigation strategies “it is likely that some staff, players and other participants in the 2020-21 season nonetheless will contract COVID-19.” The league urged teams to have plans ready to assist visiting team personnel or referees who happen to test positive away from their home cities, such as directing them toward isolation accommodations if necessary and to assist with that person’s care while recovering.

There are two methods by

which a player can return to play after a positive coronavirus test: one is a test-based resolution, in which an infected individual has at least two consecutive negative PCR test results. The other is a time-based resolution, where a player would have to isolate, rest and avoid workouts for at least 10 days and then spend at least two more days training in isolation. He would also have to undergo cardiac screening before being cleared to return.

The league is still working with the union on specific protocols for life on the road, saying it wants to find ways to “promote

more controlled environments and reduce nonessential interactions.” Teams will be urged to work with hotel vendors on best practices, such as face-mask usage and physical distancing, especially from people who are not part of a team’s travel party — which will be capped at 45 people, including players, coaches and staff.

There is a possibility that the league will have teams travel with someone whose specific task is to handle testing on the road. Those people — it may be one, it may be two — would not count toward the 45-person travel party total.

Seagrass mapping: Some of your questions answered

Q: What are seagrasses?

A: Seagrasses are flowering plants that colonized the ocean some 70 to 100 million years ago. Seagrasses have leaves, flowers, seeds and roots. Unlike land plants, seagrasses do not have strong stems to hold themselves up. Instead they are supported by the buoyancy of the water surrounding them. Another unique characteristic of seagrasses is that they are "halophytes," meaning they only grow in saltwater. Of the approximately 52 species of seagrasses that exist worldwide, there are only seven species found in Florida, six of them along Florida's Gulf Coast.

Q: Where do seagrasses grow?
A: Seagrasses typically grow in protected bays and lagoons but can also be found in the deeper waters of the Gulf of Mexico. The depth to which seagrasses grow is most often determined by the amount of light reaching the bottom. In most of our Gulf Coastal estuaries you can find seagrass meadows between 6-10 feet of water. But off the Springs Coast just north of Tampa Bay, seagrasses can grow at depths of 30 feet or more! Overall, Florida has about 2.5 million acres of seagrass, more seagrass than anywhere else in the continental United States.

Q: Why are seagrasses so important?
A: Seagrasses provide critical habitat in Florida estuaries. They help improve water clarity, reduce nutrient pollution, and even help combat climate change. Approximately 70% of commercially and

recreationally important fish spend at least part of their lifecycle within seagrass meadows. Seagrasses are very important to Florida's economic health, contributing approximately \$20 billion annually to the state's economy.

Q: How and why does the District map seagrass habitat?

A: Seagrasses are sensitive to environmental change and therefore make very good indicators of estuarine health. For this reason, District scientists have been mapping seagrass habitat along the west-central and southwest Florida coast since 1988 as a way to take the pulse of the estuary. District scientists collect digital aerial photographs from an aircraft flying at an altitude of approximately 10,000 feet.

Q: When does the District map seagrass and when is the next map expected?

A: The District maps seagrasses along two regions of west-central and southwest Florida, the Springs Coast and the Suncoast. The Suncoast includes all the estuaries from Tampa Bay south to Charlotte Harbor and is mapped every two years. The Springs Coast extends from Waccasassa Bay near Cedar Key south to the mouth of the Anclote River. This region is mapped every four years. The most recent photography was flown between November 2019 and February 2020. At this time, photo interpreters are hard at work mapping both the Suncoast and Springs Coast estuaries with an expected release in early 2021.

Q: How are seagrasses doing in our estuaries?

A: The good news is that mapped acres of seagrass over the past 25 years have significantly increased in most of our estuaries peaking in 2016. For example, in Tampa Bay, seagrass acreage is greater today than it was in the 1950s. These long-term gains are a direct result of better water quality, largely due to improvements in how we treat our wastewater and manage our stormwater runoff.

However, since 2016, seagrass acreage has remained relatively steady and has even declined in some of our Suncoast estuaries. Seagrass loss can be caused by a number of reasons. Hurricanes, red tide, and other significant events all effect the overall health of our seagrass habitat. What will the 2020 maps show us? We will soon find out.

Q: Who else monitors seagrasses in my estuary?

