DOH offers free COVID-19 tests

The Citrus County Department of Health will offer no cost COVID-19 testing to those with or without symptoms.

Tests check samples from a person's respiratory system to tell if you currently have an infection; it is not an antibody test. Test results usually take three to seven days and, in some cases, up to 10 days.

Testing is done by appointment only. To schedule an appointment, call 352-527-0068.

The Citrus County Department of Health will offer no-cost back to school immunizations from Friday, July 20, through Friday, Aug. 14, by appointment only at the Department of Health, 3700 W. Sovereign Path, Lecanto.

In addition, the immunizations will be offered from 9:30 to 1:30 p.m. Saturday, July 25, 2020.

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Florida COVID-19 cases climb higher

MIAMI — Officials are announcing more beaches will be closing again in Florida to avoid further spread of the new coronavirus as they try to tamp down on large gatherings amid a spike in confirmed COVID-19 cases.

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis said

at a news conference Sunday in Pensacola that interactions among young people are driving the surge in confirmed cases. Meanwhile in Broward County, home to Fort Lauderdale, authorities said they would be closing beaches during the busy Fourth of July weekend following the decision of Miami-Dade County to close theirs between July 3 and July 7.

The Florida Department of Health reported on Sunday more than 8,500 new confirmed cases of COVID-19 and 29 deaths. In total, the state now has more than 141,000 confirmed coronavirus cases and more than 3,400 deaths.

New hospitalizations are also ticking upward, although not as dramatically as the new cases.

Thirteen new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest FDOH update. No new hospitalizations were reported; no new deaths were reported. To date in the county, 277 people have tested positive, 36 have been hospitalized and 12 have died.

Construction continues

Affordable housing project on schedule despite pandemic

The affordable housing project slated for a fall completion in Inverness is on schedule say its Fort Lauderdale developers with the first of three buildings ready for new residents before the year's end.

The Citrus County Housing Services also announced recently a \$70,000 local match using State Housing Initiative Program (SHIP) funds for the Green Mills' Colonnade Park, 106-unit, affordable apartment complex on Colonnade Street.

Despite much of Florida's construction industry being hampered by the coronavirus pandemic, Green Mills co-founder and owner Mitch Rosenstein told the Chronicle the company had anticipated problems and took steps to work around them at the Colonnade Park project near Forest Drive.

"While the same cannot be said of some of our other communities under development in Florida, COVID-19 hasn't materially slowed Colonnade Park's construction schedule, yet," Rosenstein said. "We did experience delays involving finish-related components like millwork and flooring, but our team and builder anticipated them early on and adjusted quickly."

"We hope to have the first residential building ready for occupancy in the fourth quarter of this year, 2020, and we expect to commence pre-leasing activities in September," he said.

You couldn't miss Jake Steel. He was the one wearing loud, obnoxious shirts with martini glasses or hot sauce bottles or hula girls or chicken and waffles on them. He could pull it off, too, with confidence and swagger.

He was the one singing karaoke — badly — and not at all self-consciously. Jake was the one sipping on the largest-size Icee he could find, the one with the smile a mile wide.

"Jake loved to laugh and have a good time," said Jason Steel, Jake's dad. "He rarely shied away from a challenge: zip lining, rock climbing, eating weird food, riding roller coasters, hot dog and doughnut eating contests, 3 a.m. runs for Icees — Jake was up for all of it."

"Everything Jake enjoyed, he enjoyed to the fullest. Moderation was for suckers — Jake lived fiercely," Jason said.

Two years ago, when Jake was diagnosed with leukemia, after his initial shock he continued living life to the fullest, with fierce determination, optimism and courage, and an unwavering faith in Christ.

Jason "Jake" Pierce Steel II died June 3, 2020, after a heroic battle with leukemia. He was 23.

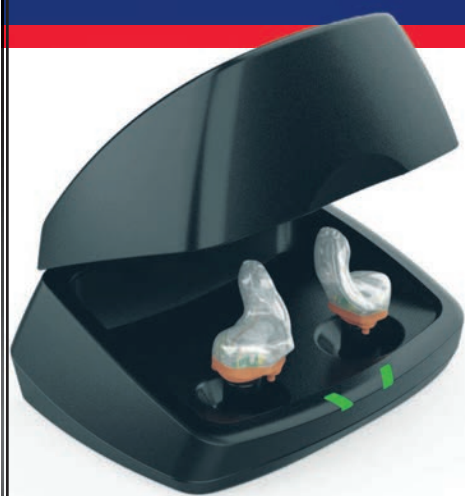

County rolls out watering schedule

Citrus County has enacted mandatory irrigation restrictions effective immediately, in response to increased irrigation demands that resulted in groundwater withdrawals exceeding Southwest Florida Water Management District's (SWFWMD) permitted amounts. The new watering schedule is necessary to bring water use into permit compliance and avoid regulatory penalties.

The following landscape irrigation restrictions are in place for all Citrus County except the cities of Crystal River and Inverness. The restrictions include:

■ Landscape irrigation is limited to one day per week for

unincorporated Citrus County.

■ Irrigation is only allowed on a specific day of the week based on the last number of the address.

■ All landscape irrigation is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. to reduce evaporation.

■ Established lawns, less than one acre in size, shall choose to irrigate either before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m. — not both.

■ Hand-watering and micro-irrigation of plants (other than lawns) can be done on any day before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m.

■ All wasteful and unnecessary water use is prohibited. For example, irrigating within 12 hours of receiving 3/4-inch of rain, irrigating with a broken sprinkler head/part or allowing water to

flow from a hose without a nozzle.

Below is the one-day per week unincorporated Citrus County watering schedule. A user may irrigate established lawns and landscaping during only one of the specified time periods on the allowable watering day.

Address irrigation day

(Choose a.m. or p.m. irrigation, not both)

■ Address that ends in 0 or 1: Monday from midnight to 10 a.m., or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.

■ Address that ends in 2 or 3: Tuesday from midnight to 10 a.m., or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.

■ Address that ends in 4 or 5: Wednesday from midnight to

10 a.m., or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.

■ Address that ends in 6 or 7: Thursday from midnight to 10 a.m., or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.

■ Address that ends in 8 or 9, and locations with a mix of addresses or for which an address cannot be determined (such as multi-family units and common areas associated with a subdivision): Friday from midnight to 10 a.m., or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.

Frequent hand washing uses very little water. Residents are encouraged to continue hand washing, following CDC guidelines during the COVID-19 pandemic.

World leaders, stars unite at event aimed at fighting virus

LONDON — A summit that included a star-studded virtual concert hosted by **Dwayne Johnson** has raised nearly \$7 billion in cash and loan guarantees to assist the poor around the globe whose lives have been upended by the coronavirus pandemic.

Global Citizen said its summit with world leaders had raised \$1.5 billion to help COVID-19 efforts in poor countries, along with a promise of 250 million doses of a vaccine for those nations if one is successfully developed.

