County probes land clearing

Parcel of land had been site of RV resort proposal rejected earlier this year

The county's code compliance division has issued a notice of violation against a developer who has been clearing some land without a permit on an 85-acre parcel on

Citrus Avenue north of Crystal River.

A hearing date is set for 9 a.m. Dec. 15 in Room 166 of the Lecanto Government Center, 3600 W. Sovereign Path.

Scott McKinney, director of Citrus County Code Compliance, said a code officer walked the

property Wednesday and saw what he believed to be "under-brushing," where brush is removed rather than scraping the land down to the bare dirt beneath it. Underbrush clearing usually involves mowing and mulching equipment.

That kind of work is

legal, McKinney said.

The December hearing is to account for the work done prior to the notice being issued and any other removal of trees exceeding 4 inches in diameter.

McKinney said the county cannot issue "stop work" orders and the

property owner will be held responsible for the violation, especially if it continues.

This is the same property that made the news last June when a developer applied for a zoning change on the

Developers hope to gauge interest in non-traditional housing option

Affordable, manageable and sturdy.

Shipping container houses are breaking ground in Citrus County, and their builders want to know how much interest prospective homeowners have in the vogue housing concept.

"We have the resources to make somebody's dream of a container house hopefully come true," Darren Nichter, cofounder of Citrus Container Park LLC, said. "Have an open mind; we want their honest feedback."

Citrus Container Park,

out of Lecanto, built a model container home on the future site of its Citrus Container Village development at 2714 E. Dawson Drive, west of Inverness and behind the Lowe's and Walmart shopping plazas along State Road 44.

A dozen, same-sized lots will make up the container community at buildout, permitted as single-family homes.

"We plan on building 12 more so we hope this one's at least popular," Citrus Container Park cofounder Rodney Worthington said, referring to the model home. "We have three more

Pine Hill Cemetery meeting sparks concerns

A local community expressed its disappointment over the state of Citrus County's Pine Hill Cemetery in southern Inverness, but its voice wasn't heard as well as it had hoped.

Between 30 and 40 people attended a town-hall-style event the evening of Wednesday, Nov. 3, at the Valerie Theatre to start brainstorming improvements for what's considered to be the oldest African American burial ground in the county.

However, participants and their host, Inverness

native Dr. Devonte White, pointed out how no county officials were present to listen.

"The whole point was for them to hear the

community's sentiments ... our concerns regarding the cemetery," White told those in attendance. "This is not going to be last time they hear from us; I

promise you that, I promise you that."

"You may just be whistling in the wind," resident Randolph Bellamy added. "Unless we follow up on it, we'll be meeting again with nothing done. ... Their interest is not as much as ours."

White said he'll work to schedule another meeting before the year is up.

"I'll do everything in my power that they hear from us, and that they show up," he said, "because you can't run from us; we mean business."

It's White's goal to collect suggestions from Pine Hill's stakeholders on how to bring the county's 1.8-acre cemetery up to

the same aesthetic standard as the 22-acre, Inverness-owned Oak Ridge Cemetery surrounding it.

Afterward, White will draft a petition to present to county commissioners for action.

"The county has to answer the questions and concerns we actually have," he said. "They won't know until we actually tell them."

White, a professor of criminal justice, decided to organize Wednesday's meeting a few months ago, after noticing

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

Judge ends shooting case

With adjudication

and probation

sentence for teens

While Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard “Ric” Howard wasn’t punishing Zoey Ellan Andersen, Jason Byron Simms Jr. and Joseph Shane Finn for fatally shooting Sandra Ryder, the judge wanted to let them know they were still to blame.

“One of three of you killed that woman, and yet there’s nobody individually criminally responsible,” Howard said during the teens’ sentencing Thursday, Nov. 4. “You don’t know who did it, and that’s a burden you’ll have to carry for the rest of your lives.”

At the end of the court hearing, Howard adjudicated the teens guilty of their misdemeanor charge of possessing a firearm as a minor, and ordered them to serve juvenile probation until they completed the conditions.

To finish and abide by their respective probations, the teens have to do 100 hours of community service, write an apology letter, go to counseling, attend school, take

random drug screens, not possess any weapons or firearms, and have no contact with each other.

Howard also opted to keep the teens from serving up to three days in a juvenile detention facility because they had already spent 21 days behind bars following their arrests, and ordered for the firearms in question to be remain in the custody of the sheriff’s office.

“It would make me happy if they were melted down into hockey pucks,” the judge said.

In the early afternoon of Nov. 21, 2018, 58-year-old Ryder was fatally shot outside her house on the 6100 block of West Wayward Wind Loop in Homosassa.

In connection to Ryder’s death, the Citrus County Sheriff’s Office in April 2019 arrested Andersen, then 13, Finn and Simms, both 14.

Prosecutors later charged the teens with manslaughter and shooting firearms as minors.

At the end of a three-day bench trial on Sept. 1, Howard acquitted Andersen, Simms and Finn of Ryder’s manslaughter.

Howard did convict the teens of unlawfully firing a 12-gauge shotgun and .30-caliber rifle around the same time a bullet fatally struck Ryder in her head almost 400 yards away across a field.

Ryder at the time was helping her husband of 39 years, John

Ryder, with chores outside.

John Ryder, who attended the trial, was not present during the sentencing.

“I hope none of you know the pain of that man’s loss,” Howard told the teens Thursday.

John Ryder didn’t see the bullet strike his wife. Deputies and the Medical Examiner’s Office were also unable to recover a firearm projectile from either shooting scene or Ryder’s body.

Witnesses living in the neighborhood, including John Ryder, pointed authorities to a source of gunfire, where deputies later found spent ammunition in a woodline between Andersen’s home off of West Country Club Drive and a field bordering Ryder’s home to the south.

Investigators were able to match the ammo casings with the shotgun and rifle the teens admitted to shooting.

During the trial, prosecutors Blake Shore and Kevin Davis argued the teens were the only ones shooting guns in the area.

Charlie Vaughn, Bill Grant and Assistant Public Defender Ed Spaight — the respective lawyers for Andersen, Simms and Finn — said nothing connected their clients to firing the fatal round.

Defense attorneys argued there were discrepancies in witness testimonies over where the gunfire

was coming from, claimed there was no line of sight, and criticized investigators for discounting exculpatory evidence the moment the teens became their prime suspects.

None of the teens testified during their shared trial.

Howard didn’t explain his verdict when he announced it, but the judge emphasized how a reasonable doubt — the standard for a criminal conviction — is not a possible, speculative, imaginary or forced doubt.

Shore asked Howard at Thursday’s sentencing to adjudicate the teens guilty of their misdemeanor charge, to impress upon them the severity of their actions.

Shore said the teens took the firearms from the bedroom of Andersen’s father while he was working, fired the guns multiple times unsupervised, and had little regard for Ryder’s shooting death when authorities told them about it.

“My focus is,” the prosecutor said, “is on their demeanor.”

