Citrus County COVID-19 cases
 According to the Florida Department of Health, 17 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. No new deaths were reported, for a total of 437. To date in the county, 10,540 people have tested positive (including 92 non-residents). No new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 685 hospitalized. Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

 DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for all individuals 18 and older and front-line health care workers is now available. Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036. As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and preregister with if they do not have internet access. In Citrus, call 833-540-2058. Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

Making room for many more

RV resort in works for northern Crystal River; city staff reviewing plans

 An RV resort with the parking and utility hookups to accommodate just under 600 recreational vehicles is ready to sprout in northern Crystal River. City staff, as of Friday, April 9, was still reviewing the Hidden Lakes Preserve RV Resort project submitted to city hall by developers in late March. Property owner Charlie Dean Jr. said work can start as soon as city staffers give their OK on

the 85-acre resort north of the Crystal River Mall. "We're really excited about this project," he said. "I think it's going to be a positive, economic impact to the city of Crystal River with tourists coming in, spending multiple nights there — maybe even months — and being a part of the community." Brian Herrmann, director of Crystal River's planning and community development department, said staff has been reviewing the project to ensure it matches with a similar

planned-unit-development master plan City Council approved in September with a 5-0 vote. "Assuming they do meet the standards, they can proceed with development based on staff review," Herrmann said. "They need not go back to city council." Dean, who, according to him and the Citrus County Property Appraiser's Office, bought the two parcels of Hidden Lakes in November for \$3.4 million, said the resort will be a 55-and-older community promoting affordable

housing for active people. "We'd like to have something that sets us apart," said Dean, who's the son of former county sheriff and state senator Charlie Dean Sr. "We're like a lifestyle, and the lifestyle we're trying to sell is outdoor activities." Not only will Hidden Lakes offer its own recreational amenities, Dean said, but its closeness to Crystal River gives its tenants access to shops and restaurants within the city.

County commissioners to discuss building new animal shelter for Citrus

 Since 2014, county commissioners have been discussing building a new animal shelter to replace the outdated facility at the Inverness Airport. Nobody denies a new shelter is needed but the stumbling block has always been cost. The board will get another shot at it on Tuesday, April 13, when they hold a workshop at 9 a.m. to discuss design options

and costs. The workshop will be at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave. in Inverness. And cost will likely be the problem again. An architect from the Bacon Group will present cost estimates and design options. The estimated price tag is \$11.5 million. Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said that price will likely be "dead on arrival." Kinnard said he wonders if the Bacon Group people even considered the county's needs for a simple, practical shelter

— not a Taj Mahal, he said. But there may be an alternative. Expect much discussion Tuesday about the new shelter Lake County recently built. It's got a simple design, no unnecessary frills and — most importantly — it only cost about \$7 million.

Citrus seeks ideas from Lake County shelter

 How did Lake County commissioners go about building their new animal shelter at such a reasonable cost and still make it functional? Here's what Whitney Boylston, director of the Lake County Office of Animal Services, said:
Q: What process did Lake County commissioners go through to build your shelter? Did they hire a consultant and did they go with the consultant's estimates?
A: "We worked with an architect who was working with a consultant. The process included a needs-assessment based on trends and projections. The original estimate (about \$12 million) was much higher than the design that

we ultimately used."
Q: Was practicality more a concern than cost when discussing the new shelter?
A: "Embracing humane standards of care and sheltering best practices was important to us. However, all government building projects are influenced by cost."
Q: Why did Lake County build a new animal shelter?
A: "The previous shelter was not designed with a no-kill mission in mind and the building itself had reached the end of life. It was no longer economically viable to continue to maintain, upgrade and repair the

"This property gives people best of both worlds," Dean said. "I know our group will be active within the community, within the city."

Crystal River Mayor Joe Meek said he appreciates Dean's investment, which, he said, will encourage a bounty of travelers to stay and enjoy the city's natural treasures.

"We are very excited about this project," he said. "We think it's going to be another great amenity to have in Crystal River."

Plans for Hidden Lakes show 586 RV lots surrounding a fitness center, woodshop, laundry room, nature trails, courts for bocci and pickleball and a clubhouse and pool overlooking a fishable lake. Dean said the resort will have an activities director scheduling regular events.

Dean said RV tenants will have the option of either staying overnight or they can sign a lease for either three, six or 12 months.

