DOH makes more vaccine available

Much like Thursday, the lines for the Department of Health in Citrus County's second drive-thru distribution began forming throughout the late evening hours Friday, Jan. 8, and into the early morning hours of Saturday, Jan. 9, as area residents sought the first of their two doses to combat the novel coronavirus.

Unlike Thursday when DOH-Citrus distributed 800 doses of the Moderna vaccination, which require a second dose in 28 days, the agency distributed 1,180 shots, according to Audrey Stasko, DOH-Citrus spokeswoman. By 9:55 a.m., the agency had

accounted for all vaccinations to be given, turning away those who didn't make the cutoff despite waiting hours in line along County Road 491. Health department officials wrapped up shortly before 3 p.m., Stasko said.

Stasko confirmed Saturday, those who received their first shot of Moderna from DOH-Citrus, will receive their second shot from the agency, which will receive additional deliveries of the vaccine.

Details about how DOH-Citrus will administer the second dosage are being ironed out, Stasko said. "We will notify recipients either by phone, the website or through local media outlets," she said.

Every year has its glitches and bumps, especially for nonprofit organizations that depend on donations and volunteers.

At the start of 2020, the Community Food Bank of Citrus County had a core crew of about 30 volunteers, plus groups that would come in from businesses or clubs to help receive, sort and give out food to the 56 agencies and food pantries that directly help feed hungry people in Citrus County — an average of two million pounds a year to feed 17,000 people.

In February, the community gathered together at Crystal Harley-Davidson in Homosassa for the third annual Citrus Empty Bowls CFBCC fundraising event, people milling around eating delicious soups from local restaurants.

Postscript: Annie May Hensley  
Epitome of a genteel Southern lady

With a cast iron skillet and a scoop of lard, Annie May Hensley could turn ordinary pieces of chicken into crispy fried bites of heaven on earth.

"Mmm, mmm — we ate Mama's fried chicken almost every Sunday after church," said Rocky Hensley.

Fried chicken and a gift for hospitality, a gentle nature, a spirit of hard work and self-sufficiency and a life lived by the Golden Rule, Annie May Hensley, who died Dec. 29, 2020, at age 94, was the epitome of a genteel Southern lady.

Born in Archer, Florida, Annie May, one of three

sisters, moved to Citrus County with her family when she was about 6.

She graduated from Citrus High School in 1945.

As a certified observer for the Aircraft Warning Service program of the U.S. Army during World War II, she kept watch for enemy aircraft from the Historic Courthouse clock tower in Inverness.

Her claim to fame: In 1961, she appeared as an extra in the courtroom scene of "Follow That Dream" with Elvis Presley — and one time off the set Elvis gave her a piece of gum.

"She couldn't have had a better life," Rocky Hensley said.

Annie May was all

about family.

"I was an only child — my dad left when I was 3 and my mom raised me by herself, and her whole life revolved around raising me," Rocky Hensley said. "My grandmother and grandfather also lived in Inverness, and they helped raise me, too."

To support herself and her son, Annie May worked for the county for 31 years, retiring from the property appraiser's office in 1988.

She lived in a rented house in the area of Grace Street and Osceola Avenue in Inverness until Citrus Memorial Hospital bought the property in that area, including her home.

Sugarmill  
neighbors take  
notice of garage

Donald Dozier's garage is causing quite the stir with his Sugarmill Woods neighbors because of his \$49,000 18-by-38 foot garage.

Why? Sugarmill deed restrictions do not allow for detached garages, but Dozier says his IS attached — by a breezeway.

Although deed restrictions are normally private matters between owners of deed-restricted property and the associations that govern them, residents instead are also blaming Citrus County government for issuing Dozier the wrong permit.

The county has determined the garage was attached because of a breezeway that connects the building with the house — though there are no doors in the breezeway connecting the house to the garage.

Dozier said he's done everything above board.

According to code, a garage is considered an accessory structure to the main building, a house.

Those who are complaining say the garage and the breezeway go against the code. Plus, some think it's an eyesore.



Four Citrus County  
Publix pharmacies  
to administer  
COVID-19 vaccine

Publix announced that four of its store pharmacies in Citrus County will begin administering the COVID-19 vaccine to customers 65 and older by online appointment.

Gov. Ron DeSantis said in a recent news conference in Ocala that 22 Publix pharmacies in Marion, Citrus and Hernando counties will have about 15,000 doses of the Moderna vaccine and that the program can be expanded as more becomes available.

It is expected that each pharmacy will be able to handle up to about 120 vaccinations a day, according to Publix, which is partnering with the Florida Department of Health to administer the vaccine.

"Understand, there will be more demand than they will be able to accommodate at first," DeSantis said. "It doesn't mean you're not going to get in; this is kind of the first inning, if you don't get in this time, try the next day, then the next day. As we get more vaccine, there will be more opportunities to be able to get it. We're not going to quit on this."



All six lanes through  
Homosassa to open  
at end of January

At long last — all six north and south lanes of the 2.1-mile stretch from West Green Acres Street to South Jump Court on U.S. 19 through Homosassa are expected to be open by late January, according to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

The widening project, which began in November 2016, was supposed to wrap up in the spring of 2019.

Even though the lanes may open, the \$31.8-million project will not completely finish until spring 2021.

When done, there will be an additional lane in each direction with paved shoulders, designated bike lanes and sidewalks on both sides of US 19.

There will also be a multi-use path on the east side (next to the north-bound lanes) of U.S. 19. The majority of that path will be 10 feet wide — from Green Acres Street to Homosassa Springs State Park (midway between Yulee Drive and Grover Cleveland Boulevard) — and from Ivy Place to Stonebrook Drive/Jump Court.

"I'm just more than happy this is finally about to be over with," said Bob Kane, manager of Kane's Ace Hardware in Homosassa, whose store is in the epicenter of the widening.

DOH prepares for  
onslaught of people  
wanting COVID-19  
vaccinations

This week, the Department of Health in Citrus County started administering COVID-19 vaccinations.

Last week, the DOH received 2,000 vaccinations and inoculated first responders with the plan of offering the remainder, over 1,000 vaccinations, to people 65 and older in a first come, first served drive-through event Thursday, Jan. 7, at Central Ridge District park in Beverly Hills.

Prior to that, the DOH was inundated with calls and emails about the how and when the vaccinations will be doled out, said Audrey Stasko, the DOH spokeswoman in Citrus County.

Many county residents contacted the Chronicle and the DOH complaining that too many people will come and many will be angry when they get turned away.

"It's going to be chaos," Floral City resident Larry Gawell said.

Too many senior citizens will come in hopes of getting vaccinations and have to wait hours in line, ill-prepared for the crowd of other drivers wanting the same, he said.

### Grants available to businesses affected by COVID expenses

Local businesses starting Monday can apply for two different grants to help them financially due to COVID-19 expenses.

The Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) micro grant will have a minimum award of \$250 up to a maximum \$2,500. It will pay up to \$2,500 for business's PPE expenses incurred between March 1 and Dec. 15, 2020.

The Small Business Retrofit/Adaption grant will have a maximum award of \$10,000 per business.

This is to pay for business's adaptation and modification COVID-related expenses incurred between March 1 and Dec. 15, 2020.

A small business may be eligible for both grants.

The Citrus County Chamber of Commerce recently proposed a plan to county commissioners to offer these grants and commissioners approved and adopted them.

Both grants will be offered through the county on a reimbursement basis and will require the business owner to submit an application online through SurveyMonkey.

# Deputies arrest 10 in bust

Ten people, many of whom had previously been convicted of felony charges, face a number of drug-related charges after a raid Thursday, Jan. 7, in Homosassa, according to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office news release.

The Citrus County Sheriff's Office SWAT team, along with the support of the Hernando County Sheriff's Office SWAT team, executed a search warrant Thursday, Jan. 7, at 6451 W. Park Drive in Homosassa, according to the release issued late Friday, Jan. 8.

Detectives from CCSO's Tactical Impact Unit and Community Crimes Unit were aware of a nuisance residence in the community and developed an investigative strategy to gather evidence that led to the issuance and execution of a narcotics search warrant, the release stated.

Upon arriving at the residence, deputies discovered 14 people living on the property in various sheds, campers and RVs, all of which were utilizing power from the main structure that was already in complete disrepair.

After securing the residence and individuals on scene, the release stated, detectives located various narcotics to include large trafficking amounts of methamphetamine (35.5 grams), black tar heroin, narcotic pills, cannabis wax, and cannabis. A 9mm pistol and \$1,729 in cash were also seized during the search warrant.

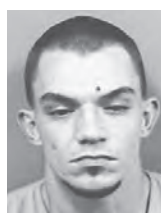

The following subjects were arrested and charged:

■ Mark Charles Weatherly, 20: Trafficking in methamphetamine, possession of a controlled substance (heroin), possession of a controlled substance (buprenorphine), possession of a controlled substance (cannabis wax), possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a handcuff key, resisting arrest without violence and possession of paraphernalia. Weatherly also had an outstanding warrant for failure to appear for possession of paraphernalia. The sheriff's office noted he is a three-time convicted felon.

■ Amy Susan Lyons, 49: Possession of paraphernalia.

■ Jamey Laramée, 44: Possession of paraphernalia; he is a two-time convicted felon.

■ Faith Marie Bergman, 42: Possession of a controlled substance,

possession of cannabis under 20 grams, and possession of paraphernalia. She has three prior felony convictions.

■ Louis Michael Lauro, 47: Possession of a controlled substance, possession of cannabis under 20 grams, possession of paraphernalia, and own/lease/rent a drug dwelling. She has four prior felony convictions.

■ Shonda Lea Sergeant, 33: Possession of a controlled substance, possession of paraphernalia and possession of cannabis under 20 grams. She has two prior felony convictions.

■ Ashlee Rose Felsentreger, 26: Possession of paraphernalia.

■ Richard Clarence Miller, 26: Possession of paraphernalia; four prior felony convictions.

■ Shirley Rena Hughes, 28: Possession of paraphernalia; one prior felony conviction.

■ Ormond Kenneth Revels, 49: Possession of a

controlled substance and possession of paraphernalia. He has 14 prior felony convictions.

"Thank you to our diligent professionals for getting these drugs off our streets," Sheriff Mike Pendergast wrote in the release. "They are the men and women in green that work tirelessly to protect the residents of our great county. We will continue to fight illicit drug activity in our community at every given opportunity. Thanks to great partnerships, like the one we have with the Hernando County Sheriff's Office, drug dealers are not safe anywhere in Florida."

After the arrests of those involved, County Code Compliance responded to the residence to complete a thorough examination of the property's condition. County representatives advised they would begin the legal process to demolish the structures on the property and rid Citrus County completely of the nuisance dwelling.

Those seeking their first round of vaccines Saturday did so as temperatures dipped into the 40s early in the morning, keeping warm by staying inside their vehicles, sleeping when they could, watching shows on their phones or tablets or reading.

Henry Bormann sat patiently inside his truck, with the heater on, thankful he was one of the first vehicles at the front of the line Saturday; a stark comparison to Thursday, he said, when he

was the first vehicle turned away after DOH-Citrus had accounted for all of its doses to be distributed then.

"Disappointed, because you want to get the shot," he said about Thursday, "but it was good and here I am (today), so it worked out."

With the Citrus County Sheriff's Office guiding and directing the flow of traffic into Central Ridge Park, more motorists were able to park inside the county-owned facility as it made use of the open fields under the power lines, said Ernesto "Tito" Rubio, DOH administrator.

"The cooperation between

government agencies just surpasses everyone else," he said about coordination between DOH-Citrus, the sheriff's office and the county.

With the sheriff's office leading the way, Rubio said, getting cars into the park was "tweaked a little bit."

"We learned a lot about how to get the cars inside of the park to keep County Road 491 clear," he said. "That's a big boon today."

The DOH began giving out the shots about 9 a.m. Saturday in a first-come, first-served basis at the county park at 6905 N. County Road 491.

Each Moderna vial

contains 10 doses. Once a vial is punctured with a needle it must be used within six hours, Freta Dunn, DOH's immunization program manager, told the Chronicle on Thursday during its initial vaccine distribution.

Once a vial is taken out of the freezer and is not punctured, it must be used within 28 days.

Much like Thursday, hundreds of people were turned away because there weren't enough vaccines.

"Our mission is to get vaccines in people's arms," Rubio said. "We understand not everyone can come this way and we're working to get vaccines to those people."

Cohen seeks to dismantle Trump legacy, one podcast at a time

NEW YORK — The rehabilitation of **Michael Cohen** has reached a surreal new stage: Quizzing the actor **Ben Stiller** about his approach to impersonating him on “Saturday Night Live.”

Since September, **President Donald Trump’s** former lawyer and fixer has been producing a podcast from the Park Avenue apartment where he is serving the remainder of his prison sentence for lying to Congress, evading taxes and facilitating campaign finance crimes.

The show, “Mea Culpa,” has been downloaded nearly 3 million times and is available in 37 countries, Cohen said. Before Stiller, featured in an episode released Friday, guests have included **Rosie O’Donnell**, the magician and former “Celebrity Apprentice” star **Penn Jillette**, political journalists, and current and former operatives from both parties, including **James Carville** and **Anthony Scaramucci**.

The topic of every show so

far? Blistering criticism of the president’s every move.

Cohen, who once famously claimed he would take a bullet for Trump, said he has made it part of his penance to dismantle Trump’s legacy and “return this nation to a place of sanity,” though he categorizes his show as “a news commentary program” instead of an “anti-Trump program.”

He said he plans to continue his podcast throughout the Biden administration.

“We cannot fool ourselves into believing that Trump will just disappear,” he told The Associated Press. “Accordingly, he will continue to remain a topic of discussion.”

The launch of the podcast followed Cohen’s publication over the summer of a tell-all memoir about his conversion from Trump acolyte to avowed enemy.

In his interview with Stiller, Cohen likened Trump’s signature scowl to the visage of Derek Zoolander, Stiller’s pouty male

model persona. Stiller, for his part, said he recognized in Cohen the “dichotomy” of fear and a killer instinct.

