**Gov. calls special session**

Simpson, Massullo back plan to have lawmakers address vaccine mandates

Citrus County's two-man legislative delegation enthusiastically supported Gov. Ron DeSantis's call for a special legislative session in November to push back against President

Biden's vaccine mandates.

Businesses nationwide are threatening to fire employees who don't get the COVID-19 vaccinations. DeSantis has said that kind of thinking goes against personal freedoms and Florida will fight against such forced mandates.

"No one should lose their job over a COVID shot," he said.

Rep. Ralph Massullo, R-Lecanto, and Sen. Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, agreed.

"I think we should have some policy for our state to protect our citizens and businesses and schools so we can

continue to keep Florida open," Massullo said.

DeSantis and his staff, he said, takes the pandemic seriously.

"We have followed the science and we have followed the Centers for Disease Control

**Attempted murder, battery, sex cases move forward**

Man accused in Homosassa shooting incident will reportedly attempt 'stand your ground' defense

Several Citrus County felony cases moved forward Thursday as Circuit Court Judge Richard Howard set new status and trial dates to step the legal process along.

The Homosassa man accused of shooting at a bouncer at a bar and facing attempted first-degree murder charges will have a stand-your-ground hearing in

which his lawyer will ask Howard to dismiss the charges against his client.

Attorney Bryan Caughey told Howard on Thursday during a case status hearing that he will in November ask that the charges be dropped based on Florida Statute 776, commonly referred to as "Stand Your Ground" law.

The State Attorney's Office alleges that James Parkerson II, 53, on July 11, 2020, shot at a

bouncer at the Nature Resort's Marina Bar in Homosassa after the bouncer used his own vehicle to block Parkerson from leaving the bar's parking lot. Prosecutors say Parkerson had just before fought with another man.

According to arrest records, witnesses told arresting deputies Parkerson got into a fight with someone in the parking lot before they separated and then Parkerson and his girlfriend got into their truck to leave.

**Drug import proposal could save \$150M**

Feds must OK plan

Florida will save an estimated \$150 million if two phases of its proposed prescription-drug importation program are fully implemented during the first year after a plan state lawmakers adopted three years ago is approved by federal regulators.

Of course, when — or if — that federal approval will come is the big question, Florida Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA) Secretary Simone Marsteller told the House Finance & Facilities Subcommittee Wednesday.

**Be a reading role model**

*First Library program aims to increase literacy for children*

Most of us can look back on fond memories of being read our favorite books as children. Now, it's our turn to pass this magic to the next generation.

The Citrus County Education Foundation's (CCEF) First Library program is looking for 24 celebrity readers to read to the district's and kindergarten classes on Oct. 27 and 26 volunteers to read to pre-k classes Nov. 3.

According to the CCEF website, a child from a

middle-income home typically enters first grade with more than 1,000 hours of reading time at home. Children from low-income homes average below 100 hours.

The goal of the First Library program is to increase the chance of success among all students by the time they reach third grade. The program began in 2013 for pre-K classes and expanded to kindergarten during the 2017-18 school year.

Today, each pre-K and kindergarten classroom in the district's 11 elementary schools participates in four readings per year.

At each reading, every child is

sent home with the book.

"That's their first library," said Debbie Reilly, Citrus County Library System regional manager and CCEF board member.

The Oct. 27 book is "Pete the Cat: Pete's Big Lunch," by James Dean.

The Nov. 3 book is "Do You Want a Hug," by Kevin Lewis.

"It's extremely rewarding to read for children," added Eric Head, Citrus County Library System director and CCEF board member. He said anyone is welcome to volunteer.

By starting a home library, the

goal is to encourage reading at home between parents and children. Head said the more words kids are exposed to, the better off they will be in the future.

"The one thing that we can do more than anything," he said, "is read to them."

**CCSO: No evidence Brian Laudrie was in Citrus County**

Citrus County Sheriff's Office officials have been dispelling rumors Brian Laudrie, the person of interest in the murder of his fiancée Gabby Petito, was in their jurisdiction.

Sheriff Mike Prendergast issued a statement Wednesday evening, Oct. 20, on his agency's Facebook page after a person called authorities at around 5:30 p.m. Tuesday to report an abandoned bicycle purportedly belonging to Laudrie off of State Road 200 in Hernando.

Prendergast said a deputy

tried to lift fingerprints from the bicycle but was unsuccessful because of the bike's condition.

"At this time," the sheriff said, "our office has no evidence to believe this abandoned bicycle is Brian Laudrie's."

Prendergast said his investigators also can't verify the man a Dunnellon-area resident's surveillance system captured in October cycling on a sandy path is Laudrie.

"Again," the sheriff said, "our office does not have sufficient proof to believe the individual in this circulated video clip is Brian Laudrie or that this abandoned bike is that of

Laudrie's."

Law enforcement has been searching for Laudrie since he was last seen Sept. 13, after the 23-year-old returned to his parents' North Port home from a cross-country road trip with 22-year-old Petito.

Petito vanished during the journey and amid tensions with Laudrie. Her body was later found near where the couple was last spotted in Wyoming. Coroners ruled Petito was strangled to death.

Laudrie has not been charged with Petito's murder but a warrant was issued for his arrest, alleging he fraudulently

used bank accounts around the time of Petito's death.

During a Wednesday search of the Carlton Reserve, 24,500-acre preserve in Sarasota County, authorities discovered human remains close to where Laudrie's belongings were also located.

Medical examiners confirmed Thursday that those remains are Laudrie, according to The Associated Press.

"We are aware of the current events as they are unraveling ...," the sheriff's office posted on Facebook. "Our office continues to follow this story as it develops."

Diving into the depths of Cousteau

NEW YORK — Who was Jacques-Yves Cousteau, exactly?

He was an oceanographer and explorer but held no scientific degree. He was an environmentalist whose voyages were nevertheless sometimes funded by oil companies seeking drilling sites. He was a filmmaker who made otherworldly undersea documentaries — three won best documentary Oscars — but he disliked the term. He preferred “adventure films.”

Maybe Cousteau’s legacy is, appropriately, more fluid. Perhaps more than anything else, Cousteau symbolized a boundless spirit of adventure, leading a landlubbing public into enchanted underwater worlds. A siren of the seas.

In Liz Garbus’ “Becoming Cousteau,” an editor named John Soh from ABC’s “The Undersea World of Jacques Cousteau” wrestles with the difficulty of labeling Cousteau only to conclude: “He was a man looking at the future.”

“Becoming Cousteau,” which National Geographic opens in theaters Friday, attempts to frame the singular Cousteau and his legacy as an early environmental defender of increasingly imperiled waters. It’s a defining documentary portrait of the French oceanographer — the real-life Steve Zissou — as a fish only truly content below the surface.

“I am miserable out of the water,” Cousteau, who died

in 1993, says in a recording in the film. “It is as though you’ve been introduced to heaven and then forced back to Earth.”

The film, which will debut Nov. 24 on Disney+, has one toe in the dreamy mystical realm of Cousteau’s own making — the otherworldly underwater photography he shot with Louis Malle; the stylish, high-seas adventures aboard the Calypso — and another in a more sober reality of ocean pollution that Cousteau watched with growing concern. In later years, his popular, Emmy-winning nature series turned increasingly grim and ominous.

“By the end of his life, I think he felt like Cassandra screaming to everyone about this impending doom,” says Garbus. “Certainly he suffered commercially for that, as well. They were like: These shows are

a downer.”

Garbus, the prolific documentarian of two Oscar-nominated docs (“What Happened Miss Simone?” “The Farm: Angola, USA”) and a host of others (“The Fourth Estate,” “All In: The Fight for Democracy”), first started developing the film in 2015. But it took years to get access approved by the Cousteau Society and his estate.

