Citrus COVID-19 daily update

Twenty-five new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest FDOH update. One new hospitalization was reported; no new deaths were reported.

To date in the county, 1,539 people have tested positive (including four non-residents), 148 have been hospitalized and 36 have died.

COVID-19 testing offered

The Florida Department of Health in Citrus County (DOH-Citrus) will no longer require appointments for drive-thru COVID-19 testing at the Citrus Springs Community Center, 1570 W. Citrus Springs Blvd., Citrus Springs.

Testing will be offered at no cost to adults and children 12 and older, with or without symptoms; however, it will be limited to the first 150 individuals.

Registration starts at 7:30 a.m. followed by testing at 8. Do not arrive earlier than 7:30 a.m.

DOH-Citrus' viral tests check samples from your respiratory system with an oral swab to tell you if you currently have an infection. Additional testing sites include:

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Census deadline worries grow

New deadline could cost Florida billions in federal funding, congressional seat

The U.S. Census Bureau's new deadline to finish the decennial headcount likely ensures census undercounts in Florida that could

cost the state billions over the next 10 years and douses its long-shot hopes of picking up a third new congressional seat.

The deadline to finish the count, which determines federal and state allocations for the next

decade, now is Sept. 30, four weeks earlier than planned since spring.

The bureau reported Monday that 93 million households, nearly 63% of all households in the nation, have self-responded to the

census and at least 60 million households remain uncoun-  
ted. They will need to be ferreted out by 500,000 door-knockers the bureau said it is dispatching to the streets this month.

Workshop to address interchange

Board to discuss new West Cardinal Street Interchange proposal

The public will have a chance Tuesday, Aug. 11, to find out more about what is planned near the new Suncoast Parkway interchange at West Cardinal Street in Homosassa

The board will discuss at a workshop a proposed new Future Land Use Map Category at the new Cardinal Street Interchange within an area previously designated as an Interchange Management Area (IMA).

West Cardinal is of particular interest because it is a mixture of mostly rural land uses and — unlike State Road 44, where the new toll road will end for now — the interchange will drastically alter the look of that road. County officials want to make sure development near that interchange is managed and doesn't turn into sprawl.

"The underlying goal behind this whole plan is having quality development there — quality mixed-use development," County Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said. "We just don't want additional gas stations taking up acreage on every corner of these interchanges."

Kinnard said the interchange is ideal for light industrial and manufacturing centers, which could transport goods via the road to Tampa.

Because this is a workshop, the board will not vote on the plan and the public may speak at the discretion of the chairman.

Gissy pulls rezoning application for resort

DUNNELLON — Westgate Resorts has pulled its application with Dunnellon to rezone a property buffering the Rainbow River with plans to build a luxury resort, campground and RV park.

Jim Gissy, the owner of the Rainbow River Ranch property in question and vice president of Westgate, said on Tuesday, Aug. 4, 2020, Westgate withdrew the application Monday, Aug. 3, because it was

"too much risk and work to try development without government and community support."

"No hard feelings," he added. "Life goes on."

The application with the City, which sought a zoning and land-use change to 89 acres adjacent to the river, County Road 484 and Hendrix Drive, wasn't finalized and had yet to be reviewed by the planning commission, City Council or the public. Part of the application process included a traffic study.

Lightning strike  
suspected in  
house fire

Citrus County Fire Rescue crews were dispatched to a residential structure fire at 3:14 pm on Friday, Aug. 7, 2020, on North Wiley Post Way in Hernando.

Engine 5 from Hernando arrived on scene first at 3:26 pm to find an approximately 4,000-square-foot, two-story wood frame and concrete block single family residence 50% involved. The caller reported seeing lightning strike and secondary to the witnessed lightning strike, the caller reported seeing flames and smoke coming from the second story.

Crews made an aggressive defensive attack until the bulk of the fire was knocked down. Once able, a search of the interior was completed and determined that there were no occupants in the home.

The power company was contacted to secure the power and Duke Energy arrived shortly after to remove the meter. The fire was called under control at 4:37 pm. Units from Pine Ridge, Citrus Springs, DeRosa, Kensington, the Highlands, as well as Chief 1, Battalion Chief 1 and the Rehab Unit from Citrus Springs responded.

There were no injuries reported. The structure was a total loss. After an extensive mop up and overhaul, crews cleared the scene at 10:30 p.m.

The Florida State Fire Marshal was contacted to investigate.

CR city council to meet virtually

Agenda: Riverwalk update, 'Xtreme' triathlon, commercial paddlecraft vendors

During the July 13, 2020, Crystal River City Council meeting, City Manager Ken Frink presented options for managing the use of the city's launch facilities by commercial paddlecraft vendors, and council members unanimously approved to designate Kings Bay Park, effective Aug. 17, 2020, as the only city launch allowable for commercial paddlecraft.

At the upcoming Crystal River City Council meeting Monday, Aug. 10, 2020, Frink is scheduled to give a status update.

He will also ask the council to authorize Mayor Joe Meek to send letters to the Florida Division of State Lands, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service asking for their consent to annex the southern half of Kings Bay, currently under county management.

According to the Aug. 10

agenda, Frink notes: "On a local level, responsibilities are shared between the City and County due to an arbitrary political boundary that divides the bay in half.

"The north half is in the City and south half in the County. This leads to inconsistent local rules and enforcement. In an effort to have one consistent managing body, set of rules, and enforcement, it is recommended that the southern half of the bay be annexed into the City of Crystal River." Also on the agenda:

■ **Update on the Riverwalk project.** The city had hoped to receive state funding for its completion, but it was among Gov. Ron DeSantis' \$1 billion veto list that accompanied the state's \$92.2 billion budget that went into effect July 1, 2020.

■ **Triamerica Foundation** has submitted a special event permit application for the 2020 Florida Xtreme Triathlon to be held

Friday, Nov. 13, 2020, at Hunter Springs Park, the same location as last year for the swim portion of the competition.

■ **Vote to award Commercial Fence, LLC of Dunnellon** the \$23,480 contract for the Copeland

Park fence replacement project, which includes increasing the height of the fence portion in the area of the basketball courts from 8 feet to 10 feet to prevent balls from bouncing up and over into the lake.

Italy's pioneering comic actor, Franca Valeri, dies at 100

ROME — Franca Valeri, an elegant, ironic and versatile actor who pioneered female comic roles in Italy's post-war years and helped the nation laugh at its foibles, has died at 100.

The Corriere della Sera newspaper quoted her daughter, **Stefania Bonfadelli**, an opera singer, as saying that Valeri died in her sleep at her home in Rome on Sunday, nine days after her 100th birthday.

