Citrus County COVID cases still going up
According to the Florida Department of Health, 17 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.
Two new deaths were reported, for a total of 399.
To date in the county, 9,756 people have tested positive (including 76 non-residents).
No new hospitalizations were reported, for a total of 640 hospitalized.

DOH-Citrus vaccine registration system open

DOH-Citrus' preregistration system to schedule COVID-19 vaccine appointments for individuals 65 and older and frontline health care workers is now available.
Individuals can now be added to a waiting list for vaccine appointments and be notified when appointments are available in Citrus County by visiting myvaccine.fl.gov or by calling 866-201-0442; TTY is 833-476-1036.
As part of the statewide preregistration system, each county has a designated number that individuals can call and pre-register with if they do not have internet access. Citrus County's designated number is 833-540-2058.
Vaccine supply remains limited and appointments may not be available for several weeks.
When calling, get the name of the operator and do not hang up until you receive confirmation the appointment has been made, including the date, time and location of the appointment.

Upgrades improving Crystal River Airport

Recognizing the Crystal River Airport is an economic driver and needs safety improvements, county commissioners Tuesday voted unanimously to fire off a resolution to state legislators and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to extend the runway.
Tuesday's vote comes at a time when the Citrus County Engineering Division is making several improvements at the airport, including a new beacon and new t-hangars to store planes.
The airport contributes an estimated \$5.37 million to the Crystal River economy from air traffic that affects local businesses and tourism, according to Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) data.
The existing landing strip is about 640 feet too short for many corporate and private jets to comfortably use. Ideally, a 5,000-foot runway is needed to provide an adequate safety margin for the aircraft to take off and land.
As it stands now, current air traffic may not meet the operational requirement of 500 jet operations annually, the county said.
How much runway an aircraft needs to take off or land is determined by a variety of factors,

Crystal River collects public input on proposal to have boat ramp in state park

Crystal River officials wanted to know what people had to say about replacing the city's boat ramp at the end of Northwest Third Avenue, and the public didn't disappoint.
Roughly 200 people showed the evening of Thursday, Feb. 25, to the city's informational open house at the George Washington Carver Community Center.
It was a two-hour chance for locals to learn about, question and critique the city's proposal to relocate the boat ramp to one of two locations within the Crystal River Preserve State Park.
Crystal River's consultant, Jones Edmunds, continued to compile responses from surveys filled out before and during Thursday's event, city spokeswoman Leslie Bollin said on Friday.
City staff said the "Third Avenue boat ramp" within the Dockside Shoppes plaza can't coexist with the King's Bay Riverwalk boardwalk, planned to run along the northern shores of Cedar Cove.



As a result of its King's Bay Riverwalk construction, Crystal River will close the popular, city-owned boat ramp in between Bird's Underwater Dive Center and Charlie's Fish House. The ramp offers access to King's Bay and points west to the Crystal River and Gulf of Mexico.

**Deadline to file
 homestead
 exemption today**

The deadline for filing homestead exemptions and classifications with the Citrus County Property Appraiser is Monday, March 1. Applications may be done online, in person, or mailed and postmarked no later than Monday, March 1.

For eligibility, a complete application with all supporting documentation is required. Property owners with an existing exemption or classification should have received an annual renewal postcard in January 2021. If no changes have occurred to the property exemption status (i.e., changes of ownership, mailing address, marital status, etc.), renewal is automatic.

A new application is required if you purchased a new home and vacated your homesteaded property, or made any changes in the title to your home. You may contact the Property Appraiser's office if you are unsure of the status of your homestead. Late filings will be considered for the 2022 tax roll. For good cause and upon request, late filings may be eligible for consideration at the discretion of the Property Appraiser.

Sheriff nabs repeat felons in drug bust

A pair of convicted felons, with lengthy criminal histories, found themselves in jail Thursday, Feb. 25, after a raid at their Beverly Hills residence.

Maurice Evans, 30, a nine-time convicted felon, was arrested and charged with one count of trafficking in heroin (approximately 54 grams), possession of a controlled substance (buprenorphine), rent/lease/own drug dwelling (with minor present) and possession of paraphernalia. His bond was set at \$63,000.

Fifth-four-year-old Clarence Bryant, 54, a 10-time convicted felon, was charged with possession of a controlled substance (cocaine); possession of a controlled

substance (heroin); rent/lease/own drug dwelling (with minor present); possession of paraphernalia; and, driving while license suspended (habitual offender). His bond was set at \$20,000.

According to a Citrus County Sheriff's Office news release issued late Friday, Feb. 26, detectives with the Tactical Impact Unit gathered intelligence and determined that Evans and Bryant, both of which occupied the residence, were heavily involved in illicit drug activity. Further investigation revealed that Evans was responsible

for \$10,000 worth of heroin being distributed on the streets of Citrus County every week.

During a search of the residence at 11 S. Desoto St., detectives discovered numerous items of paraphernalia consistent with illicit drug sales such as scales, measuring cups, plastic baggies, razor blades and multiple cell phones. Investigators also located a safe, which contained approximately 54 grams of heroin, 49 buprenorphine patches, along with \$7,300 in cash.

In 2017, detectives arrested

Evans' brother Joseph, in what was the agency's largest heroin bust at the time with 56 grams seized. Joseph Evans was sentenced to 33 years in the Florida Department of Corrections, the CCSO release stated.

"Our office is extremely grateful that the minor child who resides at this house was not present during this search warrant," Sheriff Mike Prendergast said.

"We are also thankful knowing the arrest of Evans and Bryant will result in the shutdown of a main supplier of heroin in Citrus County," Prendergast said. "If this is your family's business, the time to get out is now, we will show no mercy in our pursuit to arrest you in our efforts to save countless lives."