Cousteau’s second wife, Francine Cousteau, and their two children, Pierre Yves and Dianne, are executive producers on the film. (Cousteau also had two other sons: Jean-Michel and Philippe, who died in a plane crash in 1979.) Working with the family, Garbus says, was “very complicated.”

Cousteau’s legacy also includes co-creating the Aqualung, freeing underwater diving of clunky apparatus and birthing the use of scuba.

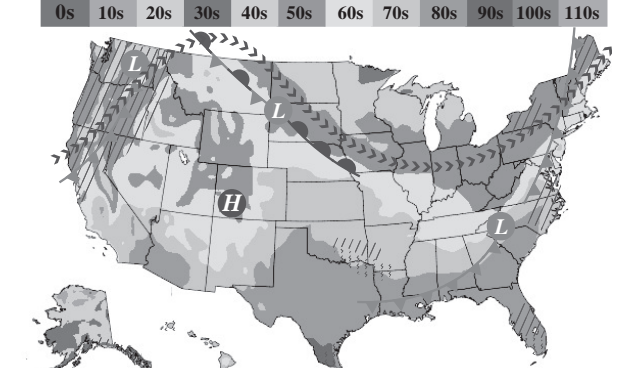

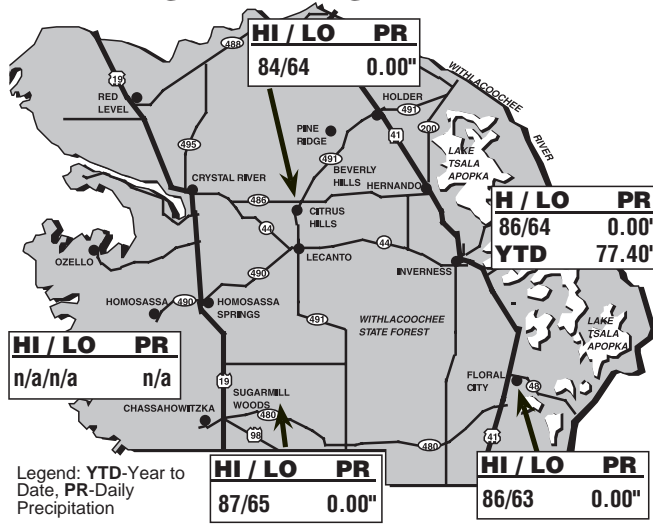

and Prevention (CDC) studies seriously," Massullo said.

Added Massullo: "We believe the children are not at any more of a risk from COVID than they are of the flu. The studies have shown that. Parents should have the right to decide how they are raised and whether (to get the shot)."

Simpson, along with Florida House Speaker Chris Sprowls, R-Palm Harbor, issued the following joint statement:

"Across the country, hard-working employees and business owners trying to make a living are being threatened by the Biden Administration's reckless one-size-fits-all approach to COVID-19 vaccine mandates," they said.

"Meanwhile, the rights of parents are being trampled on," the statement read. "Florida will respond to this gross overreach by the federal government."

Biden and Sprowls said they will review DeSantis' specific proposals, along with "our own ideas for legislative action, including whether now is the time for Florida to withdraw from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and establish our own state program."

Many other states are considering anti-mandate bills. GOP Texas Gov. Greg Abbott last week issued an executive order to prohibit any entity from requiring vaccines.

DeSantis outlined policy goals for the special session, including holding businesses

liable for adverse reactions to vaccines, removing legal liability protections for employers with vaccine mandates and added protections for people fired for not being vaccinated.

"At the end of the day, you shouldn't be discriminated against based on your health decisions," DeSantis said during a news conference. "We want to provide protection for people, we want to make it clear that, in Florida, your right to earn a living is not contingent upon whatever choices you're making in terms of these injections."

Democrats immediately chastised DeSantis with state Sen. Annette Taddeo, who this week announced she is running for governor, likening him to a dictator "that supposedly we all hate."

Biden last month ordered sweeping new federal vaccine requirements for as many as 100 million Americans — private-sector employees as well as health care workers and federal contractors.

Biden criticized Americans who are not yet vaccinated and said his "patience is wearing thin."


But Republican leaders — and some union chiefs — said Biden was going too far in trying to muscle private companies and workers, a certain sign of legal challenges to come.

## 'Sound of Music' daughter dies

STOWE, Vt. — The second daughter of Maria von Trapp, whose Austrian family was famous for being depicted in the musical and beloved movie "The Sound of Music," has died. She was 90.

Eleonore "Lorli" von Trapp Campbell died Sunday, Oct. 17, in Northfield, Vermont. The death was confirmed by The Day Funeral Home in Randolph, Vermont.

Campbell was born in Salzburg, Austria, the second daughter of Georg and Maria von Trapp and a younger stepsibling to the older von Trapp children who went on to be depicted in stage and film.

The family escaped from Nazi-occupied Austria in 1938 and performed concert tours throughout Europe and America. The family settled in Vermont in the early 1940s and opened a ski lodge in Stowe.

The Austrian traditions her mother brought to Vermont from Europe played a big part in the family life, daughter Hope McAndrew, of East Hardwick, Vermont, said Thursday.

While McAndrew said they all knew every word from "The Sound of Music," they also knew the songs the family sang

while touring North America, long before the musicals.

"They did amazing Christmas concerts that she would describe to us. And they were really touching, they were," McAndrew said. "She had very fond memories of those Christmas concerts."

"The Sound of Music," was a musical play and movie based loosely on a 1949 book by Maria von Trapp, who died in 1987. It tells the story of an Austrian woman who married a widower with seven children and teaches them music.

Campbell's father, Austrian naval Capt. Georg von Trapp and his first wife, Agathe Whitehead von Trapp, had seven children who were the basis for the singing family in the musical and film. Maria married the captain after Whitehead von Trapp died and taught her new stepchildren music. They are all now deceased.

Georg von Trapp and Maria von Trapp went on to have three more children, who were not depicted in the movie; Campbell was the second. Campbell's siblings, Rosmarie von Trapp and Johannes von Trapp, live in Stowe.

Campbell's first career was singing soprano as a member of the Trapp Family Singers, which traveled internationally and to all of the United States, except South Dakota and Hawaii, until she married Hugh David Campbell in 1954, the obituary said.

"The life of singing on tour is one that involves an extraordinary amount of discipline and hard work, and my mother lived as a teenager singing lead soprano, night after night after night, and toured much of the year, and it really shaped who she was," Campbell's daughter Elizabeth Peters, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, said Thursday.

"She was a very disciplined woman, and yet she missed out on many of the things that the rest of us enjoyed in high school and college years and yet she was very grateful for all the travel and the experience she had," Peters said.

After Campbell married in 1954, she supported her husband, a coach and teacher, in Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, while raising seven daughters. In 1975, the family moved to Waitsfield, Vermont. She taught her girls to cook, bake, garden, sew, knit, darn, and make butter and ice cream from scratch.

In addition to her two remaining siblings, survivors include seven daughters, 18 grandchildren and six great-grandsons.

A service is scheduled for Nov. 6 in Waitsfield.

## Bond and 'Willy Wonka' songwriter Leslie Bricusse dies at 90

LONDON — Oscar-winning British songwriter Leslie Bricusse, whose work includes James Bond themes and Willy Wonka's signature tune, has died. He was 90.

Son Adam Bricusse said on Facebook that his father "passed away peacefully" on Tuesday, Oct. 19. No cause of death was given. His death was also confirmed by actress Joan Collins, a friend, who said on Instagram that Bricusse "was one of the giant songwriters of our time."

Born in the London suburb of Pinner in 1931, Bricusse studied at Cambridge University, where he was president of the Footlights performance club, a springboard for musical and comic talent.

He began writing music for stage and screen in the 1950s, and enjoyed success over more than five decades.

Bricusse wrote both music and lyrics, working alone and with collaborators. He wrote lyrics for the Bond theme songs "Goldfinger" and "You Only Live Twice," with music by John Barry.

