COUNTY COVID-19 UPATE

Citrus County COVID cases still going up
 According to the Florida Department of Health, 19 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Two new deaths were reported, for a total of 414. To date in the county, 9,882 people have tested positive (including 80 non-residents). No new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 645 hospitalized.

DOH-Citrus vaccine registration system open

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 65 and older and frontline health care workers is now available. Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.

As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and pre-register with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated number is 833-540-2058.

Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.

When calling, get the name of the operator and do not hang up until you receive confirmation the appointment has been made, including the date, time and location of the appointment.

Celebration for 'Coach'



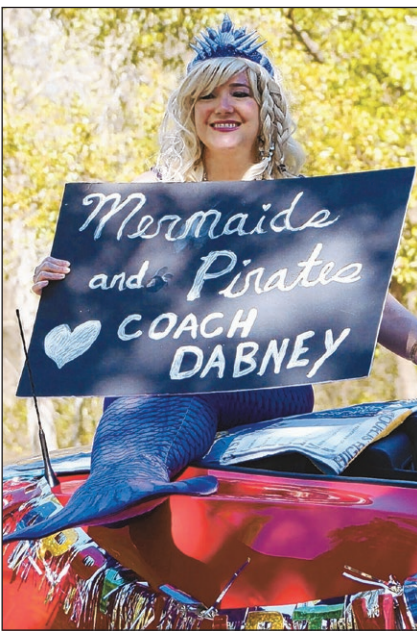

County educator, icon honored with special birthday parade

"Coach" Archie Dabney, a long-time Citrus County educator, was lauded Sunday, March 7, for his 93rd birthday with a drive-by parade outside New Horizon Assisted Living Residence in Inverness. Dabney, who is recuperating from pneumonia and a bad kidney infection and COVID-19, was

recognized by his former students, as well as family members of those one-time pupils. Between 70 and 80 vehicles passed by the facility on Forest Drive, near the entrance of Whispering Pines Park. Most stopped to offer a birthday card and in-person greeting to the beloved Citrus County icon. The event took more than 40 minutes, with Dabney often telling his former students and others, he "appreciated" them coming by. "My Lord," he said as the vehicles continued to roll by. Melody McDaniel, one of "Coach's kids" — those whose lives have been touched by Dabney — and perhaps his most ardent cheerleader, organized the event, calling out to his former students and others in the community to participate in the parade.

BOCC to discuss sewer project

County commissioners Tuesday will discuss spending between \$1.75 million and \$2.25 million in available CARES Act money to install a sewer within the Suncoast Parkway Interchange Management Area (IMA) off West Cardinal Street in Homosassa.

This would be a force main and require no individual assessment for property owners in the area.

The county considers the IMA to drive economic development because of the proximity to the toll road under construction.

The sewer line would run about 1.5 miles west to U.S. 19 and require a lift station. It would take about one year to complete. Once done, it is expected to enhance the marketability of the area.

The county is planning a massive change to Cardinal — mixed-use development with 10- and 20-acre minimum buildable lots to go with the management plan that, if successful, will vastly change rural Cardinal to a mini-town center.

County commissioners in January voted 3-2 to send the town center proposal to the state for review. It will have to come back for a final vote once that review is done.

Also at Tuesday's meeting:
 ■ Board members will consider applying for a \$500,000 federal grant to establish new educational programs at the Inverness Airport that teach technical skills used in aviation maintenance, repair and flight skills.
 ■ Commissioners will discuss county projects currently approved for RESTORE Act funding. That's federal funding that Citrus County and 22 other counties received from the 2010 BP Deepwater Horizon oil spill disaster and to be used for programs, projects and activities that restore and protect the environment and economy. The projects include the \$8.6-million King's Bay Riverwalk project to form one continuous path from the Best Western Crystal River Resort to Kings Bay Park.
 ■ Also in the hopper is the Old Homosassa Heritage Park project, which will include the purchase of 2.02 acres of waterfront property on the Homosassa River. The county commission meeting starts at 1 p.m. Tuesday, March 9, at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave., Inverness. For information about the agenda, visit <https://bit.ly/389U1T0>.

City: People want a new ramp

Crystal River officials say support is there for the city to replace its boat ramp at the end of Northwest Third Avenue.

City Manager Ken Frink told the Chronicle Editorial Board on Wednesday, March 3, a majority of preliminary public response in city surveys wants to have a new boat ramp within

Sailboat Avenue.

"We're going through the numbers now," Frink said about compiling feedback taken before and during an informational open house March 4 at the George Washington Carver Community Center.

Opposition, Frink said, came from the residents who live along West State Park Drive and expressed concern about an increase of traffic on their main roadway.

Frink said roughly 2,000 vehicles travel State Park Drive daily, and the city reached out to Citrus County officials to see how traffic could be better controlled to increase pedestrian safety. "They're ready to cooperate with us," he said.

City staff said the "Third Avenue boat ramp" within the Dockside Shoppes plaza can't coexist with the King's Bay Riverwalk boardwalk, planned to run along the northern shores of Cedar Cove, and looked for a new location within city limits to build a replacement. A pair of sites within the preserve was identified as possibilities: the Mullet Hole, a popular cove off of Sailboat Avenue and the Indian River Canal, or the current boat ramp.

Crystal River began soliciting public input after the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP), which owns the 27,500-acre preserve, wanted to gauge community opinion. Once they get FDEP and City Council approval, city staff will move forward with applying for grants to fund the new ramp's design and permitting.

Crystal River is lobbying Florida lawmakers for the final \$1 million to break ground on its Riverwalk boardwalk later this year in time to finish by March 2022.

Historic replica vessel to set sail

Want to set sail with history?

Members of the Crystal River Boat Builders are inviting the public to attend the launching of their latest historic vessel recreation, the Silver Tide.

Followed by a presentation at 3 p.m. Tuesday, March 9, at the Best Western Crystal River Resort, 614 NW U.S. 19, the replica of the early 1900s fishing boat will launch at 4 p.m.

This will be an outdoor event, following COVID-19 guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

According to the boat builders, the Silver Tide was built using period methods and sports a 100-year-old, six-horsepower inboard motor.

These types of fishing vessels would pull out unpowered skiffs to drop nets, and would keep catches on ice to be kept fresh on the return to shore.

Council to vote on grit cleanup at treatment plant

Crystal River is looking to clean out its water treatment plant for free.

City Council will vote on a pair of motions focused on funding and starting the removal of sand and grit that accumulated at the plant at the end of Northwest 11th Street.

Council members call to order at 5:30 p.m. Monday, March 8, at Crystal River City Hall, 123 NW U.S. 19. They will also meet earlier at 5 p.m. as members of the city's Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) board.

When wastewater travels through a treatment plant, it can leave behind grit made up of asphalt, limestone, concrete, eggshells, coffee grounds, seeds and bone fragments.

If it builds up too much within the plant, the grit can lead to a reduction in efficiency, reduced tank capacities, clogged systems and increased energy costs.

A recent assessment of the city's plant found roughly 63 tons of grit had accumulated in its aeration basins, anoxic tank and headworks, according to the city.

Council's first vote on the grit cleanup is on whether to OK an agreement with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for the department to fund 100% of the project with a

\$84,519 grant the city applied for at the suggestion of its service provider, U.S. Water.

Council's second vote, if approved, would OK a piggyback agreement with U.S. Submergent Technologies, LLC, of Orlando, to do the work.

