Citrus County COVID update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 28 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Two new hospitalizations were reported; three deaths were reported.

To date in the county, 3,856 people have tested positive (including 19 non-residents), 368 have been hospitalized and 146 have died.

Schlabach: 'I'm going to listen to the citizens'

Tuesday cannot come fast enough for Ruthie Davis Schlachach.

The 56-year-old Black Diamond resident is itching for the ceremonial swearing-in and taking her seat as a Citrus County commissioner.

After losing in 2018 to now fellow Commissioner Ron Kitchen Jr. and winning a crowded primary in August, Schlachach has met with county department directors and was pouring over Tuesday's agenda on Friday.

"I'm a reader," she said. "I take notes."

Though a newcomer, Schlachach said she comes into office with eyes wide open. She said, for example, that while Commissioner Scott Carnahan and Kitchen share seniority with six years each on the board, Schlachach won't be intimidated by their longevity.

"They voters have been very clear what they want," she said, noting along with her win, Holly Davis defeated incumbent Jimmie T. Smith, and incumbent Jeff Kinnard was re-elected without opposition. "The citizens are ready for a new chapter in Citrus County. Historical knowledge is important, but I'm going to listen to the citizens of Citrus County."

She added: "They want a new guard. We don't need leadership that's all egos and

personal agendas."

Her No. 1 project? Finding a permanent home and direction for the Citrus County Animal Shelter.

Schlabach said she fully supports Kinnard's plan on Tuesday's agenda to ask for conceptual approval to place the animal shelter and LifeStream Behavioral Center's mental health treatment campus near the county jail and state juvenile prison.

She said the county could help develop programs that aid inmates, teenage prisoners, mental-health patients and pets that need training and adoption.

"It's my responsibility to take care of vulnerable people and vulnerable animals," she said. "This is something we have to do. How long have we been talking about the animal shelter?"

After visiting with county staffers, Schlachach said she is eager to get

to work.

"We are really lucky with who we have," she said. "It makes me want to be even stronger for them."

Schlabach's interest in local politics began around 2017 when she and her husband, Jarey, owners of Schlachach Security and Sound Inc., were embroiled in a code case with the county over a fence they installed to block their parking lot from an adjoining one.

In 2018, the county commission voted to drop the case with two of Schlachach's new fellow commissioners playing a role.

Commissioner Scott Carnahan, set to become chairman Tuesday, made the motion to dismiss the code case. Kitchen was the lone no vote.

The experience had a lasting effect.

"The Lord put us in that place," she said, "so I would be pushed to run for office."

Tragedy takes mother from son

Family, friends pull together to help pay for services, care

Wednesday, Nov. 4, 2020, was a typical Wednesday for 25-year-old Ashley Constantino.

After she finished her work day as a medical assistant, she picked up her 5-year-old son, Nemo, buckled him into his car seat and set off for the weekly Wednesday night church service at NOW Church in Ocala.

At the intersection of County Road 491 and State Road 200, she turned left onto S.R. 200 and into the path of an SUV traveling southbound.

That's when typical turned tragic.

As the SUV, driven by a

25-year-old man from Inverness, collided with the left side of Ashley's sedan.

She later died from her injuries at an area hospital.

Nemo was also critically injured, although he is now home with his grandfather, Victor Constantino, in a full leg cast for six weeks.

"He's a great kid," Constantino said. "He has autism, but he's high-functioning. I also have a 6-year-old daughter, and the two of them are close, so now my wife and I have the two to take care of."

Nemo also has a severe wheat allergy and a dairy intolerance, but what he can eat, he loves to eat.

"He's a foodie, just like his mom," Constantino said.

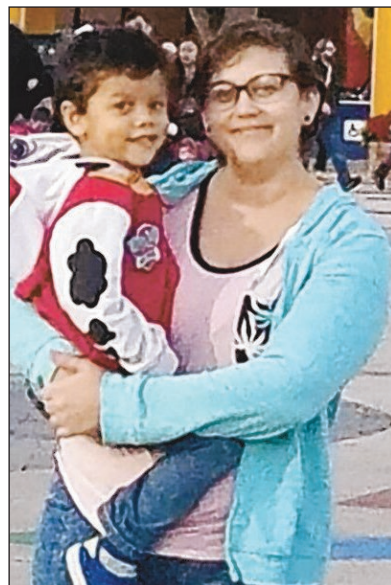
Constantino said they are still in shock at the loss of his daughter.

"She had a huge heart, doing for others before herself," he said. "That's why she was a medical assistant. She liked helping people."

Ashley grew up in Galloway, New Jersey, and moved to Dunnellon to be with her dad about six years ago.

After she had Nemo, whose given name is Nehemiah, the two lived with Constantino for about two years while Ashley worked toward being able to support herself and her son on her own.

Judge gives more time in benefits case

Rejecting arguments by the state and Deloitte Consulting LLP, a circuit judge has given more time to plaintiffs to file a revised class-action lawsuit stemming from problems in Florida's unemployment-compensation system.

Leon County Circuit Judge John Cooper issued an order this week that gives plaintiffs' attorneys until Monday to file an amended complaint. But Cooper also issued a warning to the plaintiffs' attorneys, writing that if they "fail to amend the complaint within the time set by this order,

the case will be dismissed with prejudice without further notice or hearing. The plaintiffs should not assume this court will grant another extension."