“I felt like there was a humanity in there that I was trying to connect with,” Stiller said, adding he didn’t want his SNL impression “to be this scathing, mean thing.”

Cohen, on the other hand, seems to be going for the jugular, while satisfying his own addiction to the limelight.

He rails breathlessly in every show against the “idiot in chief.” In one recent episode of “Mea Culpa,” he complained that the presidential pardon process had “devolved into a corrupt and transactional circus, with Trump as its ringmaster.”

Trump cutting short his recent Florida vacation and returning to Washington to double down on his challenge to the election results “sent my blood pressure through the roof!” Cohen told listeners in his Long Island cadence.

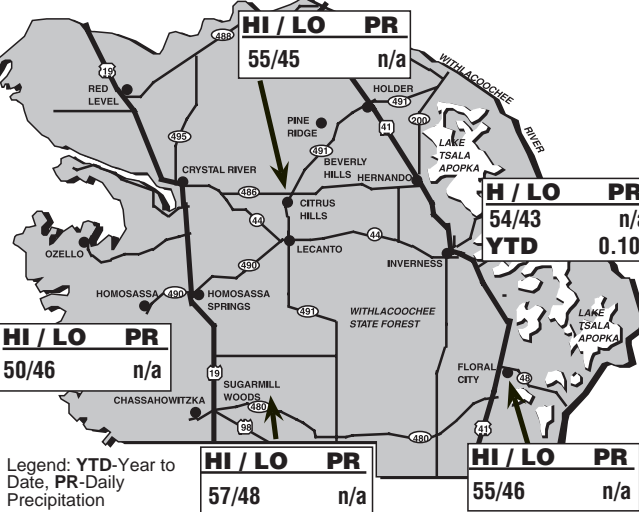

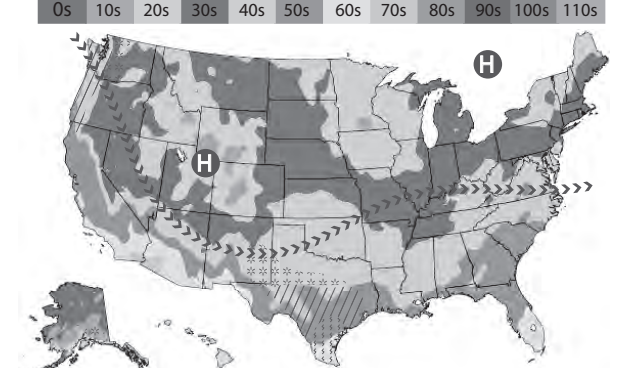

Social distancing wasn't even in the lexicon back then.

In mid-March, the food bank sent out a news release saying: "We've all been taken by surprise by the coronavirus (COVID-19). Many people who have been laid off or furloughed are now finding it difficult to make ends meet. The Community Food Bank of Citrus County (CFBCC)

is committed to keeping the more than 50 local food agencies ... that we serve fully stocked and ready to serve those in need throughout our community."

By the end of 2020, the CFBCC doubled the amount of food they procured and distributed — 4 million pounds — to feed upwards of 60,000 people. And they did it with fewer volunteers.

Plus, they distributed 100,000 cloth face masks provided by Citrus County EOC and Project America Strong to their partnering agencies throughout the community.

In addition, the already-busy folks at the CFBCC agreed to be the staging area for the county Emergency Operations Center whenever they received food from agencies such as FEMA.

"Not only do they have the capability and the capacity to do that, but they also have the willingness to help our citizens out," said Chris Evans, EOC director. "It's a key, essential part of our community to keep people fed and keep them healthy."

Their mission goes beyond ending hunger, said CFBCC board member Johnny Cash.

"We're also nourishing hope," he said. "Ending hunger and

nourishing hope have become the words we live by."

For these and other reasons, the Community Food Bank of Citrus County is the Citrus County Chronicle's inaugural Nonprofit Organization of the Year.

"We have a wonderful community that supports us wholeheartedly, and we were able to do everything that we could to bring in about 4 million pounds of food to feed the community," said Barbara Sprague, CFBCC executive director. "Plus, we've done very well as far as fundraising, even though a lot of our events got annotated. We even got some new donors who saw the need of so

many people who were affected by the pandemic, people who had never asked for assistance before.

"And luckily, many of those people have bounced back," she said.

This year, CFBCC received funding from:

■ Enterprise Holdings Foundation — \$2,500.

■ Wawa in Lecanto — \$2,500.

■ Sam's Club in Brooksville — \$2,000.

In May, Suncoast Credit Union donated \$50,000 and encouraged the community to match their donation.

Thanks to an anonymous

\$50,000 donor and other individuals who stepped up to the plate to make contributions, the match challenge raised a total of \$182,786.

The original \$50,000 from Suncoast Credit Union provided 400,000 meals. The matching contributions provided an additional 1,062,288 meals, a total of 1,462,288 meals to local families in need.

In September, Publix Super Market Charities gave a \$15,000 grant to CFBCC, which provided 120,000 meals.

Sprague said they're set to go into 2021 — as set as they can be in this age of uncertainty.

"It's been a long, hard year — we've been non-non-non-stop, but clearly, we love what we do," she said. "We've been streamlining and reorganizing our building so we can do as much as we can with what we have, and luckily we've all been staying healthy."

"But we're looking forward to the day when our volunteers who have been staying home because of the coronavirus can come back and hopefully some new people will step up and help us, because there's a lot of work to be done."

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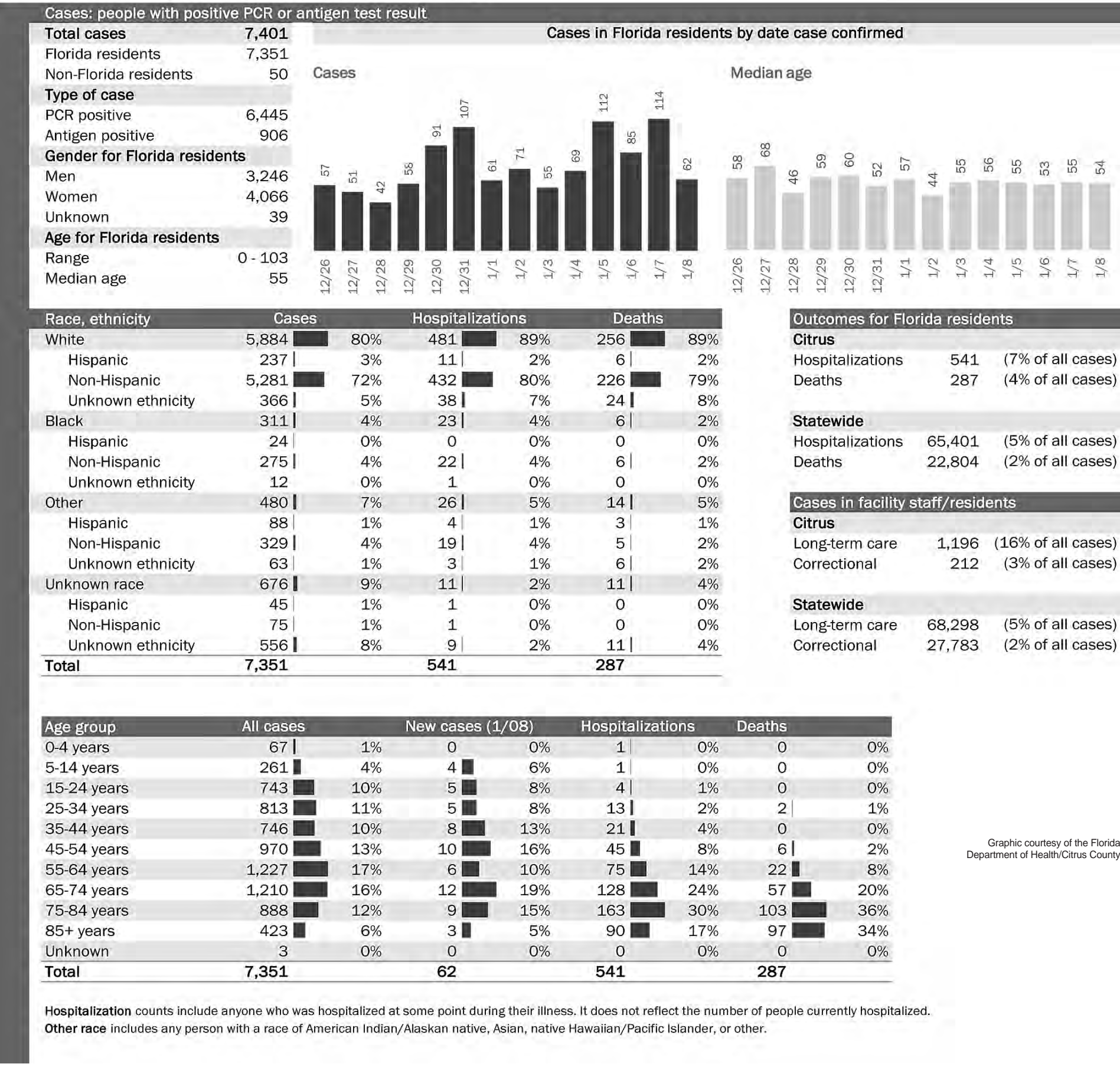

“The house was owned by a family in New Jersey, and they loved Mama,” Hensley said. “All those years she lived there I think they only charged her \$75 (monthly) rent.”

Martha Hinkle, an Inverness native and former neighbor of Annie May, recalled how, as a child, she and her friends would be outside playing and Annie May, always with an apron on, would offer them something to drink or a snack.

“She was a very kind lady,” Hinkle said. “Miss Annie May fed everyone. We knew her mom, too, because she was the lunchroom lady at the school, and she fed us too.

“She was giving, and always had a positive attitude. She was a true friend to so many and will be greatly missed.”

To Melanie Hensley, Annie May was the ideal mother-in-law.

“You hear horror stories about mothers-in-law and daughters-in-law, but we never had that at all,” she said. “She loved me as her daughter for 43 years, and it was a great relationship — no squabbles at all, which was wonderful.”

As a grandmother, Annie May doted on her grandchildren.

“Grandmas are here to spoil grand-kids and she always made sure to do just that,” said Hillary Hammerle. “Once when I was in elementary school, I stayed home from school ‘sick’ and we would always go to Fat Boys BBQ for lunch.

“Also, I remember driving home from lunch and she ran a stop sign. Sure enough, there was an officer watching. She got pulled over and I was sure to tell the officer she was speeding! She never forgot that,” she said.

“She also taught me that no matter what people did or said, to be kind — kill them with kindness. I like to think I am like her in that way,” Hammerle said.

Hammerle also recalled how her grandma loved to brush her hair:

“If we got ready at her house in the morning before school, she would beg to brush my hair,” she said. “I would give anything to let her brush my hair one more time.”

Annie May Hensley rarely, if ever, complained. She did not gossip, was patient, gentle and kind.

She had a heart of gold and would help anyone in need. She was probably one the longest members of First Presbyterian Church of Inverness — and she made some of the best peanut butter fudge you ever ate.

If she had something you needed, it became yours.

“My memories of Grandma: walking me — crying of course — down the hallway to kindergarten everyday and visiting the school clinic frequently because I knew she'd come pick me up,” said her granddaughter, Kristen Todd.

“We would watch the ‘Price is Right’ and her ‘programs’ — soap operas. She would cook anything I wanted, but it was usually grits and eggs or potato soup.

“After school she would take my sister and I to TCBY for ice cream. As an adult, her advice was always, ‘Well, Kristen, you just do what you need to do!’ spoken in her Southern accent and sweet voice,” Todd said.

“My own children — Makayla, Kinnley, and Jackson — would always leave her house with a parting gift, a book, a notepad, a trinket, or a loaf of her delicious banana bread.

“I will miss being able to just stop by and visit, her sweet tea, and her famous fried chicken,” she said. “But most of all, I'll just miss her.”

# 2021 – More support for our veterans



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An array of national initiatives to assist veterans have been passed to make life more comfortable for those who have served the United States.

## National bill passages assist active, retired US military members

This year we'll see dramatic and very important changes in support of our veterans and their families after passage of some Congressional actions subsequently approved and signed by our President. These include the 4,500-page National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) which specifies the annual budget and expenditures of the U.S. Department of Defense and the Congressional Bill H.R. 7105, titled "The Johnny Isakson and David P. Roe M.D. Veterans Health Care and Benefits Improvement Act of 2020," named for former Republican leaders of the House and Senate veterans' affairs committees.

The NDAA includes a 3% military pay raise, a halt to proposed military

medical cuts, military treatment facility (MTF) reorganization, and the addition of three conditions to the list of ailments presumed connected to Agent Orange exposure for Vietnam War veterans suffering from bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinson's-like symptoms. The provision would add these diseases to the VA presumptive list, which lowers the amount of proof veterans must provide in order to receive VA benefits.

The creation of the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) in 1972 allows a military retiree or retirement-eligible service member to ensure a continuous lifetime annuity for their dependents by paying monthly premiums for a maximum of 30 years. Another benefit

titled Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) that could be received by a widow sadly offsets the money received from SBP, dollar-for-dollar. This offset is sometimes referred to as a "widow's tax" and has been a terrible action causing severe hardships for many spouses. As example, DIC is a monthly benefit paid to eligible survivors of service members who:

- Died while on active duty, active duty for training or inactive duty training.

- Died as a result of a service-connected injury or disease.

- Did not die as a result of a service-connected injury or disease, but were totally disabled by a service-connected disability for at least 10 years before death.

- Were released from active duty for at least five years before death,

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or for at least one year before death.

■ Were a former prisoner of war and died after Sept. 30, 1999.

