High court reprimands judge

Richard 'Ric' Howard disciplined for trying to influence judicial candidate

Florida Supreme Court justices chastised Citrus County Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard before a virtual audience for his attempt to dissuade a candidate from running for a local judgeship.

"This is an unfortunate day for you, for us and for the entire state judiciary," Chief Justice Charles Canady said Thursday,

Sept. 2, during Howard's brief public reprimand, held over Zoom. "Your misconduct has damaged the public's trust and confidence in our state courts."

Howard's punishment stems back to April 2019,


when he first tried to convince then-candidate Pam Vergara from running against incumbent George Angeliadis in a 2020 election for circuit judge.

Vergara would eventually go on to beat Angeliadis in the August primary by roughly 6,100 votes in the circuit's five-county race covering Citrus, Marion, Hernando, Lake and Sumter counties.

After investigating the complaint against

Heavy rains cause more local flooding Mobile home park hit again

Wednesday's torrential rains wreaked havoc on roads and property in low-lying areas of Citrus County, especially on the west side.

Will Bryant, environmental health director with the Department of Health in Citrus County, said he got calls of flooding and standing water from several coastal residents.

Portions of Homosassa Trail were underwater part of the day.

The Duke Energy wastewater treatment plant couldn't keep up

with the rain and it overflowed, Bryant said. As of Thursday, Duke was still working on it.

Perhaps most disheartening is that the rain exacerbated the ongoing problem at the Floral City Singing Forest Mobile Home Park — just when floodwaters from previous rains were receding. It's back to square one for residents there, Bryant said.

"It's pretty close to where it was before," he said.

Heavy rains about three weeks ago flooded the community's park area and pond in front of

In a unanimous eight member vote, the commission approved the request by the Atlanta-based Pruitt Properties Inc. for a property. I facility is not of West Coulomb and North Boulevard. Pruitt's

conditional use approval to build the 93-bed and 60-unit assisted living facility in two phases in a low density residential district

district.

The 19.25 acres in question is already bordered to its northwest by Forest Ridge Elementary School, a senior assistance residence to the west, and West County Road 486 to the south. There are residential homes to the east of the property. The proposed facility is near the corner of West County Road 486 and North Forest Ridge

oulevard. Pruitt's representa-

tive, local attorney Clark Stillwell, told the commission that the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration had issued Pruitt a certificate of need demonstrating that there was a need in the community for such a facility.

"We believe we meet the conditional use requirement outlined by the county," Stillwell said. "I believe this particular project is needed in this community."

He cited the growing number of seniors in the county as well as a

Lack of daily COVID-19 updates draws lawsuit

Citing a diminishing pandemic, the Florida Department of Health's (DOH) COVID-19 data dashboard ceased issuing daily updates of new cases, hospitalizations and deaths in June.

When the delta-variant fueled COVID-19 pandemic hit Florida in July with numbers that eclipsed previous peaks, the DOH, under Gov. Ron DeSantis' directive, declined calls to return to daily reporting and stayed with posting weekly updates on Fridays.

The Florida Center for Government

Surgeon General Scott Rivkees over the state's "refusal to provide COVID-related statistical records it used to make public daily.'

The 238-page lawsuit, filed late Monday night in Leon County's 2nd Judicial Circuit in Tallahassee, features 30 pages of exhibits and seeks an immediate hearing to force the FDOH to daily publish "county-level information and other sociodemographic data on the number of COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations and deaths.'

Guillermo Smith, D-Orlando, Committee, in a July 23 letter have sued the DOH and Florida asked Rivkees for 14 days' worth of daily Orange County COVD-19 case counts, positivity rates, hospitalizations, death rates and vaccinations.

In an Aug. 9 emailed reply, DOH Legislative Director Drew Love told Smith "the specific data you have requested for Orange County are considered confidential and exempt from public disclosure."