Cooper on Sept. 30 dismissed the lawsuit, which was filed on behalf of people who had trouble obtaining unemployment benefits amid the coronavirus pandemic. But Cooper gave plaintiffs' attorneys 30 days to file an amended complaint, which would refuel the legal fight.

At the deadline, the plaintiffs' attorneys requested a two-week extension to file an amended complaint, pointing in part to needing "additional time to

research certain issues raised by the defendants."

But in documents filed last week, attorneys for the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity and Deloitte argued that Cooper should reject an extension, effectively scuttling the case. The state cited a June 22 hearing that went into detail about issues in the lawsuit.

"The bare assertion by plaintiffs' counsel of a need for two additional weeks of research time — beyond the 30 days provided by the court's order and the four months since the June 22 hearing — provides an insufficient basis for disregarding the court's clear

directive to file a timely ... amended complaint or face dismissal of the case with prejudice," department attorneys wrote.

The plaintiffs filed the lawsuit in April after hundreds of thousands of coronavirus-caused unemployment claims overwhelmed the state's online CONNECT system.

The Department of Economic Opportunity runs the unemployment system, while Deloitte was a contractor that helped put CONNECT in place in 2013. The lawsuit made a series of allegations, including negligence and breach of fiduciary duty.

Resurfacing leads to fresh, new lane for bikes, pedestrians in Citrus Springs

Construction was recently completed for the County resurfacing project on Citrus Springs Boulevard from U.S. 41 to Withlacoochee Trail (C39), 1.4 miles.

The project was jointly funded by Citrus County and Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT)

Small County Outreach Program (SCOP). The bid amount for the project was \$970,546 and the project was completed on time and within the allocated budget.

As part of the resurfacing on Citrus Springs Boulevard, the county decided it was time for a diet, a lane diet. The Citrus Springs Boulevard

roadway lanes were 18 feet wide, too narrow for two lanes and too wide for one lane.

The travel lane stripe was moved in to create a standard 11-foot-wide vehicle lane, which provided space for a 7-foot-wide bike/pedestrian lane. The new bike/pedestrian lane provides an extension to the existing bike/

pedestrian facilities on Citrus Springs Boulevard west of U.S. 41.

"My friends and I ride this road regularly to get from the north trailhead on the Withlacoochee State Trail to the Dunnellon Trail. This new bike lane allows riders to avoid the dangerous part of U.S. 41," said cyclist Bob Feldberg. "We were delighted

at the wonderful paving job the county has done and the nice, wide bike lane makes it a pleasure to ride."

The county has previously implemented lane diets and created bike/pedestrian lanes in other areas of the county, such as improvements on Roosevelt and Beverly Hills boulevards.

Blogger's hiring as COVID data analyst draws rebuke

Florida has about 425,000 state employees, so it's not every day that an entry-level, \$40,000-a-year hire draws statewide media attention and scorn.

If that newly hired COVID-19 data analyst in the Florida Office of Policy and Budget (OPB) is a "sports guy" moonlighting as a COVID-19 analyst" with no knowledge of immunology but an exhaustive history of spreading conspiracy theories and dismissing science, however, then observers notice.

Kyle Lamb, 40, a sports blogger, podcaster and Uber driver from Columbus, Ohio, has been hired by the OPB, an agency within the governor's office, but has not as started his position in Tallahassee.

Among his Twitter and sports

message board posts, Lamb repeatedly has posted claims that defy scientific evidence, such as masks don't prevent COVID-19 from spreading, hydroxychloroquine can treat the virus, COVID-19 is less dangerous than the flu and isn't dangerous for children, United Nations troops were occupying a local county fairgrounds in March and the pandemic is a "biowar" being waged by China.

On a website for a podcast he hosts, Lamb wrote, "Fact is, I'm not an 'expert.' I'm not a doctor, epidemiologist, virologist or scientist. I also don't need to be. Experts don't have all the answers, and we've learned that the hard way."

Peppered throughout his social media posts is effusive praise for Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis' pandemic policies, such as his refusal to issue a statewide mask mandate, which drew notice on

Fox News in July.

Lamb tweeted Nov. 6 that he'd "officially accepted an offer to go work for Gov. Ron DeSantis ... doing data analysis on several fronts for them including but not limited to COVID-19 research and other projects. I have no qualms about being a 'sports guy' moonlighting as a COVID-19 analyst."

Word of Lamb's hiring filtered through Ohio before it matriculated south, with one well-known epidemiologist issuing a warning to Floridians.

"Oh, lord. Sorry, Florida," Kent State University College of Public Health epidemiologist Dr. Tara C. Smith tweeted. "Ohioans may have seen Kyle Lamb's COVID conspiracy posts shared on social media — now he's apparently gotten a job in the Sunshine State."

Florida Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried, a prospective 2022 Democratic gubernatorial

candidate, said in a statement Lamb is actually the perfect hire for an administration attempting to obscure its failure in addressing the pandemic.

"Cases are skyrocketing, and the governor continues undermining science," Fried said. "Now he wants to hire a fringe sports blogger with no experience in epidemiology or data analysis just because he shares the governor's negligent, misguided opinions?"