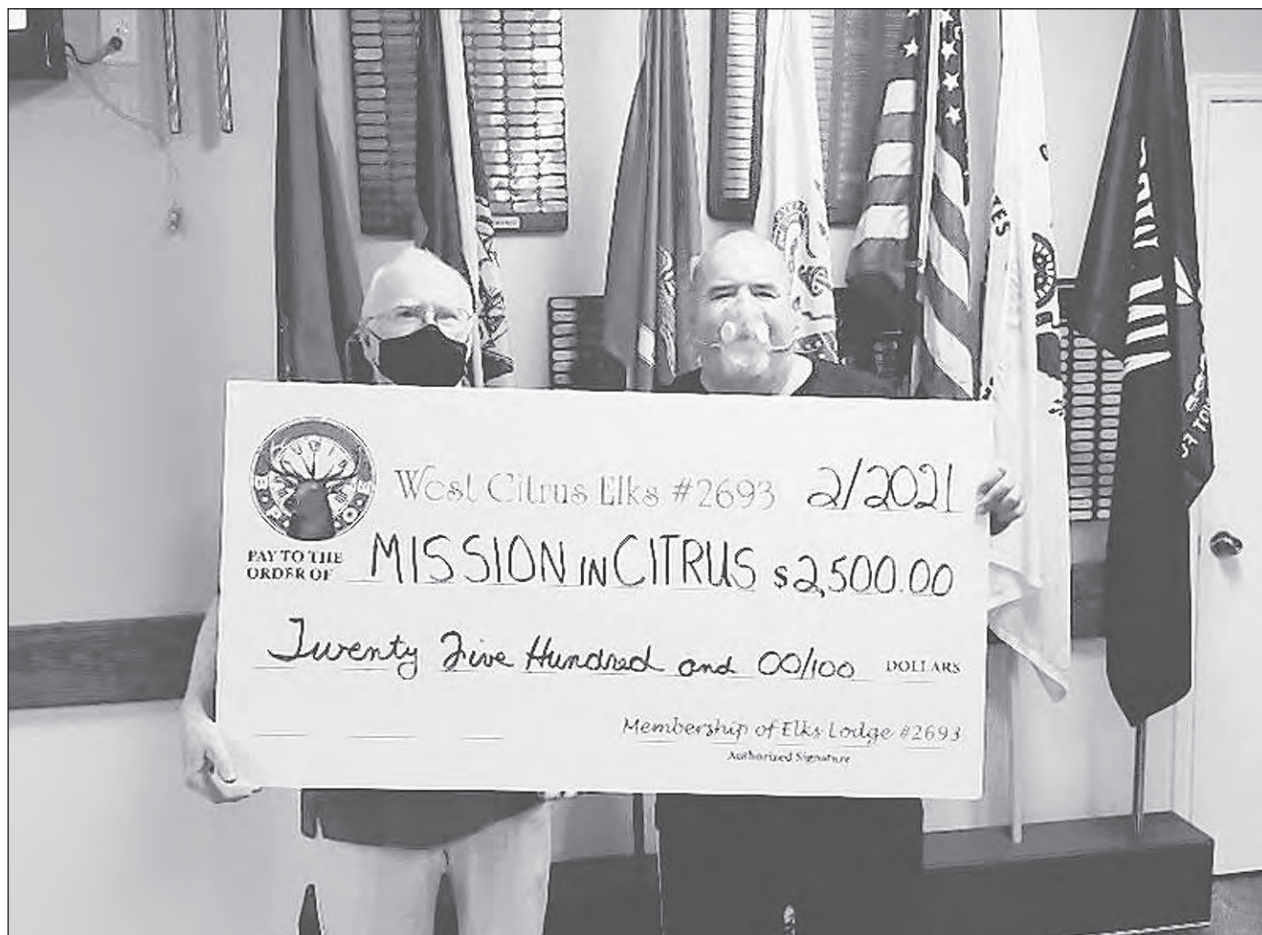

Man reportedly resists arrest, strikes deputy

A Floral City man faces charges of resisting arrest with violence, battery on a law enforcement officer, and resisting arrest without violence.

Citrus County Sheriff's deputies arrested Michael Leroy Waite, 60, Friday, Feb. 19, as they were trying to serve a

warrant for his arrest on a previous charge of unlawful interception of oral communication.

According to arrest report deputies and Waite had spoken by telephone and arranged to be at Waite's home so he could be arrested. When deputies arrived Waite was standing at a gate and one of the deputies reached through the gate

to grab Waite.

Waite pulled back, according to the report, causing the deputy to cut his hand and arm on barbed wire. Waite ran into his home. More deputies arrived, according to the arrest report. The deputies asked Waite to come out; he did only after deputies ordered several times.

When one of the deputies tried to handcuff Waite, he

tensed and struck the deputy in the face with his elbow, according to the arrest report.

Deputies took him to the ground and he again resisted, but this time without violence by keeping his hands under his chest.

He was eventually handcuffed and taken to the Citrus County jail. His bond was \$11,000.

New Orleans Museum of Art announces 3 big gifts in 1 month

NEW ORLEANS — The New Orleans Museum of Art has announced a major gift to its photography department — the third such announcement this month. Collectors Cherye R. and James F. Pierce have given the museum more than 260 important photographs, a news release Thursday said. They include a print of Robert Capa's "The Falling Soldier," taken in 1936 during the Spanish Civil War, and the 1932 photograph titled "Behind the Gare St. Lazare," which many consider Henri Cartier-Bresson's best work. Another print of that Cartier-Bresson photograph sold at a London auction in 2017 for £131,000 (about \$170,300), according to the Phillips Auctioneers website.

Others range from vintage prints by Ansel Adams to contemporary work by William Eggleston. There also are platinum prints by contemporary photographer Lois Conner by Frederick Evans, who was born in 1853 and retired in 1915 because platinum cost so much, and by Mexican photographer Manuel Alvarez-Bravo, from whom the Pierces commissioned work. "Cherye and Jim were pioneers in the collecting of photography," said Susan Taylor, the museum's director. "Their prescient decision to collect and their dedication to the medium will have a profound impact on the museum's ability to share a fuller history of photography with our public." The couple has promised

another 300 works in the future, the museum said. Earlier this month, the New Orleans Museum of Art announced a major fund and pledged endowment from Del and Ginger Hall of Chicago. The fund will support and augment photographic exhibitions and programs over the next five years.

The museum said the endowment will help provide a firm foundation for the department's activities from now on. "Del and Ginger's incredible generosity will help grow what is already one of NOMA's greatest strengths: our photography program," Taylor said Feb. 11. And on Feb. 4, it announced that radiologist and art collector Russell Albright had willed the museum nearly 400 works including more than 350 photographs. He also left a fund for the photography department. "His collection will serve as the core of contemporary

photography at NOMA and the accompanying endowment fund will ensure that his legacy at the museum will live on," Taylor said at the time. Although Albright died in 2017, his collection wasn't legally part of the museum and fully cataloged until 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic delayed the announcement. The museum cannot release the amount of individual gifts of money, but gifts made and pledged over the last few years will bring the department's endowments to \$2.5 million by 2023, museum spokeswoman Margaux Krane said in an email Wednesday.