But SBP and DIC are completely different programs, paid by separate federal agencies, and the dollar-for-dollar reduction is unfair. Thankfully, the NDAA completely eliminates the Widow's Tax, though in phases. In 2021, one-third of the SBP will be restored. In 2022, two-thirds will be restored. On Jan. 1, 2023, the SBP will be completely restored and surviving spouses will receive their SBP and DIC payments in full. In addition, the SBP child-only option, which was a work-around created after 9/11 for surviving spouses of active-duty deaths to receive the full SPB until their children turned 18 (or 23, if in college), is also repealed. The surviving spouses who elected to use that benefit, can restore their eligibility regardless of their children's ages. And, since income does not matter for DIC benefits, receipt of Social Security benefits will not affect DIC eligibility. If entitled to DIC benefits, the spouse should draw it and Social Security. DIC eligibility may include some surviving children, certain helpless adult children and surviving children. I know this can be confusing and there are other parameters in spouse eligibility but information can be found by calling 800-827-1000 or by going to the website <https://tinyurl.com/y6em2js9>.

H.R. 7105 is also a lengthy read, about 340 pages, and addresses numerous veterans related support areas including:

Easing the federal grant process for organizations that aid homeless veterans. The organizations need money to help veterans get into housing and



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to renovate shelters to account for social distancing during the current pandemic situation. Plus, America's 162 state-run veterans' homes are now required to regularly report to the VA about their coronavirus cases and deaths before Feb. 4 and

beneficiaries, a problem being seen more and more as unscrupulous businesses attempt to rip off veteran students. In fact, the bill requires VA to determine whether schools undergoing legal or punitive actions by the government should be

requiring teams who specialize in military sexual trauma to process benefit claims allowing veterans who must be examined during the claims process to choose the sex of the medical provider examining them.

Supporting Native American veterans by prohibiting the VA from charging them copayments and creating an advisory committee to the VA secretary about the unique challenges facing tribal veterans is a provision of this bill. And, within one year of this law becoming effective, all Native Americans will be exempt from any VA copay for health care or medication, regardless of whether the individual has a service-connected disability.

Beginning in 2023, the VA will be getting into the life insurance business as directed by this bill. VA will offer all disabled veterans under age 81 a whole-life policy. The program will be similar to Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI); however, under that program veterans must sign up for VGLI within 16 months after leaving the service. The new insurance program will have no such time limit. This is going to significantly help our senior citizen veterans and their families who do not have VGLI. Policies will be limited to a \$40,000 payout for most veterans

when the program begins.

Currently, only Guard and Reserve members who have or had at least 90 days of active service are eligible for home loans while those without active-duty service are ineligible for the loan. Under this bill, they will now be eligible to receive a VA home loan beginning in 2021 if they have at least 90 days of service and 30 of those days have been consecutive.

There are also several changes in this bill for the support of deceased veterans and their families. Currently, the VA will pay only to transport a deceased veteran's remains to a national veterans cemetery. Within two years of the bill becoming law, VA will pay costs to transport a deceased veteran's remains to state and tribal veterans cemeteries and the VA will begin furnishing urns for storing the cremated remains of deceased veterans. Families will have the option of receiving a

free headstone or burial urn, but not both. Currently, most veterans are eligible to receive a free headstone upon their death, but not an urn. Also, veterans who receive the free VA-issued headstone and are buried in either a state or private cemetery will be able to have their spouse's name engraved on the headstone at no cost. Currently, families must pay to have the spouse's name engraved on a VA-issued headstone. This will be effective for deaths going back to Oct. 1, 2019.

Finally, Congress approved a 3% military pay raise effective Jan. 1, 2021. The raise matches the administration's request and nearly matches the FY 2020 raise of 3.1%, which was the largest pay increase for servicemembers in 10 years. Congress also increased Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay from \$250 to \$275 month for duty in a

VA is now required to publicly post the number of coronavirus cases and deaths at those homes.

Under this bill, when a Medal of Honor awardee dies, that veteran's pension will continue and be paid to the surviving spouse if not receiving Dependency Indemnity Compensation (DIC). The current Medal of Honor pension is \$1,388.68 a month, revised annually based on inflation.

This bill provides aid for veterans attending school by increasing legal protections for GI Bill benefits and ordering more scrutiny on schools with a history of taking advantage of

eliminated from receiving any GI Bill funds.

Creating a dedicated Office of Women's Health at the Department of Veterans Affairs that provides \$20 million to retrofit VA hospitals with women's health spaces, this bill makes permanent a program to provide child care at VA facilities, mandates every VA hospital to hire a dedicated women's health provider, requires VA to create an anti-harassment and anti-sexual assault policy, and to designate someone at each facility to receive reports of harassment. Also, included are other items related to this very subject including

## Annie gives advice

**D**ear Annie: My sister is 75 years old. She is a hoarder. She has lived at home her whole life and started accumulating junk soon after my dad died 10 years ago. If something comes into the house, it isn't going out, as it is with most hoarders. So you can imagine what an appalling situation it has become.

My sister took care of my mom, who was in a wheelchair until she died two years ago at age 93. I spent thousands of dollars between the time when my mom became ill and when she died, driving a 50-mile round trip every day for six years to help my sister take care of her. And I continued to do so every other weekend after our mom died, bringing my grandsons to visit so my sister wouldn't feel lonely.

Recently, I took a tumble at the dog park and fractured my kneecap. I asked my sister whether I could borrow one of Mom's wheelchairs for a while. She told me to go look for one at Goodwill.

I figured that her mounds of precious junk must be more important to her than my many years of loyalty, and I don't want to ever visit her again. And she can't visit me because she can't bear the thought of getting rid of her broken-down Buick to buy a new one.

Do you think she would

get help with her problem if I stopped seeing her, or would she just be happy alone with her stuff? — *Snuffed Out by Stuff*

**Dear Snuffed Out by Stuff:** Hoarding is a form of obsessive-compulsive disorder. The disorder does not operate in the realm of logic. You can't reason with it. And you shouldn't take it personally — because as much as it might seem to you that your sister is choosing her stuff over you, she's not really choosing anything at this point. She's simply acting on compulsions.

If you want to stop visiting her for the sake of your own well-being, I applaud the boundary-setting. But it sounds as though you want to stop visiting her because you hope it would spur her to get help. If that's the case, you want to control the uncontrollable, and you'd most likely end up even more frustrated. Instead of basing decisions on how they might or might not impact her hoarding behavior, base your decisions on what's healthy for you.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Florida Public Service Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$26.50 per month and business services are \$37.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in a government benefit program (Lifeline) to make residential telephone or broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers are those that meet eligibility standards as defined by the FCC and state commissions. foreign area designated as an imminent danger area or high-risk duties.

So, we are seeing some important improvements in veterans and their families support by our country and the VA. As many of you know by now, improving support to us is a pet peeve of mine. When you don a uniform, take an oath to defend our great country and in doing so offer your life for freedom, we deserve honor and support in return. As do our families who have sacrificed so much during our service in uniform. But there is still much

more to do. I won't go into details but this article was generated after a 5-hour experience today, a very bad experience I might add, while dealing with what I frequently refer to as the "system" communications issues between civilian and VA medical care and veterans. Unfortunately, there are a number of procedures and practices still needing improvement between each of them. However, actions by the NDAA, the referenced bill and other ongoing programs may lead to improvement.

I have had many veterans ask me when we would be receiving the coronavirus vaccine and I am sorry to say I have no definitive answer. I was

informed by a VA representative recently that the Pfizer serum cannot be given at the Lecanto Clinic due to cold storage requirements but I've yet to see any information about other vaccines being administered at their location. I did receive a message from another state's VA system at my previous residence indicating that my age bracket and health condition places me 16th in priority of receiving a vaccine. I'm 75 with cancer, severe heart problems and other medical conditions and am certainly glad I am not 29 and healthy. Actually, I do.

Please follow my occasional articles here in the Chronicle which I do for

you and as therapeutic help for an Agent Orange related memory health issue I struggle with daily. And, before I do forget it, thanks to the Chronicle for continuing to allow us to have veterans information in their publication and on their website.

God Bless America, our veterans in harms way and their wonderful families awaiting return of heroes.

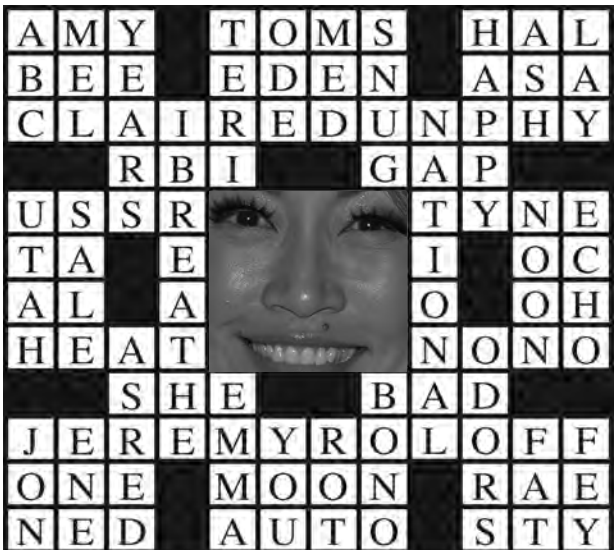

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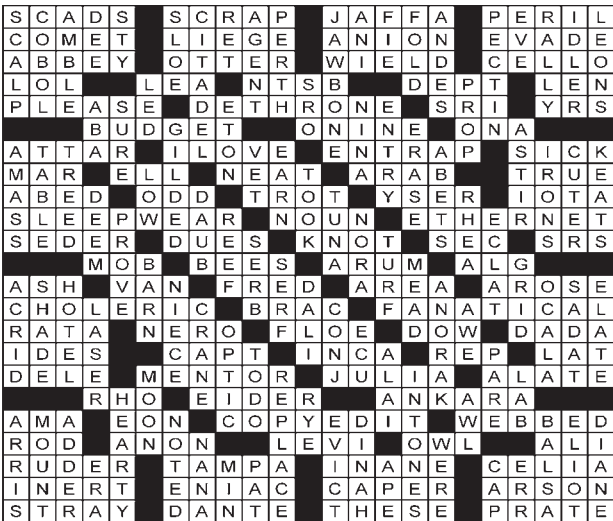

## Bills: 1st playoff win since 1995

### Colts' comeback attempt fall short

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. — Quarterback Josh Allen and safety Micah Hyde teamed up to make the Buffalo Bills' losing past history.

Now do you Bill-ieve?

In a season in which the Bills busted numerous slumps, Allen became Buffalo's first starter in a quarter century to win a playoff game. And Hyde ensured the Bills wouldn't endure another second-half collapse as happened last year in a wild-card loss to Houston, or last-second touchdown.

With Buffalo the AFC East champions for the first time since 1995 and hosting their first playoff game since '96, Allen threw two touchdown passes and scored another rushing in leading the Bills to a 27-24 win over the Indianapolis Colts in a wild-card game Saturday.

Hyde batted down Philip Rivers' desperation pass as time ran out in helping Buffalo snap an 0-6 postseason skid by winning its first playoff game since a 37-22 win over Miami on Dec. 30, 1995.

The past was very much present in Allen's mind when reflecting on how Buffalo squandered a 16-0 third-quarter lead in a 22-19 overtime loss to Houston in his first career playoff appearance.

"Obviously we started off a little slow and we were able to get into a rhythm late. Made enough plays to win," Allen said. "It's new territory for myself, but it just gives us a chance to play next week."

The end of the game was so stunning, in which the Bills nearly squandered a 24-10 fourth-quarter lead, safety Jordan Poyer was still having difficulty trying to put the result in perspective.

"I haven't had time to celebrate and take it in, but this is awesome for the Bills organization, the city, to be able to play a

## Rams get better of Seahawks

### Overcome injuries, topple Seattle 30-20

SEATTLE — A lot of Cam Akers churning yards on the ground and mostly a great Rams defense has Los Angeles moving on in the NFC playoffs at the expense of division-foe Seattle.

Akers rushed for 131 yards and a touchdown, Darious Williams returned Russell Wilson's interception 42 yards for a score, and the Rams beat the Seahawks 30-20 in the NFC

wild-card playoff game Saturday.

"A lot of guys stepped up and answered the bell in a big way," Rams coach Sean McVay said. "Darious Williams showing up, I thought that was a huge momentum shift for us."

The best defense in the league during the regular season carried its dominance into the playoffs — even while missing unanimous All-Pro tackle Aaron Donald for much of the second half. No team was better at limiting yards or points than the Rams (11-6) and they continued to torment Wilson and the Seahawks (12-5).

Seattle's quarterback was under siege from the defensive front and a secondary that minus one play never let DK Metcalf or Tyler Lockett break loose. Donald, before leaving with a rib injury, and Jalen

Ramsey were superb. But so were other role players such as Troy Reeder, Jordan Fuller and Leonard Floyd.

Floyd had two of the Rams' five sacks. Two of the others belonged to Donald. The Rams allowed just 278 total yards and 11 first downs.

It added up to sending the Rams into next week's divisional playoff round, likely at top-seeded Green Bay unless Chicago upsets New Orleans.

Williams' interception was his third of the season against Wilson after picking him off twice in Los Angeles in November. He jumped a wide receiver screen intended for Metcalf and returned it untouched to give the Rams a 13-3 lead midway

# Hardaway, Burke lead Mavs past Magic

*Ball youngest in NBA with triple-double*

DALLAS — Tim Hardaway Jr. scored a season-high 36 points, Trey Burke did the same with 29 and Luka Doncic had another triple-double as the short-handed Dallas Mavericks beat the Orlando Magic 112-98 on Saturday night.

Hardaway and Burke took on expanded roles to help Dallas get over .500 for the first time this season with starters Josh Richardson and Dorian Finney-Smith and backup point guard Jalen Brunson sidelined by COVID-19 protocols.

The three Mavericks didn't return with the team from Denver following a 124-117 overtime win Thursday, and coach Rick Carlisle wouldn't discuss how long they would be out. One of the three, who hasn't been identified, tested positive for the virus.

Hardaway and Burke made it a rather quiet second triple-double of the season for Doncic, combining to 15 of 21 from 3-point range while the star point guard had 20 points, 11 rebounds and 10 assists.