With frequent collaborator Anthony Newley, Bricusse wrote the Academy Award-nominated score for 1971 film "Willy Wonka and the Chocolate

Factory," including the song "Pure Imagination," sung by Gene Wilder and now considered a classic. Another song from the movie, "The Candy Man," became a huge hit for Sammy Davis Jr.

Bricusse and Newley also wrote 1960s stage musicals, including "Stop the World — I Want To Get Off" — which included the Grammy Award-winning song "What Kind of Fool Am I?" and "The Roar of the Greasepaint — The Smell of the Crowd." That show featured the song "Feeling Good," which became a signature tune for Nina Simone.

Bricusse's other film work included the music for "Doctor Doolittle," which won a best-song Oscar in 1968 for "Talk to the Animals."

He worked as a lyricist with composers including Henry Mancini on "Victor/Victoria" — which won him a second Academy Award, for best score, in 1983 — and John Williams, on "Superman," "Home Alone" and "Hook."

Bricusse is survived by his wife, Yvonne Romain, and their son.

# FBI: Remains found in park ID'd as Brian Laundrie

ST. PETERSBURG — The FBI on Thursday identified human remains found in a Florida nature preserve as those of Brian Laundrie, a person of interest in the death of girlfriend Gabby Petito while the couple was on a cross-country road trip.

The remains, a backpack and notebook believed to belong to Laundrie were discovered Wednesday in a Florida wilderness park, according to the FBI. The area where they were found had been under water during earlier searches.

The FBI's Denver office

said in a news release that a comparison of dental records confirmed that the remains were Laundrie. A lawyer for his parents, Steve Bertolino, also confirmed in a statement they were told the remains were those of their son.

"We have no further comment at this time and we ask that you respect the Laundrie's privacy at this time," the statement said.

The discovery of the remains concluded a massive search involving federal, state and local law enforcement that began shortly after Laundrie disappeared Sept. 14, two weeks after the 23-year-old returned alone to his

parents' home in North Port, Florida.

The investigation into Petito's slaying, however, is not yet concluded. Still, only Laundrie has ever been identified by law enforcement officials as a person of interest in the case.

Petito's family reported her missing Sept. 11, launching a search that garnered worldwide media attention and focused largely on the Carlton Reserve wilderness park near the Laundrie home. It is a densely wooded, swampy area that's home to alligators, coyotes, bobcats, snakes and numerous other creatures.

Florida's proposed Canadian Prescription Drug Importation Program plan has received preliminary approval from former U.S. Health & Human Services Secretary Alex Azar and in late September was submitted to HHS and the U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA) for final review.

"It's going to get done soon," Marsteller predicted, but exactly when and in exactly what form is uncertain.

Establishing such a drug import program was one of Gov. Ron DeSantis' first announced priorities upon assuming office in January 2019.

During the ensuing legislative session, lawmakers adopted House Bill 19, which created three state-backed import programs:

- Canadian Prescription Drug Importation Program.

- International Prescription Drug Importation Program managed by the Department of

Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR).

- A pilot program run by the Florida Department of Health (DOH) and DBPR.

The following year, lawmakers created the intergovernmental structure to be administered by AHCA to purchase drugs to treat asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, diabetes, hepatitis C, HIV and AIDS and mental health conditions and earmarked \$20.4 million in the budget to hire a contractor to get the program off the ground.

Marsteller told the 18-member panel, chaired by Rep. Clay Yarborough, R-Jacksonville, that within the first year of approval, the plan will be launched in two phases.

The first phase would provide drugs to DOH Agency for Persons with Disabilities (APD), Department of Children & Families (DCF) and Department of Corrections (DOC), she said.

A second phase would provide drugs for the state's Medicaid program, which has seen enrollment skyrocket by 1

million since the pandemic emerged in March 2020, and is projected to top 5 million by next July.

About 23% of all state residents are enrolled in Florida's \$35 billion-plus Medicaid program, which will cost the state an additional \$1.2 billion this year compared to last despite billions in additional federal funding.

Using the drug-import program for Medicaid-acquired prescriptions is "where the rubber's really going to meet the road," Marsteller said.

According to AHCA's 30-page presentation on the pending prescription drug plan, the \$150 million in estimated savings "may vary following implementation due to fluctuations in prescription drug pricing, additional drugs identified as importation candidates, rebates secured, and availability of supply."

In July, President Joe Biden directed the FDA to work with all states on drug importation plans and last month petitioned to dismiss a federal lawsuit blocking the launch of Florida's and New Mexico's plans.

That's when the bar's manager told the bouncer to park his truck behind Parkerson's to keep the couple from leaving while deputies were called.

Parkerson's girlfriend tried to drive forward away but the bouncer re-positioned his truck to keep them in the parking lot, according to records.

That's when Parkerson got out of his truck, stood 6 feet in front of the other man's truck and brandished a small handgun, forcing the other man to take cover inside his vehicle. At that, Parkerson fired a single round, which struck the driver's side roof-support pillar, according to records.

The bouncer then drove his truck forward to strike Parkerson, but Parkerson was able to get out of the way but keep his handgun pointed at the man. The bouncer drove away but managed to block the parking lot's exit.

Florida's Stand Your Ground law grants a person the right to immunity from prosecution when a defendant uses force in accordance with specified prerequisites.

Statute 776.032 provides that, in certain circumstances, a person may use deadly force to stand their ground against an attacker and be free from the fear of prosecution.

"A person is justified in using ... deadly force if ... (they) reasonably believes that using ... such force is necessary to prevent imminent death or great bodily harm to ... another," according to the statute.

When the defendant files a motion to invoke the statutory immunity, then the trial court holds a pre-trial evidentiary hearing to determine if the evidence warrants immunity.

During the hearing, the accused provides evidence that the stand your ground law applies in their case. Then prosecutors are asked to prove that the defendant is not entitled to immunity.

■ In another case, Howard set a Dec. 22 case status hearing for Adam Joseph Joerres, 34, accused of authority figure soliciting or engaging in sexual conduct with a student.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested the Lecanto High School math teacher on accusations he sent lewd texts and images to a student.

Sheriff's deputies arrested the Inverness man May 24.

According to the sheriff's office, Joerres had been having inappropriate text conversations with a student since February 2021.

According to the arrest report, a girl described Joerres' texts as "flirting," adding that Joerres would also send her inappropriate images or memes.

She also said Joerres would throw paper balls at her buttocks and down her shirt.

According to the arrest report, the girl told detectives Joerres texted her during prom in April to ask if she wanted to see him afterward.

She said Joerres also told her he would kill her if she either told anyone or didn't delete their texts, according to records.

When detectives questioned him to his arrest, Joerres admitted to the allegations but denied being physical with any student, according to the sheriff's office and arrest report.

Joerres resigned from the school district following his arrest.

Joerres' lawyer, David Knox, told Howard "I suspect this case (will be) resolved."

■ In another case Howard set a Jan. 18, 2022, trial date for Quinton James Jones, 26, charged with battery on a law enforcement officer and resisting arrest with violence.

was arrested January 2021.

Citrus County deputies arrested Jones after his family members told emergency workers that Jones had a rifle and was threatening suicide.

Deputies found Jones on his porch with the rifle shouting that he was inviting deputies to try and arrest him and that he wanted to commit "suicide by cop." That's a term referred to by some people in which law enforcement deputies are pressured into shooting a person intent on ending their own life. It often involves someone pointing a gun at a law enforcement officer with no intention of shooting them, and the law enforcement officer shooting them in self defense.

The arresting deputy reported that Jones had pointed his rifle at him, according to the arrest report. When Jones put down his rifle the deputy tried to restrain him with handcuffs, but Jones resisted. During a scuffle, Jones broke the deputy's finger and tore a ligament in his hand.