The group said it had secured \$5.4 billion in loans and guarantees from the European Commission and the European Investment Bank to support fragile economies worldwide.

The event included a Johnson-hosted concert with performances by **Jennifer Hudson**, **Miley Cyrus**, Coldplay and Chloe x Halle. Cyrus performed The Beatles' "Help!" in an empty stadium and Hudson performed "Where Peaceful Waters Flow" from a boat in Chicago.

"The \$6.9 billion that was pledged today to support the world's poorest and most marginalized communities is an incredible next step on our journey out of the COVID-19 era, but there is more still to be done, as no one is safe until everyone is safe," **Hugh Evans**, CEO of Global Citizen, said after the event Saturday.

"As we fight this virus, we also need to take care of the most vulnerable people and address the challenges they're facing right now," Canadian Prime Minister **Justin Trudeau** said

during the event.

Speakers also included the leaders of New Zealand, El Salvador, Sweden, South Africa and Barbados.

Italy honors virus dead with Donizetti's Requiem concert

ROME — Italy bid farewell to its coronavirus dead on Sunday with a haunting Requiem concert performed at the entrance to the cemetery of Bergamo, the hardest-hit province in the one-time epicenter of the outbreak in Europe.

President Sergio Mattarella was the guest of honor, and said his presence made clear that all of Italy was bowing down to honor Bergamo's dead, "the thousands of men and women killed by a sickness that is still

greatly unknown and continues to threaten the world."

To respect social distancing rules, the guest list for the outdoor evening concert was limited to Mattarella and mayors of Bergamo's 243 cities acting as representatives of their communities. RAI state television, which broadcast the concert live, said a few health care workers and representative of families who lost loved ones to the pandemic were also invited.

Aside from the soloists and conductor, masks were omnipresent including for the chorus, and the wind instruments were arranged behind Plexiglas. The orchestra performed the unfinished Requiem funeral Mass of Bergamo native **Gaetano Donizetti**, one of Italy's most important 19th century composers.

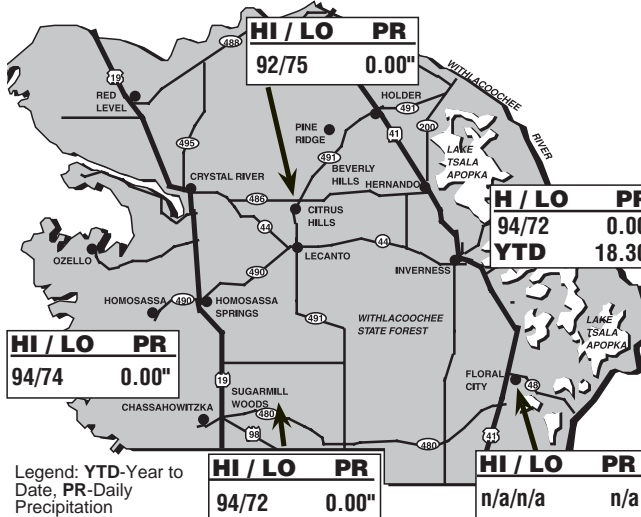

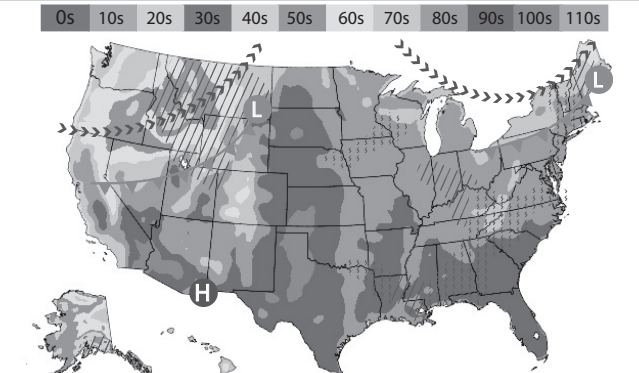

As a teen, Jake swam for Citrus High School.

Built more like a football player than a swimmer and bigger than most of his competitors, he still managed to outswim the best of them.

After high school, he went to Berry College in Georgia where he swam his freshman year.

"Jake was fiercely determined," said his mom, Liza Steel. "Like so many freshmen, classes got away from him and he had to drop a class, which put him under the 12 hours needed to participate in sports, so he had to stop swimming for the semester."

"But Jake was determined to rejoin the team, so he asked the coach what he could do. Every night Jake would arrive at the pool as the team was finishing their practice and do their entire two-hour workout by himself," she said. "Much to the surprise of his teammates and coaches, when Jake rejoined the team, he was faster and stronger than he had been before."

At the conference meet, Jake dropped time in every event, including a 6-second drop in the 200-meter breaststroke.

"Jake told us later that he wasn't going to let anyone see him quit or slack off," Liza said. "He was determined to show his commitment and ability."

Jake showed that same determination, coupled with courage, throughout his two-year battle with leukemia, which included five rounds of chemotherapy.

"He made the courageous look easy," Liza said. "Because of the way his leukemia manifested, Jake was asked to be in a lot of studies. He never asked, 'How much will it hurt?' or 'What do I have to do?' He only asked, 'Will it help people?'"

During one trial at Moffitt Cancer Center an unexpected side effect caused spinal cord swelling, resulting in a temporary paralysis from the chest down.

At one time he was in remission for four months and this past Christmas he was scheduled for a bone marrow transplant with his brother, Luke, as the donor, but his temporary paralysis never went away and the transplant was postponed.

In college, Jake majored in creative technologies — he was a maker. He had always loved building things, putting together models, playing with Legos as a boy.

He had wanted to find a career creating 3-D models, but when he was in the hospital, his focus shifted to using his degree to make improvements in hospital care.

He would talk to the nurses about their jobs, what they were frustrated with, what would make their jobs easier.

However, he didn't live to finish college, only making it through his junior year.

Nevertheless, he made an impact.

"He was this goofy, loud, boisterous presence, always the one having the most fun," his brother, Luke, said. "I was ecstatic when the doctors said I could be his bone marrow

donor, because as the younger brother it felt like I wasn't able to do enough to help him, and this was something I could do.

"Now ... I feel lost. Right now I don't have anything close to a sense of direction," he said. "All my life I've been following in Jake's footsteps."

For his sister, Carleigh, Jake was the perfect big brother.

"He cared for me, protected me, comforted me, and he would put my needs above his own," she said.

One morning, the two were alone in the house and Jake fell — his spine had broken from compression fractures. Carleigh called for help, and as they waited for help to arrive, Carleigh laid on the floor next to her brother and started crying.

"Jake comforted me and told me everything was going to be OK," she said. "Jake always cared for me even when he was the one who needed to be cared for."

Jake was one of a kind. He went to his high school prom by himself and had a great time. He loved comics and Japanese anime, karate, '70s mellow music and '50s doo wop.