In the suit, Smith claims the DOH "falsely stated the information was 'confidential" under state law, "even after making those same records The suit contends that Smith, available for nearly a year on Accountability a member of the House Pan- the Department's daily COVID

came after weeks of "slow-walking" his request for daily updates which, as a member of the state legislature, he claims he is entitled to under Article I, Section 24 of Chapter 119, of the state Constitution.

Smith said the requested information would not have identified any individual but "would illustrate the larger impacts of the virus on Orange County including the ages, sex, ethnic and racial demographics of those with confirmed cases of the virus, and vaccination rates for the county.'

Rivkees, who is leaving his state surgeon general post in ida Department of Health" and September, maintains such continue to be so, she said.

DOH's denial, Smith said, information can be withheld in accordance with state rules concerning epidemiological research, which may be "made public only when necessary to public health."

DeSantis Press Secretary Christina Pushaw told Florida Politics Tuesday that DOH reports data "routinely and automatically" to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CVDC), which updates its national COVID-19 dashboard every weekday.

FSU wants judge to toss lawsuit over shutdown

TALLAHASSEE — Florida State University is asking a federal judge to toss out a potential class-action lawsuit seeking refunds for students who were forced to learn remotely in spring 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The lawsuit, filed on behalf of FSU law student Harrison Broer, is one of numerous similar cases filed against colleges and universities in Florida and other states. What FSU attorneys described as a "flood of litigation" spurred Florida lawmakers to pass legislation this spring to try to shield schools from such lawsuits.

The Broer case, initially filed in May in Leon County circuit court and moved this month to federal court, contends that students should receive partial refunds of tuition and fees because the FSU campus shut down in March 2020 and classes were shifted

In part, the lawsuit alleges that FSU breached contracts with students, who had paid money expecting on-campus classes and services.

But in a motion to dismiss the lawsuit Friday, the university's attorneys disputed that an "enforceable written contract" existed between Broer and the school. Without such a contract, the motion said, the university is shielded from a breach-of-contract claim because of sovereign immunity, which helps protect government entities from lawsuits.

'There is no contract between plaintiff and FSU — let alone an express contract—thereby dictating dismissal of plaintiff's breach of contract claim based upon sovereign immunity," the motion said.

But in an amended version of the lawsuit filed July 30, Broer's attorneys said FSU students entered into "express" contracts with the university through a series of steps, including submitting applications, accepting offers of admission, registering for

classes and paying tuition and fees.

"The scope of the agreement between plaintiff and defendants was formed throughout the application process, admission, enrollment, registration and payment — including through all the documents and materials shared and agreed to during those processes. ... By enrolling in courses and paying his fees for tuition and other services for the spring 2020 semester, plaintiff provided consideration for and accepted the regulations and policies established by defendants and governing fees for tuition

and other services," the lawsuit said. But FSU attorneys, in last week's motion to dismiss, said a "hodgepodge of documents patched together, none of which singularly, or in the whole, amount to an express contract, do not promise plaintiff the refund he seeks.'

The lawsuit also raises other arguments, including that the university has violated what is known as the "takings clause" of the U.S. Constitution. FSU attorneys pointed to the federal constitutional question in shifting the case early this month from state court to federal court in Tallahassee.

U.S. District Judge Allen Winsor has scheduled a June 2022 trial in the dispute, though that could be short-circuited if he agrees with the university's motion to dismiss the case. The lawsuit does not specify an amount of refunds sought for FSU

The legislation passed this spring by state lawmakers and signed by Gov. Ron DeSantis provided liability protections for public and private universities and colleges for actions taken because of COVID-19.

The legislation took effect July 1, and Broer's attorneys wrote that any attempt to use it in the lawsuit would be an unconstitutional impairment of an existing contract. The university's attorneys did not focus heavily on the new law in the motion to dismiss, though they wrote that "retrospectivelooking language of the statute indicates that the law was meant to apply retroactively to the COVID-19 emergency period."