Assistant State Attorney Kevin Davis told Howard that he would contact Jones' lawyer about possibly settling the case.

■ In another felony case, Howard set a new status hearing date of Dec. 20 for Ronald Charles Monteleone, the Homosassa 48-year-old accused of threatening a motorist with a knife during a road rage incident.

Monteleone faces a charge of aggravated battery and two counts of aggravated assault in connection with the July 3, 2020, incident at the

corner of County Road 491 and State Road 44 in Lecanto.

Monteleone is accused of trying to strike a man and woman with his car before he chased the man with a knife, according to records.

■ Also Thursday in court, Howard gave Phillip Sawhill a deadline on when the Pasco County 55-year-old should say if he's either pleading out to allegations he caused a deadly crash near Inverness, or if he's taking his felony case to jurors.

"It's getting some age to it," the judge said after scheduling Sawhill's next court date on Dec. 22 as a plea-or-set hearing for Sawhill to announce whether he'll be standing trial or changing his not-guilty plea to a trio of vehicular-manslaughter charges. "Good luck to all concerned."

James Brown, who represents Sawhill alongside lawyer Charles Vaughn, asked Howard for a continuance because he's expecting to get a report within the next 60 to 90 days from an expert witness tasked with reconstructing the fatal head-on collision from Dec. 24, 2019.

Brown said prosecutors also might want to depose the witness after their findings are published.

Assistant State Attorney Patricia Diaz didn't object to Brown's request.

It's alleged Sawhill, of Land O'Lakes, tried to overtake five northbound vehicles in a no-passing zone before his white Toyota Highlander struck a southbound Kia Optima on South Pleasant Grove Road, south of East Amy Lane.

Emergency responders pronounced the Kia's three occupants — 62-year-old Amalia Gomara, of Dunnellon; 86-year-old Clara Adela Gorrin, of Hialeah; and 85-year-old Nilda Cordovi, of Pembroke Pines — dead at the crash scene.

Motorists stopped to help Sawhill escape from

his Highlander, which caught fire. Sawhill was hospitalized with serious injuries.

After Florida Highway Patrol troopers arrested Sawhill in November, prosecutors charged him with three counts of vehicular manslaughter.

Sawhill posted bail in December on a \$90,000

bond, releasing him from custody. If convicted as charged, he could be sentenced to up to 45 years in prison.

# Assistance for bankruptcy attorney approved

The Citrus Board of County Commissioners has approved a request from County Attorney Denise Lyn to hire an attorney to assist in the bankruptcy issues with DAB Construction and Nature Coast EMS. We hardly need to dig down into the black holes of the U.S. 19 construction debacle and the dollar-draining funnel of the EMS disaster.

But even then, the county needs to try to recover from these fiascos. It's no secret that Citrus County isn't rolling in wealth. The BOCC is held accountable and looked at closely by citizens and the press.

Ms. Lyn's request put a cap on the dollar amount she said she needs to employ this specialty hired gun. It's \$8,000. In reviewing the contract submitted to her by the bankruptcy law firm she picked, their going rate is \$300 an hour for government work. A review of hourly rates nationwide shows that Florida's average rate for government work is about \$294 an hour, so Ms. Lyn's choice is in the ballpark. Not bad for slugging it out in the trenches.

But speaking of a fight, we feel this money is well-spent protection to keep Citrus County — and its taxpayers — sleeping peacefully at night. We have no idea of the future litigation on the horizon in Citrus County, but this Pinellas County firm appears a good choice because bankruptcy firms focus on one of two issues: protecting debtors or going for the money owed creditors. The chosen one — Blanchard Law in Largo — seems perched on protecting

debtors. That would be Citrus County.

One might ask why are we hiring an attorney when we already have one who gets an annual salary? It's a reasonable question. With a reasonable analogy. A person goes to his or her general practitioner for routine care, but when a health crisis occurs, the best action is to see that specialist — cardiologist, neurosurgeon, oncologist or whomever. A sick heart, brain, or cancer are only talking points with your GP. When your life is on the line, it's time to bring in the big guns.

In her memorandum to the board, Lyn stated as much, saying there is an urgency in relation to payments and title issues with the county's assumption of the EMS services. This was discussed extensively by the commissioners and staff at the Oct. 9 commission meeting, with Commissioner Ruthie Schlabach wondering why we need to go to another county to hire a bankruptcy lawyer. She wondered how many specialty firms are in Citrus County that focus on this branch of the law. Ms. Lyn couldn't provide a specific number, but regardless of that, the county has positioned itself with a defensive wall in terms of litigation. And the \$8,000 is already accounted for as a line item in the annual budget for outside attorney assistance, being only 10% of the \$80,000 available. We encourage the remaining \$72,000 to be returned to the general fund at the end of this fiscal year. And like an auction, "Going once, going twice," the gavel closes on \$8,000.

And not a penny more.

**Plant-based diet might prevent cancer**

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. One in eight women in the United States will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. It is the most common cancer among women except for skin cancers. On average, every 2 minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer in the United States.

There is a belief that genetics make up a large number of breast cancer cases but that is not true. Only 5% to 10% come from an inherited genetic mutation. The vast majority come from daily diet and lifestyle choices.

Overweight and obese women have between 50% and 250% more breast cancer occurrence, recurrence, and death than their normal-weight counterparts. Everywhere you have a fat cell you've got an enzyme called aromatase which turns precursor hormones into estrogen, which feeds and fuels 80% of all breast cancers.

Animal products — animal protein and animal fat — give cancer everything it needs to flourish.

Chicken and fish are animal protein, so the same cellular response is happening as if you were eating beef. Also, grilling chicken or cooking it in the oven creates PhIP, a carcinogen that increases breast cancer risk.

Plant-based foods — particularly leafy greens, cruciferous vegetables, soy, berries, mushrooms, and scallions and onions — have phytochemicals that stop a cancer cell's ability to survive. We all know we have massive challenges with bus driver shortages, school teacher and staff shortages, and bringing students up to adequate grade levels after a year of remote learning.

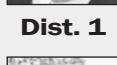
It is evident to a blind man that the governor's decision not to apply for funds is political. We are the only state in America that has not submitted a plan for these funds.

# Trump to roll out new media venture

NEW YORK — Some investors aren't waiting to see if former President Donald Trump's plans for a media company to challenge the likes of Facebook, Twitter and even Disney can actually become reality — they're all in.

Trump said Wednesday that he's launching Trump Media & Technology Group and a "Truth Social" app as a rival to the Big Tech companies that have shut him out and denied him the megaphone that was paramount to his national rise. The announcement came nine months after Trump was expelled from social media for his role in inciting the Jan. 6 Capitol insurrection.

Experts were split on how strong a competitor Trump Media & Technology Group can be, but the stock market reacted with exuberance.

TMTG's plan is to become a publicly listed company through a merger with Digital World Acquisition Corp., a type of company whose sole purpose is to acquire a private company and take it public. Shares of Digital World Acquisition quadrupled Thursday in what some might see as validation for Trump, even though there's a ways to go before the merger is completed.

"I'm personally not a Trump supporter, but this could lead to giant media presence," said investor Ryan Joshua Keenan, who put \$2,000 into the stock early Thursday morning and had already tripled the money by the early afternoon. "It's been going up ridiculously."

Trump has spoken about launching his own social media site ever since he was barred from Twitter

and Facebook. An earlier effort to launch a blog on his existing website was abandoned after the page drew dismal views.

"We live in a world where the Taliban has a huge presence on Twitter, yet your favorite American President has been silenced," he said in a statement Wednesday. "This is unacceptable."

Conservative voices actually do well on traditional social media. On Wednesday, half of Facebook's 10 top performing link posts were from conservative media, commentators or politicians, according to a daily list compiled by a New York Times technology columnist and an internet studies professor using Facebook's own data.

