### 'Freedom Week' to offer sales

TALLAHASSEE — Florida is about to find out how much a week of sales-tax "freedom" translates into capitalism.

Starting Thursday, in what lawmakers dubbed "Freedom Week," people will receive sales-tax breaks when they make a wide range of purchases that could help spur them to be more active after being limited by the coronavirus pandemic.

Shoppers from Thursday through July 7 will be able to avoid paying all or part of sales taxes on purchases such as grills; bicycles; fishing and camping gear; kayaks and canoes; tickets for concerts, movies and ball games; gym memberships; boxes of softballs and sleeves of tennis balls; and even sunscreen.

The tax package also includes a more-traditional tax "holiday" for back-to-school shoppers that will start in late July and last 10 days.

## Former CCSO detective dies

For 29 years, Gary Atchison rose through the ranks within the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, serving as a patrol deputy, detective and School

Resource Deputy.

Atchison, who retired from the sheriff's office in July 2015, was found dead Monday, June 28, by the son of a former colleague while vacationing in the Florida Keys. He was 64.

"I was shocked when I got the phone call," Dave Gallant said, noting his son,

daughter-in-law and granddaughter had lunch with Atchison on Friday.

Gallant said his son visited Atchison again Sunday night, and went to see him Monday morning when he discovered Atchison dead.

"It wasn't an easy thing to find out that way," Gallant said.

Atchison will most likely be remembered for his work alongside Detective Scott Grace on the Jessica Lunsford case, which received international attention.

Their investigations into the February 2005 kidnapping and murder of the 8-year-old

### Owner loses custody due to alleged cruelty

"Simply shocking to the conscience."

That's how Citrus County Judge Bruce Carney described Beautiful's injury of neglect before he said the canine's master could no longer own an animal in the county.

"For whatever reason, he maliciously tortured Beautiful," the judge said of Crystal River-area 30-year-old Aaron Cornelius Barrett during a civil hearing the afternoon of Monday, June 28.

Favoring a county petition, Carney's decision came after Dr. Meaghan Mielo, chief veterinarian of Citrus County Animal Services, talked him through a photo collection of a large, open wound to the top of the 3-year-old pit bull terrier's left forelimb.

Mielo said three inches of bone were exposed, causing a severe infection along with an infestation of maggots. Beautiful's

ligaments also became distorted, forcing her to walk atop her wrist.

"I hope she will be able to keep the limb but it'll never return to full-capacity," the

veterinarian testified. "(Barrett) has not met the community standard of care for animals."

## Tourism tax revenue soars

Tourists, it seems, are on the move again — if bed tax money is any indication.

Citrus County collected 95% more in tourist tax revenue in April than it did one year earlier.

In April 2021, the state sent the county a check for \$271,040 in bed tax revenue, compared to \$138,354 in April 2020, the first full month of the pandemic.

"That's the highest since we started collecting 5%," Citrus County Visitors Bureau Director John Pricher said.

In 2018, county commissioners increased the tourist tax from 3% to 5%.

Revenue from the fifth cent goes into a line-item account in the TDC budget for tourism-related capital projects.

The numbers were even better in May.

The bed tax revenue in May was \$227,646, up 411% from last year's \$44,487. Of course, last May was the height of the pandemic so the comparable numbers this year look especially good. Nobody was staying at local hotels back then.

The tourist (or bed) tax is levied on people who stay at hotels, motels, See TOURISM/Page A8

## CCSO detective could see charges dropped

A judge gave a chance for Stephen Paul Conley to resolve his felony case without convictions of drug-possession charges he was arrested for after resigning as a Citrus County lawman.

During Conley's court appearance Tuesday, June 29, over Zoom, Circuit Judge Richard "Ric" Howard approved the Homosassa

47-year-old to enroll in pre-trial intervention for substance abuse.

Brian Trehy, Conley's lawyer, asked Howard to qualify his client for the intensive and stringent drug counseling program, which, if Conley completes, could lead to the dismissal of his five drug-possession charges.

If Conley fails, the State Attorney's Office will resume prosecution.

Along with outlawing Barrett from owning or contacting animals in the future, Carney also ordered Beautiful, five of Barrett's other dogs and four of his rabbits over to ownership of county animal services.

Carney also instructed Barrett to pay the county \$6,486 for the veterinarian treatment it's given his animals. Barrett, who didn't appear to the hearing, has 30 days to appeal Carney's findings.

Officers with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office Animal Control Unit seized the animals May 26 from Barrett's home on the 1800 block of North Scenic Way, before deputies arrested Barrett.

Animal Control Unit Supervisor Lora Peckham told Carney her officers saw the dogs were either living in small and unshaded kennels or were being unlawfully tethered, violating county ordinances.

Along with having fleas, Mielo said, many of the dogs also tested positive for hookworms, whipworms and heartworms.

According to his arrest report, Barrett told authorities another dog attacked Beautiful a couple weeks ago while she was with a friend.

Barrett said he knew Beautiful was injured but didn't seek care for her because he thought the regular injections of penicillin he was giving her would suffice, Peckham said.

In connection to Beautiful's sufferings, the State Attorney's Office charged Barrett June 21 with aggravated animal cruelty — a felony punishable by up to five years in state prison.

Barrett's lawyer, Assistant Public Defender Luke Waatti, pleaded not guilty on behalf of his present client Monday during Barrett's arraignment before

Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard.

Howard scheduled Aug. 19 as Barrett's next courtroom appearance.

It will be sometime before Beautiful fully recovers, but she still has her leg and her high spirits.

With a songful howl and a swinging tail, Beautiful expressed her gratitude June 23 to Mielo, Peckham and the other animal control and shelter personnel who've healed her.

"She is doing so well," Peckham told the Chronicle. "When she came in, the entire front of her leg was missing — all the way down

to the bone; you could see tendons, you could see everything inside."

After around 10 days, tissue formed over Beautiful's wound, requiring bandage changes every other day instead of daily. June 23 was also Beautiful's first day without a splint on her leg.

Mielo told the Chronicle it's unclear what injured Beautiful, but it was unlikely another dog.

"It's hard to say since the injury was so old and there was so much damage from insects, infection and everything," she said, "but there are no other

wounds on her that would support her being attacked by a dog."

If the county's custody over her stands, Beautiful will be up for adoption. Knowing when that could be will be up to her period of recovery, which might include long-term medical foster care.

"All of the staff have been involved in her care and have been rooting for her," said Mielo, who's been assisted by lead veterinarian technician Stephanie Daniell and vet tech Erin Cagwin. "Everyone here is in love with her."

Animal abuse should be reported to authorities either when it's happening or when it's been documented.

Witnesses can submit anonymous tips to Citrus County Crimes Stoppers by calling 888-269-8477.

Peckham said outside pets, especially during the summer, should have a collar or harness, fresh water and shelter from the elements — a kennel no smaller than 80 square feet per dog.

Although not recommended, tethering can be used if the leash is

longer than 20 feet, is not used as a primary method of containment and the animal's owner can see them.

"You can't just wrap a chain around their neck," Peckham said.

Peckham, Mielo and Animal Services Director Colleen Yarbrough said the relationship between the county sheriff's office and animal services hasn't been this strong in a long time.

With experience in field-training and forensics, staff at the animal shelter have been reporting stronger evidence of abuses to Peckham and her officers to bring forth for prosecution.

This includes the fatal cyst in Bennie, a chihuahua whose Inverness owner, Kevin Lee Thompson, was sentenced in May to five years in prison for not getting the dog treated.

"Our partnership has made it possible for arrests to happen and for felonies to go forward," Mielo said, "which has never been the case around here."

"We're seeing that so much now," Peckham added, "that the sad endings are few and far between."

**Man gets life sentence for molesting girl**

TAMPA — A judge ordered a life sentence for a 43-year-old Florida man who molested a 10-year-old girl and then doused her in bleach to destroy evidence.

Jurors in Tampa found Lewis Matthews guilty of four felonies following a three-day trial earlier in June, the Tampa Bay Times reported.

Prosecutors said the girl told investigators — and later the court — about falling asleep on the living room floor on April 13, 2019. She said about 3:30 a.m., Matthews woke her up and molested her.

He was interrupted when her mother heard a noise and came downstairs. She was "stunned by what she discovered," prosecutors said, and quickly dialed 911, the newspaper reported.

As she was on the phone, Matthews grabbed the girl and two other children in the home and put them in a car. He drove to a gas station, took the child inside and grabbed a bottle of bleach off the shelf, prosecutors said. He took the child into the store's bathroom, ordered the girl to remove her clothing and doused her in bleach.

**CWOW Academy slots open**

*Accelerated learning program will allow students to progress at their own pace*

The New CWOW Academy, set to open this fall for the 2021-22 school year, is still looking for "motivated" students in grades 3 through 12 to fill the 15 openings for the A.C.E. — Accelerated Christian Education — self-paced program.

As retired Citrus County educator and the school's director/administrator

Scott Waters explained, the school isn't the typical "stand in front of the class and deliver a lesson" program, but an individualized plan for each student that's based on a diagnostic test.

"I recently returned from training in Tennessee at the A.C.E. Academy in Hendersonville and we're continuing to actively enroll (students)," Waters said.

The A.C.E. Bible-based curriculum is divided into bite-sized, achievable

units called PACEs with each level consisting of 12 PACEs in each subject.

Students work at their own pace and once they score an 80% on the PACE test, they move on to the next unit.

According to the ACE Ministries website, with minimal assistance, PACEs allow students to absorb subject material according to their own learning ability rather than being pushed

forward or held back by their age.

The program allows "overachievers" to complete early.

The school is on-site at the New Church Without Walls, 300 S. Kensington Ave. in Lecanto, next to the Holiday Inn Express.

**Officials vow thorough inquiries**

SURFSIDE, Florida — Elected officials pledged Tuesday to conduct multiple investigations into the collapse of an oceanfront Florida condo tower, vowing to convene a grand jury and to look closely "at every possible angle" to prevent any other building from experiencing such a catastrophic failure.