Burke, who missed the Denver trip because of an illness that Carlisle said wasn't coronavirus-related, was 7 of 8 from long range to help the Mavericks finish 20 of 40 against an Orlando team tied for the fewest 3s allowed per game coming in.

Nikola Vucevic had 30 points and 15 rebounds, and Aaron Gordon scored 16 points a night after

missing a 42-point loss in Houston with a sore left hamstring as the Magic lost their ninth straight game in Dallas and fell to 2-4 since a 4-0 start.

Doncic capped a roller-coaster third quarter by beating the buzzer with a long 3-pointer for an 85-75 lead. The Mavericks led by six at halftime, then trailed by six in the third after a 15-1 Orlando run started by the only 3 from Gordon. Dallas answered with an 18-2 run, with Hardaway scoring 12.

## Hornets 113, Hawks 105

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — LaMelo Ball became the youngest player in NBA history to record a triple-double with 22 points, 12 rebounds and 11 assists, and the Charlotte Hornets beat the Atlanta Hawks 113-105 for their third

straight win.

The 19-year-old Ball replaced Markelle Fultz as the youngest NBA player to record a triple-double by 177 days.

Ball, the third overall pick in the NBA draft, was 9 of 13 from the field as the Hornets handed the struggling Hawks their fourth straight loss. He became only the fifth rookie in NBA history to record a triple-double and the first Hornets player ever to reach that plateau coming off the bench.

Terry Rozier scored 23 points for the Hornets.

## Nuggets 115, 76ers 103

PHILADELPHIA — Nikola Jokic had 15 points and 12 assists to lead Denver past Philadelphia, beating a 76ers team that had only seven available players because of injuries and

COVID-19 protocols.

The Sixers tipped without four regular starters — All-Stars Ben Simmons (sore left knee) and Joel Embiid (back) due to injury, and Seth Curry and Tobias Harris over virus concerns. Coach Doc Rivers said he didn't think the game should be played.

Curry learned of his positive coronavirus test while the team played Thursday in Brooklyn, and the additional testing, contact tracing and COVID-19 health and safety protocols led to a slew of unavailable players.

The team met the minimum eight active players by including injured forward Mike Scott, who was not actually able to play.

Tyrese Maxey led the Sixers with 39 points in 44 minutes on 18-of-33 shooting in his first career start, and Isaiah Joe had 13 points.

## Bucks 100, Cavaliers 90

MILWAUKEE — Khris Middleton scored 27 points and Milwaukee withstood the absence of two-time reigning MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo to beat Cleveland.

Antetokounmpo sat out with back spasms after taking a hard fall one night earlier in a loss to the Utah Jazz.

Bobby Portis replaced Antetokounmpo in Milwaukee's starting lineup and scored 17 points as the Bucks (6-4) closed a five-game home stretch in which they went 4-1. After Jrue Holiday made the game's first basket, Portis scored the Bucks' next 10 points.

The Bucks overcame a huge performance from Cleveland's Andre Drummond, who had 26 points and 24 rebounds. Drummond was the first Cavalier to have at least 20 points and 20 rebounds in the same game since Anderson Varejao did it against Boston on Jan. 31, 2012.

## Heat 128, Wizards 124

WASHINGTON — Tyler Herro scored a career-high 31 points and Jimmy Butler nearly had a triple-double with 26 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists as Miami beat short-handed Washington.

Washington played without the NBA's leading scorer, Bradley Beal, who was a late scratch when he was placed in the NBA's health and safety protocol.

Miami has alternated wins and losses through its first eight games. The Wizards lost their third straight and are winless in five home games.

They were also without their other starting guard, Russell Westbrook, out with a left quad injury. Westbrook, who had triple-doubles in his first four games with the

Wizards, was intending to play the second half of a back-to-back for the first time after sitting out the first two.

## Spurs 125, Timberwolves 122, OT

MINNEAPOLIS — DeMar DeRozan scored 38 points, helping San Antonio beat Minnesota in Karl-Anthony Towns' return to the Timberwolves.

DeRozan, who went 13 for 23 from the floor and 12 of 13 from the line, had 13 points after the third quarter and keyed San Antonio's third straight victory with his relentless drives to the basket. Dejounte Murray (22 points) and Patty Mills (21 points) knocked down plenty of timely 3-pointers.

Towns, who missed the last six games with a partial dislocation of his left wrist, had 25 points and 13 rebounds in 37 minutes as Minnesota's losing streak hit seven games.

Malik Beasley scored 29 points on 7-for-11 shooting from 3-point range, his last make pulling the Timberwolves within three points with 37 seconds left.

## Suns 125, Pacers 117

INDIANAPOLIS — Mikal Bridges scored a career-high 34 points and Devin Booker added 25, leading Phoenix over Indiana.

Phoenix pulled into a tie with the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers for the best record in the Western Conference at 7-3 after earning its first road win over the Pacers since 2016.

All-Star forward Domantas Sabonis had 28 points and matched his career high with 22 rebounds for the Pacers, who had a two-game winning streak snapped.

Phoenix used a late first-half run to take a 56-53 half-time lead, then opened the second half by scoring the first five points.

# Brooks' return ignites Kentucky in win over Florida

GAINESVILLE — In his first game of the season, Keion Brooks Jr. scored 12 points on 6-for-8 shooting and Kentucky more closely resembled its No. 10 preseason ranking by throttling Florida 76-58 on Saturday.

Brooks is the only returning scholarship player who played last season, and only until last week was he medically cleared to return to competition after missing the first nine games of the season with a left leg injury.

Although he'd been conditioning and participating with the team in non-contact drills, Thursday was his first full practice since the injury.

Though topping 70 points for the third straight game, the Wildcats exerted high energy on the defensive end and held Florida to 37.5% shooting (21 for 56) and scored 25 points off 16 Gators turnovers.

The Wildcats (4-6, 3-0 Southeastern Conference) used a 16-4 run to start the second half after leading 35-29 at the break.

Brandon Boston Jr. and Davion Mintz each scored 13 for Kentucky and Olivier Sarr 10.

Anthony Duruji scored 15 for Florida (5-3, 2-2) and Tyree Appleby 10.

Kentucky has won three straight and will ready itself to play Alabama (9-3, 4-0) in an early-conference matchup for the top spot in the SEC on Tuesday.

## No. 4 Texas 72, No. 14 West Virginia 70

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — Andrew Jones hit a 3-pointer with 1.8 seconds left to lift No. 4 Texas to a 72-70 victory over No. 14 West Virginia.

Jones took a pass from Courtney Ramey and hit an uncontested shot from the right corner after West Virginia's Emmitt Matthews missed two free throws with 11 seconds left.

Ramey scored 19 points for Texas (10-1, 4-0 Big 12), which trailed for

most of the game and had to come from nine points down in the second half. Jones finished with 16 points, Matt Coleman had 13 and freshman Greg Brown had 12 points and 14 rebounds.

Texas scored the final seven points of the game and avenged last year's 38-point loss at West Virginia, which the fifth-worst loss in program history and the worst under coach Shaka Smart.

Taz Sherman scored 17 points, Sean McNeil added 14 points and Derek Culver had his seventh double-double of the season, with 14 points and 16 rebounds, for the Mountaineers (9-4, 2-3).

## No. 1 Gonzaga 116, Portland 88

PORTLAND, Ore. — Joel Ayayi posted the first triple-double in Gonzaga history and the Bulldogs routed Portland for their 16th straight win.

Ayayi had 12 points, 14 assists and 13 rebounds, and Drew Timme had 26 points for the Bulldogs (12-0, 3-0 West Coast Conference), who were riding the nation's longest active winning streak.

Ahmed Ali had 19 points for the Pilots (6-5, 0-2), who have lost 13 straight against Gonzaga.

## No. 2 Baylor 67, TCU 49

FORT WORTH, Texas — Jared Butler scored a season-high 28 points and Baylor stayed undefeated with another another double-digit win even after trailing at halftime for the first time this season.

MaCio Teague added 12 points and Davion Mitchell had 10 for the Bears (11-0, 4-0 Big 12).

Mike Miles had 15 of his 17 points by halftime for the Horned Frogs (9-4, 2-3), who led at halftime only because of the freshman's highlight buzzer-beating 3-pointer from about 65 feet that made it 28-27.

## No. 6 Kansas 63, Oklahoma 59

LAWRENCE, Kan. — David McCormack hit the clinching short hook shot with 12.8 seconds to go, giving the Kansas big man 17 points against short-handed Oklahoma.

Ochai Agbaji added 14 points and Jalen Wilson had nine points and 11 rebounds, helping Kansas (11-2, 4-1 Big 12) avoid back-to-back losses in Allen Fieldhouse for the

## No. 7 Creighton 97, St. John's 79

OMAHA, Neb. — Denzel Mahoney scored a season-high 24 points to lead six players in double figures with star Marcus Zegarowski out of the lineup, and Creighton pulled away early in a victory over St. John's.

The Bluejays (10-2, 6-1) won their sixth straight Big East game in the same season for the first time since joining the conference in 2013. The Red Storm (6-6, 1-5) dropped to 0-4 on the road.

## No. 9 Tennessee 68, Texas A&M 54

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Santiago Vescov scored a career-high 23 points, including six 3-pointers, and Tennessee beat Texas A&M.

Vescov's hot hand began early

for the Vols (9-1, 3-1 Southeastern Conference) as he hit his first four shots from behind the arc. His barrage was a part of a 17-4 Tennessee run that pushed the Volunteers' lead to 14 midway through the opening half.

Senior Savion Flagg was the Aggies' saving grace at the end of the first, connecting on three consecutive 3-pointers to pull the Aggies (6-4, 1-3) within six. Flagg entered Saturday's contests on a 3-for-21 clip from the field over the previous three games.

## No. 11 Houston 71, Tulane 50

# Cup finalists land in altered Central Division

*Lightning will battle Stars among others*

The NHL's pandemic-altered divisions were set up based on geography in the hope that reducing travel will help the games go on.

Each of the four divisions are stacked with talented teams in the professional sports league with perhaps the most parity on the planet.

The Central Division, though, has some unusual quirks: It features the defending Stanley Cup champion Tampa Bay Lightning and the runner-up Dallas Stars among its eight teams. The division is also guaranteed a new champion because St. Louis and Colorado, who finished 1-2 in the Central last season, were sent to the West Division.

"We like our team, but like every team in the league there are a lot of questions about how this is all going to work," Stars general manager Jim Nill said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press. "Who will get off to a quick start, or a slow start? Who is going to get hit hard by the injury bug. But, it's all good because we're back to the sport we love."

With some key players injured and some affected by COVID-19 this week, the Stars might get off to a slow start again. Dallas won one of its first eight games last season and had a six-game losing streak when the league paused play in March because of the pandemic.

That didn't stunt the Stars because they lasted until Game 6 of the Stanley Cup Final.

The new-look Central also includes Carolina, Chicago, Columbus, Detroit, Florida and Nashville. They will all get to know one another well because each of the 56 games in the regular season that starts on Wednesday night and ends in early May will be within the division.

Tampa Bay is shooting to be just the fourth NHL team in three decades to repeat. The defending champions will be led by Steven Stamkos up front, Conn Smythe Trophy winner Victor Hedman on defense and Vezina Trophy finalist Andrei Vasilevskiy in net.

"It's the toughest trophy in sports to win, but it's the best feeling in the world lifting the Cup over your head," Hedman said. "It's contagious."

## PANDEMIC PLAY

Just days before the season is scheduled to start, a pair of Central Division teams were already affected by COVID-19.

Six Dallas players and two staff members tested positive

for the coronavirus, according to the NHL, in a development that pushes back the Stars' opener by nearly a week. The Stars were to open Jan. 14 at Florida.

Columbus kept a number of players off the ice "out of abundance of caution" on Friday due to the league's COVID-19 protocols.

## MISSING STARS

The Lightning will be without last year's leading scorer, Nikita Kucherov, who had season-ending hip surgery.

Dallas All-Star center Tyler Seguin (hip) and goaltender Ben Bishop (knee) are expected to be out for about three months of the four-month regular season.

## BACKING THE BLUE

The Blue Jackets extended their franchise record postseason streak to four last year, proving those wrong who thought losing Artemi Panarin and Sergei Bobrovsky in free agency would set them back.

To keep a talented and young player in the future, Columbus signed forward Oliver Bjorkstrand to a five-year contract extension worth \$27 million to avoid this being the last season on his deal.

The Blue Jackets went looking to boost their scoring with some help at center and found it in Max Domi, who was acquired in a trade with Montreal for forward Josh Anderson.

"I think we are ready," defenseman Seth Jones said. "We've



actually had a great group here the past few weeks skating and a lot of the guys that came in early to kind of get that groove back with each other."

## SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN

The first of eight scheduled Stanley Cup Final rematches is Jan. 17 when Tampa Bay hosts Dallas, assuming the Stars' schedule is not overhauled because of virus issues.

The defending conference champions will play consecutive

games against each other four times with one potentially, interesting stretch. The Stars will face the Lightning at home Feb. 18 and 20 and after two games against other opponents, they will meet again Feb. 27 and March 1 in Florida.

With so many games against common opponents with only one day between games, teams in the division expect emotions to boil over and gloves to get dropped at times.

"Ah, yeah, I think I'm gonna be in the penalty box a little bit more than I expected, just with

# Under Day, offense and QBs have taken off

*Buckeyes have evolved since last national title win*

Much has been made of Alabama's transformation from a dynasty built on Nick Saban's calling card lock-down defense to one powered by a prolific offense.

No. 3 Ohio State, which faces the top-ranked Crimson Tide on Monday night in the national championship game, has undergone an offensive evolution of its own in recent years.

Former Ohio State coach Urban Meyer's desire to rejuvenate an attack that was shut out in the 2016 playoff by Clemson led him to Ryan Day, who provided exactly what the Buckeyes needed to become more potent and — as a huge bonus — ended up being an ideal successor to his former boss.