He loved the gym — and the fried chicken at the Berry College campus dining hall.

He loved Broadway musicals — "1776" and "Wicked," which the family all saw together at the Straz Center in Tampa.

He especially loved the last song, "For Good," because it talked about the bond of friendship: "But because I knew you, I have been changed for good."

"Jake was a wonderful gift to us all," Jason said. "Even though his time with us was far too short, he showed us what fierce means. Even in the midst of what turned out to be a terminal illness, Jake was fiercely alive, a warrior that fought to the very end."

"He never lost his faith," Jason said. "With every setback, he never wavered ... despite his physical problems, he remained full of hope and spent his last days showing us that the purpose and meaning of life is love," he said. "When Jake was in ICU he told us, 'God is so good, because he's given us each other. And I'm so happy that we'll always be together.'"

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Mississippi lawmakers vote to remove rebel emblem from flag

JACKSON, Miss. — Mississippi lawmakers voted Sunday to surrender the Confederate battle emblem from their state flag, triggering raucous applause and cheers more than a century after white supremacist legislators adopted the design a generation after the South lost the Civil War.

Mississippi's House and Senate voted in succession Sunday afternoon to retire the flag, each chamber drawing broad bipartisan support for the historic decision. Republican Gov. Tate Reeves has said he will sign the bill, and the state flag would lose its official status as soon as he signs the measure. He did not immediately signal when the signing would take place.

The state had faced mounting pressure to change its flag during the past month amid international protests against racial injustice in the United States. Cheering and applause erupted as lawmakers hugged each other in the Senate with final passage. Even those on the opposite side of the issue also hugged as an emotional day of debate drew to a close. Bells also could be heard ringing in the state capital city as passage of the measure was announced.

A commission would design a new flag that cannot include the Confederate symbol and that must have the words "In God We Trust." Voters will be asked to approve the new design in the Nov. 3 election. If they reject it, the commission will set a different design using the same guidelines, and that would be sent to voters later.

Mississippi has a 38% Black population — and

the last state flag that incorporates the emblem that's widely seen as racist.

Republican House Speaker Philip Gunn, who is white, has pushed for five years to change the flag, saying that the Confederate symbol is offensive. The House passed the bill 91-23 Sunday afternoon, and the Senate passed it 37-14 later.

"How sweet it is to celebrate this on the Lord's day," Gunn said. "Many prayed to Him to bring us to this day. He has answered."

That dynamic changed in a matter of weeks as an extraordinary and diverse coalition of political, business, religious groups and sports leaders pushed to change the flag.

At a Black Lives Matter protest outside the Mississippi Governor's Mansion in early June, thousands cheered as an organizer said the state needs to divorce itself from all Confederate symbols.

Religious groups — including the large and influential Mississippi Baptist Convention — said erasing the rebel emblem from the state flag is a moral imperative.

Business groups said the banner hinders economic development in one of the poorest states in the nation.

Legislators put the Confederate emblem on the upper left corner of Mississippi flag in 1894, as whites were squelching political power that African Americans gained after the Civil War.

The battle emblem is a red field topped by a blue X with 13 white stars. The Ku Klux Klan and other hate groups have waved the rebel flag for decades. Georgia put the battle emblem prominently on its state flag in 1956, during a backlash to the civil rights movement. That state removed the symbol from its banner in 2001.

Democratic state Sen. Derrick Simmons of Greenville, who is African American, said the state deserves a flag that will make all people proud. "Today is a history-making day in the state of Mississippi," Simmons told colleagues before the Senate voted for passage. "Let's vote today for the Mississippi of tomorrow."

Pre-leasing means to accept leases before construction is complete.

As for the county's \$70,000 grant, Rosenstein said the money shows a commitment by local government and the community.

"When we apply for federal and state subsidies from Florida Housing Finance Corporation, the quasi-governmental agency which allocates and administers those development subsidies in Florida, it goes a long way to have support from local governments," Rosenstein said. "For Colonnade Park, this local match evidenced support from Citrus County and provided an added level of comfort to Florida Housing because it showed that our proposed community went through more scrutiny, met local goals, etc."

"Financially speaking, every dollar of additional subsidy that local governments like Citrus County

can provide helps us balance budgets while also allowing us to build attractive, well-amenitized communities," he said.

While the coronavirus has closed businesses and derailed many social aspects of our lives, Rosenstein said the need for affordable housing has not changed.

"There's still significant demand for quality affordable housing in Citrus," he said. "Our other affordable community in Citrus County, Forest Ridge (in Hernando), maintains full physical occupancy and just about full economic occupancy, which is a fancy way of saying that it achieves maximum affordable rents and collections rates," Rosenstein told the Chronicle. "Forest Ridge also leased up far more quickly than anticipated when it was completed; coupled with its full occupancy and there's clearly a need in Citrus for nice affordable housing."

Rosenstein also said that the need for affordable housing is still sufficient enough here that he's again looking for

more affordable housing opportunities in Citrus County.

Rosenstein said that it's also important to get buy-in from local government. He said he's seen that from Inverness city hall.

"The city's staff has been good to work with," he said. "It helps that they understand and appreciate the need for nice, new affordable housing in Inverness."

Rental charges for the Inverness complex will be based on income and family size. The apartment complex will also participate with the Housing Choice Voucher Program, also known as the Section 8's housing voucher program, Green Mills officials told the Chronicle.

The complex will have a mix of mostly one-bedroom, one-bath and two-bedroom, two-bath apartments and will be professionally managed

with onsite amenities that will include a pool, fitness center, club house and game room.

Tammy Harris, Citrus County's Housing Services Division director, said there is a waiting list for housing vouchers.

"Many families are just one unexpected expense away from being broke and two paychecks away from being homeless," she said.

At this time 200 local families are receiving subsidized housing vouchers through CCHS allowing them an affordable place to live, she said. In addition, another approximately 300 more are currently on a waiting list.

New admissions this week have been between 160 and 170 per day, according to figures compiled by covidtracking.com.

State officials on Friday announced a ban on alcohol consumption at bars, and DeSantis explained

Sunday there was "widespread non-compliance" in those businesses, saying they "tossed aside" safety guidelines. Several restaurants were shut down over the weekend in Broward County for not following rules restricting capacity and mandating the use of masks.

"It has invariably been because they packed so many people in and created a type of environment that we are trying to avoid," DeSantis said. "Caution was thrown to the wind and so we are where we are."

DeSantis said that between late May and early June, racial justice protests after the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis diverted attention from the pandemic, and people began to feel more comfortable going out.

South Florida restaurants and businesses restarted operations with some restrictions in the middle of May after wide closures, but some municipalities delayed the reopening to later that month. Beaches in Miami-Dade County, the hardest-hit, only reopened on June 10.

"I do think you saw some of the vigilance wear down a little bit," DeSantis said.

