Citrus County COVID-19 update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 88 positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Six new deaths were reported, for a total of 282.

To date in the county, 7,226 people have tested positive (including 49 non-residents).

One new hospitalization was reported, for a total of 535 hospitalized.

Note that totals reflect preliminary reports received by the state, and may be subject to later revision.

Publix vaccine appointments go fast

You had to be quick on the draw to make an online appointment Thursday morning with Publix for a COVID-19 vaccination.

A Publix employee told the Chronicle that as soon

as the online reservation site was activated, it took just 15 minutes for all appointments to be claimed and the limited vaccine supply exhausted.

That is true of all 22 Publix pharmacies in Citrus, Hernando and Marion counties that participated in the pilot program.

Publix is asking folks to keep checking back with the online registration system at www.Publix.com/covidvaccine because the Lakeland-based chain is expecting more vaccines to arrive. When that will be is anyone's guess.

When people accessed the Publix website used to

make reservations, they saw this: "All available COVID-19 vaccine appointments at Publix Pharmacy have been claimed. Please check back again soon as more appointments may become available."

"I'm just going to have to wait my time, that's all," said Stanley

Fleming, 93, who had hoped to get his shot at the Publix pharmacy at Sugarmill Woods, one of four county Publix stores administering the Moderna vaccine.

"I'm like everyone else, Fleming added, "I'd like to be protected."

Long lines for first shots



800 doses given; more available Saturday

The Department of Health in Citrus County gave itself until 3 p.m. Thursday to vaccinate at least 800 people at Central Ridge District Park against the coronavirus. The local agency was finished by 1 p.m., two hours ahead of schedule.

The DOH began giving out the shots about 9 a.m. in a first come, first served basis at the 6905 N. County Road 491 facility in Beverly Hills.

"It's going smoothly," DOH administrator Ernesto "Tito" Rubio told the Chronicle as DOH workers were administering the vaccines. "We are practiced in giving vaccines with drive-thru."

The local agency also

Relief, frustration from seniors awaiting shots

Michel Bergeron and his partner Nancy Alexander were the first to receive the coronavirus vaccine Thursday, Jan. 7, at Central Ridge District Park from the local department of health, but for the couple it didn't come easy.

Traffic stretched thousands of vehicles from the Beverly Hills park along County Road 491 to Beverly Hills Boulevard nearly 4 miles away. Hundreds of vehicles and their occupants were turned away when DOH workers counted off people in line to receive the

life-protecting vaccine against the 800 doses the local DOH was preparing to dispense. The DOH had 800 doses.

"I've been paranoid (about contracting the virus)," Bergeron told the Chronicle after getting the vaccine shot in his arm. "I've been paranoid careful. I'm high risk. I've got COPD and I'm asthmatic."

It was the third time the couple tried to get inoculated against the disease that has claimed more than 360,000 people in the United States and left more than 21 million infected. The number of dead in Citrus County from the virus is nearing 300.

Bergeron and Alexander, who live in The Villages, had tried twice before to get the vaccine in Lake County, but Sunday the vaccines didn't arrive, the couple said, and this week they were hundreds of cars too late.

The couple parked by the Citrus County park's entrance on County Road 491 beginning at 6 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 6, and waited. They were determined to get the vaccines his time, Alexander said.

The DOH in Citrus County will again offer vaccines from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 9, at Central Ridge Park. The park will be closed the night before at dusk. The vaccines are only for

those 65 years and older.

The Moderna vaccinations require a second dose in 28 days. The DOH in Citrus County is guaranteed by the federal government to get those second doses for each of the first doses the local DOH gives out, said Ernesto "Tito" Rubio, the local DOH administrator.

Despite getting the first round of vaccinations, Bergeron and Alexander said they will heed health officials' warnings and continue to wear masks and keep their social distance. Not much will change, they said.

Schools celebrate star teachers, staffers

Even in the midst of a shadowing pandemic, Citrus County found shining stars within its public school system.

During the annual Galaxy of Stars ceremony, held virtually this year the evening of Thursday, Jan. 7, local school district and Citrus County Education Foundation officials

honored the district's top educator and support staffer.

Judie Banfield, a third-grade Hernando Elementary School instructor, won the school district's teacher of the year for 2022.

"I'm truly grateful and blessed, and I thank God and my family for the support they've given me to go to school and become a teacher," Banfield told the Chronicle. "I'm

blessed to work at such an amazing place with such amazing people."

Banfield said she dedicated her award to Citrus County teachers who taught and helped inspire her.

"Without them," she said, "I wouldn't be the teacher I'd be."

"Judie exemplifies a professional educator who makes a tremendous difference in the lives of all students," Hernando

Elementary School Principal Kyle Jaecks wrote in his nomination letter for Banfield, who's taught more than six years in the district. "Her busy, bustling classroom is a model for all educators."

Rick Godfrey, an ESE paraprofessional with Crystal River Primary School, won the honor of being the district's school related employee of the year for 2021.

"It's definitely an

honor," the 12-year district employee said in his acceptance speech. "I know how tough it is for someone to be here; it's got to be hard, everybody's so good."