A: The District's maps provide an excellent systemwide estimate of seagrass coverage over time. But that's not the whole story. To complete the seagrass habitat picture, more site-specific information needs to be collected. That's where our local partners come in. These partners, including county and city governments, National Estuary Programs, and citizen volunteer groups work very hard to collect critical site-specific seagrass data, that when used in conjunction with the District's seagrass maps, gives us a comprehensive look at this critical undersea habitat.

Q: How can I find out more information about seagrasses in my estuary?

A: The District seagrass maps are available for download via our geospatial open data portal (<https://data-swfwmd.opendata.arcgis.com/>). The University of South Florida Water Institute's open data portal also hosts many of the District's seagrass maps (<https://data-waterinstitute.opendata.arcgis.com/>).

MANAGING DESTINY

Now is not the time for roadblocks

Change is not only inevitable, but speedily coming to our front doorsteps with the completion of the Suncoast 2 Parkway in early 2022.

Given that interchanges are development gateways, the rapidly approaching change will have its greatest impact at the parkway's Cardinal Street interchange because of its uniquely rural character.

To manage the parkway's developmental impact, county commissioners had the foresight in 2005 to adopt Interchange Management Areas (IMAs) within the Citrus County Comprehensive Land Use Plan to encourage managed development that promotes public safety, compatibility with surrounding uses, highway beautification and aesthetically pleasing development.

Since then, the county has devoted considerable time, study and effort in exploring several interchange exit scenarios to preclude the visual blight and unmanageable sprawl that plagues the Interstate 75 and State Road 44 junction in Wildwood.

The exploratory effort and public input have led county planners to favor a “Resilient Citrus County” scenario that envisions a well-balanced commercial and residential land use mix to support a diversified economy. Other interchange options explored were a “trend” scenario that would produce helter-skelter development and a “focused growth” scenario that would be a patchwork of re-designated land uses.

With Cardinal interchange planning ready to move forward in high gear, the Citrus County Planning

Development Commission (PDC) waved a caution flag during the interchange's recent second public hearing. Rather than vote on whether to recommend to

the county commission the scenario envisioned by county planners, the PDC postponed its vote to discuss concerns raised by some PDC members and the Citrus County Building Alliance.

Among the concerns raised were the blending of the interchange's development with its rural setting, planning restrictions that could impede balanced growth, and making the widening of Cardinal Street and central sewer and water integral, not ad hoc, to the interchange planning process.

As the parkway's completion accelerates, the county's opportunity to have a working plan in place before time overcomes it is quickly ticking down. As such, discussion of the concerns raised should be viewed by all parties as an opportunity to fine-tune the county's planning vision rather than a roadblock that could result in the Cardinal interchange's planning process falling victim to unmanageable growth and commercial blight.

Now is Citrus County's chance to be firmly in the driver's seat by fine-tuning county staff's planning vision and following the exit sign to the interchange scenario that best manages the dramatic developmental change of Cardinal Street as a gateway to the future.

If Citrus County is to control its destiny, it should heed the advice of management consultant Peter Drucker, “You cannot predict the future, but you can create it.”

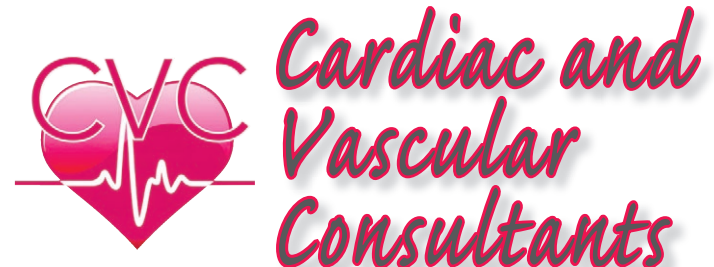

Free products for nonprofits

Governmental agencies, both state and federal, provide benefits for which nonprofits can apply. Foundations provide financial grants that fund the operations of nonprofits to support of their mission and purpose. There are also large national nonprofits in the business of providing both service and product to other nonprofits. NAEIR, the National Association for the Exchange of Industrial Resources is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that helps other charitable 501(c)(3) organizations. Every year, NAEIR sends out a brochure to the Non Profit Resource Center explaining their program of giving. Here is their story.

