Citrus County COVID cases still going up

According to the Florida Department of Health, 59 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update.

No new deaths were reported, for a total of 420.

To date in the county, 10,156 people have tested positive (including 85 non-residents).

One new hospitalization was reported, for a total of 658 hospitalized.

Totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and are subject to revision.

BOCC mulls impact fees

Impact fees will take center stage at Tuesday's county commission meeting

Specifically: commissioners will decide whether to raise them, lower them or keep them as is.

There are eight impact fee categories collected in Citrus County: roads, schools, libraries, fire, law enforcement, parks, emergency medical services (EMS) and public buildings.

Currently, the county's adopted impact fee policy formula is at 50% of the full amounts for two categories: transportation and schools.

Based on a consultant's report, impact fees for single-family homes using the same formula, would rise \$1,363 — from the current \$4,809 to \$6.172

Impact fees help local government fund infrastructure necessitated by new growth. They are one-time fees on new de velopment and are paid by the builders before construction can begin.

Prince Harry gives advice to grieving children in new book

LONDON — Britain's Prince Harry has written the foreword for a new book aimed at the children of frontline workers who died in the COVID-19 pandemic, sharing the pain he suffered as a boy after the death of his mother, Princess Diana.

Harry wrote that losing his mother at age 12 left "a huge hole inside of me," according to excerpts of the book printed in the Times of London. Diana died in a Paris car accident in August 1997.

"Hospital by the Hill," by Chris Connaughton, is the story of a young person whose mother worked at a hospital and died during the pandemic. It is being given to children who have experienced similar losses.

"While I wish I was able to hug you right now, I hope this story is able to provide you comfort in knowing that you're not alone," Harry wrote in the foreword.





So I believe that is the best alternative we have rather than moving it somewhere else far away where there might be environmental concerns.

Florida House committee eyes rules for voting by mail

TALLAHASSEE — A Florida House committee takes up its own effort to rewrite voteby-mail rules Monday, as Republicans push to enhance "ballot security" — despite no evidence of widespread problems — while Democrats and voter rights advocates say the election-related proposals before lawmakers would be costly and will make it harder for some Floridians to vote.

The election bill is one of several high-profile measures coming before Florida lawmakers in the coming days, as they hunker down for some of the heaviest lifting yet during their two-month session — including work on rewriting parts of the state's election laws, providing protections for businesses against COVID-related lawsuits and enacting additional ways to punish demonstrators who turn violent.

Gov. Ron DeSantis and other Republicans have made those measures top priorities.

A measure scheduled to be heard by the House Public Integrity and Elections Committee on Monday would require 24-hour monitoring of ballot drop boxes — either by guards, elections officials during work hours or by surveillance cameras during off hours — and require voters to provide identification, such as their Social Security numbers, to update registration information.

The Senate is considering its own changes to how vote-by-mail ballots are handled, including the banning of drop boxes.

Both versions would also narrow the time period covered by a single application for an absentee ballot from two general elections cycles to just one — and wipe out the advantage Democrats now have over Republicans in the number of absentee voters.

That provision has come under attack by Democrats who charge that Republicans are trying to wipe the slate clean after Democrats overtook the GOP in the vote-by-mail race.

Another top priority for DeSantis and his legislative allies is shielding most businesses from being sued because of the pandemic — and could be on the brink of advancing to the governor's desk.

In the coming week, the House floor will take up a measure already passed by the Senate — but it's unclear how the House will handle that proposal. It could decide to abandon its own two-pronged approach, which carves out a separate bill for health care providers, and instead adopt the single Senate bill to address what proponents fear could be a proliferation of frivolous COVID-related lawsuits.

Another controversial measure the House is taking up is the so-called anti-riot bill, which comes up this week for final debate in the chamber.

\$2.5M cash found in PVC pipes in alleged scam

MIAMI — Federal agents found \$2.5 million in cash hidden in PVC pipes in the bedroom closet of a Miami man charged with bilking the government in a massive \$49 million Medicare fraud scam.

The cash was found sealed with plastic wrap inside pipes buried under the closet floor at Jesus Garces' home during a raid Wednesday, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Federal authorities have spent the last decade cracking down on the multi-billion Medicare fraud scams cheating taxpayers, but they rarely find cash stockpiles like this. Agents also found another \$75,000 in a safe and another \$280,000 in a safe at another home linked to Garces, along with seven Rolex watches.

The Miami Herald reported that swarms of agents from Health and Human Services, the FBI, Customs and Border Protection, and Miami-Dade Police descended on Garces' home Wednesday, armed with excavation tools, where they spent hours digging up the loot.