"His willingness to help in any way needed is evident," Crystal River Primary School Principal Donnie Brown wrote in Godfrey's nomination letter, "as he helps a child

July 4 shooting gets another court date

Armed-robbery, animal-cruelty cases progress virtually

Carol Marie Kolberg got another court date for her felony case alleging the Lecanto 75-year-old shot at and injured a boy watching Independence Day fireworks next door with his family.

During Kolberg's court hearing held Tuesday, Jan. 7 via Zoom, Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard scheduled her next appearance for March 4.

Kolberg is charged with attempted manslaughter with a firearm and shooting at a dwelling.

She faces a sentence of up to life in prison if convicted of shooting in the direction of Chad Burke Jr. the night of July 4, striking the 12-year-old in his stomach.

Chad was watching relatives light fireworks on his family's front yard off of West Rolling View Place when the stray bullet struck him, causing

severe injury.

It's alleged, Assistant State Attorney Kevin Davis told Howard on Tuesday, Kolberg became angry at the fireworks and fired at the source of its noise.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office authorities arrested Kolberg in August after firearm experts matched one of her seized guns to the projectile recovered from Chad. She was released from the Citrus

Assistant Public Defender Alexei Lizanich, Kolberg's attorney, told Howard Tuesday he expects his client's case will go to trial.

Also during the virtual court hearings Thursday for out-of-custody defendants:

Malakhi Jaheim Bellamy is expected at his next court date to either set a trial date or change his not-guilty plea on allegations he and two local accomplices ambushed a man over a drug deal.

During Bellamy's virtual court appearance Thursday, Howard scheduled

March 4 as the Lecanto 18-year-old's plea-or-set hearing.

Bellamy faces charges of armed burglary of a conveyance, armed robbery, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, grand theft of a firearm and grand theft.


If convicted of either the armed burglary or armed robbery charge, Bellamy could be sentenced to a prison term of up to life.

Bellamy's co-defendants, Crystal River 23-year-old Adrian Gage Williams and Homosassa 18-year-old Strother Jones Natteal, also face similar charges.

It's alleged the trio robbed another man Nov. 16 near the intersection of West Constitution Lane and South Gettysburg Drive in Homosassa.

Prior reports state the man told Citrus County Sher-

iff's Office investigators Bellamy asked to meet so he could pay him back for marijuana.

At the meeting location, down a dirt trail, the man said Bellamy and who would later be identified as Natteal and Williams mugged him, robbing him of his wallet, car keys and cellphone.

They also rummaged through the man's vehicle, stealing marijuana and a firearm Bellamy then used to threaten the man's life with before he, Williams and Natteal ran away.

Assistant Public Defender Luke Waatti, Bellamy and Williams' attorney, told Howard Tuesday he will be recusing himself from Bellamy's case due to the conflict of interest between his clients.

Waatti said during Williams' virtual court hearing he has to talk with Williams about an offer from Assistant State Attorney Kevin Davis, his prosecutor, that could be in his best interest.


Williams next court date is March 4, court records show, and Natteal is due for a hearing Jan. 14.

Inverness 55-year-old Ruth Ann Johnson told Howard she

wants to take her animal-cruelty case to trial to defend against allegations she and codefendant Kevin Lee Thompson did

nothing for their dog suffering from cancer. After Johnson expressed her wishes, Howard scheduled her trial for the week of April 12 and a final pre-trial hearing March 29.

Thompson, an Inverness 57-year-old, is due to stand trial the week of Feb. 15. He has a final pre-trial hearing Feb. 1.

It's alleged Johnson and Thompson, who were arrested in June, didn't seek veterinary treatment for a year for their chihuahua, Bennie, while the canine amassed a softball-sized tumor that eventually split open.

Davis on Tuesday offered Johnson a plea offer of four years probation. Johnson would also have to pay overdue vet bills, Davis added, and she wouldn't be allowed to own animals while on probation.

"I want to go to trial," Johnson responded after Howard asked her if she wanted the prosecutor's offer.

Inverness council contemplates abandoned Manning's Bar future

Hopes that abandoned Manning's Bar on State Road 44 in Inverness could be demolished without using taxpayer money is dwindling as quickly as the building is falling into disrepair.

That was the advice from City Manager Eric Williams during the city council meeting this week as council members got an update on the eyesore by the city attorney Robert Batsel.

Batsel told the council the

city had a lean on the property, but other entities were in front in the legal line and ahead of Inverness. The city in 2016 directed owners Milton and Nadeen Kongque, of Hernando, to fix the dilapidated property, but the couple did not comply.

Williams warned that the cost to demolish the property would be about \$15,000. In addition, the blight was also a hindrance to further development there.

The bar, at 2608 State Road 44, closed 35 years ago, but many still know it by the Manning name.

Region's Bank holds the mortgage on the property. Williams said maybe the bank could take possession of the decaying structure. And

because the building is a hazard, the city could also step in and take action, including demolition, he said.