ABBA back after 40 years with new album, virtual show

LONDON - ABBA is releasing its first new music in four decades, along with a concert performance that will see the "Dancing Queen" quartet going entirely digital.

The forthcoming album "Voyage," to be released Nov. 5, is a follow-up to 1981's "The Visitors," which until now had been the swan song of the Swedish supergroup. And a virtual version of the band will begin a series of concerts in London on May 27.

"We took a break in the spring of 1982 and now we've decided it's time to end it," ABBA said in a statement Thursday. "They say it's foolhardy to wait more than 40 years between albums, so we've recorded a follow-up to 'The Visitors."

The group has been creating the holographic live show, using motion capture and other techniques, with George Lucas' special-effects company, Industrial Light & Magic.

They call it "the strangest and most spectacular concert you could ever dream of."

"We're going to be able to sit back in an audience and watch our digital selves perform our songs," the group's statement said. "Weird and wonderful!"

The planned show spurred the making of the album, which features the new songs "I Still Have Faith In You" and "Don't Shut Me Down." It began with sessions in 2018 and was delayed by the coronavirus pandemic.

The show will come 50 years after the founding of the group that consisted of two married couples for most of its existence, and whose name is an acronym of the first names of its





Howard, the Florida Judicial Qualifications Commission recommended in August 2020 for the state supreme court to publicly reprimand the judge. Justices agreed with the commission.

"Public reprimands, such as this, are an important way we can ensure the public we take misconduct by a judge very seriously," Canaday said Thursday. "We will not hesitate to punish unethical conduct by a judge in a very public way.'

Howard and Vergara declined to comment Thursday about the reprimand, their respective judicial assistants told the Chronicle.

Howard didn't speak during the hearing, which was a few minutes long and broadcasted on the supreme court's Facebook and YouTube pages.





Chip shortage halts more auto production

DETROIT — The global shortage of computer chips is getting worse, forcing automakers to temporarily close factories including those that build popular pickup trucks.

General Motors announced Thursday that it insights for Cargurus.com. would pause production at during the next two weeks, including two that make the company's top-selling Chevrolet Silverado pickup.

Ford will stop making pickups at its Kansas City Assembly Plant for the next two weeks. Shifts will be cut at two more truck plants in Dearborn, Michigan, and Louisville, Kentucky.

The cuts will compound an already short supply of cars, trucks and SUVs on dealer lots nationwide that have pushed prices to record levels. Automakers reported that U.S. dealers had just under a million new vehicles on their lots in August, 72% lower than the 3.58 million in August of 2019.

"It now appears to be accelerating in the wrong direction." said Jeff Schuster, president of global vehicle forecasting for LMC Automotive, a consulting firm.

Industry analysts say the delta variant of the novel coronavirus has hit employees at chip factories in southeast Asia

"Now the prospects for new sales for the rest of the year continue to dim with the reality that tight inventory will last well into 2022," said Kevin Roberts, director of industry Demand for trucks,

For others, "pricing is through the roof, so they can't afford it and aren't willing to spend what it's going to cost to get that vehicle.

Stellantis shut down its Ram truck assembly plant in Sterling Heights, Michigan, this week due to the chip shortage. The company's Belvidere, Illinois, small-SUV plant and a minivan plant in Windsor, Ontario, are down for two weeks.

Toyota said it would slash production by at least 40% in Japan and North America for the next two months, cutting production by 360,000 vehicles worldwide in September alone.

Nissan, which announced in mid-August that chip shortages would force it to close its huge factory in Smyrna, Tennessee, for two weeks until Aug. 30, now says the closure will last four weeks, until Sept. 13.

State conservation went downhill under Rick Scott

In a recent Editorial, the Chronicle writes. "Florida has not prioritized conservation in the past, so residents need to continually remind policymakers at all levels how important it is. It will take funding; it will also take cooperation among national, state and local groups and individuals, both government and private. In Citrus County, we particularly need to practice smart planning to avoid the sprawl that could derail efforts to create wildlife corridors.'