Vaughn, Grant and Spaight said their clients don’t deserve a conviction or more time in behind bars in detention because they’re either back in school or employed, and have been remorseful.

“I honestly hope,” the judge told the teens, “this the last time I see the three of you in court.”

BH man resists arrest;

adds to warrant problems

A Beverly Hills man already facing battery and robbery charges now faces more after a run-in with Citrus County Sheriff’s Office deputies.

The circumstances that led to the arrest of Maurice Atavion Carte Newson, 19, began on Tuesday, Nov. 2, when two deputies were surveilling the home in the 10 block of East Golden Street in Beverly Hills.

That’s when one of the deputies saw Newson leave the home and walk toward the mailbox to check the mail, according to the arrest report.

The deputy recognized Newson and knew there was a warrant for his arrest stemming from robbery and battery charges.

According to records, one of the two deputies approached Newson at the home’s front door and handcuffed him. That’s when Newson began screaming for his mother to come out of the house.

The arresting deputy reported that he tried to explain to the mother that there was an arrest warrant for her son. According to records, the deputy reported that both were screaming at him and demanding to see a copy of the warrant. The deputy called for back-up for help in getting Newson to his patrol car: his mother was holding Newson around his neck and refusing to let him go.

The second deputy arrived and the mother released her son, according to records.

But that wasn’t the end of it.

The arresting deputy reported that Newson continued to scream at the two

deputies, and still warning that there would be retribution for his arrest. The deputy reported that Newson also used racial slurs against the two deputies.

Newson also spit in the face of the second deputy, according to records.

The arresting deputy told Newson to get in his patrol car, but Newson refused, according to records. The deputy warned him that unless he complied he would use his Taser. Newson complied, in part.

According to the deputy, Newson sat in the patrol car but hung his legs outside the door and left his feet on the ground. According to records, the deputy warned Newson several times that he would Taser him unless he put his legs in the car. Newson refused and the deputy Tasered Newson in the leg for three seconds. Newson complied.

Once fully inside the car, Newson repeatedly kicked one of the doors so frequently and hard that several areas of the door broke and the deputy could no longer open that door, according to records.

On the way to the jail, once again Newson warned the deputy there would be consequences for the use of the Taser and that he would start a riot in the jail, according to records.

Once at the Citrus County jail, the staff told him to place his legs out of the car so they could put on restraints. Instead, Newson got out of the car and made a run for it, but was stopped by jail staff, according to records.

In addition to his battery and robbery charges, deputies charged the Beverly Hills man with criminal mischief with \$1,000 or more in damage, resisting a law enforcement officer with violence, and battery on a law enforcement officer.

His new bond was set at \$12,000.

Woman arrested

for child neglect

Left toddler in

yard with dogs

A Citrus Springs woman was taken into custody for allegedly leaving a toddler unattended in her front yard with aggressive dogs.

Citrus County Sheriff’s Office deputies arrested 26-year-old Marissa Nicole Penn the afternoon of Saturday, Oct. 30, under a charge of child neglect without great bodily harm.

According to Penn’s arrest report, obtained Thursday, Deputy Tommy McGill responded to Penn’s home off of West Autumn Place to a report of child endangerment.

When McGill arrived, the deputy spotted the complainant — a neighbor — standing on the opposite end of Penn’s driveway.

McGill also noticed a 2-year-old boy playing in the dirt next to the road, and three large dogs barking and acting aggressive toward the neighbor, preventing him from walking toward the deputy.

According to Penn’s arrest report, McGill tried to reach the child, but the three dogs ran over to him

and tried to bite the deputy several times. McGill brandished his Taser and baton to distract the canines, allowing the neighbor to reach the child, who was unharmed.

McGill noticed the front door of Penn’s house was open, and he yelled for someone to get their dogs, but was unsuccessful.

After several minutes, the dogs ran back inside the home. McGill followed and shut the front door behind them. Penn then opened the door to the deputy, who described Penn as being either half-awake or possibly under the influence.

Penn’s neighbor told McGill he was mowing his grass when he spotted the child alone in the front yard alongside three dogs running in and out of the house. He said he honked a horn to try to alert someone inside the home.

According to the arrest report, the neighbor also recorded the child crossing the road several times.

Penn told McGill in a Mirandized statement she was asleep because she had been sick for the past few days, adding the child was supposed to be with her.

According to her arrest report, Penn said the child figured out how to unlock doors, and this wasn’t the first time he got outside by himself.

Penn posted bail on a \$2,000 bond, according to court records, and will be arraigned on her third-degree felony Nov. 15. If convicted, Penn faces up to five years in prison.

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Homosassa man accused of stealing motorcycle

A Homosassa man initially facing a possible trespassing charge now is in more serious trouble and facing grand theft charges.

Arresting Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies first encountered Steven Charles Winburn, 37, Monday, Nov. 1, when they were dispatched to South Canna Lily Avenue in Homosassa for a trespassing complaint.

The deputy reported that when he arrived, Winburn said he would leave the property and drive away on the same motorcycle that he used to arrive.

According to records, the motorcycle was a 2020 Harley-Davidson, model XL 1200X Sportster48.

The deputy reported that the motorcycle was worth \$12,000.

According to records, the license plate was pushed up against the side of the motorcycle with bags hanging over the plate.

The arresting deputy asked Winburn who the motorcycle belonged to and Winburn would only reply that he had gotten it from a friend named Leroy, according to records.

The deputy reported that when he ran the motorcycle's information through the sheriff's office database, it showed the motorcycle was stolen.

The deputy told Winburn he was under arrest and when the deputy tried to handcuff Winburn, Winburn tried to run away, according to records. The

deputy managed to grab one of his arms and another deputy on scene grabbed the other arm.

The deputy also reported that when he arrived at the jail, he heard the sound of glass against the back seat, according to records.

The deputy reported seeing a glass bubble pipe in Winburn's left hand when getting out of the patrol car. The deputy had Winburn go down on his knees and drop the pipe, according to records.

The deputy reported that type of pipe was commonly used to smoke methamphetamine. After the pipe hit the ground, Winburn said "What is that?" according to records.

The deputy charged Winburn with resisting arrest without violence, theft of a vehicle and possession of drug paraphernalia. His bond was \$4,000.

differences in care between Pine Hill and Oak Ridge.

Founded in 1890 near the corner of Hill Street and Line Avenue, Pine Hill Cemetery has 322 known gravesites.

Alfred Tompkins, the founder of Inverness, was granted a land permit in 1889 to establish the neighboring Oak Ridge Cemetery, which was deeded for the burial of white people only. Inverness took ownership of Oak Ridge in 1981.

For many years, funeral home director Eli White and others living nearby maintained Pine Hill until the 1980s, when it was determined the county was responsible for the cemetery.

Several local residents spoke out during White's open discussion, airing gripes over how Pine Hill has been neglected.

Janetta Perry said she does her best to tidy her family's graves, but she finds herself helpless for others buried nearby who either don't have relatives or the county to do the same for them.