"We have to start looking at what's in the best interest of the city," Williams said.

In other business, the council:

Agreed to bid out work to build a sidewalk along Colonnade Street from Colonnade Park Apartments.

The developer already built a sidewalk from the apartments to Whispering Pines Park. The city will build the sidewalk in the opposite direction. The council instructed Williams to bid out the work and report back who responds.

Williams told his council bosses he agreed to a \$26,000 deal for commercial fans and

lights for the Depot District pavilion.

Williams told the council that previous offers from other vendors was for about \$80,000 but the \$26,000 offer would end in 2020 and there were no scheduled meetings to discuss the issue, so he took action. He also told the Chronicle that the labor cost for an electrician to install the fans and lights would be about \$8,000.

Williams told the council that the boardwalk around Cooter Pond was complete, but the lighting was about 2/3 finished.

Council members congratulated Williams on his one-year anniversary as the city's manager and all agreed he had done a remarkable job during trying times.

Board says it wants comp plan rewrite

Citrus County commissioners are about to lead the public down a path that hasn't been traveled in 30 years.

Commissioners said this week they want to hire consultants to help them update the comprehensive plan, a massive document that is the blueprint that drives all aspects of growth regulation in Citrus County.

The document, often referred to as the comp plan, was approved in 1990 and is updated every five years.

During a workshop Tuesday, commissioners said the county needs a new strategic plan that will help them to develop a new comprehensive plan.

Inverness attorney Clark Stillwell, who often represents the interests of developers, was a member of the countywide citizens committee that helped to write the comp plan.

Even though the committee included a wide range of interests, Stillwell said the plan faced significant opposition.

"It's not a fun process, I'll tell you that right now," he said.

Stillwell said the county doesn't need an entirely new plan, just an updated one.

He noted the manatee protection plan, for example, which limits the number of boat ramps and boat slips on coastal waters. Citrus was the first in Florida to adopt a manatee protection plan.

He said in 1990 the winter count of manatees was 150; now it's over 750.

"Someone's done a real good job here in that regard," Stillwell said.

But growth has also led to more demand for water access, Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said.

Consultants to develop a strategic plan and comp plan update could cost between \$100,000 and \$200,000, County Administrator Randy Oliver said.

Oliver said he will bring options at the board's next meeting to proceed.

Forestry crews contain 313-acre wildfire

State firefighters contained a wildfire that broke out the morning of Wednesday, Jan. 6 within the Citrus Tract of the Withlacoochee State Forest.

Florida Forest Service spokeswoman Judith Tear said forestry crews contained the 313-acre fire by 4:07 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 6, after a forestry fixed-wing aircraft spotted the blaze at around 11:49 a.m. between forest roads 13 and 16.

Tear said part of the scorched land includes controlled "burn-outs" firefighters set to help combat the wildfire's progression by removing flammable debris on forest floors.

No injuries or property damages were reported, Tear said, adding the fire could have been worse

Late-night hosts react with shock, anger to attack

NEW YORK — Late-night TV show hosts expressed anger and frustration at the violence at the U.S. Capitol, offering somber monologues that pleaded for unity even as some aimed pointed barbs at those they held responsible for the mobs' actions.

"It was a terrible day in the history of this country," said Jimmy Kimmel on his ABC show Wednesday. Over on CBS, Stephen Colbert called it "a horrifying day that will go down in U.S. history, however much longer that is."

They were reacting to footage several hours earlier of a violent mob loyal to President Donald Trump storming the Senate and forcing lawmakers into hiding. Tear gas was used in the Rotunda.

"If my grandfather were alive today and saw what was happening in the country that he fought for, he'd be disgusted," said Jimmy Fallon on NBC. "People walking around with the flag upside down thinking they're patriotic. Today was not patriotism. Today was terrorism."

James Corden, who grew up in England, used the perspective of an outsider to view the events, saying he always looked to the United States as a beacon of light and possibility.

"Today, people across the world would have looked at these pictures from Washington and they would have wondered what on earth has happened to this great country," Corden said on CBS. But he added "the America that they admire still exists."

Kimmel ridiculed some

members of the mob, including one dressed as a Viking. "It was like a psychotic 'Price is Right' audience forcibly taking control of the Plinko wheel," Kimmel said. He condemned those who "lit these fires."

Colbert's 14-minute monologue was the most scathing, calling out Trump's most outspoken GOP supporters in Congress and the Senate for what he alleged were years of sowing the seeds for violence.

"After five years of coddling this president's fascist rhetoric, guess whose followers want to burn down the Reichstag?" he said. "Who could have seen this coming? Everyone. This is the most shocking, most tragic, least surprising thing I've ever seen."

"The Daily Show" was on vacation Wednesday night but tweeted out a combo photo of the Capitol under siege and an image of dinosaurs running amok from "Jurassic Park," with the caption: "Same energy."

Several hosts wryly noted the relatively restrained reaction from authorities and compared

that to the way Black protesters have been treated.

"I wouldn't even want to imagine his treatment or response to those people if they had been wearing Black Lives Matter hats instead of red MAGA ones," Corden said.