Milanese by birth but Roman by adoption, Valeri will be honored with a wake Monday at a theater in the Italian capital, Rome's City Hall announced.

Beloved by Italians, especially for her roles in the 1950s to the 1970s, first on radio, then on TV and in movies, Valeri was recently toasted by many celebrities and in interviews as her 100th birthday approached.

President **Sergio Mattarella** sent a condolence message, praising Valeri as a "versatile and popular actress who will remain in the hearts of Italians for her great talent and her extraordinary likability."

Valeri was a sophisticated, intelligent comic interpreter of post-war Italian society and often wrote the scripts or monologues for her performances, especially on stage.

Signature roles featured comic scenes in which she appeared solo, holding a phone, real or imaginary, including as "Signorina Snob," a role for which she drew upon her Milanese bourgeois roots. Another popular comic character she created poked fun at Roman middle-class vulgarities.

After decades in which comic

roles in Italy were virtually the exclusive province of men, Valeri held her own against top male comic actors, starring against Toto and **Alberto Sordi**. Of the six films she made with Sordi, arguably her most popular role came in "Il Vedovo" (The Widower), a 1959 hit directed by **Dino Risi**, a master of Italian comedy films.

Often self-ironic, Valeri once wrote a movie script in which she proposed playing sister roles with **Sophia Loren** and sent the proposal to **Carlo Ponti**, the producer who was Loren's husband.

Asked in a recent interview about the secret to her long-running success, Valeri replied: "I tried to maintain being classy."

Back injury forces Simon Cowell off 'America's Got Talent'

Cowell broke his back Saturday while testing his new electric bicycle at his home in California and was to undergo surgery that evening, according to a spokesperson for the entertainment mogul.

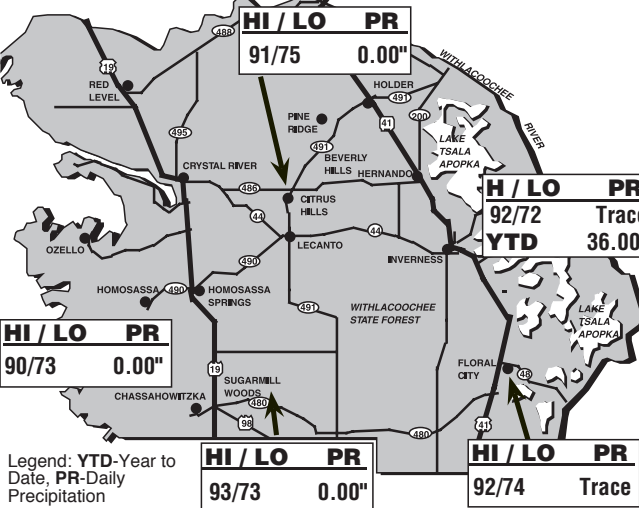
He will be absent when NBC's "America's Got Talent" kicks off its run of live shows beginning Tuesday and Wednesday, the network said Sunday.

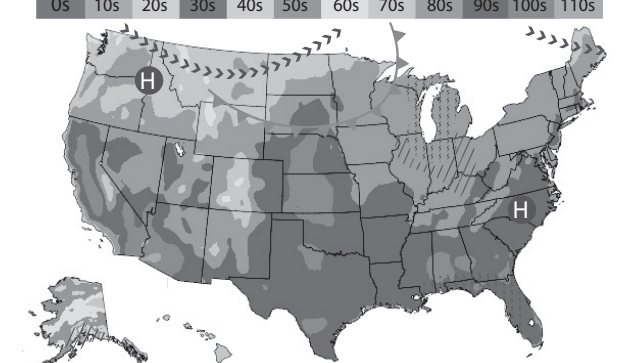

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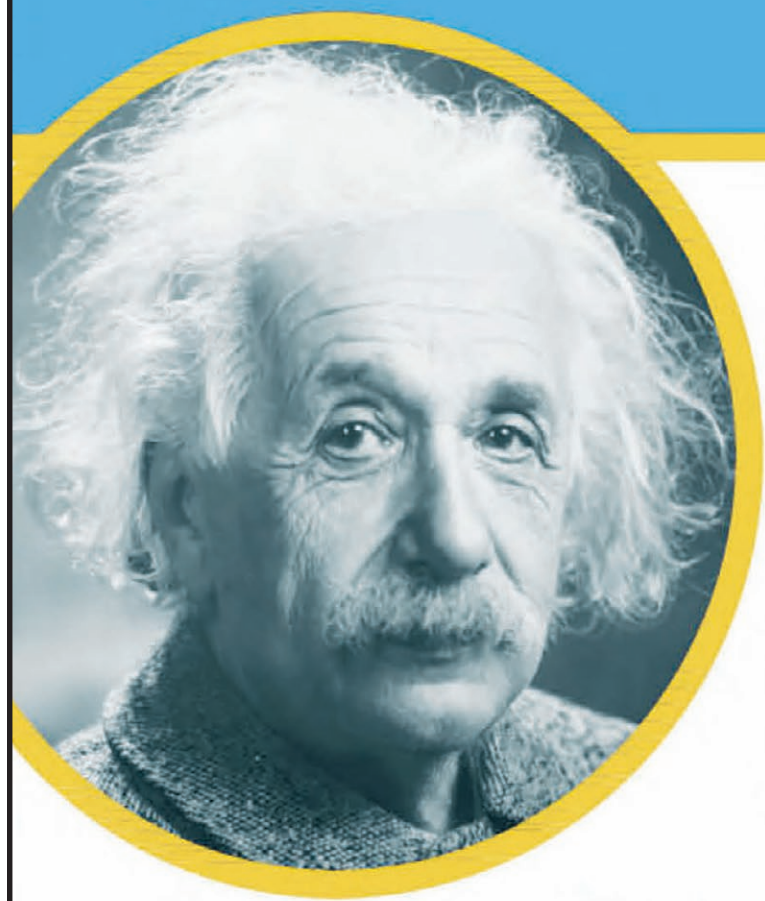

More than 41% of households in Florida failed to self-report and remained uncounted as of late July, Census Bureau Assistant Regional Manager Marilyn Stephens told the Capitol News Service.

“So Florida’s not pleased with where it is right now, and that’s why we are working so hard on this push to get more households to self-respond,” Stephens said.

Areas with undercounts face significant repercussions in not receiving their share of \$700 billion in annual federal funding

— a projected \$1.5 trillion through 2030 — to be distributed by census-based formulas.

An estimated 200,670-person undercount in the 2000 census cost Florida about \$225 million annually, or more than \$2.5 billion over the decade, according to the bureau.