On Saturday, Vice President Mike Pence called off campaign events in Florida and Arizona, another state that is also seeing a surge in cases. Pence was to appear at events in Lake Wales and in Sarasota County. He is still set to meet with the governor.

DeSantis said he worried that younger people who live with older relatives may infect those in groups who can get more severely ill with COVID-19. Numbers are showing that since the spike in cases began to show.

"For these younger groups they need to be thinking about who they are coming into contact with who may be in the more vulnerable groups," DeSantis said.

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Business groups worry about 'patchwork' of local mask rules

Sparks fierce debates

Business groups say a "patchwork" of local face-mask ordinances across Florida is creating confusion for store owners and customers.

Several cities and counties from the Panhandle to South Florida have approved requirements for face coverings to be worn in public settings. But other local governments have stayed out of the issue, and Gov. Ron DeSantis has refused to issue a statewide mandate.

The issue also has sparked fierce debates, with some people taking the advice of public health officials who say face coverings can reduce the spread of COVID-19, while others see mask requirements as a government intrusion into personal liberties.

Florida Retail Federation CEO Scott Shalley said some ordinances could lead to businesses being fined if customers refuse to wear masks. He said it is unfair to make store employees police the mask mandates, which vary among communities.

"The mask issue, in and of itself, has shown itself to be very volatile," Shalley said. "There is definitely, for some people, a political component to it. We really don't think our sales associates, who are on the front lines providing services to Floridians, should be the ones to be in the middle of that battleground."

The National Federation of Independent Business also expressed concerns about businesses being held liable if customers don't comply with mask requirements.

"This patchwork of local regulations has created confusion and underscored the challenges small businesses face as they struggle to recover from the shutdown," Bill Herrle, NFIB's state executive director in Florida, said in a prepared statement. "Under many of these ordinances, owners could be held criminally liable if customers don't follow the rules and wear a mask."

"We believe draconian rules that arbitrarily punish small business owners are unfair, especially when the owners are doing everything they can to protect their customers and employees and prevent the virus from spreading."

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STATE BUDGET OVERSIGHT

Lawmakers remain silent

The coronavirus pandemic is slicing through Florida's communities at an unparalleled pace generating a health crisis, and a state budget crisis, as it spreads unchecked.

A recent Politico story brought light to the issue.

Revenue is down. According to the governor's report, the overall loss this year through May is \$1.45 billion.

Spending is up. The budget was not written to deal with the emergency response needed to blunt the virus' attack.

With so much up in the air, what are legislators doing to set things right?

Sitting at home.

Yes. State lawmakers have taken the unprecedented step of leaving spending decisions up to Gov. Ron DeSantis.

DeSantis plans to aggressively wield his veto pen by slashing up to \$1 billion out of the state budget prior to July 1. Nothing new here, Florida governors have always had the power to make those kinds of decisions.

Then there is the \$5 billion Florida received through the CARES act. Normally, the legislature has to approve this type of spending. Not so says DeSantis. He declared a state of emergency and can

spend it as he sees fit.

Regardless, tasking one person with responsibility over such a large sum with no oversight is inviting trouble.

Without a watchdog, we would not have found out the White House just sent out a total of \$1.4 billion to over one million dead people.

A cardinal rule of fiscal management is oversight. It appears this budget challenge

is a hot potato and the Legislature has chosen to drop it with the election looming in November.

Anything at odds with the state constitution and past practices should trigger alarm bells. The Legislature needs to get involved instead of following the "What me worry?" course.

While DeSantis fiscal actions have not raised concerns thus far, it is a dereliction of duty for the legislature to cede its role as a check on the state executive branch. It is always easier to oversee money being spent as it is happening rather than investigate it after the fact.

Setting DeSantis, or any other elected official, free with the candy money in their pocket, with no adult supervision, scares us.

Planning for the future

More efficient traffic flow and improved safety are two of the biggest benefits of access management.

Alternative access issues relate to shopping center out-parcels — lots created along thoroughfare frontage of shopping center sites and leased or sold separately due to their high effective strategies for comprehensive corridor management and value location. If treated separately in development review and site planning, these lots could each have individual drive-ways on a major road, sometimes with no internal connection to the surrounding development resulting in a great number of conflict points. Cross access should be embraced for all development on state and arterial roads — it makes sense. Having the ability to access multi-able business without pulling in and out of traffic lessens stop and go traffic, reduces accidents and saves time. It's called planning for the future.

Economic development will have growing pains, like it or not. With Suncoast Parkway entering Citrus County, now is the time to adhere to our CDMP, LDC and FDOT guidelines. To carve out special parcels due to their lack of understanding of our land laws dilutes and circumvents future planning. It creates dysfunctional and ineffective land use criteria. For the handful of whiners who want special exceptions, give them a box of Kleenex. You can't always get what you want.

There will always be conflict with the letter of the law. Nobody likes being told "no." But without objectives and policy we become the wild, wild west. Compromise can be accomplished within reason. But if a request clearly sets a precedence for future request, then consider how the same action would look like throughout the county. Remember, zoning dictates our quality of life.

Jumping to conclusions that our Planning and Development Department or our county attorney is being unreasonable, first take the time to educate yourself to your request. If more clarity is needed, staff is always available to answer all concerns. Certain land use request are governed not only locally but by state and federal statutes. It's easy to say a request would be a great fit, have economic implications or the applicant has longevity in the county, but is it good sound land use policy? Land use decisions run with the land not the person and are legal documents to be used by others in the future. Planning for the future is a necessity.

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World hits virus milestones

Global high in infections brings fear of more to come

ROME — The world surpassed two sobering coronavirus milestones Sunday — 500,000 confirmed deaths, 10 million confirmed cases — and hit another high mark for daily new infections as governments that attempted reopenings continued to backtrack and warn that worse news could be yet to come.

“COVID-19 has taken a very swift and very dangerous turn in Texas over just the past few weeks,” said Gov. Greg Abbott, who allowed businesses to start reopening in early May but on Friday shut down bars and limited restaurant dining amid a spike in cases.

California Gov. Gavin Newsom rolled back reopenings of bars in seven counties, including Los Angeles. He ordered them to close immediately and urged eight other counties to issue local health orders mandating the same.

More Florida beaches will be closing again to avoid further spread of the new coronavirus as officials try to tamp down on large gatherings amid a spike in COVID-19 cases. Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis said interactions among young people are driving the surge.

South Africa’s health minister warned that the country’s current surge of cases is expected to rapidly increase in the coming weeks and push hospitals to the limit. Health Minister Zwelini Mkhize said the current rise in infections has come from people who “moved back into the workplace.”

New clusters of cases at a Swiss nightclub and in the central English city of Leicester showed that the virus was still circulating widely in Europe, though not with the rapidly growing infection rate seen in parts of the U.S., Latin America and India.

Poland and France, meanwhile, attempted a step toward normalcy as the held elections that had been delayed by the virus.