Many hosts noted with optimism that the nation is weeks away from a new administration and that the same steps where the mob battled police will welcome a new batch of lawmakers.

"It's important to remember that this is not who we are. I assure you there are more good people than there are bad, and good will prevail," Fallon said.

Seth Meyers was live on NBC and didn't try to joke about the events, filling his monologue with terms like "armed insurrection" and "stunning scenes of violence and sedition."

"We are going to try our best tonight to process what happened and I promise, I promise, if you come back tomorrow we will have jokes," he said.

In 1935, rock-and-roll legend Elvis Presley was born in Tupelo, Mississippi.


Ten years ago: U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, D-Ariz., was shot and critically wounded when a gunman opened fire as the congresswoman met with constituents in Tucson; six people were killed, 12 others also injured. (Gunman Jared Lee Loughner was sentenced in Nov. 2012 to seven consecutive life sentences, plus 140 years.)



The four local Publix sites participating in the vaccine program are Crystal Springs Shopping Center, 6760 State Road 44 in Crystal River; Shoppes of Sugarmill Woods, 9525 U.S. 19 in Homosassa; Publix Plaza, 1012 W. Main St. in Inverness; and Shoppes of Citrus Hills, 2601 N. Forest Ridge Blvd., Hernando.

James McKelvey of Homosassa said if it is this difficult to get the first shot, he wonders how bad will it be to book an

appointment for the required second shot.

McKelvey said the vaccine roll-out should be handled like the flu shot, where people make appointments with their own doctors who would get a supply and then their patients could work through them.

The current scattershot approach is not working, he said, and believes Gov. Ron DeSantis should stop, reassess the distribution and come up with a more orderly method.

Patrick O'Hare's wife, Lillian, tried getting onto the Publix website at 6 a.m. Thursday and constantly received a message to try

back. When she finally got online at 9:30, all the vaccination appointments were gone.

The O'Hares, both in their 80s who live in Homosassa, say they're unlikely to change their COVID-19 prevention habits until they're vaccinated.

"We just don't go out," O'Hare said. "People aren't wearing masks. We can't risk it."

provides testing for the virus three times a week in a similar drive-thru process as well as other vaccinations, which has helped give the local DOH practice, Rubio said.

The Moderna vaccinations require a second dose in 28 days. Rubio said his DOH will offer them and the federal government guarantees the local DOH will have the supply.

Amanda Woodward, the local DOH preparedness program manager, said there were no significant problems administering the vaccines. But the local DOH staff will meet after the vaccinations and discuss any needed changes, Woodward said.

The DOH will offer at least another 800 vaccinations beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 9, at the same place, Central Ridge Park.

"I believe everything is

going extremely smooth," she told the *Chronicle*. "(But) you will always have little hiccups."

"Besides the traffic on (County Road) 491 everything went to plan," she said, referring to the miles-long traffic along the highway of people wanting to get vaccinations.

Hundreds of people were turned away because there weren't enough vaccines.

"Our goal is to get the shots in people's arms as quickly and efficiently and safely as possible," Woodward said.

The DOH in Citrus County offers the vaccines on a first come, first served basis. Woodward said the DOH here tried a pre-registration process when offering virus testing but there were problems.

"Half the people wouldn't show up or were late," she told the *Chronicle*. So the DOH decided to use a first come, first served process with the vaccines.

The hope is not to waste any of the vaccine, said Freta Dunn, DOH's immunization program manager.

Each Moderna vial contains 10 doses. Once a vial is punctured with a needle it must be used within six hours, Dunn told the *Chronicle*. Once a vial is taken out of the freezer and is not punctured, it must be used within 28 days.

"(So, the clock) is always ticking," Dunn said.

DOH spokeswoman Audrey Stasko said people shouldn't expect to be fully protected from a single dose of the vaccine.

"Whether they take the vaccine today or Saturday or months from now you still need to practice your daily precautions. That's the reality," she said.

It will take weeks to build immunity and people still need their second dose, Stasko said.

They know the vaccine reaches its best protection with the second dose.

"But at least you have some peace of mind (with the first dose)," Bergeron said. "I want to turn 70. So we won't be burning our masks soon."

The two will likely wait a couple months after their second dose before letting down their guard some.

"I'm paranoid," he said. "And you never know."

The DOH required recipients of the vaccine to remain at the park for 15 minutes to ensure no side effects. Waiting near the couple were Joe Hoehman and Maureen Peronne.

The couple got to the park at 6905 N. Lecanto Highway, Beverly Hills, at 3:30 a.m.

They thought they were lucky. They didn't have to try and sleep in their Volkswagen bug overnight.

"We were going to be here," Peronne said. "I don't care if we had to walk all the way. I don't care if we had to walk 150 miles, we are here."

Hoehman said he knows the vaccinations are not a cure-all, but it's the first step to protection.

"Now it gives you a little relief," he said.

Most of the hundreds of area residents wanting the vaccines said the DOH in Citrus County was organized and the process went smoothly. But they also said they felt badly for those who came to the park in hopes of the vaccine but were turned away when there wasn't enough for them.