"I feel so bad," she said. "I don't want to get in trouble trying to go over here and clean this spot."

Solutions for Pine Hill included putting up more entrance and directional signage, and paving the sole dirt pathway bisecting the cemetery.

Mimi Clark said a water source should be installed in Pine Hill, farther down its hill, to make it easier for people to pressure wash or hose down dirty headstones.

Theresa Evans, White's mom, said more has to be done to stop people from using Pine Hill as something other than a place to respect the dead.

Evans said flowers have been stolen from graves, people walk their dogs in the cemetery without picking up after their pets, and motorists park and trespass there at night.

"Nobody's been patrolling that area," she said. "It's dark. What are you doing at a cemetery?"

Volunteer members of the Citrus Garden Club have cleaned Pine Hill four times a year since 2001.

Garden club officers Sandra Hume and Lesly Smith said Wednesday the overhanging branches and trees should be trimmed to curb how much falls on the ground after a storm.

They invited the town

hall to the garden club's next cleanup for Pine Hill, which starts at 9 a.m. Nov. 10 by the cemetery's blue entrance sign located at the end of a paved road off of South Line Avenue.

"I don't know what's going on," Hume said, taking note of Pine Hill's conditions, "but, personally, I would like to see our community ... out there."

Many asked why a northern portion of Pine Hill hadn't been mowed for some time in September. They said they prodded both Inverness and the county for action, resulting in county staff cutting the grass the day before a funeral happened.

"You had weeds up to your waist," Bellamy said.

"Will the county keep mowing it?" asked Richard Murphy, who used to work on the cemetery. "Or what's going to happen?"

Inverness City Manager Eric Williams replied the county opted not to mow that section of Pine Hill because its surveyors, "unbeknownst to the city," staked it.

"That created a great differential and great divide between these two cemeteries," he said. "They clearly understand they need to be taking care of that again."

County spokeswoman Veronica Kampschroer told the Chronicle on Thursday the stakes were put in as a result of survey the county requested in July.

"The purpose of the survey was to establish the existing boundaries of the Pine Hill Cemetery property," she said, "in response to a citizen inquiry about maintenance of the cemetery."

Kampschroer said the stakes are still in place, "and while it was determined that the cemetery has expanded beyond the

boundaries of county property, the county will continue mowing the entire Pine Hill Cemetery."

Resident Willie White said Wednesday that Inverness should just take over Pine Hill.

"The city mowing another acre? I don't think it's going to be that much time difference," he said.

Williams said "the city would be more than willing to consider anybody's opportunity for us to combine things," but noted the county still has an obligation to Pine Hill.

Kampschroer said the county's grounds maintenance section budgets \$2,500 out of the general fund to cover the regular and incidental maintenance of Pine Hill.

Inverness pays roughly \$52,000 a year for Oak Ridge to be mowed and cleared of fallen vegetation.

Williams said the funding source is a perpetual care trust fund the city set up as part of Oak Ridge's license with the Florida Department of Financial Services.

Inverness fuels its cemetery's care fund with at least 10% of each burial plot sale, which is \$1,995 for one casket or two cremations, or \$1,595 for a cremation plot.

Kampschroer said the county does not authorize or charge for burials.

White said the county should want "to compete" with Inverness on how Pine Hill looks compared to the city's cemetery.

"It's not just Pine Hill; it's in other communities within Citrus County," he said. "This is just the beginning."

lots cleared right now.”
For more information about Citrus Container Park and its container homes, call 352-302-6116 or visit facebook.com/citruscontainerpark.
According to Citrus County, Crystal River and Inverness, no other permitted container homes exist but there is interest to build them.
Crystal River city staff has been meeting with a developer applying to build one off of Northeast Eighth Avenue.
“We conveyed our standards,” the city’s planning and development director Brian Herrmann said, “and I believe that they will be proceeding.”
Nichter and Worthington said they and their other business partner, Dr. Paresh Desai, pursued their container home project to help give homebuyers an inexpensive yet aesthetic and efficient option to choose from.
“Look at the housing marking; nobody can afford to buy a house anymore,” Worthington said. “We’re hoping to get the people who are making \$14 an hour; they’re getting left behind in every city.”
“We’re starting to see a trend where people don’t really need a 3,500-square-foot house with three bathrooms,” Nichter added.
Made from two shipping containers, the Container Park’s 720-square-foot model house accommodates a porch, two bedrooms, one and a half bathrooms, a living room, dining area, kitchen with full-size appliances and space for a stackable washer and dryer.
Not much of the siding was cut out, except a handful of window frames and ports for utilities, like

air-conditioning.
“We didn’t want to take a whole ton of the panels out — the metal sides,” Nichter said, “because the more you take out, the more steel you got to put in again to strengthen it back up again because that is the strength of the container is the siding of it.”
Container home architects have gone wild with their blueprints.
“You can get as creative as your engineer and metal worker can do it,” Nichter said. “You can get really imaginative.”
While a container home is smaller and almost prefabricated, building one can still fall subject to the readiness of the construction industry and availability of licensed subcontractors.
If everything’s contracted out, it could take roughly six months to construct a container home similar in size to Citrus Container Park’s model home, Nichter and Worthington said.
Citrus Container Park builds with watertight shipping containers, which have been deemed too out-of-shape for precise stacking aboard a commercial vessel.
“They’ve just made too many trips,” Worthington said.
Worried about a container home and its steel frame being at the mercy of outside temperatures? Its walls are fully insulated with spray foam, which also acts as a vapor barrier.
Just on the ground, without being being bolted and welded down to a concrete foundation to be a house, a shipping container can also withstand strong, hurricane-force winds.
“It’s almost comparable to single-wide,” Worthington said, “but a single-wide blows right over.”
Nichter and Worthington said it’s tough to know a container home’s market

value when there isn’t a similar residence type elsewhere in the county to compare to.
“Every Realtor we’ve talked to said, ‘you can’t compare it against a house but it’s also not a mobile; you can’t pick it up and move it,’” Nichter said.
As a starting point, Citrus Container Park will list its model home — furnished with granite countertops, wood cabinets and waterproof vinyl — for

\$139,900 and see how offers come in.
“We went higher-end on a lot of it,” Nichter said. “We think it finished out nicely, and we’ll just see what people’s opinions are by their offers and what they think of it; we’ll get a lot of feedback.”
For Citrus Container Park, it’s about creating an opportunity for potential homeowners who are priced out of a normal-size home but don’t want to live

in a trailer.
“People just think they should buy the normal, 3/2 house,” Worthington said. “You’re at \$250,000.”
“It gives them an ability to own a home they can call theirs without having it get blown away in the storm,” Nichter added. “It opens up the door for affordability; if the housing market keeps up, they’re not going to be able to afford a house for who knows when.”