Garces, who was arrested in 2019, has been at a federal detention center in Miami after a judge ruled he was a flight risk who might attempt to return to his home country of Cuba. The 50-year-old is expected to go to trial later this year for conspiracy to commit healthcare fraud, where prosecutors allege he bilked Medicare and private insurers of millions by charging for medical equipment that patients never received or didn't need.

Federal investigators said he received \$100,000 in cash a week over a two-year period from one of the money launderers, according to a 2019 detention order.

Cops: Married teacher couple smoked marijuana with kids

VIERA — Two married high school teachers were arrested this week after authorities said they repeatedly gave students marijuana and smoked it with them at their Florida home.

An investigation by the Brevard County Sheriff's Office found James Brand, 50, and Amy O-Reilly Brand, 45, consumed marijuana with students at their home on multiple occasions. No criminal activity took place on school grounds.

State child welfare officials received a complaint earlier this month that the Viera High School teachers allowed a girl under the age of 18 to use marijuana and have a sexual relationship with a man who was also living at the home.

The couple was charged Thursday with child neglect and contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Florida Today reports the teachers are on paid administrative leave pending an investigation.

Doctors protest in Myanmar as state violence continues

MANDALAY, Myanmar -Health care workers marched through Myanmar's second-biggest city at dawn Sunday, kicking off another day of countrywide protests against last month's coup. Elsewhere police used violence against protesters and security forces shot dead at least one person.

About 100 doctors, nurses, medical students and pharmacists, wearing the long white coats, lined up on a main road in Mandalay to chant slogans and voice their opposition to the Feb. 1 coup that toppled the elected civilian government of Aung San Suu Kyi.

Mandalay has been a major center of opposition to the takeover, and later in the day engineers there held what has been dubbed a "no-human strike," an increasingly popular tactic that involves lining up signboards in streets or other public areas as proxies for human protesters.

The protests are part of a broader civil disobedience movement, including boycotts and strikes, that aims to restore the civilian government and return Myanmar to its slow march towards democracy that began nearly a decade ago when the military began loosening its grip after five decades of rule In recent weeks, however, the numbers of protesters has fallen off and the death toll has climbed in the face of lethal force by police and soldiers shooting into crowds. The independent Assistance Association for Political Prisoners had verified 247 deaths nationwide. The group also has confirmed that 2,345 people have been arrested or charged since the coup, with 1,994 still detained or sought for arrest.

Palestinians expand vaccination campaign

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip -The Palestinian Health Ministry began administering the first doses of coronavirus vaccines it received from the global COVAX initiative to health care workers and older residents in the West Bank and Gaza Strip on Sunday.

The World Health Organization and its partners running the United Nations COVAX program delivered 61,400 vaccines to the Palestinian Authority on Wednesday, whereas 21,300 were shipped to the blockaded, Hamas-controlled Gaza Strip.

The vaccine shipment is a boost to the West Bank, where the PA has struggled to obtain vaccines as the infection rate surged in recent weeks. Until now it had only secured 10,000 doses of Russia's Sputnik V vaccine and 2,000 shots from Israel for the roughly 3 million Palestinians living in the West Bank. By contrast, Gaza, which has been under Israeli-Egyptian blockade since Hamas took control of the area in 2007, has received more than 80,000 vaccines. Most of them were of the Russian variety and have come from a rival of President Mahmoud Abbas based in the United Arab Emirates. Mohammed Dahlan, who has been living in Abu Dhabi since falling out with Abbas in 2011, has secured the delivery of 60,000 shots to Gaza and promised more, embarrassing Abbas ahead of Palestinian elections planned in May. In the West Bank, Palestinian Prime Minister Mohammad Shtayyeh said the vaccines would go to medical workers and older people. "We are here to start the preventive vaccination drive for our people against the coronavirus," he said. Even with the arrival of the vaccines, the Palestinian areas lag far behind Israel, which has vaccinated some 80% of its adult population.

AP sources: Iran threatens US Army post, top general

Iran has made threats against Fort McNair, an Army post in the U.S. capital, and against the Army's vice chief of staff, two senior U.S. intelligence officials said.

They said communications intercepted by the National Security Agency in January showed that Iran's Revolutionary Guard discussed mounting "USS Cole-style attacks" against the Army post, referring to the October 2000 suicide attack in which a small boat pulled up alongside the Navy destroyer in the Yemeni port of


The intelligence also revealed threats to kill Gen. Joseph M. Martin and plans to infiltrate and surveil the installation, according to the officials, who were not authorized to publicly discuss national security matters and spoke on condition of anonymity. The Ârmy post, one of the oldest in the country, is Martin's official residence.