The collections announced this month and more than 1,300 donated and pledged in 2018 by Tina Freeman, the museum's second photography curator, have brought the museum's photographic holdings to more than 15,000 works, she said.

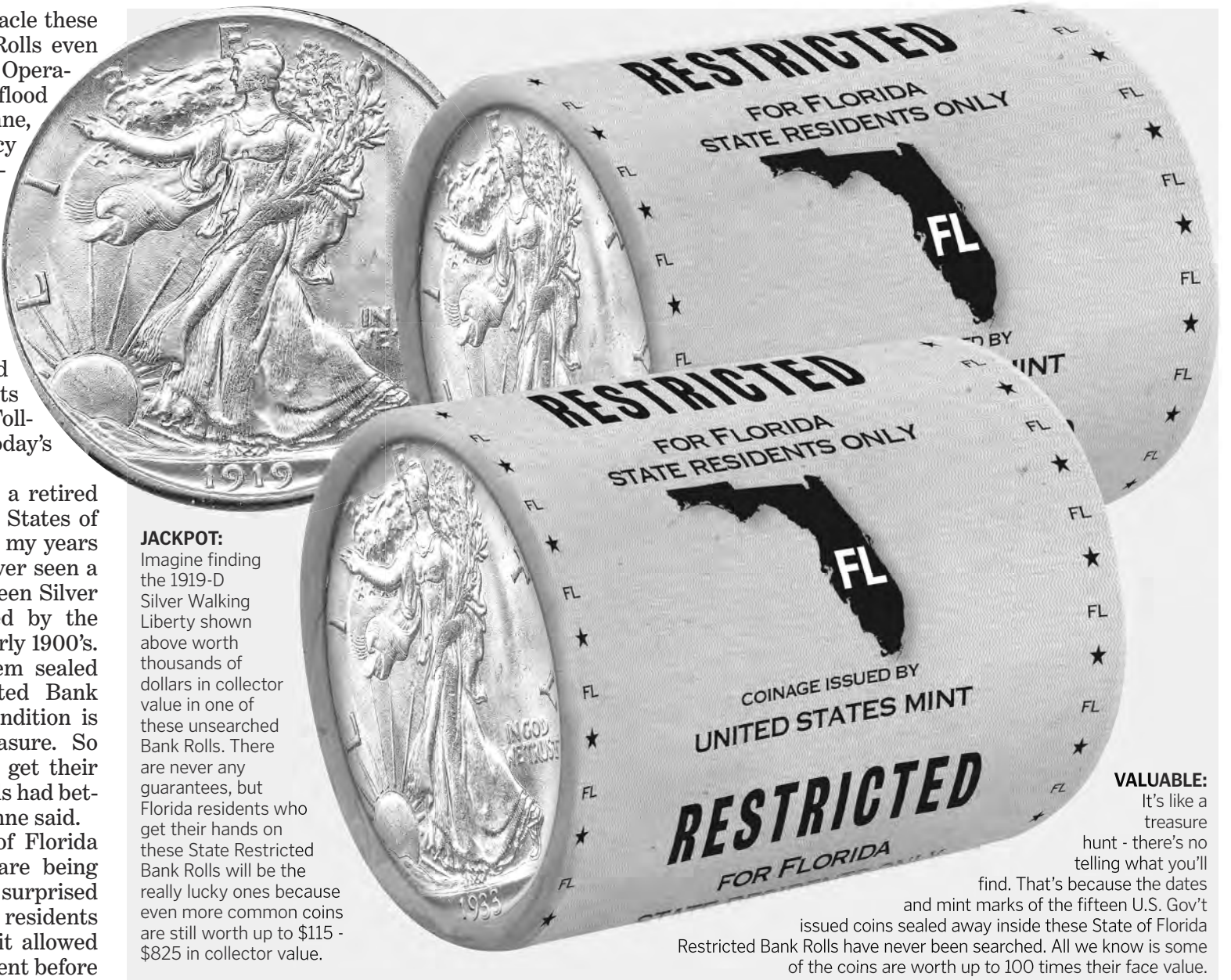

Some decisions better in local hands

Some of the staunchest Republicans we know are disgusted with Florida's elected, mostly Republican, leaders.

As we have heard over the years, they say that the government closest to the people is the best one to govern — yet our legislators have repeatedly attempted to wrest authority away from local government.

A bill going through the committee process now is a good example — it would preempt to the state the power to license home-based businesses. Both HB 403 and nearly identical companion SB 266 would create a new section in the Florida statutes (proposed 559.955).

The House bill says that a home-based business may not be “prohibited, restricted, regulated, or licensed in a manner that is different from other businesses in a local government's jurisdiction.”

The Senate bill states that the “licensure and regulation of home-based businesses is preempted to the state, and local governments may not enact or enforce any ordinance, regulation or policy or take any action to license or regulate a home-based business.”

This proposed legislation says, in effect, that the state knows better how to handle home-based businesses than the local government does. We strenuously disagree.

Such legislation could ruin the quiet enjoyment of your neighborhood. It essentially removes land planning, which determines what types of businesses are permitted in different areas, from local hands.

As the 1,000 Friends of

Florida advocacy organization maintains, it could allow “such businesses as funeral homes, boat repair shops, car stereo installation and others to operate in residential neighborhoods.”

It smacks of yet another state power play. As the Florida House staff analysis for this bill notes, the Florida Constitution grants local governments broad home rule authority.

Some local governments already have enacted ordinances regulating home-based businesses, including what types of business may be carried on at a residence or how much of a residence may be used as a business.

Florida law specifically grants local jurisdictions the right to regulate businesses relating to zoning and land use, and levy of local business taxes. However, Florida law preempts to the state the authority over, among other things, tobacco and nicotine products (thus the current fight to allow localities to ban smoking in their parks), and disposable plastic bags.

In 2019, when Gov. Ron DeSantis vetoed a bill that would have banned local regulation over disposable plastic straws, he said that the state “should simply allow local communities to address this issue through the political process. Citizens ... can seek recourse by electing people who share their views.”

This attempt at state preemption of home-based business regulation should be stopped. Let your legislators know that it's better left in local hands. But if such a bill lands on the governor's desk, he should veto it.