Once city staff gives Hidden Lakes the green light, workers will start clearing the resort's 85 acres of long-leaf pine, water oak and sweetgums to sell as timber.

"Ideally, I'd like to keep all the trees, if I could, but it's not feasible," Dean said, noting his property had already been classified to grow and farm timber.

Dean also owns and maintains 80 acres of protected natural lands on the northwest border of the uplands Hidden Lakes will be built on.

"It's got to be kept in its natural state," he said.

As trees get felled to make way for Hidden Lakes, Dean said, work crews will layer loads of excavated and imported sand across the resort to grade it.

More fill and foundation will be added to the bottoms of the resort's more-permanent structures, raising them above the 12-foot base flood levels recently set by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Depending on how fast it fills with lessees, the resort's 586 RV lots will be paved throughout three construction phases, starting with 200 within the first 18 months of ground breaking.

When city council was reviewing the Hidden Lakes plan, concerns were raised about the development's proximity to residents.

Dean said a 25-foot buffer of dense vegetation and a 6-foot-tall privacy fence will keep the resort's neighbors visually separated.

"They're not going to be able to see the back of an RV," he said. "We care about the environment, and we're going to be very conscientious of our neighbors; I don't want them to think we're going to come in, and they're going to be look at whatever's going to be there."

with Citrus Animal Services Director Colleen Yarbrough — recently made separate visits to the Lake County Animal Shelter in Tavares.

Davis, who also visited the Humane Society of Tampa Bay facility, said she was impressed and believes there are elements of both that could be incorporated into Citrus County's design.

"What I loved about both shelters is how they pull in community goals and community interaction," she said.

The Lake County shelter, she said, was closer to what she believes Citrus County needs: less fluff and more functionality.

"Lake County feels very close to right for Citrus County because it's practical," Davis said. "They do a beautiful job of integrating with the county and leveraging that asset to further other goals in the community."

For example, during National Library Week last week, shelter staff put up a bookshelf outside the cattery and kids could read to the pets. That increases childhood reading scores, Davis said.

Lake County also partners with their technical college by having vet-tech students use the shelter for internships and training.

Above all, she said both facilities are good at engaging the community and holding fundraisers to help pay for their shelters.

"We need to get the price down and be

creative in fundraising," Davis said.

Kinnard said he's researched the Lake County shelter and also liked the simplicity and practicality.

It has four separate adoption pods to separate the dogs and keep stress low. The outdoor kennels have little doors to allow them inside. There is also a drive-through adoption service.

The shelter that has served Citrus County for decades out near the Inverness Airport has outlived its use and it's too crowded, shelter volunteers say, and they have

encouraged county commissioners in the past to look at building a new shelter in Lecanto.

"The current shelter has a poor working environment and is sub par for animal health," Davis said. "There's been much discussion about building it on county-owned property near the jail in Lecanto."

"It should go in the middle of the county," County Commissioner Holly Davis said.

The exact location will be part of Tuesday's dis-

ussion, she said.

Crystal River leaders to look ahead

City council to vote on restarting work on the city's 50-year master plan

Crystal River officials are looking to restart the city's work on its 50-year blueprint.

After calling to order at 5:30 p.m. Monday, April 12, City Council members will vote on whether to pay \$156,000 for planning firm Dover Kohl & Partners to finish the Crystal River Civic Master Plan.

Council will meet at city hall, 123 NW U.S. 19, Crystal River. For information about city government meetings, either visit crystalriverfl.org/meetings or call 352-795-4216.

Once it's completed, following a weeklong public charrette of community feedback, the master plan will act as an illustrative packet of development guidelines for the city to follow in its future.

"This will allow the staff to move forward with redeveloping the City's land development code," the council agenda states, "including the specific standards that will shape the City over the upcoming decades."

Dover Kohl has already helped Crystal River with a portion of its civic master plan in June, when it hosted a three-day charrette process to gauge public sentiment over how the Florida Department of

Transportation should resurface State Road 44 within the city.

However, the city's master plan draft was paused when COVID-19's arrival hindered large, in-person gatherings and Dover Kohl's staff travel.

City council to vote on leasing Legrone Park building as YMCA community youth center

Also during its meeting on Monday, council will vote on whether the YMCA of the Suncoast should lease the city building next to Jim Legrone Memorial Park.