Miami-Dade County Mayor Daniella Levine Cava said she and her staff will meet with engineering, construction and geology experts, among others, to review building safety issues and develop recommendations "to ensure a tragedy like this will never, ever happen again."

State Attorney Katherine Fernandez Rundle said she will pursue a grand jury investigation to examine

factors and decisions that led to Thursday's collapse of the 12-story Champlain Towers South in Surfside. Another victim was recovered Tuesday, bringing the confirmed death toll to 12, with 149 people unaccounted for. Even as officials looked to the future, they were resolute in vowing to continue the effort to find survivors.

On the sixth day of a painstaking search, Gov. Ron DeSantis evoked a well-known military commitment to leave no one behind on the battlefield and pledged to do the same for the people still missing in the rubble.

"The way I look at it, as an old Navy guy, is when somebody is missing in action, in the military, you're missing until you're found. We don't stop the search," DeSantis said at a news conference.

**Inverness not likely to raise tax rate**

Inverness City Manager Eric Williams will ask his city council to keep the city's ad valorem tax rate at last year's level when council members meet next.

The council members are slated to set their tentative millage rate Tuesday, July 6, during their regularly scheduled public meeting. Williams' proposed 2021-2022 rate will be 7.9730.

Once set, Florida law allows the council to lower the tentative rate but not to raise it. The council will meet at 212 W. Main St. in Inverness.

Council president David Ryan said the current property tax rate is at a

good place given how Inverness residents and businesses are trying to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I feel comfortable with that (millage rate)," Ryan said. "It's hard to please everybody. I think we're doing our best to minimize impacts to residents and businesses for that matter."

The proposed millage rate, which mirrors last year's rate, was also last year's rollback rate. Before then, it had been 8.2729.

The rollback rate is the millage rate which would generate the same amount of property tax as the previous year. So if the value of taxable property in the city increases, the rollback rate decreases.

The Citrus County Property Appraiser is scheduled to release on July 1 his preliminary estimate for the city's taxable value.

One mill in property, or ad valorem, taxes is equal to \$1 for each \$1,000 of the property's taxable value.

So if a property is worth \$75,000, after homestead exemptions, the property owner's city property taxes will be \$597.96. That does not include county or school taxes.

When the city property appraiser releases his preliminary value of the city, the council will better understand how much its proposed millage will generate. Last year it generated nearly \$4 million.

"We're trying to hold the line on taxes," Ryan said. "In the future we might

have to do something, but for now I think that's a good idea to keep it the same."

"It shows we are doing our best in holding the line, but we still have to provide services," he said. "And if we reduce services ... no one wants that."

"In the future (when the economy better recovers) we'll have more wiggle room," he said.

Williams said that the property appraiser's evaluation of the city's value will tell him more. It could also be an avenue to lower the millage to help residents and especially businesses, if the city's value increases, Williams told the Chronicle.

One possibility is to determine the millage rate by setting the preliminary

millage at 7.9730 and adding the percentage of growth and subtracting 3%, he said. That could lead to a small decrease in property taxes for many but still reflect growth in the final millage rate, he said.

Even if it results in a small decrease in property taxes, say 1%, Williams said, that 1% makes a difference for many businesses.

Studies have already shown that the city depends too much on commercial taxes, he said. A small decrease may not mean much to residents, "but it makes a big difference for commercial property owners."

**Steel plate saves man from axe blows to head**

*Woman charged with attempted murder*

A steel plate in the back of a man's skull may have saved him after a Hernando woman allegedly struck his head with an axe.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office authorities arrested 30-year-old Casandra Brooke Hallmark on Saturday, June 26, on a charge of attempted premeditated murder with a deadly weapon.

Hallmark was jailed without a bond.

According to Hallmark's arrest report, the sheriff's office was dispatched Saturday to a report of a man being struck by a double-sided medieval axe at a Hernando address. Hallmark, who a witness identified as the man's alleged attacker, had run away.

Deputies questioned the man, who said he and another man were working on a water pump when he felt a thump on the rear of his head, stunning him before he felt a second impact.

Deputies noted an inch-long cut to the back of the man's head, a couple of inches

away from the top of his spinal cord. "It was later discovered that the victim had a steel plate inserted into the back of his skull," Hallmark's arrest report states, "which may have contributed to him becoming dazed."

According to the arrest report, the man said he saw the other man yelling at Hallmark, who was holding the axe above her head before the other man disarmed her and chased her away.

Deputies spoke to the man who witnessed the alleged attack.

He corroborated the injured man's statements, adding Hallmark, who is homeless, stayed in a shed on his property the evening before. He said he let Hallmark into his house to get cigarettes when she must have grabbed the weapon from off his wall display.

Hallmark's statements to deputies were redacted in her arrest report.

**Man flees cops after motorcycle crash**

A 28-year-old Brooksville man ran afoul of Citrus County sheriff's deputies on Saturday, June 26, according to an arrest affidavit.

Jacob Ray Mitchell was charged with possession of a controlled substance, driving while license suspended/revoked — knowingly, resist officer without violence, fleeing/eluding LEO and drug paraphernalia. Bond was set at \$6,500.

According to the report, Deputy Rudy Danner observed a multicolored motorcycle traveling west on Gulf-to-Lake Highway late Saturday night with no license plate and no brake light. Upon activating his emergency lights, the motorcycle made an abrupt right hand turn and sped through the Brannen Bank parking lot onto North Crede Avenue.

During the pursuit, the motorcycle driver, later identified as Mitchell, looked back at the police

cruiser several times while accelerating up to speeds of 50 mph. The driver then made an abrupt left hand turn into a yard in the 2400 block of North Crede Avenue. Mitchell then made his way southbound on North Crede Avenue, where an assisting deputy saw him crash the motorcycle in the road then flee into a wooded area.

Deputies found Mitchell in waist-deep water 15 yards from the road. After finally complying with orders, deputies handcuffed the defendant. Upon searching him, authorities found a glass pipe with methamphetamine residue wrapped in socks in his pocket. In his pants pocket, they found a baggie with 1.13 grams of methamphetamine.

After running his information through a database, deputies learned Mitchell's license had been suspended or revoked for failure to pay a traffic fine May 24.

Mitchell was transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility.

ATHENS, Greece — A painting donated to Greece by Pablo Picasso will go back on display at the newly renovated National Gallery in Athens following its recovery more than nine years after it was stolen and the arrest of a 49-year-old construction worker as a suspect.
Authorities said Tuesday that Picasso's "Woman's Head" and a work by the Dutch master Piet Mondrian, "Stammer Mill with Summer House," were stolen in January 2012 from the National Gallery in Athens.

They were recovered, wrapped in plastic sheets and hidden in a dry river bed outside Athens after the suspect was detained for questioning.

The Picasso work of a female in cubist style was donated to Greece in 1949 with a dedication "in homage to the Greek people" for their resistance against the German-led occupation in World War II.

"This painting is of special importance and emotional value as the great painter personally dedicated it to the Greek people for their struggle against fascist and Nazi (occupying) forces and bears his hand-written dedication," Culture Minister Lina Mendoni said.

"That is why this painting was impossible not only to sell but even to put on display as it would be immediately identified as being stolen from the National Gallery." The National Gallery was recently reopened after a major renovation that lasted nine years and was delayed for months due to the pandemic. Mendoni did not say when the recovered works would go back on display.

The suspect is a Greek man who is believed to have acted alone, police said. They were investigating his claim that a third stolen work, a drawing of a religious scene by Italian 16th-century painter Guglielmo Caccia, was damaged and discarded shortly after the 2012 break in.

Legendary big-wave surfer Greg 'Da Bull' Noll dies at 84

LOS ANGELES — Greg "Da Bull" Noll, who became a surfing legend by combining a gregarious, outsized personality with the courage and skill to ride bigger, more powerful waves than anyone had ever attempted, has died. He was 84.

Noll, who had lived in the picturesque, seaside town of Crescent City, California, died Monday of natural causes, according to an Instagram post from his son's company, Noll

Surfboards. Requests for comment from the Noll family were not immediately returned, and it was not clear where he died.

One of the first and arguably one of the greatest big-wave riders, Noll was much more than a surfer. He was also an entrepreneur who helped transform the sport with his Greg Noll surfboards, which were among the first to be built from balsa wood, a substance that made them more maneuverable and light enough for most people to use.

He also appeared in numerous surfing documentaries, worked as a photographer on the 1967 film "Surfari" and was the stunt double for James Mitchum in the 1964 film "Ride the Wild Surf."

It was the towering waves he caught, coupled with a blunt but friendly manner, that made Noll's reputation.

From the early 1950s through the 1960s, he traveled from Southern California to Mexico, Australia and the North Shore of Hawaii's island of Oahu in search of the biggest waves.

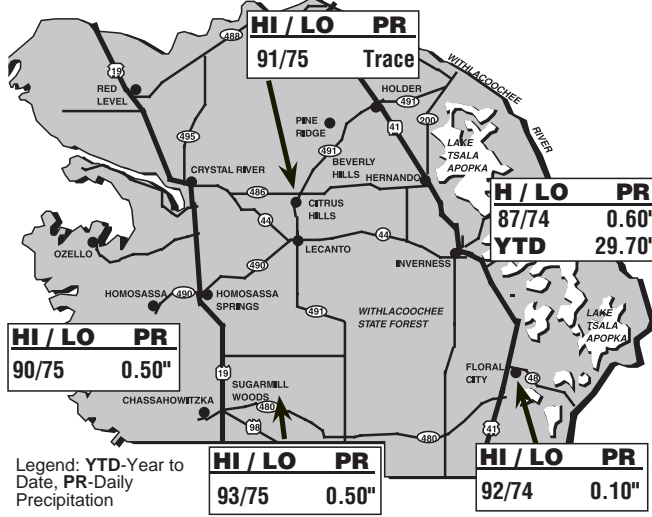

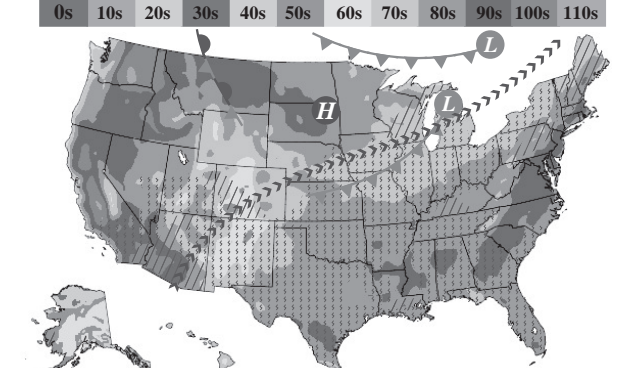

Homosassa girl, led to the arrest and March 2007 conviction of John Couey.