Looking for the purple martins

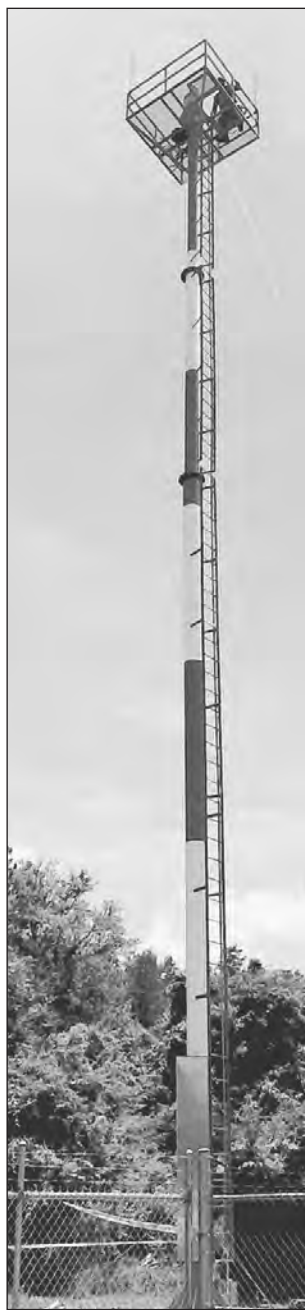

including payload — the heavier the plane, the more runway it needs.

Pilots are often limited now due to payload because they can't take as many passengers or cargo and may have to plan an extra fuel stop.

The airport's previous 50-foot beacon was obsolete, difficult to repair, and caused visibility issues for approaching aircraft. The new 75-foot-tall beacon was funded through a partnership between the FAA, FDOT and Citrus County.

Construction on 10 t-hangar units has started and should be completed by March 2021.

There is a significant need for hangars throughout the state to provide safe storage of aircraft, with 24 people on the waiting list for hangars, according to the county. This project is expected to bring in about \$41,000 in revenue per year to the county.

"It's not possible," City Manager Ken Frink said at Thursday's event.

After breaking ground later this year, the Riverwalk's second and final phase is expected to finish in March 2022.

With their boat ramp's fate determined, city staff searched for another location to build its replacement.

Staffers contacted the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP), which owns the 27,500-acre preserve, to ask about building a boat ramp within its park.

FDEP and city officials identified two possible sites: the Mullet Hole or the park's existing boat ramp at the end of North Sailboat Avenue.

Terri Lowery, managing director and senior vice president of Jones Edmunds, said it's not unusual to have different government entities sharing land.

FDEP leaders asked city staff to host a public meeting to gauge the community backing for replacing the ramp.

If there's enough local support and the FDEP OKs the location choice, Frink said, city staff will apply for grants to fund the new ramp's design and permitting.

Without an endorsement from the public and a resulting

approval from the state, Crystal River will lose its boat ramp.

If that happens, Frink said he and his staff will try to reassure FDEP a replacement boat ramp will give easier and safer access to the Crystal River and the Gulf of Mexico.

With the Third Avenue ramp, not only do boaters have to encroach on the private properties neighboring the ramp, they have to park on the other side of U.S. 19 afterward, before walking across the four-lane highway to launch their vessel.

"It's very dangerous," Frink said.



Lawrence Wilmer said he doesn't want to see the ramp go because it'll restrict access into the bay, including his, as someone who makes a living from the waters.

"I just hate losing a ramp," he said.

After hearing from city staff that an average of 3.5 boats launch daily from the boat ramp, Mike Engiles, echoed by other open house attendees, asked, "why bother moving it?"

At 27 launches, according to city staff, Labor Day weekend was the busiest day on record for the boat ramp, and an average of

10 vessels launch there on weekends.

Hernando resident Heather Nagy said Crystal River shouldn't be developing in the undisturbed habitats of the park, damaging the ecosystems of threatened animal and plant species.

"The middle name of the Crystal River Preserve State Park is 'preserve,'" she said, "and doing this is not preserving."

Jesse Buckley said a boat ramp at the Mullet Hole would disrupt those who fish the popular cove off of Sailboat Avenue and the Indian River Canal, which runs parallel to State Park Drive and many residential canals.

"They've been fishing there for generations," he said, "they're grandfathered in."

Husband and wife, Edward and Maureen Elder, who live in a condo off of State Park Drive, said having a boat ramp at the end of their neighborhood street would increase vehicle traffic, making it unsafe for the many who walk and cycle on State Park Drive.

There would have to be a sidewalk built along the roadway, which would also need to be improved to mitigate its regular flooding, Edward Elder said.

Frink said city staff expects a minimal increase in roadway traffic compared to what's there now.

Locals living in the Indian Waters subdivision by the state park suggested the city look at ramp

locations off of Fort Island Trail or by the Cross-Florida Barge Canal.

Frink said the areas of the state park in question are within city limits, and could provide boaters with faster access to the Gulf.

Frink said the Mullet Hole has enough upland space that can be developed.

However, he said, the park's existing boat ramp, which used to be a yacht club, is favored because the site already accommodates what the city is looking for.

If the old yacht club was chosen as its new boat ramp's location, the city would work with FDEP to redesign the ramp already there so boats aren't launched right into the river's current, Frink said.

Save the Manatee Club Executive Director Pat Rose told the Chronicle on Friday he supports the Riverwalk and sympathizes with the city's desire to replace its boat ramp.

Rose is concerned about how many of those boaters who'd launch from the state park would head back east toward King's Bay, increasing boat traffic and disrupting manatee movements.

He said he wants the city to know what the consequences of a new boat ramp could do, instead of just rushing into it to get grants.

"We need to not just jump at the first thing that comes along," he said. "I think we need to understand that."

establishes recurring funds for the purpose of conservation," Stewart said. "While Florida continues to grow, we must be mindful of the need to preserve the state's environment for the well-being and enjoyment of future generations."

The bills seek to establish an annual \$100 million base Florida Forever allocation, prohibit Land Acquisition Trust Fund money from being used to support direct, technology and information services by state agencies, and extend Florida Forever bonds by 14 years to 2054.

"With a thousand people moving to Florida every day, we must continue to acquire the necessary lands to meet our state's future environmental and recreational needs," Altman said.

Florida Forever is the nation's largest public land acquisition program with more than 870,000 acres purchased and conserved by the state since 2016.

Voters approved Florida Forever as Amendment 1 in 2014. The measure required the state set aside one-third of revenue from its documentary stamp tax to acquire conservation lands.