Wearing mandatory masks, social distancing in lines and carrying their own pens to sign voting registers, French voters cast ballots in a second round of municipal elections. Poles also wore masks and used hand sanitizer, and some in virus-hit areas were told to mail in their ballots.

“I didn’t go and vote the first time around because I am elderly and I got scared,” said Fanny Barrouh as she voted in a Paris school.

In Texas, Abbott appeared with Vice President Mike Pence, who cut campaign events from upcoming visits to Florida and Arizona

because of rising virus cases in those states.

Pence praised Abbott for both his decision to reopen the state, and to roll back the reopening plans.

“You flattened the curve here in Texas ... but about two weeks ago something changed,” Pence said.

Pence urged people to wear masks when unable to practice social distancing. He and Abbott wore face masks as they entered and left the room, taking them off while speaking to reporters.

Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar, meanwhile, defended the fact that President Donald Trump has rarely worn a mask in public, saying he doesn’t have to follow his own administration’s guidance because as a leader of the free world he’s tested regularly and is in “very different circumstances than the rest of us.”

Addressing spikes in reported coronavirus cases in some states, Azar said on NBC’s “Meet the Press” that people “have to take ownership” of their own behaviors by social distancing and wearing masks if possible.

A reported tally Sunday from Johns Hopkins University researchers said the death toll from the coronavirus pandemic had reached 500,108.

About 1 in 4 of those deaths — more than 125,000 — have been reported in the U.S. The country with the next highest death toll is Brazil, with more than 57,000, or about 1 in 9.

The true death toll from the virus, which first emerged in China late last year, is widely believed to be significantly higher. Experts say that especially early on, many victims died of COVID-19 without being tested for it.

To date, more than 10 million

confirmed cases have been reported globally. About a quarter of them have been reported in the U.S.

The World Health Organization announced another daily record in the number of confirmed coronavirus cases across the world — topping over 189,000 in a single 24-hour period. The tally eclipses the previous record a week earlier at over 183,000 cases, showing case counts continue to progress worldwide.

Overall the U.S. still has far and away the most total cases. At more than 2,450,000 — roughly twice that of Brazil. The number of actual cases worldwide is much higher.

New York, once the nation’s pandemic epicenter, is now “on the exact opposite end,” Gov. Andrew Cuomo said in an interview with “Meet the Press.”

The state reported five new virus deaths Saturday, its lowest reported daily death toll since March 15. During the state’s peak pandemic in April, nearly 800 people were dying every day. New York still leads the nation in COVID-19 deaths with nearly 25,000.

In the state of Washington, Gov. Jay Inslee put a hold on plans to move counties to the fourth phase of his reopening plan as cases continue to increase. But in Hawaii, the city of Honolulu announced that campgrounds will reopen for the first time in three months with limited permits to ensure social distancing.

Britain’s government, meanwhile, is considering whether a local lockdown is needed for the central English city of Leicester amid reports about a spike in COVID-19 among its Asian community. It would be Britain’s first local lockdown.

“We have seen flare-ups across

the country in recent weeks,” Home Secretary Priti Patel told the BBC on Sunday.

Polish voters were casting ballots, in person and by mail, for a presidential election that was supposed to have taken place in May but was chaotically postponed amid the pandemic. President Andrzej Duda, a 48-year-old conservative backed by the nationalist ruling Law and Justice party, is running against 10 other candidates as he seeks a second five-year term.

Iwona Goge, 79, was encouraged to see so many people voting in Warsaw.

“It’s bad. Poland is terribly divided and people are getting discouraged,” she said.

French voters were choosing mayors and municipal councilors in Paris and 5,000 towns and cities in a second round of municipal elections held under strict hygiene rules. Key battlegrounds include Paris, where the next mayor will preside over the 2024 Summer Olympics.

Italy was honoring its dead later Sunday with an evening Requiem concert in hard-hit Bergamo province. The ceremony in the onetime epicenter of the European outbreak came a day after Italy registered the lowest daily tally of COVID-19 deaths in nearly four months: eight.

European leaders were taking no chances in tamping down new clusters. German authorities renewed a lockdown in a western region of about 500,000 people after about 1,300 slaughterhouse workers tested positive.

Africa’s confirmed cases of COVID-19 continued to climb to a new high of more than 371,000, including 9,484 deaths, according to figures released Sunday by the African Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Suspect in killing at Louisville protest in custody

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The suspect arrested in the shooting death of a man during a Louisville protest over the police killing of Breonna Taylor had taken part in demonstrations but was disruptive and had been asked by other protesters to leave, authorities and protesters said Sunday.

The man, identified by an arrest citation as Steven Nelson Lopez, was hospitalized and being interviewed by homicide investigators about the shooting that happened late Saturday, interim Louisville Police Chief Robert Schroeder said at a news conference.

Lopez was wounded in the leg by gunfire from bystanders at the park who were defending themselves, the arrest citation said. He has been charged with murder and wanton endangerment.

Tyler Charles Gerth, 27, of Louisville, died after being shot at Jefferson Square Park in downtown Louisville, authorities said.

Walmart facility gunman was a former employee

RED BLUFF, Calif. — A man who drove into a Walmart distribution center in Northern California and went on a shooting rampage that left him and another man dead, and four others wounded, was fired from his job at the center last year, authorities said.

Louis Wesley Lane, 31, was fired from the distribution center near Red Bluff in February 2019 after failing to show up for work, Tehama County Assistant Sheriff Phil Johnston told a news conference early Sunday.

Lebanon’s FM to summon US envoy over comments

BEIRUT — Lebanon’s foreign minister summoned the U.S. ambassador to Beirut over comments she made recently in which she criticized the militant Hezbollah group, state-run National News Agency reported Sunday.

In Hezbollah’s stronghold south of Beirut, some 500 protesters marched on foot and motorcycles through the streets chanting: “Oh America, you are the Great Satan.”

The agency gave no further details other than saying that the meeting between Foreign Minister Nassif Hitti and Ambassador Dorothy Shea is scheduled for Monday afternoon.

Trump denies briefing on reported bounties

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Sunday denied that he had been briefed on reported U.S. intelligence that a Russian military intelligence unit secretly offered bounties to Taliban-linked militants for killing American troops in Afghanistan, and he appeared to minimize the allegations against Moscow.

American intelligence officials concluded months ago that Russian officials offered rewards for successful attacks on American service-members last year, at a time when the U.S. and Taliban were holding talks to end the long-running war, according to The New York Times.

Trump, in a Sunday morning tweet, said “Nobody briefed or told me” or Vice President Mike Pence or chief of staff Mark Meadows about “the so-called attacks on our troops in Afghanistan by Russians.”

“Everybody is denying it & there have not been many attacks on us,” he said.