That is not a totally accurate statement. Florida went through an enlightened period in the 1980s and into the 2000s where it did in fact prioritize conservation. The Conservation and Recreational Lands (CARL) program was established by the Florida legislature in 1979 to acquire lands of environmental and cultural significance. In 1989, the CARL program was replaced by Preservation 2000 and the funding

NEW YORK — A stunned U.S. East Coast faced a rising death toll, surging rivers, tornado damage and continuing calls for rescue Thursday after the remnants of Hurricane Ida walloped the region with record-breaking rain, drowning more than 40 people in their homes and cars.

In a region that had been warned about potentially deadly flash flooding but hadn't braced for such a blow from the no-longer-hurricane, the storm killed at least 45 people from Maryland to Connecticut on Wednesday night and Thursday morning.

At least 23 people died in New Jersey, Democratic Gov. Phil Murphy said. At least 12 people

The COVID-19 pandemic has created a nurse staffing crisis that is forcing many U.S. hospitals to pay top dollar to get the help they need to handle the crush of patients this summer. The problem, health leaders say, is twofold: Nurses are quitting or retiring, exhausted or demoralized by the crisis. And many are leaving for lucrative temporary jobs with traveling-nurse agencies that can pay \$5,000 or more a week.

It's gotten to the point where doctors are saying, "Maybe I should quit being a doctor and go be a nurse,' said Dr. Phillip Coule, chief medical officer at Georgia's Augusta University Medical Center, which has on occasion seen 20 to 30 resignations in a week from nurses taking traveling jobs.

rates to get staff from another state to come to our state," Coule said.

The average pay for a traveling nurse has soared from roughly \$1,000 to \$2,000 per week before the pandemic to \$3,000 to \$5,000 now, said Sophia Morris, a vice president at San Diego-based health care staffing firm Aya Healthcare. She said Aya has 48,000 openings for traveling nurses to fill.

At competitor SimpliFi, President James Quick said the hospitals his company works with are seeing unprecedented levels of vacancies.

"Small to medium-sized hospitals generally have dozens of full-time openings, and the large health systems have hundreds of full-time openings," he said.

The explosion in pay has made it hard on hospitals without deep enough pockets.

Kansas Gov. Laura Kelly lamented recently that the state's hospitals profit margins."

"And then we have to pay premium risk being outbid for nurses by other states that pay a "fortune." She said Wednesday that several hospitals, including one in Topeka, had open beds but no nurses to staff them.

In Kansas City, Missouri, Truman Medical Centers has lost about 10 nurses to travel jobs in recent days and is looking for travelers to replace them, said CEO Charlie Shields.

He said it is hard to compete with the travel agencies, which are charging hospitals \$165 to \$170 an hour per nurse. He said the agencies take a big cut of that, but he estimated that nurses are still clearing \$70 to \$90 an hour, which is two to three times what the hospital pays its staff nurses.

"I think clearly people are taking advantage of the demand that is out there," Shields said. "I hate to use 'gouged' as a description, but we are clearly paying a premium and allowing people to have fairly high

Ex-prosecutor indicted for misconduct in **Arbery death**

SAVANNAH, Ga. — A former Georgia prosecutor was indicted Thursday on misconduct charges alleging she used her position to shield the men who chased and killed Ahmaud Arbery from being charged with crimes immediately after the shootings.

A grand jury in coastal Glynn County indicted former Brunswick Judicial Circuit District Attorney Jackie Johnson on a felony count of violating her oath of office and hindering a law enforcement officer, a misdemeanor.

The indictment resulted from an investigation Georgia Attorney General Chris Carr requested last year into local prosecutors' handling of Arbery's slaying after a cellphone video of the shooting and a delay in charges sparked a national outcry.

"While an indictment was returned today, our file is not closed, and we will continue to investigate in order to pursue justice," Carr, a Republican, said in a statement.