"He was extremely committed and devoted to whatever case he was on; not just that one case, but any case," said James Martone, a close friend and former colleague of Atchison's at the sheriff's office. "I knew he was someone who was going to find justice for Jessica.

"We were very close with the family; we still are to this day," Martone added. "We had that connection. ... He gave (the case) a personal touch, it wasn't just about Jessica. It became about the family. He put his heart into everything, including his work."

The Lunsford case took its toll on Atchison, Gallant said.

"I know the case wore him down," he said, "you never think of a case like that happening in Citrus County. Gary stayed in contact with the grandparents. He felt like he needed to keep connected with them.

"(The case) did affect him. I think it hurt him bad," Gallant added. "No. 1, it was a tough case; No. 2, it was such a bad case."

His death, Martone said, sent a shockwave throughout the law enforcement community, and throughout the community he protected.

"Most importantly, we lost an advocate for Citrus County," he said about Atchison, a graduate of Citrus High School. "He was just a great, great friend, Citrus County lost a dear friend."

Both Atchison and Gallant shared the road together as zone partners, working as partners for seven years on a crime suppression unit in the 1990s.

"We had a lot of fun, Gary and I," Gallant said. "We knocked down quite a bit of property crimes. We had a unique relationship ... but as far as personality, we were like water and oil — not that I was mean — it

just clicked for us two to work together."

Atchison "had a good heart, he was a fun guy and he was very outgoing," Gallant said. "He got to know a lot of people throughout the year. Anytime we went somewhere, I don't care where we were, there was always someone that he knew. He was a funny guy. Everyone loved him; he had a great personality."

Retired Citrus County Sheriff's Office detective Luther Willis remembers Atchison as professional, thorough and complete, yet compassionate when dealing with people — "he was a joy to work with."

Willis added that Atchison's death hit him especially hard.

"Our careers paralleled each other," he said. "Sometimes we worked the same assignment and sometimes we didn't, but we always had a good working relationship with each other and helped each other when needed. We worked a lot of property crimes together ... and then later on he worked major crimes cases."

Atchison was a friend of Danny Linhart's older brother, so Linhart grew up with him. Linhart started with the sheriff's office in 1993, and Atchison was the first guy he knew.

"The biggest thing about Gary, he worked good cases and was always

willing to jump into something," said Linhart, a retired sheriff's office major. "He came to work with the attitude: 'Let's get it done.' He'd say, 'Some things will work out, some things won't, but we're going to win in the end. We're going to do the right thing for people' ... Gary always did the right things for the right reasons."

Atchison started at the sheriff's office shortly after Capt. Joe Eckstein began his career there.

"We basically worked together throughout our entire careers," said Eckstein, who retired in February 2016. "We were on the Sheriff's Emergency Response Team together for several years. A good friend, a great co-worker and just a really, really nice guy."

"I'm still in shock over his passing. I'm going to miss his unique laugh and great sense of humor."

Melissa Bowermaster, executive director of the Citrus County Children's Advocacy Center — Jessie's Place, worked alongside Atchison in the Lunsford case as a member of the sheriff's office's victim advocate unit.

"He was certainly a very dedicated detective; he loved law enforcement, he was very compassionate with victims, particularly with the Lunsford family," she said. "On a personal side, he was funny, a good

person to be around ... a light-hearted, good-spirited person."

While Martone said his late friend will forever be linked to the high-profile case, he noted Citrus County should realize Atchison's personal approach to his career set him apart.

"He never met a stranger," said Martone, who began his career as an SRD while Atchison, a fellow Dolphins fan, closed out his career as one.

County Commissioner Jeff Kinnard and Atchison became friends during the latter part of his law enforcement career when Atchison served as an SRD at Citrus High, where Kinnard's children attended.

"I mean, wow ... (the news) caught me off guard," Kinnard said. "It's

heartbreaking. It was ... he's just such, honestly, a great guy. If you knew Gary, you absolutely loved the guy. He never met a stranger, I know it's over used, but that was Gary.

"I just had a very, very heavy heart when I heard the news. He was one of the good guys for sure."

Tod Cloud, a retired law officer of over 30 years, said his path crossed with Atchison's many times as a Florida Highway Patrol trooper and Crystal River policeman.

"I've known him for a long time, and it's just very sad," he said. "He was a very fine, wonderful deputy ... It's just a big loss ... God has his masterplan and, unfortunately, that was part of his plan for whatever reason."

Kinnard encouraged others to live their retirement

much like Atchison did. "In his retirement years, each time he would head to the Keys ... he'd always post photos on Facebook," Kinnard said. "I would make comments such as, 'This is how you're supposed to live retirement, you're doing it the right way.'

"If you've been to the Keys, there's a long blue wall, everyone recognizes it, everyone. He'd send me a picture of that, make a Facebook post, 'Heading back, this one is for you.' That type of thing, he had great fun with it. Gary Atchison was living his best life in retirement."

Willis said after they retired, he and Atchison, along with other retired local law enforcement officers, would meet periodically at Coach's in Inverness for an "Old Detectives Group" lunch and gabfest.

"Gary enjoyed life and lived every day to the fullest," he said. "And if there's bourbon and cigars in heaven, we know what he and (fellow detective) Jerry Dixon are doing."

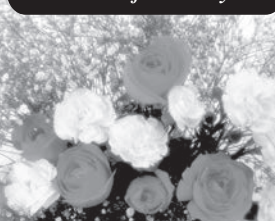
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# First African American named to lead US Forest Service

WASHINGTON — Veteran forester Randy Moore has been named chief of the U.S. Forest Service, the first African American to lead the agency in its 116-year history.

Moore, 66, replaces Vicki Christiansen, who has led the agency since 2018. The Forest Service, a division of the Agriculture Department, oversees 193 million acres of public lands in 154 national forests and 20 national grasslands.

Moore has served as regional forester in the California-based Pacific Southwest Region since 2007, where he has responsibility for 18 national forests in California and Hawaii.

He will take over from Christiansen as head of the 30,000-employee agency upon her retirement July 26. Christiansen and Moore will collaborate on what is already shaping up as a severe wildfire season in the West, where an epic drought, complicated by climate change, has made putting out fires more challenging and strained firefighting resources throughout the region.

In the Pacific Northwest, where an extended heat wave has triggered record-breaking temperatures in Oregon and Washington state, fire crews have been positioned in high-risk areas, and cities and counties have imposed burn bans.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack, who appointed Moore, called him "a catalyst for change and

creativity" in carrying out the Forest Service's mission to sustain the nation's forests.

As a regional forester, Moore has been on the forefront of climate change, most notably leading the region's response to the dramatic increase in catastrophic wildfires in California over the past decade, Vilsack said. "His proven track record of supporting and developing employees and putting communities at the center of the Forest Service's work positions him well to lead the agency into the future at this critical time in our country," Vilsack said in a statement.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., praised Moore's selection as Forest

Service chief.

"California understands all too well the challenges facing our forests and I'm glad a Californian will head efforts to tackle them," she said.

Arkansas Rep. Bruce Westerman, the top Republican on the House Natural Resources Committee, called Moore "a seasoned professional," adding: "I sincerely hope we can work together on mitigating catastrophic wildfires, opening up our national forests to sustainable lumber harvesting, making forests more resilient against insects and diseases and much more."

Before heading the Pacific Southwest region, Moore was regional forester in the Wisconsin-based Eastern Region, where he oversaw forests in 20 states.

Moore started his federal career in 1978 at USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service in North Dakota. He has worked at national forests in Colorado, North Carolina and Missouri, a national grassland in Kansas and as an administrator in Washington.

Moore's appointment comes as Congress and the Biden administration push to increase firefighter pay and convert at least 1,000 seasonal wildland firefighters to year-round workers as fires have grown more severe. President Joe Biden last week called for an increase in pay for federal firefighters, who start as low as \$13 an hour.

"That's a ridiculously low salary to pay federal firefighters," Biden said. "That's going to end in my administration."