TMTG has not set its sights low. In addition to the Truth Social app, which is expected to soft-launch next month with a nationwide rollout early next year, the company says it is planning a video-on-demand service dubbed TMTG+ that will feature entertainment programming, news and podcasts.

One slide in a TMTG presentation on its website includes a graphic of its potential competitors, which range from Facebook and Twitter to

Netflix and Disney+ to CNN. The same slide suggests that over the long term TMTG will also become a power in cloud computing and payments and suggests it will go head-to-head with Amazon, Microsoft, Google and Stripe.

"This network will most likely be most successful in targeting far-right users, the same that left Facebook for 'alternative' social networks like Gab or Parler," said Alexandra Cirone, assistant professor in government at Cornell University.

Trump's new media outlet could also compete for viewers on conservative networks such as OANN, Newsmax and Fox News, she said.

Ali Mogharabi, senior equity analyst at Morningstar, who covers Twitter, Facebook and other social media companies, said Trump's brand could initially give TMTG a leg up relative to other new social media sites going up against Facebook and other big players.

"Whether that's going to be sustainable in the long run, that's very uncertain."

Mogharabi said next year's mid-term elections could be pivotal in whether the social media platform succeeds.

# House votes to hold Trump ally Bannon in contempt

WASHINGTON — The House voted Thursday to hold Steve Bannon, a longtime ally and aide to former President Donald Trump, in contempt of Congress for defying a subpoena from the committee investigating the violent Jan. 6 Capitol insurrection.

In a rare show of bipartisanship on the House floor, the committee's Democratic chairman, Mississippi Rep. Bennie Thompson, led the floor debate along with Republican Rep. Liz Cheney of Wyoming, one of two Republicans on the panel. Still, the vote was 229-202 with all but nine GOP lawmakers who voted saying "no."

The House vote sends the matter to the U.S. attorney's office in Washington, where it will now be up to prosecutors in that office to decide whether to present the case to a grand jury for possible criminal charges. It's still uncertain whether they will pursue the case — Attorney General Merrick Garland would only say at a House hearing on Thursday that they plan to "make a decision consistent with the principles of prosecution."

The partisan split over Bannon's subpoena — and over the committee's investigation in general — is emblematic of the raw tensions that still grip

Congress nine months after the Capitol attack.

Democrats have vowed to comprehensively probe the assault in which hundreds of Trump's supporters battered their way past police, injured dozens of officers and interrupted the electoral count certifying President Joe Biden's November victory. Lawmakers on the panel say they will move swiftly and forcefully to punish anyone who won't cooperate with the probe.

Republicans call it a "witch hunt," say it is a waste of time and argue that Congress should be focusing on more important matters.

## CDC expands rollout, also blesses mixing different shots

WASHINGTON — Millions more Americans can get a COVID-19 booster and choose a different company's vaccine for that next shot, federal health officials said Thursday.

Certain people who received Pfizer vaccinations months ago already are eligible for a booster and now the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says specific Moderna and Johnson & Johnson recipients qualify, too. And in a bigger change, the agency is allowing the flexibility of "mixing and matching" that extra dose regardless of which type people received first.

The Food and Drug Administration had already authorized such an expansion of the nation's booster campaign on Wednesday, and it was also endorsed Thursday by a CDC advisory panel. CDC Director Dr. Rochelle Walensky had the final word on who gets the extra doses.

"We're at a different place in the pandemic than we were earlier" when supply constraints meant people had to take whatever shot they were offered, noted CDC adviser Dr. Helen Keipp Talbot of Vanderbilt University.

She called it "priceless" to be able to choose a different kind for the booster if, for example, someone might be at risk for a rare side effect from a specific vaccine.

## Moscow closing schools, many businesses as virus deaths soar

MOSCOW — Restaurants, movie theaters and many retail stores in Moscow will be closed for 11 days starting Oct. 28, along with other new restrictions, officials said Thursday, as Russia recorded the highest numbers of coronavirus infections and deaths since the pandemic began.

The government coronavirus task force reported 36,339 new infections and 1,036 deaths in the past 24 hours. That brought Russia's death toll to 227,389, by far the highest in Europe.

President Vladimir Putin has voiced consternation about Russians' hesitancy to get vaccinated and urged them to get the shots, but firmly ruled out making them mandatory.

He responded to the rising infections and deaths by ordering Russians to stay off work from Oct. 30 to Nov. 7, when the country already is observing a four-day national holiday, and Moscow Mayor Sergei Sobyenin followed up by introducing new restrictions in the capital, starting even earlier.

Gyms, cinemas and other

entertainment venues, as well as most stores will close in Moscow from Oct. 28 to Nov. 7, along with kindergartens and schools. Restaurants and cafes will only be open for takeout or delivery orders during that period. Food stores and pharmacies can stay open.

Access to museums, theaters, concert halls and other venues will be limited to those holding digital codes on their smartphones to prove vaccination or past illness, a practice that will remain in place even after Nov. 7.

Most state organizations and private businesses, except for those operating key infrastructure and a few others, will halt work in the 11-day period, Sobyenin added.

Earlier this week, he said unvaccinated people over 60 will be required to stay home except for brief walks and open-air exercise. He also told businesses to keep at least a third of their employees working remotely for three months starting Oct. 25.

"The situation in Moscow is developing according to the worst-case scenario," Sobyenin wrote on his blog, adding that the number of infections in the capital is nearing all-time highs.

There still are restrictions on who qualifies and when for a booster. Starting six months past their last Pfizer vaccination, people are urged to get a booster if they're 65 or older, nursing home residents, or at least 50 and at increased risk of severe disease because of health problems.

Boosters also were allowed, but not urged, for adults of any age at increased risk of infection because of health problems or their jobs or living conditions. That includes health care workers, teachers and people in jails or homeless shelters.

The same booster qualifications apply to

Moderna recipients. Moderna's booster will come at half the dose of the original two shots.

As for recipients of the single-shot J&J vaccine, a COVID-19 booster is recommended for everyone at least two months after their vaccination. That's because the J&J vaccine hasn't proved as protective as the two-dose Moderna or Pfizer options.

The CDC panel didn't explicitly recommend anyone get a different brand than they started with but left open the option — saying only that a booster of some sort was recommended. And some of the advisers said they would

prefer that J&J recipients receive a competitor's booster, citing preliminary data from an ongoing government study that suggested a bigger boost in virus-fighting antibodies from that combination.

About two-thirds of Americans eligible for COVID-19 shots are fully vaccinated, and the government says getting first shots to the unvaccinated remain the priority.

While health authorities hope boosters will shore up waning immunity against milder coronavirus infections, all the vaccines still offer strong protection against hospitalizations and death.

## Official: Narrative of riders filming train rape is false

MEDIA, Pa. — The narrative that passengers watched a man rape a woman on a train in suburban Philadelphia last week and "filmed it for their own gratification instead of calling the police" is false, the prosecutor handling the case said Thursday as he asked witnesses to come forward.

Delaware County District Attorney Jack Stollsteimer made the assertion during a news conference in which he also stressed any witness to the Oct. 13 attack should share information without fear that they would be charged. He said Wednesday that Pennsylvania law does not allow for the prosecution of someone for simply witnessing a crime.

The news conference comes after days of police and Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority officials saying multiple passengers were present for the assault, with some appearing to hold their phones in the direction of the attack as police allege 35-year-old Fiston Ngoy raped the woman in a train seat.

Authorities initially expressed dismay that most passengers did not call 911 or report the attack, even if they didn't understand the seriousness of what was happening.

Upper Darby Police Superintendent Timothy Bernhardt told reporters over the weekend there were passengers present who "should have done something," in his opinion.

## Harris calls Va. governor's race 'tight'

DUMFRIES, Va. — Vice President Kamala Harris traveled to the Washington suburbs on Thursday night to campaign for Democratic candidate Terry McAuliffe in a Virginia governor's race that she acknowledged looks closer than once expected.