Ten of Florida's 13 congressional Democrats in a letter to DeSantis demanded Thursday he un-hire Lamb.

"Given that Lamb is an unqualified conspiracy theorist, his role as a member of your COVID-19 response staff is inexplicable and grossly irresponsible, we call on you to immediately remove Lamb from this critical role," the letter reads.

Rudolph, Santa figures soar to sell for \$368,000

LOS ANGELES — And how the bidders loved him!

A buyer shouted out with glee that they would pay \$368,000 for the Rudolph and Santa Claus figures used in the perennially beloved Christmas special “Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer.”

Bidding for the figures soared past the projected sale price of between \$150,000 and \$200,000 on Friday at the Icons & Legends of Hollywood Auction held in Los Angeles by Profiles in History.

The buyer was not identified. The seller was **Peter Lutrario**, 65, of New York, who told The Associated Press before the auction that he thought he would never part with the dolls but wanted to be able to take care of his children and grandchildren with the money.

The figures were among several used to make the 1964 stop-motion animation television special.

The 6-inch-tall Rudolph and 11-inch-tall Santa were made in Tokyo of wood, wire, cloth and leather, and are still malleable. Rudolph's nose still lights up. Santa's beard is made from yak hair.

Soumitra Chatterjee, legend of Indian cinema, dies at 85

NEW DELHI — **Soumitra Chatterjee**, the legendary Indian actor with more than 200 movies to his name and famed for his work with Oscar-winning director **Satyajit Ray**, died Sunday of complications from the coronavirus. He was 85.

Chatterjee's daughter,

Poulami Bose, said her father died at a hospital in the city of Kolkata in West Bengal state where he had been staying since testing positive for the virus in early October. He is also survived by his wife and a son.

Chatterjee had a career in Bengali-language films that spanned six decades and was best known for his work with Ray, one of the world's most influential Indian directors, whose films garnered critical acclaim and won multiple awards worldwide, putting India on the global cinema map.

Chatterjee's films with Ray that won global recognition include “Apur Sansar” (“The World of Apu”), the third in the director's internationally recognized

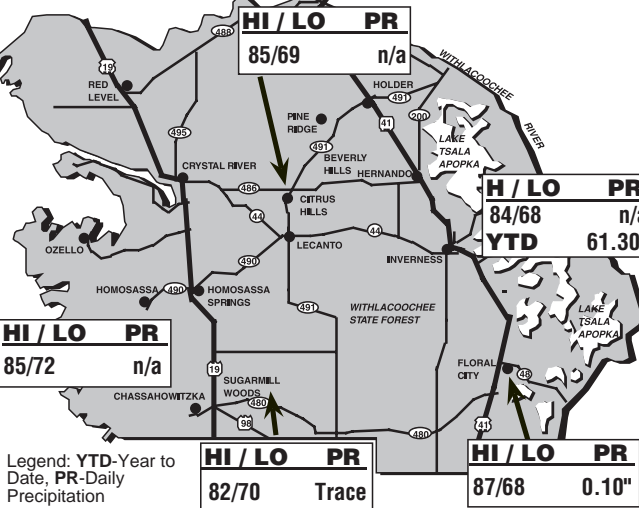
Apu Trilogy, “Charulata” (“The Lonely Wife”), “Aranyer Din Ratri” (“Days and Nights in the Forest”), “Ghare Baire” (“The Home and the World”) and “Ganashatru” (“Enemy of the People”).

Telegraph India, an English-language newspaper published in Kolkata, wrote in its obituary for Chatterjee that he had a 14-title body of work with director Ray “that would have ensured him immortality even if he hadn't done anything else in life.”

Despite his immense popularity in Bengali-language cinema, Chatterjee stayed away from Bollywood. But for 90 million Bengalis, he was a cultural icon and an unforgettable star.

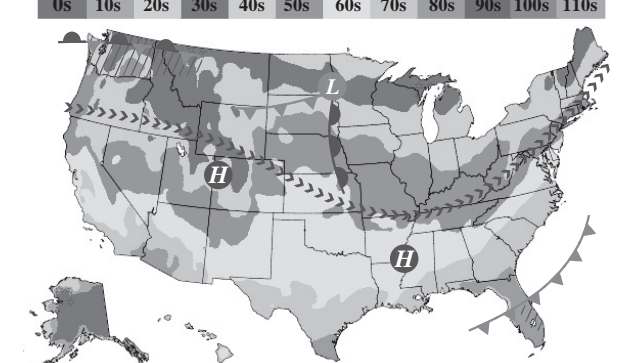

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New Florida Legislature leaders brace themselves

Dealing with pandemic, budget woes, silent on special session

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis resisted repeated calls during the spring and summer for a legislative special session to address an array of pandemic-induced issues.

In late-September, however, the governor himself suggested newly elected House and Senate Republican leaders call a special session during mid-November organizational meetings to adopt his proposed "Combating Violence, Disorder and Looting and Law Enforcement Protection Act," which aims to crack down on violent protests.

"It may be something where you need to act," DeSantis said on Sept. 23.

As of last Monday, however, House Speaker-Elect Chris Sprowls, R-Palm Harbor, and Senate President-Designate Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, have not expressed interest in calling a special session before the 60-day 2021 legislative session begins March 2.