"When he got here, I had the opportunity just to see him coach. I knew we were going to be different," Ohio State athletic director Gene Smith said. "His football IQ overall is phenomenal, but offensively it's at another level. He's a creative thinker. His ability to analyze and dissect, you know, the chess game, so to speak, is really, really outstanding."

Day was hired as quarterbacks coach and co-offensive coordinator by Meyer in 2017, just days after the Buckeyes lost 31-0 in the Fiesta Bowl semifinal to Clemson. Since then, Ohio State's offense has taken off. Not only have the Buckeyes become more productive, but the way they play has helped make the program a more desirable destination for blue-chip quarterbacks.

Sort of like Alabama.

"We had a pretty prolific offense with that we were doing, but we needed to recognize what was happening around us," Smith said.

The last time Ohio State won a

national championship was 2014, the first year of the playoff. Meyer's spread offense leaned heavily on the read-option and quarterback running game. J.T. Barrett played most of that season at quarterback and became a Heisman Trophy contender. Famously, Cardale Jones stepped in after Barrett was injured late in the season and led the Buckeyes to the title.

Jones was not as good a runner as Barrett, but had a much bigger arm to stretch the field. That seemed to help when the Buckeyes faced Alabama in the semifinals.

The next two seasons, Ohio State's offense produced good numbers and the team continued to pile up victories. On talent and athleticism alone, the Buckeyes could overwhelm most opponents but the offense was occasionally inconsistent — especially against the best competition.

The low point came against Clemson in Arizona. The Buckeyes had nine first downs and 215 total yards.

"I'm not used to it. We're not used to it. It's not going to happen again," Meyer said then.

Meyer cleaned house and hired Day, who was coming off a two-year stint in the NFL, and former Indiana coach Kevin Wilson to be co-offensive coordinators.

"When we came here it wasn't like we were putting ideas in. We were learning what Coach Meyer wanted us to do, period," Wilson said.

Day said his discussions with Meyer were mostly about how best to utilize talent.

"Each year it's changed, tweaked here and there, but at the end of the day I think the basis of (the offense) has pretty much stayed the same," Day said this week.

Day's roots go back to New Hampshire, where he played quarterback for Chip Kelly, who was offensive coordinator at the FCS school. Kelly had known Day for years before coaching him.

"When he was done playing and got into coaching it was kind of a no-brainer," said Kelly, now

head coach at UCLA.

Day landed on Meyer's staff in Florida as a graduate assistant and stayed connected to Meyer's coaching tree, working with Steve Addazio, a former Florida assistant, at Temple and Boston College.

Kelly brought Day to the NFL for two seasons with Philadelphia and San Francisco. When Day returned to college football he did so with the blueprint of an NFL passing game that attacks the field more vertically than Meyer's offense did.

Day also brought an understanding of maybe the biggest difference between the NFL and college game: You can't be the same team every week.

"It's about matchups," Kelly said. "I think he did a really good job in the Clemson game in matching their tight ends. That was an advantage for him, their tight ends on the Clemson linebackers and safeties. And that's what the NFL taught us is that

each week the matchup's different."

In 2018, with Dwayne Haskins at quarterback and Day now promoted to sole offensive coordinator, the Ohio State offense moved closer to what it is today. Day also took over as acting coach for three games while Meyer was serving a suspension related to his handling of domestic violence allegations involving a former assistant coach.

The Buckeyes won all three games without Meyer, and Haskins went on to become a Heisman Trophy finalist and the first Ohio State quarterback drafted in first-round in more than 30 years.

When Meyer stepped down after 2018, Day was Smith's choice to take over. His first big win? Persuading quarterback Justin Fields, a former five-star recruit, to transfer from Georgia to Ohio State sight unseen.

"It was just Ohio State's — their success with quarterbacks

on the college level and just the amount of success that I would have under Coach Day and being able to learn from him, because of course he's been in the NFL. He's been to the level that I'm trying to go," Fields said.

Last season with Fields, Ohio State averaged 6.94 yards per play, its best output since the 2014 season (6.98). This season, the Buckeyes are at 7.51 after going for 8.87 against Clemson in the Sugar Bowl semifinal.

And while Fields will likely be high first-round pick in the next NFL draft, the Buckeyes quarterback room is looking good for the future after signing two four-star recruits in 2020 (C.J. Stroud and Jack Miller). Ohio State also has a commitment from 2022 five-star Quinn Ewers.

Meyer went 83-9 in seven seasons at Ohio State. Remarkably, the Buckeyes still appear to be trending up with Day.



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# Two tied for the lead at Tournament of Champions

*Palmer, English enter last day on top*

KAPALUA, Hawaii — Ryan Palmer went through a range of emotions over the final 15 minutes Saturday that ended with him posting a 9-under 64 for the best round of the week and a share of the lead with Harris English in the Sentry Tournament of Champions.

Palmer thought he might have been in trouble with a thin fairway metal approaching the green on the par-5 18th. It narrowly cleared native grass left of the green and rolled out to 12 feet, and he two-putted for birdie.

His score stood when rules officials determined there was no intent, and no penalty, when he tamped down a divot a few paces away from where his golf ball was rolling after a muffed chip on the ninth hole.

English wasn't so fortunate with his second shot to the 18th. He was left and came up some 15 feet short of clearing the hazard. His only good break was that a marshal somehow spotted it. Instead of a third shot from 200-plus yards away, he hacked out to 80 feet away and took two tough putts for par and a 66.

They were tied at 21-under 198, one shot ahead of Collin Morikawa,

who also flirted with trouble on the closing hole at the Plantation, finished with a birdie and shot 65.

Until the final hole, the third round at Kapalua was all about making birdies to keep from losing ground. Scoring has been exceptionally low, not just by one player but several of them, because of a soft course and little wind.

The top three began to pull away.

Daniel Berger, playing in the final group with English, had a long eagle putt hang on the lip at the 18th and had to settle for birdie and a 67 that left him three shots behind, still in the mix.

Defending champion Justin Thomas finally hit a shot he couldn't find. Three times this week, he hit it into knee-high native grass and managed to locate the ball and twice saved par. He wasn't so lucky on the sixth hole, sending it well right and into a deep gorge for a double bogey. Thomas recovered for a 68 and was four back, along with Sungjae Im (67).

Masters champion Dustin Johnson was doing his best to keep pace until his drive on the par-5 15th sailed too far right and into the hazard, leading to a bogey that felt even worse considering it's a par 5 he can reach in two with an iron. He missed birdie chances coming in and shot 69, seven shots out of the lead.

Xander Schauffele two years ago shot a 62 on the final day to rally from five behind, and such a score is possible in these ideal conditions. But there's a lot of players to climb, and

English hasn't shown any signs of backing off as he goes for his first victory in just over seven years.

Palmer has gone even longer — 11 years since his last individual title on the PGA Tour — and played his best on Saturday. His only big miscue was on the par-5 ninth when he put his second shot in rough left of the green and used the wrong club for a pitch that came up short and rolled down the slope back into the fairway.

He knew where it was headed and began walking, and stepped down a divot a few paces short of where the ball was rolling. That was the violation that led to disqualification for Camilo Villegas from this tournament 10 years ago on the 15th hole. Palmer met with the rules staff and was cleared because there was no intent to improve his lie.

Palmer said when he watched the video, he wasn't sure what concerned officials. He later added the ball was 5 feet away and "not even close to where I was at."

So his score was upheld and he now is part of a two-way tie for the lead, a final group between two players who are trying to end a drought in a tournament they are fortunate to be playing.

The field for the Tournament of Champions was expanded this year for 2020 winners and anyone who reached the Tour Championship, all because of the COVID-19 pandemic that shut the tour down for three months. Both Palmer and English made it to East

Sometimes life throws people into a position, a moment of action, where they make important things happen. And then life goes on. Those same people move forward with their lives and do all the regular things people do. Then, many years or decades later, their name shows up on the obituary page and we remember. I had a few of those memories this week. We published the obituary of

Wilbur Langley this week. He was born in Lecanto and spent his entire 86 years in Citrus County. He was a country boy who was most comfortable in his cowboy boots. He always wore a smile. In the late 1950s, he started Langley's Well Drilling company and he helped find water for all those new homes being constructed throughout the area. But Wilbur burst onto the public scene when he became a county commissioner in the 1980s. The

county was booming and the problems were many, but Wilbur always used his country wisdom to help find solutions. Unlike some of the self-important politicians we have today, Wilbur was always just a humble guy trying to get things done. That fact was driven home to me on a cold winter morning back in the early 1980s when the well and pump at my Inverness home was frozen solid. I called Langley Well Drilling and asked for help.

Even though it was the morning of a county commission meeting, it was Wilbur who was on my driveway 30 minutes later. He dug up the frozen pump and tried to get the water flowing so our kids could take showers and go to school. He worked all morning in the dirt and then went to a county commission meeting to do the work of the county. He still had mud on his shoes. It was a small town and there

Seems to me, surrounding counties have enough brainpower to figure it out. Maybe we should send some of our people to learn how you do it. Doesn't seem to me like it should be that hard.

■ This morning my husband and I were in line at 6:15 to get a COVID vaccine at the Central Ridge District Park. We were two and a half miles from the entrance at that time. At 8:30, we were told they were out of vaccines. My question is: Why would this county let vaccines be distributed at a place that is located off a two-lane highway where school buses and people going to work would

travel? We went 27 miles, waited in line and no vaccines. Another system has to be explored. This is not a good option. What about the fairgrounds at Inverness? The cars would be off the highway and then they can count who's in cars and see how many shots they have and send people home if they're out of them. Oh, I forgot — this is Citrus County, isn't it? That's

right, they don't think very well here.

■ I think it's ridiculous the Citrus County Health Department has the COVID vaccines on a first-come-first-served basis, yet the sheriff is there to run you off if you come too early and nobody's designated what too early is on this point where they'll run you off the property at the park.

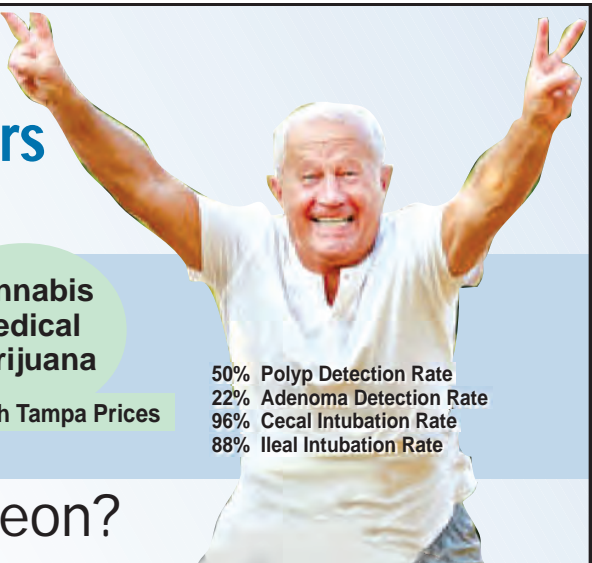

# Community Food Bank honored as nonprofit of the year

For the last 40 years the Chronicle has recognized a Citizen of the Year. In last weekend’s edition, we announced that retiring Supervisor of Elections Susan Gill was the recipient of that honor for 2020.

This year we are going to begin a new tradition — recognizing a Nonprofit Organization of the Year.

Part of what makes Citrus County a special place is that we have so many tremendous nonprofit organizations.

Those nonprofits have helped Citrus create an avenue for volunteers to donate their time and help improve the quality of life for others. A side benefit of the huge nonprofit community is that those volunteers have the opportunity to quickly integrate into a broader community. Newcomers get involved and suddenly they are stakeholders in Citrus County.

Stakeholders care about things and that is important.

The nonprofits also create an avenue for all of us to make contributions to groups that are dealing with the problems important right here in Citrus County. By contributing to local nonprofits, you get to see your dollars go to work and have an impact.

For 2020 — our inaugural recipient of the Nonprofit Organization of the Year goes to the Community Food Bank of Citrus County (CFBCC).

The mission of the Community Food Bank is to supply food and supplies to 56 separate agencies and food pantries in Citrus County who in turn deliver the food to people in need.

In a normal year, the Community Food Bank provides more than two million pounds of food that provides nourishment to 17,000 county residents. Those are huge numbers.

In 2020, because COVID-19 crashed our economy and

put so many people out of work, the job of the Food Bank more than doubled. This last year the Food Bank

provided more than four million pounds of food that helped 60,000 people survive the pandemic.

The Community Food Bank has taken the job of a nonprofit to a higher level. There is a small staff run by CFBCC executive director Barbara Sprague and about 30 volunteers who donate

their time to the effort. A volunteer board of directors oversees the operation and helps make the big strategies happen.

The nonprofit is funded through contributions from individuals, civic groups and businesses. The Food Bank has built a strong fundraising team that helps keep the food coming. Grants from businesses and foundations are frequently secured.

The board of directors includes a strong group of local leaders. Mike Orlito currently serves as president and Steve Ponticos as vice president. Board members include Ed Gruber, Steven R. Hilsdon, Sean Barnes, Bart Bennett, Joe Cappuccilli, Johnny Cash, Bev Goethe, JJ Kenney, Jewel Lamb and Naomi Prendergast.

Food is donated or sold to the Community Food Bank in bulk from supermarkets, Feeding Tampa Bay, food drives, farms, gardens, wholesalers, food brokers and individuals.

The food items are then collected, sorted and distributed to the agencies and individuals who directly feed those in need.