About NAEIR

NAEIR is in the business of empowering 501(c)(3) nonprofit charitable organizations with acts of generosity.

NAEIR receives and warehouses excess inventory donated to them by manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers throughout the U.S. NAEIR redistributes this inventory to over 15,000 schools, churches and other nonprofits across America.

All merchandise received from NAEIR must be used by the recipient nonprofit and cannot be bartered, traded or sold.

Last year, an inventory of \$100 million of free goods was available to nonprofits with membership status in NAEIR.

How does it work?

Manufacturers, distributors and retailers accumulate large amounts of inventory in their warehouses because of overproduction, returns and discounted items.

They do not want to throw away new, unsold and useable product.

Neither do they wish to flood the market with this merchandise as that would hurt and diminish new sales.

For the donors who choose to ship products to NAEIR, IRS provides tax deductions as an incentive to continue their donations.

Who is eligible for NAEIR?

Churches, schools and other nonprofits are eligible to apply for and receive free merchandise.

Eligible organizations must be 501(c)(3) charitable, publicly supported nonprofit organizations. An IRS "Determination Letter" is usually required before the merchandise can be shipped.

A nominal annual membership fee of \$59 is required to join NAEIR.

Contacting NAEIR is the best way to receive current membership information. NAEIR can be reached by calling 800-562-0955 or by email member@naeir.org. The website is www.naeir.org.

Be sure to let NAEIR know you discovered them thru the Non Profit Resource Center in Citrus County.

By law, all merchandise given to member nonprofits must be made available free of charge.

There are no limits on the dollar amount of inventory recipients can receive. Some nonprofits have received upwards of \$18,000 of available products per year.

What's available?

The list of merchandise available is extensive. Products include: office and janitorial supplies, maintenance items, tools and hardware, class materials, clothing and shoes, computer software, toys, games and sporting goods, books, tapes and CDs, arts and crafts, personal care items and holiday items.

The state of Florida records indicate there are over 800 nonprofits located inside the borders of Citrus County and over 4,500 collectively by counties touching our county border lines.

It behooves any nonprofit to investigate the opportunity of receiving products available thru NAEIR.

Donate rewards or give cash?

If you're looking to give to charity this holiday season but don't want to dip into your bank account, donating unused credit card rewards, hotel points and airline miles can be a helpful alternative. In some cases the charity can use the rewards for travel needs, and in other cases, the issuer can convert them to cash for the charity.

And nonprofits' needs are skyrocketing amid the COVID-19 pandemic. A July 2020 analysis by Candid, a group that provides information about nonprofits, found that more than one-third of them may be forced to shutter as a result of the twin crises of the pandemic and recession.

Here are times it can make sense to donate from your credit card rewards stash and times when it's not the best idea.

WHEN DONATING POINTS WORKS WELL

■ When you (and the charity) will get good value for the points

Sometimes point values are diminished if you donate them. Other times, it's a fair or even superior value.

Citi lets eligible cardholders donate ThankYou points to a handful of charities at a value of 1 cent each. That's the baseline value you'd want for travel redemption, and it's a better value than redeeming for cash back.

Those who hold eligible Chase credit cards can redeem their points for statement credits to cover donations to about a dozen charities, again at a rate that's higher than the penny-per-point value for cash back.

There are third-party options, too. Miles4Migrants, a charity that uses donated miles to help people affected by disasters, works to get full value for gifted rewards.

"We have a team of expert award bookers search for flights and give that information to the donor, who books the flight directly for the person in need," marketing manager Cat Cooke said.

■ When the charity gets a kicker Through Dec. 1, 2020 (aka "Giving Tuesday"), American Express is offering a 10-times match when you donate

points to Feeding America. Discover lets cardholders donate rewards to several charities and contributes an extra \$25,000 to one that receives the most donations annually.

United Airlines' Miles on a Mission platform runs periodic campaigns to support nonprofits. The company will roll out a new initiative starting Dec. 1 with a match limit of 125,000 miles per charity.

■ When your supply outpaces your demand

Points and miles don't earn interest and can be devalued. If you're sitting on more points than you'll use in the next two years, donating them may make sense.

Derrick Dye, an attorney and blogger at Travel-on-Points, earns millions of miles a year and strives to donate 10% of them, even if it's not for outside value.