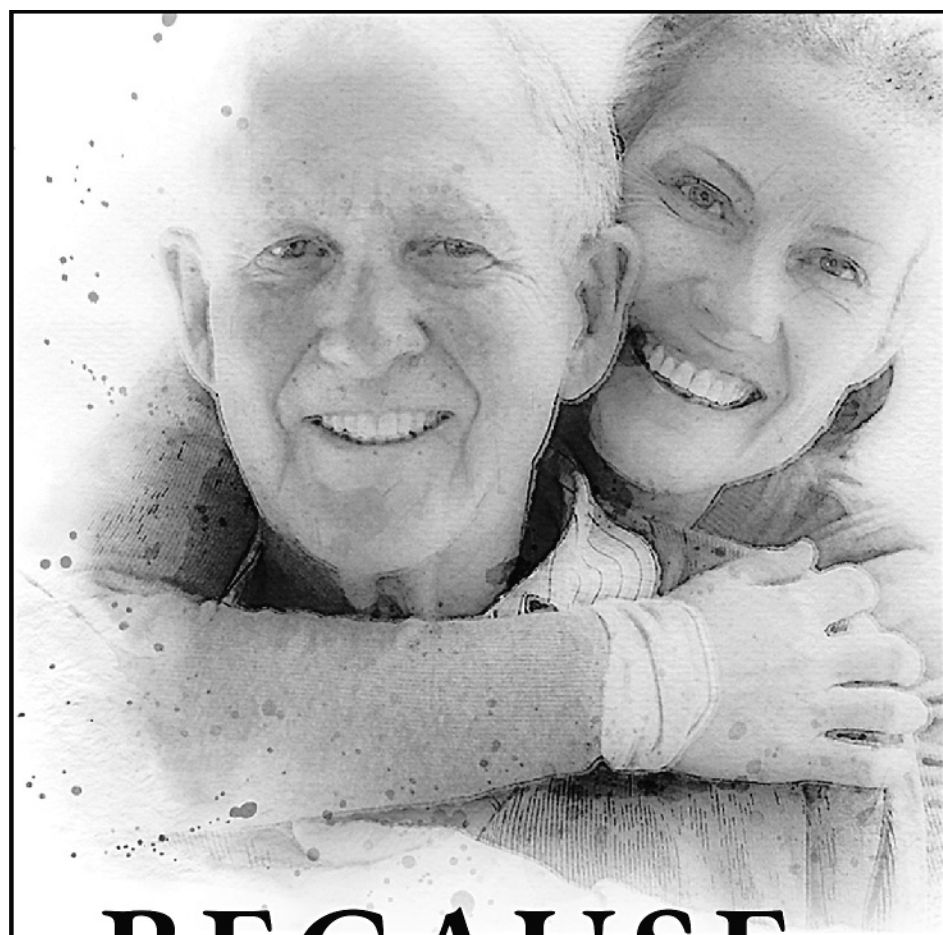

Judges can enroll willing drug offenders with two or fewer nonviolent felony charges or convictions into the supervised pretrial intervention program while their case continues, according to Florida law.

Howard set a fallback date of Aug. 24 for Conley to sign up.

Assistant State Attorney Nick Caporicci told Howard he didn't offer Conley pretrial intervention because of his prior 20-year career with the Citrus County Sheriff's Office.

"He should've known better," the prosecutor said.

Conley faces a prison sentence of up to 25 years if he's convicted as charged.

Trehy argued Conley left the agency as a detective sergeant six months before his Feb. 27 arrest.

"This was not connected to his employment in any way," the attorney said.

According to prior reports, Conley resigned from the sheriff's office's Criminal Investigations Division in lieu of Sheriff Mike Prendergast firing him as discipline for being stopped a couple days earlier by deputies for driving away from a known drug house.

Deputies jailed Conley

during a Beverly Hills traffic stop after allegedly discovering 2.5 grams of methamphetamine, 12 oxycodone pills, a morphine pill, a clonazepam pill and 0.6 grams of fentanyl in Conley's vehicle.

Deputies also found a glass pipe coated with meth residue in between the driver's seat and center console, and a holstered pistol next to the seatbelt buckle.

Conley was released from custody a few days later after posting bail on a \$11,000 bond.

Trehy said Conley was prescribed painkillers after suffering a previous injury, leading to Conley's addiction to illegal narcotics and his eventual arrest. Since then, Trehy said, Conley has been receiving drug-treatment services at The Centers.

Howard said it "would be violative of simple equity" if he treated Conley "different than any other citizen" who was also eligible for pretrial intervention.

## Plea-or-set hearing set for woman's sex-battery case

Howard on Tuesday scheduled Aug. 24 for when he expects Homosassa 38-year-old Jamie Rene Tobey to either change her not-guilty plea or stand trial on accusations she and an

accomplice restrained and sexually abused an 18-year-old woman in October.

Tobey faces charges of sexual battery and principal to sexual battery, and could be sentenced to up to 30 years in prison if convicted.

Tobey's codefendant, Beverly Hills 40-year-old Anthony Reed, was arrested a couple days before Tobey in December.

Reed was charged with sexual battery and false imprisonment, and faces a prison term of up to 20 years if convicted.

His trial was set for the week of Nov. 29, and he has a final pretrial hearing Nov. 8.

Pamela Bauman, Tobey's lawyer, told Howard on Tuesday the woman Tobey and Reed are accused of sexually abusing while she was cleaning Reed's home said in a deposition Tobey didn't abuse her. Caporicci refuted Bauman's interpretation of the woman's statements.

campgrounds, RV parks and short-term rentals. The tax is mostly borne by tourists and has no impact on residents.

Even more telling: the bed tax collected in April and May was higher even than pre-pandemic numbers.

■ April 2021's \$271,040 was 26% higher than April 2019, when the county netted \$213,824.

■ May 2021's \$227,646 was 47.7% higher than May 2019's \$154,072.

Citrus County, because of its outdoor tourist attractions, fared better than other counties in Florida during the pandemic, Pricher said.

For the entire fiscal year of 2019-2020 — which encompassed several months of the pandemic — the county was down only 1.5% over the previous year 2018-2019.

"That's pretty impressive," Pricher said.

Local lobbyist Gene McGee said the numbers are especially significant when you consider the big increase in tourists is all being done without

European visitors, who traditionally make up 33% of Citrus County's visitor base.

"When they come back, the numbers will get even better," said McGee, also a member of the Citrus County Tourist Development Council. "People are ready to travel and they're ready to travel to an outdoor recreation-based destination."

Meanwhile, U.S. hotel industry occupancy soared to its highest level since November 2019, reaching 66.0% for the week ending June 12, according to Smith Travel Research (STR).

"Operators are telling us that it could be even better, but they are having to forgo occupancy due to ongoing labor shortages in many markets," according to STR.

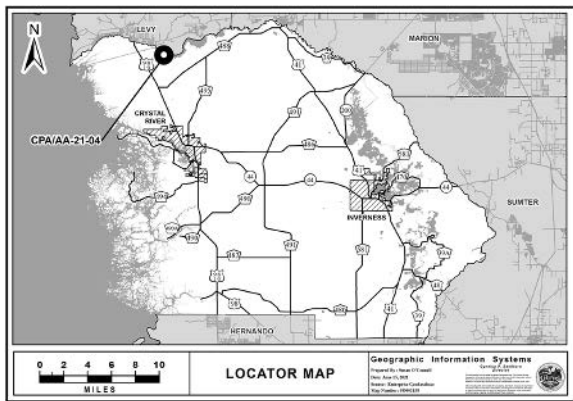

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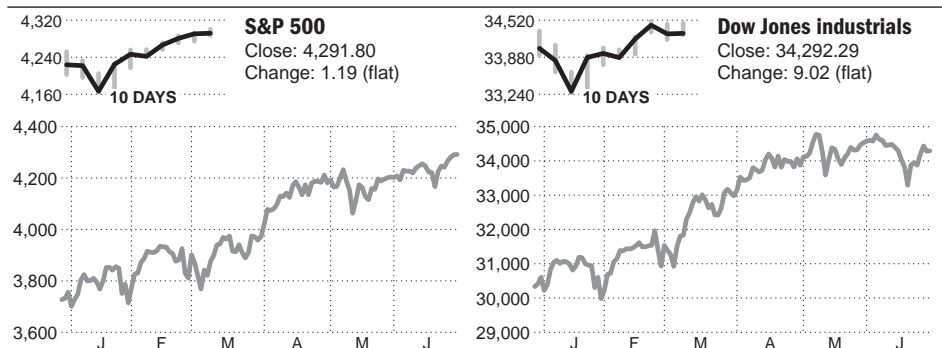

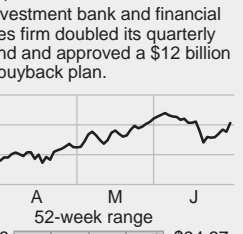

Consumer confidence up in June

WASHINGTON — U.S. consumer confidence rose for a fifth month in June to the highest level since the pandemic began last year as households responded to increased vaccinations and the further re-opening of businesses.

The Conference Board reported Tuesday that its consumer confidence index increased to 127.3 in June, up from a May reading of 120.0.

The June increase reflected an improvement in consumers' assessment of current conditions.

Consumer sentiment is expected to keep rising in coming months which will provide more support for consumer spending, which accounts for 70% of economic activity.

Consumers' appraisal of current business conditions increased with 24.5% viewing conditions as good, up from 19.9% in May. Consumers' assessment of the labor market was also up with 54.4% of consumers saying jobs were plentiful, up from 48.5% in May while 10.9% of consumers saw jobs as hard to get, down from 11.6% in May.

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks drifted further into record heights in a listless day of trading on Tuesday, as Wall Street waits for the heavy-weight economic data coming at the end of the week.

The S&P 500 inched up by 1.19 points, or less than 0.1%, to 4,291.80 and added to its all-time high set a day earlier.

More stocks fell than rose within the index, but gains for tech companies made up for weakness for banks and utilities.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average edged higher by 9.02 points, or less than 0.1%, to 34,292.29. The Nasdaq composite added 27.83, or 0.2%, to its record high from a day before and finished at 14,528.33.

Stocks have set their recent records on optimism that the economy is strengthening and that the Federal Reserve will keep interest rates low for a while longer.

A report showed that home prices across the country rose again in April, continuing their blistering pace.

With one day left in June, the market is getting ready to close out a strong first half of the year. The S&P 500 is on track for a gain of 14.3%, more than double its average for a full year, going back to the start of the millennium.

Technology stocks did much of Tuesday's heavy

lifting for the broader market. Apple rose 1.2%, and Microsoft gained 1%.

Major banks announced plans to return billions of dollars to their shareholders through dividend increases and stock buybacks after passing the Federal Reserve's most recent 'stress tests.'

Morgan Stanley rose 3.4% after announcing a doubling of its dividend and plans to buy back \$12 billion of its own stock. Other bank stocks were mixed following their own announcements. Goldman Sachs rose 1.1%, but Bank of America fell 1.6%.

As a group, financial stocks in the S&P 500 fell.