An estimated 1.4 million undercount in Florida’s 2010 census — the third-highest in the nation — cost the state more than \$20 billion in federal allocations this decade, the bureau estimated.

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic skewed the Census Bureau’s timelines and the headcount was accelerated by a month, an Urban Institute study predicted Florida’s Hispanic

and Black populations would be undercounted and its white population overcounted, making the state’s census among the nation’s most inaccurate.

The Washington-based nonpartisan think tank outlined three scenarios in its census projections, with anywhere from 97,000 to 320,000 people — roughly the population of Orlando — going uncounted, at least.

Urban Institute researchers concluded the census will fail to count about 2.4% of Black Americans and 2% of Hispanic Americans while slightly overcounting second home owners and seasonal residents, who tend to be seniors and white.

Florida ranks 11th among states in Black residents who

comprise about 18% of the state’s population and sixth in total Hispanic share of the population, 27%.

Florida was slow to gear up for the census. After maintaining for months the headcount was best left to the bureau and more than 120 local committees across the state, Gov. Ron DeSantis appointed Lt. Gov. Jeanette Nunez in January to lead a 19-member Florida Complete Count Committee.

Unlike California, which has spent nearly \$200 million preparing for the 2020 census — New York City spent \$40 million and Illinois spent \$29 million — Florida did not allocate money for the census.

What may have spurred

DeSantis to join 45 other states in lending executive assistance to the headcounters was the outside potential of qualifying for a third new congressional district.

The bureau estimated in January that Florida’s population was 21.48 million, which means the state virtually is assured of adding two members to its 27-member Congressional delegation and gaining two votes in the Electoral College.

Virginia-based political consulting firm Election Data Services, however, projected Florida was about 172,000 people away from adding another seat, nearly 200,000 people closer to qualifying for a third new congressional district than it was in 2018.

There’s an application in process at the Southwest Florida Water Management District to construct a couple of docks and a boardwalk for “private, family-use only” on wetlands along the east bank of the river at the property.

Gissy presented tentative plans for the property at a City workshop in November 2019. The proposal included a restaurant and hotel, 250 RV units, luxury glamping (“glamorous camping”) units and teepees, an activity center or assembly space and a parking lot, which Gissy suggested could help ease crowding at Blue

Run Park.

The vision for the project, Gissy said, was inspired by the Westgate River Ranch Resort & Rodeo along the Kissimmee River in Polk County.

The presentation was met with a mix of encouragement and caution, but opposition to development on the river began picking up steam in recent months as the initial application came nearer to finalization. City Administrator Dawn Bowne said one or more educational workshops involving the City Council and the public would be held on the project before it went before the planning commission.

The issue loomed large over the city’s political outlook, on issues ranging from planned growth to Rainbow River usage.

Those voicing opposition to development most frequently cited an increased threat to the health of the river; an increase in local traffic and a change to the immediate area’s scenic makeup. Proponents of the development pointed to a potential improvement in local jobs and the economy and an increase in city revenue, as the property is within the city limits.

The project served as a backdrop to other recent issues before the council, including impact fees, which guarantee more city revenue in the case of development. It was also linked to a current effort by the City Council to remove two planning commission members, Louise Kenny and Mary Ann Hilton.

City Attorney Andrew Hand, directed by a consensus of the City Council, provided a legal opinion on a potential conflict of interest in the future by the two members who are also members of the Rainbow River Conservation (RRC). The report argued that — since the RRC appears to oppose the development in its distributed literature, and since the development application would come before the planning commission, and since the two members have a “contractual” relationship with RRC in their act of paying dues — a potentiality for conflict is greater due to the members’ membership in an organization that openly opposes a development that figured to come before the planning

commission. The report recommended the members consult the state Ethics Commission for more specific legal guidance.

The Dunnellon City Council in July voted 4-1 (Councilman Bill White opposed) on a motion to begin the process for removing the planning commission members. A public hearing will be Monday, Aug. 10, at Dunnellon city hall.

The complaint that sparked momentum on the contentious planning commission issue came from planning member John Pierpont, who recused himself from a vote on changing the city’s well-head and aquifer protection zones because members of his family own property near the water tower by Dunnellon

Christian Academy that would be affected by the proposed changes. Pierpont raised a conflict of interest concern to the Council regarding Kenny and Hilton because Dr. Burt Eno, president of the RRC, submitted a paper warning about the changes to the aquifer and well-head protections. Eno’s paper was not a submission on behalf of the RRC.

At its meeting on Aug. 10, the city will have a public hearing on the well-head proposal, which seeks to change the content of wellhead zone development protection definitions to align with that of Marion County’s and to move the code from the city’s comprehensive plan to the more amenable future land-use designations.

He said Tom earned his degree in physiology, graduating in 1962 and got a job offer for a coaching job in Ohio, across the river from the university. There he taught science, physical education and served as head football coach. He was also pursuing his master’s degree at Xavier in Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 1972, Tom brought his young family back to Central Florida where he got a job as head coach at Inverness High School, Luke said.

It was there that he had a little rivalry with two family members — a sporting rivalry. He came up against family members from his home county — his brother Dale Swain as head coach for Bushnell and his brother-in-law, Mike Wood as head coach for Wildwood.

He said his uncle Dale would always joke that Tom only won because he had a player named Larry Key, who went on to be a successful college athlete at Florida State University.

He quoted Dale as saying, “He only had two plays, Larry Key left and Larry Key right.”

According to his bio on the Seminole.com website, Key became the first player in Florida State history to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 1,117 as a senior in 1977. He served as a captain on that team that finished 10-2. Over his career from 1974-77, Key broke game, season and career marks for rushing.

He gained over 100 yards 10 times and finished with 2,953 career yards as a Seminole. His 97-yard run against VPI in 1976 was the longest run ever by a Seminole. Key also set four kick return records and was the national leader in all-purpose yardage in 1977. By his senior year, Florida State fans had adopted the habit of shaking their keys every time he touched the ball.

Dale added to it — he said Tom had another outstanding outside running back that played for him the second two years and then it was “outside left” and “outside right.”

Dale said his brother was outstanding coach.

During Tom’s time with Inverness High School, Tom led the team to three district championships and a battle for two state titles and he was named Mid-Florida Conference Coach of the Year twice in those four years.

According to the family,

he was also named Citrus County Man of the Year in 1974.

On Wednesday, April 7, 1976, he announced a change in his life. Tom was going into politics, pursuing the job as tax collector for Sumter County — a job that was held at the time by Doris Beville.

“Because he felt that if he lost the least bit of interest in football coaching that he would leave it. He always wanted to give more than 110 percent,” said Mrs. Swain.