According to Crystal River staff, there won't be an interruption to water or sewer services during the 30-day process.

Also during Crystal River's government meetings on Monday:

■ Sitting as members of the city CRA board, council will get a look at a trio of staff-approved grant applications from three city businesses getting murals on their storefronts.

These applications were for Crystal River's mini-grants,

which can cover 50% of the mural's cost, but can't exceed \$1,000.

Those who applied and were awarded the grants are: Kane's Cattle Company and its \$2,500 mural; Hunter Springs Kayak and its mural estimated to cost to between \$2,150 and \$3,250; and Manatee Tour and Drive for its mural estimated to cost between \$2,250 and \$2,750.

William Mickey, who's painted murals across the city's downtown and town square, has either been or is expected to be hired to do these artworks.

■ Council members will get an update from Citrus County Sheriff's Office Capt. John Novy on the state of crime, traffic and marine enforcement within Crystal River.

Audiences hold back, even as more movie theaters open

Theaters reopening in New York City this weekend did not set the box office on fire. North American theatrical grosses stayed relatively muted, despite some major new releases like Disney's "Raya and the Last Dragon" and Lionsgate's Tom Holland and Daisy Ridley action flick "Chaos Walking," according to studio estimates Sunday.

Walt Disney Animation's "Raya and the Last Dragon" earned an estimated \$8.6 million from 2,045 locations in North America. The well-reviewed fantasy adventure, featuring the voices of Awkwafina and Kelly Marie Tran, is also available for Disney+ subscribers to rent and stream at home for \$29.99. Streaming grosses were not reported.

Warner Bros. "Tom & Jerry," which is available to stream free for HBO Max subscribers, brought in \$6.6 million from 2,563 North American theaters in its second available weekend. Last weekend the animated film scored the best domestic opening of the year with \$13.7 million.

"Chaos Walking," meanwhile, debuted with \$3.8 million. The future set film from "Edge of Tomorrow" director Doug Liman cost around \$100 million to make.

Approximately 80% of the domestic market is currently allowed to operate with limited capacity. Many areas in North America are not yet fully open, including Los Angeles, and most California counties, Washington D.C., and much of Canada.

Disney is hoping to keep "Raya" in theaters throughout the spring. There are scant

major family films on the schedule until early summer and the company is hoping for increased play during spring breaks and as more territories reopen.

Internationally, "Raya and the Last Dragon" earned an estimated \$17.6 million from 32 territories — the highest grossing of which was China with \$8.4 million.

EL James' 'Freed,' as told by Christian Grey, coming in June

Christian Grey is tying up the loose ends of his side of the story this summer. "Freed: Fifty Shades Freed as told by Christian" is set to hit shelves June 1, the publisher said Sunday.

The book is the conclusion to author E L James' trilogy from Christian's point of view. Previous books include "Grey" and "Darker."

James said in a statement that "Freed" has been a labor of love.

"For me, just as for Anastasia Steele, Christian is a challenging, infuriating, and endlessly fascinating character," James said.

"Freed" will be published by the Bloom Books imprint of Sourcebooks. James' "Fifty Shades of Grey" trilogy has sold over 150 million copies worldwide, adapted into a series of films that made over \$1.3 billion at the worldwide box office.

In 1979, technology firm Philips demonstrated a prototype compact disc player during a press conference in Eindhoven, the Netherlands.

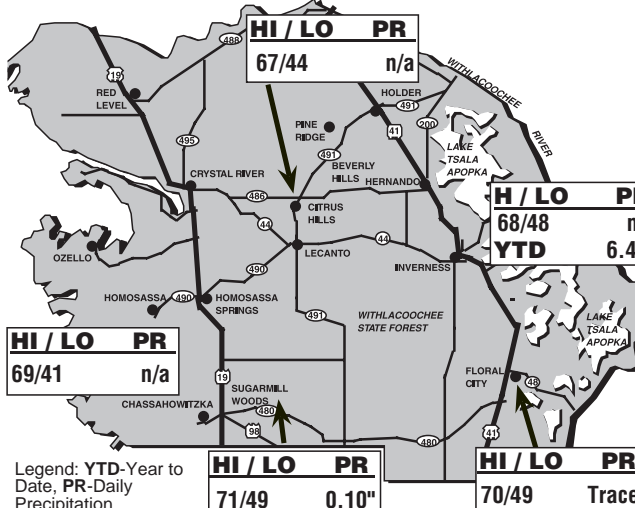
Ten years ago: Voters in Bell, California, went to the polls in huge numbers and threw out the entire City Council after most of its members had been charged with fraud.

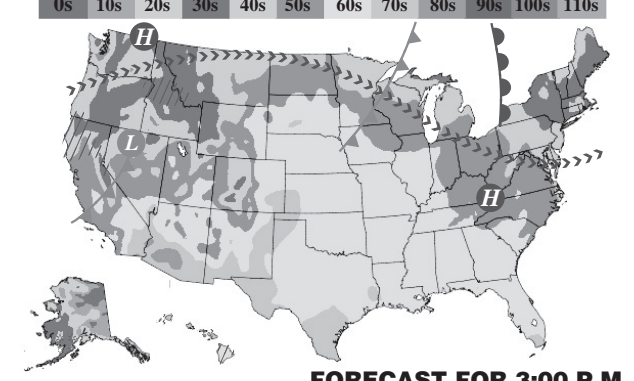

Sheriff's office best suited to run EOC

In July, County Commissioners put Sheriff Mike Prendergast and the Citrus County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) on notice that the day-to-day oversight of the emergency operations center should be under the Board's oversight.

The decision stemmed from a brouhaha when now-Chairman Scott Carnahan said the sheriff makes it difficult for policy group members to access the building during emergency planning, such as what occurs during a hurricane.

Time, they say, heals all wounds.

The Board recently agreed to leave the emergency management department in the hands of the sheriff's office. The decision makes both economic and operational sense for the CCSO to remain as the county emergency operations manager.

Sheriff Prendergast told commissioners he could operate the department at about \$300,000 annually with \$182,000 offset by grants. The county was looking at spending up to \$450,000, according to County Administrator Randy Oliver.

Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said it's a logical choice because the CCSO has the personnel at hand should

emergencies occur.

We agree.

Overseeing the EOC is emergency centric staff and the sheriff's department is about emergencies. For the record, the door of the emergency management center in Lecanto should be open any time a county commissioner shows up. Have their pictures at the front desk so the person on duty does not repeat the same mistake that led to this controversy.

Being a quasi-military organization, the sheriff's office has the personnel, resources and experience to plan and execute emergency operations. Add to that, the significant cost savings do in large measure to the grants available to the sheriff's office this was the best choice for commissioners.

The sheriff's office has the personnel with the skills, experience and resources to manage and streamline emergency responses, as well as the leaders who can make key decisions under stress.

This was a tempest in a teapot and we're glad it has gone away, like it should have.

Emergency management belongs with the sheriff, not the county commission.