The big piece of economic data this week will be Friday's jobs report for June. Economists expect it to show U.S. employers created 675,000 more jobs than they cut, with the unemployment rate

falling to 5.7%.

Job growth has been choppy recently, with gains falling disappointingly short of economists' expectations in recent months. That's key because the Fed is likely to keep up its support for the economy through low interest rates as long as the job market looks like it needs help.

'This Friday's unemployment number is pretty important because its going to determine the trajectory of when the Fed is actually going to adjust its policies,' said Andrew Slimmon, portfolio manager at Morgan Stanley Investment Management.

The central bank, meanwhile, has stuck by its position that high inflation is likely to be only temporary. That would allow it to keep interest rates low for longer than it otherwise would.

# RV park not good fit for Citrus Avenue

The RV industry is booming, and as a result, there is a lot of interest in building new RV parks. According to the RV Industry Association, in February, sales of recreational vehicles were up 30% from the same month in 2020.

Miami developer Jaymelday Holdings LLC is proposing a 600-space recreational vehicle resort on Citrus Avenue just north of Crystal River, and is seeking a zoning change from low-density residential on 61 acres across the street from the Crystal River United Methodist Church. The development would include amenities such as a pool, golf cart rentals, a bar and grill, a basketball court and walking trails.

Residents of the area are rightfully concerned. They say the development is too intense for the area. Many say they moved to their bucolic piece of heaven to escape the kind of noise and traffic the development could attract. Citrus Avenue has a speed limit of 55 mph at some points; 600 RV pads have the potential of producing gridlock on the two-lane road.

Opposition from residents: strike one.

The Citrus County Planning and Development Commission agrees with the residents. In strike two, the panel unanimously voted against the zoning change.

They, like the residents, agree the development is incompatible with the surrounding residential area. They cite concern about noise, traffic and storm-water runoff. Residents already deal with flooding issues and say a development of this size would add to the problem.

While there's no doubt the developers have a quality project planned, it just doesn't fit with the location.

The matter will be scheduled for a public hearing once the zoning applicant provides a formal legal description of the property, but strike three should come from the county commission, which has the final say on the zoning change.

"This neighborhood is a quiet, peaceful neighborhood," resident Roy Gordon said. "To bring this into a quiet neighborhood doesn't make any sense at all."

The county commission should listen to Mr. Gordon and the planning commission.

**THE ISSUE:**

Developer wants 61 acres on Citrus Avenue north of Crystal River rezoned for luxury RV park.

**OUR OPINION:**

Neighbors and the planning commission reject the proposal, and so should the county commission.

However, that does not mean I do not have "standing" to question the wisdom of spending more for a local animal shelter than will be spent on an upscale hotel to house doctors and visitors.

discussion for Citrus County.

# Heat wave triggers blackouts

SPOKANE, Wash. — The unprecedented Northwest U.S. heat wave that slammed Seattle and Portland, Oregon, moved inland Tuesday — prompting a electrical utility in Spokane, Washington, to resume rolling blackouts amid heavy power demand.

Officials said more than a half-dozen deaths in Washington and Oregon may be tied to the intense heat that began late last week.

The dangerous weather that gave Seattle and Portland consecutive days of record high temperatures exceeding 100 degrees Fahrenheit was expected to ease in those cities. But inland Spokane saw temperatures spike.

The National Weather Service said the mercury reached 109 F in Spokane — the highest temperature ever recorded there.

About 9,300 Avista Utilities customers in Spokane lost power on Monday and the company said more planned blackouts began on Tuesday afternoon in the city of about 220,000 people.

“We try to limit outages to one hour per customer,” said Heather Rosentrater, an Avista vice president for energy delivery.

She said about 2,400 customers were without power as of shortly after 2 p.m. Tuesday, mostly on the north side of the city, and those customers had been alerted about the planned outage. About 21,000 customers were warned Tuesday morning that they might experience an outage, she said.

Avista had to implement deliberate blackouts on Monday

because “the electric system experienced a new peak demand, and the strain of the high temperatures impacted the system in a way that required us to proactively turn off power for some customers,” said company president and chief executive Dennis Vermillion. “This happened faster than anticipated.”

Rosentrater said the outages were a distribution problem, and did not stem from a lack of electricity in the system

Meanwhile, authorities said multiple recent deaths in the region were possibly related to the scorching weather.

The heat may have claimed

the life of a worker on a nursery in Oregon, the state’s worker safety agency, known as Oregon OSHA, said on Tuesday.

The man who died was from Guatemala and had apparently arrived in the United States only a few months ago, said Andres Pablo Lucas, owner of Brother Farm Labor Contractor that provided workers for the nursery, including the man who died.

The man, whose name was not disclosed, died at Ernst Nursery and Farms, a wholesale supplier in St. Paul, 20 miles north of Salem, on Saturday amid sweltering temperatures. An Oregon

OSHA database listed the death as heat-related.

“The employee was working on a crew moving irrigation lines. At the end of the shift he was found unresponsive in the field,” said agency spokesman Aaron Corvin.

Speaking in Spanish, Pablo Lucas said when workers gathered together shortly after noon on Saturday, they noticed one of them was missing. They began searching and found his body. Pablo Lucas said he didn’t remember the man’s name.

Pablo Lucas said the laborers often have the option to start working near sunrise when it is cooler and can stop

around midday, but some want to stay regardless of the heat.

“The people want to work, to fight to succeed,” he said. “For that reason, they stay.”

Officials in Bremerton, Washington, said heat may have contributed to four deaths in that Puget Sound city. But Vince Hlavaty, Bremerton’s medical officer, told the Kitsap Sun that firefighters cannot say definitively whether the heat was the cause of death.

In Bend, Oregon, authorities said the deaths of two homeless people in extreme heat may have been weather-related.

# Learning setbacks coming into focus with new testing results

AUSTIN, Texas — The scores from the first U.S. standardized tests taken during the pandemic are offering an early glimpse of just how far students have fallen behind, with some states reporting that the turbulent year has reversed years of academic progress.

Texas education officials offered a grim report Monday as the state became one of the first to release full results from its spring exams. The percentage of students reading at their grade level slid to the lowest levels since 2017, while math scores plummeted to their lowest point since 2013. In total, about 800,000 additional students are now behind their grade level in math, the state said.

“The impact of the coronavirus on what school means, and what school is, has been truly profound,” said Mike Morath, the state’s education commissioner. “It will take several years of change and support in order to help kids catch up.”

Other states have shared previews of alarming results.

In Florida, officials said reading scores dropped by 4 percentage points compared to 2019, the last time the statewide tests were administered. In Indiana, state officials are warning of a drop in reading scores and a “significant decline” in math.

Experts warn that low participation rates in some regions could leave entire states with unreliable data, and that even within states there are pockets where many families opted out. In Texas, 86% of students took the tests this spring, down from a typical rate of 96%.

Still, the early results provide some of the firmest data yet detailing the effects of the March 2020 school shutdowns, the switch to virtual learning and related disruptions. They also

line up with trends seen in national studies over the past year: Students are behind in reading and even farther behind in math.

Setbacks are sharpest among students of color and those from low-income families. Across all student groups, those who spent more time learning in-person had better exam scores.

“It’s a little sickening to see the bottom drop out for so many kids,” said Robin Lake, director of the Center on Reinventing Public Education at the University of Washington. “Clearly remote learning has been hitting the most vulnerable kids the hardest. It’s what we were expecting, but it’s still tough to see.”

Morath said the results underscore the need for a strong return to in-person learning this fall. In districts with many students learning online, the share who failed to meet math standards grew by 32 percentage points. In districts with more in-person learning, by comparison, the failure rate increased by 9 points.

That divide was wider than the gaps between students based on race or income, but the data also found that white

students had higher scores than their Black and Hispanic peers, and students from wealthier families had much higher scores than those from poverty.

“These are not numbers, these are children,” Morath said, “and this represents how well we have supported them in their continued academic growth.”

He called out school districts that were slower to return to in-person learning, including in El Paso, saying they saw steeper learning setbacks compared to rural schools that reopened classrooms quickly. In El Paso Independent School District, 64% of eighth-graders fell short of math standards this spring, compared to 20% in 2019, according to state data.

In typical years, Texas uses its annual tests to rate schools and determine whether students can move to the next grade. But state officials suspended those measures during the pandemic and said tests should be used to identify students who need the most help. All students who fell short of testing standards will be entitled to intensive tutoring next school year under new legislation passed by lawmakers last month.

### Supreme Court leaves CDC eviction moratorium in place

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court is leaving a pandemic-inspired nationwide ban on evictions in place, over the votes of four objecting conservative justices.

The court on Tuesday rejected a plea by landlords to end the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention moratorium on evicting millions of tenants who aren’t paying rent during the coronavirus pandemic. Last week, the Biden administration extended the moratorium by a month, until the end of July. It said then it did not expect another extension.

U.S. Judge Dabney Friedrich in Washington had struck down the moratorium as exceeding the CDC’s authority, but put her ruling on hold. The high court voted 5-4 to keep the ban in place until the end of July.

In a brief opinion, Justice Brett Kavanaugh said he agreed with Friedrich’s ruling, but voted to leave the ban on evictions in place because it’s due to end in a month and “because those few weeks will allow for additional and more orderly distribution of the congressionally appropriated rental assistance funds.”

Also last week, the Treasury Department issued new guidance encouraging states and local governments to streamline distribution of the nearly \$47 billion in available emergency

### rental assistance funding

By the end of March, 6.4 million American households were behind on their rent, according to the Department of Housing and Urban Development. As of June 7, roughly 3.2 million people in the U.S. said they faced eviction in the next two months, according to the U.S. Census Bureau’s Household Pulse Survey.

### Venomous snake on the loose in North Carolina capital

RALEIGH, N.C. — Officials in North Carolina are warning people to be on the lookout for a venomous snake on the loose.

The Raleigh Police Department sent out a notice early Tuesday urging anyone who sees the missing zebra cobra to stay away and 911. They say the venomous snake could spit and bite if cornered.