Florida Forever is funded by a 70-cents-per-\$100 documentary stamp excise tax levied on property deeds and a 35-cents-per-\$100 excise tax on promissory notes and other documents.

The fund accrues up to \$300 million annually but a provision in the state's General Appropriations Act allows lawmakers to

divert "unappropriated cash balances from specified trust funds" into the general fund to plug budget holes and provide tax relief.

Before voters approved the Florida Forever program, several state-financed conservation programs to boost Land Acquisition Trust Fund revenues preceded it. By 2015, the fund had collected more than \$740 million with only \$88 million surviving "budget sweeps" to be spent on conservation efforts.

The pattern of "budget sweeps" persisted even after Florida Forever was created. In 2016, the first year the fund accrued money, the Legislature shifted \$197 million of its \$237 million into the general fund; only \$50 million was spent on land acquisition.

In 2017, only \$15 million in Florida Forever money was spent to purchase land. In 2018, after lawmakers swept \$140 million from the fund, Leon County Judge Charles Dodson ordered the Legislature to spend Florida Forever money as intended and \$100 million was committed to land acquisition.

Gov. Ron DeSantis has expressed distaste for trust fund sweeps of Florida Forever and the Sadowski Affordable Housing Fund. He requested \$120 million for Florida Forever last year. Lawmakers approved \$100 million.

While his 'Florida Leads' budget proposal fully funds affordable housing at \$423 million, DeSantis requests only \$50 million for Florida Forever.

SB 1480, sponsored by Sen. Jason Brodeur, R-Sanford, and HB 1173, introduced by Rep. Rick Roth, R-West Palm Beach, also seek to extend Florida Forever bond capacity from 2040 to 2054.

Both filed on Feb. 19, neither bills call for a \$100 million Florida Forever floor and, as of Thursday afternoon, await committee assignments.

That annual allocation needs to be no less than \$100 million, Altman said.

"It's a huge need," he said. "The growth we're seeing in Florida now, and we'll continue to see, if we don't do this, we will not meet the recreational or conservation of the people of Florida. I think that's important not only for our quality of life but for our economic viability."

The state is now conducting engineering and design work on Phase 2 to continue the parkway another 3 miles to County Road 486, which was added to the state's plans in 2016 at the county's request because officials didn't want the road stopped at S.R. 44.

Construction on the extension is expected to start shortly after the U.S. 98-S.R. 44 leg is completed.

Starke said neither project phase is in jeopardy due to budgetary concerns.

"Suncoast Parkway 2 will directly link Citrus County with the Tampa Bay area," she said. "This project supports north-south regional travel, future traffic needs in Citrus County, and includes a multi-use recreational trail along its west side (and) will improve mobility, enhance safety, and facilitate hurricane evacuation."

FDOT has long used what is known as the five-year work program to map out projects.

In addition to the current-year impacts, the state agency faces a \$2.91 billion reduction in revenue over the next five years.

Starting at \$303.6 million in the current fiscal year, toll collections are expected to account for \$1.558 billion of the hit to revenue through the 2025-2026 fiscal year.

In the same time, the department is expected to be short another \$1.097 billion in revenue generated by gas taxes, rental car surcharges, and motor-vehicle license fees, according to projections.

Senate President Wilton Simpson wants to shift plans for one of three controversial toll-road projects, months after saying funding for the projects could be cut amid a state revenue shortfall.

The Tribly Republican said last week a proposed northern extension of the Suncoast Parkway could

be moved close to the route of U.S. 19, near the Gulf Coast, to lessen financial and environmental impacts and to bring the toll road closer to Tallahassee as it approaches Interstate 10.

"You could do it very similarly to the way we do in South Florida with (Interstate) 95 and the turnpike," Simpson said. "They could run parallel with each other. You've already got a footprint within that environmental concern. And you could do that, and then that would be probably the best outcome for the environment. It would certainly cut the project size and scope down to a more manageable size and scope."

Simpson said it doesn't

make sense to have the Suncoast Parkway end in Citrus County as it comes north out of the Tampa

area. Under a plan approved by the Legislature in 2019, the parkway would be extended north

to Jefferson County.

UN warns of mass famine in Yemen

CAIRO — A U.N. humanitarian agency on Sunday warned that more than 16 million people in Yemen would go hungry this year, with already some half a million people in the war-torn country living in famine-like conditions.

The U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, or OCHA, said the risk of large-scale famine in the Arab world's poorest country "has never been more acute," adding that the years-long conflict, economic decline, and institutional collapse created enormous humanitarian needs in all sectors.

The stark warning comes a day before a pledging conference co-hosted by Sweden and Switzerland. The U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres will appeal for \$3.85 billion in relief aid for Yemen this year.

The response to the U.N.

appeal is unlikely to meet expectations, given that the coronavirus pandemic and its devastating consequences hit economies around the globe. Wealthy Gulf donors such as Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, which contributed generously to U.N. appeals in 2018 and 2019, cut back drastically on aid to Yemen last year amid the pandemic and corruption in Yemen aid efforts.

Yemen's war started in 2014 when the Houthi rebels seized the capital, Sanaa, and much of the country's north.

The Saudi-led, U.S.-backed coalition intervened months later to dislodge the rebels and restore the internationally recognized government.

The conflict has killed some 130,000 people and spawned the world's worst humanitarian disaster.

US still open to Iran nuclear talks

WASHINGTON — The Biden administration said Sunday it remains open to talks with Iran over the 2015 nuclear deal despite Tehran's rejection of an EU invitation to join a meeting with the U.S. and the other original participants in the agreement.

A senior administration official said the U.S. was "disappointed" in the rejection but was flexible as to the timing and format of the talks and saw Iran's decision to snub the European invitation as part of the diplomatic process. The official said the U.S. would be consulting with the other participants — Britain, China, France, Germany, Russia and the European Union — on the way forward.

The official was not authorized to discuss the matter by name and spoke on condition of anonymity.

Earlier Sunday, Iran turned down the offer for talks saying the "time isn't ripe" for the meeting, at which the U.S. would have participated as an observer. Iran had been insisting that the U.S. lift or ease sanctions imposed on it by the Trump administration under its "maximum pressure campaign" before sitting down with the United States.

President Joe Biden has said repeatedly that the U.S. would return to the deal that his predecessor, Donald Trump, withdrew from in 2018 only after Iran restores its full compliance with the accord.