“To me, Dad was everybody’s friend. Dad never met anybody he didn’t like,” Luke said, noting that if someone walked into his office, for the first time or not, it was like “he had known them his whole life. I just assumed that he did know all these people.”

Tom spent 36 years as Sumter County’s tax collector, until he decided to retire.

Agreeing with Luke, Chris said Tom loved people and never met a stranger.

“He was a great encourager,” said Chris, adding that being a coach, “... just gave him foresight to say things in a way that you needed to hear and in a way that you could receive. I don’t want to say

that he was always coaching, but he was always investing.”

“He was a great encouragement to me,” Chris said, adding not only in his education but in being a family man and raising kids.

He was “just a tremendous grandparent to my boys,” traveling to all their sports games, even in the rain.

“Up until last year, he’d want to come down and watch the boys play,” so they would wheel him to watch.

“He never seemed to tire,” Chris said.

“He was a believer in Jesus,” said Chris, who added that he had the “privilege to go on at least two mission trips with him.”

“He always had a servant’s heart.”

His wife, Rita McNeal Swain said, “He was a kind man who suffered these last 10 years with a strong inner strength. He contributed a great deal to

Sumter County and the State of Florida.

“Tom enjoyed life and had an aura about him that people automatically liked him. He will really be missed,” she said.

Tom’s sister, Peggy Swain, said Tom was “a daredevil” of sorts. He just didn’t water ski, he could ski with his feet — barefoot skiing, she said.

Then there was the alligator: Peggy said one day when she was still in elementary school, she came home to find a 5-foot live alligator tied to the water spigot in their yard on Noble Avenue.

She doesn’t recall if it was dinner, but she does remember that her brother had wrestled it to bring it home.

Her husband Mike said he would be forever

indebted to Tom.

“The man saved my life,” he said, explaining that they had been at a family function at Tom and Peggy’s parent’s home, back in 1979, when Mike began to choke on a piece of meat.

“He (Tom) lifted me up off the ground and kept squeezing and squeezing,” until the food released.

“He said he learned it while coaching over at Citrus,” Mike said, adding that he told him, “I’m sure glad you sent to school on that day. Tom was a friend to everybody. He treated

everybody the same. He was well liked — a real good man.”

Mike said he would go the extra mile to help the kids out, as well as families and residents.

“He really cared about people and wanted to help people.”

Pointing out his dad was a fighter and always encouraged healthy habits, Luke said he always encouraged them to work out for their health, even at a young age and before it was a big thing.

“You better get your workout today because you’re never going to be able to go back and get it,” Luke quoted his dad as saying, noting that even two days before he passed away, he was lying in bed doing arm lifts.

He loved hunting and they hunted Richloam, Green Swamp and Appalachicola — with an annual trip to Idaho for elk.

“He loved to fish as well.”

And he had three rules, Luke said with humor, quoting his dad.

“I don’t hunt in Georgia, I don’t fish in brown water and I don’t hit yellow golf balls.”

Luke said even though Georgia deer might be a little bigger, his dad was more than happy to hunt Central Florida.

Tom was born to Earl and Margaret “Helen” (Sharpe) Swain and has three siblings — Dale, Peggy and Patsy Hall.

It was his athletic ability that earned him the college scholarships to Middle Georgia College and then Morehead State University in Kentucky.

He spent time as president of the Florida Tax Collector’s Association and a member of the Wildwood Rotary Club and other service organizations.

**Florida’s coronavirus stats dip**

*Reports 77 deaths, 6,229 new cases*

TALLAHASSEE — Florida saw a decline in coronavirus deaths and new cases on Sunday, with 77 reported fatalities and 6,229 reported new cases.

That compares to 187 new deaths and 8,502 confirmed cases reported Saturday. Still, the average number of deaths reported over the last seven days is 158.

And the number of hospitalizations due to the virus crept up slightly. The state reported 6,857 patients were being treated in hospitals because of the virus, compared to 6,836 the day before. Miami-Dade County had the most hospitalizations with 1,510, followed by Broward County with 909.

As the state grappled with the pandemic, hundreds of early voting sites were open across the state. On Saturday, more than 40,000 people cast ballots in person ahead of the Sept. 18 primary. In the county hit hardest by the virus, Miami-Dade, nearly 23,000 have cast ballots in person since early voting

began Monday.

But voting was light in many areas, and there’s been a significant increase in vote-by-mail ballot requests. In Glades County, a rural area to the west of Lake Okeechobee, 52 people had cast in-person ballots as of early Sunday afternoon, compared to 882 that had cast ballots by mail.

And some of the state’s school districts were set to reopen Monday despite a lawsuit filed by the Florida Education Association seeking a delay.

Republican state Rep. Randy Fine is one of at least three Florida lawmakers who have tested positive for the virus. In a Twitter post over the weekend, he shared his lung X-rays compared to healthy lungs as a message about how serious the virus is.

“Here are your lungs. Here are my lungs with 30 percent Covid damage. (White cloudy is bad). Any questions? I can answer one — this ain’t the flu. And ‘recovery’ is a very subjective, and long-term, question,” Fine tweeted.

Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis had no public events scheduled Sunday.

**Early voting begins as Florida grapples with virus**

*4.2 million voters have requested a vote-by-mail ballot*

TALLAHASSEE — Statewide in-person early voting began Saturday in Florida while the state continues to grapple with a high number of coronavirus cases.

Hundreds of early voting sites were open across Florida’s 67 counties, though it appeared that many were seeing light traffic 10 days ahead of a primary election with no statewide races on the ballot.

“No lines, no waiting,” said Hillsborough County Supervisor of Elections Craig Latimer. “We’ve got a couple of sites that are busier than others, which is not unusual, but there’s really no waiting right now.”

Voters are mainly choosing party nominees for Congress and the state Legislature, as well as voting in local elections. While both parties have pushed voters to cast ballots by mail in recent elections, this year there’s been a stronger push during the pandemic.

Latimer has noticed a huge increase in vote-by-mail ballot requests.

“We are seeing a real uptick in mail-in ballots, that’s for sure,” he said. “We’ve gotten back more than 107,000 mail-in ballots, and that’s more than the vote-by-mail and early vote for the 2016 primary.”

More than 4.2 million Florida voters have requested a vote-by-mail ballot, and nearly 1.5 million had been returned

by Saturday morning, according to a Department of State website. That compares to nearly 1.3 million cast in the entire 2016 primary election. With 2.7 million ballots still not returned, this primary will far surpass the totals from four years ago.