An animal control officer was called to a home in northwest Raleigh on Monday evening for a report of a live snake spotted on a resident’s porch, police said. But when the officer arrived, the snake had slithered away. Then they learned that a zebra cobra was missing from a home in the area.

Venomous snakes are legal to own in North Carolina, but they must be kept in an escape-proof, bite-proof enclosures and owners must notify law enforcement if one escapes.

# Suicidal crises, mental fatigue: Kids grapple with reentry

After two suicidal crises during pandemic isolation, 16-year-old Zach Sampson feels stronger but worries his social skills have gone stale.

After relentless months of social distancing, on-line schooling and other restrictions, many kids are feeling the pandemic's toll or facing new challenges navigating reentry.

A surge in teen suicide attempts and other mental health crises prompted Children's Hospital Colorado to declare a state of emergency in late May, when emergency department and hospital inpatient beds were overrun with suicidal kids and those struggling with other psychiatric problems. Typical emergency-department waiting times for psychiatric treatment doubled in May to about 20 hours, said Jason Williams, a pediatric psychologist at the hospital in Aurora.

Other children's hospitals are facing similar challenges.

In typical times, the activities that come as the school year ends — finals, prom, graduations, summer job-seeking — can be stressful even for the most resilient kids. But after more than a year of dealing with pandemic restrictions, many are worn down and simply don't "have enough in the tank of resilience" to handle stresses that previously would have been manageable, Williams said.

"When the pandemic first hit, we saw a rise in severe cases in crisis evaluation," as kids struggled with "their whole world shutting down," said Christine Certain, a mental health counselor who works with Orlando Health's Arnold Palmer

Hospital for Children. "Now, as we see the world opening back up, ... it's asking these kids to make a huge shift again."

At some children's hospitals, psychiatric cases have remained high throughout the pandemic; others have seen a more recent surge.

At Wolfson Children's Hospital in Jacksonville, Florida, behavioral unit admissions for kids in crisis aged 13 and younger have been soaring since 2020 and are on pace to reach 230 this year, more than four times higher than in 2019, said hospital psychologist Terrie Andrews. For older teens, admissions were up to five times higher than usual last year and remained elevated as of last month.

"The overwhelming demand for pediatric mental health services is putting an unprecedented strain on pediatric facilities, primary care, schools and community-based organizations that support kids' well-being," said Amy Knight, president of

the Children's Hospital Association.

In Florida, waits for outpatient treatment are even longer and many therapists don't accept kids insured through Medicaid, Andrews said.

Sampson says "just a lot of stuff" triggered his first crisis last August. The Jacksonville, Florida, teen struggled with online education and spent hours in his room alone playing video games and scrolling the internet, drawn to dark sites that "made my brain hurt."

He revealed his suicidal thoughts to a friend, who called the police. He spent a week in the hospital under psychiatric care.

Both his parents have worked in mental health jobs but had no idea how he was struggling.

"We had realized he had been spending more time isolating, not really tending to showering and that type of stuff, but we were in the middle of a pandemic. No one was really doing those things," said his mother, Jennifer Sampson.

The teen started virtual psychotherapy but in March his self-destructive thoughts resurfaced. Hospital psychiatric beds were full so he waited a week in a holding area to receive treatment, his mother recalled.

Now on mood stabilizers, he's continuing therapist visits, has finished sophomore year and is looking forward to returning to in-person school this fall. Still, he says it's hard motivating himself to leave the house to go to the gym or hang out with friends.

"I definitely find my social skills are rusty," Sampson said.

"I feel that this is going to be something that we're dealing with for quite a while," his mother said.

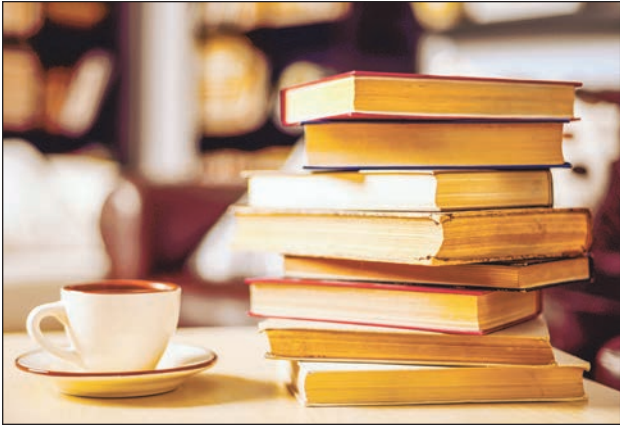

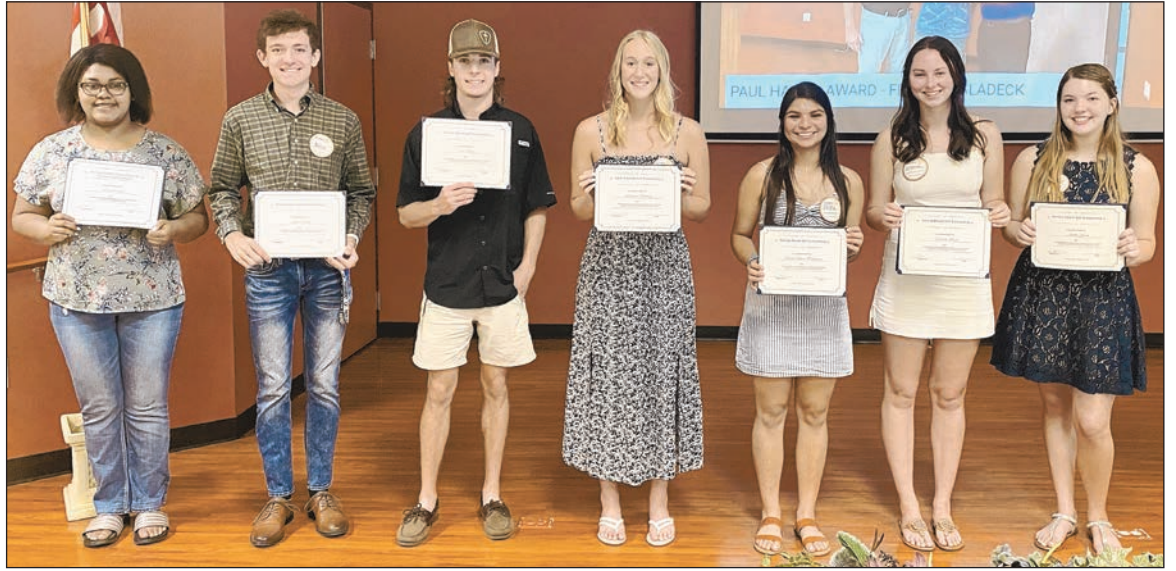

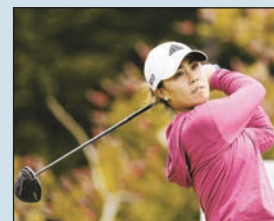

## Injured Serena Williams out at Wimbledon

*Exit in first round now leaves women's field wide open*

WIMBLEDON, England — Serena Williams bit her upper lip. She held her left hand over her mouth and tried to hold back tears while getting ready to serve.

It was the first set of her first-round match Tuesday at Wimbledon, and Williams knew this stay at a tournament where she has won seven of her 23 Grand Slam singles titles was about to end because she hurt her right leg when she lost her footing behind a baseline.

Moments later, her legs

buckled as she tried to change directions to chase a shot by her opponent, 100th-ranked Aliaksandra Sasnovich of Belarus. Williams dropped to her knees, her head down on the grass. She used her racket to help her stand, but only so she could limp to the net to concede — just the second mid-match retirement at any Grand Slam tournament of her career and first since 1998.

"I was heartbroken to have to withdraw today," Williams said in a statement released by the tournament.

"Feeling the extraordinary warmth and support of the crowd today when I walked on

— and off — the court," she said, "meant the world to me."

Said Sasnovich: "She's a great champion, and it's (a) sad story."

Roger Federer surely articulated a common sentiment when told by a reporter what happened to Williams.

"Oh, my God," he said. "I can't believe it."

Williams was serving while leading 3-1 at Centre Court — where the retractable roof was shut because of rain that forced the postponement of two dozen matches until Wednesday — when her left shoe seemed to