In 2020 the challenge for the Community Food Bank exploded. Their ability to organize, fundraise and meet that important challenge is why we recognize the group of our first recipient of the Citrus County Chronicle’s Nonprofit Organization of the Year.

there is nothing we cannot handle. If you recall, in November's letter to the editor, I spoke about how today's law enforcement professionals must wear a multitude of hats. I mentioned how these hats are truly the variety of roles our deputies must fulfill to safeguard our county, and that statement still holds true today. I also highlighted the ever-evolving needs of our citizens regarding mental health issues and how at the end of last year CCSO created a Community Impacts Section to address this specific need. While this may seem like an easy solution to help address an existing

issue, there were numerous components to consider prior to executing this strategy. This is where the great leadership of our CCSO professionals assist. The resilient leaders that make up CCSO, from upper administration, to sworn and support staff alike, work endlessly to maintain a strong foundation to keep our operations moving forward. Moving forward starts with one of the most important attributes of leadership, the ability to listen. More so, the leaders here at CCSO not only listen to citizens about issues plaguing our community, but act quickly to resolve them. When I first took office, there were so many Sound Offs and complaints regarding traffic. Rightfully so, as traffic-related issues and accidents were on a steady rise, with no achievable solution insight

— or so some thought. After reviewing the primary cause of such issues, my team leaders and I went to work creating an effective campaign with a zero-tolerance policy for aggressive and distracted driving #JustDriveCitrus. By the end of 2019, our office decreased the number of traffic fatalities by nearly half, 40.54%. We didn't stop there, we continued to listen. As we heard, drugs were another huge concern for the majority of citizens. Through the same determination, Operation Coin Toss was established and successfully resulted in 147 total arrests carrying 307 felony and 105 misdemeanor charges this past year. Your sheriff's office has accomplished many more of these successes in its endeavor to make Citrus County the safest

community in Florida. And guess what, we don't plan on slowing down this year. Serving into 2021, I, along with the great leaders and dedicated professionals of CCSO will remain unwaveringly committed to delivering excellence in public service to our citizens. In today's world of public transparency, multifaceted community needs, and the other myriad of challenges that seem to present themselves, we will continue to strive for positive change for a better Citrus. Our best approach for this positive change starts with the full cooperation and support of you, our community members. I look forward to serving as your Sheriff this New Year.

■ I believe the idea of getting all the people over 65 at once to get their shots is kind of an experiment in futility. The way it should be done, I would like to say, is that they start off with the people that are 90 to 100-plus first, then the 80-year-olds second, then the 70-year-olds third, and then the 60-year-olds last. I believe that's going to be the only way to do it where certain people of certain ages can get it done.

■ I checked the Publix vaccine appointment site at 2 a.m. Thursday morning and also frequently from 6 a.m. thereafter. The site kept telling me that the appointment site wasn't ready yet and to check back later. Then when I checked again around 9:15 a.m. the site tells me that all appointments have been claimed and to check back again soon as more appointments become available. How can that happen when all the while I was previously checking the site and the site never even let me know that it was up and running again? At this rate, we will never be able to get our shots.

■ A big thanks to Publix for offering the Moderna vaccine. Citrus Hills Manager Amanda and her team did an amazing job today of providing a smooth flow throughout the in-store vaccine process.

■ The health department obviously is not prepared for vaccinations. Forget about testing now. I had a test Dec. 28, 2020. There were so many people flooding the phone lines on Monday, Jan. 4, and Tuesday, Jan. 5, it took multiple days, disconnects and hang-ups, but I did get through. It was a joke. Forget about them calling me with the results. I needed another to see my mother-in-law in the ALF. "Citrus County" at its best. Good luck to all you people waiting Thursday to get a vaccination. I hope there's no chaos. Get it together, guys.

■ What am I going to do? My family and I will be vaccinated. The anti-maskers and anti-vaxxers can live or die, but I choose to be safe.

■ Here we go again. People are running amok trying to find where they can get the shots, with people telling you that you can go to the drugstore or go to the health department. Nobody knows nothing. In the

meantime, you've got people running amok trying to find out where they can get the shot. It's just like when we first found out about this virus and the grocery store was bombarded. Somebody's got to organize something for once. Organize! You've got senior citizens out there who can hardly walk, much less move around. They have nowhere to go or tell us where to go or what to do or how to do it. You've got to get it together so we can get it together. Do you understand?

■ I don't understand why the Citrus County Department of Health is going to give COVID vaccinations to folks on a first come, first served basis. To me, that's ridiculous. They're going to have a limited number of vaccines and people are going to be waiting in line day after day if they don't get there at the crack of dawn. Why can't we have registrations like the counties to the south?

■ I have issues with the vaccine in regards to first responders. My daughter is a home health nurse and she sees patients who have been discharged from the hospital and are sent home and need temporary nursing care. In the last week, 10 days, she's had four to five COVID patients. Her agency has not sought the vaccine until today. My daughter tested positive for COVID today. She had to pay \$100 for her test and she has no access to the vaccine. She is a front-line worker. What's really chapping my hide is the fact that she is a front-line emergency response worker with no

access to the vaccine and working for an agency who provides health care to patients, yet she's being exposed to COVID and the patients now probably have been exposed to COVID because the people working for this agency have been exposed. It's a never-ending circle. So, yeah, you need to look at agencies in your county that are providing services to recently discharged patients who — and most of them are elderly — have been exposed or are coming out of the hospital after being exposed to COVID and sending out nurses to work with these people that knowingly have COVID. Even though these nurses are gowning, are gloving, are masking, are spraying with Lysol or whatever, they are still getting COVID. So this would be a good story if you guys would like to check on it.

■ With the number of senior citizens that Citrus County has, they might have changed their way of giving their vaccine and started with 80 and above, then a week or so later or a number of days, go to the 70 and above. That way they won't have a rush and a zoo when they try to all get there at once for their vaccine.

■ The schedule for giving COVID vaccinations in our county shows an appalling lack of preplanning at all government levels. First come, first served is not the best way to slow the spread of the virus. First responders and residents of long-term care facilities should have been the initial recipients. Let's hope there is

someone who can make wiser decisions and do it very soon.

■ Over nine months they've had to plan the distribution of the COVID vaccine and the best that the Department of Health in Citrus County can come up with is that everybody does first come, first served; that everybody stands in line. How long will the lines be? Will there be police? Will there be people cutting in line? It's just unbelievably pitiful that after nine months, that is the best distribution plan for the vaccine that they could think of.

■ Is this the best response Citrus County has to the COVID vaccine distribution — show up for a chance to sit in your car all day and maybe possibly get a vaccine shot? What about the required follow-up shot? Will there be one available? Will you sit in your car for that one, too? Ask the folks at Withlacoochee Tech to write a program that answers the phone, assigns a number and time to arrive, and stops when the doses available is reached. You will need it in the future when other vaccine doses arrive — if they do — or are you going to handle the other vaccine distributions the same way?

■ Why is it Citrus County is not doing what other counties are doing regarding the vaccination distributions? The other counties have people going online and registering for an appointment, which avoids chaos and long lines at the vaccination site. It's stressful enough trying to avoid getting the COVID virus. Let's not make it any worse.

were things to do.

■ Peggy Pattillo was 88 years-old when she died last week. She and her husband Dave retired to Inverness after living all over the country. As a young and beautiful woman growing up in California, people said she looked like Rita Hayworth. It was only appropriate that folks thought Dave looked like Rock Hudson.

But it wasn't their good looks that made a difference in Inverness. It was there community involvement and a vision they had for Inverness.

Dave could be very hard-headed while Peggy was always a joy. They lived in Inverness at a time that the county seat was under siege. Half the downtown shops were boarded up and in disrepair. The old courthouse was in need of a lot of love. Some members of the county commission wanted to move the courthouse to Lecanto. And the Florida Department of Transportation wanted to slam U.S. 41 right through the middle of town.

Things looked bleak.

It was Dave and Peggy Pattillo who first started the movement to rejuvenate downtown Inverness. As volunteers, they started working on Main Street. Folks thought they were a little crazy at first, but then their enthusiasm caught on.

The city of Inverness took over and tens of millions of dollars later we have the "small town done right" gem that we enjoy today.

Peggy and Dave Pattillo were the ones who got it all started.

In a small town, they proved that a couple of energized retirees could really make something happen.

■ Bruce Bellamy was only 67 when he died last week. He spent his life in Citrus County and was well known as a youth league coach, an actor, author and playwright. He was even known to get involved in politics.

He was a member of the extended Bellamy family whose parents were the Rev. Leroy and Priscilla Bellamy. The Rev. Bellamy was one of the early civil rights leaders in Citrus County who made sure that the transition from segregation went as smooth as possible.

Bruce followed in his footsteps. One of the highlights each year at the Citrus County African American Read-In was when Bruce would give his passionate recitation of Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech.

His enthusiasm was infectious.

Even in a small town, he used his acting abilities to inspire other people and make them want to work together.

our country.

Let me be clear: What happened on Wednesday was absolutely unacceptable. There is no doubt about this. What has been the greatest democracy the world has ever seen for almost 250 years, on Wednesday, made a terrible display of its immaturity and weakness. And it did so on an international scale.

I'm concerned that we may not recover.

But the other matter that concerns me is the everyday American. The question I keep asking myself is, what now? What do I do with this? How do I reconcile this with what I want to believe about my country and about democracy?

When I experienced conflict as a kid, my mom would never immediately take my side. She always played devil's advocate. She always realized conflict is hardly ever one-sided. And so

she would ask me, "Cortney, how did you contribute to this situation? What did you do or say or how did you act that may have helped this conflict grow into the issue you are facing now?"

I hated those questions. It made me so mad as a kid. Just take my side, Mom.

What I've come to learn as an adult, is that those questions are incredibly valuable — and not just in personal conflict situations. I find those questions to be useful for things like Wednesday.

I wasn't in Washington, D.C. on Wednesday. But that doesn't mean I haven't contributed to the negligence of our democracy. It doesn't mean that I am absolved of any kind of responsibility for the outrageous things that we all witnessed on Capitol Hill.

Wednesday was not simply the result of one speech or one provocation. Wednesday was the result of years of siloed information bouncing around personal echo chambers of thoughts, ideas and beliefs. It was the result of a societal

rejection of objective truth and facts. It was the result of acquiescence because that's "just the way things are."

It finally all spilled over.

We, as the American people — Republicans, Democrats, Independents — have a collective obligation to pursue objective truth. And that means getting off our social media newsfeeds and doing the hard work of reading and listening to multiple sources — even those who take a partisan bend that is different from our own.

Americans' acceptance of the choice to sell the news to the highest bidder or the biggest advertiser is a travesty that has had colossal consequences. Wednesday is one of them.

There was a time when extremes were ostracized; when unsubstantiated rhetoric from either side of the political divide was spurned. In today's world the opposite has happened. Seeking a middle ground has been discounted in favor of zero-sum belief systems wherein disagreement or variation of

opinion relegates someone to "enemy" status. That's how we ended up with recent presidential elections where the electorate is forced to vote for a candidate simply because the other option is a worse choice.

That's not what democracy is supposed to be.

We can no longer afford to live in an America where the currency is hatred and selfishness and we are defined by what we are against rather than by what we are for.

Wednesday must be the wake-up call that unites us together to reject anarchy and fuel collaboration and conversation around the things on which we disagree. The beauty and value of a democracy is conversation — not shouting our opinions at the top of our lungs and daring people to disagree with us — but rather the concerted decision to not just hear what the other side is saying while we are thinking about our rebuttals, but to actually listen to their concerns.

I'm not sure when we stopped

caring enough about our neighbor to really want to understand their position and to love them enough to consider what we might be able to do to better help them bear their load.

Wednesday was the proverbial line in the sand. We can still stop this train from running headfirst over the cliff. But we must first acknowledge that every individual citizen has a role to play and commit to pursuing the tenets and goals of democracy with our whole selves.

If we don't, I can't imagine what comes next.

pregnant women and families and continues with support until the child reaches 18 years of age. This support is in the form of counseling, parenting classes, mental health counseling, food pantry, clothing, diapers and more. When the pandemic began to affect the county, the Center immediately began to work on ways to help families while ensuring everyone's safety. Food and other supplies were personally delivered to homes. Counselors reached out to clients by phone, if they did not want to go to the center. 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# Understanding stimulus

Citrus County businesses, unemployed and others in line for financial help

President Donald Trump on Dec. 27, 2020, signed into law a massive \$900-billion coronavirus relief and stimulus package with the intent of financially helping hard-hit small-business owners, nonprofits and citizens.

At 5,000 pages long, it would take many nights of bedtime reading to sift through the major points.

Nature Coast Florida SCORE, which includes Citrus County, has provided specifics of the package, especially as it pertains to the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP).

“This (stimulus package) is definitely good for small businesses in Citrus County,” said Jim Green, treasurer and workshop chairman for Nature Coast Florida SCORE.

The Chronicle has identified key components of the package most important to residents of Citrus County.

Here are some takeaways:

## How much in direct payments will people get?

As of now, the law provides \$600 direct payments to people making up to \$75,000 per year and couples making \$150,000 per year — with payments phased out for higher incomes — with \$600 additional payments per dependent child.

What does the new law do for the Paycheck Protection Program?

The new act allocates an additional \$285 billion for the PPP. Small businesses that obtained an initial PPP loan can qualify for a second round of loans, called “second draw” loans.

## How can I qualify for a ‘second draw’ loan?

To be eligible, businesses must have been in operation before Feb. 15, 2020, have fewer than 300 employees per location, have used or will use a prior PPP loan if previously received and

The act also sets aside \$12 billion specifically for minority-owned businesses.

## What is happening with the unemployed?

The package revives supplemental federal pandemic unemployment benefits but at \$300 per week — through March 14 — instead of the \$600 per week benefit that expired in July 2020.

seen at least a 25% revenue decrease in gross receipts during any quarter of 2020 (compared to the same quarter in 2019).

## How much money is it?

For this round of PPP loans, the maximum loan amount is \$2 million.

## What can claimants do to facilitate the process?

“We recommend that claimants continue to log-in to their CONNECT account every 48 hours to see if there are any additional steps they need to take on their claim,” said Department of Economic Opportunity spokeswoman Paige Landrum Landrum, referring to the state’s CONNECT online unemployment portal.

## Is there any help provided for renters?

The package includes money for a first-ever federal rental assistance program; funds to be distributed by state and local governments to help people who have fallen behind on their rent and may be facing eviction.

# Didn’t get your relief yet? You aren’t alone

Didn’t get your second relief check yet? You aren’t alone.