"Considering US/E3 positions & actions, time isn't ripe for the proposed informal meeting," Iranian foreign ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh said on Twitter. He referred to the so-called E3, which comprises Britain, France and Germany.

"Remember: Trump failed to meet because of his ill-advised 'Max Failure,'" he said. "With sanctions in place, same still applies. Censuring is NOT diplomacy. It doesn't work with Iran."

The Biden administration

announced earlier this month that it would accept an EU invitation to participate in a meeting of deal participants and at the same time rescinded a Trump determination from the U.N. Security Council that Iran was in significant breach of the agreement that all U.N. sanctions had been restored.

The U.N. move had little practical effect as nearly all members of the world body had rejected Trump's determination because the U.S. was no longer a participant in the nuclear deal. Biden administration officials said the withdrawal of the determination was intended to show goodwill toward its partners and at the same time had eased severe restrictions on the movement of Iranian diplomats posted to the U.N.

Separately on Sunday, the State Department condemned a weekend attack by Iran-backed Yemeni rebels on Saudi Arabia, saying it damaged prospects for peace.

Along with the overtures to Iran on the nuclear front, the Biden administration also reversed several late Trump administration moves against Iranian-backed rebels in Yemen.

Secretary of State Antony Blinken rescinded his predecessor's designation that the Houthi rebels were a "foreign terrorist organization," a move that the U.N. and relief groups had said would make the already disastrous humanitarian situation in Yemen even worse.

In addition, the Biden administration decided to halt all offensive assistance to Saudi Arabia for its military campaign against the Houthis in Yemen.

The Houthis, however, have stepped up their operations in the country, pressing ahead with an offensive in Marib province and launching attacks on Saudi Arabia.

At least 18 die, many wounded in Myanmar

YANGON, Myanmar — Security forces in Myanmar opened fire and made mass arrests Sunday as they sought to break up protests against the military's seizure of power, and a U.N. human rights official said it had "credible information" that at least 18 people were killed and 30 were wounded.

That would be the highest single-day death toll among protesters who are demanding that the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi be restored to power after being ousted by a Feb. 1 coup. About 1,000 people are believed to have been detained Sunday.

"Deaths reportedly occurred as a result of live ammunition fired into crowds in Yangon, Dawei, Mandalay, Myeik, Bago and Pokokku," the U.N. Human Rights Office said in a statement referring to several cities, adding that the forces also used tear gas, flash-bang grenades and stun grenades.

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio

Guterres strongly condemned the crackdown, calling the use of lethal force against peaceful protesters and arbitrary arrests "unacceptable," and expressed serious concern at the increase in deaths and serious injuries, U.N. spokesman Stephane Dujarric said.

Confirming the deaths of protesters has been difficult amid the chaos and general lack of news from official sources, especially in areas outside Yangon, Mandalay and the capital of Naypyitaw. But in many cases, photos and video circulated showed circumstances of the killings and gruesome photos of bodies.

The independent Assistance Association of Political Prisoners reported it was aware that about 1,000 people were detained Sunday, of whom they were able to identify 270. That brought to 1,132 the total number of people the group has confirmed being arrested, charged or sentenced since the coup.

The Feb. 1 coup reversed years of slow progress toward democracy after five decades of military rule.

Trump calls for GOP unity

Stands by claims about 'rigged' election loss

ORLANDO — Taking the stage for the first time since leaving office, former President Donald Trump on Sunday called for Republican Party unity, even as he exacerbated intraparty divisions and trumpeted claims about the election in a speech that made clear he intends to remain a dominant political force.

Speaking at the Conservative Political Action Conference, where he has been hailed as a returning hero, Trump blasted his successor, President Joe Biden, and tried to cement his status as the party's undisputed leader despite his loss in November.

"Do you miss me yet?" Trump said after taking the stage, where his old rally soundtrack had been playing. "I stand before you today to declare that the incredible journey we begun together ... is far from being over."

Though Trump has flirted with the idea of creating a third party, he pledged Sunday to remain part of what he called "our beloved party."

"I'm going to continue to fight right by your side. We're not starting new parties," he said. "We have the Republican Party. It's going to be strong and united like never before."

The conference, held this year in

Orlando instead of the Washington suburbs because of COVID-19 restrictions, has served as a tribute to Trump and Trumpism, complete with a golden statue in his likeness on display. Speakers, including many potential 2024 hopefuls, have argued the party must embrace the former president and his followers, even after the deadly insurrection at the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6.

And they have repeated his unfounded claim that he lost the November election only because of mass voter fraud — an assertion that has been repeatedly rejected by judges, Republican state officials and Trump's own administration.

Still, Trump continued to repeat what Democrats have dubbed the "big lie," calling the election "rigged" and insisting that he won in November, even though he lost by more than 7 million votes.

"As you know, they just lost the White House," he said of Biden, rewriting history as he teased the prospect that he will run again in 2024. "I may even decide to beat them for a third time," he said.

And he mocked those who have warned that such talk will damage the party.

"If Republicans don't get this and the other things I'm going to say, then you should, like the Supreme Court, be ashamed of yourselves," he said.

Crisis deepens as Cuomo pledges to cooperate

ALBANY, N.Y. — Gov. Andrew Cuomo acknowledged for the first time Sunday that some of his behavior with women had been "misinterpreted as unwanted flirtation," and said he would cooperate with a sexual harassment investigation led by the state's attorney general.

In a statement released amid mounting criticism from within his own party, the Democrat maintained he had never inappropriately touched or propositioned anyone. But he said he had teased people and made jokes about their personal lives in an attempt to be "playful."

"I now understand that my interactions may have been insensitive or too personal and that some of my comments, given my position, made others feel in ways I never intended. I acknowledge some of the things I have said have been misinterpreted as an unwanted flirtation. To the extent anyone felt that way, I am truly sorry about that," he said.

He made the comments after the state's attorney general demanded Cuomo grant her the authority to investigate claims he sexually harassed at least two women who worked for him.

Cuomo's legal counsel said the governor would back a plan to appoint an outside lawyer as a special independent deputy attorney general.

Astronauts prep station for new solar wings

CAPE CANAVERAL — Spacewalking astronauts ventured out Sunday to install support frames for new, high-efficiency solar panels arriving at the International Space Station later this year.