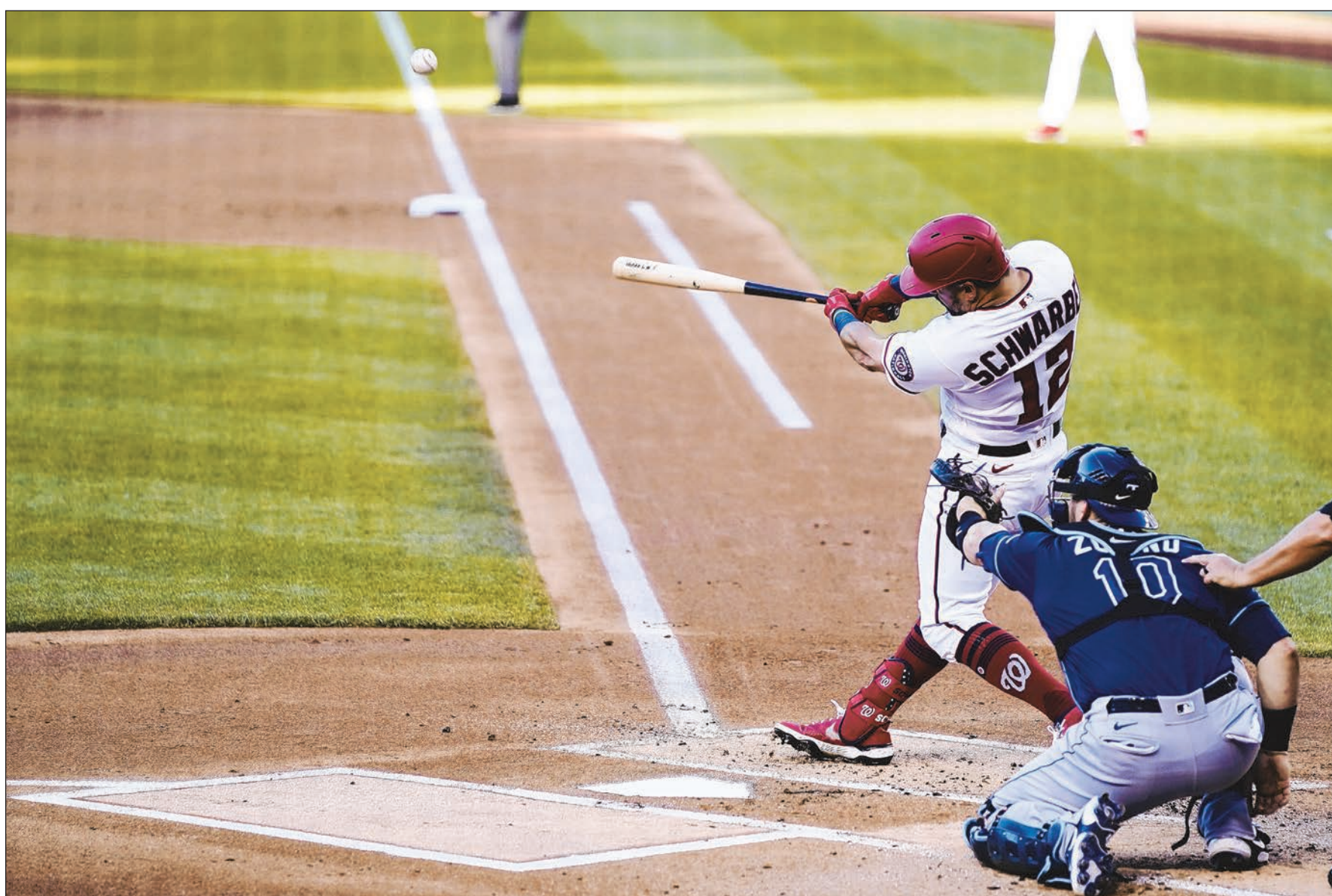

WASHINGTON — Kyle Schwarber's power display is making history. His relationship with the Home Run Derby appears consigned to it.

After Schwarber led off the first inning with his 12th home run in 10 games to help the Washington Nationals to a 4-3 victory on Tuesday night, Schwarber said he has not been approached about participating in this year's derby on July 12 at Denver's Coors Field.

If Schwarber is asked, he said he probably would pass, two years removed from his duel with then-Nationals slugger Bryce Harper in the event in Washington.

"It was definitely a moment that you're not going to forget. You kind of check that off your bucket list," Schwarber said. "But if I was approached I would probably not do it. You get a little sore afterward. It's four minutes of straight hacking as hard as you can."

Schwarber tied Albert Belle in 1995 for the most home runs over a 10-game span since at least 1901. He has 16 home runs in 18 games since being moved into the leadoff spot in the Nationals' batting order on June 8.

Schwarber drove Rich Hill's first pitch, an 83 mph fastball, 434 feet off the upper-deck facade in right for his major league-leading seventh leadoff

## Canadiens players will need to step up their game tonight

TAMPA — The loser of Game 1 of the Stanley Cup Final has won the championship each of the past three years.

The Tampa Bay Lightning will likely end that streak if the Montreal Canadiens do not get a better showing from their offensively talented line of Cole Caufield, Nick Suzuki and Tyler Toffoli.

While the Canadiens have a knack for bouncing back this postseason, the series opener was an eye-opener against Tampa Bay's top trio of Ondrej Palat, Brayden Point and Nikita Kucherov. Because the Lightning get the last line change again in Game 2 on Wednesday night, coach Jon Cooper can get Point's line on the ice against Suzuki's as much as he wants, and that does not appear to be a favor-

able matchup for Montreal.

"It looks like they want to play against us the whole time, so we have to do a better job," Suzuki said, noting his two turnovers as part of his line's problems. "You just have to do a better job of cleaning up turnovers, limit their time and space and try our best to keep them off the scoresheet."

That did not happen in Game 1, when Point's line scored twice on Suzuki's line on the way to

breaking it open for a 5-1 victory. Giving the puck away against that caliber of opponents isn't a recipe for Montreal hanging with Tampa Bay.

Of course, the Canadiens have felt this way before, looking outclassed in the semifinal opener against Vegas before roaring back and winning in six games. The memory of taking over against Vegas and erasing a 3-1 series deficit to beat Toronto in the first round has players

confident they can replicate those comebacks.

It starts with acknowledging how bad Game 1 was.

"We were pretty far from our best game," center Phillip Danault said. "I felt like we were a little bit like against Vegas (in Game 1), kind of looking. We've got some young guys, ... Just got to step up and play our game and be confident."

**Cav is back! Cavendish posts 31st Tour stage win**

FOUGERES, France — This time, they were happy tears.  
In October last year, Mark Cavendish posted an insignificant 74th place at the Belgian classic Gent-Wevelgem. Depressed and dejected, with his contract with the Bahrain McLaren team almost over, the sprinter from the Isle of Man suggested in an emotional post-race interview it could well have been his final race.  
On Tuesday at the Tour de France, the tears of sadness made way for those of happiness after the "Manx Missile" posted a 31st stage win at cycling's biggest event.  
"Just being here is special enough. I didn't think I would ever get to come back to this race," said Cavendish, the greatest sprinter in the race's history.  
The 36-year-old veteran sat on the road and cried after his triumph in the fourth stage. He was congratulated by teammates, who worked hard in the stage finale to put Cavendish in an excellent position for the sprint.

**England sheds history by knocking out Germany**

LONDON — As the Wembley Stadium announcer roared the final score — "England 2, Germany 0" — Gareth Southgate's vision was momentarily diverted from his victorious players to the big screen.  
Shown beaming from the VIP seats, reveling in England's passage to the European Championship quarterfinals on Tuesday, were David Beckham and Ed Sheeran. Prince William, wife Kate and 7-year-old Prince George were also there celebrating, as fans just like their subjects rather than royalty.  
But it was the sight of David Seaman

that caught Southgate's eyes and made him pause, to think back — in one of his greatest moments as England coach — to the pain of 25 years ago. It was Southgate's penalty miss at the old Wembley that denied an England side with Seaman in goal the chance to reach the Euro '96 final.  
"For the teammates who played with me, I can't change that — so that's always going to hurt," Southgate said. "But what this group of players has been able to do is give a new generation a lot of happy memories and another afternoon where they have made a bit of history."

**Ukraine scores late in extra time, beats Sweden**

GLASGOW, Scotland — Ukraine had reached the round of 16 at the European Championship with two losses and the worst record of the advancing teams.  
And now the quarterfinals, too.  
Ukraine eliminated previously unbeaten Sweden 2-1 on Tuesday with a goal in stoppage time at the end of extra time from a player who was left on the bench for the entire group stage. Substitute Artem Dovbyk stooped low to guide a header from Oleksandr Zinchenko's cross past goalkeeper Robin Olsen.  
It was the 24-year-old forward's first goal for the national team.  
Ukraine's greatest ever forward, current coach Andriy Shevchenko, ran down the sideline to celebrate with his players, who will now head to Rome to face England on Saturday.  
Zinchenko also scored on a day when his Manchester City teammate Raheem Sterling got one in England's 2-0 win over Germany. Zinchenko gave Ukraine the lead in the 27th minute when he rifled in a low shot set up by a crafty pass from captain Andriy Yarmolenko.

lose its traction while she was hitting a forehand.

Williams winced and stepped gingerly between points, clearly troubled. After dropping that game, she asked to visit with a trainer and took a medical timeout.

She tried to continue playing. The crowd tried to offer support and encouragement. Eventually, the 39-year-old American couldn't continue. The chair umpire climbed down to check on her; and they walked together up to the net; the score was 3-all, 15-30 when Williams stopped.

Williams, who began the match with her right thigh heavily taped, raised her racket with right arm and put her left palm on her chest. Then she waved to the spectators.

Officially, this goes in the books as only the second first-round Grand Slam exit of Williams' career. The other came at the 2012 French Open, where she

was beaten by Virginie Razzano. Shortly after that, Williams teamed up with coach Patrick Mouratoglou and began accumulating majors to eclipse Steffi Graf's professional era record of 22 and move within one of Margaret Court's all-era mark of 24.

"All the best for her," said Sasnovich, who reached the fourth round at Wimbledon in 2018 for her best Grand Slam result.

Williams' departure makes a wide-open women's draw even more so. As it was, defending champion Simona Halep and four-time major champ Naomi Osaka withdrew before the tournament started.

And so, even as her 40th birthday approaches in September, Williams was among the top contenders. With her best-in-the-game serve and stinging groundstrokes, she had made it to the past four finals when she entered Wimbledon — winning in 2015 and 2016, missing the tournament while pregnant in 2017, then finishing as the runner-up in 2018 and 2019 (it was canceled last year because of the pandemic).

**CHARLOTTE SCHWARBER**

Schwarber became a free agent Dec. 2 when the Chicago Cubs failed to offer a 2021 contract. He agreed in January to a \$10 million, one-year contract with the Nationals calling for a \$7 million salary, a deal that includes an \$11.5 million mutual option for 2022 with a \$3 million buyout.  
Juan Soto followed two batters later with a two-run drive, and Victor Robles added a solo homer in the second for a 4-0 lead off Hill (6-3), who said catcher Mike Zunino spotted him tipping his pitches during the first two innings.  
"I'm glad we caught it," said Hill, who allowed eight hits over six innings. "I was able to go out there and execute for the next few innings and give us a chance. But it sucked putting us in that position early on."  
Washington has won three straight and 13 of 16 and at 39-38 has a winning record for the first time since beating Atlanta on opening day.

# Olympic golf a bigger priority for women

Dustin Johnson was never going to the Olympics. Justin Thomas was never going to miss them. And then there was Patrick Cantlay, who didn't have a choice.