After the building's lease ended with the Spot Family Center, which now rents on a month-to-month basis, city staff started requesting

proposals in March for area organizations to turn it into a community youth center.

Before ranking the YMCA its top choice, a team made up of City Manager Ken Frink, City Councilman Ken Brown, city staff and Citrus County Sheriff's Office personnel looked over proposals from the Y, the Spot Family Center and the Boys & Girls Club of Citrus County.

Also during city council's meeting on Monday:

■ Frink will give council an update on the city's various projects within King's Bay; and,

■ Council will proclaim the week of April 12 as "Water Conservation Week."







COVID surge shows need to continue vaccinations

Over the past week, the state of Florida has seen an additional uptick in COVID-19 cases among those age 65 and younger, with COVID-variant cases outpacing any other state in the nation. The only age group that did not experience an additional spike, according to health officials, were seniors — the population with the highest vaccination rate.

So far, the vaccine is working and protecting the state’s most vulnerable.

However, the data also points out the fact that is the pandemic is not over, and many are still at risk of severe illness and death from COVID-19. And the advantage of a young age is no immunity.

Many younger Floridians haven’t been vaccinated, and are very socially active. Areas dense in college-age populations are seeing a notable surge.

Vaccination appointments opened for those age 18 and older on April 5, and it is hopeful that, like the senior population, infection rates will also flatten and lower.

The vaccines are safe and young people need protection too.

In looking at the vaccine rates in current populations, and taking lifestyle into account, it is clear that vaccines work to suppress infections. The most recent surge data among social college students demonstrates

that a failure to follow mask wearing and distancing protocols leads to an increase in infections.

The numbers clearly demonstrate the necessity of getting the vaccine and following the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention’s (CDC) guidelines. Because when we respond to a pandemic with ignorance — people die.

We know the best ways to combat the virus, and that is through evidence-based recommendations that work.

COVID-19 variants, some of which are much more contagious than the original strand, are spreading rapidly. Work is still in progress in studying the diseases’ mutations, and whether the current vaccines can stop the spread.

Health officials are saying the best way to stop all strains of the virus so far are to follow the same guidelines that have long been recommended: vaccination, mask wearing and physical distancing.

We can control COVID-19, but we have to follow guidance from public health and disease experts, or else the pandemic will continue to haunt us.

Know a young person that is eligible to receive a vaccination? Remind them that it is their turn to get a shot, and not to wait. The sooner we flatten the numbers and stop the spread, the sooner we can live life without reservations.

Pubs, hairdressers to reopen as UK eases lockdown

LONDON — Millions of people in Britain will get their first chance in months for haircuts, casual shopping and restaurant meals on Monday, as the government takes the next step on its lockdown-lifting road map.

Nationwide restrictions have been in place in England since early January, and similar rules in the other parts of the U.K., to suppress a surge in coronavirus infections that swept the country late last year, linked to a more transmissible new variant first identified in southeast England.

Britain has had Europe's worst coronavirus outbreak, with more than 127,000 confirmed deaths.

Infections, hospitalizations and deaths have all fallen thanks to the lockdown, and a mass vaccination program that has given at least one dose to more than 60% of the adult population.

Candidate accused of rape vows to block elections

MEXICO CITY — A Mexican ruling party state candidate accused of rape, who later had his candidacy canceled by regulatory authorities on other grounds, said Sunday he will not allow elections in his home state unless he is allowed to run.

Félix Salgado is running for the governorship of the troubled Pacific coast state of Guerrero. While two women accused him of rape, he has not been charged and was allowed by President Andrés Manuel López Obrador's Morena party to continue running.

But in late March, elections regulators ordered him taken off the ballot, saying he failed to report campaign spending. The country's electoral court last week ordered the Federal Electoral Institute to reconsider that decision.

Salgado is leading a caravan of vehicles to protest at the electoral institute's office in Mexico City, and on Sunday, Salgado said unless that decision is overturned, he won't allow the June elections in Guerrero to occur without him.

"If we are on the ballot, there will be elections," Salgado told a crowd of supporters in Iguuala, Guerrero. "If we are not on the ballot, there will not be any elections."

Ecuador, Peru head to polls under strict measures

LIMA, Peru — Ecuador and Peru were choosing new presidents Sunday under strict public health measures prompted by the coronavirus pandemic, which has recently

strengthened in the neighboring South American nations.