NASA's Kate Rubins and Victor Glover put the first set of mounting brackets and struts together, then bolted them into place next to the station's oldest and most degraded solar wings. But the work took longer than expected, and they barely got started on the second set before calling it quits. Rubins will finish the job during a second spacewalk later this week.

The spacewalkers had to lug out the hundreds of pounds of mounting brackets and struts in 8-foot duffle-style bags. The equipment was so big and awkward that it had to be taken apart like furniture, just to get through the hatch.

Some of the attachment locations required extra turns of the power drill and still weren't snug enough, as indicated by black lines. The astronauts had to use a ratchet wrench to deal with the more stubborn bolts.

Welcome back, baseball

Optimism abounds as MLB's spring includes fans' return

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. — Brian Delaney checked his ticket, found his seats and then sat down for a minute in the sunshine. It wasn't a typical late February day in Arizona — a little cool, a little breezy — but Delaney didn't complain a bit.

"You ever been through a Colorado winter?" the Colorado Rockies fan said with a grin.

The good humor and smiles were easy to find as baseball fans streamed into Sunday afternoon's spring training opener between the Rockies and Arizona Diamondbacks. A downward trend in COVID-19 cases throughout most of the country has meant that a limited amount of fans are allowed back in spring training facilities throughout Arizona and Florida.

At Salt River Fields at Talking Stick, the crowd was capped at about 2,200 fans, which is 16% of the usual capacity. Delaney said he never hesitated to get tickets for himself and Debra Mierzwa once they went on sale a few weeks ago.

"Oh yeah," Delaney said. "We were never worried. This is great."

The happy and halfway-normal scene on Sunday was a far cry from 353 days ago, when incredulous fans stood outside Salt River Fields and digested the news that baseball — and pretty much the rest of the world — was being shutdown because of the spreading coronavirus pandemic.

Nearly a year later, things are very different.

"It seemed like forever," said Brandon Ramsey, who lives in the Phoenix area and went to the Reds-Indians game in Goodyear on Sunday. "Last year got cut a little short. To come out here for opening day us just fantastic. They did a great job in socially distancing. They made sure we were safe."

Aside from the World Series and NL Championship Series held last October at a neutral-site park in Arlington, Texas, this marked the first time fans were allowed at big league baseball games since March 12.

By now the safety protocols for sports events have become familiar. Fans in Scottsdale are spread out in small pods of two, four or six people. Masks are worn except when eating and drinking. People sitting on blankets in the grass beyond the outfield wall were given spray-painted squares to stay separate. Cleaning crews

are ubiquitous.

But spring baseball appears to have considerable safety advantage over its NBA, NHL and college basketball counterparts: It's played outdoors where studies have shown the virus is less effective at spreading.

"We feel really good about our

ability to host spring training in the safest possible way," Cactus League executive director Bridget Binsbacher said.

All 30 teams in Major League Baseball are allowing fans at their spring training facilities in Arizona and Florida, though capacity will be severely

limited. The Chicago Cubs are welcoming the most fans (3,630 per game) while the San Francisco Giants will have the fewest (1,000 per game).

The Yankees and Twins have the largest percentage of seats available, with the potential to reach 28%

Another surprise winner in Byron

NASCAR's weird streak continues at Homestead

HOMESTEAD — After years of seeing a handful of drivers — the same guys, really — dominate NASCAR's top level nearly every week, the Cup Series is experiencing a little parity to start the season.

It's a welcome sight for some. Others hope it's a fleeting moment.

William Byron was the third surprise winner through three races this season with his victory Sunday at Homestead-Miami Speedway. Byron joined Michael McDowell and Christopher Bell as unlikely winners to start this season.

Byron completed most of the final two stages at Homestead to win for the second time in 111 Cup starts. His first one came at Daytona last August and landed him one of the final spots in the playoffs.

No one saw that one coming.

Few had this one on the radar, either.

Byron entered the weekend as a 28-1 shot to win a race many expected would provide a return to normal for the racing series. Instead, McDowell and Bell have company in the relatively odd group of 2021 winners and drivers who have locked up postseason spots.

"A lot of people obviously made some good decisions on how to get better," said 2017 series champion Martin Truex Jr., who finished third. "The box we have to work is so small ... the rules are the rules and they haven't changed in a while. The smaller teams get to catch up."

Truex was quick to point out that he still believes the top teams — the heavyweights like himself, so to speak — will find their way back to the top sooner rather than later.

But the first three races have provided plenty of eyebrow-raising moments. Tyler Reddick was second Sunday, nearly 3 seconds behind Byron. McDowell had his third straight top-10 finish. Chris Buescher ran up front for the first part of the race.

"It definitely has closed the gap," McDowell said.

McDowell and Bell were first-time winners to open the season.

The Bucks won for the first time in 11 games this season when trailing after three quarters.

Kawhi Leonard's potential tying 3-point attempt bounced off the front rim with about four seconds left. Khris Middleton got the rebound and sealed it with two free throws with 2.1 seconds remaining.

HOUSTON — Justise Winslow scored 20 points and Memphis pounded Houston for the Rockets' 11th straight loss.

Big moment for Mancini

And a socially distanced standing ovation for Trey Mancini.

All over spring training, baseball enjoyed a bevy of reassuring signs Sunday on the opening day of Grapefruit and Cactus league play.

Many top names were in play, too.

World Series MVP Corey Seager drove in the first run for Los Angeles, 22-year-old Fernando Tatis Jr. played for the first time since signing his \$330 million, 14-year contract, and All-Stars DJ LeMahieu, José Altuve and Joey Votto took swings.

Jazz Chisholm of the Marlins and Adam Haseley of the Phillies did even better—they led off games with home runs.

Say, what's all this talk about a deadened ball?

A change easily noticeable: shortened games. Major League Baseball is letting teams cut these early exhibitions down to five innings if they want, coming after a season in which the coronavirus forced clubs to alter workouts and play only 60 times.

The Chicago White Sox and Milwaukee stopped

after six innings in Arizona. The only Florida game to go nine was Washington-St. Louis, and tied 4-all.

Around the diamonds, Marcus Semien, Andrew Benintendi and Elvis Andrus made their exhibition debuts for new teams and Todd Frazier homered for Pittsburgh.

Not many aces on the mound on the first day—Jack Flaherty, Nathan Eovaldi and Iván Nova were among the familiar names limbering up, and they each got tagged.

By far, the most touching scene involved Mancini.

After producing 35 home runs and 97 RBIs for the Orioles in 2019, he seemed primed for even bigger things. But after playing just five exhibitions last year, he needed to end his season to have surgery for colon cancer.