Most interviewed by the Chronicle said a process by which people could preregister would have been fairest.

"Appointments would have been much better," said Patti Pfeifer, 65.

She and her husband, Bud, arrived outside the park Wednesday night and

pulled off County Road 491, but couldn't sleep.

"It's too dangerous on Lecanto Highway," she said about parking on the side of the road.

"We think they're doing an excellent job but they should have at least opened the park all night long," she said.

The Crystal River couple said they have been following most of the safety rules to avoid infection.

"We shop at Walmart, but we avoid long lines. We also wear masks," she said.

"We're having fun," she

said, "but we're still being careful."

Allan San Martin, who was behind them, also came to the park Wednesday night.

"I got maybe 30 minutes total (sleep)," he said.

"I hate it," San Martin said of the first come, first served strategy. "They should do something online. Everything is online."

He said he came the night before to appease his girlfriend.

"She was a basket case (fearing the DOH would run out of vaccines)," he said.

Rubio said until the Florida Department of Health instructs him otherwise, his local DOH will follow a first come, first served process.

The problem with registering people is that if people don't come, the DOH will have to throw away

their vaccine. "That's the problem. We don't want to waste the vaccine," he said. "This stuff is platinum."



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
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Trump concedes

Talks of removal from office grow

WASHINGTON — With 13 days left in his term, President Donald Trump finally bent to reality on Thursday amid growing talk of trying to force him out early, acknowledging he'll peacefully leave after Congress affirmed his defeat.

Trump led off a video from the White House by condemning the violence carried out in his name a day earlier at the Capitol. Then, for the first time, he admitted that his presidency would soon end — though he declined to mention President-elect Joe Biden by name or explicitly state that he had lost.

"A new administration will be inaugurated on Jan. 20," Trump said in the video. "My focus now turns to ensuring a smooth, orderly and seamless transition of power. This moment calls for healing and reconciliation."

The address, which appeared designed to stave off talk of a forced early eviction, came at the end of a day when the cornered president stayed out of sight in the White House. Silenced on some of his favorite internet lines of communication, he watched the resignations of several top aides, including a Cabinet secretary.

And as officials sifted through the aftermath of the pro-Trump mob's siege of the U.S. Capitol, there was growing discussion of impeaching him a second time or invoking the 25th Amendment to oust him from the Oval Office.

The invasion of the Capitol building, a powerful symbol of the nation's democracy, rattled Republicans and Democrats alike. They struggled with how best to contain the impulses of a president deemed too dangerous to control his own social media accounts but who remains commander in chief of the world's greatest military.

"I'm not worried about the next election, I'm worried about getting through the next 14 days," said Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, one of Trump's staunchest allies. He condemned the president's role in Wednesday's riots and said, "If something else happens, all options would be on the table."

Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi declared that "the president of the United States incited an armed insurrection against America." She called him "a very dangerous person who should not continue in office. This is urgent, an emergency of the highest magnitude."

Neither option to remove Trump seemed likely, with little time left in his term to draft

the Cabinet members needed to invoke the amendment or to organize the hearings and trial mandated for an impeachment. But the fact that the dramatic options were even the subject of discussion served as a warning to Trump.

The president's video Thursday — which was released upon his return to Twitter after his account was restored — was a complete reversal from the one he put out just 24 hours earlier in which he said to the violent mob, "We love you. You're very special." His refusal to condemn the violence sparked a firestorm of criticism and, in the new video, he at last denounced the demonstrators' "lawlessness and mayhem."

As for his feelings on leaving office, he told the nation that "serving as your president has been the honor of my lifetime" while hinting at a return to the public arena. He told supporters "that our incredible journey is only just beginning."

After the storming of the Capitol and the eventual week-hours certification of Biden's win by members of Congress, Trump released a statement that merely acknowledged he would abide by a peaceful transfer of power on Jan. 20.

The statement was posted by an aide and did not originate from the president's own Twitter account, which has 88 million followers and for four years has been wielded as a political weapon that dictates policy and sows division and conspiracy.

Trump couldn't tweet it himself because the social media platform suspended his account, stating that the president had violated its rules of service by inciting violence. Facebook adopted a broader ban, saying Trump's account would be offline until after Biden's inauguration.

Capitol Police rejected offers of federal help to quell mob

WASHINGTON — Three days before supporters of President Donald Trump rioted at the Capitol, the Pentagon asked the U.S. Capitol Police if it needed National Guard manpower. And as the mob descended on the building Wednesday, Justice Department leaders reached out to offer up FBI agents. The police turned them down both times, according to senior defense officials and two people familiar with the matter.

Despite plenty of warnings of a possible insurrection and ample resources and time to prepare, the Capitol Police planned only for a free speech demonstration.

Still stinging from the uproar over the violent response by law enforcement to protests last June near the White House, officials also were intent on avoiding any appearance that the federal government was deploying active duty or National Guard troops against Americans.