"My wife and I feel strongly about supporting our nation's veterans, and donating our Southwest Airlines points to the Honor Flight Network is an easy way for us to give back," Dye said.

WHEN DONATING POINTS ISN'T IDEAL

■ When your points lose significant value

Many loyalty programs don't disclose how many dollars a charity will receive for your points or miles donation. But often it won't be the same value you could expect if you used them for travel.

Marriott, for instance, offers a robust

list of charities to which you can donate Bonvoy points — from as few as 2,500 points for a \$10 donation, up to 125,000 points for a \$500 donation. That's a value of 0.4 cent per point, but you can more than double that if you use them for travel.

■ If you can donate cash rewards instead

Some cards may give you an option to earn rewards as points or cash back. And while points can sometimes offer a fair or excellent value when donated, cash back remains the most flexible reward of all.

You can give that money to any number of charities, not just ones that partner with the card issuer. Plus, you might reap tax benefits this way.

Because the IRS generally views credit card rewards as rebates and not income, donations of points and miles aren't eligible write-offs — but monetary donations could be. If you redeem rewards for cash back and then donate that directly to a charity, you're giving money, not points.

■ If you have alternative 'found funds'

Another way to avoid tapping into your bank account or your rewards stash is to donate "cash equivalents." One example: unused gift card balances that may be floating around your desk. Charity Choice, a nonprofit that lets users send gift cards to more than 1,000 different charities, also accepts unused balances on existing retail and restaurant gift cards.

You'll receive a tax receipt for the full value of the gift card you donate.

Christmas Parades move toward drive-thru format

The Citrus County Chamber of Commerce, in consultation with the Citrus County Health Department, the City of Crystal River, the City of Inverness, and the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, has decided that with the spike of COVID-19 cases and the current stress on available hospital beds the Crystal River and Inverness Christmas parade formats will now be "drive-thru"

Commonly referred to as "reverse Parades", floats will be stationary and parade viewers will drive-thru the route to view the float entries.

The dates and times will remain the same, Saturday, December 5th at 6 PM. in Crystal River and Saturday, December 12th at noon in Inverness. The locations will be changed to a more conducive area.

The Chamber has partnered with law enforcement to route the floats in the

Crystal River Christmas parade around a one-mile interior road at the Crystal River Mall. In Inverness, Highlands Blvd, from Montgomery to Apopka, will be utilized for this year's Inverness Christmas parade.

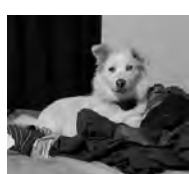

Replacing a cracked undermount sink

Q: Tim, can you solve a conundrum for me? My bathroom was remodeled about two months ago, and the vanity has a granite top with a china undermount sink. Yesterday I noticed a long crack in

the sink that extends up from the drain hole. The contractor claims I did it by dropping something. I didn't. He won't repair it. What can be done? How might it have happened? I feel I need a new sink, but I can't figure out how to install one because when I lay on my back and look up I don't see

any clips holding the sink to the underside of the stone. I'm so angry at the contractor. Help! — Paula H., Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

A: Few things are more frustrating than contractors who run away from problems instead of

running towards them. Based on the incoming help requests at my website, I see an alarming trend of contractors who are reluctant to honor warranties. It's hard to comprehend, but I feel it's caused by the huge

demand for building services right now. Contractors can just start a new job and make more money rather than go to a past job to work for free fixing an error or faulty product.

I've been a master plumber for decades and have installed countless sinks, including china

undermount ones like Paula's. Fortunately, the photos that Paula sent to me showed she's got plenty of room to work under the sink, and putting in a new one shouldn't be that hard.

First, let's look at why the sink might have

Looking at the ponytail plant

Gardeners and homeowners enjoy collecting unusual plants. While travelling across Texas back in the 1970s, Citrus County resident Evelyn Stonesifer bought a souvenir — a small potted plant commonly called a ponytail or elephant's foot plant. Its accepted scientific name is *Beaucarnia recurvata*. In the

family Asparagaceae of flowering plants (technically called Angiosperms) the *Beaucarnia* genus has only nine species — all are from tropical Mexico or Central America. *Beaucarnia* plants are considered succulents, not palms.

