One dies in Sunday crash

A 19-year-old Citrus Springs woman died in a two-vehicle crash in the afternoon hours of Sunday, April 25, according to a Florida Highway Patrol report. A van, driven by a 63-year-old Beverly Hills man, was traveling northbound at 3:05 p.m. on County Road 491 and had stopped at the intersection of State Road 200, the report stated. The woman was traveling westbound in a pickup truck on State Road 200 approaching the intersection of County Road 491.

According to the report, despite the stop sign, the man entered the intersection and path of the woman's truck so as to complete a left turn.



Universal trash collection and American Rescue Plan Act money will be discussed at a special meeting of the county commissioners at 9 a.m. at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave., in Inverness.

It was recently announced that \$33 million in federal aid was headed Citrus County's way as part of the coronavirus relief stimulus package signed into law by President Joe Biden. Citrus County will get \$29 million, Crystal River \$1.34 million and Inverness \$3.12 million.

There are specific guidelines as to how this money can be spent and county commissioners will explore some of their options at the morning meeting.

The stimulus package, called the American Rescue Plan Act, goes to states, counties and cities

to cover increased costs, replenish lost money and mitigate economic harm from the COVID-19 pandemic and set a path back to economic recovery.

It was spring 2014 and Lori Stephens and her husband, Brian Gass, were in Crystal River to try stand-up paddle boarding.

Citrus County received the 350-acre Betz Farm property north of Turkey Oak Drive in 2003 and it has sat vacant ever since.

County commissioners said that makes no sense, especially since the site near Crystal River is in a prime development area and it is now a red-hot market for commercial property.

With that in mind, commissioners at their last meeting said they would be open to accepting offers for the property

The board will discuss the Betz property further during its meeting Tuesday, which begins at 1 p.m. at the Citrus County Courthouse, 110 N. Apopka Ave., Inverness.

"There are folks who are interested in that property right now that want to do some developing out there," Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said Friday.

This isn't the first time development of the Betz Farm tract has been broached. During a goal-setting workshop in 2006, county commissioners discussed setting aside the property for affordable housing.

But that never got beyond the discussion phase.

County commissioners in 2017 voted to approve the Betz site as surplus property for eventual sale.

The property would be especially attractive for developers if plans go through to move traffic on State Road 44 onto Turkey Oak, making it a state road and a bypass from State Road 44 to U.S. 19.

South Fia. deputies told not to enforce anti-riot law

FORT LAUDERDALE ----Deputies in a South Florida county are being instructed not to enforce an anti-rioting law signed by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis last week, unless it's absolutely necessary.

When it is deemed necessary, the decision must run it up the chain of command before taking action, according to an internal memo obtained by the South Florida Sun Sentinel.

Col. David R. Holmes, the Broward County Sheriff's Office's executive director of law enforcement, emailed district captains Wednesday to say the anti-rioting law threatened to diminish the sheriff's office's attempts to connect with the community.

The sheriff's office doesn't need "any overzealous deputies utilizing the new law to conduct enforcement that could violate people's civil liberties," Holmes said in the email.

The so-called anti-riot law that DeSantis signed last week was a response to nationwide demonstrations that occurred in the wake of George Floyd's murder. Most of the protests against racial injustice were peaceful, but some turned violent.

A nonprofit group last week filed a lawsuit in federal court in Orlando, challenging the new law.

Opponents of the law said it was a racist reaction to a problem that hasn't occurred in Florida. They saw it as an attempt to squash the voices of groups like Black Lives Matter.

The new law enhances penalties for crimes committed during a riot or violent protest. It allows authorities to hold arrested protesters until a first court appearance and establishes new felonies for

violent demonstration.

It also strips local governments of civil liability protections if they interfere with law enforcement's efforts to respond to a violent protest and adds language to state law that could force local governments to justify a reduction in law enforcement budgets.

It also makes it a second-degree felony to destroy or demolish a memorial, plaque, flag, painting, structure or other object that commemorates historical people or events. That would be punishable by up to 10 years in prison.

Florida resumes Johnson & Johnson vaccination shots

ORLANDO - Shots using the Johnson & Johnson vaccine resumed Sunday at federally supported mass vaccination sites throughout Florida, state emergency officials said.

The Florida Division of **Emergency Management** tweeted that it was resuming the Johnson & Johnson shots at the vaccination sites in Tampa, Orlando, Jacksonville and Miami after reviewing guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration.

The federal agencies on Fridav called for the 11-day pause on the Johnson & Johnson vaccine to be lifted after federal regulators reviewed data on blood clots and assessed risks associated with the vaccine.