Ecuadorians face a runoff between a conservative businessman and a protégé of former leftist President Rafael Correa, while Peruvians have 18 options to pick from in the first round. All seats in Peru's congress, too, are being contested.

The elections come amid a surge in COVID-19 cases in both countries and meager progress in their vaccination programs. Lockdowns have returned, threatening further damage to the nations' already battered economies.

Ecuador's runoff features leftist candidate Andres Arauz, who led the first round of voting with more than 30% on Feb. 7, and former banker Guillermo Lasso, who edged into the final by finishing about half of a percentage point above environmentalist and Indigenous candidate Yaku Pérez.

Meanwhile, Peru's election has turned into a popularity contest in which a candidate has even addressed how he suppresses his sexual desires.

The crowded field of presidential hopefuls comes months after the country's political chaos reached a new level in November, when three men were named presidents in a week after one was impeached by Congress over corruption allegations and protests forced his successor to resign.

Pentagon chief: US commitment to Israel 'ironclad'

TEL AVIV, Israel — U.S. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin on Sunday declared an "enduring and ironclad" American commitment to Israel, reinforcing support at a tense time in Israeli politics and amid questions about the Biden administration's efforts to revive nuclear negotiations with Israel's archenemy, Iran.

Austin's first talks in Israel since he became Pentagon chief in January come as the United States seeks to leverage Middle East diplomatic progress made by the Trump administration, which brokered a deal normalizing relations between Israel and several Arab states.

By coincidence or not, the defense secretary arrived as Iran reported that its underground Natanz nuclear facility lost power just hours after starting up new advanced centrifuges capable of enriching uranium faster.

If Israel caused the blackout, it would further heighten tensions between the two nations, already engaged in a shadow conflict across the wider Middle East.

Iran called it an act of "nuclear terrorism," but did not immediately blame anyone directly.

No party unity in speech

Trump goes after both Pence, McConnell

PALM BEACH — It was supposed to be a unifying weekend for a Republican Party at war with itself over former President Donald Trump's divisive leadership. But Trump himself shattered two days of relative peace in his closing remarks to the GOP's top donors when he insulted the party's Senate leader and his wife.

Ahead of the invitation-only speech at Trump's new home inside his Mar-a-Lago resort, the former president's advisers said he would emphasize his commitment to his party and Republican unity.

Trump veered sharply from prepared remarks Saturday night and instead slammed Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., as a "stone-cold loser" and mocked

McConnell's wife, Elaine Chao, who was Trump's transportation secretary.

Trump also said he was "disappointed" in his vice president, Mike Pence, and used a profanity in assessing McConnell, according to multiple people in attendance who were not authorized to publicly discuss what was said in a private session. He said McConnell had not thanked him properly for putting Chao, who was labor secretary under President George W. Bush, in his Cabinet.

McConnell's office did not immediately respond to a request for comment Sunday.

Trump's words left some attendees feeling uncomfortable.

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich did not defend Trump as he left Palm Beach on Sunday.

"We are much better off if we

keep focusing on the Democrats. Period," Gingrich said.

Saturday's speech was the final address of the Republican National Committee's weekend donor summit in Palm Beach. Most of the RNC's closed-door gathering was held at a luxury hotel a few miles away from Mar-a-Lago; attendees were bused to Trump's club for his remarks.

While a significant faction of the Republican Party hopes to move past Trump's divisive leadership, the location of the event — and the former president's prominent speaking slot — suggests that the GOP, at least for now, is not ready to replace Trump as its undisputed leader and chief fundraiser.

Ahead of his latest attack on fellow Republicans, Trump's team reported that his remarks were intended to reinforce his continued leadership role in Republican affairs, a sharp break from past presidents.

More ash rises into Caribbean air

Volcanic eruptions continue, worsen on island of St. Vincent

KINGSTOWN, St. Vincent — Conditions worsened on Sunday at a volcano on the eastern Caribbean island of St. Vincent as loud rumbling, lightning and heavy ashfall were observed and residents reported power cuts.

The eruption Friday of La Soufriere forced many residents to evacuate their homes, though some remained in place. The rumbling was heard in the capital of Kingstown, about 20 miles south.

"I'm just here wondering when it's going to calm down," resident Kalique Sutherland said.