"This race is tight," Harris told hundreds of cheering supporters in a parking lot outside a county fire station in Dumfries, about 30 miles south of Washington and part of fast-growing Northern Virginia, which has been a key driver in turning what was once a red state more reliably blue. "And we got to make it clear, Virginia, that we're paying attention. We got to make it clear that we're not taking anything for granted."

## California proposes new oil drilling ban

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — California's oil and gas regulator on Thursday proposed that the state ban new oil and gas drilling within 3,200 feet of schools, homes and hospitals to protect public health in what would be the nation's largest buffer zone between oil wells and communities.

It's the latest effort by Democratic Gov. Gavin Newsom's administration to wind down oil production in California, aligning him with environmental advocates

pushing to curb the effects of climate change and against the powerful oil industry in the nation's seventh-largest oil producing state.

Studies show living near a drilling site can elevate risks of birth defects, cancer, respiratory problems and other health issues. More than 2 million Californians live within 3,200 feet of oil drilling sites, primarily low-income residents and people of color in Los Angeles County and the Central Valley. The proposal would not ban wells already operating in those zones but would add new pollution controls.

## EU summit loads pressure on Poland

BRUSSELS — European Union leaders pressured a defiant Polish Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki Thursday to fall back into line on recognizing that EU law trumps national decision-making, hoping that dialogue will stave off a crisis in the bloc.

Morawiecki instead painted a picture of an overbearing union that treats its 27 member nations as mere provinces, usurping ever more powers and imposing its values against the wishes of sovereign peoples.

Facing the threat of losing out on tens of billions of EU funds because of his stance, he countered that Poland "will not act under the pressure of blackmail."

Almost all other countries replied that respecting common rules and values is essential in a bloc if it is not to unravel and lose political and economic clout in the world.

"If you want to be part of a club and have the advantages of a club, you must play by the rules," said his Belgian counterpart Alexander De Croo. "A red line has been breached and we cannot accept that."

## Haiti gang leader threatens to kill missionaries

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — The leader of the 400 Mawozo gang that police say is holding 17 members of a kidnapped missionary group is seen in a video released Thursday saying he will kill them if he doesn't get what he's demanding.

The video posted on social media shows Wilson Joseph dressed in a blue suit, carrying a blue hat and wearing a large cross around his neck.

"I swear by thunder that if I don't get what I'm asking for, I will put a bullet in the heads of these Americans," he said in the video.

He also threatened Prime Minister Ariel Henry and Haiti's national police chief as he spoke in front of the open coffins that apparently held several members of his gang who were recently killed.

"You guys make me cry. I cry water. But I'm going to make you guys cry blood," he said.

On Thursday afternoon, Henry's office announced that Léon Charles had resigned as head of the National Police and was replaced by Frantz Elbé.

# WH: Climate change brings threats

WASHINGTON — The Earth's warming and resulting natural disasters are creating a more dangerous world of desperate leaders and peoples, the Biden administration said Thursday in the federal government's starkest assessments yet of security and migration challenges facing the United States as the climate worsens.

The Defense Department for years has called climate change a threat to U.S. national security. But Thursday's reports by the departments of Defense and Homeland Security, National Security Council and Director of National Intelligence provide one of the government's deepest looks yet at the vast rippling effects on the world's stability and resulting heightened threats to U.S. security, as well as its impact on migration.

They include the first assessment

by intelligence agencies on the impact of climate change, identifying 11 countries of greatest concern from Haiti to Afghanistan.

Another report, the first by the government focusing at length on climate and migration, recommends a number of steps, including monitoring the flows of people forced to leave their homes because of natural disasters, and working with Congress on a groundbreaking plan that would add droughts, floods and wildfires and other climate-related reasons to be considered in granting refugee status.

The climate migration assessments urge the creation of a task force to coordinate U.S. management of climate change and migration across government, from climate scientists to aid and security officials.

Each year, storms, the failure of seasonal rains and other sudden natural disasters force an average of 21.5 million people from their homes around the world, the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees says.

Worsening climate from the burning of coal and gas already is intensifying a range of disasters, from wildfires overrunning towns in California, rising seas overtaking island nations and drought-aggravated conflict in some parts of the world.

"Policy and programming efforts made today and in coming years will impact estimates of people moving due to climate-related factors," said the report, one of dozens of climate change assessments President Joe Biden ordered from federal agencies. "Tens of millions of people, however, are likely to be displaced over the next two to three decades due in large measure to climate change impacts."

The Biden administration is eager to show itself confronting the impacts of climate change ahead of a crucial U.N. climate conference in Glasgow, Scotland, that starts late this month. That's especially so as Biden struggles to get lawmakers to agree to multibillion-dollar measures to slow climate change, a key part of his domestic agenda.

# Pirates find a way to win

CRYSTAL RIVER — In a game where they were out-gained by almost 200 yards and gave up 24 consecutive points, the Crystal River Pirates still somehow found a way to win Thursday night's home football game against South Lake, 27-24.

Against Citrus last week, we had a lot of self-inflicted wounds and weren't able to find a way to win. Tonight, close ball game, I like to think that shows some growth and maturity on our end."

The Pirates led 20-0 in the first half and took a 20-3 lead into halftime. The Eagles (1-7) scored three second-half touchdowns to take a stunning 24-20 lead with just 1:17 left in the game.

A good kickoff return by David Paulsen set up the Pirates at midfield. After a Michael Tovine 5-yard run and 10-yard pass to Issac Edwards put the ball at the Eagles 30, Tovine found Paulsen down the sideline for a 25-yard gain for first-and-goal at the 5 with 35 ticks left on the clock.

"I saw the matchup and took it," Tovine said of the long gain to Paulsen. "I back-shouldered him on the throw. He caught it and made a play."

Lohrey said both his outside receivers can make a

Gainer's final run preceded a punt that began a disastrous sequence for Lecanto in the second quarter. With Springstead (6-3, 1-1 6A-5) leading 7-6, Madden Buratzuk blocked the kick and Curtis Chancey recovered to give the Eagles the ball on the Panthers' 35-yard line.

# Taylor smacks three homers

*Dodgers beat Braves 11-2 to extend NLCS*

LOS ANGELES — Chris Taylor hit three homers and drove in six runs as the Los Angeles Dodgers broke loose at the plate to beat Atlanta 7-2 on Thursday night, cutting the Braves' lead in the NL Championship Series to 3-2.

AJ Pollock had two home runs and four RBIs for the Dodgers, who have won seven straight postseason elimination games dating to last season. They also trailed 0-2 and 1-3 against Atlanta in the NLCS last year before rallying to win three straight games at a neutral site in Arlington, Texas.

Game 6 is Saturday back in Atlanta, where the Braves get two more chances to earn their first trip to the World Series since 1999.

After mustering just four hits in a 9-2 loss in Game 4 that pushed them to the brink of elimination, the desperate Dodgers rapped out eight hits by the third inning off Max Fried. They finished with 17, a club record for a postseason game.

The Dodgers got to Fried with four consecutive hits in the second. Pollock hit a tying homer and Taylor drove the first pitch he saw to left field, putting the Dodgers in front for good, 3-2.

Starting at third base in place of injured Justin Turner, Taylor became the second Dodgers player with a three-homer game in the postseason. Kiké Hernández also did it in Game 5 of the 2017 NLCS against the Chicago Cubs.

Taylor had an RBI single in the third to make it 4-2. He went deep in the fifth, sending an 0-2 pitch from Chris Martin to center field and extending the lead to 6-2.

Taylor homered again in the seventh, taking Dylan Lee out to left-center with two outs. The versatile veteran had an opportunity to match the major league mark of four home runs in game, but struck out swinging to end the eighth.

Albert Pujols wasn't just hugging, he was hitting, too.