Small jet crashes into building on takeoff; four aboard die

A small jet crashed shortly airport in Connecticut on Thursday morning, killing all four people aboard, officials said.

The jet took off just before 10 a.m. from the Robertson Airport before crashing into the building at Trumpf Inc., a manufacturing company, Farmington Police Lt. Tim McKenzie said.

"It appears there was some type of mechanical failure during the takeoff sequence that resulted in the crash behind us," he said.

The plane, a Cessna Citation 560X, was headed to Dare County Regional Airport in Manteo. North Carolina, the Federal Aviation Administration said. Two pilots and two passengers were killed, McKenzie said. Their names were not immediately released.

Jan. 6 riot defendant returned to jail for using internet

IOWA CITY, Iowa - A federal judge on Thursday ordered a prominent participant in the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol to return to jail after he was caught accessing the internet to watch false conspiracy theories about the presidential election.

U.S. District Judge Timothy Kelly said that Doug Jensen, 42, of Des Moines, Iowa, had violated the strict conditions that were set when he released Jensen from jail on July 13, including prohibitions on accessing the internet and using a cellphone.

Kelly ordered marshals at the federal courthouse in Des Moines, where Jensen attended Thursday's hearing, to immediately take him into custody as he awaits trial.

Prosecutors had moved to revoke Jensen's pretrial

release on Aug. 19, days after a federal officer found Jensen in his garage using an iPhone to watch news from Rumble, a streaming platform popular with conservatives.

Jensen acknowledged that he had earlier watched two days of the cyber symposium sponsored by MyPillow CEO Mike Lindell, an ally of former President Donald Trump who used the event to push false theories that the presidential election's outcome was changed by Chinese hackers.

Greek health care workers protest compulsory vaccinations

ATHENS, Greece - Hundreds of Greek health care workers, accompanied by ambulances with sirens blaring, marched through central Athens on Thursday to protest regulations mandating coronavirus vaccines for anyone working in their sector.

Under the regulation, which went into effect Wednesday, any health care worker who isn't vaccinated against COVID-19 or hasn't recovered from the disease within the last six months will be suspended from work without pay.

About 400 protesters rallied outside the health ministry in the center of the Greek capital, before marching to parliament accompanied by about a dozen ambulances. The protesters say they are not against vaccinations, but object to making them compulsory, and say the measure will lead to staff shortages.

The government counters that the measure — which applies to all health care workers in the private and public sector as well as to workers in care homes for the elderly — is necessary to protect the most vulnerable amid a third surge of COVID-19 infections in the country.

China bans 'sissy men' from television

BEIJING - China's government banned effeminate men on TV and told broadcasters Thursday to promote "revolutionary culture," broadening a campaign to tighten control over business and society and enforce official morality.

President Xi Jinping has called for a "national rejuvenation," with tighter Communist Party control of business, education, culture and religion. Companies and the public are under increasing pressure to align with its vision for a more powerful China and healthier society.

The party has reduced children's access to online games and is trying to discourage what it sees as unhealthy attention to celebrities.

Broadcasters must "resolutely put an end to sissy men and other abnormal esthetics," the National Radio and TV Administration said.

That reflects official concern that Chinese pop stars, influenced by the sleek, fashionable look of some South Korean and Japanese singers and actors, are failing to encourage China's young men to be masculine enough.

Josh Ambrose was a winner in the 200 free (2:01.80) and 100 backstroke (1:02.71). Pearcy came in first in the 50 free (27.94), and freshman Mateo Valach took the top spot in the 500 free (5:46.89) and 100 breaststroke (1:21.02).

"It was a good first meet," Lecanto boys coach Bill Wells said. "Mateo as a freshman swam the first 500 he's ever swum and did a pretty decent time.