Out of nearly 8 million people who received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, 15 women developed these blood clots. Johnson & Johnson vaccine providers will now provide information about the risk and information about symptoms to watch for after vaccination.

'Mortal Kombat,' 'Demon Slayer' are in the lead

NEW YORK — The weekend at movie theaters featured something not seen for a while: a genuine box-office battle.

Warner Bros.' "Mortal Kombat" reboot and the Japanese anime film "Demon Slayer: Mugen Train" both vied for the top spot at the North American box office, with "Mortal Kombat" narrowly edging "Demon Slayer." The R-rated "Mortal Kombat" earned an estimated \$22.5 million, according to studio estimates, while "Demon Funimation's Slayer" grossed \$19.5 million.

The two releases fueled the best weekend for movie theaters during the pandemic, with an estimated \$54.2 million in ticket sales overall, according to data firm Comscore. "Mortal Kombat," which like other 2021 Warner Bros. debuted simultaneously on HBO Max, sold more tickets in the U.S. than any movie besides the studio's own "Godzilla vs. Kong" — which on Sunday crossed \$400 million worldwide. In March, "Godzilla vs. Kong" set a pandemic-best debut with a five-day \$48.5 million opening.

The performance of No Yaiba — the Movie: Mugen Train'' was more surprising. The Japanese movie, which played dubbed and with subtitles, is а

continuation of the "Demon for a theatrical recovery Slayer" TV series, which itself comes from a popular manga series. It has already been a massive hit internationally. In Japan, it's the highest-grossing movie ever with more than \$350 million in estimated ticket sales.

The two releases, while far from awards material, gave Hollywood some good news ahead of Sunday's Academy Awards. The outlook has been increasingly brightening for movie theaters, which are hoping for a semi-normal summer season, perhaps by "Demon Slayer - Kimetsu late May or early June. "A Quiet Place Part II" and the Walt Disney Co.' "Cruella" are both set for release Memorial Day weekend. Thus far, the best evidence

comes ironically from movies that have played at home at the same time as they have in cinemas. With that approach, Warner Bros. has topped the box office nine out of 17 weekends this year, and accounts for 48% in North American market share.

"Mortal Kombat," based on the game that first spawned a 1995 film, has also picked up \$27.6 million internationally. Made by New Line for approximately \$55 million, the film — which was mostly panned by critics but more warmly praised by audiences for its bloody fight sequences — is part of a new surge in video game adaptations.

6 killed, 10 hurt in fiery van crash on Ga. interstate

SUWANEE, Ga. — Police in Georgia say a van carrying 16 people crashed onto its side and was engulfed in flames on an interstate, killing at least six people and injuring 10.

Police said six people died at the scene and 10 were taken to hospitals around the metro Atlanta area, the Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported.

Passersby stopped to pull people from the burning vehicle Saturday evening along I-85 near the I-985 split, Gwinnett County police Sgt. Michele Pihera said in a news release. The area is about 35 miles northeast of downtown Atlanta.

One bystander suffered a minor injury but declined to be transported, police said.

The news release said details about the people in the van would be announced in the coming days.

The occupants were members of a sober living group, Gwinnett County police told WXIA-TV on Sunday.

Investigators were working to determine the cause of the crash. Information at the scene led police to believe another vehicle may have been involved.

Police seek man who attacked Chinese American

NEW YORK — A 61-year-old Chinese American man was attacked by a man who kicked him repeatedly in the head in East Harlem, police said.

The man was collecting cans when he was attacked from behind, knocked to the ground and kicked in the head shortly after 8 p.m. Friday. He was taken to Harlem Hospital in critical but stable condition, police said.

Dying to get away Rescue groups decry loss of migrant lives in Mediterranean

ROME — Rescue groups and the Vatican are decrying the latest deaths of migrants who put to sea in traffickers' unseaworthy boats, amid laments that central Mediterranean nations are choosing not to dispatch vessels to save them.

Aid group Alarm Phone said in a tweet that despite a spotter plane locating an overcrowded ship in the sea north of Libya on Wednesday and pleas for help from the occupants, "only non-state actors actively searched for the boat in distress at sea."

By the time a charity rescue ship reached the site on Thursday evening, the boat had capsized and all the estimated 130 occupants are believed to have drowned.

"Abandoned and buried at sea" read the headline across a photo of the sea on the front page of L'Osservatore Romano, the Vatican newspa-

per on Saturday.

On Sunday, Pope Francis somberly built on the newspaper's denunciation of what he called a "moment of shame."