The result is the U.S. Capitol was overrun Wednesday and officers in a law enforcement agency with a large operating budget and experience in high-security events protecting lawmakers were overwhelmed for the world to see. Four protesters died, including one shot inside the building.

The rioting and loss of control has raised serious questions over security at the Capitol for

future events. The actions of the day also raise troubling concerns about the treatment of mainly white Trump supporters, who were allowed to roam through the building for hours, while Black and brown protesters who demonstrated last year over police brutality faced more robust and aggressive policing.

"This was a failure of imagination, a failure of leadership," said Houston Police Chief Art Acevedo, whose department responded to several large protests last year following the death of George Floyd. "The Capitol Police must do better and I don't see how we can get around that."

Acevedo said he has attended events on the Capitol grounds to honor slain police officers that had higher fences and a stronger security presence than what he saw on video Wednesday.

Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy said that as the rioting was underway, it became clear that the Capitol Police were overrun. But he said there was no

contingency planning done in advance for what forces could do in case of a problem at the Capitol because Defense Department help was turned down. "They've got to ask us, the request has to come to us," said McCarthy.

U.S. Capitol Police Chief Steven Sund, under pressure from Schumer, Pelosi and other congressional leaders, was forced to resign. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell asked for and received the resignation of the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate, Michael Stenger, effective immediately. The Sergeant at Arms of the House was also expected to be removed.

It is not clear how many officers were on-duty Wednesday, but the complex is policed by a total of 2,300 officers for 16 acres of ground who protect the 435 House representatives, 100 U.S. senators and their staff. By comparison, the city of Minneapolis has about 840 uniformed officers policing a population of 425,000 in a 6,000-acre area.

US sets COVID death record

The U.S. registered more COVID-19 deaths in a single day than ever before — nearly 3,900 — on the very day the mob attack on the Capitol laid bare some of the same, deep political divisions that have hampered the battle against the pandemic.

The virus is surging in several states, with California hit particularly hard, reporting on Thursday a record two-day total of 1,042 coronavirus deaths. Skyrocketing caseloads there are threatening to force hospitals to ration care and essentially decide who lives and who dies.

"Folks are gasping for breath. Folks look like they're drowning when they are in bed right in front of us," said Dr. Jeffrey Chien, an emergency room physician at Santa Clara Valley Regional Medical Center, urging people to do their part to help slow the spread. "I'm begging everyone to help us out because we aren't the front line. We're the last line."

Meanwhile, the number of Americans who have gotten their first shot of the COVID-19 vaccine climbed to at least 5.9 million Thursday, a one-day gain of about 600,000, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Hundreds of millions will need to be vaccinated to stop the coronavirus.

About 1.9 million people around the world have died of the virus, more than 360,000 in the U.S. alone. December was by far the nation's deadliest month yet, and health experts are warning that January could be more terrible still because of family gatherings and travel over the holidays.

A new, more contagious variant is spreading around the globe and in the U.S. Also, it remains to be seen what effect the thousands of supporters of President Donald Trump who converged this week in Washington, many of them without masks, will have on the spread of the scourge.

On Wednesday, the day a horde of protesters breached the U.S. Capitol, disrupting efforts to certify the election of Joe Biden, the U.S. recorded 3,865 virus deaths, according to Johns Hopkins University.

"The domestic terrorists overran the Capitol police, just as the virus has been allowed to overrun Americans," said Dr. Eric Topol, head of the Scripps Research Translational Institute. "The U.S. lost control of a Trump-incited mob and a Trump-played-down pandemic virus."

Brady excited, ready to lead Buccaneers

Tampa Bay in playoffs for first time since 2007

TAMPA — New team, same old Tom Brady.

The six-time Super Bowl champion who left New England for sunny Florida is in the playoffs for a NFL-record 18th time in 21 years, and eager to build on an ever-expanding legacy in his first post-season appearance with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Bill Belichick and the Patriots are home watching following a historic two-decade run with the 43-year-old quarterback, who's now pumping vitality into a franchise with the worst all-time winning percentage in the four major professional sports.

Brady led New England to the

Super Bowl nine times in 20 seasons, appearing in 41 playoff games and winning 30 — both records.

The Bucs, who will end a 13-year postseason drought when they face Washington in a NFC wild-card game Saturday night, have played 15 playoff games in the club's 45-season history.

"Anytime you make the playoffs, it's a good feeling, and it's a good opportunity to be playing this weekend, a privilege for any of us," Brady said Wednesday.

"We're a team that's made a bunch of improvements over the course of the year, and we have to be at our best. That's what this part of the season is all about," the three-time league MVP added. "The regular season is what it is. You realize you put it in the books, but we're here to win playoff games."

Brady left New England in free agency, signing a two-year, \$50 million contract with the Bucs, who've surrounded him with an All-Star cast of playmakers that includes receivers Mike Evans, Chris Godwin

and Antonio Brown, tight end Rob Gronkowski and running backs Ronald Jones and Leonard Fournette.

An improved defense has helped Brady continue to defy Father Time, too.