While the IRS and Treasury have distributed the bulk of the anticipated \$164 million in round two of relief payments for Americans faster than the first time, millions have not gotten payments yet or found hiccups in the distribution.

The latest payments of \$600 per eligible adult and dependents are sorely needed among many who are struggling financially due to the pandemic.

Here’s what someone waiting on a payment should know.

## Why didn’t I get the payment?

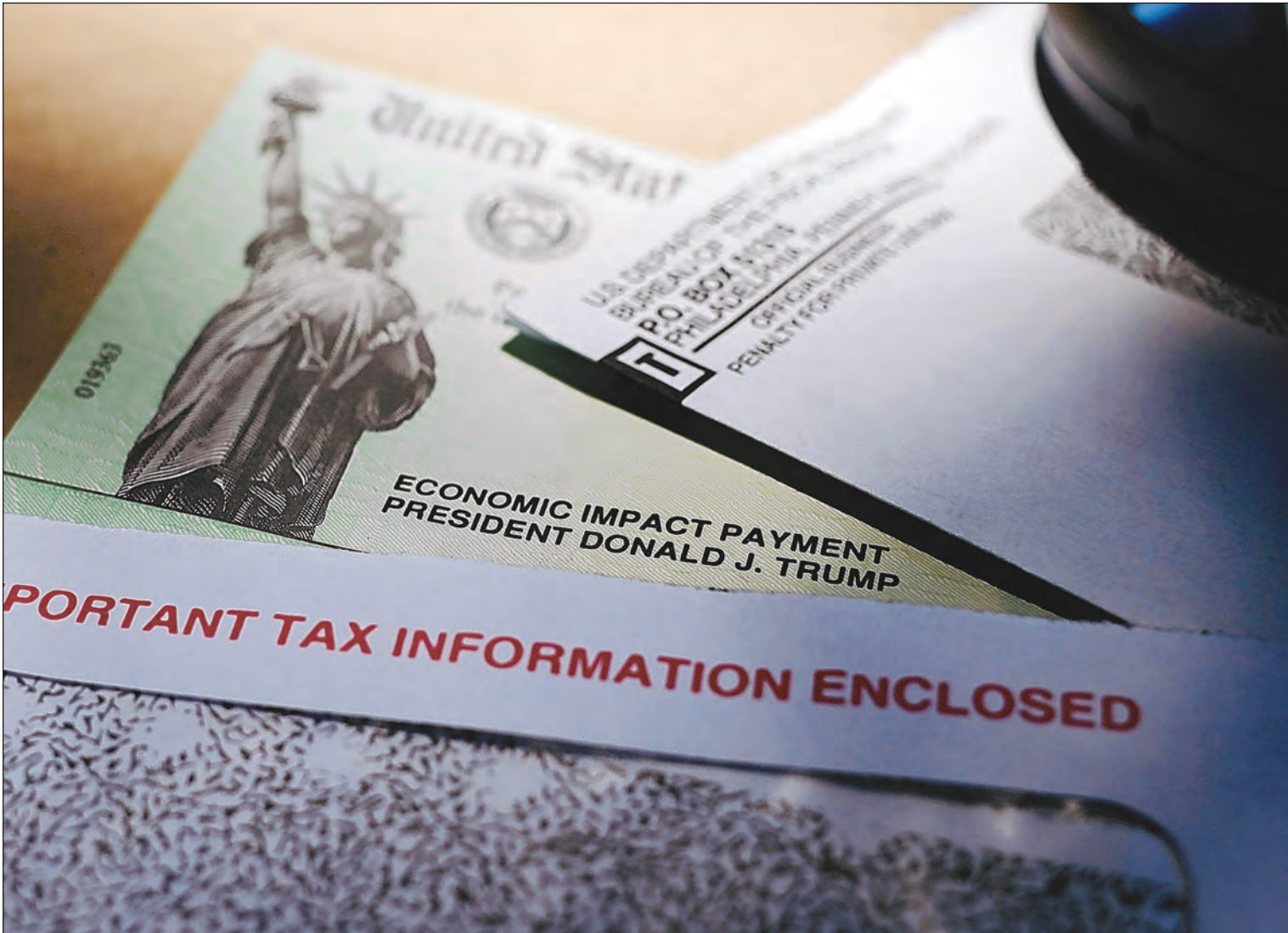
First, make sure you are eligible. Under this latest round of relief, the \$600 payments will go to individuals making less than \$75,000 or \$150,000 for couples who are married and filing jointly. Those who make more will get a reduced amount. There are no payments for individuals earning more than \$99,000 a year.

Unlike last time though, payments will not be denied Americans who are married to someone without a Social Security number.

If you are eligible, check the IRS Get My Payment tool on its website to find out the status of your payment.

As with the last round, most payments will be automatic and made via direct deposit to bank accounts. However, some people may find they got direct deposit the first time but get their payment in the mail this time, either in the form of a paper check or debit card.

It also appears there was a major snafu this time for people who filed their taxes with an online tax preparation

service such as TurboTax or H&R Block and paid for their tax preparation fees with their expected refund. In those cases, the IRS website may show that the money went to an account they do not recognize. That is because money may have been sent to a temporary bank account established by the tax preparer, which is no longer active.

By law, the financial

institution must return the money to the government if the account is closed or no longer active. A number of taxpayers vented online about their frustration with the situation, including many who got their payments with ease the first time.

The National Consumer Law Center estimates up to 20 million Americans may be impacted by this latest

administrative issue.

“It is disappointing that the IRS did not fix this problem, which it has known about for months,” said Lauren Saunders, associate director of the National Consumer Law Center. “People who need money now may have to wait months until they can file a tax return and get their refund, unless the tax prep companies are able to forward the funds.”

## How long will it take?

The IRS and Treasury began distributing payments last week. By law, they have until Jan. 15 to make payments.

Payments made by direct deposit could take a few days to process, but the funds were largely available early this

# Watch out for fraud as stimulus payments are deposited and mailed

TALLAHASSEE — As the federal government begins delivering additional stimulus payments across the country in the new \$166 billion stimulus package, Floridians should be wary of potential fraud related to the economic relief.

Floridians are already receiving payments both through direct deposit and mailed checks. Attorney General Ashley Moody wants to make sure Floridians are prepared to spot and avoid scams related to the federal payments.

Today, Attorney General Moody issued a Consumer Alert highlighting scams related to the latest stimulus payments and tips to help Floridians avoid falling prey.

“As we have seen throughout the pandemic,” Moody said, “bad actors

are looking for ways to exploit the crisis to steal money, government benefits and people’s identities. With direct payments already received or on the way to Floridians’ bank accounts, I am asking consumers to remain vigilant in their efforts to identify and avoid scams designed to steal federal payments or personal information.

“The best way to do this is to stay informed about how and when you will receive your stimulus payment and avoid solicitations requiring personal information, upfront payments or other actions in exchange for federal money.”

The Internal Revenue Service has until Jan. 15 to deliver the payments. The Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Micro Grant will have a minimum award of \$250 up to a maximum award of \$2,500.

#### Program Overview:

- Individual business grants

to pay for businesses PPE expenses up to \$2,500 incurred between March 1 and December 15, 2020.

■ For business-related costs for PPE and sanitization supplies related to COVID-19 that directly impacted applicant businesses employees and customers when such cost was not otherwise sold or charged to the customer.

■ Must demonstrate the expenses through receipts/documentation and that documentation must show that the expense(s):

- Was COVID related
- Met or exceeded \$250
- Examples include, but are not limited to, Masks, Face

Shields, Hand Sanitizer Gel, New Hand Sanitization Stations, Gowns, Disinfecting Wipes, Temperature Checking Devices, and Employee COVID Testing paid for by the business.

●●●

The Small Business Retrofit/Adaption Grant will have a maximum award of \$10,000 per business. A small business may be eligible for both grants.

#### Program Overview:

■ Individual business grants to pay for businesses adaptation and modification expenses related to COVID-19. Grant is up to \$10,000 for expenses incurred between March 1 and December 15, 2020.

■ Examples of eligible expenses include actual modification expenses related to physically and/or functionally adapting the business to meet officially required or recommended guidance related to COVID-19 with the overall goal to make operation of the business safer for employees and/or the public.

■ Examples of eligible business adaptations and expenses include, but are not limited to: Erecting counter separation barriers, increasing height of restaurant separation booths, adding a customer drive-thru, mobile device application for paperless menu, restriping/signage for pickup lanes/spaces,

social distancing separation staging stickers, COVID-19 safety signage, and similar business delivery improvements.

■ Applications for grant must provide receipts for any expenditures made that will be recovered under this grant.

These grants will be offered through the County on a reimbursement basis and will require the business to submit an application online through SurveyMonkey apply online at the [www.CitrusBOCC.com](http://www.CitrusBOCC.com).

Applications will be accepted until funds are exhausted.

week. The payments sent through the mail could take three to four weeks to reach people. Taxpayers are encouraged to watch their mail closely for its arrival.

People who did not receive either the first or second round of payments that

were due to them or received an incorrect amount can claim the Recovery Rebate Credit on their 2020 tax return to get their payment.

### When does tax season start?

The IRS has not stated when it will begin accepting tax returns for this filing season but tax season generally begins in late January.

Some tax filing services will allow

customers to file before that time.

Filing electronically is the fastest and safest way to process a return. In the past, the IRS issued refunds in less than 21 days from the date the return was received.

### Why the error message on the IRS site?

The Get My Payment tool is helpful but can be difficult to understand.

Don't be alarmed if you get the

"please wait" message, that is a normal part of the site's operation.

If you get the "Payment Status #2 – Not Available" message, then you will not receive the payment and instead need to claim it on your tax return.

It is updated only once daily so checking it multiple times could be fruitless.

Also, it can lock users out if it is accessed too many times; this is designed to prevent fraud.

To contact the IRS, visit [IRS.gov](https://www.irs.gov). To track stimulus payments, use the IRS Get My Payment tool at [www.irs.gov/coronavirus/get-my-payment](https://www.irs.gov/coronavirus/get-my-payment).

Remember that the IRS will not call or email Floridians about stimulus payments. Spoofing the IRS continues to be a trick used by scammers often through recorded

telephone messages or imposter robocalls.

Robocalls targeting stimulus recipients could be utilized to exploit this latest round of economic relief. There are signs these calls may be increasing as Americans continue to work from home.

In April of last year, Attorney General Moody issued a Consumer Alert addressing this growing problem and highlighted a few recent COVID-19 related recordings. In the red oak group, Laurel Oak has long, smooth, narrow leaves, without rolled-under edges. Leaves are shiny on both sides. Native to the Southeastern Coastal Plain in cold zones 6 to 9 from central Florida north to Virginia and west to southeast Texas, Laurel Oak has several common names, including swamp laurel oak, diamond-leaf oak, water oak and obtuse oak. It naturally grows in moist, humus-rich, poorly drained soils. Hybrid cultivars are available. Laurel Oak and its cultivars tend to be a host plants for parasitic native mistletoe. Heavy mistletoe infestations will eventually kill the tree host.

# Construction spending up 0.9% in November

WASHINGTON — Spending on U.S. construction projects increased 0.9% in November as strength in home building offset weakness in other parts of the construction industry.

The November gain

followed a bigger 1.6% rise in October and left construction spending up 4.4% through the first 11 months of 2020 compared to the same period in 2019, according to the Commerce Department.

For November, spending on residential construction rose 2.7% with single-family

construction surging 5.1 percent while apartment construction was flat, according to the new data released Monday. Record low mortgage rates have spurred strong demand for housing even as a global pandemic resulted in widespread lock downs for other parts of the economy.

While housing activity, fueled by low supplies of available homes, stands 16.1% higher than it did a year ago, spending on private nonresidential projects is 9.5% below the levels of a year ago with hotel and motel construction down 26.5% from the level in November 2019

and office construction down 6.6%.

Many analysts believe the extended period of working from home for many Americans brought on by the coronavirus will translate into lower demand for office space in coming years as businesses opt to allow

employees to do more work away from the office.

For November, spending on non-residential projects fell 0.8% with spending for office buildings dropping a sharp 8.1%. Spending on government projects dipped 0.2% in November.

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# Are gutters and downspouts necessary?

Ask the **BUILDER**

**Q:** Tim, I think I've got a good idea. I'm re-roofing two of my barns with metal roofing. I was thinking of extending the roof past the walls 18 inches so dripping water falls farther away from the barn walls. Right now I've got gutters and I'm tired of them clogging up with leaves and debris. What is the best practice when it comes to gutters or no gutters? What about sizes for both gutters and downspouts? What would you do if you were me? — Carol K., Mio, Mich.

**A:** This conundrum is an excellent example of a tip I've shared with my children. I've encouraged them to travel far and wide. When you do this, you discover things you feel are normal are not so normal in other places. I remember being in Toronto, Canada years ago thinking it was strange they didn't have a separate directional arrow traffic signal light telling you when it was safe to turn left at an intersection. After all, that's what I'm used to in the United States! Those clever Canadians just had the green light flash to tell you it was safe to turn! They felt there was no need for an extra light.

I grew up in Cincinnati. The soil makeup there is a dense, poorly draining

clay deposited by a series of four massive continental glaciers that covered the land all the way from the North Pole to the Midwest four times in the past 2 million years. But guess what? The soil makeup in New England, where I now call home, is quite sandy and it drains well. Soil composition is a very important thing to consider when it comes to the question of gutters or no gutters, it turns out.

Here in New England most houses and barns have no gutters. Not only is the soil conducive to great drainage, but the snow and ice on roofs have a tendency to rip gutters off structures when it slides and tumbles off the roofs! Gutters tend to be less than ideal in New England for those two reasons.

It's important for you to consider the amount of water that comes off a roof. Recently, we had two inches of rainfall at my house in just one day. The footprint of my house is 1,625 square feet. Had I harvested all that water in a cistern, I would have collected 2,025 gallons in that short time. Not everyone can harvest water because of laws in different states, but that's a topic for another time.