"Let us pray ... for those who can help but who prefer to look the other way. Let's pray for them in silence," he told the public in St. Peter's Square.

The existence of the dangerously overcrowded boat was first signaled in a call to the aid group Alarm Phone on Wednesday.

Alarm Phone said it was in contact with the dinghy over a period of 10 hours on Wednesday. It said it "repeatedly relayed its GPS position and the dire situation on board to European and Libyan authorities and the wider public."

The European Union border protection agency Frontex told The AP in an interview that it had alerted Italian, Maltese and Libyan authorities after one of its patrol planes spotted the dinghy.

"Despite Frontex spotting the ghy's aid.

Ocean Viking, a rescue ship operated by the charity group SOS Mediterranee, together with MY ROSE, one of three merchant vessels which complied with requests from Italy and Libya to lend assistance, reached the site on Thursday and found several bodies, one of them hunched over a life preserver, but no survivors.

Frontex spokesman Krzysztof Borowski blamed the incident on bad weather.

"Unfortunately, the deadly weather that occurred over the last few days in that area made it almost impossible to do any type of rescue mission," he said in a Zoom interview on Saturday from Warsaw, Poland, where the EU agency is based.

According to Ocean Viking's log, a Libyan coast guard vessel, Ubari, was supposedly headed to the dinghy's aid.

Death toll in fire at Iraqi COVID-19 hospital over 80

BAGHDAD — The death toll from a massive fire at a Baghdad hospital for coronavirus patients rose to at least 82 Sunday as anxious families searched for missing relatives and the government suspended key health officials for alleged negligence.

The flames, described by one witness as "volcanoes of fire," swept through the intensive care unit of the Ibn al-Khatib Hospital, which tends exclusively to COVID-19 patients with severe symptoms. Officials said the blaze, which also injured 110 people, was set off by an exploding oxygen cylinder.

Most of those killed suffered severe burns, he said. Others were overcome by smoke, unwilling to leave behind relatives hooked up to ventilators.

Gunfire erupts in Somali capital amid standoff

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Gunfire erupted in Somalia's capital on Sunday between soldiers loyal to the government and others angry at the country's leader as tensions spiked over President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed's extended stay in power.

The gunfire heard across much of the city highlighted earlier warnings that the election standoff could increase instability in the Horn of Africa nation. The estimated hundreds of mutinous soldiers, still in uniform, took up key positions in northern Mogadishu as some residents hid.

The president faces growing opposition in Somalia and abroad after the lower house of parliament approved a two-year extension of his mandate and that of the federal government and he OK'd it, to the

JUNEAU, Alaska — Alaska Airlines has banned an Alaska state senator for refusing to follow mask requirements.

"We have notified Senator Lora Reinbold that she is not permitted to fly with us for her continued refusal to comply with employee instruction regarding the current mask policy," spokesman Tim Thompson told the Anchorage Daily News on Saturday, adding that the suspension was effective immediately.

Reinbold, a Republican of Eagle River, said she had not been notified of a ban and that she hoped to be on an Alaska Airlines flight in the near future.

Minority legislators sense moment to pass 'bold' legislation

It is still unclear whether Socialists will get 71 seats in the 140-seat parliament to govern alone.

Some 3.6 million eligible voters in Albania and abroad voted to elect 140 lawmakers for a four-year mandate in the Balkan nation.

Albania, a NATO member since 2009, is looking forward to launching full membership negotiations with the 27-member European Union later this year and Sunday's vote is considered a key milestone on that path.

The hope is that post-communist Albania's 10th parliamentary election will be free and fair.

To date, voting always has been marred by irregularities.

Keselowski earns 6th Talladega win

Uses overtime pass to reach Victory Lane

TALLADEGA, Ala. – Brad Keselowski did it exactly right this time and finally got that lastlap victory, winning in overtime Sunday at Talladega Superspeedway.

Keselowski is the ninth driver to win through 10 NASCAR Cup races this season and avenged the embarrassing Team Penske gaffe in the season-opening Daytona 500 when he and teammate Joey Logano triggered a last-lap crash as Keselowski tried to pass Logano for the victory.

Keselowski led just one lap, the last one, in a race that featured 35 lead changes among 27 drivers.

"The whole race I had a couple opportunities to take the lead, but I just kept thinking, 'Man, keep your car in one piece," Keselowski said. Logano was involved in an air-

borne wreck and called on NASCAR to change the dangerous racing conditions at Daytona and Talladega.