Lava has begun to flow from the volcano, said Prof. Richard Robertson, the lead scientist at the University of the West Indies Seismic

Research Center.

"It's likely that at some point it would quiet down and hopefully we would have a break so that we could recover a little bit more, but don't be surprised if after the break it picks up like this again," Robertson said.

Elford Lewis, a 56-year-old farmer who evacuated his home on Sunday morning, said the ongoing eruption is worse than the last big one in 1979.

"This one is more serious," said Lewis, who witnessed the big eruption decades ago.

An eruption of the 4,003-foot volcano in 1902 killed roughly 1,600 people.

About 16,000 people have had to flee their ash-covered communities with as many belongings as they could stuff into suitcases and

backpacks. However, there have been no reports of anyone being killed or injured by the initial blast or those that followed.

Ralph Gonsalves, the prime minister of the 32 islands that make up the country of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, has said people should remain calm and keep trying to protect themselves from the coronavirus. He said officials were trying to figure out the best way to collect and dispose of the ash, which covered an airport runway near Kingstown, and fell as far away as Barbados, about 120 miles to the east.

About 3,200 people took refuge at 78 government-run shelters, and four empty cruise ships stood ready to take other evacuees to nearby islands, with a group of more than 130 already taken to St. Lucia.



History-making Masters

Hideki Matsuyama becomes the first Japanese player in the Masters to don green jacket

AUGUSTA, Ga. — The pressure was even more than Hideki Matsuyama could have imagined when he stood on the first tee Sunday at Augusta National. So was the emotion when he walked off the 18th green as the first Masters champion from golf-mad Japan.

His arms securely inside the sleeves of the green jacket, he thrust them in the air.

Ten years after he made a sterling debut as the best amateur at the Masters, the 29-year-old Matsuyama claimed the ultimate prize and took his place in history.

Whether he's Japan's greatest player is not his concern.

"However, I'm the first to win a major," he said through his interpreter. "And if that's the bar, then I've set it."

Staked to a four-shot lead, the nerves stayed with Matsuyama from the time he hit his opening tee shot into the trees to back-to-back birdies that led to a six-shot lead to a few

nervous moments at the end when Xander Schauffele made a late run at him.

Only when he belted his drive down the 18th fairway and twirled the club in his hands could he feel this victory was in hand. He played so well for so long that three bogeys over the last four holes made this Masters look closer than it was.

He closed with a 1-over 73 for a one-shot victory over Masters rookie Will Zalatoris (70).

Schauffele ran off four straight birdies to get within two shots with three holes to play, only to hit 8-iron into the water on the par-3 16th for a triple bogey that ended his hopes. He shot a 72 with a triple bogey and a double bogey on his card and tied for third with Jordan Spieth (70).

"Man, he was something else. He played like a winner needs to play," Schauffele said. "Sixteen, I really would have loved to have put more pressure on him there, but basically gave him the tournament at that point."

Then his thoughts turned to the significance of what Matsuyama

achieved. Schauffele's mother was raised in Japan and his grandparents still live there.

"No one really wants to talk about how much pressure is on him," Schauffele said. "You look at the media that follows him. You look at what he's done in his career. He's a top-ranked player with a ton of pressure on him, and that's the hardest way to play. He's able to do it."

And he did it.

The emotion for a player who says so little was never more evident. Moments before Dustin Johnson helped him into the green jacket, Matsuyama needed no interpreter in Butler Cabin when he said in English, "I'm really happy."

So masterful was this performance that Matsuyama stretched his lead to six shots on the back nine until a few moments of drama. With a four-shot lead, he went for the green in two on the par-5 15th and it bounded hard off the back slope and into the pond on the 16th hole.

Matsuyama did well to walk away with bogey, and with Schauffele making a fourth straight birdie, the lead

was down to two shots. And then it was over.

Schauffele was in the water: Matsuyama made a safe par on the 17th and ripped one down the middle of the 18th fairway. He made bogey from the bunker to finish at 10-under 278, See HISTORY/Page B3

Rays fade in finale

Odor snaps tie with 1st NY hit

ST. PETERSBURG — Rowned Odor is looking ahead, not to the past.

The newest addition to the New York Yankees wants to help his new team be successful. It didn't take him long to contribute to a win.

"It was great, feels really good," the infielder said after his first hit as a Yankee snapped a 10th-inning tie and New York rallied Sunday to avoid a weekend sweep with an 8-4 victory over the Tampa Bay Rays.