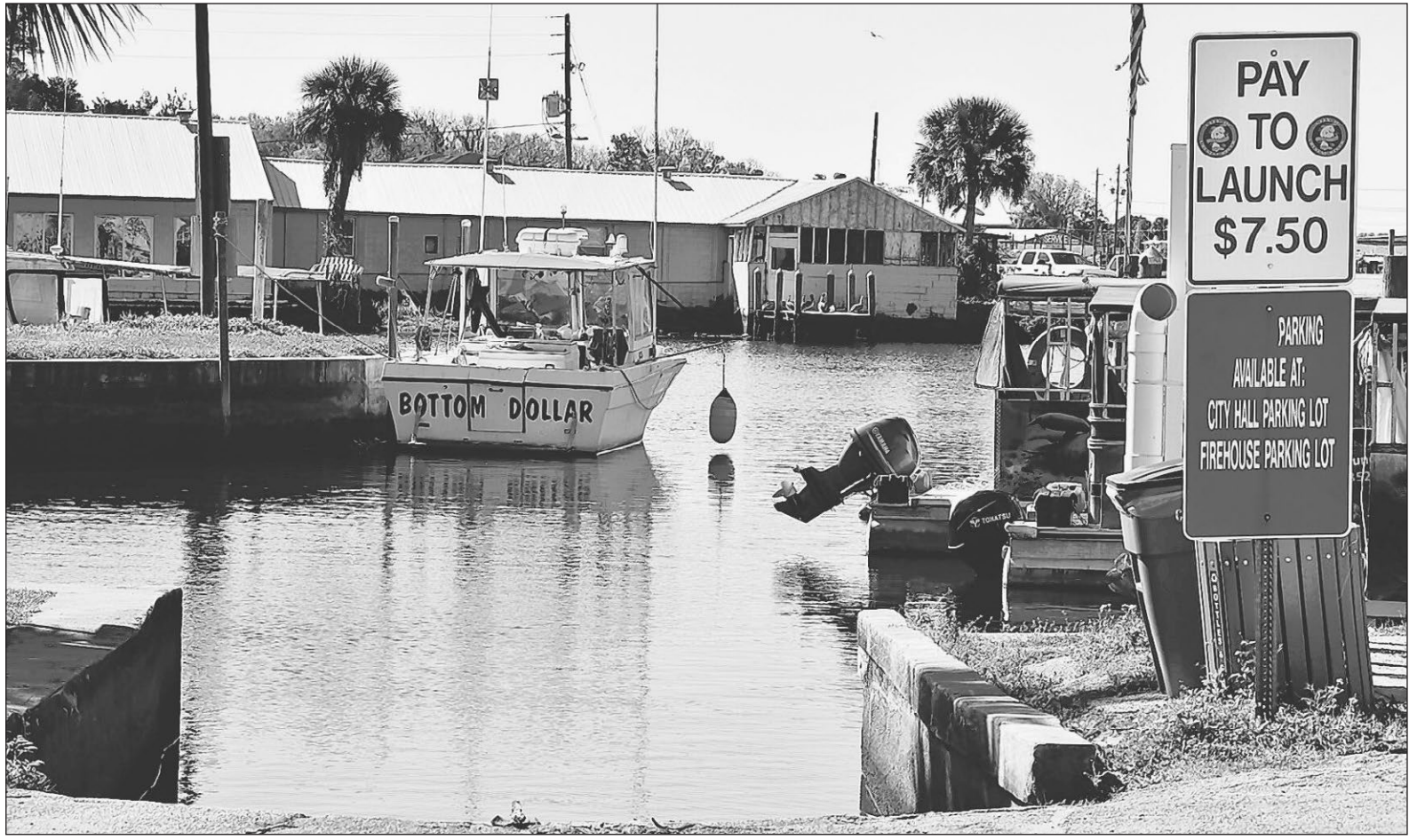

Where IS ruled, pope calls on Christians to forgive, rebuild

QARAQOSH, Iraq (AP) — Pope Francis urged Iraq's Christians on Sunday to forgive the injustices against them by Muslim extremists and to rebuild as he visited the wrecked shells of churches and met ecstatic crowds in the community's historic heartland, which was nearly erased by the Islamic State group's horrific reign.

"Fraternity is more durable than fratricide, hope is more powerful than hatred, peace more powerful than war," the pontiff said during prayers for the dead in the city of Mosul, with the call for tolerance that has been the central message of his four-day visit to Iraq.

At each stop in northern Iraq, the remnants of its Christian population turned out, jubilant, ululating and decked out in colorful dress. Heavy security prevented Francis from plunging into the crowd as he would normally. Nonetheless, they simply seemed overjoyed that he had come and that they had not been forgotten.

It was a sign of the desperation for support among an ancient community uncertain whether it can hold on. The traditionally Christian towns dotting the Nineveh Plains of the north emptied out in 2014 as Christians — as well as many Muslims — fled the Islamic State group's onslaught. Only a few have returned to their homes since the defeat of IS in Iraq was declared four years ago, and the rest remain scattered elsewhere in Iraq or abroad.

Bells rang out for the pope's arrival in the town of Qaraqosh.

"The road to a full recovery may still be long, but I ask you, please, not to grow discouraged," Francis told a packed Church of the Immaculate Conception. "What is needed is the ability to forgive, but also the courage not to give up."

The Qaraqosh church has been extensively renovated after being vandalized by IS militants during their takeover of the town, making it a symbol of recovery efforts.

Iraq's Christian population, which has existed here since the time of Christ, has dwindled from around 1.5 million before the 2003 U.S.-led invasion that plunged the country into chaos to just a few hundred thousand today.

Francis's visit, on its last day Sunday, aimed to encourage them to stay, rebuild and restore what he called Iraq's "intricately designed carpet" of faiths and ethnic groups.

Dressed in white, Francis took to a red carpeted

stage in Mosul on his first stop of the day, surrounded by the grey hollowed-out shells of four churches — Syriac Catholic, Armenian Orthodox, Syriac Orthodox and Chaldean — nearly destroyed in the war to oust IS fighters from the city.

It was a scene that would have been unimaginable years earlier. Mosul, Iraq's second largest city, was at the heart of the IS so-called "caliphate" and witnessed the worst of the group's rule inflicted on Muslims, Christians and others, including beheadings and mass killings.

He deviated from his prepared speech to emphasize the plight of Iraq's Yazidi minority, which was subjected to mass killings, abductions and sexual slavery at the hands of IS.

"How cruel it is that this country, the cradle of civilization, should have been afflicted by so barbarous a blow," Francis said, "with ancient places of worship destroyed and many thousands of people — Muslims, Christians, Yazidis — who were cruelly annihilated by terrorism and others forcibly displaced or killed."

IS inflicted atrocities against all communities, including Muslims, during its three-year rule across much of northern and western Iraq. But the Christian minority was hit especially hard. The militants forced them to choose among conversion, death or the payment of a special tax for non-Muslims. Thousands fled, leaving homes and churches that were destroyed or commandeered by the extremists.

Mosul, Iraq's second largest city, became IS's bureaucratic and financial backbone. It took a ferocious nine-month battle to finally free the city in July 2017.

Bloody Sunday recalled

Memorial honors late civil rights giants

SELMA, Ala. — Activists who gathered virtually and in person to commemorate a pivotal day in the civil rights struggle that became known as Bloody Sunday called on people to continue the fight for voting rights as they also honored giants of the civil rights movement, including the late U.S. Rep. John Lewis, who died last year.

The Selma Bridge Crossing Jubilee marks the 56th anniversary of Bloody Sunday — the day on March 7, 1965, that civil rights marchers were brutally beaten by law enforcement officers on Selma's Edmund Pettus Bridge. Lewis, the Rev. Joseph Lowery, the Rev. C.T. Vivian, and attorney Bruce Boynton were the late civil rights leaders honored on Sunday.