After flipping five House seats last week, Republicans head into the 2021 session with a 78-42 chamber advantage and with at least the same 23-17 Senate majority; one race is in a runoff.

Under Florida law, a special session may be called by the governor or by joint proclamation issued by the senate president and house speaker. Lawmakers can appeal for a special session in a three-fifths vote of each chamber.

No such action appears on

the horizon. As scheduled, the Senate and House will hold organizational sessions Nov. 17, formally swearing in newly-elected members and officers, including Sprowls and Simpson.

Neither new leader has posted variations from the scheduled "Legislator University" in December and committee weeks beginning in January.

Sprowls did, however, announce the creation of the Pandemics & Public Emergencies Committee (PPEC), a 12-member panel to coordinate the state's pandemic response.

House PPEC Chair Tom Leek, R-Ormond Beach, and Senate PPEC Chair Sen. Kathleen Passidomo, R-Naples, said during a Florida Chamber of Commerce conference last week that adopting COVID-19 liability protections would be a 2021 priority.

After some legislators and business groups unsuccessfully asked for a special session to adopt COVID-19 liability legislation, Leek and Passidomo urged patience, stating such a complicated bill requires full vetting to ensure it can withstand legal challenges.

Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith, D-Orlando, congratulated Sprowls for creating the panel.

"Eight months into a deadly pandemic that killed 16,961 Floridians, shuttered 1 in 5 small businesses and pushed millions into poverty, the GOP Florida House finally forms a committee to begin dealing with it ... in January," Smith tweeted.

DeSantis unilaterally cut \$1

billion from the \$92.2 billion fiscal year 2021 budget adopted by lawmakers in March two days before it went into effect on July 1.

Democrats and some Republicans argued only lawmakers could make such a cut, citing the state constitution, which mandates any "deficit in the General Revenue Fund in excess of 1.5 percent ... must be resolved by the Legislature."

In addition, some maintain, the Legislature, not the governor, is responsible for allocating

what remains of the \$12 billion in CARES Act money the state received in March.

DeSantis insists his emergency powers — Florida remains in a state of emergency — allowed him to unilaterally amend the budget and allocate federal assistance monies.

The governor wants to add \$4.6 billion in CARES money — if permissible — to \$8.5 billion in state reserves to ensure it weathers any storms.

"From a budget perspective, we'll probably be OK this fiscal

year," DeSantis said.

That prudence gives lawmakers a chance to brace for the challenge ahead, Rep. Jay Trumbull, R-Panama City, new House Appropriations Committee chair, told the Bay County Chamber of Commerce Friday.

The Legislature is looking at a \$2 billion revenue shortfall next year, he said, meaning tough choices loom.

"Because we have a balanced budget," Trumbull warned, "we can't spend more than we take in."

Astronauts board SpaceX rocket for night launch, no Musk

CAPE CANAVERAL — SpaceX launched four astronauts to the International Space Station on Sunday on the first full-fledged taxi flight for NASA by a private company.

The Falcon rocket thundered into the night from Kennedy Space Center with three Americans and one Japanese, the second crew to be launched by SpaceX. The Dragon capsule on top — named Resilience by its crew in light of this year's many challenges, most notably COVID-19 — was due to reach the space station late Monday and remain there until spring.

Sidelined by the virus himself, SpaceX founder and chief executive Elon Musk was forced

to monitor the action from afar. He tweeted that he "most likely" had a moderate case of COVID-19. NASA policy at Kennedy Space Center requires anyone testing positive for coronavirus to quarantine and remain isolated.

Sunday's launch follows by just a few months SpaceX's two-pilot test flight. It kicks off what NASA hopes will be a long series of crew rotations between the U.S. and the space station, after years of delay. More people means more science research at the orbiting lab, according to officials.

"This is another historic moment," NASA Administrator Jim Bridenstine said Friday. But he noted: "Make no mistake: Vigilance is always required on every flight."

The flight to the space station — 27 1/2 hours door to door — should be entirely automated, although the crew can take control if needed.

With COVID-19 still surging, NASA continued the safety precautions put in place for SpaceX's crew launch in May. The astronauts went into quarantine with their families in October. All launch personnel wore masks, and the number of guests at Kennedy was limited. Even the two astronauts on the first SpaceX crew flight stayed behind at Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Vice President Mike Pence, chairman of the National Space Council, traveled from Washington to watch the launch.

Outside the space center gates, officials anticipated

hundreds of thousands of spectators to jam nearby beaches and towns.

NASA worried a weekend lift-off — coupled with a dramatic nighttime launch — could lead to a superspreader event. They urged the crowds to wear masks and maintain safe distances. Similar pleas for SpaceX's first crew launch on May 30 went unheeded.

The three-men, one-woman crew led by Commander Mike Hopkins, an Air Force colonel, named their capsule Resilience in a nod not only to the pandemic, but also racial injustice and contentious politics.

It's about as diverse as space crews come, including physicist Shannon Walker, Navy Cmdr. Victor Glover, the first Black astronaut on a long-term space

station mission, and Japan's Soichi Noguchi, who became the first person in almost 40 years to launch on three types of spacecraft.