The 27-year-old second baseman was in the lineup for the first time after being acquired from Texas in a trade last week. He said he doesn't feel pressure

to prove he can play after being designated for assignment by the Rangers.

"I just try to be myself, just try to play the game the way I play the game all the time, trying to bring that energy I have to the team," said Odor, his face cleanly shaven after sporting a scruffy beard for years in Texas. "That's what I did today, and it really feels good."

Gio Urshela homered and drove in three runs for New York, which won for only the third time in its past 13 regular-season meetings with the Rays. Tampa Bay also ousted its AL East rival from the playoffs on the way to winning the AL pennant last season.

"You've got to be able to turn the page in this game. You know you're going to take your lumps every now and then, even when you're a really good ball club," Yankees manager Aaron Boone said.

"A tough couple of first games

here," Boone added. "I thought it was a good job of turning the page and coming out and playing some winning baseball."

Urshela hit a two-run homer in the third inning. His career-high fourth hit of the day, a two-out single in the 10th off Collin McHugh (0-1), helped the Yankees put away the AL champions, who were on the verge of completing a three-game sweep before giving up a tying run in the eighth.

Odor was 0 for 4 before singling to center on a 3-2 pitch to break a 4-4 tie.

Last season, he was 6 for 81 (.074) with two strikes — the lowest average in the majors among players with 75 or more at-bats.

"I was just trying to do my best, put the ball in play to drive that run in," Odor said. "He gave me a good pitch to hit and I made a pretty good contact."

Berry gets 1st Xfinity victory

MARTINSVILLE, Va. — Josh Berry passed Ty Gibbs with 28 laps to go and pulled away for his first career NASCAR Xfinity Series victory in a rain-delayed race at Martinsville Speedway.

Berry gave himself enough cushion after getting by Gibbs to withstand challenges by Noah Gragson and Daniel Hemric, who ran out of time trying to navigate lapped traffic.

Berry, making just his 13th career start spread over five seasons and eight years, became the second driver to gain his first win on the 0.526-mile oval, joining Brett Bodine (1985). Berry's best prior finish was seventh earlier this year at Las Vegas.

"Oh my gosh. I have so many people I could thank I could be here 'til tomorrow morning," Berry said after climbing from his car.

Gragson finished second and got a \$100,000 consolation prize as the top finisher among four in the Dash for Cash. Hemric was third, followed by Gibbs and Brandon Jones.

Gragson also won the first stage of the race, which started Friday night and went 91 laps before it was halted by rain. Hemric won the second stage under sunny skies.

Truex outlasts teammate Hamlin

Earns win again at Martinsville

MARTINSVILLE, Va. — Martin Truex Jr. admits to being surprised by his success at Martinsville Speedway.

Truex won a stirring, laps-long duel for the lead with teammate Denny Hamlin in the rain-delayed NASCAR Cup Series race Sunday night, winning for the third time in the last four stops at the 0.526-mile oval — the oldest and shortest in the series.

"This place has become a playground for us I guess," Truex said in Victory Lane. "We didn't have the best car all day, but we just kept working on it and never quit on it."

Truex, who nudged Hamlin repeatedly in the turns and tried to get to his inside on the straightaways without success, finally made the pass with 15 laps to go, ducking underneath Hamlin coming out of the second turn. He sailed off to victory without another challenge as Hamlin and Chase Elliott battled the rest of the way for second.

Truex became the first repeat winner in NASCAR's top series this season.

The race was rained out after 42 laps Saturday night, and was completed as the second part of a doubleheader that started with the completion of the rain-delayed Xfinity Series race from Friday night.

Elliott, who won here last fall on his way to winning the series championship, held off Hamlin for second. Hamlin was third, followed by William Byron and Kyle Larson.

"That was a lot of fun there at the end, racing with Denny," Truex said about his Joe Gibbs Racing teammate. "We raced

clean and we were able to come out on top."

The Gibbs team had all four of its drivers finish in the top 10 as Christopher Bell took seventh and Kyle Busch 10th, leaving team owner Joe Gibbs excited, and relieved.

"I was just praying that Denny and Martin didn't get together running up front," Gibbs said.