Florida has had nearly 527,000 confirmed coronavirus cases, leading to more than 8,200 deaths.

By law, early voting must be offered beginning 10 days before an election through the third day before the election. But counties can choose to begin early voting 15 days before an election through the second day before an election.

Hillsborough County, which includes Tampa, began early voting

Monday and has had more than 9,000 votes cast at 24 early voting sites. But the turnout has widely varied, including one early voting site that only had one voter come in on Wednesday.

Before early voting began statewide Saturday, more than 107,000 voters cast ballots in person in counties that had already opened polls.

Precautions are being taken at poll sites. Latimer said that voters are given a stylus pen to sign in, and another pen to fill out ballots and are being told to keep both as a souvenir rather than have them passed along to other voters. Plexiglas is set up between poll workers and voters, and there are markings on the floor to ensure social distancing and a one-way flow of traffic.

“We’re doing our best to provide a safe and healthy environment,” he said.

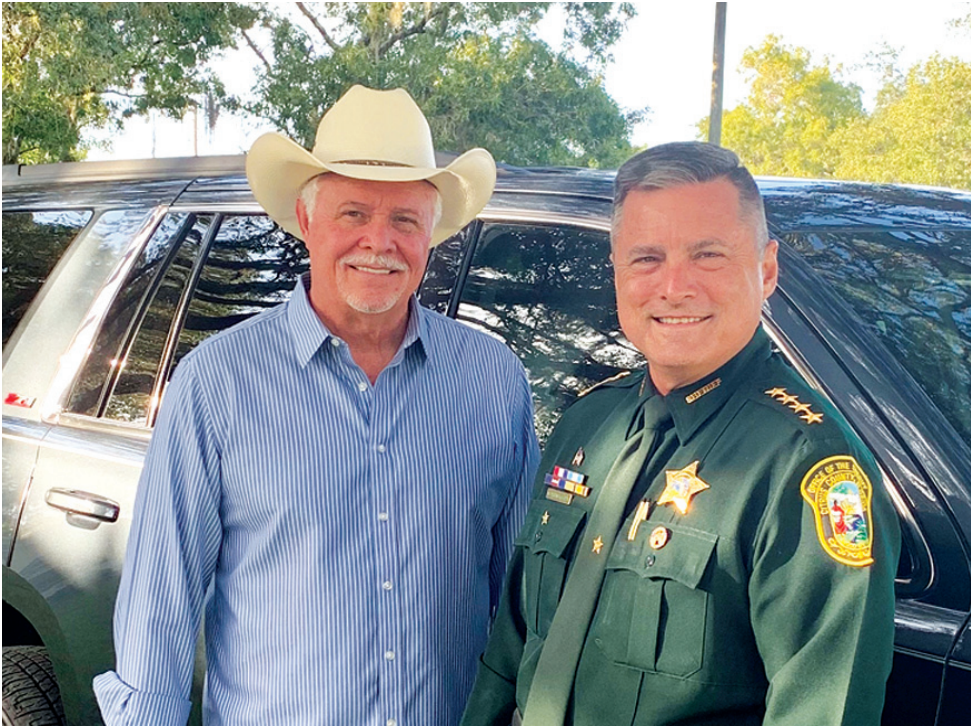

# For pandemic jobless, the only real certainty is uncertainty

CHICAGO — For three decades, Kelly Flint flourished as a corporate travel agent, sending everyone from business titans to oil riggers around the planet. Then came the worst pandemic in a century, leaving her jobless and marooned in an uncertain economy.

Furloughed since March, Flint has dipped into her retirement account to pay her bills, frustrated that her \$600 weekly emergency federal aid payments have expired. She yearns, too, for an end to the twin disasters that now dominate her life: recession and pandemic.

“I don’t deal well with the unknowns,” she says. “I never have.”

Across America are legions of Kelly Flints, women and men who don’t know when they’ll receive another paycheck — or if.

The COVID-19 outbreak and resulting economic upheaval have thrown millions of lives into disarray. Industries have collapsed, businesses closed, jobs disappeared. Compounding the misery is a question no one can answer: When will this all be over?

If 2020 had to be condensed into a single word — and there are many, many words to describe it — uncertainty would hover at the top of the list. Uncertainty about health. About the future. About the country itself. And uncertainty about livelihoods and jobs and economic security in a historical moment where each

day seems to bring a fresh wave of unwanted developments.

America has faced economic calamity before, most recently during the recession of 2008, when the jobless rate soared to 10%. That pales in comparison to the two crises that have cost more than 160,000 American lives and ushered in spiraling unemployment — 30 million job losses, of which 17.5 million people remain unemployed.

Uncertainty, painted onto the landscape by the numbers. And behind each one, a human being. Here are some of their thoughts:

■ “I’ll either be here or I’ll build my peace elsewhere. ... I can’t get wrapped up in the unknowns when I have blessings in front of me.” — LISA VINES, 56, of Memphis, Tennessee, laid off in March from her sales job at a promotional product company where she’d worked for 20 years.

■ “I’ve learned that you can’t possibly plan for everything and, though it’s a cliché, you’ve just got to roll with the punches. And I’ve learned to go where the next thing leads me. Hopefully, that will be soon.” — JARED SAIGH of Iron River, Michigan, laid off in 2019 from a marketing company. He was then hired to lead a nonprofit attached to his local hospital, but the offer was rescinded after the pandemic swooped in.

■ “This is a day-to-day process, and I can’t worry about the things I cannot change.” — JAMES JACKSON, 51, of Florida, who lost his job as a hospitality

worker after his workplace closed in March. He’s now looking for a warehouse job and worries about having enough food for his kids, 8 to 18, and being able to afford school supplies and clothes.

■ “There are certain things you can’t control, and you have to let it go. I can’t control the pandemic. I can’t control the job market. ... In the back of my mind, there’s still a tiny drawer of anxiety and worry. ... But I’m starting to tell myself, ‘Listen, you’re going to be fine.’” — BRETT LIPSHUTZ, 46, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, who lost his job as a bilingual software trainer when the pandemic hit. He’s starting a tofu business with friends and expects to be able to teach French in the Milwaukee public high schools this fall.

■ “I feel like I don’t have very much of a purpose now.” — MORGAN GITH- MARK, 24, of North Carolina, who had to quit her marketing job in March because it involved face-to-face encounters with customers at big-box stores. She is diabetic and has an increased chance of serious illness if she contracts the coronavirus.