Securing land for a park is right choice

County talks of Pirates Cove has sparked a feud in the community and between commissioners. The waterfront property in Crystal River spans 3.6 acres at the west end of Ozello trail. The property boasts 750 feet of water frontage and borders an existing parkland boat ramp. In 1993, the no-name storm destroyed the restaurant and motel that once sat on the property grounds until it was completely demolished in 2010. The owner of the property died in 2019 and his heirs seek to sell the property.

County commissioner Jeff Kinnard has supported pursuing a purchase of the property at the right price. The location and proximity to the park make this property appealing for citizens to enjoy the waterfront. Commissioners Holly Davis and Ruthie Schlabach also returned a vote to support the pursuit of the property. Ozello residents attending the commission meeting are also in favor of the property becoming a county park.

County Commissioner Ron Kitchen Jr. on the other hand said he won’t support the purchase of a future park with tax dollars. Kitchen feels the county is taking on too many projects and there

are higher priorities like paving roads. Kitchen does not think Citrus County needs more parks and instead suggested a deal much like the one in 2017 where the board supported private citizens to secure funding to buy property along the Homosassa River for a park. Carnahan also opposed the vote last Tuesday.

This is not the first time the county has considered purchasing this property and the opportunity may not come about again. While staff has been directed to negotiate the purchase price for the park the commission needs to look for grants and other opportunities to fund a passive park at Pirates Cove. For those worried about the maintenance cost, a passive park means the property would have fewer structured recreational activities, which require little or no specialized parkland development and management. Developing and maintaining parks has an important role in our community development. Pirates Cove should be secured as an oasis for citizens and visitors alike to enjoy the beauty of our nature coast and there is funding opportunities out there to do it.

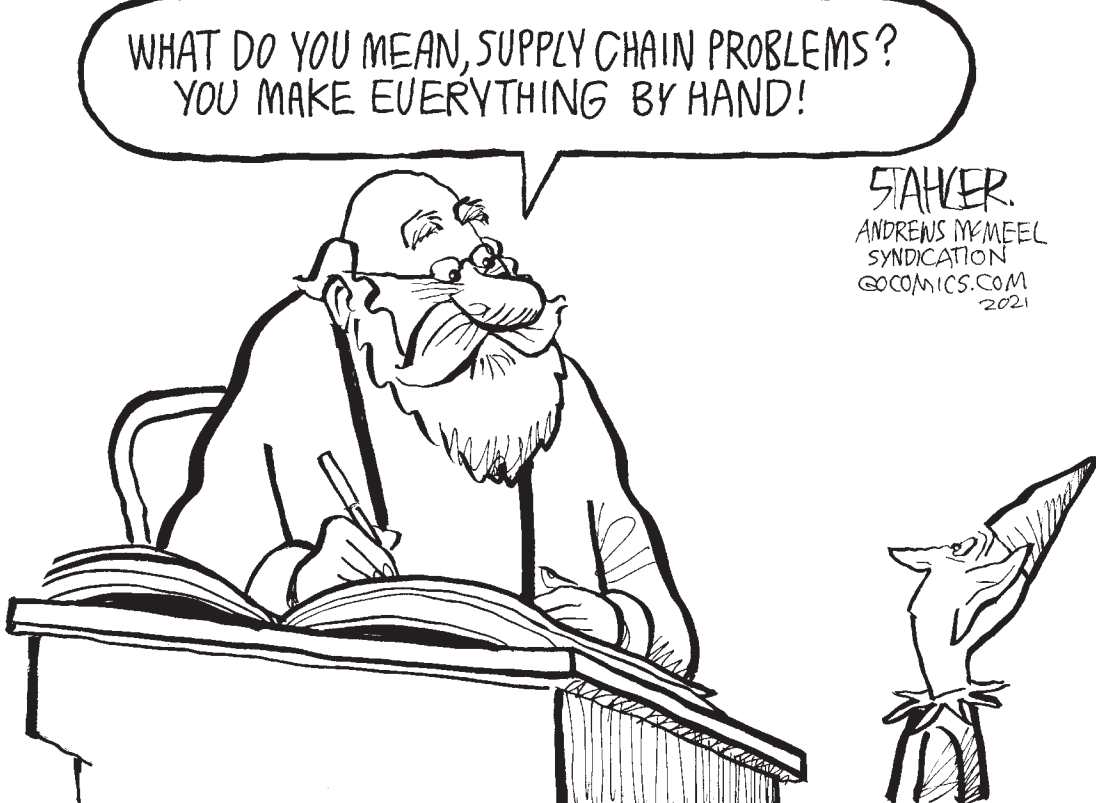
Animal abusers will abuse people

Citrus won’t attract major retailers

It is still my opinion that Citrus County will not attract major retailers or other commercial enterprises to the area of the Cardinal Street interchange or anywhere else in the county. The reasons will be found in the statistics.

First, the total land area of Citrus County is 30% greater than the total land area of Hernando County. But the population of Citrus is 30% less than the population of Hernando County. A simple calculation establishes that the population density is 70% greater in Hernando. This means there are more people and more households in any local area of similar size.

Next, the average total household income is about the same in both counties. Also, the actual number of people believed to be at or below poverty level is about the same.

When these facts are applied to the different total population levels, it is clear that Hernando County has 30% more households with income above the poverty level. The people in these households are likely to have more disposable income.

This combination of population density, together with the number of people with appropriate levels of income, is a significant factor for businesses that rely on selling to

I definitely want to follow the science. Today I get my booster shot!

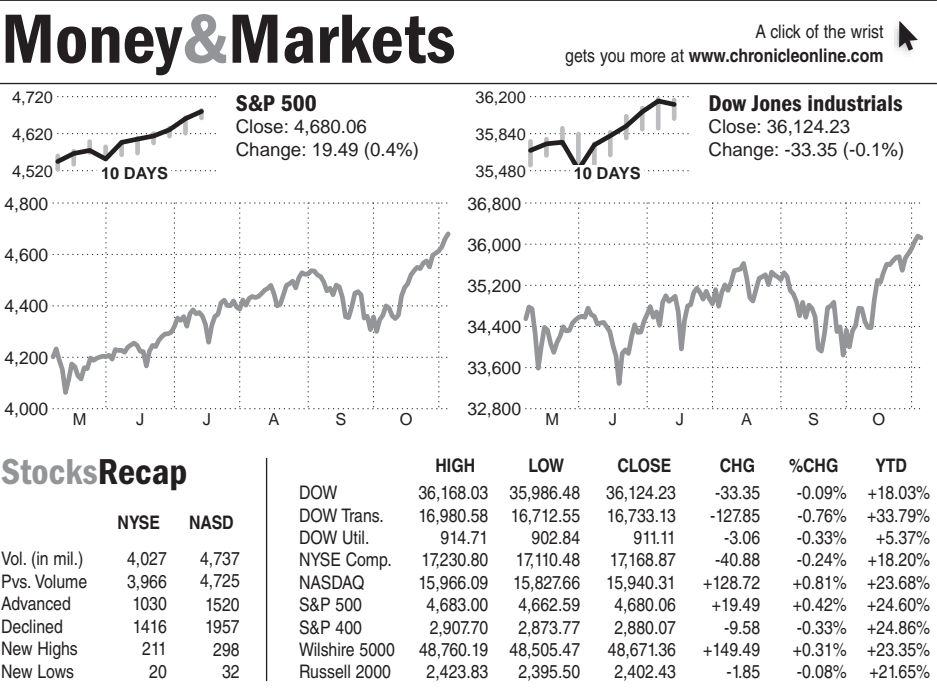

property in hopes of building Crystal River Luxury RV Resort. That resort would have included up to 600 RV pads, pool, golf cart rentals, bar and grill, a basketball court and walking trails. Neighbors opposed the resort, saying it was not consistent with the neighborhood, which is heavily wooded and bordered on three sides by