"It's amazing because when you're out there watching him in practice, you're like, 'This guy looks like he's 30, maybe 33 at most,'" coach Bruce Arians said.

"It's just amazing watching him and the way he works so hard at taking care of himself. That's not easy at 43, taking a few shots — hopefully not too many — and moving on. ... He really is a freak of nature in that regard."

It's never been Brady's style to call attention to his accomplishments, so he lets his play speak for what he's been able to do this season without benefit of a normal off-season or preseason to prepare for his transition to a new team.

With a franchise-record 40 touchdown passes, he joined Aaron Rodgers, Drew Brees, Peyton Manning

Indians trade star SS Lindor, Carrasco to Mets

New York owner chasing a title

CLEVELAND — The Cleveland Indians traded four-time All-Star shortstop Francisco Lindor and pitcher Carlos Carrasco to the New York Mets on Thursday.

Cleveland obtained infielders Andres Gimenez and Amed Rosario, right-hander Josh Wolf and outfielder Isaiah Greene.

Hedge fund owner Steven Cohen bought the Mets on Nov. 6 from the Wilpon and Katz families and pledges to increase spending.

The 27-year-old Lindor is one of baseball's best all-around players, capable of winning games with his bat, glove or legs. He's a career .285 hitter and averaged 29 homers, 86 RBIs and 21 steals in his six major league seasons — all in Cleveland.

He has also been the face of the Indians' franchise, with an infectious smile and joy for playing that has made him one of Cleveland's most popular athletes.

Carrasco is one of the game's best comeback stories, overcoming leukemia to become one of the AL's steadiest starters. The 33-year-old has a 88-73 career record with a 3.73 ERA.

Once the Indians' pandemic-shortened 2020 season ended with a loss to the New York Yankees in the wild-card round, it became a matter of when, and not if, Lindor would be traded.

Cleveland had run out of options. Lindor has turned down numerous long-term contract offers from the cash-strapped Indians, betting on himself and knowing he could get more

money from a major-market team when he becomes a free agent.

He is only under contract through the 2021 season, so the Mets will have to quickly get to work on locking him up long-term.

The Indians made it known that Lindor was available for the right price. And while it's never easy to trade a generational talent with perhaps his best years still ahead of him, Cleveland's financial situation was never going to make it possible to keep him.

Cohen is hoping to turn around a franchise that has not won a World Series since 1986.

Cohen hired general manager Brodie Van Wagenen and brought back former GM Sandy Alderson as team president and hired Jared Porter from Arizona as GM under Alderson.

Increasing spending, the Mets kept pitcher Marcus Stroman for an \$18.9 million qualifying offer, signed right-hander Trevor May to a \$15.5 million, two-year contract and catcher James McCann, to a \$40.6 million, four-year deal. New York also signed injured right-hander Noah Syndergaard to a \$9.7 million, one-year deal.

Plenty of future pros

NFL prospects everywhere in Alabama-Ohio State title game

Former LSU linebacker Patrick Queen is a good example of how a huge performance in a national championship game can help a player boost his NFL draft stock.

Queen was a rising prospect throughout last season and capped it by being the defensive MVP of the College Football Playoff championship victory against Clemson. About three and half months later, Queen was selected in the first round by the Baltimore Ravens at No. 28 overall.

No. 1 Alabama and No. 3 Ohio State head into the national title game Monday night with a slew of future NFL players. The matchups will not only determine who wins a championship, but could also influence where some of their stars are drafted.

"You do want to look into a player's ability to play in the clutch and in the big moments because obviously when you're putting together a football team, an NFL roster, your goal is to be playing in the playoffs," said Jim Nagy, Senior Bowl executive director and a former NFL scout. "So you want to look at the consequential games. The games that really matter."

Alabama center Landon Dickerson, who is out with a knee injury, and guard Deonte Brown have already accepted invitations to the Senior Bowl on Jan. 30, Nagy said. Heisman Trophy-winning receiver DeVonta Smith, star running back Najee Harris and tackle Alex Leatherwood have also been invited.

For Ohio State, center Josh Myers, running back Trey Sermon, linebackers Tuf Borland and Barron Browning, and defensive end Jonathon Cooper plan to take part in the Senior Bowl, Nagy said. Invitations have also been extended to defensive tackle Haskell Garrett and linebacker Pete Werner.

There are perhaps 20 players who could potentially be drafted in April after playing for the Crimson Tide and Buckeyes.

QUARTERBACKS

Ohio State's Justin Fields was amazing against Clemson, throwing six touchdown passes and showing off accuracy and arm strength all over the field. He also displayed poise and toughness, playing most of the game after taking a nasty hit to his side.

That came after an inconsistent and truncated season that has called into question Fields' status as the best available QB behind Trevor Lawrence.

"There's a lot of buzz around the league about (BYU's) Zach Wilson being the No. 2 pick in the draft behind Lawrence," said Dane Brugler, a draft analyst for The Athletic. "Fields, with what he did, it changed that a little bit. He's making teams

kind of go back and reconsider."