■ “I’m the type of person who, if I have an idea of what I’m facing, I can try to make a plan that makes sense. But you don’t really know what it is you need to do.” — MICAH ANDERSON, 37, who lost his job when the Portland, Oregon, club where he tended bar was forced to close in the pandemic’s early days. Now he walks almost everywhere. He has reduced his food budget to essentials. He

doesn’t go out with friends. He’s become politically active, calling the offices of federal lawmakers, urging them to back a bill creating a \$120 billion fund to help rescue restaurants and bars.

■ “At the end of the day, the only person who’s going to get me out of this is me.” — DEANNA KOUSKOULAS, 30, of Michigan, who was laid off from a copywriting-marketing job in suburban Detroit after six months of work. She’s now interviewing for jobs, preparing for the post-pandemic era. She spends part of every morning sharpening and expanding her skills, studying graphic design on YouTube, among other things, “so I can come out strong when things do go back to normal.”

Uncertainty ripples outward. There are so many things that, because of it, simply can’t be done.

Job uncertainty is new for Flint, 53, the travel agent. She’s never been unemployed, and it’s “doubly scary,” she says, because she’s single.

Every week, she sends out fresh resumes from her home in Galveston, Texas. “I’ve had anxiety that I’ve never had before. I’ve even had panic attacks. I’ve had crazy dreams of zombies,” she says. “It has worn on me.”

For Micah Anderson, the uncertainty has been the hardest part — “having zero idea of what next week is going to even look like.”

“You just have no clue. You make decisions the best you can. And you hope that they turn out OK.”

CHECK THE FACTS

Virus myths multiply online

The purpose of a myth is to explain something the individual does not understand. Myths are older than recorded history, and times of political or social unrest often lead to new myths to explain issues of the moment. Couple the penchant of mankind to look for ways to explain what the individual does not understand with the ready availability of a method to spread information to a wide audience and we have what we have seen during the coronavirus pandemic, where social media is a sometimes toxic mix of fact and myth.

Current myths about this disease cover the waterfront, from masks to cures to source of the disease, how it is transmitted, or who is susceptible to it. These are posted on social media, and often reposted by someone who knows nothing about the original poster or the facts in the post.

In many instances, misinformation spread on social media is relatively harmless, perhaps causing people to think one way or another, or to buy some product or another. But when dealing with a potentially deadly disease, misinformation can have serious consequences, even leading to illness and/or death.

During this pandemic, misinformation on social media has been partly driven by the lack of consistent and factual messages from all levels of government, from the president to the governor to local officials. There have been mixed messages at all levels, and without strong factual guidance from the national level, there have been different messages from 50 different states and countless county and city officials.

This fosters an environment in which misinformation flourishes like weeds growing rampantly in a garden that is not carefully tended.

But how are individuals with no training in medicine or epidemiology to sort out the truthful information from the bogus? One researcher, Washington State University digital literacy expert Mike Caulfield, suggests a method to help sort factual information from misinformation. He uses the acronym SIFT to describe the process. The letters stand for Stop, Investigate the source, Find better coverage, and Trace claims, quotes or media from the posting.

First is Stop. Don’t accept or share a claim until you have checked it out. Next, Investigate the source cited in the post. Is the person making the statement a scientist or someone trained in the area, or is it simply a blog post?

Third, Find better coverage. This means doing a quick search to see if this claim or statement is consistent with other information from reliable sources on the topic. This can be done with a quick Google search, or by checking with a fact-checking organization.

Finally, Trace claims by looking for the original source of the information. Is it a scientific paper, or a story by a reputable news organization, or is it a blog post by some unknown person or something that has circulated around social media for months or years? The source matters.

Also, do a quick search about that individual to see if they are generally considered reputable, or if they have a history of misinformation and/or unsubstantiated claims.

This kind of checking doesn’t have to be too time-consuming or laborious, but a quick check of the information can help you as an individual avoid spreading misinformation, and it can help keep you from acting based on misinformation that can do you or others harm.

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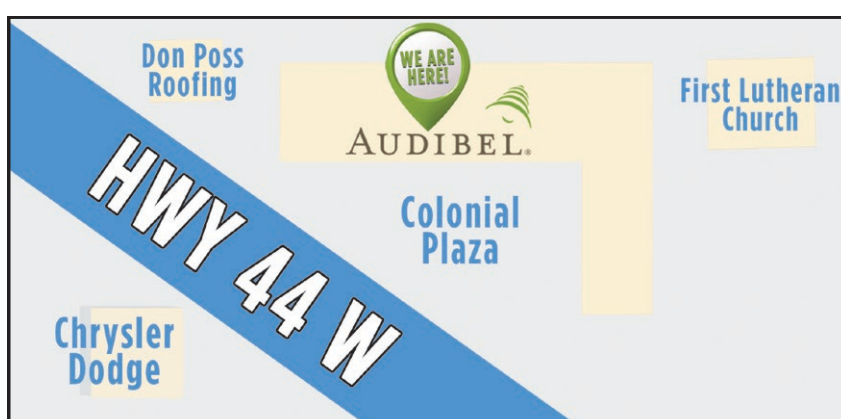
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# US virus issues irk Europe

*Confirmed cases top 5 million*

ROME — With confirmed coronavirus cases in the U.S. hitting 5 million Sunday, by far the highest of any country, the failure of the most powerful nation in the world to contain the scourge has been met with astonishment and alarm in Europe.

Perhaps nowhere outside the U.S. is America's bungled virus response viewed with more consternation than in Italy, which was ground zero of Europe's epidemic. Italians were unprepared when the outbreak exploded in February, and the country still has one of the world's highest official death tolls at over 35,000.

But after a strict nationwide, 10-week lockdown, vigilant tracing of new clusters and general acceptance of mask mandates and social distancing, Italy has become a model of virus containment.

"Don't they care about their health?" a mask-clad Patrizia Antonini asked about people in the United States as she walked with friends along the banks of Lake Bracciano, north of Rome. "They need to take our precautions. ... They need a real lockdown."

Much of the incredulity in Europe stems from the fact that America had the benefit of time, European experience and medical know-how to treat the virus that the continent

itself didn't have when the first COVID-19 patients started filling intensive care units.

More than four months into a sustained outbreak, the U.S. reached the 5 million mark, according to the running count kept by Johns Hopkins University. Health officials believe the actual number is perhaps 10 times higher, or closer to 50 million, given testing limitations and the fact that as many as 40% of all those who are infected have no symptoms.

"We Italians always saw America as a model," said Massimo Franco, a columnist with daily Corriere della Sera. "But with this virus we've discovered a country that is very fragile, with bad infrastructure and a public health system that is nonexistent."

With America's

world's-highest death toll of more than 160,000, its politicized resistance to masks and its rising case-load, European nations have barred American tourists and visitors from other countries with growing cases from freely traveling to the bloc.