The day became a turning point in the fight for voting rights. Footage of the beatings helped galvanize support for passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

This year's commemoration came as some states seek to roll back expanded

early and mail-in voting access and efforts have been unsuccessful to restore a key section of the Voting Rights Act that required states with a history of discrimination to get federal approval for any changes to voting procedures.

Many speakers throughout the day's events emphasized the need for continued activism to protect voting access.

"Voter suppression is still alive and well," said

U.S. Rep. Teri Sewell, a Democrat who represents the 7th Congressional District which includes Selma. "It reminds us that progress is elusive and every generation must fight and fight again."

Sewell spoke during a video that featured comments from activists, mayors, members of Congress and others about the historic anniversary. Later, organizers played video footage of activists, many who had been part of the

original Blood Sunday events in 1965, crossing the bridge once again. They wore masks and in keeping with social distancing requirements designed to stop the coronavirus, spread out across the bridge as they walked.

The event typically brings thousands of people to Selma. However, most of the events were held virtually this year because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Democrats debate filibuster changes

WASHINGTON — With President Joe Biden on the verge of his first big legislative victory, a key moderate Democrat said Sunday he's open to changing Senate rules that could allow for more party-line votes to push through other parts of the White House's agenda such as voting rights.

West Virginia Sen. Joe Manchin stressed that he wants to keep the procedural hurdle known as the filibuster, saying major legislation should always have significant input from the minority party. But he noted there are other ways to change the rules that now effectively require 60 votes for most legislation. One example: the "talking filibuster," which requires senators to slow a bill by holding the floor, but then grants an "up or down" simple majority vote if they give up.

"The filibuster should be painful, it really

should be painful and we've made it more comfortable over the years," Manchin said. "Maybe it has to be more painful."

Democrats are beginning to look to their next legislative priorities after an early signature win for Biden on Saturday, with the Senate approving a \$1.9 trillion COVID-19 relief plan on a party-line 50-49 vote.

Final passage is expected Tuesday in the House if leaders can hold the support of progressives frustrated that the Senate narrowed unemployment benefits and stripped out an increase to the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour.

Biden says he would sign the measure immediately if the House passed it. The legislation would allow many Americans to receive \$1,400 in direct checks from the government this month.

"Lessons learned: If we have unity, we can do big

things," a jubilant Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., told The Associated Press in an interview after Saturday's vote.

Still, the Democrats' approach required a last-minute call from Biden to Manchin to secure his vote after he raised late resistance to the breadth of unemployment benefits. That immediately raised questions about the path ahead in a partisan environment where few, if any, Republicans are expected to back planks of the president's agenda.

Democrats used a fast-track budget process known as reconciliation to approve Biden's top priority without Republican support, a strategy that succeeded despite the reservations of some moderates. But work in the coming months on other issues such as voting rights and immigration could prove more

difficult.

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., pledged that Senate Republicans would block passage of a sweeping House-passed bill on voting rights. The measure, known as HR 1, would restrict partisan gerrymandering of congressional districts, strike down hurdles to voting and bring transparency to the campaign finance system. It would serve as a counterweight to voting rights restrictions advancing in Republican-controlled statehouses across the country in the wake of Donald Trump's repeated false claims about a "stolen" election.

"Not one Republican is going to vote for HR 1 because it's a federal takeover of elections, it sets up a system where there is no real voter security or verification," Graham said. "It is a liberal wish list in terms of how you vote."

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Red hot on the road

Gourde helps Bolts rally for 6-3 victory over Blackhawks

CHICAGO — The Tampa Bay Lightning needed some energy, and Yannick Gourde delivered.

As usual.

Gourde had two goals and two assists, and the Lightning used their power play to rally for a 6-3 victory over the Chicago Blackhawks on Sunday.

“He does that all the time for us,” coach Jon Cooper said. “That’s why he’s having a successful NHL career, because he never stops going. He never gives up on plays. He’s just a worker.”

Gourde had one of Tampa Bay’s three power-play goals during its four-goal second period. Pat Maroon added his 100th career goal in the third, giving the Lightning a season-high four goals with the man advantage.

“Every shift I step on the ice in the second period I was trying to bring people to the fight with me,” Gourde said. “That’s something I really like doing. It’s part of me. It’s part of my game.”

Ondrej Palat and Victor Hedman also scored power-play goals in the second. Alex Killorn scored for the third straight game, and Andrei Vasilevskiy made 22 stops.

The Lightning improved to 3-0-1 on their season-long six-game trip and stretched their point streak to a season-high eight games. The reigning Stanley Cup champions took two of three in the series between Central Division contenders.

Mattias Janmark had a goal and an assist for the Blackhawks. Philipp Kurashev and Pius Suter also scored, and Kevin Lankinen made 33 saves.

“We’ll bounce back, I’m certain of that,” coach Jeremy Colliton said. “We got to take the good with us and obviously there’s room for improvement.”

Chicago opened a 3-0 lead when Janmark fed Suter in front for the rookie’s eighth goal of the season 3:11 into the second. But Tampa Bay responded with a big push.

The rally started with goals by Palat and Gourde 23 seconds apart. Palat beat Lankinen from the right circle for a power-play goal at 3:51, and then Gourde knocked in his own rebound

Larson celebrates return with win

First victory since 2020 suspension

LAS VEGAS — Kyle Larson wasn’t sure he’d ever race again in NASCAR, and if he could, he didn’t know who would even hire him.

It was Rick Hendrick who took the chance on a driver many believed was radioactive for sponsors. Larson’s use of a racial slur while participating in an online race last April cost him his job, his reputation and his ability to attract the corporations that fund a race team.

Hendrick said he’d pay for the car himself because he was that confident that Larson, reformed after months of self-work, could be redeemed.

On Sunday at Las Vegas Motor Speedway, Larson raced to his first NASCAR victory since he was reinstated from a nearly yearlong suspension. He ran just the first four races last season and was hired by Hendrick Motorsports when NASCAR said the suspension would lift at the start of this year.

“Thanks Mr. H. for believing in me,” Larson radioed to boss Rick Hendrick after crossing the finish line.

He then celebrated his first career win on an intermediate track with smoke-filled burnouts, including one on the

backstretch for friends watching from a motorhome on the hillside above the track. Larson said he became emotional as he took the white flag but had composed himself by the time he finished his burnouts.

“I didn’t know if I’d ever have an opportunity to win a NASCAR race again,” said Larson, who again thanked Hendrick for taking “a massive chance on me.”

Hendrick was both thrilled and surprised by the victory in Larson’s fourth race with his new team. He figured it would take time for Larson to build a relationship with his new crew chief and find a rhythm in the No. 5 Chevrolet. There is no practice because of pandemic protocols so Larson is learning in real time.

“I didn’t really expect it to come this quick because I really thought it would take time to gel,” Hendrick said by phone after the race. “He’s a champion, really, and I am so lucky to have him.”

Bubba Wallace, NASCAR’s only Black fulltime driver, was one of the first competitors to congratulate Larson.

“It meant a lot for Bubba to come to victory lane,” Larson said. “He’s always believed in me. That was special.”

Larson’s move to Hendrick was expected to be electric.

Larson is considered one of the top talents in NASCAR but won just six times in six seasons with Chip Ganassi Racing.

Paired with mighty Hendrick, everyone suspected Larson would at last reach his full potential.

“He got in a great car, he’s a great driver and he’s going to make things happen,” runner-up Brad Keselowski said. “That’s

what he does. He’s a wheelman.”