When Mancini came up in the first inning against Pittsburgh, he drew a nice round of applause as he approached the batter's

box and waved to the crowd. The cheers kept growing, with pitcher Chad Kuhl stepping off the mound and umpire Will Little cleaning the plate to prolong the salute.

Mancini took off his helmet to acknowledge a standing ovation that included the fans, the Orioles and the Pirates.

"It was amazing," he said. "I almost teared up a little bit, I'm not going to lie."

ROCKIES 5, DIAMONDBACKS 2 (8)

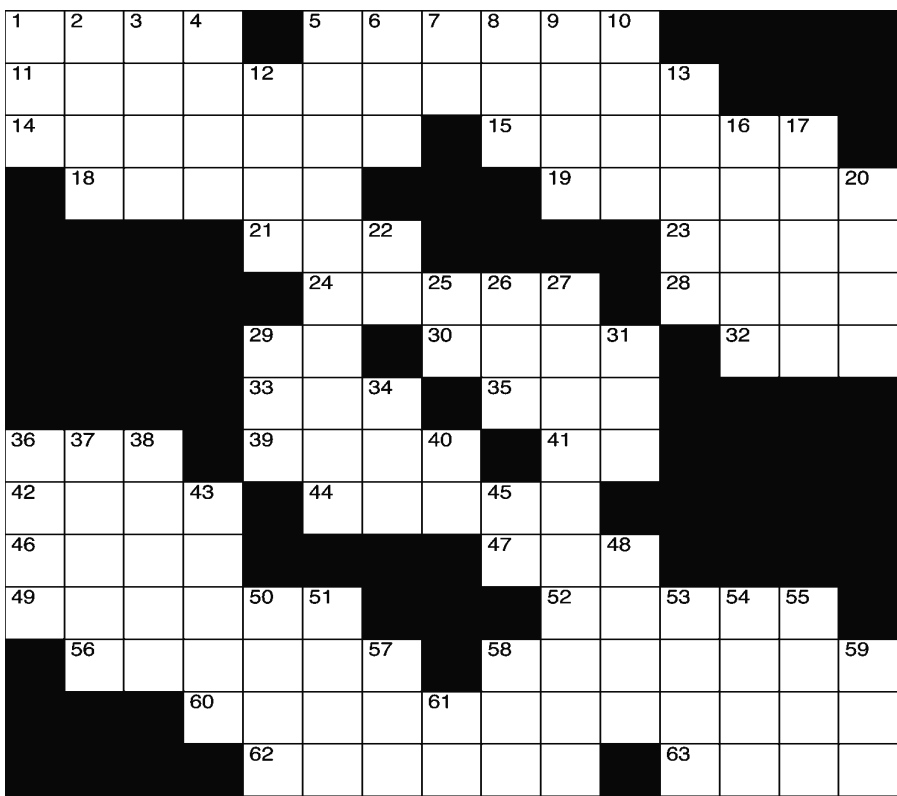

Morikawa plays a steady hand to get win

BRADENTON — PGA champion Collin Morikawa shook off an early mistake and played a steady hand on a Concession golf course known for calamity, closing with a 3-under 69 for a three-shot victory in the Workday Championship.

Morikawa picked up a few short-game tips from major champions — Mark O'Meara on his putting, Concession member Paul Azinger on the chipping — and he said it carried him to another big win.

And there was a tribute to Tiger Woods, his golf idol growing up.

"We don't say 'Thank you' enough," Morikawa said, referring to how much Woods has raised the profile and prize money in golf. He also mentioned his grandfather dying a month ago and began to get emotional.

Morikawa won by three over Brooks Koepka (70), Viktor Hovland (67) and Billy Horschel (70).

He finished at 18-under 270 and became the 24th player to win a major and a World Golf Championship title since this series began in 1999. He joined Woods as the only players to win both before turning 25.

There were red numbers on the board and on the golf course, with several players wearing red shirts and black pants — the Sunday colors of Woods — as a show of support as Woods recovers from career-threatening leg injuries from his car crash in Los Angeles last Tuesday.

"Red and black, we know

that's what Tiger does on Sundays, so just to join in and just let Tiger know we're supporting him in the best way we can," Tony Finau said. "We're still playing and we miss him out here, but it was cool just to be a part of that."

Morikawa didn't have the colors, but he had the game.

So many times on Sunday, Woods had the lead and forced everyone to catch him. Outside of a chunked chip on the second

hole that made him scramble for bogey, Morikawa didn't miss a fairway the rest of the way and was rarely out of position.

Horschel caught Morikawa after three holes and tried to stay with him. Koepka had the last good chance to catch him until he three-putted for par from 35 feet on the par-5 17th hole.

Hovland, who finished his second round with a quadruple bogey, might have had the best chance of all. Hovland somehow

managed to punch out of the wire grass and onto the green to make birdie on the par-5 13th, his seventh birdie of the round that pulled him within one shot.

His hopes effectively ended on the next hole.

Just as Morikawa was pouring in an 8-foot birdie putt on the short par-4 12th hole, Hovland ran his 40-foot birdie putt some 15 feet past the hole on the par-3 14th, and missed the par putt.

Morikawa's lead was back to

three shots, and he never flinched the rest of the day.

Grace closes eagle-birdie for title at Puerto Rico Open

RIO GRANDE, Puerto Rico — Branden Grace closed eagle-birdie to win the Puerto Rico Open, an emotional triumph following his father's January death after a month-long fight with the coronavirus.

Grace holed out from a greenside bunker for eagle on the par-4 17th and birdied the par-5 18th for a one-stroke victory over Jhonattan Vegas at windy Grand Reserve.

Whoa, Nelly! Korda makes it 2 straight victories for her family

ORLANDO — Jessica Korda opened the LPGA Tour season last month by winning the Tournament of Champions.

On Sunday, it was Nelly's turn. Nelly Korda followed in big sister's footsteps with a three-shot victory that looked easier than it felt. She seized control with three birdies through six holes, closed with 12 pars and shot a 3-under 69 at Lake Nona to win the Gainbridge LPGA.

Sutherland overtakes Weir to win Champions tournament in Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz. — Kevin Sutherland chipped in for the only birdie of the final round on No. 16 and had a tap-in for another on the next hole, shooting a 4-under 69 to overtake Mike Weir in the Colguard Classic.