Closely related *Nolina*

species are in a different genus in the same Asparagaceae family, so the name *beaucarnia* is not interchangeable with *nolina*.

There are 27 accepted named species in *Nolina*, including two rare, legally protected endemic native species in the wild in Florida. Florida Beargrass, *Nolina atopocarpa Bartlett*, is a threatened species. Britton's Beargrass, *Nolina brittoniana Nash*, is an endangered species.

Inquisitive plant lovers can look online where The Plant List gives currently accepted *Beaucarnia* species names. For some 50 years, Evelyn enjoyed, tended, and repotted her ponytail plant as a house

plant. She and her husband Martin "Stony" moved to Citrus County in 1968, where Martin built many houses. Over the years, Evelyn and her ponytail plant moved into a series of six homes that Martin built. For a while, the Stonesifers raised miniature horses out on County Road 491 behind two homes they built where Allen Ridge is now located. They also ran Stoney's Used Furniture.

Evelyn's ponytail had to live outside when it became too tall and heavy for an indoor houseplant. Her yellow cat took to climbing the very slow growing *beaucarnia* and scratched the smooth bark on the slim, gray-brown trunk. The base of the trunk swelled into a large round caudex where the plant stores water. Although xeric (drought-tolerant), tropical *beaucarnias* are not cold-hardy so need

winter protection from temperatures below 45 degrees.

Beaucarnia recurvata is usually a potted patio or pool cage plant in Central Florida. Further north it is an indoor plant. In time and in the right climate, tropical, woody-stemmed, frost-tender Ponytail *beaucarnia* can grow 30 feet tall, with a trunk diameter up to 40 centimeters and the flared rounded caudex base can become many feet in diameter. Round when young, the caudex can elongate to several feet high with a base diameter of up to 6.5 feet on an ancient specimen. Single-stemmed when young, mature trees may have branches. In Mexico there are registered *B. recurvata* trees over 350 years old.

Thin, strap-like, linear, leathery, recurved,

Matchbook holder an example of smoking memorabilia

something I cannot make out. I do not understand what it was used for given its shape. It has been an object of conversation, but no one really knows what it was used for. Can you tell me what my mystery item is? — D.McC., internet

Dear D.McC.: I appreciate the good clear photographs including one of the makers' mark. You have a matchbook holder. Remember, until the late 20th century, matchbooks were literally ubiquitous. They were given away as promotional items by every restaurant and most retailers.

Smoking cigarettes is no longer cool, and now we have a collecting category that is cool called smoking memorabilia. All the decorative objects related to smoking cigarettes, e.g. lighters, ashtrays, advertising memorabilia, etc. are looked for by collectors.

Your matchbook holder was made by Wendall August Forge as marked. The company started business in the 1930s and continues into current times. It is made of aluminum. The condition appears to be excellent — I see no scratches on the surface. Potential dollar value is \$10 to \$20.

Dear John: I have seen in the Chronicle where you have helped with information about family pieces, so I am hoping you may be able to help me. My mother bought this secretary secondhand in the 1940s or 1950s for my father. Can you give me any information just by looking at the picture? I do not even know the style, but I think it is beautiful. Thanking you beforehand. — K.R., Homosassa

Dear K.R.: You have a drop front secretary bookcase with a broken arch pediment. It is an elaborate 20th century version of an English Chippendale 18th century form. I am glad you included a photograph of the desk portion interior. I can see the two metal armatures for the drop front lid support, dating the piece well into the 20th century. It was likely made in Grand Rapids, Michigan, between World War I and II. It is close to, if not 100 years old, so you have an antique reproduction.

Creeping sage will creep all over your yard

This is creeping sage. Although it's a native plant and many people like it, Gardener Gal isn't a fan.

Dear Gardener Gal: I'm writing to you even though I'm no stranger to plants and gardening. I'm sure I'm older than you and I'll bet I have been gardening longer too, but need help with a new plant in my yard.

I've attached a photo of a bloom spike, though the flowers are more blue than photo shows. It is a ground cover and very fast growing. I would like to know if it is native (I can tell you it is definitely invasive) and get a name for it so I can do some research on my own to decide if it goes or stays.