Mario Andretti on Twitter called Larson’s victory the most entertaining NASCAR race he’d ever watched and praised Larson for driving “the race of his life” and Hendrick — “O’ Rick

knew what he was doing when he hired him.”

The victory gave Hendrick back-to-back victories. William Byron won last week at Homestead-Miami Speedway, so Hendrick has two of its four

Vols beat Florida, earn No. 4 seed in SEC

Michigan State upsets No. 2 Michigan

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Victor Bailey Jr., John Fulkerson and Keon Johnson scored 14 points apiece and Tennessee rallied from a 14-point deficit to beat Florida 65-54 on Sunday in the regular-season finale for both teams.

Tennessee (17-7, 10-7 SEC) secured the No. 4 seed and a bye into the Friday's quarterfinals of the conference tournament.

Fulkerson added seven rebounds and four assists and Josiah-Jordan James had eight points and 10 boards for the Volunteers.

Florida used a 13-2 run to take a 31-17 lead with five minutes left in the first half but Tennessee scored 11 of the final 13 first-half points to trim its deficit to five at the break. Florida missed seven consecutive, and 9 of 10, from the field as the Vols ripped off a 21-4 spurt—including eight points by Bailey—to make it 53-43 with 7:33 to play.

Tyree Appleby had 17 points on 7-of-14 shooting and Colin Castleton added 11 points for Florida (13-9, 9-7).

The fifth-seeded Gators play the winner between No. 12 seed Texas A&M and No. 13 seed Vanderbilt in Thursday's second round.

After being outrebounded 18-16 in the first half, Tennessee was plus-11 on the glass in the second. Florida had just 21 points after the break, its lowest-scoring half of the season.

The Gators went into the game leading the SEC in free-throw percentage

(.760, 37th NCAA), field-goal percentage (.472, 42nd NCAA) and 3-point field-goal percentage (.359, 78th NCAA). On Sunday, they shot 41.7% from the field, made 3 of 13 (23.1%) from behind the arc and hit 11 of 18 (61.1%) free throws.

Michigan State 70, No. 2 Michigan 64

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Rocket Watts scored 21 points and Aaron Henry had 18 to lead Michigan State to a 70-64 victory over No. 2 Michigan that seems to seal coach Tom Izzo's 23rd consecutive NCAA Tournament bid.

The Spartans (15-11, 9-11 Big Ten) have won five of their last seven games, beating No. 4 Ohio State, No. 5 Illinois and their second-ranked rivals

during the late-season surge.

The Wolverines (19-3, 14-3) closed the regular season getting routed at home by the Fighting Illini, beating Michigan State handily to seal the Big Ten title and losing the rematch three days later.

And, Michigan might have lost more than that.

Senior guard Eli Brooks hurt his left ankle early in the game at the Breslin Center and did not return in what potentially could be a problem going into the Big Ten and NCAA tournaments. Brooks ranks fourth on the team with eight-plus points per game, averages nearly three assists a game and has started 51 games over two seasons.

No. 3 Baylor 88, No. 18 Texas Tech 73

WACO, Texas — MaCio

Teague scored 35 points while matching a school record with 10 made 3-pointers and Baylor finished undefeated at home for the first time in 73 years.

The Big 12 champion Bears (21-1, 13-1 Big 12) never trailed, but didn't take control for good until a 16-3 run in the second half when Teague had three 3s while scoring 12 of those points. He finished 10-of-12 from long range.

Jared Butler scored 18 points and Davion Mitchell 17 as Baylor finished 10-0 in the Ferrell Center, the first time going undefeated at home since going 9-0 in 1947-48. Vital had 10 points and 15 rebounds.

Kyler Edwards had 18 points for Texas Tech (17-9, 9-8), which was coming

off three consecutive wins at home. Kevin McCullar and Terrence Shannon Jr. both had 11.

No. 5 Iowa 77, No. 25 Wisconsin 73

IOWA CITY, Iowa — Luka Garza scored 21 points and had 16 rebounds as Iowa defeated Wisconsin.

Minutes after the game, Iowa athletic director Gary Barta announced Garza's jersey No. 55 would be retired after the season, bringing Garza to tears.

It was the 12th double-double of the season for Garza, who leads the Big Ten in scoring and is third in the nation. He is Iowa's all-time leading career scorer with 2,201 points.

The Hawkeyes (20-7, 14-6) have won seven of eight and will be the third seed in the Big Ten Tournament.

Micah Potter shot 9 for 12 and scored 23 points for Wisconsin (16-11, 10-10), which has lost five of six.

No. 9 Houston 67, Memphis 64

HOUSTON — Tramon Mark hit a long 3-pointer as time expired to lift Houston over Memphis.

After Memphis tied it with 1.7 seconds left, Marcus Sasser threw the ball to mid-court, where Mark picked it up. He dribbled through two Memphis defenders and launched a 35-footer off the backboard and in. Houston mobbed Mark in a hectic scene under the basket.

DeJon Jarreau had 19 points and eight rebounds, Quentin Grimes added 17 points and eight rebounds, and Justin Gorham had 10 points and 12 rebounds for the Cougars (21-3, 14-3 American), who won their fourth straight game.

Mark finished with eight points and shot 3 for 12 from the field.

Landers Nolley II scored 14 points, Lester Quinones and DeAndre Williams each added 11 points for Memphis (15-7, 11-4).

No. 15 Texas 76, TCU 64

FORT WORTH, Texas — Andrew Jones scored 16 points while making all four of his 3-pointers, and Texas finished the regular season with a third consecutive road victory.

The added week of Big 12 games to account for COVID-19 and weather postponements worked out well for the Longhorns (17-7, 11-6 Big 12). They also won at Iowa State and 15th-ranked Oklahoma to reach 9-2 away from home and 6-2 in true road games.

Matt Coleman III scored 14 points and Courtney Ramey had 13 points and six assists for Texas, which moved up to the third seed in the Big 12 tournament and will face No. 18 Texas Tech, the sixth seed, in the quarterfinals Thursday.

RJ Nembhard scored 13 points and Mike Miles added 12 for the Horned Frogs (12-13, 5-11).

No. 20 Loyola Chicago 75, Drake 65

ST. LOUIS — Cameron Krutwig and Braden Norris scored 20 points apiece to lead Loyola Chicago over Drake in the Missouri Valley Conference championship game for a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

The Ramblers (24-4, 16-2) will be making their seventh NCAAAs appearance and first since the 2018 team reached the Final Four as a No. 11 seed.

Keith Clemons added 13 points for Loyola, which has won six in a row and 17 of its last 18.

Tremell Murphy and D.J. Wilkins scored 20 points each for Drake (25-4, 15-3).

Team LeBron wins NBA All-Star Game 170-150

James a perfect 4-0 as captain

ATLANTA — Even in the strangest NBA All-Star Game of them all, LeBron James was still the perfect captain.

Team LeBron showed off its high-flying and long-range skills during a dominating run to close out the first half, setting up a 170-150 romp over Team Durant in the league's 70th midseason showcase Sunday night.

This one sure was different than the previous 69 All-Star contests.

Determined to pull off an exhibition that is huge for TV revenue and the league's worldwide brand, the NBA staged the game in a mostly empty arena in downtown Atlanta, a made-for-TV extravaganza that was symbolic of the coronavirus era.

Even with intense safety protocols in place, two players didn't even make it to tipoff. Philadelphia stars Joel Embiid and Ben Simmons were ruled out because they got haircuts from a barber who tested positive for COVID-19.