They rode out to the launch pad in Teslas — another Musk company — after exchanging high-fives and hand embraces with their children and spouses, who huddled at the open car windows. Musk was replaced by SpaceX President Gwynne Shotwell in bidding the astronauts farewell.

Besides its sleek design and high-tech features, the Dragon capsule is quite spacious — it can carry up to seven people. Previous space capsules have launched with no more than three. The extra room in the capsule was used for science experiments and supplies.

Use United Way to assist with CARES funds

We have all been asked to do difficult things during the current coronavirus pandemic that is rampaging through our country. Local governments in Florida have been placed in an unenviable position of distributing financial assistance to businesses and nonprofits that have suffered from state ordered closings.

The position is difficult because in our case, the Citrus County Commission has no experience in such endeavors and the guidelines for distribution of the funds are constantly shifting.

Large counties in Florida received direct distribution of CARES Act funds from the federal government. The smaller counties — such as Citrus — saw the federal funds flow to state government where a new batch of bureaucratic and political requirements were layered on by Tallahassee.

Millions of dollars have flowed to the county commission for distribution to local businesses, but the stipulations keep changing as locals try to comply with state rules. For some artificial reasons, the state has ordered the small counties to move quickly with their distribution of funds or lose the availability of the dollars.

The artificial deadlines create an unnecessary urgency to distribute dollars combined with a threat if they do things incorrectly the county might be responsible for returning the funds. That almost takes all the fun out of giving away federal assistance.

In Citrus County, one

nonprofit agency that could help the county overcome the barriers is the United Way. The highly respected nonprofit has spent more than 30 years refining the process of determining where need exists. The county has been forced to create its own process for determining what that need might be, and as is inevitable in any quickly established system — there have been problems.

Leaders from United Way plan on attending the next meeting of the commission to ask for a chunk of CARES Act funds so they can immediately redistribute it to those in needs. It is natural for those in need to look to United Way to play a leadership role when a crisis strikes.

The county, especially the two new commissioners who will be joining the board at this meeting, need to look closely at the opportunity to make use of this existing part of our social infrastructure. United Way has a history of being transparent in how it collects and spends all of its money. The county can easily review all of the spending that could take place.

We appreciate the county's desire to be careful with the distribution of the CARE funds, but we also know that thousands of individuals and scores of businesses are still in desperate need of help. United Way could be a trusted avenue

It would be a shame if Citrus had to return millions of dollars in CARES funding because the bureaucracy got in the way of common sense.

Be wary of herd immunity

I try to never render an opinion unless I know that it is backed up with evidence. Mr. Rutemiller's Oct. 30 letter "COVID death rate misstated" both confuse and concerned me.

His first five paragraphs are hard to follow, but he finally says the death rate is 1%. I think Mr. Rutemiller is trying to represent selected periods of time. The official World Health Organization death rate is 3.44%.

This rate is derived by dividing deaths by positive tested population. For example: As of mid-November, the total positive tested U.S. population is about 10,000,000 with 300,000 deaths, including unrecorded deaths estimates.

To calculate the death rate percentage gives you 3%. Going forward, we should be able to reduce the death rate because of better medical care and those of greatest risk have sheltered. So, let us use 2.5%.

Mr. Rutemiller's assumed goal is to advance herd immunity as a public policy. It is estimated that 70% of the population needs to be infected to get herd immunity. So, let's calculate the resulting deaths. U.S. population: 330,000,000 x 70% 231,000,000 x 2.5% 5,775,000 deaths to reach herd immunity. Hopefully, the development and distribution of a vaccine will reduce the death numbers. Still, the possibility of nearly 6 million deaths is daunting.

In paragraph five, Mr. Rutemiller states that economic recovered was quickest in states that did not close down. I believe this is based on a "The Sentinel" Kansas October article.

It looked at seven rural upper midwest states using one week of data. Of course, this was before the COVID wave swept over these states. Now they all are in the deep red zone. If you want a real study, look up "Kansas mask study." Some counties mandated masks and some did not. The mask-mandated counties had fewer infections.

In the last paragraph, Mr. Rutemiller introduces Darwin's Natural Selection, which is change over time that improves a species biological reproductive success. Unfortunately, in the short run, viruses mutate too fast for human natural selection to be useful.

Survival of the fittest, a term actually developed by Herbert Spencer, is more associated with Social Darwinism which morphed into eugenics. Some have used eugenics as a justification for promoting racial superiority. I would be very cautious using herd immunity to cull the herd of the less fit.

Republicans sought to stop Philadelphia officials from counting absentee ballots. Their argument: GOP observers had been barred from the rooms where the votes were being counted. The problem: That wasn't true.

A postal worker in Pennsylvania has recanted claims that a supervisor tampered with mail-in ballots for last week's election

Republicans have alleged that there was impropriety in state ballot counts. They lost in court every time. And for the same reason: Republicans could not provide evidence of wrongdoing

They asked a judge to delay certifying Detroit's results. The judge said no. He said the GOP's evidence of misconduct was "mere speculation."

A Republican election observer said she'd been given a sticky note by an unnamed poll worker, alleging that late-arriving ballots were being counted improperly. But she couldn't provide the poll worker's name or any other proof.

A judge rejected that, saying that the GOP's evidence was inadmissible as hearsay

Trump allies claimed that thousands of people had voted illegally in Clark County, home to Las Vegas.