The 41-year-old slugger got on base three times, including a

walk, and scored twice on Taylor's homers. He notched two singles for his third and fourth hits of the postseason in his second start. He had two hits in the NL Division Series against San Francisco.

Pujols has taken to greeting his much younger teammates with bear hugs in the dugout after home runs, and they kept him busy.

Los Angeles got a clutch performance from its bullpen after opener Joe Kelly allowed a two-run homer to Freddie Freeman in the first and soon exited after 28 pitches with tightness in his right biceps.

Evan Phillips, Alex Vesia, Brusdar Graterol, Blake Treinen, Corey Knebel and Kenley Jansen combined to allow just three hits the rest of

the way.

Atlanta's Eddie Rosario, who homered twice in his second four-hit game of the NLCS in Game 4, went 2 for 4 with a strikeout.

Pitching in his hometown, Fried gave up five runs and eight hits in 4 2/3 innings. The left-hander struck out three and walked two.

Springstead needed just two plays to cash in, with Owen Andress running up the middle for a 5-yard touchdown to make it 14-6 with 4:10 to play in the first half.

Two plays into the next drive, Lecanto fumbled the ball away, recovered by PJ. Class. The Eagles went 29 yards on just four snaps, capped by Ayden Ferguson taking a Nick Centola pass 15 yards to the end zone with 1:34 to go before halftime.

The Panthers ran off very little clock while going three-and-out, giving the Eagles one more possession before the intermission. Centola found Cross Licht over the middle for a 17-yard scoring strike as 9.7 seconds remained, and Springstead led 27-6 at halftime. It was Licht's second touchdown, following a 4-yard run on the first play of the second quarter.

"The first half, I think we kind of got deflated once Darius got hurt and we had that fumble early in the game," Alexander said. "... You never know when the momentum is going to shift in the game and that just happened to be that time. We couldn't bounce back. Eventually we're going to be the type of team that can bounce back whenever we make mistakes early in the game. Tonight we just couldn't capitalize."

Staked to that big advantage, the Eagles did what they have done so well the past few decades, pound the ball and milk the clock. They ran 40 times for 284 yards. Much of the damage came from Andress, who had 186 yards on 19 carries.

# Florida set to get defensive

*While rebuilding via transfers*

GAINESVILLE — Florida might have its best defensive team in nearly a decade, an experienced group that seems to fit perfectly with coach Mike White's style.

White added three defensive stalwarts via the NCAA transfer portal, led by two-time Big South defensive player of the year Phlandrous Fleming and Summit League defensive player of the year Brandon McKissic, to bolster a lineup the Gators believe will be able to compete in the stacked Southeastern Conference.

Throw in returning shot-blocker Colin Castleton and Boston College transfer CJ Felder, and the Gators could have their best collection of defenders since Scottie Wilbekin, Casey Prather, Will Yeguete and Patric Young ran roughshod through the league in 2014 and advanced to the Final Four.

"We have size, speed, mentality, which is one of the biggest things, and a chip on our shoulder," Felder said. "We have guys with accolades, but we don't care about the accolades. We just genuinely like playing defense and really give our best effort on that end of the floor."

Florida's Wilbekin-led foursome was years in the making, a testament to patience and development under then-coach Billy Donovan.

White didn't have the same luxury. He turned to the burgeoning transfer portal to revamp a team that finished 15-10 last season and failed to get past the NCAA Tournament's opening weekend for the third straight postseason.

Guards Tre Mann and Scottie Lewis turned pro, drafted 18th

and 56th, respectively. Shooting guard Noah Locke, forward Omar Payne, backup point guard Ques Glover and reserve forward Osayi Osifo transferred in hopes of finding more prominent roles elsewhere.

White also lost his top two assistants, with Darris Nichols getting the head job at Radford and Jordan Mincy taking over at Jacksonville. White hired Oklahoma State's Erik Pastrana and Florida Atlantic's Akeem Miskdeen to replace them.

As for Florida's roster, White believes he upgraded several spots by adding leading scorers from three teams.

Fleming led Charleston Southern in scoring (20.1), rebounding (7.4) and steals (33) last season. McKissic averaged 17.2 points for the University of Missouri-Kansas City while shooting 50.8% from the field and 42.9% from 3-point range. Myreon Jones led Penn State with 15.3 points a game.

But it's the other end of the court that might see the biggest boost.

"I think to this point it's safe to say we're going to be pretty athletic defensively," White said. "We've got some guys that can move their feet and we have some veteran defenders. Does that necessarily mean you're going to be really good defensively? I hope so. I don't know that, but I hope so. I like our ceiling defensively."

## MORE TRANSFERS

The core of Florida's team already included three transfers: Castleton (Michigan), point guard Tyree Appleby (Cleveland State) and forward Anthony Duruji (Louisiana Tech). Appleby averaged 11.3 points and 3.3 assists last year. Castleton averaged 12.4 points, 6.4 rebounds and 2.3 blocks.

## FRESH FACES

Although White filled most of his holes with transfers, he also brought in two freshmen. The

class includes five-star recruit Kowacie Reeves, a 6-foot-6 guard who averaged 27 points and 9.9 rebounds as a senior at Westside High in Macon, Georgia. Guard Elijah Kennedy was a late addition to the class.

## COACH KEY

Forward Keyontae Johnson,

who collapsed on the court and was rushed to a nearby hospital last December, is not expected to be medically cleared this season. Johnson will resume his role as "Coach Key," helping run practices, motivate teammates and scout opponents. Johnson remains on scholarship.

"He's very much a big part of what we're doing," White said.

## EARLY TEST

The Gators open the season Nov. 9 against Elon, a tune-up before hosting No. 20 Florida State five days later. The Seminoles have won seven straight in the series.

## Hamilton expects newcomers to sustain FSU's recent success

*Three straight trips to the Sweet 16*

TALLAHASSEE — As Leonard Hamilton begins his 20th season at Florida State, he has elevated the program from one of the worst in the Atlantic Coast Conference to one of the league's top men's basketball teams.

Florida State is one of just three teams, joining Gonzaga and Michigan, that has advanced to the Sweet 16 in each of the last three NCAA Tournaments. The No. 20 Seminoles will feature a mix of veterans, transfers and freshmen to help them reach the tournament for a fifth straight time.

"We've been fortunate for the last couple of years, when we've had guys move on, I think we've in some ways gotten better each year," Hamilton said. "The culture of our team, the ability of our guys to stay focused and accept the roles and the system and the style of ball that we play."

"We have some guys ready to step up and replace the guys that played so well for us last year that have moved on."

Florida State has stability in leaders like guard Anthony Polite and forward Malik Osborne to help bring along transfers Caleb Mills (Houston) and Cam'Ron Fletcher (Kentucky). The Seminoles landed five-star guard Jalen Warley as well as four-star guard/forward Matthew Cleveland.

The Seminoles will need time to build chemistry but the height, length and athleticism is undeniable. Florida State has four 7-footers on their.

"That has been probably the strength of our program — we've been able to always seem to develop guys and allow them to continue to keep improving and step into roles and keep our program at a significant position in basketball," Hamilton said.

Florida State has produced six NBA first-round draft picks since 2016. Among those are five-star recruits like Scottie Barnes and Patrick Williams, who both played one year in Tallahassee, as well as diamonds in the rough like Devin Vassell and Mfondu Kabengele.

Florida State, which once struggled to win a handful of ACC games, has averaged 24.8 wins over the last five seasons. They appear poised to make a run at another league title.

## AREA TO ADDRESS

Florida State is seeking options at point guard with Barnes now in the NBA. The option is likely a combination of seniors RayQuan Evans and Polite, although it will be tough to deny Warley playing time if his defense is up to what Hamilton expects.

Warley, a McDonald's All-American, averaged 15.6 points and 7.0 assists in his senior season at Norristown Westtown School in Pennsylvania.