The outcome was not only disappointing for Hamlin, who had a dominant car and led 276 laps, but also for Ryan Blaney, who won the first two stages and led 157 laps but dragged an air gun out of his pit after the final stop and was sent back to 19th in the field.

Blaney rallied to finish 11th, but earlier, he and Hamlin were dominant.

Blaney passed Hamlin for the lead on Lap 75 and cruised to victory in the 130-lap Stage 1, and Stage 2 played out much the same. Hamlin was fast early in the run, pulling comfortably

ahead, but Blaney eventually ran him down to win that stage, too.

Hamlin's third-place finish was his series best seventh top-five run in eight races.

"We had a really fast car for 20 laps or so, and then it would just kind of go away," Hamlin said. "We just continue to run top-three every single week. Every stage, every finish — we're right there. We just need to get a little better. We're barely missing it."

The race featured several drastic changes in fortunes, perhaps none bigger than for Joey Logano. He was in danger of being lapped at the end of the first stage, but gambled with others midway through the race by staying on the track to gain position when most of the leaders pitted.

It worked because another caution flew shortly thereafter, allowing him to pit for the fresh tires most other teams already had and stayed near the front the rest of the way.

Logano finished sixth.

Misfortune was the case for Alex Bowman, Brad Keselowski and several others because of a major pileup on the backstretch involving more than a dozen cars on Lap 387. Bowman had gotten as high as second before getting caught up in the mess that ended his day, and Keselowski, a two-time winner at Martinsville, also had to call it a day after the wreck.

"It's just part of the short track deal," Keselowski said.

The accident started when Kyle Busch and Chris Buescher got together exiting Turn 2.


Daniel Suarez also was involved, and rode around the oval to the entrance to Turn 1, climbed out of his car when it caught fire and walked away as it burst into flames.

Celtics' 31-3 run sparks comeback

ORLANDO — Khris Middleton scored 21 points, Bobby Portis added 16 points, including four 3-pointers, and 10 rebounds off the bench and the Milwaukee Bucks defeated the Orlando Magic 124-87 on Sunday night to end a three-game losing streak.

Milwaukee was again without star Giannis Antetokounmpo, but it mattered little as Middleton shot 8 of 13 from the field and added eight rebounds and five assists to help the Bucks lead wire to wire. Middleton also hit two 3-pointers to give him 1,000 for his NBA career.

"He's the ultimate professional, so consistent, a great scorer and he does it in a lot of different ways," Milwaukee coach Mike Budenholzer said of Middleton. "I think, at the same time, he's a great leader. He's really taken on a more impactful leadership role. The scoring and the 3s, everybody sees, but I like how he's taken on leadership."

Milwaukee shot 48.9% and made 19 3-pointers to beat the Magic for the sixth straight time — five of those wins coming in Orlando. The Magic shot 37.2% and hit only 8 of 36 3s.

Brue Holiday added 12 points, five rebounds and seven assists for Milwaukee, which never saw its lead dip below 13 points in the second half. Milwaukee pulled its starters early in the fourth period and extended its lead to as much as 37 late.

Brynn Forbes added 13 points off Milwaukee's bench. Pat Connaughton made all four of his shots and added 11 points.

"The focus of the group was good and both ends of the court some good things were happening," Budenholzer said. "So, a lot of positives."

Mo Bamba scored a career-best 21 points for Orlando, which lost its fifth straight game and 18th in 22 games. Bamba, who has gotten significantly more playing time since the team waived Khem Birch, shot 8 of 11 overall and 5 of 6 from 3-point range. He topped his previous high of 19 points set two games ago.

The Magic are 2-7 since trading Nikola Vucevic, Evan Fournier, Aaron Gordon and others at the NBA's trade deadline on March 25.

"I just told the guys that we're going to have some nights like this because it's where we're at," Magic coach Steve Clifford said. "Listen, it was a bad performance, I'm in charge of the team and we've got to do better."

Celtics 105, Nuggets 87

DENVER — Jayson Tatum and Jaylen Brown fueled a 31-3 run that helped the Boston Celtics put the skids on the NBA's hottest team with a 105-87 victory over the Denver Nuggets.

The Nuggets looked well on their way to their ninth straight victory when they took a 79-65 lead in the third quarter on a 3-pointer by Facundo Campazzo.

Boston outscored the Nuggets 40-8 the rest of the way. The Celtics had been held to 16 first-quarter points and trailed by 14 early on.