residential streets. The Citrus County Planning and Development Commission (PDC) unanimously rejected the request. All this is déjà vu for Robert Hathorn, whose home off Tom Mason Drive is right next to the current land-clearing. It looks as if five or six acres have already been cleared, he said. For what purpose? Nobody, including the county, knows. Efforts to reach the company whose name was on the notice of violation — IDLETUESDAY LLC —

were unsuccessful. “My neighbors and I fear this belligerent group will have the entire 85 acres leveled by that time and will simply pay the fine,” Hathorn said. 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Business vaccine rules start Jan. 4

Large firms must require vaccines or testing

Tens of millions of Americans who work at companies with 100 or more employees will need to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 by Jan. 4 or get tested for the virus weekly under government rules issued Thursday.

The new requirements are the Biden administration's boldest move yet to persuade reluctant Americans to finally get a vaccine that has been widely available for months — or face financial consequences. If successful, administration officials believe it will go a long way toward ending a pandemic that has killed more than 750,000 Americans.

First previewed by President Joe Biden in September, the requirements will apply to about 84 million workers at medium and large businesses, although it is not clear how

many of those employees are unvaccinated.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration regulations will force the companies to require that unvaccinated workers test negative for COVID-19 at least once a week and wear a mask while in the workplace.

OSHA left open the possibility of expanding the requirement to smaller businesses. It asked for public comment on whether employers with fewer than 100 employees could handle vaccination or testing programs.

Tougher rules will apply to another 17 million people working in nursing homes, hospitals and other facilities that receive money from Medicare and Medicaid. Those workers will not have an option for testing — they will need to be vaccinated.

Workers will be able to ask for exemptions on medical

or religious grounds.

The requirements will not apply to people who work at home or outdoors.

Biden framed the issue as a simple choice between getting more people vaccinated or prolonging the pandemic.

"While I would have much preferred that requirements not become necessary, too many people remain unvaccinated for us to get out of this pandemic for good," he said Thursday in a statement.

Biden said his encouragement for businesses to impose mandates and his own previous requirements for the military and federal contractors have helped reduce the number of unvaccinated Americans over 12 from 100 million in late July to about 60 million now.

OSHA said companies that fail to comply with the regulations could face penalties of nearly \$14,000 per violation.

Analyst in Trump-Russia probe charged with lying

WASHINGTON — A Russian analyst who contributed to a dossier of Democratic-funded research into ties between Russia and Donald Trump was arrested Thursday on charges of lying to the FBI about his sources of information, among them a longtime supporter of Hillary Clinton.

The case against Igor Danchenko is part of special counsel John Durham's ongoing investigation into the origins of the FBI's probe into whether Trump's 2016 campaign and Russia had conspired to tip the outcome of that year's presidential campaign.

The indictment, the third criminal case brought by Durham and the second in a two-month span, is likely to boost complaints from Trump allies that well-connected Democrats worked behind the scenes to advance suspicions about Trump and Russia that contributed to the FBI's election-year investigation.

The case does not undercut investigators' findings that the Kremlin aided the Trump campaign — conclusions that were not based on the dossier. But the indictment does endorse a longstanding concern about the Russia probe: that opposition research the FBI relied on as it surveilled a Trump campaign adviser was marred by unsupported,

uncorroborated claims.

The five-count indictment accuses Danchenko of making multiple false statements to the FBI when interviewed in 2017 about his role in collecting information for Christopher Steele, a former British spy whose research into ties between the Trump campaign and Russia was financed by Democrats.

Danchenko was a significant source for Steele as Steele compiled his dossier of research. That dossier, the target of intense derision from Trump, was ultimately provided to the FBI and used by federal authorities as they applied for and received surveillance warrants targeting former Trump campaign aide Carter Page.

Witness: Shooting victim threatened to kill Rittenhouse

KENOSHA, Wis. — The first man shot by Kyle Rittenhouse on the streets of Kenosha was "hyperaggressive" that night, threatened to kill Rittenhouse, and later lunged for his rifle just before the 17-year-old fired, witnesses testified Thursday.

The testimony at Rittenhouse's murder trial came from two witnesses who had been called to the stand by the prosecution but gave accounts often more favorable to the defense in the politically polarizing case.

Rittenhouse, now 18, is charged with shooting three men, two of them fatally, in the summer of 2020. The aspiring police officer had gone to Kenosha with an AR-style semi-automatic rifle and a medical kit in what he said was an effort to safeguard property from violent protests that broke out over the police shooting of a Black man.

Ryan Balch, a former Army infantryman who carried an AR-style rifle that night and walked around patrolling the streets with Rittenhouse, testified that Rosenbaum was "hyperaggressive and acting out in a violent manner," including trying to set fires and throwing rocks.

Balch said he got between Rosenbaum and another man while Rosenbaum was trying to start a fire, and Rosenbaum got angry, shouting, "If I catch any of you guys alone tonight I'm going to f--- kill you!"

Biden bill on brink of House votes, but fighting drags

WASHINGTON — Democrats in the House appear on the verge of securing President Joe Biden's now-\$1.85 trillion-and-growing domestic policy package alongside a companion \$1 trillion infrastructure bill in what would be a dramatic political accomplishment — if they can push it to passage.

The House prepared late Thursday for votes now likely on Friday, and White House officials worked the phones to lock in support for the president's signature proposal. House passage of the

big bill would be a crucial step, sending to the Senate Biden's ambitious effort to expand health care, child care and other social services for countless Americans and deliver the nation's biggest investment yet fighting climate change.

Alongside the slimmer roads-bridges-and-broadband package, it adds up to Biden's answer to his campaign promise to rebuild the country from the COVID-19 crisis and confront a changing economy.

But they're not there yet.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi was working furiously Thursday and kept the House late to shore up the votes. The party has been here before, another politically messy day like many before that are being blamed for the Democrats' dismal showing in this week's elections. On and off Capitol Hill, party leaders declared it's time for Congress to deliver on Biden's agenda.

New grand jury seated as Trump probe continues

NEW YORK — New York prosecutors investigating former President Donald Trump's business dealings have convened a new grand jury to hear evidence in the probe as the previous panel's term was set to run out, a person familiar with the matter told The Associated Press Thursday.