Instead of 10,000 cases, Trump's allies presented one: a woman named Jill Stokke, who said she was denied the right to vote in person because her mail ballot had been stolen and filled out by someone else. Election officials said they had indeed received a mail ballot from her, but the signature matched her own.

Trump campaign officials claimed that as many as 9,000 nonresidents wrongly voted and that the Clark County, Nevada, elections system was riddled with other fraud, without offering credible evidence.

Local election officials have stressed that Nevada law allows some people to vote while living out of state: students, military personnel and military spouses.

A Georgia judge dismissed Trump's suit in one day, writing that there was "no evidence" the county elections board had failed to comply with the law.

There were even International Observers. "No 2020 election fraud in U.S. presidential vote" was the International Observers report

Why is this refusal to face facts so dangerous?

The Republican city commissioner in Philadelphia whose office is responsible for counting votes in the city, said his staff has been receiving death threats since the count began there last week.

Peru's interim president resigns as chaos erupts

LIMA, Peru — Peru's interim president resigned Sunday as the nation plunged into its worst constitutional crisis in two decades following massive protests unleashed when Congress ousted the nation's popular leader.

In a short televised address, Manuel Merino said Congress acted within the law when he was sworn into office as chief of state Tuesday, despite protesters' allegations that legislators had staged a parliamentary coup.

The politician agreed to step down after night of unrest in which two young protesters were killed and half his Cabinet resigned. Peruvians cheered the decision, waving their nation's red and white flag on the streets of Lima and chanting "We did it!" But there is still no clear playbook for what comes next.

Congress scheduled an emergency session for Sunday afternoon to select a new president. Meanwhile, ex-President

Martín Vizcarra — whose ouster sparked the upheaval— called on the country's highest court to step in.

"It can't be that the institution that got us into this political crisis, that has for five days paralyzed Peru, with deaths, is going to give us a solution, choosing the person who they best see fit," Vizcarra said.

Peru has much at stake: The country is in the throes of one of the world's most lethal coronavirus outbreaks and political analysts say the constitutional crisis has cast the country's democracy into jeopardy.

"I think this is the most serious democratic and human rights crisis we have seen since Fujimori," said analyst Alonso Gurmendi Dunkelberg, referring to the turbulent rule of strongman Alberto Fujimori from 1990 to 2000.

Congress kicked Vizcarra out using a clause dating back to the 19th century that allows the powerful legislature to remove a president for "permanent moral incapacity."

Acknowledging, not conceding

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump on Sunday appeared to acknowledge for the first time that Joe Biden won the White House, but made clear he would not concede and would keep trying to overturn the election result. Trump's statements came in tweets that included several baseless claims about the Nov. 3 vote, which state and federal officials say was safe and secure.

Trump, without using Biden's

name, tweeted that "He won," something Trump had not said before publicly, though he said the Democrat's victory was only "in the eyes" of the media.

Biden defeated Trump by winning back a trio of battleground states that switched from the Democratic column in 2016 — Michigan, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania — and topped the 270 electoral vote threshold to clinch the presidency. Biden so far has 78.8 million votes, the most ever by a winning candidate, to Trump's total — more than 73 million.

"If the president's prepared to begin to recognize that reality, that's positive," Biden's incoming chief of staff, Ron Klain told NBC's "Meet the Press." Still, Klain said, "Donald Trump's Twitter feed doesn't make Joe Biden president or not president. The American people did that."

A Republican governor said "it was good actually" to see Trump's tweet that Biden won. "I think that's the start of an acknowledgment. ... We want to make sure that there is a smooth transition," said Arkansas' Asa Hutchinson on NBC.

Nearly 2 dozen arrested in protests

WASHINGTON — Demonstrations over President Donald Trump's loss at the polls have resulted in charges against nearly two dozen people in Washington, including a person accused of setting off a commercial firework and four people accused in an assault that left the victim unconscious on the street.

The arrests came during and after protesters and counterdemonstrators clashed Saturday in Northwest Washington. Several thousand people rallied during the day in support of Trump, whose motorcade briefly drove by the gathering protesters Saturday morning on the way to the president's Northern Virginia golf club.

Trump supporters marched from Freedom Plaza to the Supreme Court Building, across from the Capitol, during the day. Their activities and those of counterdemonstrators grew increasingly tense and took a violent turn in the early evening. Videos posted to social media showed numerous incidents of shoving and punching as well as a firework explosion and a man shoving and knocking down one person before being shoved and punched unconscious himself by others.

A 26-year-old District of Columbia man was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon after

discharging the firework at several people, the Metropolitan Police Department said in a news release Sunday.

Police said in another statement that four people, all but one confirmed as District residents, were arrested on various charges related to a man being knocked

unconscious by one person and then assaulted by the others. Whether that incident was depicted in social media video was not clear.

Police also reported a stabbing victim was treated at a hospital for nonlife-threatening injuries. Four police officers were injured as they

responded to the unrest, and eight firearms were recovered, the department said.

Police said at least 10 of those arrested were from the District of Columbia while others came from neighboring Maryland and Virginia. Some of those arrested were from New York, New Jersey, South Carolina and Georgia, police said, and more suspects were being sought as authorities reviewed surveillance footage.