Appreciate your help. — John

Dear John: Of course I'm always happy to help a fellow gardener. It sounds like I could maybe use you as a resource as well. A wise person once told me that a gardener who

stops asking questions is a gardener who has stopped learning.

I (feeling proud) knew right away what you had in your yard. *Salvia miscella*, or Southern river sage. Ok, I'm not gonna pull any punches — I hate it. Harsh, I know, but...I hate it.

Another common name for it is creeping sage. Boy, does it creep! It has taken over plant beds and is coming up in my lawn. It is a native plant. This is a good thing in terms of feeding native pollinators, though I honestly haven't seen them give it much attention. The

creeping habit also makes it a fairly reliable ground cover, though you will probably lose it in winter for awhile.

6. Layer up in the bedroom.

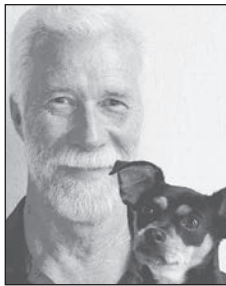

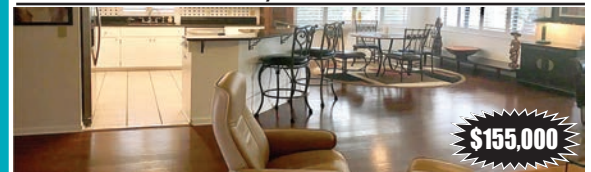

pillows. A luxurious cashmere or wool throw and soft velvet bed pillows can turn your bedroom into a cozy refuge from those harsh winter winds.

7. Add sheepskin for warmth.

For warmer transitions from bed to floor, place a sheepskin rug beside your bed, creating a cozy greeting to feet on brisk winter mornings. Or toss one over an ottoman or a chaise to provide a toasty spot to tuck chilly toes while reading or relaxing.

8. Dress up your hardwood.

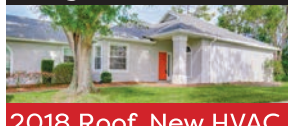

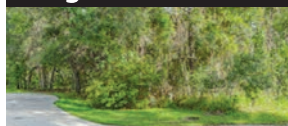

When you Google it, you will see most folks saying positive things about it. I'm all about using natives as much as possible, but just being native doesn't give a plant a free pass. At least not on my property.

Write me back when you decide if it is staying or going.

Dear Gardener Gal: We saw a snake in our bushes that was obviously blind. We could tell it wasn't poisonous, but still kept our distance. Do you think this is related to an injury or is it just a really old snake? My son feels bad for it and wants to feed it. Should he do that? — June

Dear June: Your son sounds like a terrific kid.

I have good news for him — the snake is only temporarily blind. The discoloration over its eyes is old skin that is ready to be shed. From your photo, it looks like the

This black racer is only temporarily blind. The dead skin over its eyes will eventually rub off.

snake (black racer) will be rubbing the old skin off very soon. Nature plans it so they don't have to go around blind for very long.

This is a lifelong process and whether young or old, snakes (and lizards) will shed their skin on a regular basis as they grow.

Tell your son to keep an eye out

for the shed. It will be in bushes or near rocks or whatever the snake used to get free of old skin. If he's lucky the shed will have the head with eyes will still be intact. Great conversation piece.

evergreen leaves can be 5 feet, 11 inches long and appear in terminal tufts like a ponytail at the top of the trunk and branches. Leaf edges are very finely serrated.

Only old *Beaucarnia recurvata* plants flower and then only in warmer South Florida cold zones 10a to 11. Small greenish-white flowers with six tepals cluster in huge fluffy-looking panicles atop erect inflorescence flower stalks. A mature tree in a select location may flower two to three times a year. Seeds will weigh the flower stem downward.

After Martin died in 2003, a grandson, Troy

Stonesifer, moved down from Maryland to help his grandmother with home upkeep, transportation, companionship and protecting the 12-foot tall ponytail beaucarnia from winter freezes. This November, at 95 years of age, Evelyn decided her beloved plant needed a new family, so phoned me for help arranging an adoption. I knew the perfect family with an ideal garden location nearby in Citrus Hills.