## NEW ARRIVALS

Hamilton said who starts doesn't matter as he often plays a deep rotation, and the Seminoles will lean on a large group of newcomers.

Mills could see significant minutes after averaging 12.8 points at Houston. Fletcher didn't play much at Kentucky but will be looked to provide defense and rebounding.

Cleveland averaged 22.8 points at Pace Academy in Alpharetta, Georgia.

## HOME RUN

Florida State has won 25 straight ACC home games, which is the second longest streak in league history. Duke (26) set the league record in the 1997-2000 seasons.

The Seminoles open the ACC schedule against Syracuse on Dec. 4, and they could break the mark on Jan. 8 against Louisville.

## 11-OVERTIME

Florida State has tied a national record with 11 straight overtime wins, a streak that dates to Jan. 13, 2018.

## THE SCHEDULE

Florida State will face some early road tests, playing Florida on Nov. 14 and No. 7 Purdue on Nov. 30. The Seminoles will also play host to No. 9 Duke on Jan. 17, at No. 19 North Carolina on Feb. 12 and at No. 25 Virginia on Feb. 26.

## 'Canes hoping transfers can make impact

CORAL GABLES — Miami's new point guard is playing for his fourth different team. He's the shortest guy on the roster, yet is known for his toughness, and was immediately asked to be a leader on his new squad.

In Miami Heat terms, that describes Kyle Lowry. In Miami Hurricanes terms, that describes Charlie Moore.

The Hurricanes' hopes this season might hinge in large part on Moore, a 5-foot-11 guard who has already started games for California, Kansas and DePaul in his college career and now has signed with Miami — his fourth school, in his fourth different major conference. No player on the Miami roster has scored more college points than Moore, one of six Hurricanes newcomers this season.

"We've both been to a lot of places," Miami guard Kameron McGusty said. "He's been in and played in two different conferences. He's played in three conferences, actually; this will be his third."

Not quite. This will be his fourth. Moore has already been in the Pac-12, the Big 12 and the Big East. Now, he's taking a shot at the Atlantic Coast Conference, where he and McGusty — who transferred from Oklahoma in 2018 — will be among four sixth-year seniors on the Hurricanes' roster.

"We just try to use our knowledge that we've gained throughout our six years and use all the things that we've seen from different teams and different conferences and just help our team prepare and try to help our young guys get on track so they're ready to help us contribute this year," McGusty said.

Miami went 10-17 overall and 4-15 in the ACC last season, the Hurricanes' third consecutive year finishing below .500 in both categories. That followed a three-year run of NCAA Tournament appearances for the Hurricanes, one that tied the longest such stretch in school history.

But with three starters back, plus talented new arrivals like Moore, Miami expects improvement. Leading scorer Isaiah Wong (17.1 ppg last season) returns, along with McGusty (13.3) and Anthony Walker (9.6). Moore and fellow transfer Jordan Miller (13.0 ppg in 69 games at George Mason) are among the new faces that will be asked to help from the first tip-off of the season.

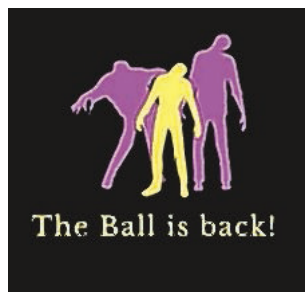
"We had a couple of kids transfer out, so we recruited a couple of transfers ourselves," Miami coach Jim Larranaga said. At least the early travel won't be too daunting, with 13 of Miami's first 15 games to be played in Florida. The Hurricanes' Dec. 1 game at Penn State in the ACC-Big Ten challenge will have an emotional tie; Adam Fisher, entering his first season as Penn State's associate head coach, went back to his alma mater after coaching the last eight seasons at Miami.

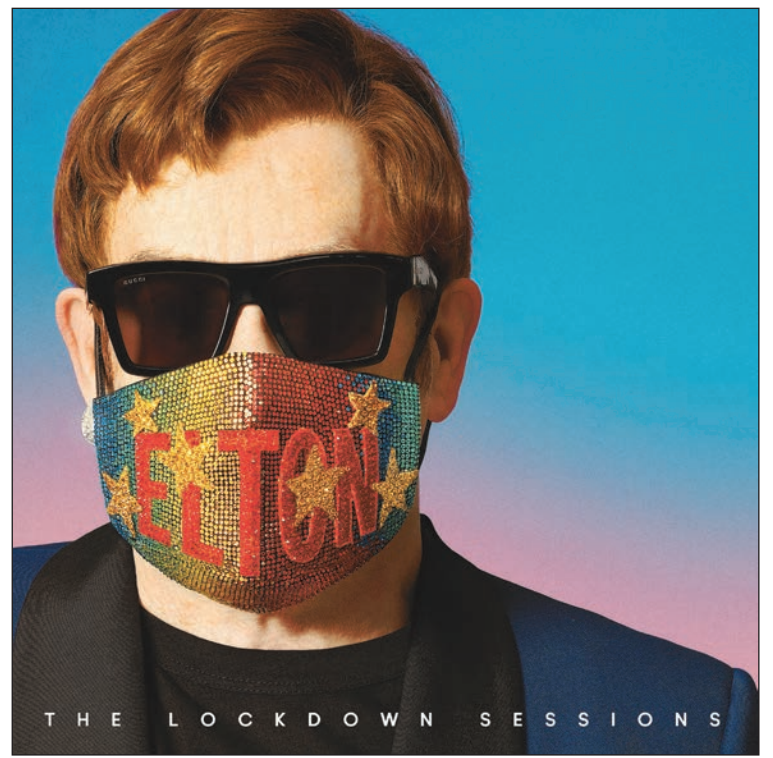

Annie offers advice

Dear Annie: Under what circumstances is it OK to cancel your plans with one friend in order to spend time with someone else?



DEAR ANNIE

I have a friend who repeatedly cancels her plans with me if she suddenly gets an invitation from someone who is higher status/more socially prominent. I've tried to talk to her about this, but she feels I am being too sensitive and that it's best to "keep things loose,"

with the understanding that both parties are free to opt out if something else comes up. The frequent cancellations make me feel like I'm her "backup friend," with whom she only spends time if she doesn't get a better offer. What do you advise? —Blown Off

Dear Blown Off: If a friend makes you feel like a backup, she is no friend at all. Even the term "backup friend" is an oxymoron; there's no such thing!

Once you commit to plans, you should honor that commitment. That doesn't mean there's no room for flexibility — we're all busy, after all — but a pattern of blowing you off for "higher status" company is unkind and unfair.

I would firmly tell this "friend" that you honor your word after making plans with someone and that you expect her to do the same. If she continues to blow you off, she's probably not even worth penciling in.

Dear Annie: I am turning 38 this year. I'm a father of two with a third due in November — this time, a girl.

What are the strengths and weaknesses of your bridge game? Most players count winners; many also tally losers; experts track high-card points; and champions in addition calculate the opponents' hand distributions. Luckily, though, that last capability is rarely needed.

high-card points. Remember what the declarer or the defenders have shown during the auction and have produced as the play proceeds.

You would think that this would be a strength of the robots at Bridge Base Online, but watch how this deal panned out.

In the auction, North's two-club response as a passed hand was Drury, showing three or more spades and a maximum pass. The robot's jump to game was optimistic.

West led the diamond ace and shifted to a low club. East won with his king and returned a club to his partner's ace. West shifted to a low heart, dummy's eight winning the trick.

Declarer, needing the rest, had to find the spade queen.

Taking that suit in isolation, you should cash the king and finesse twice (if necessary) through East. However, the robot played low to his ace and ran the jack through West, going down one when East produced the queen. Mathematically that was inferior, but why was South wrong on this deal specifically?

West had already shown 11 points. (East would have covered dummy's heart eight at trick four if he could have.) With the spade queen, West would have opened the bidding.

If something is niggling you about the defense, tune in tomorrow.