Several other cities on Saturday saw gatherings of Trump supporters unwilling to accept Democrat Joe Biden's Electoral College and popular vote victory as legitimate, including Phoenix; Dallas; Las Vegas; Austin, Texas; Lansing, Michigan; and Salem, Oregon.

Cries of "Stop the Steal" and "Count Every Vote" were common despite a lack of evidence of voter fraud or other problems that could reverse the result.

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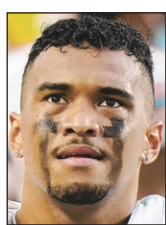

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Johnson buries major memories

Historic Masters victory brings green jacket

AUGUSTA, Ga. — In this one-of-a-kind Masters that had no fans and no roars, Dustin Johnson made sure it had no drama. And when he polished off his five-shot victory Sunday with the lowest score in tournament history, he had no words.

Only tears.

Looking smart in his Masters green jacket he dreamed his whole life of winning, Johnson spoke to a small gathering on the putting green in absence of the official ceremony, but only briefly. In control of every aspect of his game on a course that never allows anyone to relax, he couldn't speak when it was over. Instead, he turned to wipe his eyes.

"I've never had this much trouble gathering myself," Johnson finally said. "On the golf course, I'm pretty good at it."

No one was better. Not even close.

Johnson overcame a nervous

start that conjured memories of past majors he failed to finish off, and then delivered a command performance that added his own touch to a Masters unlike another.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, it was the first played in November. It was the first without ropes and without roars because patrons were not allowed, only one guest for each player, coaches, Augusta National members and officials.

Leading by two shots heading into Amen Corner, the world's No. 1 player got through the 12th hole — where Tiger Woods earlier hit three balls in Rae's Creek and made 10 — and then ran off three straight birdies to pull away from Cameron Smith and Sungjae Im, the only players who had a chance.

Johnson closed with a 4-under 68 and finished at 20-under 268, breaking by two shots the record set by Tiger Woods in 1997 and matched by Jordan Spieth in 2015.

He had only four bogeys in 72 holes, another record, this one held by Jack Nicklaus and Jimmy Demaret. He missed only 12 greens all week, a record last set by Woods.

All that mattered was that green jacket. Nothing ever comes easily for Johnson in the majors. Nothing looked so

natural as seeing Woods, the defending champion, help him into that size 42 long in Butler Cabin.

"Having Tiger put it on was

awesome. You wouldn't want it any other way," Johnson said. And then he smiled before adding, "But any guy could put it on me and I'd be just fine."

His five-shot victory was the largest at the Masters since Woods won by 12 in 1997. All that was missing were the roars from

Bucs rebound big

Brady leads bounce back with 46-23 blowout win over the Panthers

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Tom Brady said the message this week from coach Bruce Arians was about having "mental toughness."

The Bucs showed plenty of it on Sunday.

After having practices delayed by storms earlier in the week, a mechanical issue that delayed their flight to Charlotte by 6 1/2 hours on Saturday, and the lingering memory of a 38-3 loss to the Saints last week, the Buccaneers rebounded nicely with their most impressive win of the season.

Brady threw for 341 yards and three touchdowns, Ronald Jones set a franchise-record with a 98-yard touchdown run, and the Buccaneers bounced back from a dreadful defeat with a

resounding 46-23 win over the Carolina Panthers.

"He said from the beginning, there's no excuses," Brady said of Arians' message. "We played better than we did last week, obviously. We just have to do it consistently, continue to make plays and run the ball like we ran it today."

Coming off the most lopsided loss of his illustrious career, Brady threw touchdown passes to Cameron Brate, Mike Evans and Rob Gronkowski, then ran for another score in the fourth quarter to seal the win.

Panthers coach Matt Rhule described Brady's play as "elite" and "fantastic."

The Bucs ran the ball just five times last week.

On Sunday it was the complete opposite, as they racked up 210 yards rushing on 37 carries. Jones finished with a career-high 192 yards, including the big

third-quarter burst that blew open the tight game and stripped the life out of the Carolina defense.

Although two Carolina defenders said they knew what play was coming, Jones raced up the middle behind left guard, shook off safety Tre Boston and was gone. Jones became the fourth NFL player with a TD run of 98 yards or longer, joining Tony Dorsett, Derrick Henry and Ahman Green.

"I knew he was going to break one sooner or later," Arians said. "Blaine (Gabbert, backup QB) and I looked at each other and he said, 'He's going to take it to the house.' I said, 'There's a good chance on this play.' And he did."

Jones was upset with himself over a first-quarter fumble that led to a Carolina touchdown, but Arians stuck with him.

Tulsa in at 25; Indiana set for top-10 matchup

No. 25 Tulsa is ranked in The Associated Press college football poll for the first time in 10 years and No. 9 Indiana is set to play the first top-10 matchup in program history.

The AP Top 25 was mostly stagnant Sunday after four of the top five teams did not play and only one ranked team lost this weekend.

Alabama is No. 1 for the second straight week, with 60 first-place votes. No. 2 Notre Dame received one first-place vote and No. 3 Ohio State got the other. The rest of the top eight was unchanged: Clemson is No. 4, followed by Texas A&M, Florida, Cincinnati and BYU. Indiana moved up one spot to ninth — the Hoosiers' best ranking since they were fourth in the 1967 poll — heading into a matchup with Ohio State on Saturday.