France and Germany are now imposing tests on arrival for travelers from "at risk" countries, the U.S. included.

"I am very well aware that this impinges on individual freedoms, but I believe that this is a justifiable intervention," German Health Minister Jens Spahn said last week.

Mistakes were made in Europe, too, from delayed lockdowns to insufficient protections for nursing home elderly and critical shortages of tests and protective equipment for

medical personnel.

Hard-hit Spain, France, Britain and Germany have seen infection rebounds with new cases topping 1,000 a day, and Italy's cases went over 500 on Friday. Some scientists say Britain's beloved pubs might have to close again if schools are to reopen in September.

Europe as a whole has seen over 207,000 confirmed virus deaths, by Johns Hopkins' count.

In the U.S., new cases are running at about 54,000 a day — an immensely high number even when taking into account the country's large population. And while that's down from a peak of well over 70,000 last month, cases are rising in nearly 20 states, and deaths are climbing in most.

# Nagasaki urges ban on nukes

*75th anniversary of atomic bombing*

TOKYO — The Japanese city of Nagasaki on Sunday marked its 75th anniversary of the U.S. atomic bombing, with the mayor and dwindling survivors urging world leaders including their own to do more for a nuclear weapons ban.

At 11:02 a.m., the moment the B-29 bomber Bockscar dropped a 4.5-ton (10,000-pound) plutonium bomb dubbed "Fat Man," Nagasaki survivors and other participants stood in a minute of silence to honor more than 70,000 dead.

The Aug. 9, 1945, bombing came three days after the United States dropped its first atomic bomb on Hiroshima, the world's first ever nuclear attack that killed 140,000. On Aug. 15, Japan surrendered, ending World War II.

At the event at Nagasaki Peace Park, scaled down because of the coronavirus pandemic, Mayor Tomihisa Taue read a peace declaration in which he raised concern that nuclear states had in recent years retreated from disarmament efforts.

Instead, they are upgrading and miniaturizing nuclear weapons for easier use, he said. Taue singled out the U.S. and Russia for increasing risks by scrapping the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty.

"As a result, the threat of nuclear weapons being used is increasingly becoming real," Taue said. Noting that the Nuclear Proliferation Treaty entered into force 50 years ago, Taue urged the U.S. and Russia to show a (asterisk)workable way(asterisk) towards their nuclear disarmament at the NPT review process next year.

He said that "the true horror of nuclear weapons has not yet been adequately conveyed to the world at large" despite struggle and efforts by hibakusha, or atomic bombing survivors, to make Nagasaki the last place of the tragedy.

He also urged Japan's government and lawmakers to quickly sign the 2017 Treaty on the Prohibition of

Nuclear Weapons.

After taking part in the ceremony, Prime Minister Shinzo Abe criticized the treaty for not being realistic. None of the nuclear states has joined, and it is not widely supported even by non-nuclear states, he said.

"The Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons was adopted without taking into consideration the reality of the harsh national security environment," Abe said at a news conference. "I must say the treaty is different from Japan's position and approach" even though they share the same goal of abolishing nuclear weapons, he said.

Abe has repeatedly refused to sign the treaty. He reiterated that Japan's approach is not to take sides but to serve as a bridge between nuclear and non-nuclear states to encourage dialogue to achieve a total nuclear ban. Survivors and pacifist groups say Japan is virtually siding with the U.S. and other nuclear states.

Abe cited "severe national security environment and a wide gap between the two sides on nuclear disarmament." He also noted Japan faces threats of development and modernization of nuclear weapons from "neighboring countries in

the region."

Taue, who spoke before Abe, disagreed, saying: "Among the nuclear-weapon states and countries under the nuclear umbrella, there have been voices stating that it is too early for such a treaty. That is not so. Nuclear arms reductions are far too late in coming."

While Tokyo renounces its own possession, production or hosting of nuclear weapons, as a U.S. ally Japan hosts 50,000 American troops and is protected by the U.S. nuclear umbrella. The post-WWII security arrangement complicates the push to get Japan to sign the treaty as it beefs up its own military to deal with threats from North Korea and China, among others.

An aging group of survivors have expressed a growing sense of urgency to tell their stories, in hopes of reaching younger generations to continue their effort toward establishing a nuclear-free world.

"There is not much time left for us survivors," said Shigemi Fukabori, 89. He was a 14-year-old student mobilized to work at a shipyard when Nagasaki was bombed.

"I'm determined to keep telling my story so that Nagasaki will be the last place on Earth to have suffered an atomic attack."

### PR halts primary voting in centers lacking ballots

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Puerto Rico on Sunday was forced to partially suspend voting for primaries marred by a lack of ballots as officials called on the president of the U.S. territory's elections commission to resign.

The primaries for voting centers that had not received ballots by early afternoon are expected to be rescheduled, while voting would continue elsewhere, the commission said.

"I have never seen on American soil something like what just has been done here in Puerto Rico. It's an embarrassment to our government and our people," said Pedro Pierluisi, who is running against Gov. Wanda Vázquez, to become the nominee for the pro-statehood New Progressive Party.

Meanwhile, Vázquez called the situation "a disaster" and demanded the resignation of the president of the elections commission.

"They made the people of Puerto Rico, not the candidates, believe that they were prepared," she said. "Today the opposite was evident. They lied."

### DC shooting leaves one dead, some 20 injured

WASHINGTON — A dispute that erupted into gun fire during a large outdoor party in Washington, D.C., early Sunday left one person dead and some 20 others injured, including an off-duty officer "struggling for her life," according to police.

Christopher Brown, 17, died in the shooting that occurred after midnight in a southeast side neighborhood where people had gathered for music and food, Peter Newsham, the chief of the Metropolitan Police Department, told reporters.

"There was some kind of a dispute," Newsham said. "Multiple weapons were produced."

Police said at least three shooters may have been involved, though no arrests were immediately announced. Newsham said a motive for the shooting wasn't clear.

### Earthquake hits North Carolina, damage minor

SPARTA, N.C. — The most powerful earthquake to hit North Carolina in more than 100 years shook much of the state early Sunday, rattling homes, businesses and residents.

The National Weather Service in Greenville said the 5.1-magnitude temblor struck at 8:07 a.m., following a much smaller quake several hours earlier.

There were no reports of injuries, but some minor structural damage was reported in Sparta, as well as cracks in roads. Images on social media also showed items knocked off of grocery store shelves.

Michael Hull was standing in his driveway at his home in Sparta when he noticed a group of deer running.