I phoned Dot and Brad Welch of Welch Appliances (now repairs and service only). Dot accompanied me to adopt the prized ponytail beaucarnia from Evelyn. We all wore face masks covering mouths, noses and chins even though we were out in the garden. We only removed the masks for

photographs and kept a respectful social distance from the at-risk senior Evelyn. She is 20 years my senior and had a wealth of gardening experience to share. Her front porch is now converted into a greenhouse for bonsai plants. No heavy lifting involved with clipped and miniaturized bonsai plants.

Rosemary topiary a great holiday gift

Edible rosemary provides a wonderfully fragrant addition to the home and makes a great holiday gift. Often, these plants are found trimmed into the shape of a miniature tree.

This shape is fine for a short while, but after the holidays, discontinue trimming. Compact trimming allows insect populations to thrive. Allowed to grow naturally, rosemary is a low-maintenance plant that tolerates Florida's climate well, whether planted in the ground or in a large pot.

Evergreen rosemary plants can grow to 3 to 4 feet tall and wide. Choose a garden spot that will accommodate its moderately fast growth, with full sun and well-drained soil. This Mediterranean

plant prefers dry conditions and will suffer quickly if over-watered. Avoid "killing it with kindness."

Whether growing in the ground or in a container, small stems can be cut off and used in your favorite dish. (After a thorough washing of course!) Rosemary is commonly used to season meats, roasted potatoes and rustic breads, but can also add an aromatic zip to a sugar or butter cookie recipe.

While the plant does not have a spectacular flower, its blooms of pink to lavender add interest in the fall, making it a well-rounded garden addition. Maybe you'll gift yourself with one this year.

cracked. The first thing I'd consider would be the drain assembly. The plumber that installed the drain might have overtightened the nut on the drain assembly that compresses the drain trim ring to the china surface. The drain stopper fits inside this trim ring that you see from above when you brush your teeth.

In all my years I've never seen a china sink come from the factory with a firing crack defect. It's possible, but it's very rare. No matter how the crack happened, there's no acceptable fix in my opinion other than to remove and replace the existing sink.

The lack of clips or hardware under the sink to hold it tight against the stone top is very unusual. I'd never install an undermount sink this way. It appears the contractor, or his subs, used silicone caulk to hold the sink in place. This is a recipe for long-term disaster. I can't begin to share with you the number of failed-sink photos homeowners have sent me where sinks were installed just with caulk and suddenly drop once filled with water or heavy dishes.

I'd empty everything out of the

vanity cabinet below and disconnect the sink from the drain piping. I'd also remove the drain tailpiece from the sink. Then I'd stack some old towels or empty cardboard boxes in the vanity base to catch the sink when it suddenly releases from the stone top.

Next, I'd get a new stiff 1.5-inch putty knife and, using a hammer, I'd carefully tap the knife at an angle so one tip of the knife, not the entire flat edge, drives between the underside of the stone and the top rim of the sink. I'd do this from above looking down on the sink — not from below, lying in the cabinet. Hold the knife parallel to the underside of the stone top and tap it carefully. Avoid having the hammer touch the polished edge of the stone top cutout. You surely don't want to chip that!

If the sink is held in place with silicone caulk, as I suspect, the knife will cut through the caulk. At some point, you'll start to see the sink sag, although it could drop suddenly with no warning. This is why you have the cushioning in place to prevent damage to the vanity.

Once the sink is out, scrape any excess caulk from the underside of the stone top. You can buy solvents that will soften silicone caulk. Read the safety warnings about working with

these chemicals indoors.

You'll install the new sink using an undermount hardware kit. There are several available, and many require you to epoxy a threaded post to the underside of the stone top. These are easy to work with; you just have to make sure you install them in the right position so they don't touch the outer rim of the replacement china sink.

It's important to understand that the epoxy will not adhere well to any stone that has silicone caulk smeared on it. You either have to remove the caulk smear or grind it off using a small rotary tool so you expose rough stone that the epoxy will stick to with no issues.

Numerous online videos show how to install undermount sinks and how to hold the sink in place as you tighten the hardware to the epoxied threaded posts. Watch these videos for sure.


When you go to reinstall the drainpipe assembly, understand that the cone-shaped washer that fits inside the hole is what helps create the seal. You don't need the nut overtightened to get a leak-proof seal. Hand-tight plus an additional 1/2 to 3/4 turn is all you need.