Trump tweets video with racist chant

President later deletes post

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Sunday tweeted approvingly of a video showing one of his supporters chanting “white power,” a racist slogan associated with white supremacists. He later deleted the tweet and the White House said the president had not heard “the one statement” on the video.

The video appeared to have been taken at The Villages, a Florida retirement community, and showed dueling demonstrations between Trump supporters and opponents.

“Thank you to the great people of The Villages,” Trump tweeted. Moments into the video clip he shared, a man driving a golf cart displaying pro-Trump signs and flags shouts “white power.” The video also shows

anti-Trump protesters shouting “Nazi,” “racist,” and profanities at the Trump backers.

“There’s no question” that Trump should not have retweeted the video and “he should just take it down,” Sen. Tim Scott, R-S.C., told CNN’s “State of the Union.” Scott is the only Black Republican in the Senate.

“I think it’s indefensible,” he added.

Shortly afterward, Trump deleted the tweet that shared the video. White House spokesman Judd Deere said in a statement that “President Trump is a big fan of The Villages. He did not hear the one statement made on the video. What he did see was tremendous enthusiasm from his many supporters.”

The White House did not respond when asked whether Trump

condemned the supporter’s comment.

Joe Biden, the presumptive Democratic presidential nominee, condemned Trump. “We’re in a battle for the soul of the nation — and the President has picked a side. But make no mistake: it’s a battle we will win,” the former vice president tweeted.

Trump’s decision to highlight a video featuring a racist slogan comes amid a national reckoning over race following the deaths of George Floyd and other Black Americans. Floyd, a Black Minneapolis man, died after a white police officer pressed his knee into his neck for several minutes.

Protests against police brutality and bias in law enforcement have occurred across the country following Floyd’s death. There also has been a push to remove Confederate monuments and to rename military bases that honor figures who fought in the Civil War against the Union. Trump has opposed these efforts.

Johnson collects Travelers crown

Career-long season streak is extended

CROMWELL, Conn. — Dustin Johnson won the Travelers Championship on Sunday to end a long drought and extend his career-long season victory streak to 13.

Johnson closed with a 3-under 67 for a one-stroke victory over Kevin Streelman at fan-free TPC River Highlands. Johnson last won in Mexico City in March 2019.

"I'm definitely proud of myself for continuing the streak and I want to keep it going," Johnson said. "It was a long time between wins, though, and, so, hopefully it won't be that long for the next one."

Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus each won in 17 consecutive years. Johnson failed to win in 2014, but is given credit for winning in the 2013-14 season from

his victory in the fall of 2013 in Shanghai. The tour changed to a wraparound season in 2013.

Johnson tapped in for par on the par-4 18th and raised his ball to acknowledge the smattering of applause from course workers, officials and reporters, the only in-person witnesses allowed because of the coronavirus pandemic.

He finished at 19-under 261 for his 21st PGA Tour title.

Streelman also shot 67. Streelman, who made seven straight birdies to win at TPC River Highlands in 2014, had a 37-foot birdie try on 18 that ended up just short and right.

He was two strokes behind Johnson on the 17th fairway when the weather horn blew for an hour-long storm delay.

Johnson came out of the delay and hit his tee shot on 16 into a greenside bunker. His second shot went well past the hole and made bogey to cut his lead to a stroke.

"I've had a few missed cuts, so to come back and finish a solo second is nice, but to be that close and perform and be right

there, I'm just a little disappointed right now," Streelman said.

Johnson was at 19 under when his tee shot on the par-4 15th went left and came inches from

Weekend full of racing

Denny Hamlin caps marathon day at Pocono Raceway with 4th victory of the season

LONG POND, Pa. — Round 2 at Pocono went to Denny Hamlin. Hamlin seized the spotlight, specifically in victory lane when Pocono had to set up lights after the race ended in the dark.

Hamlin topped Kevin Harvick on Sunday night to win the second Cup race of the weekend at Pocono Raceway and flip the result of the opener. The 1-2 finish out of each driver is a clear sign two of the best drivers in the game are poised again to make a championship push.

Hamlin says, bring it on. "We just want to get to the final four with a chance," Hamlin said.

Hamlin has four wins this season for Joe Gibbs Racing and Harvick has three for Stewart-Haas Racing as they start to separate themselves from the rest of the field.

Hamlin is racking up milestones as he chases his first NASCAR Cup championship. Hamlin has 41 victories to move to 19th on NASCAR's career list and his sixth win at Pocono matched Jeff Gordon for most at the 2 1/2-mile, tri-oval track.

"It's hard to believe because we went through such a dry spell there in the middle of my career," Hamlin said about his Pocono results.

Hamlin raced to his fourth victory of the season to cap a wild, marathon day of racing at the track, with three NASCAR races and nightfall in the finale. Pocono doesn't have lights — but the pit road numbers were lit up and glowed as Hamlin won for the second straight year at Pocono.

Hamlin had a late vibration in his No. 11 Toyota on Saturday that hindered his attempt to catch Harvick down the stretch. About 25 hours later, Hamlin surged past Harvick and built a nearly 3-second lead once the SHR driver got caught up in lapped traffic. "Our car was actually better today

than it was yesterday," Harvick said. "We had to run in a lot of traffic there and Denny kept ticking off laps."

The Daytona 500 champion's victory capped the first NASCAR triple-header at one track. The race was delayed by lightning and rain, as much a part of Pocono as a JGR driver taking

the checkered flag. Gibbs' roster has six of the last seven winners at Pocono.

"I hate to feel disappointed in a second and a first, but man, I felt like I should have won both races," Hamlin said.