The Alabama defense has had some bumpy moments, but it is still the most talented group Ohio State has faced, starting with SEC defensive player of the year Patrick Surtain III. The junior will probably be the first cornerback drafted if he declares.

Plus, Fields will be tested by Alabama schematically.

"Give (Tide coach) Nick Saban 10 days to figure you out and to find your weaknesses, that's terrifying," said Matt Miller of NFL Draft Scout.

Alabama quarterback Mac Jones is among the second tier of quarterbacks in the upcoming draft that includes Florida's Kyle Trask and maybe SMU's Shane Buechele.

Jones has been superb, but he doesn't have athletic traits comparable to Fields and Lawrence.

Jones is surrounded by top-end talent, and offensive coordinator Steve Sarkisian has done a good job of scheming receivers open and creating mismatches.

"He's a very, very difficult evaluation because how do you separate him from just an elite situation," Brugler said of Jones.

Especially on the heels of former Alabama star Tua Tagovailoa's rookie NFL season, which was solid but far from spectacular.

WADE'S WORLD

Ohio State cornerback Shaun Wade made the All-America team, but that was a generous evaluation based on reputation and last year's play when he was a nickelback and slot corner.

His move to the outside this season has been spotty at best and indicative of Ohio State's cornerback play in general. Now,

he gets to face Smith, a sure first-rounder, and the gemstone of Alabama's prolific passing game.

"If I'm Alabama and Steve Sarkisian, I'm getting DeVonta Smith on (Wade's) side of the field as much as humanly possible because no one has been able to stop him," Miller said.

Brugler said Wade's future might still lie at safety.

"At the same time, if he goes out there and performs at a high level against Smith, then all of a sudden that's a different conversation," Brugler said. "But based on what we've seen from Shaun Wade this year, it just doesn't seem like a realistic possibility."

IN THE TRENCHES

Alabama defensive tackle Christian Barmore is a third-team All-American and a third-year sophomore, so he is no sure thing to enter the draft.

The 310-pounder has not played at a consistently high level that would make him a lock first-rounder. Still, Brugler said the defensive line class is thin at the top of this draft and Barmore has a chance to be best of the bunch.

Barmore will face a good test in Ohio State's interior line. All-America guard Wyatt Davis and Meyers are likely Day 2 draft picks with bottom of the first-round potential.

SERMON DELIVERS

Ohio State running back Trey Sermon has gone on a remarkable late-season tear with 636 yards rushing in his last three games. He should expect to see a lot of linebackers Dylan Moses and Christian Harris, the top two tacklers for the Crimson Tide.

Nagy said Sermon looked like a potential starting NFL running back before injuring his knee last season while at Oklahoma.

"He's gotten his opportunity these past few weeks there for Ohio State and he's taken full advantage of those, but to do it against a Nick Saban defense in a national championship game would just be that next level for him," Nagy said.

and Dan Marino as the only quarterbacks to throw at least 40 in multiple seasons. It also tied Russell Wilson for the second most in the league this year behind's Rodgers' 48.

"When he first signed I said, 'OK, we'll be a 40 (touchdown) and 10 (interception) team,'" Ariens said. "I was expecting practice, I was expecting OTAs and those things. What he's done with none of that — especially this last half of the season — is incredible."

Brady enters the playoffs coming off throwing for 1,067 yards and 10 touchdowns over the last eight quarters he played. He rallied the Bucs from double-digit deficits to win four times this season and has thrown for at least two TDs in seven consecutive games.

"As a player, he really hasn't changed," Gronkowski, the quarterback's favorite target in New England, said. "From the second I first met him, he's been all-in — all-in with practices, all-in at meetings, all-in trying to get better every single day."

In some ways, Brady has exceeded Ariens' expectations.

"His leadership is beyond anything I've ever seen. Peyton Manning is the only thing close," said Ariens, who's worked with Manning, Ben Roethlisberger, Carson Palmer and Andrew Luck while establishing a reputation as a quarterback whisperer.

"It's a never-ending thing with him, the perfectionist, to get everything right in practice," Ariens added. "Also, his calmness on the sideline in games when we're not winning, saying 'We're going to win.' Those type of things. You put those in a bottle and you make a bunch of money."

It hasn't been all rosy. While the Bucs went 10-0 against teams that failed to make the playoffs, they were 1-5 against opponents that earned berths. Brady had 10 touchdown passes and nine interceptions in the losses.

When Ariens, who doesn't sugarcoat his assessment of quarterbacks, spoke publicly about Brady's early inconsistency many wondered if there was a rift developing between player and coach.

A four-game winning streak to end the regular season put that notion to rest.

"I feel like we have a great relationship. From the moment I got here, we've just had great dialogue and I certainly appreciate all the insight he gives me and the way he coaches and leads," Brady said.

"It's very open, honest dialogue about how we think, certainly how I can be most effective," Brady added. "Any questions he has, we always have a great, open line of communication. I really enjoy my time getting to know him, and I have great admiration for him as a coach, as a man, as what he is off the field and how he commands and leads the team."






Citrus writer publishes 'Inner Voices'

author of 'Inner Voices'