The development comes as the Manhattan district attorney's office is weighing whether to seek more indictments in a case that has already resulted in tax fraud charges against Trump's company, the Trump Organization, and its longtime CFO Allen Weisselberg.

Trump himself remains under investigation after District Attorney Cyrus Vance Jr. led a multiyear fight to get access to the Republican's tax records.

The person was not authorized to speak publicly and did so on condition of anonymity. The news of the new grand jury was first reported by The Washington Post.

The Manhattan DA's office declined comment. A message seeking comment was left with a Trump Organization lawyer.

WHO: Europe pandemic epicenter despite vaccines

GENEVA — Top officials at the World Health Organization said Thursday that Europe has seen a more than 50% jump in coronavirus cases in the last month, making it the epicenter of the pandemic despite an ample supply of vaccines.

"There may be plenty of vaccine available, but uptake of vaccine has not been equal," WHO emergencies chief Dr. Michael Ryan said during a press briefing on Thursday.

He called for European authorities to "close the gap" in vaccinations. However, WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said countries that have immunized more than 40% of their populations should stop and instead donate their doses to developing countries that have yet to offer their citizens a first dose.

"No more boosters should be administered except to immuno-compromised people," Tedros said.

Iran marks 1979 takeover of US Embassy

TEHRAN, Iran — Thousands of Iranians gathered on Tehran streets Thursday for the anniversary of the 1979 seizure of the U.S. Embassy, chanting "Death to America" and "Death to Israel," and burning American and Israeli flags. The embassy takeover triggered a 444-day hostage crisis and break in diplomatic relations that continues to this day.

The government-organized commemoration, long a venue for voicing anti-Western sentiment, typically draws angry crowds each year. Last year, authorities canceled the event due to the still-raging coronavirus pandemic but on Thursday, state TV said that 800 cities across Iran staged demonstrations.

Protesters hoisted an effigy of President Joe Biden wearing a T-shirt emblazoned with the Star of David, drops of red paint dripping from its mouth.

Seven Rivers falls in finale to Bishop Snyder

Warriors blow 18-3 lead in second half

LECANTO — A season of great progress for Seven Rivers Christian didn't have the feel-good ending the Warriors would have liked to carry into the offseason.

Seven Rivers hosted Bishop Snyder on Thursday night at Warrior Park in a matchup of teams reeling from the disappointment of being knocked out of the Sunshine State Athletic Conference playoffs last week.

The Warriors seemed in prime position to finish 6-0 at their home park, building an 18-3 advantage early in the third quarter. But a pair of recovered onside kicks allowed the Cardinals to dominate time of possession in the second half and rally for a 23-18 victory.

"They had a great game plan. Keep our offense off the field is a pretty darn good game plan for them and they did a good job. (Bishop Snyder head coach) Travis (Markoski) is a good coach," Seven Rivers

head coach Monty Vann said. "They milked the clock the way they needed to and they got first downs when they needed to."

It was one last opportunity to take a bow in front of the home crowd for the seniors, but two key ones were missing. Mario Aguilera suffered a fractured heel in practice two days earlier, leaving the team without its leading receiver, a top defensive back and placekicker.

Also, lineman Jon Gill sat out after being ejected from the previous game.

"If we have Mario I think that's a different game because he helps us defensively, as well," Vann said. "It's one of those deals where you go with who you got. And not having Jon Gill hurt us that game, too. ... We were down with the wrong people at the wrong time."

Another senior, Alex Eden, certainly stepped up. After catching eight passes for 186 yards and five touchdowns six days earlier in a playoff loss at Eagle's View, Eden hauled in seven receptions for 145 yards and reached the end zone three times.

"It's sad. I obviously don't want to graduate. We'd love to continue playing for this

Citrus junior Jenkins seeks first medal at state swim meet

Drew Jenkins feels as good as he has all season, at the most opportune time.

The Citrus High junior is the county's lone representative at Friday's Class 2A FHSAA Swimming and Diving State Championships, held at Sailfish Splash Waterpark and Aquatics Center in Stuart. He hopes he won't return home empty-handed.

Jenkins made it to states for the second year in a row, having automatically qualified with his first regional title in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:02.79) and a runner-up finish in the 100 butterfly (54.25).

"It's all going good. I've practiced every day up until the meet. It's a big taper, just getting ready," Jenkins said. "I'm the most confident I've ever felt

going into a swim meet before.

"A lot of it is coming from winning up to this point and it's a big boost in self-esteem. I've never placed this well before. It feels a lot better going in automatically. Also I'm adding weight training to my workouts. I'm feeling a lot stronger this year."

Jenkins is seeded 12th in both of his races, so he'll likely have to shave some time to get into medal contention, which means placing top 8 in prelims and advancing to the championship final.

"My main goal is medal in one event, specifically the 100 breaststroke," Jenkins said. "I feel like I have more time to drop in that event, whereas the fly I've already dropped a lot up to this point. Breaststroke, I have a lot more to give in that event."

A year ago in his first trip to states, he was 21st in the 200 IM (2:04.15). But he

was "bummed I didn't do the 100 fly" after he realized his time would have qualified. So he decided to rectify that this season, and opted not to do the IM because the events are too close together.

That decision has paid dividends, as has the incorporation of weight training into his preparation.

"I reached a point where my technique was not going to get better," Jenkins said. "The only way I can get better is getting stronger and have more endurance."

Much of that went out the window, though, at the very beginning of the season when he came down with COVID-19. He was forced to take a two-week break — an eternity of downtime for an experienced swimmer — and he missed the season-opening meet against Lecanto.

Black trainer taking aim at title

Brings modest filly into Breeder's Cup

DEL MAR, Calif. — California Angel has already beaten the odds before she even runs in the Breeders' Cup. The 2-year-old filly cost just \$5,500, a drop in the bucket compared to her blue-blooded rivals. She earned her way into the world championships with a late-running victory at 17-1 odds.

Her trainer, George Leonard III, is believed to be the first Black conditioner with a horse in the Breeders' Cup.

California Angel, by way of Indiana, takes on 13 rivals in the \$1 million Juvenile Fillies Turf, one of five races Friday that kick off Breeders' Cup weekend at Del Mar, the seaside track north of San Diego.

"I realize it's phenomenal even being here," said Leonard, a Louisiana native who has a 19-horse stable.

Indiana Grand is supporting its hometown filly by offering the first 200 fans in attendance on Friday a \$20 win wager on her. Owner Chris Walsh is from Columbus, Indiana.

Walsh has already turned down several offers to buy California Angel, a daughter of 2014 Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner California Chrome. Her name was inspired by her sire as well as Leonard's habit of calling the filly "Angel."

"I have the best horse I've ever touched," he said. "We think we don't really know her full potential yet."