"Not even a minute passed and the side-to-side motion started," Hull said. "It takes you a minute to realize what's happening, and you just can't believe it. Then it was over. It was loud, like God was shaking a mountain at you, literally."

Karen Backer was in her Greensboro apartment when she heard initially mistook banging in her kitchen for her roommate.

"Nope, it was the cabinet doors 'clinking' open and closed! My neighbors on the other hand said they felt our

apartment building shaking," Backer said. "Well, sadly, nothing surprises me in 2020, but a hurricane and an earthquake in the same week is crazy."

It was the largest earthquake to hit the state since 1916, when a magnitude 5.5 quake occurred near Skyland, the weather service said.

The U.S. Geological Service said the quake's epicenter was about 2.5 miles southeast of Sparta, just south of the Virginia-North Carolina border. The USGS said the population in the affected region resides in structures "that are resistant to earthquake shaking, though vulnerable structures exist."

The quake was felt in nearby states including Virginia, South Carolina and Tennessee.

### Pelosi says election threats aren't equal

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Sunday the threats of interference in the U.S. presidential election from Russia and China are not equal, pointing to a more serious risk with Moscow's efforts to boost President Donald Trump's reelection bid.

"They're not equivalent," said Pelosi, D-Calif. "Russia is actively 24/7 interfering in our election. They did so in 2016, and they are doing so now." She urged intelligence agencies to "put more information out there" on the specific nature of the threats.

An intelligence report last week said Russia was already using a "range of measures" to undercut Trump's Democratic challenger, Joe Biden, and promote Trump with misinformation on social media. The statement Friday by William Evanina, director of the National Counterintelligence and Security Center, also said China does not want Trump to win a second term and has accelerated its criticism of the White House, and that Iran is also hoping Trump will lose.

Pelosi said trying to equate China and Russia on the threat of foreign election interference doesn't tell the story.

### Donors demand change before help for Beirut

BEIRUT — World leaders and international organizations pledged nearly \$300 million in emergency humanitarian aid to Beirut in the wake of the devastating explosion, but warned on Sunday that no money for rebuilding the capital will be made available until Lebanese authorities commit themselves to the political and economic reforms demanded by the people.

Over 30 participants to the international conference offered help for a "credible and independent" investigation into the Aug. 4 Beirut explosion, another key demand of the Lebanese crowds who took to the streets Saturday and Sunday.

In Beirut, two Lebanese Cabinet ministers, including a top aid to the premier, resigned amid signals that the embattled government may be unraveling in the aftermath of the devastating blast that ripped through the capital. The blast killed 160 and wounded 6,000, raising public anger to new levels.

The resignation of Information Minister Manal Abdel-Samad, in which she cited failure to meet the people's aspirations and last week's blast, was followed by a swirl of reports that other ministers were also resigning.

Late Sunday, Environment Minister Demanios Kattar resigned, calling the ruling system "flaccid and sterile."

# Rays rally, stun Yankees in walk-off

## Perez has RBI single in 9th

ST. PETERSBURG — Michael Perez hit an RBI single with two outs in the ninth inning, and the Tampa Bay Rays rallied late to beat the New York Yankees 4-3 on Sunday.

Mike Brosseau started the ninth with a double off Zack Britton (0-1) but was thrown out at third on Brandon Lowe's grounder: Lowe advanced to second on a wild pitch before Manuel Margot walked.

After both runners advanced on Willy Adames' grounder to first, Perez lined a single to right as the Rays took three of four from the AL East leaders.

"I was just trying to put the ball in," Perez said through a translator.

Perez drove in the only run on a sacrifice fly in the Rays' 1-0 victory over New York on Friday night, which was his 28th birthday.

"A good birthday weekend for him," Rays manager Kevin

Cash said.

Brosseau and Lowe both homered in the seventh, when the Rays tied it at 3.

Ryan Thompson (1-0) worked a perfect ninth for his first major league win.

Rays starter Charlie Morton left with right shoulder inflammation after giving up a leadoff walk to Aaron Hicks in the third. The 36-year-old right-hander went 16-6 last year in his first season with Tampa Bay.

"I don't feel like it's a big deal," said Morton, who first felt some tightness in the second inning.

Yankees starter James Paxton took a one-hitter into the seventh before allowing a leadoff double to José Martínez. With one out, Brosseau hit a two-run homer, and two pitches later, Lowe connected for a solo shot.

"Yeah, it definitely stings," New York manager Aaron Boone said. "We had a chance to really salvage the trip. They put some good at-bats together to get back into the game. We take away a lot of good from the way Pax threw the ball."

Paxton gave up four hits and struck out 11 over 6 1/3 innings. "It's a tough one," Paxton said.

Tampa Bay loaded the bases with one out in the eighth and

appeared to go up 4-3 when Hunter Renfroe was ruled safe at first on a potential double-play grounder. The Yankees challenged the call and it was overturned after a video review.

The Yankees took a 3-0 lead in the fifth when Margot misplayed Gio Urshela's fly ball on the warning track in center field for a three-base error with two outs that allowed two runs to score.

Margot was reinstated from the coronavirus-related injured list before the game. He was required to undergo intake screening after going to the Dominican Republic following the death of his father.

The Yankees loaded the bases with one out in the first but scored just one run when Mike Ford was hit by a Morton pitch.

Morton allowed one run and three hits in two-plus innings.

# Major breakthrough

Collin Morikawa delivers a great shot in quiet moment to win PGA

SAN FRANCISCO — The shot will be remembered as one of the best under pressure that hardly anyone witnessed. It made Collin Morikawa a major champion Sunday in a thrill-a-minute PGA Championship that not many will forget.

Morikawa hit driver on the 294-yard 16th hole that was perfect in flight and even better when it landed, hopping onto the green and rolling to 7 feet for an eagle that all but clinched victory on a most quiet Sunday afternoon at Harding Park.

In the first major without spectators, the 23-year-old Californian finished with a bang.

"I was hoping for a really good bounce and got it," he said. "I hit a really good putt, and now we're here."

He closed with a 6-under 64, the lowest final round by a PGA champion in 25 years, for a two-shot victory over Paul Casey and Dustin Johnson, two of 10 players who had a chance on the back nine.

## Sullivan ends title wait at English Championship

WARE, England — An emotional Andy Sullivan ended a near five-year wait for his fourth European Tour title as he recorded a seven-shot victory at the English Championship in Ware.

Heading into the final round at Hanbury Manor with a five-shot advantage, Sullivan saw his lead cut to just two by Spain's Adrian Otaegui (66).

But while his challenger faltered over the closing stages, Sullivan recorded four birdies on the back nine to shoot a 6-under 65 for a 27-under 257 total.