But once the game began, it fell right in line with the three previous All-Star outings with the captain format. The top vote-getters in each conference pick the teams, a duty that James has earned all four years.

He's now 4-0, having defeated Stephen Curry's squad in 2018 and teams selected by Milwaukee's two-time reigning MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo the last two years.

This time, James drafted his two former adversaries to assemble a dominant squad that blew away Kevin Durant's team.

Antetokounmpo was the game MVP after shooting 16 of 16 for 35 points. Curry chipped in with 28 points, while Damian Lillard had 32. James spent most of the night admiring his drafting skill, playing less than 13 minutes and finishing with four points.

The only good thing for Durant: He didn't have to participate in this shellacking, sitting out the game with an ailing hamstring.

Bradley Beal led Team

Durant with 26 points.

On a night highlighting Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Team LeBron swept the first three quarters and was first to reach the final target score, earning a total of \$750,000 for its charity, the Thurgood Marshall College Fund.

The game got out of hand late in the second quarter.

With scant defense being played, Team LeBron took turns dunking off alley-oop passes. Chris Paul delivered back-to-back lobbs that Lillard and Curry slammed through. Then, it was Paul on the receiving end of a payback pass from Curry.

After showing they could handle shots up close, Team LeBron headed outside in the final seconds of the half.

Lillard pulled up for a 3-pointer from the half-court line. Not to be outdone, Curry knocked down one from virtually the same spot.

The atmosphere at State Farm Arena was downright eerie compared to a normal All-Star Game.

Instead of a packed house, with A-list celebrities crammed into prime courtside seats, this game was attended by a smattering of hand-picked guests. They had plenty of room to spread out in a 17,000-seat venue that was essentially transformed into a giant television studio, with socially distanced spectators kept far from the court.

Towering video screens were set up behind the benches. Vegas-style lights flashed around the arena. Recorded crowd noise blared over the sound system. The entertainment was provided by the host Atlanta Hawks, who didn't have any players in the game but were represented by their cheerleaders, drum line and DJ.

To address fears that one of its biggest events would become a super-spreader for a virus that has killed more than a half-million Americans, the NBA pared down its usual weekend-long ritual of extravagant parties, gridlocked streets and people watching.

This All-Star Game was a one-night-only event, with a pair of skill competitions held shortly before the game and the Dunk Contest squeezed into the half-time break. The players flew in

Saturday afternoon and were largely confined to a nearby hotel except for their time on the court.

"This is when everyone in basketball all over the world comes to one city," James said during a Zoom call before the game. "We're able to sit back and go, 'Wow, this is the game we have built.' It's a beautiful weekend for all walks of life, on the floor and off the floor."

"But I'm sitting here in my hotel room, isolated. My family's not here. I'm by myself. It's just different, to say the least, compared to previous years."

Curry sinks final shot for second 3-point title

ATLANTA — Stephen Curry shot his way to another 3-point title and Domantas Sabonis made sure the Skills Challenge still belongs to the bigs.

Then Portland's Anfernee Simons sealed his final, winning dunk with a kiss. Well, almost.

Curry, the Golden State Warriors superstar, provided a dramatic preview for his seventh All-Star Game appearance when he sank his final 3-pointer to edge Utah's Mike Conley for the title on Sunday night. Curry also won the 3-point content in 2015.

Conley had the lead with 27 points before Curry was the final

shooter of the contest. Curry had 26 points before sinking his final shot from the corner for 28 points and the win.

"I could hear the temperature rise a little bit," Curry said of the reaction from the small crowd allowed in State Farm Arena.

"It was some awesome competition," Curry said. "I'm glad I got it done."

After a runner-up finish to 2020 Skills Challenge winner and fellow big man Bam Adebayo of Miami, Indiana's Sabonis returned to win the title.

The 6-foot-11 Sabonis did not miss a pass or 3-point shot in elimination wins over Julius Randle of the New York Knicks and Luka Doncic of Dallas in the test of passing, ball-handling and shooting ability. Doncic fell behind by missing in his first two tests of his passing accuracy.

Sabonis beat Orlando's 7-foot Nikola Vucevic in the matchup of big men for the skills title. Each missed two 3-point shots before Sabonis sank his third attempt and then clinched his first in victory.

"It was fun," Sabonis said. "I wanted to come out and make sure I got it done this time."

Curry had 31 points in the first round to lead the contest. Also advancing were Jayson Tatum, with 25 points, and Conley, with 28.

Tatum led off the final round

with 17 points while making only one shot from the "money ball" rack. Conley nearly duplicated his first-round total and it appeared it might be enough until Curry solidified his reputation as one of the top shooters in NBA history.

Simons showed off his leaping ability and creativity to beat New York's Obi Toppin and Indiana's Cassius Stanley in the two-round dunk contest that started off with Stanley's spectacular slam that received a surprisingly low score.

The 6-foot-3 Simons soared, almost kissing the rim, on a powerful right-handed jam to beat Toppin in the final. Simons puckered his lips as if kissing the rim, even though he was a few inches away.

"I tried to get close enough so obviously I wouldn't hit my head on the rim too hard," Simons said, before acknowledging he has never "actually kissed the rim" in practice.

"I had to commit to it," Simons said.

Simons also paid tribute to a former star by wearing Tracy McGrady's jersey on a jam that earned a score of 49 to earn his spot in the final.

"He was my hero growing up, so I wanted to honor him as well," Simons said.

The contest was judged by five former dunk champions: Hall of Famer Dominique Wilkins (1985, 1990), Spud Webb (1986), Dee Brown (1991), Jason Richardson (2002, 2003) and Josh Smith (2005).

There was some early controversy when Stanley's first dunk, a left-hander after he moved the ball between his legs in the air, scored only 44 points. Toppin then scored a 48 on a two-handed reverse.

On Simons' first dunk, he positioned the ball even with the top of the square above the rim. He then showed off his leaping ability by grabbing the ball for the jam which earned 46 points.

"I just wanted to show I could jump up pretty high and be creative, so it was fun," he said.

Toppin also showed creativity, jumping over his father, Obadiah Toppin, and teammate Julius Randle on a dunk which earned 46 points.

In the final, Toppin took off from near the free-throw line, inspiring comparisons to Wilkins' winning form while with the Atlanta Hawks.

DeChambeau outlasts Westwood at Bay Hill

ORLANDO — Bryson DeChambeau received a text message Sunday morning from Tiger Woods to keep fighting, good advice for a final round that turned out to be the toughest at Bay Hill in 41 years.

Inspiration from Arnold Palmer is everywhere, and DeChambeau was particularly drawn to the King's motto to play boldly.

DeChambeau needed every bit of that Sunday to win the Arnold Palmer Invitational, playing the final 17 holes without a bogey, entertaining thousands with another monstrous drive over the water and delivering one last par with a 5-foot putt on the final hole for a one-shot victory over Lee Westwood.

He looked dapper in his tan o'shanter cap and red cardigan sweater that goes to the winner.

"I think this red cardigan is not only for Mr. Palmer, but I would say it's a little bit for Tiger, as well, knowing what place he's in right now," DeChambeau said.

Woods, recovering from serious leg injuries from his single-car crash in Los Angeles two weeks ago, would have witnessed quite a show in blustery conditions, fast fairways and greens so quick they looked almost white.