California Angel charged from 12th place to win the Grade 2 Jessamine last month at Keeneland, Leonard's first time in a

The son of a trainer, he struck out in 1991 and opened his own stable. Unlike most of the high-profile trainers and deep-pocketed owners at the Breeders' Cup, Leonard stocks his stalls with claimers, horses he buys out of races featuring modest purses.

"You got to love it, because there's plenty other things you can do to make a lot more money," he said of his chosen profession. "I always feel I never work a day in my life when I do what I enjoy."

Pizza Bianca, owned and bred by celebrity chef Bobby Flay, is the early 5-1 favorite in the Juvenile Fillies Turf.

California Angel, at 8-1 odds,

drew the far outside post in the field of 14.

"I have lots of confidence in my horse," Leonard said.

His wife and stablehand, Isabel, said, "We always come to win. I never pay attention to the odds."

Friday's card is topped by the \$2 million Juvenile, whose winner is tabbed as the horse to watch heading into next year's Kentucky Derby. The early favorite is 9-5 shot Jack Christopher, trained by Chad Brown and ridden by Jose Ortiz. The undefeated colt drew the rail in the 12-horse field.

"I didn't really want to be there," Brown said. "Hopefully, he breaks clean and gets out there. We'll leave it up to Jose to see if he just lets him roll along

or we just play it by ear if someone is hellbent on having the lead."

Embattled trainer Bob Baffert has three entries: 5-2 Corniche, 8-1 Pinehurst and 10-1 Barossa. Baffert is being allowed to compete after he agreed to increased security and testing standards for his eight horses. The Hall of Famer has had five positive drug tests in his stable in the last year.

Baffert is seeking a record fifth victory in the Juvenile.

"The could be hot, especially with Jack Christopher breaking from the rail," Baffert said. "These are all good horses. It's why there's a championship at stake. The margin for victory is so small. It's so tough to win these races."

Todd Pletcher will saddle 5-1 shot Commandperformance and 20-1 shot Double Thunder.

Friday's races all featuring 2-year-olds are a prelude to another nine on Saturday, culminating in the \$6 million Classic where Knicks Go is the 5-2 early favorite for trainer Brad Cox. The top horses from the U.S., Europe and Japan will be running for more than \$31 million in purses over both days.

Larson seeks to cap comeback

With NASCAR championship

PHOENIX — Kyle Larson has heard that mental toughness is required to win a championship. He has no idea if that's true — and if it is required, well, then he doesn't consider himself the championship favorite this weekend.

Toughness, Larson said, makes him think of veteran driver Kevin Harvick. And when he thinks about mental toughness, Larson points to Tony Stewart and the 2011 news conference where Stewart trash-talked Carl Edwards right out of the title.

But Larson? Tough? He's 5-foot-6 and 135 pounds. When asked what weapon he'd choose in a zombie apocalypse, Larson said he'd take his orders from fellow drivers Chase Elliott, Ryan Blaney and Corey LaJoie. He'd let them be in charge.

"People tell me all the time you have to be mentally tough to win the championship, and I feel like enough people hype it up to where you have to act different come playoff time," Larson said. "But I'm not a tough guy. So I don't know how to be tough. I don't know what I'm 'supposed' to be doing."

He is doing just fine.

The 29-year-old Larson has been deemed a future NASCAR champion his entire career. He came to the series as a 19-year-old sprint car sensation, and those who know such things said Larson was even better than both Jeff Gordon and Stewart, a pair of drivers who started on dirt and are now NASCAR Hall of Famers.

He didn't disappoint upon his 2012 arrival, but his Chip Ganassi Racing equipment was rarely fast enough. Larson tallied an underperforming six wins with Ganassi.

Still, he was a highly desired free agent at the end of the 2020 season and Larson likely could have named his price with a new team — right up until he used a racial slur while racing online early in the pandemic. NASCAR suspended him for the season, Ganassi had to fire him to placate angry sponsors and Larson wasn't sure if he'd ever be back.

But here he is, headed into Sunday's race in Arizona in the comeback of all comebacks. He is the star driver of Hendrick Motorsports, the winningest team in NASCAR that hired him out of his banishment a year ago, and the favorite to close out his nine-win season with a championship.

On the track he's been virtually unbeatable. He also has turned sponsor HendrickCars.com into one of the hottest car-buying sites around. His contract was extended through 2023.

Larson, in his seventh full Cup season, is Hendrick's new guy.

Asked if Larson has done everything

he expected when he gave him the No. 5 Chevrolet for a second chance in NASCAR, Hendrick said: "More. Much more than I would anticipate him doing."

"He's been the front of our whole program for feeding people. I don't know any driver out there as busy as that guy is, that spends as much time trying to do good for other people," Hendrick said. "If you just look at his track record, what he's accomplished this year, going and visiting food banks, schools, giving money away, just trying to be a model citizen ... He did that on his own."

Larson spent his season of exile mostly back in the sprint car world, traveling the country in a motorhome with his wife and two children, jumping from track to track, car to car, wherever the show was in town. He very publicly won 46 races.

Larson says he was naive, not racist, when he said the "n word" in April 2020. And he was OK if the consequence for not knowing any better meant the end of his promising NASCAR career.

"Until it happened, I didn't really think that I was ever going to make it back to the Cup Series and nothing looked too promising," Larson said. "I accepted it. I was having the time of my life racing, sprint cars and midgets and then dirt late models. I was doing stuff that I always wanted to do — maybe didn't think I'd be doing it at 28 years old — but I did accept it."

He is now the driver so many predicted he was going to be. He twice this season put together three-race win streak and was the driver the day Hendrick Motorsports passed Petty Enterprises as the winningest team in NASCAR.

Larson won four times in the playoffs and his win two weeks ago at Kansas made him the only one of the four championship drivers to win his spot in the finale.

He can't really explain why everything clicks at Hendrick, where he was given the final crew to work with retired seven-time champion Jimmie Johnson. Larson also believes it is best that way, that crew chief Cliff Daniels can learn more from looking at data than he can from his driver.

Steve Letarte, former crew chief for Gordon and Dale Earnhardt Jr. and now an analyst for NBC Sports, believes Larson staying out of Daniels' way has been the key.

"Kyle self-admittedly doesn't understand the setups of a Cup car. He just gets in the car and drives it as fast as it can be driven or to whatever level Cliff expects him to operate it," Letarte said. "They have a very impressive working relationship."

The duo needs to click again on Sunday, where Larson must beat Elliott, Hamlin and Martin Truex Jr. in the winner-take-all finale. Elliott and Truex are former champions, Hamlin is 0 for 4 in title chances and this is Larson's first attempt.

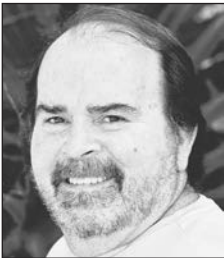
Larson said he doesn't know how he will feel if he doesn't close his comeback year with a championship.

"It's hard for me to think if people will really remember if you don't win the championship. You can read into that adding pressure that I want to win the championship even more to cap off what's been a great season," Larson said. "So that's my goal. And I hope we can finish it off and be mentioned as one of the top-five greatest seasons ever."