South Carolina fires football coach Muschamp

COLUMBIA, S.C. — South Carolina fired football coach Will Muschamp on Sunday, the second time he's been let go from a Southeastern Conference program in midseason.

The school said in a release that Muschamp has been "relieved" of his duties with the football program. Athletic director Ray Tanner said first-year offensive

coordinator Mike Bobo, a former head coach at Colorado State, will take over as interim coach.

The 49-year-old Muschamp had four years remaining on his contract. His buy-out from the school is \$13.2 million.

Thompson-Robinson propels UCLA over Cal

PASADENA, Calif. — Dorian

Thompson-Robinson threw three touchdown passes, rushed for another TD and accounted for 248 yards of total offense as UCLA rolled to a 34-10 victory over California on Sunday morning.

The Bruins and Golden Bears weren't originally slated to face each other this season, but the conference scheduled the Rose Bowl matchup on Friday after Cal's game against Arizona State and UCLA's matchup against Utah were canceled due to the Sun Devils and Utes having several positive COVID-19 tests.

UT Martin basketball coach Stewart dies at 50

MARTIN, Tenn. — UT Martin basketball coach Anthony Stewart was found dead Sunday just before the start of his fifth season with the Skyhawks. He was 50.

Stewart had been at UT Martin since 2014, starting as associate head coach under Heath Schroyer.

a crowd for any of his pivotal putts early and his birdie putts on the back nine that put it away.

It wasn't the loneliest walk up the hill to the 18th green. About 250 people offering warm applause and partner Paulina Gretzky rushed onto the green to celebrate with Johnson and his brother, caddie Austin Johnson.

Johnson now has two majors to go along with his 25 victories worldwide, a combination that validates him as one of the greats of his generation.

Gone are the doubts that he could hold a lead in the major on the final day. Four times he had gone into the final round with at least a share of the lead without winning. Johnson had questions, too. His only major was the U.S. Open at Oakmont in 2016 when he rallied from four shots behind.

"I'm sure a lot of you all think ... there were doubts in my mind, just because I had been there. I'm in this position a lot of times," Johnson said. "When am I going to have the lead and finishing off a major? It definitely proved that I can do it."

There were some nervous moments early.

Johnson's four-shot lead was reduced to one after five holes, and then he quickly restored control with an 8-iron to 6 feet on the top shelf on the right corner of the green at the par-3 sixth for birdie. That restored his lead to three shots when Im missed a 3-foot par putt. Smith was the only one who was closer than two the rest of the way.

Smith got quite the consolation. He became the first player in Masters history to post all four rounds in the 60s, and all it got him was a silver medal.

"I thought I'd have a decent shot if I got to Dustin's original score at the start of the day, 16 under," Smith said. "I knew I had to put the pressure on early. Got out of the gates pretty good and DJ was just too good at the end."

My wife and I worked very hard to put both the older ones through college. We've always had trouble keeping the oldest one engaged with making the best of decisions for herself. She finished college with a teaching degree yet doesn't use it and w a i t - resses at a restaurant. It's h a r d watching her struggle financially knowing she could have a career as a teacher.



DEAR ANNIE

She moved out at age 25 to live with a friend. They had a falling out about nine months later, and she moved in with a man she had known for two months. He is living here illegally and was in jail previously, related to an issue with a woman he had been seeing. I don't know why, and our daughter has never told us the whole story about it. After about nine months of knowing him, she tells us she is marrying him. Well, that announcement didn't go so well. My wife and I told her that we had concerns, and she was hurt by our reaction.

Our relationship is somewhat stable. We call and invite her over several times a year. However, she never calls us, has never invited us over and never comes over unless there is something in it for her, such as dinner or gifts. I need some wise advice. — **Shepherd With a Lost Sheep**

Dear Shepherd: She will marry the man she loves, regardless of his prior jail time or your disapproval. Invite both of them over for dinner more often. You say she ignores your invitations unless there is something in it for her, such as dinner, so dinner it is!

The point is that you need to communicate with her — and her future husband — if you want to have a closer relationship and offer advice based on the years of wisdom you and your wife have accumulated. Try not to be judgmental or critical. A warm, loving and accepting approach is much more likely to bring her around to your way of thinking. Keep us posted.

Dear Annie: Caught in the Middle was stepping away from social situations because discussions of politics were becoming so ugly among his friends. You suggested that he and his wife set a rule for gatherings saying no politics are discussed.

I have another approach. What if, instead, people agreed to rules that mandated that political discussion be conducted in a respectful way? They could study up on the rules of debate. They could outlast sarcasm and personal attack. They could ask people to back up assertions with fact. They could require that people cite the source of information.

At least these friends are engaged in politics. Too many people are not. Setting different rules would give everybody a chance to grow, intellectually and socially. — **Healthy Political Discussions**

Dear Healthy Political Discussions: It is true that for democracy to work, we need to be able to have healthy and respectful debates on difference of opinions. But there is a time and a place. Forming a group meeting to discuss all sides of current political issues is brilliant. If it is an ordinary dinner party or get-together, I think it's good to avoid political debate.