DeChambeau closed with a 71, matching the low score of the final round in which no one broke 70 on Sunday at Bay Hill for the first time since 1980.

Westwood, who turns 48 next month, was up to the task.

Never mind that DeChambeau's rocket over the water on the 565-yard sixth hole was 168 yards beyond Westwood. Their second shots were only 6 feet apart and both made birdie.

Westwood fought to the end. He fell out of a share of the lead with a three-putt bogey from 40 feet on the 14th. Just as critical was failing to make birdie on the par-5 16th with a wedge for his second shot from the fairway, and DeChambeau having to scramble for par.

"You can't want for more than that. I thought we had a really good battle," Westwood said. "It was never really more than one (shot) all day, and there were tough conditions out there. It was a day for playing sensible and hanging on."

They were never separated by more than one shot over the final 15 holes. DeChambeau finished at 11-under 277.

The long ball came in handy for DeChambeau, as much with the putter as the driver. He holed a 40-foot birdie putt on the fourth hole to regain a share of the lead. More critical was the 50-foot par putt he made on No. 11 to stay one ahead.

"Knowing what I know now, it's obviously the shot of the day for me," he said.

Westwood tied him with a 30-foot birdie putt on the par-5 12th, only to give it back with a three-putt on the 14th. The tournament turned on the par-5 16th, where it was Westwood who had the advantage.

DeChambeau's drive went up

against the lip of a bunker and he had to lay up short of the water. Westwood had 158 yards and hit a poor wedge that came up short of the green. He chipped nicely, except that it rolled out 6 feet by the hole on the lightning-quick greens and he missed the birdie for a chance to tie.

DeChambeau took the one-shot lead to the 18th and hit his most important drive of the day — in the fairway. Westwood's tee shot settled in a divot, and he did well to get it on the green and two-putt from 65 feet. DeChambeau's birdie putt slid by some 5 feet and he shook his arms in celebration when the par putt dropped.

Westwood closed with a 73, not a bad score considering the average of 75.49 was the highest for a final round since 1980.

Corey Connors stayed in the mix until the very end. The Canadian holed a 15-foot eagle putt on the 16th to get within one shot, only to find a bunker on the par-3 17th and miss a 6-foot par putt. With a bogey on the final hole, he shot 74 to finish alone in third.

Jordan Spieth was part of a four-man race on the front nine and briefly tied for the lead with a birdie on the par-5 sixth. That turned out to be his last birdie of the day. He took bogey on three of his last four holes for a 75, dropping him into a three-way tie for fourth with Andrew Putnam (71) and Ricky Werenski (73).

For Spieth, it was his third top-five finish in his last four events.

DeChambeau rose to No. 6 in the world with his ninth victory worldwide, and he became the first player this season with multiple victories, to go along with his U.S. Open title in September. It matched the longest it took for a multiple winner on the PGA Tour since 1969. Nick Price won his second title in the 21st week of the season in 1994.

Rory McIlroy, who started four shots out of the lead, was never in the mix. He came undone on the par-5 sixth, where he hit two tee shots into the water and then hit the fairway, green and made the putt to salvage double bogey. He shot 76.

Ernst wins Drive On Championship for 3rd LPGA Tour title

OCALA — Austin Ernst won the Drive On Championship for her third LPGA Tour title, pulling away to beat fellow former NCAA champion Jennifer Kupcho by five strokes at Golden Ocala.

Tied for the lead with Kupcho after each of the first two rounds and a stroke ahead entering the day, Ernst closed with a 2-under 70 to finish the wire-to-wire victory at 15-under 273.

"I think it's just really cool to be in the heat of it all week and to be able to perform the way I did," Ernst said. "To hit the shots I hit, and to shoot the scores I shot, I think it's just kind of testament to me, that I can do this week in and week out and just if I have a little belief myself kind of what I can do."

Kupcho, coming off a closing eagle Saturday, had a double bogey and three bogeys in a 74.

Korda in the first two events of the year, Ernst gave the United States three straight victories to open a season for the first time since 2007.

"I think the difference this week even

just the last week was I just fully committed to believing in what I do and that it's good enough," said Ernst, who missed the cut last week in the Gainbridge LPGA with rounds of 75 and 72.

"I think this week proved that it's more than good enough. It was fun to walk up and know that I was going to win. I haven't had that yet, so that was fun."

Trocheck, Reimer help Hurricanes blow past Panthers

Islanders win 5th straight

RALEIGH, N.C. — Vincent Trocheck and James Reimer continued to torment their former team, lifting the Carolina Hurricanes to their fifth straight victory with a 4-2 win over the Florida Panthers on Sunday night.

Trocheck, who was traded to Carolina just over a year ago, scored for the fourth time this season against the Panthers. Nino Niederreiter, Sebastian Aho and Warren Foegele also had goals for the Hurricanes, who have won eight of 10 home games (8-1-1) this season.

"We didn't really have any lulls in the game," Hurricanes coach Rod Brind'Amour said. "I like the fact that we hung in there. Didn't get frustrated, just kept playing."

Reimer, who made 21 saves, came to Carolina less than two years ago in a trade from Florida. He's 3-0-0 since against the Panthers.

MacKenzie Weegar and Mason Marchment scored for Florida, which had a five-game points streak snapped. Chris Driedger made 22 saves for the Panthers.

Trocheck scored just eight seconds into the Hurricanes' first power play of the game. At that point with 4:05 to play in the opening period, Carolina had as many goals as the Panthers did shots on goal.

"We played a

full 60 minutes," Trocheck said. "I think this one was the best of the last four."

Trocheck has four goals during his five-game points streak.

"He has found a home," Brind'Amour said. "It's no different than any job. When you're feeling good about and where you fit, you have success. You don't expect him to score at this rate, but we'll take it for as long as we can."

Niederreiter took a pass from Martin Necas and

beat Driedger, who had been under siege early in the second period. Niederreiter has 11 goals, posting at least one against every Central Division team except for Tampa Bay.

Carolina is 3-0-1 against the Panthers this season. This was the first meeting decided in regulation.

"They're a well-structured team," Panthers left wing Jonathan Huberdeau said. "It's always tough to play against them."

The Panthers got on the scoreboard when Weegar blasted the puck between Reimer's pads with 9:19 left in the second period.

Aho posted the team's second short-handed goal of the season 38 seconds into the third period. Foegele extended the lead to 4-1 slightly more than three minutes later.

The Hurricanes took advantage of special teams situations.

"You've got to make quick plays," Panthers coach Joel Quenneville said. "We had some good looks. We didn't have enough of them. Not enough clean possession time."

Florida won 6-2 at Nashville on Saturday, while the Hurricanes hadn't played since Thursday night.

Casey Cizikas increased the lead to 3-0 at 16:56 with his fourth goal. Cal Clutterbuck, who also scored in Saturday's 5-2 win over the Sabres, added his third of the season. Nelson scored his second of the game and ninth of the season into an empty net to complete the scoring.

BOSTON — Scott Wedgewood made 40 saves, Kyle Palmieri scored out of a scramble with 4:37 left and the Devils snapped a five-game losing streak.

Boston's Tuukka Rask made 24 saves and remained

Indians players out after breaking virus protocol

The Cleveland Indians have broken COVID-19 protocols for the third time in less than a year, this time costing them third baseman José Ramírez and slugger Franmil Reyes.

Manager Terry Francona said Sunday the two players were sent to their Arizona homes while the Indians wait to hear from Major League Baseball when they can rejoin the team.