Weather a relief to fish, fishermen

The cooler weather that has swept into the area has been a welcome relief to both fish and fishermen, as recent reports show.

Out of Captain's Cove in Inglis, Andrew Fagan reports there are a lot of redfish stacked in the river and at the hot water discharge. Sheepshead can also be found on the river inhabiting rock piles, while both grouper and mangrove snapper can also be caught in these same areas as well as offshore. Shrimp has been the bait of choice for Sheepshead.

MacRaes' Capt. Erica Toney reported that "the big fish are moving in and the gag grouper have been just slamming them."

Use 5/0 to 7/0 sized circle hooks using sardines and threadfin for bait.

Blewater Bait and Tackle said there are trout to be caught in the mouth of the river by the boundary stakes by using shrimp fished under a cork. Light-colored plastics are producing fish as well. For redfish, try cut pinfish or mullet, and don't forget to try the true and tested favorite, a gold spoon. Grouper are being found in both shallow and deeper waters with Spanish and threadfin baits leading the way.

Capt. William Toney said he has found plenty of trout by fishing small grass patches that seem to be holding fish. "Set up a drift and make several passes," Toney said. "The trout are hiding in there."

Redfish can be found south of Homosassa on the incoming tide using a shrimp floated under a cork. Toney reports that if you are north, use cut pinfish or mullet. Offshore, the gag bite has been very good using live pins in 18 to 25 feet of water. Eating sized mangrove snappers are in 35-foot waters biting live shrimp the best.

On the freshwater scene, 44 Tackle Company reports that "Speckled perch are starting to school in area lakes," said Chris King. "Use a small jighead and tip it with a minnow."

Bass are eating blue, green and pumpkin colored worms or creature baits, along with shiners producing catches as well.

Spaniard Adri Arnaus was in second place after a 65. Malaysian Gavin Green was third after 66.

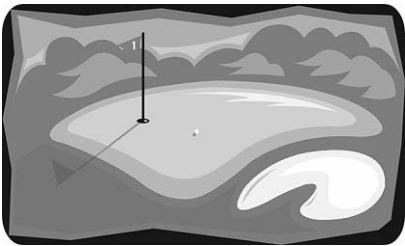
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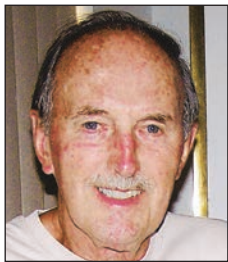

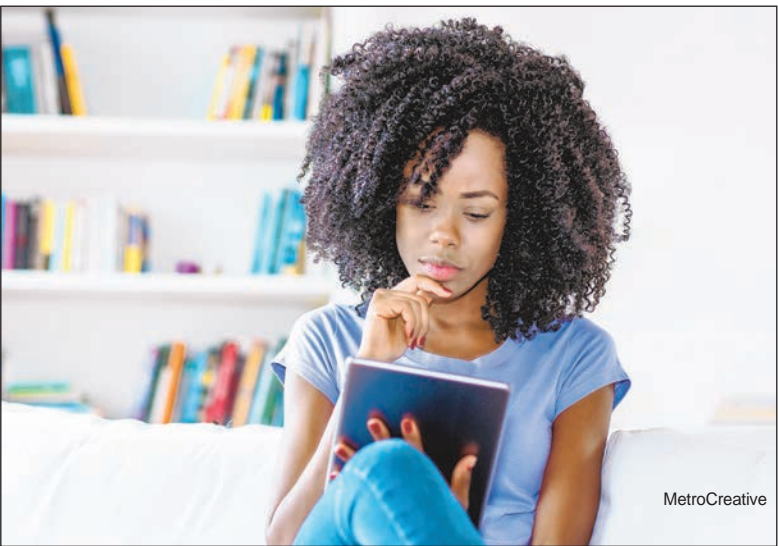

Fla. Highwaymen set art show

The Florida Highwaymen are a phenomenon of the 1950s. The originating member of the group, Alfred Hair, was an excellent artist, the student of a white man. But, unlike his white mentor, he wasn't allowed to sell his paintings in a gallery or art store because of his race.

So, he banded together with several other black artists, 26 in all, to sell their artwork along the side of the road, usually getting about \$25 apiece.

In 1990, there was a resurgence in interest about "outsider art" created by artists outside of mainstream society. Their popularity skyrocketed in 1995 after they were featured in a New York Times article and two books. The 26 original Florida Highwaymen were inducted into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame in 2006. There are now only 9 of the original 26 left.

On the weekend of Nov. 13 and 14, Paint the Town Citrus will host a show of the Florida Highwaymen's original artwork. Three of the original members will be appearing — Al Black, Issac Knight and Curtis Annett. R.L. Lewis' work will be presented by his son.

Annie offers advice

I have stopped arguing with him about it and have told him I'm preparing myself to become a widow with children because he is not proactive with his health. He thinks I'm being mean and picking fights when I only care and want him to live a long and healthy life.

He only reacts or seeks help when something bad happens. I am completely the opposite and am raising my kids to be proactive with their health, as well. I don't know what else to do. Please help! And asking him to talk to a counselor or psychologist is like talking to the wall! — Widow in the Making

Dear Widow: At 56, your husband has so many beautiful moments and wonderful experiences to look forward to — birthdays, anniversaries, retirement, weddings, grandchildren — experiences that his parents unfortunately may not have seen due to their own health.

Instead of arguing or explaining your perspective, try to help him understand his own. The only way to take part in these milestones is to be here for them, and a reactive approach to personal health won't cut it.

We can't help people who don't want to help themselves, but the load often feels lighter when we shoulder it with someone else.

You're already teaching your kids how to take care of themselves; try to tackle healthier eating and regular exercise altogether as a family. Incorporating better habits little by little into everyday routines may help your husband realize how much better he feels when he takes care of himself and how much life he has left to live.

in an unbid major: You will get positive results from negative doubles. But what happens if you wish to make a penalty double?

Look at the West hand in today's diagram. With only North-South vulnerable, North passes, East opens one club, and South intervenes with one spade. What should West do?

He could invite game by jumping to two no-trump, or overbid slightly with three no-trump. But if East-West can beat one spade doubled by one trick, their plus 200 will outscore everyone making partscores. If the contract goes down two, plus 500 beats all nonvulnerable game scores.

To catch the opponent, West must pass now, trying to do it in tempo. East reopens with double, and West passes again, converting the takeout double into a penalty double.

West led the club ace (a diamond would have worked better) and played another club — gnash, South had the king.

Declarer led a spade to the eight and jack, getting the expected news. He continued with the club jack and discarded a heart loser. East took that trick and cashed two heart winners. She continued with her last high heart, ruffed and overruffed. West shifted to a diamond, and the defenders took three spades, two hearts, one diamond and two clubs for down two, plus 500.