The threats are one reason the Army has been pushing for more security around Fort McNair, which sits alongside Washington's bustling newly developed Waterfront District.

City leaders have been fighting the Army's plan to add a buffer zone of about 250 feet to 500 feet from the shore of the Washington Channel, which would limit access to as much as half the width of the busy waterway running parallel to the Potomac River.

The Pentagon, National Security Council and NSA either did not reply or declined to comment when contacted by The Associated Press.

As District of Columbia officials have fought the enhanced security along the channel, the Army has offered only vague information about threats to the installation.

US defense chief arrives in Kabul on first trip there

KABUL, Afghanistan -U.S. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin arrived Sunday in Kabul on his first trip to Afghanistan as Pentagon chief, amid swirling questions about how long American troops will remain in the country.

State-owned Radio and Television Afghanistan and popular TOLO Television reported Austin's arrival in Kabul from India. He met with senior Afghan government officials, including President Ashraf Ghani.

According to the Washington Post, which was among the small group of U.S. media travelling with him, Austin said senior U.S. officials want to see "a responsible end to this conflict" and "a transition to something else."

"There's always going to be concerns about things one way or the other, but I think there is a lot of energy focused on doing what is necessary to bring about a responsible end and a negotiated settlement to the war," Austin said.



Rockets suffer their 20th straight loss



BOSTON — Jaylen Brown scored 34 points, including a career-high 10 3-pointers, and Jayson Tatum added 23 on Sunday to help the Boston Celtics beat the Orlando Magic 112-96 and snap a three-game losing streak.

The Celtics made 23 3-pointers in the game, one short of the franchise record. Brown was 10 for 18 from the distance and one short of Marcus Smart's team record of 11 for one player.

"I lost count at some point," Brown said. "I wish somebody would have told me that. I would have fired up five, six more to make sure I beat Marcus.'

Nikola Vucevic had 22 points and 13 rebounds for Orlando, which beat Brooklyn on Friday night to snap a nine-game losing streak. The Magic cut a five points in the first quarter hit back-to-back 3s that gave Nets debut and Nicolas Claxton 23-point, third-quarter deficit and held a 40-37 lead with seven Boston its first double-digit lead. added 16 points.

Scherzer faces deGrom in opening day preview

No surprise here: Max Scherzer will have the ball in his hands when he begins the final \$210 million contract with the Washington Nationals.

Scherzer will make his Nationals-record sixth opening day start April 1, facing the New York Mets in Washington. It'll be a rematch of an exhibition mound matchup Sunday, when Scherzer allowed two homers and threw 90 pitches in five innings of a 6-2 loss to the Mets and starter Jacob deGrom in West Palm Beach.

"He's the guy. He's the guy that gets everything started for us," Nationals manager Dave Martinez said in explaining his decision to use Scherzer in Game 1 — which, of course, was the expected outcome.

"He competes. You know what we're going to get from him,' Martinez said. "He loves opening day. So he's a guy we want to follow opening day."

It's quite a way to get things going for Major League Baseball: three-time Cy Young Award winner Scherzer against twotime honoree deGrom.

As for the rest of his rotation, Martinez said he and new pitching coach Jim Hickey still need to figure out how to slot their other starters. There's 2019 World Series MVP Stephen Strasburg and lefties Jon Lester and Patrick Corbin: the fifth starter is expected to be Joe Ross, who opted out of last season because of coronavirus concerns.

On Sunday, Scherzer allowed six hits and four earned runs, with a solo shot by Michael Conforto in the fourth and a two-run homer by Francisco Lindor in the fifth. Another run scored on a wild pitch.

Scherzer wasn't

concerned by the results, of course. He said he was working on things, including trying a slide-step.

"You're trying to get a read on season of his seven-year, their swings, how they're trying to swing the bat, and realize they're probably going to make adjustments, too," said Scherzer, whose last outing before the games matter will come Saturday in a "B" game against the Houston Astros. 



Against four hearts, West leads the diamond king. How should South continue?

Note that North goes down in three no-trump if East leads a spade or a diamond.

In four hearts, there is a danger of a loser in each suit. However, declarer's basic plan should be to discard his spade loser on dummy's club ace. So, at trick two, declarer runs the club queen. Here, it loses to East's king. Let's suppose he switches to the spade jack. South wins with his ace, takes his two top trumps and cashes the club ace and jack, discarding his remaining spade, whether East ruffs in or not. Declarer loses only one heart, one diamond and one club.

Finally, note that NMF can also be employed after a two-no-trump rebid.