No one really asked Cantlay for his outlook on the Olympics even as he returned to the top 10 in the world by winning the Memorial for his second victory of the PGA Tour season. That put him very much in the mix for a spot on the American team going to Japan.

The final week of qualifying was the U.S. Open. The final day provided an answer from an astute member of his team: "The decision has been made for him."

Four other Americans were ahead of him, in the Olympic ranking and at

Torrey Pines during the final round. That meant there was no room for Cantlay, the No. 7 player in the world.

So when the final Olympic ranking was released and 15 players decided not to go — from Johnson at No. 2 to Camilo Villegas of Colombia at No. 225 — it was easy to conclude the men care far more about green than gold, silver or bronze.

But it's progress. For Rio de Janeiro, the top four players in the world stayed home. For Tokyo, there wasn't even room for for Nos. 7, 8 and 9 — Cantlay, Brooks Koepka and Patrick Reed.

They will never catch up with the women, who have made it perfectly clear by near-perfect attendance that the Olympics mean as much to them as anything they play.

"I can't speak for what Olympics mean for a lot of

people," Danielle Kang said last week. "But for me, it's everything."

There are differences to consider, of course, namely the tour schedules and the stakes, along with the fame the women get at the Olympics that doesn't happen at some of their majors, like the Evian Championship.

For the administrators who lobbied to get golf into the Olympics, they should be encouraged by five years and two viruses.

It was largely concern and fear about the Zika virus that kept 22 eligible players from going to the 2016 Olympics. There was an unspoken pledge they would be all in for Japan.

That was before the outbreak of the new coronavirus. The Olympics not only were postponed, but COVID-19 restrictions in place for the Games to go on have stripped away so

much fun and activity involved with being Olympic athletes.

Wait until Paris in 2024! On to Los Angeles in 2028!

If only it were that simple.

Johnson already was planning to skip the Olympics before the pandemic. He had not won the FedEx Cup and it bothered him, so he didn't want to fly halfway around the world after a major and before a World Golf Championship and then play three consecutive weeks with a \$15 million prize at stake. Turns out he won it last year, anyway.

There will be more players like him.

And that's why there will be attendance issues with the men. As long as there is a pot of gold at the end of the Olympics, the value of Olympic gold will suffer.

The men's majors have a century or more of history behind them. The Olympics

went a century without having gold.

Consider the last few months.

Kang couldn't keep her eyes off the world ranking, hopeful she could hold down her position and earn a spot in the Olympics. For the men, the Olympics are like the Presidents Cup. No one really talks about it until the final week to make the team.

"I just think men golfers, they just have so many big events," Inbee Park said. "They have so many opportunities and so many different weeks with so many big tournaments. For us, I think it's a little different. We're not as big as men's golf."

"So I think girls just treat it a little differently," he said. "Men trying to work it in their schedule with a lot more tournaments going on and a lot more going on is different."

It was a big deal for Park,

who delivered a true Olympic moment.

Think of the sports in which athletes trained their entire lives for a stage that comes along once every four years. Park sat out from top competition for two months to let an injury heal, even as there were whispers in South Korea that she should give up her spot to another player in the powerhouse country.

Park then whipped up on the No. 1 player in the world to win the gold medal.

It's a big deal for Sungjae Im and Siwoo Kim, who can avoid mandatory military service in South Korea by winning an Olympic medal. Not even a green jacket can do that.

For so many other men, it's more of an honor than a priority. As long as they play, there's nothing wrong with that.

### ABOUT THE BLUE STAR PROGRAM

- ★ The Blue Star Program honors all men and women who serve in the United States Armed Services.
- ★ This program began with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs in 1944 as a living memorial to veterans of World War II.
- ★ In 1945, the National Council of State Garden Clubs (now NGC Inc.) adopted this program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii.
- ★ Blue Star Memorial Highway Markers were placed along the way. The Blue Star was adopted because it had become an icon in World War II and was seen on flags and banners in homes for sons and daughters away at war as well as in churches and businesses.

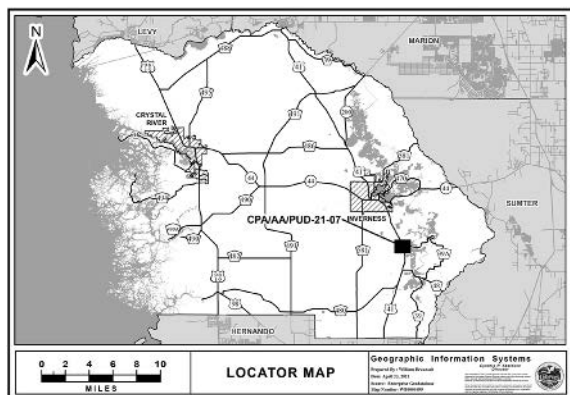

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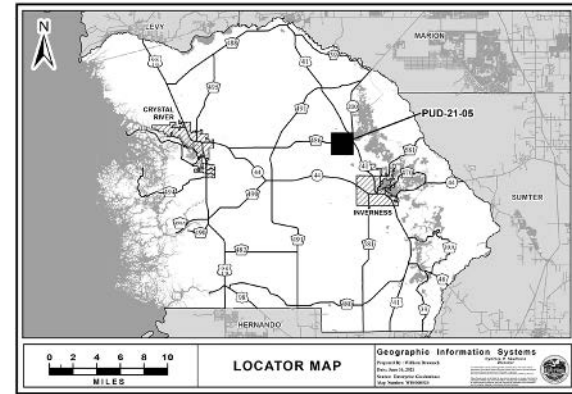

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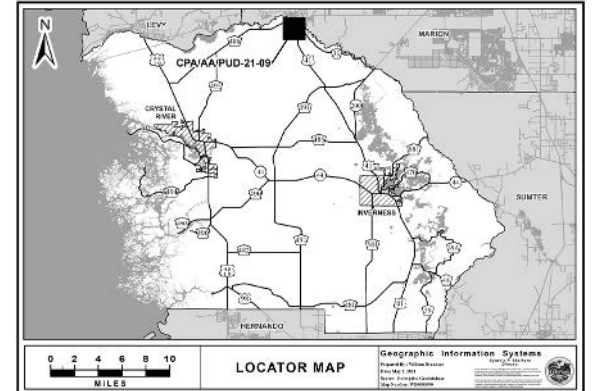

## Buzz! Bang! Fireworks!

Is a big fireworks display part of your Fourth of July celebration? When the beautiful colors are exploding in the sky, you may wonder how manufacturers create them.

The displays that we watch on special occasions start with an idea. A fireworks designer might see a flower or a tree that sparks an idea for making a firework.

Once the design is in place, **pyrotechnicians\*** (PIE-roh-tehk-NISH-uns) can begin to build the firework.

### Start with stars

The small, hard balls that make the lights we see in a fireworks display are called **stars**. These marble-sized balls are made out of black powder that's rolled into a tight ball. The ball also includes an **oxidizer** (OX-ih-dize-er), which makes the powder burn bright, and salts or metals that give the star its color.

### Making a shell

The next step is creating a **shell**. These paper cases may hold many stars or **comets**, cylinder-shaped fireworks that make long streaks across the sky.

The pyrotechnician places the stars or comets into the shell in a pattern. For instance,

\*Pyro comes from the Greek word *pur*, meaning fire. A *technician* is someone who is an expert in details of a certain subject.

a smiley face with a red smile, blue eyes and an orange nose will appear in that same pattern when the shell explodes. The shell may be only 6 inches in diameter, but the display might be as large as a football field in the sky!

### Making them fly

Next, the shells get a **lift charge**, which carries the firework up into the sky. The pyrotechnician also adds a **time fuse**, which explodes the firework. This fuse lets him control how long after launch the firework will explode.

### Putting it all together

Once the shells are ready, they're loaded into **mortars**, metal tubes used to launch the fireworks. Mortars may be arranged in **batteries**, wooden frames that hold several mortars in place.

Some pyrotechnicians may fire the shells by hand. Today, most fireworks are attached to an electrical circuit. When the technician gives a signal, the circuit turns on a firing device, much like you turn on a light in your house.

Computers are also used to launch fireworks, especially those that are choreographed (KOR-ee-oh-graffed), or arranged, to music.

### Fireworks Words

- **Aerial** — a firework that explodes high in the sky.
- **Break** — the explosion of an aerial shell.
- **Chrysanthemum** — a round burst of stars that keeps its shape before fading. It can be several colors or change color.
- **Illuminations** — fireworks that explode nearer to the ground.
- **Magazine** — a metal or concrete building used to store fireworks.
- **Peony** — a star that bursts from the center without trailing glitter.
- **Salutes** — loud, repeated booms.
- **Set pieces** — fireworks that are attached to wooden grids on the ground. They might make a picture or spell out words.
- **Spiderweb** — a bright center with distinct lines shooting out from it.
- **Strobe** — flashing silver lights that float slowly to the ground.
- **Weeping willow** — stars that trail down, looking like a weeping willow tree.

Please remember: Fireworks are beautiful and exciting for some of us, but many pets and people are upset by the noise and flashes of bright light. Make sure your pets are indoors; leaving a radio or TV turned on may help soften the noises for them.

#### Pineapple Pudding Cake

##### You'll need:

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 3 whole eggs
- 1 large can crushed pineapple (with juice)
- 1 (1-ounce) box vanilla pudding mix (not instant)

- 2 cups reduced-fat milk
- 1 tub fat-free whipped topping
- 1 cup shredded coconut



##### What to do:

1. Prepare cake mix according to package directions. Be sure to use 3 whole eggs.
2. Pour cake batter into a 9-by-13-inch glass baking dish coated with cooking spray. Bake in oven according to package directions.
3. After removing cake from oven, immediately pierce holes in top of cake with a fork. Pour canned pineapple and juice over top. Allow to cool.
4. Prepare pudding according to package directions. Spread pudding over top of pineapple.
5. Spread whipped topping over pudding. Top with coconut and chill before serving.