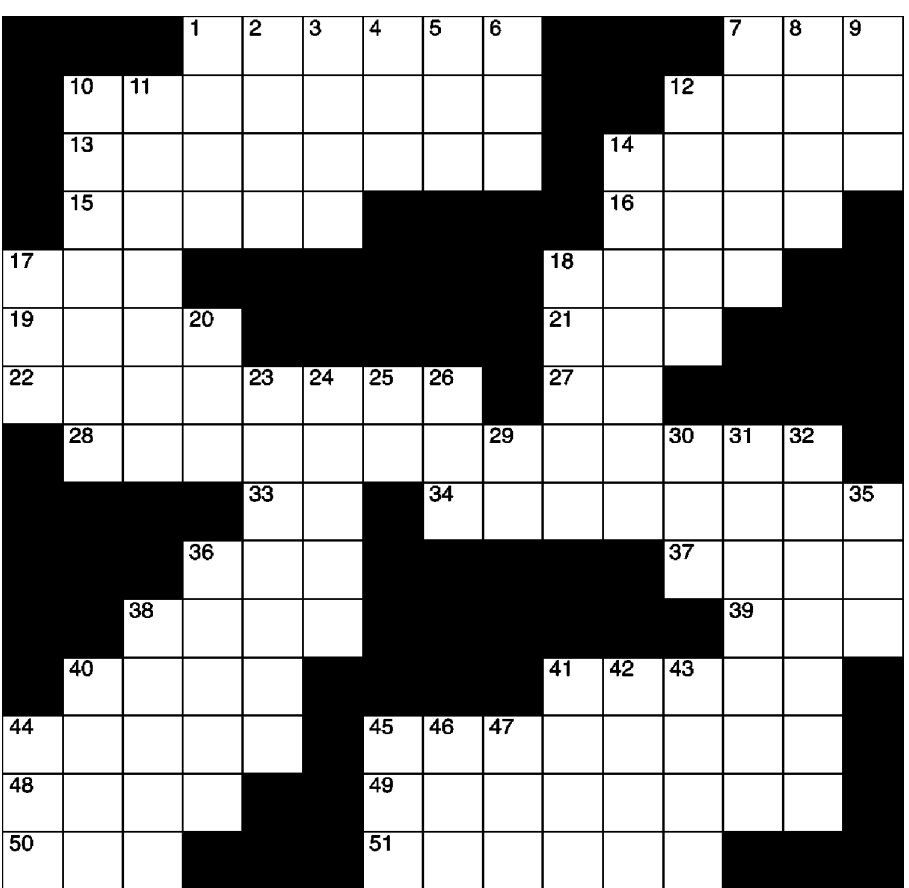

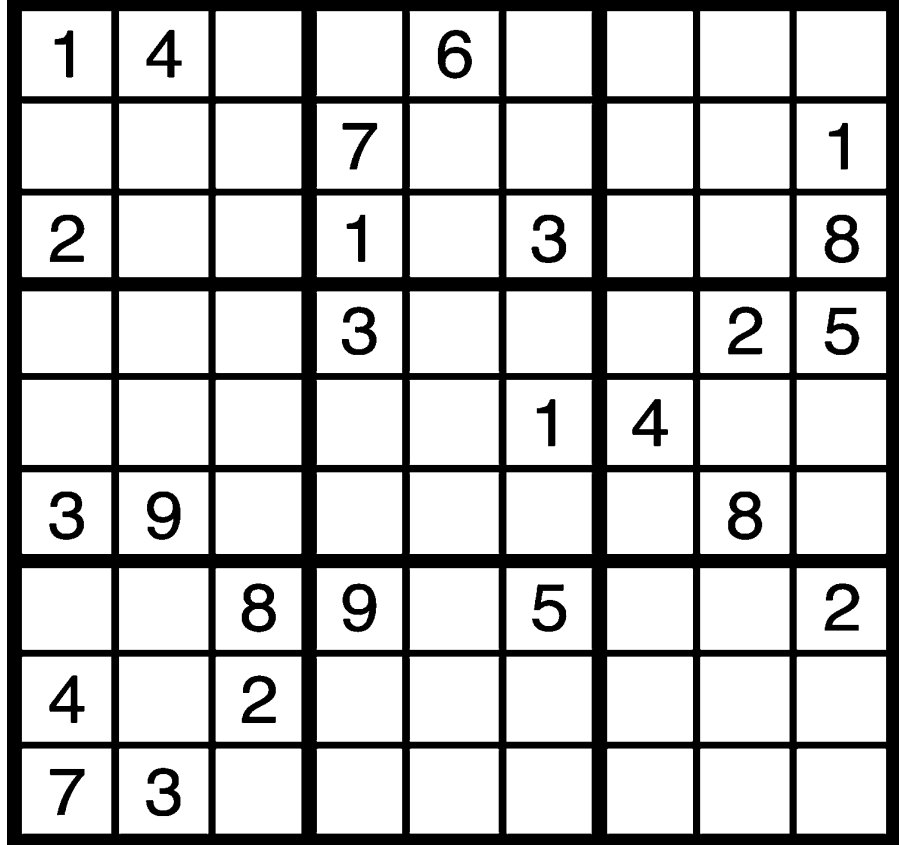

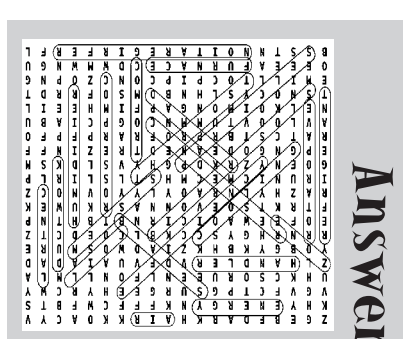

They ran six laps before the race was red-flagged nearly 51 minutes because of rain. NASCAR ran several pace laps before the race finally went green around 6:15 p.m. It was a race against darkness to complete the full 350 miles.

Harvick won Saturday's race and put the brakes on a burnout — he had to save that engine for another run in the same No. 4 Ford. The starting lineup was inverted for Sunday's race so Harvick started 20th.

Erik Jones was third, Chase Elliott fourth and Aric Almirola was fifth.

The rain wreaked havoc with the third NASCAR race of the day at Pocono. Brandon Jones opened the day with a win in the Truck Series race and Chase Briscoe won the Xfinity race. Pocono became the first track in NASCAR history to hold three national series races on the same day.

Harvick was a fan of the Cup doubleheader format.

"I think everybody would be super happy with a much shorter season and multiple double-headers," Harvick said.

NASCAR's hope to capitalize on being about the only major sport to run live every week with sports on pause in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic has been besieged by weather issues. Sunday marked the ninth race out of 15 this season with a weather delay and three have been moved a full day. It's hard to keep TV viewers interested when it's a parade of Air Titans instead of a mad dash to the checkered flag.

Pocono is notorious for rainy weekends and in 2016 had two Cup races and an IndyCar race all washed out and run on Monday. The "Need Help or Info?" signs around the track went unneeded as the only thing in the grandstands was rain.

"They are some of our more advanced prospects," Rays general manager Erik Neander said. "Certainly on the position player side that's where things went and why Wander was a leading candidate for a spot."

The Tigers are rebuilding around pitching prospects — including Casey Mize, the No. 1 pick in the 2018 draft. He's in their player pool, along with Matt Manning, Tarik Skubal, Alex Faedo and Franklin Perez.

A majority of teams took at least five catchers, and the defending champion Washington Nationals included a whopping 36 pitchers in their pool. The Baltimore Orioles announced only 44 players total at this time — not counting outfielder Trey Mancini, who was listed on the 45-day injured list and is likely to miss the season following colon cancer surgery in March. The Nationals included infielder Ryan Zimmerman in their pool,

although he said recently he was still deciding whether he would play.

The New York Yankees listed Miguel Andujar and Tyler Wade as infielders/outfielders, a sign they could see more outfield time if Aaron Judge (broken rib), Giancarlo Stanton (strained right calf) and Aaron Hicks (Tommy John surgery) aren't sufficiently healed. New York put right-hander Luis Severino (Tommy John surgery) on the 45-day IL, agreed to minor league contracts with infielder Matt Duffy and catcher Max McDowell and released right-hander Dan Otero, then re-signed him to a minor league contract.