"On one hand, I am mad about being in the crash and on the other, I am happy to be alive,' Logano said. "On another hand, I am wondering when we are going to stop because this is dangerous doing what we are doing. I got a roll bar in my head. That is not OK. I am one hit away from the same situation Ryan Newman just went through. I just don't feel like that is acceptable."

Newman escaped serious injury racing for the win on the final lap of the 2020 Daytona 500.

The victory, Keselowski's sixth at Talladega, came after team owner Roger Penske pulled the three Team Penske drivers and affiliate Matt DiBenedetto onto a call this week to discuss his expectations on how they should race Sunday. Penske refused to accept another Daytona disaster when Logano

And despite having no intentions of moving on from Brady, who signed a contract extension that'll keep him in Tampa Bay for at least two more seasons, Licht and coach Bruce Arians have not ruled out selecting a quarterback at some point in the draft.

Dear Annie: This is about the 40-year-old alcoholic with two kids who is refusing rehab. "Hitting bottom" is unwise advice, and unwarranted. He yet may end up homeless and on the streets or worse, but there are more options needed. Don't fall for the AA 12-step "hitting bottom" credo — it is not supported by the data. There is no other medical illness where we would take that approach.

He needs to see an MD who is a specialist in addiction

medicine. Several medications could help. I would also recommend a mental health therapist who specializes in work with sub-

s t a n c e abuse, using a harm reduction model, and someone who is well-versed in a style of communication known as motivational interviewing.

There is more, but that would be a good start.

All of this can be done on an outpatient basis. It is a way to get him started in treatment, build trust and to help evaluate the situation.

Maybe rehab is needed, maybe not. It isn't for everyone. The data is marginal, and these outpatient steps are a good way to start.

I hope this helps. You have an important platform and the word needs to get out about more options. — Follow the Data

Dear Follow the Data: Thank you for offering your perspective from the inside of addiction medicine. The goal is to help the young man take his life back through sobriety. If your suggestions work for him, wonderful. I know they do work for some people, which is why I am printing your letter.

However, your disparagement of AA's approach and rate of success is not something I can agree with. There is a saying at AA meetings, which is that the program works "if you work it." That is the key to the sobriety of millions of alcoholics who have been helped by AA. They succeeded because they worked the program. Just ask the reader "Anonymous below, in California." Dear Annie: I was very touched by the letter from your reader, "Out of Options." I am a sober alcoholic and have been sober since Nov. 24, 2008, which is a little over 12 years now, in Alcoholics Anonymous. I was 23 when I stopped drinking. You are right. We DO recover, but it takes time and commitment. I hurt my mother and oldest daughter very deeply when I was drinking and running amuck. It took my mother almost walking out on me for me to get clean and sober. Dear "Mom Seeking Answers," the best thing for your son is for you to abandon him. I know that sounds very harsh and unloving, but it's the only way. I would suggest that you get a copy of our basic text, "Alco-holics Anonymous," lovingly referred to by our members as the "Big Book." Annie's advice to join Al-Anon is very sound. There are thousands of people like yourself who lead happy, fulfilled lives despite having a family member or friend who is getting sober. I wish you great luck. And please remember that his choices are not your responsibility to "fix." It may take him losing his children and life as he knows it to get his "stuff" together. I have been in recovery for 12 years and have seen great successes and heartbreaking tragedies. Always remember that God has a plan, and we need to trust in him (which is certainly NOT easy when it comes to our children), but you will get to the other side and one day, life will be better. More errors are made at trick one than at any other specific trick. So, this week, let's consider some of the problems that might face the first active player at trick one the opening leader.

Look only at the West hand and the auction. What would you lead against four hearts?

North was right to respond one diamond. Skip a long diamond suit to show a major only with a weak

responding hand.

What has West learned from the auction? That North-South have a 4-4 heart fit, and North surely has at least five diamonds (otherwise, he would have responded one heart).

Let's go through West's leading options. A club is lousy, straight into declarer's first-bid suit. The diamond queen is superficially tempting, but dummy has length there, and it is usually better to lead a suit not bid by an opponent. A trump is potentially suicidal. That leaves the spade two, which would be my clear choice. Also, a point that is mega-important, the low-card lead from length guarantees at least one honor in the suit. (If you do not have an honor, lead high – top of nothing.)

Here, East, who knows his partner must have the king, wins the first trick with the spade jack, cashes the spade ace and perseveres with the spade four. West exits in a minor suit, and the defenders await the setting trick in hearts.

Note that on any other opening lead declarer can get home with two overtricks. Also, if West leads the 13th spade at trick four, South can succeed with a Devil's Coup, one of the rarest plays. If you are curious, try it and see.