Francona said Reyes, who had a virus-related misstep last season, and Ramírez went out to dinner on Friday following an exhibition game in Mesa against the Chicago Cubs.

They reported to the team's complex on Saturday and were immediately sent away. They did not have contact with any other players or team personnel.

"The players themselves actually self-reported that they had made a mistake," Francona said on a Zoom call.

When spring training resumed last year after being stopped due to the pandemic, Reyes was forced to quarantine after the team learned via a social media posting that he attended a July 4 party while wearing a mask.

A month later, the Indians placed pitchers Mike Clevinger and Zach Plesac on the restricted list after they broke protocols by going out to dinner while the team was in Chicago. Clevinger, who was traded a few weeks later to San Diego, initially didn't disclose he had been out with Plesac.

Francona understands that players may be fatigued by the COVID-19 guidelines, but they're in place to protect their safety.

"I do get it," he said. "Everybody wants to get rid of your mask and it'd be nice to go sit in a restaurant. Those aren't the

conditions we're playing under. I also know those guys are young and it's not normal to be cooped up."

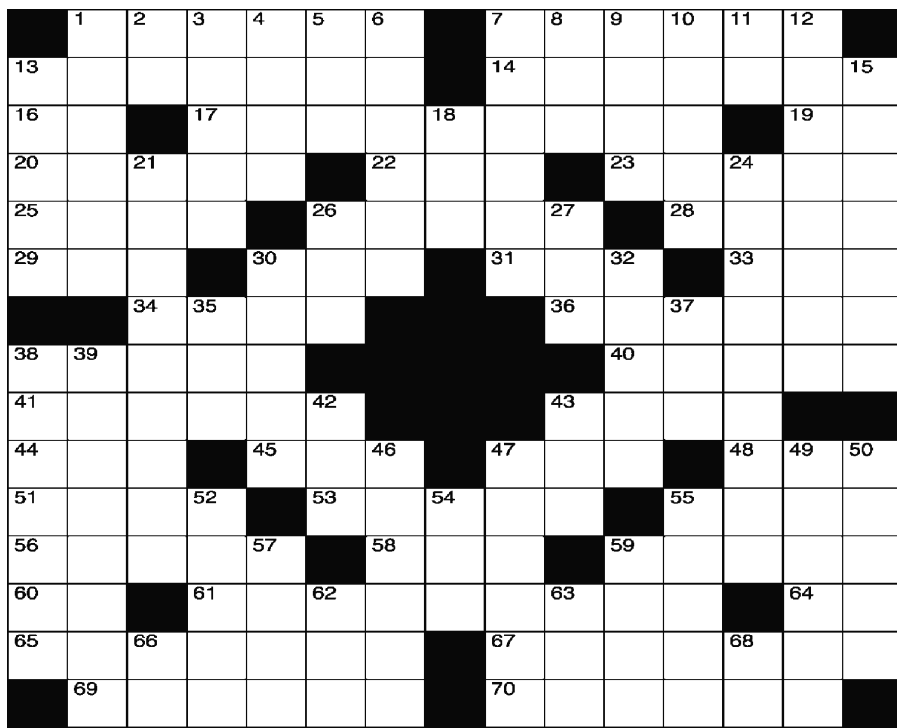

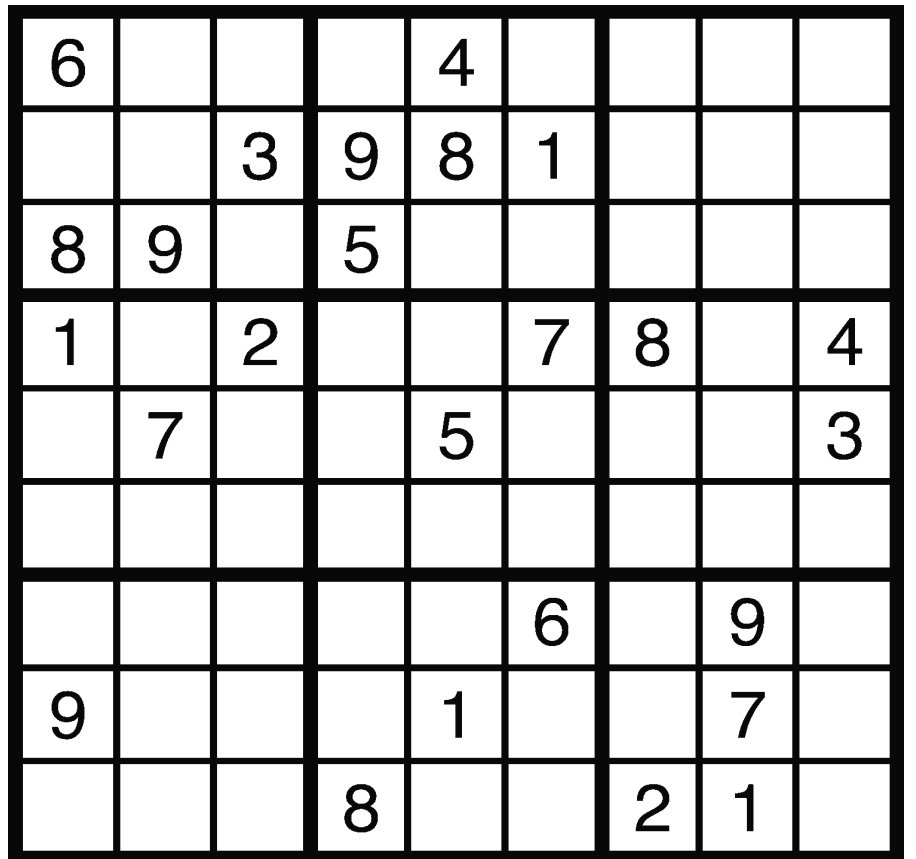

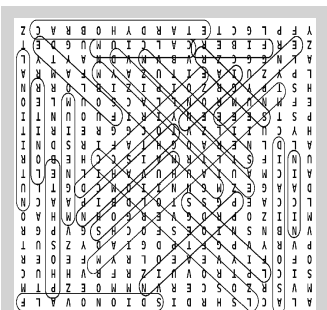

Michael Caine said, "I try to make the here and now as heavenly as possible, in case there isn't one to ascend into when we're done. It's a kind of insurance." At the bridge table, many players don't take out insurance. They assume everything will be for the best in the best of all possible worlds. And when they get lucky, they don't learn the errors of their ways -- unless the dummy or a

kibitzer cannot keep quiet! How should declarer plan the play in today's contract of six no-trump? West leads a top-of-nothing spade nine. Leading against a slam is difficult. You are tempted to falsecard to try to fool declarer, but if your partner is the one taken in, it will not be good for partnership confidence. With eight tricks outside clubs, many players would win the first trick in the dummy and call for the club jack. Anytime the clubs are 3-2 or 4-1, or East has all five, there is no damage done, four (or five) club tricks being raked in. However, what happens when West has all five clubs? Suddenly the contract has died. However, South can take out insurance to allow for any club break. He should win the first trick in hand and lead a low club toward the dummy. At the worst, this costs an overtrick when East has Q-x, Q-x-x or Q-7-6-4 of clubs. With the actual distribution, if West wins with his club queen, four club tricks are established. So let's assume West plays low. After winning with dummy's club 10, declarer plays a heart to his hand and leads another club toward dummy, assuring 12 tricks. Taking a safety play is a good insurance policy.