The Pittsburgh Pirates' player pool was without reliever Edgar Santana, who will miss all of the 2020 season after being suspended 80 games for violating Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program. MLB announced Sunday that Santana tested positive for a performance-enhancing substance. The Pirates did not include right-hander Quinn Priester or shortstop Nick

Gonzales, their top draft picks from 2019 and 2020.

"There was a number of players, aside from Quinn and Nick, who we considered, and we just felt like that we remain hopeful that there will be an opportunity to get them in uniform at a facility in 2020 and if we can do that, that would be just a more productive way for them to continue their development," general manager Ben Cherington said. "In Quinn's case, and really I would say that Quinn and a number of younger pitchers who haven't yet been at the full-season level, we just felt like this wasn't quite the time to include them in this group."

Right-hander Ubaldo Jimenez, who was attempting a comeback with Colorado during spring training before the virus halted play, was not included in the Rockies' player pool.

Seattle outfielder Mitch Haniger (back) was put on the 45-day injured list. He's not in the 60-player pool, but the Mariners can add him later.

Under the State Housing Initiatives Partnership Program (SHIP) Citrus County Board of County Commissioners announces the following housing programs and availability of funding.
2020-2021 SHIP ALLOCATION \$350,000

HOME REHABILITATION AND EMERGENCY REPAIRS FOR VERY LOW AND LOW INCOME FAMILIES

Repairs that remove conditions that are an imminent threat to the health and safety of the residents. Eligible repairs include re-roofs, electrical repairs, plumbing repairs, heating/cooling replacement or repair, etc. This program can't remodel units but instead repairs existing hazardous living conditions. Funds will be available for households making up to 80% of area median income. Site built homes, as well as mobile homes constructed after June 1994 provided the home is classified as Real Property, are eligible for assistance.

RENTAL HOUSING CONSTRUCTION OR REHABILITATION STRATEGY

This strategy will provide funding for the purchase of new construction housing, the purchase of existing housing and the rehabilitation of, or additions to, existing housing that is group home housing. Priority goes to **Special Needs** housing groups as noted in Section 420.0004, Florida Statutes, including, adult persons with a disabling condition, young adults formerly in foster care, survivors of domestic violence, and applicants receiving SSI or a disability benefit. Provided the Special Needs Strategy is met, this strategy will broaden to include group home and transitional housing for veterans, homeless, runaway youth and youth aging out of foster care. This strategy funds non-homeownership housing initiatives. This strategy is not restricted to geographical location, but must be located within Citrus County. This strategy is NOT funded and will be available at such time funding is allocated.

MANDATORY UTILITY CONNECTIONS STRATEGY

This program will only be used to pay permit, impact, and other fees necessary to connect eligible owner occupied/homesteaded residences to regional central water and/or sewer service, including the cost of installing water and sewer service lines from the residence to the water or sewer main. These funds cannot be used just for general construction of lines. Priority will be given to hookups that are being completed in conjunction with other state or federal funding sources. The purpose of this program is two-fold: to avert or reduce any adverse effect on the affordability of existing homes to which water and sewer service is being extended as well as to provide a source of leveraging for other state and federal funding sources for expansion of water and sewer service. (County ordinances require water and sewer hookups when available.) Funds will be available for households making up to 80% of area median income.

NOT-FOR -PROFIT DEVELOPER STRATEGY

Will assist with the construction or rehabilitation of homes sold by non-profit developers. This strategy will provide a subsidy to eligible sponsors, as established by resolution, to pay development costs including fees charged by government entities in conjunction with residential construction (impact fees, building permits, utility fees, etc), wells, septic and site preparation. Any funds not used for the payment of development costs may be used to offset cost of construction or rehabilitation of an acquired eligible housing unit. Sponsors eligible will be those 501(c)(3) agencies that build or repair affordable homes.

RENTAL DEVELOPMENTS STRATEGY

Local Government Contribution Funds will be made available to developers of affordable housing rental units (Very Low and Low Income) for the multi-family, elderly or disabled that are applying for funds through the Florida Housing Finance Corporation. This strategy is NOT funded and will be available at such time funding is allocated.

DISASTER STRATEGY

To provide emergency repairs to households making up to 80% of area median income in the aftermath of an Executive Order declared natural disaster to address emergency housing repair needs. Such needs may include tree and debris removal required to make individual units habitable, interim repairs to avoid further damage, and post-disaster assistance with non-insured repairs. Site built homes, as well as mobile homes constructed after June 1994 provided the home is classified as Real Property, are eligible for assistance. Funds may also be used for rental assistance for renter households that have experienced a temporary financial hardship that have been directly affected by the declared disaster that results in missed rental payments and in danger of being evicted. Funds will be available for households making up to 80% of area median income.

I found her grave today. It was a sad day. Why does this bother me so much? The cemetery had her obituary. In it, I found enough information about her life after me, including information on her two daughters. Should I contact them and get filled in on her life? — Heartbroken

Dear Heartbroken: I am so sorry for your loss. It's understandable that you are still upset about her death.

While time is known to heal wounds, it does not mean we forget about people who were important to us growing up.

Just because you both went on to love other people does not mean you didn't stop caring about each other as friends.

The fact that she looked you up all those years later and knew where you worked shows that.

I can imagine being a drug addict and being married to one is a very lonely life. She probably remembered you from before her life was filled with addiction and wanted to say goodbye.

Although it is so sad you weren't able to, you could connect to her through her daughters.

There is nothing wrong with reaching out to them, sharing memories of how great their mother was and learning about her life. Bridge PHILLIP ALDER Newspaper Enterprise Assn. The "Peanuts" cartoon bridge deals continue to appear. This time, Snoopy, playing with Woodstock and two of his friends, was the declarer in three no-trump. What should he have done after West led the spade four? In the bidding, Snoopy (South) might have opened one diamond because his hand was worth more than its face value of 17 points. The five-card suit and the 7 ace-king

Bridge points (2 for each ace and 1 for the king) add extra value. The Kaplan-Rubens evaluation method (which gets most players' votes for the most accurate) rates this hand at 18.35 points. Then, though, North would have had a close call. K-R makes his hand worth 8.8 points only, so he should respond one no-trump. Then South would jump to three no-trump. Probably East would lead the heart jack, giving North an easy time. He would play low from the board (South) and take two spades, two hearts and five diamonds. When Snoopy opened one no-trump, North judged well to invite game, and South had a clear-cut raise. The reader did not learn how Snoopy played until the next day. The game was interrupted because Snoopy had to try to shoot down the Red Baron. When Snoopy returned to the aerodrome, he reported to his captain and asked him what he should have done. When Snoopy got back to the game, he admitted that the captain said he should have led a low heart to the queen. The truth was out. Snoopy incorrectly played on clubs, but the defenders got their spades established and took three spades and two clubs to defeat the contract.