Here in New Hampshire, coarse gravel the size of walnuts is placed on the soil beneath the drip line of the roof. This

# Thank a tree for the New Year

I have submitted a similar article previously, but it was during the Thanksgiving season. Now it is 2021 and I am sure most of us are thankful that 2020 is behind us. Depending upon how your year went, some people may have more to be thankful for than others.

However, we should all be thankful that we are here in 2021 and that you are here reading this article. Rather than my usual list of tree-related New Year's Resolutions, I am asking all of you to resolve to be thankful for trees in 2021. I'm sure most of us take trees for granted. We drive by them every day and we have them in our yards. But trees provide a myriad of benefits, many of which are listed below.

■ In the summer, we seek out their shade for parking or resting.

■ In the fall, we enjoy the changing foliage (even in some places in Florida).

■ Trees are natural air conditioners — the evaporation from a single tree can equal the cooling effect of ten room size air conditioners operating 20 hours a day.

■ Trees cool our cities by up to 10 degrees by shading our homes and streets, releasing water vapor into the air (as above), and breaking up urban heat islands (large areas of pavement or reflected heat from buildings).

■ Carbon sequestration. Whether you believe in climate change or not, trees are remarkable "engines" for reducing carbon dioxide. Through the miracle of photosynthesis, trees utilize carbon dioxide and water to produce sugars and oxygen. Some scientists believe we can completely mitigate climate change by the planting of 500 billion trees worldwide.

■ Trees placed strategically around homes and office buildings can reduce summer air conditioning needs by up to 50%.

■ Trees clean the air by absorbing odors and pollutant gases and by filtering particulate matter out of the air.

■ Trees provide oxygen: In one

year, an acre of mature trees can provide enough oxygen for 18 people.

■ In one year, an acre of mature trees absorbs the equivalent amount of carbon dioxide of driving your car 26,000 miles.

■ The American Forestry

Association estimates that 100 million new trees would absorb 18 million tons of carbon dioxide and reduce U.S. air conditioning costs by \$4 billion annually.

**Dear Lori:** You have indeed spotted a cute native plant, Candyroot (*Polygala nana*).

The common name of candyroot is based on the

licorice-flavored roots, which apparently are edible.

These little guys are not commercially available and I'm not sure about a seed source.

They are an annual and a bit picky about their growing conditions. As an example, they need to stay moist, but must have good drainage and full sun. That's not easy.

To your question about removing them from their natural environment: Don't.

There is nothing to gain by you, or the plants by digging one up. Not only are native plants protected in many areas, but

plants in bloom are the most likely to die after being dug up. So many native plants are kind of invisible until in bloom, making acquiring them best done through native nurseries and seed banks. After a brief search, I have not seen Candyroot available.

Your best bet is to make a note of time of the year and location and make that hike a regular event. And keep taking pictures!

**Dear Gardener Gal:** We have a lot of lizards around our house. We like

them and feel like they are good to have around. We like that they eat bugs and my kids get a kick out of watching them fight and chase each other.

My question is about what we can do to help them through the winter. We understand about reptiles being cold blooded. We have built them little houses out of styrofoam, little boxes etc, but see no signs of them using them. Do you have structures for your lizards? We know you love lizards too! — *Lisa in Inverness*

**Dear Lisa:** I really do enjoy almost all the critters that share my property. (Except house roaches and lubbers — I hate those guys.)

I understand you and the kids' desire to make your little neighbors more comfortable and safe this winter. What good lessons and positive activities!

Here's the thing: Reptiles are cold-blooded and take on the temperature of their environment. They basically can shut down and go dormant when temperatures drop. This doesn't harm them. When temperatures warm up, they become active again and get on with their little lizard lives.

What can harm them is drying out. They must have moisture in order to survive, and if dormant, they can't seek it out.

Have you noticed the lizards overnighing in pipes and under rocks? Those hideouts basically sweat life-giving water and keep reptiles moist.

If you want to provide safe, healthy hideouts, you and the kids can build condos of metal pipes. Vary the diameter to accommodate different age groups and species. Place the pipes in shady moist areas and I guarantee your little friends will take advantage of your generosity.

**Dear R.B.:** The Currier and Ives Company produced hand-colored lithographs from 1857 to 1907. They were one of the largest print companies in the United States, their decorative and historical prints are a specific category of collector interest. "Frozen Up" is the title of the lithograph produced by them in 1872 and is


considered one of the best 50 of their total production.

The tray you have with the picture "Frozen Up" on it is a "fantasy product" having nothing to do with the original Currier and Ives Company. The tray has no specific collector interest. So, proceed as you like with the polyurethane coating, it will keep it looking good for a long time.

**Dear John:** Enclosed are pictures of a secretary; sorry about the quality. On the inside there are lots of little cubbies and drawers. It has claw feet and the numbers 554 on the back. I would like to know the history and or time period and value of the piece. Thanks for your help. — *G.G., internet*

**Dear G.G.:** The secretary bookcase is American made. The style is English from the late 1700s. The time of production of your piece was 1900 to 1930. The serpentine drawer fronts add to its market interest. Potential dollar value is below \$500.

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# Turkey Oak in Florida

**T**urkey Oak, *Quercus laevis*, is an important and irreplaceable Florida native canopy tree. Northerners learn that in warm central and south Florida there are no Blackjack Oaks, *Quercus marilandica*; Blackjack Oak evolved further north. Temperate to subtropical Florida has a limestone base rock of compressed ancient coral reef that was piled high with ridges of sand dunes as sea level declined. In lowlands — between the sand ridges and alongside waterways and swamps — leaf litter and organic material has built up over thousands of years to create a humus-rich soil, where different species like Shumard Oaks thrive on rich, moist, poorly-drained soils.

Globally in the Northern Hemisphere, there are about 600 oak species in the beech Family Fagaceae. Approximately 26 oak species grow naturally in Florida. Some are red oaks while others are in the white oak group. White oak acorns mature in about six months, while red oak acorns take about 18 months to mature. Deciduous plants lose their leaves in winter, even in Florida. They are not dead, just resting in winter. Look up to see the healthy buds fattening on Turkey Oak twigs in winter.

Florida's red oak group includes Myrtle and Turkey Oak as well as Willow Oak and Laurel Oak that have elongated and narrowed leaves. Leaves in the red oak group are variable, with rounded or pointed lobes, sometimes tipped with

bristles and sometimes long or odd shaped. Bluejack Oak, Post Oak, Sand Live Oak (a white oak), Southern Red Oak and Turkey Oak grow in dry, sandy, upland soils. Swamp Chestnut, Willow, Overcup, Shumard and

Swamp Red Oak trees grow in rich, moist, poorly drained bottom-land soils.

Woodpeckers find insect-infested trees to drill for bugs and grubs. Woodpeckers excavate holes where they lay eggs and raise chicks. Other bird species that cannot excavate their

own holes occupy abandoned woodpecker cavities to raise their babies. Some Turkey Oaks may die from insect infestations, diseases, chemicals and/or old age. Dead snags can be left standing as carbon stores, cover from predators, hiding places, shelter from weather, food sources and cavity nest sites. Eventually branches fall off, tops tumble and trunks fall, decay and release their solid carbon and nutrients into the soil. New trees grow by re-using these nutrients.

Turkey Oak is one of the few red oak trees that grows on the well-drained sandhills that make up most of peninsular Florida. It is folly to cut down Turkey Oaks and attempt to replace them with wetland, ornamental and/or tropical species as do some developers and new-to-Florida homeowners.

Maturing about 30 to 40 feet tall, erect, drought-tolerant, wind resistant Turkey Oak has an open spreading crown of 10 to 15 feet diameter. It grows from about

Sarasota northward to Virginia and west to eastern Louisiana in cold zones 8–10. It grows in full sun to part shade and naturally lives about 100 years without supplemental irrigation, fertilizers or chemical applications. Alternate, simple leaves have three to seven deep lobes pointed at the tips. Often held perpendicular to the ground, the 4-to-14-inch-long leaves turn reddish in the fall.

Turkey Oak is vital to the birds, butterflies, squirrels and other wildlife that depend on intact habitats for their survival. Tree flowers provide pollen and nectar in season. Acorns are wildlife food. To humans, astringent acorns taste bitter, but are edible if the tannins are leached out. Acorn flour has been used as a coffee substitute but contains no caffeine.

Cavities in Turkey Oak trees are used by flying, gray and fox squirrels and cavity nesting birds including owls, bluebirds, Carolina Chickadees and wrens. Turkey Oak leaves are host plants for four butterfly caterpillar species: Banded Hairstreak, Sleepy Duskywing, Juvenal's Duskywing and Horace's Duskywing.

Turkey Oak is in the red oak group. It has alternate, simple leaves with three to seven pointed lobes and no serrations or teeth on the leaf margins (edges). Leaves turn reddish in late fall before being shed for winter. Acorns of red oaks take about 18 months to mature. Although bitter to human taste, acorns are an important wildlife food source.



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# How to keep your hardwood floors in shape

In the winter, hardwood floor care is particularly important and particularly challenging, especially for anyone facing a fierce winter where temperature fluctuations, snow and rock salt all make the task that much more difficult. The challenges of winter can cause scratches, stains, cracked floorboards and more on even the best-maintained wood floors.

Dave Murphy, national technical director for wood refinishing company N-Hance Wood Refinishing, shared five easy steps with us that can prevent season-specific damage to hardwood floors. Follow these wood floor tips to keep hardwood floors in great shape, even as temperatures drop.

1. Prevent damage from rock salt.

In snowy areas, rock salt helps people and cars avoid slipping on slick patches; but rock salt can also leave stains on hardwood floors. The rough crystals can also scratch floors if tracked inside. Murphy advises against using vinegar to remove stains, a common trick, and instead suggests placing rugs and mats in high-traffic areas to protect floors. Encourage

household members and visitors to take shoes and boots off before entering the home to limit how much rock salt gets tracked inside.

2. Watch heat levels.

Setting the thermostat or radiator at a high temperature may feel great, but it can also dry out hardwood floors, causing shrinkage and even cracked floorboards. If possible, keep the temperature moderate and run a humidifier to keep moisture in the air.

3. Don't wait on spills.

Be diligent about cleaning up spills on hardwood floors immediately, especially during large gatherings. Even a small spill can leave long-term damage on the surface of floors, so have a damp cloth tucked away for a quick cleanup. This is especially true when it comes to pet damage; and, let's face it, it's harder to walk the dogs when it's freezing cold outside. Be on alert, because potty-training mishaps can wreak havoc on a wood floor if not immediately addressed.

4. Practice routine maintenance.

Following hardwood floor care guidelines all year long can give floors a good baseline before winter really begins, Murphy says. Regularly sweep, dust or mop to prevent particle and salt buildup before and during winter, and

always be sure to mop with the wood grain, not against it.

5. Do an end-of-season checkup.

Despite your best efforts, some winter-induced damage to hardwood floors may be unpreventable. Check for stains, scratches or water damage at the end of every season; major issues may mean it's time to call in a professional to refinish the floors before the next winter.

is an ingenious method of minimizing the splash of the water against the structures. You don't want lots of water getting the side of your home or barn wet. Gutters and downspouts will collect this water and pipe it to another location to minimize wetting.

Gutters and downspouts are a great idea if you have a full basement or want a dry crawlspace. Can you imagine injecting thousands of gallons into the soil next to your foundation and then HOPING it doesn't seep into a basement or crawlspace? This is why I always advise people who suffer from wet basements to be sure to pipe roof water away from their homes to the lowest spot on their building lot.

Typical residential K-style gutters come in two sizes: 5-inch and 6-inch. By far, the 5-inch size is most popular and works

for most roofs. The downspouts help you size the gutters. Typical downspouts come in two sizes: 2x3-inch downspouts fit 5-inch gutters and 3x4-inch downspouts fit 6-inch gutters.

The shape of your house or barn and your fussiness about where you want downspouts to be on your house or barn drives the decision on what to do. A single 2x3 downspout will handle 600 square feet of roof area. Surprisingly, a single 3x4 downspout will handle 1,200 square feet of roof area.

The downspout should drop into buried underground SDR-35 plastic sewer and drainpipe. This pipe will carry the water far away from the house or barn. If you live in a city you might be required to pipe your roof water into a local storm-water sewer system or a storm-water holding pond.

Avoid using the plastic or concrete splash blocks at the base of a downspout. These do nothing to get the water away from your foundation. They're foolish imposters and trick you into

thinking that the roof water is being handled correctly.

Great micro-mesh gutter guards can stop debris from getting into gutters. I've done gutter guard testing for years and found micro-mesh to be the best system. It's important for the gutter guards to be installed so their slope matches the slope of the roof above them. This way leaves, twigs, bark, and other debris washes off or is blown off the guards on a windy day.

My own home is a great example of how complex your decision might be. I have gutters and downspouts on part of my home so the roof water doesn't splash up onto my house where I have decks and my front porch. At other parts of my house, the roof water drops to the ground and disappears into the coarse gravel. I'm lucky to have well-drained sandy soil. My basement is bone dry because of the way I've engineered my system.

■ Hospital patients have been shown to recover more quickly when their hospital room offered a view of trees. They also had fewer complaints, took fewer pain killers and left the hospital sooner.

■ Property values of homes are 5 to 15% higher than those without landscape trees and homes with trees sell more quickly than those without.

■ Apartments and offices in wooded areas are known to rent more quickly and have a higher occupancy rate. Workers in offices in wooded areas report more productivity and less absenteeism.

■ Evergreen trees can serve as a windbreak and reduce the loss of heat from the home in winter by 10 to 50%. Of course, this is much more significant in colder climates than here in Florida.

■ A strip of trees 100 feet wide and 45 feet high can reduce highway noise by up to 50%. Less noise results in reduced irritability and aggressive behavior and lower stress levels.

■ Trees provide food and shelter for a variety of birds and other animals such as squirrels.

■ Trees reduce urban water runoff by absorbing water through their roots and interrupting the impact of rainfall with their canopy.

This is not even a complete list! But what would our lives be like without trees? So, in addition to being thankful for getting through 2020, add trees to your list of things to be thankful for.