ST. PETERSBURG — Eduardo Rodriguez pitched four-hit ball into the seventh inning, and the Boston Red Sox beat Tampa Bay 4-0 on Thursday night for a split of their four-game series with the the second AL wild card. AL East-leading Rays.

After dropping the games, Boston ended Tampa Bay's nine-game winning streak with a 3-2 victory on Wednesday night.

Garrett Richards replaced Rodriguez (11-7) with two on and no outs in the seventh, and the right-hander escaped the jam with a pair of strikeouts and a fly ball. Richards earned his second save, finishing a five-hitter.

Rays rookie Wander Franco extended his on-base streak to 33 games with a seventh-inning walk, but he left after the at-bat with a headache. He was checked by a trainer after pointing toward his head several times earlier in the plate appearance.

Franco tied Hall of Famers Mel Ott and Arky Vaughan for the thirdlongest streak by player under 21.

The Red Sox reported no new COVID-19 cases. Eight Boston players, including star shortstop Xander Bogaerts, and two coaches have either had a positive test or are considered close contacts since last Friday.

"It was a good day today," Red Sox manager Alex Cora said before the game. "Nothing to report. Guys are feeling OK, feeling better. Now we've just got to be patient."

Bobby Dalbec drove in two runs for Boston, which has a two-game lead over Oakland in the race for

Tampa Bay's Shane McClanahan -5) gave up four runs and eight hits in five innings. The rookie lefthander had won five straight starts. He allowed three runs or fewer in each of his previous 13 outings.

Boston opened a 2-0 lead on twoout RBI singles by Dalbec in the first and Hunter Renfroe in the J.D. Martinez hit a run-scoring

single before Dalbec connected on another two-out RBI single as Boston went up 4-0 in the fifth.

The Red Sox lead the majors with 284 runs scored with two outs. Dalbec has driven in 23 runs over his last 21 games.

Djokovic eyeing calendar-year Slam at US Open

NEW YORK — Novak Djokovic missed an overhead and stared over toward a section of the Arthur Ashe Stadium stands. After taking the next game, Djokovic glared in that direction again. Later, he spoke to the chair umpire about someone making noise in the middle of points, considered a no-no in

That, then, is pretty much what provided some intrigue and interest for Djokovic's second-round match at the U.S. Open, because the ultimate outcome seemed fairly obvious after all of about 15 minutes Thursday. Or maybe even before he and his 121st-ranked opponent stepped on court on a cool, breezy evening.

And that, surely, pleased Djokovic as he took another step toward completing the first calendar-year Grand Slam in men's tennis since 1969 and claiming a 21st major championship to eclipse the mark he shares with Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal. What Djokovic wasn't thrilled by during a 6-2, 6-3, 6-2 victory over Tallon Griekspoor was some of the distractions arriving during the run of

"I came out on the court with the right intensity, with the right focus. Definitely was a better performance from my side than a couple of nights ago," the No. 1-ranked Djokovic said, referring to his win Tuesday, when he dropped a set and was taken aback by hearing what he thought were boos but actually were last-name chants of 'Ruuuuune!" for his 18-year-old foe, Holger Vitus Nodskov Rune.

Here's what matters the most: Diokovic is 2-0 at Flushing Meadows this week and 23-0 in Grand Slam tournaments this year, with five more wins standing between him and history.

"I am motivated as ever to do well," said Djokovic, a 34-year-old from Serbia

who will face 2014 U.S. Open finalist Kei Nishikori next. "I am trying to be the best I can be every single day and let's see what happens.'

This was only the fourth Slam match for Griekspoor, a 25-year-old Dutchman who tends to appear on the lower-level ATP Challenger Tour. And he never really stood much of a chance against Djokovic, who broke to lead 3-1 and was on his way.

Djokovic dominated every statistical category. He served well, to the tune of 13 aces. He serve-and-volleyed occasionally. He returned well enough to win half of Griekspoor's service games. He dominated baseline exchanges.

Maybe that's why ESPN's telecast cut away in the third set.







should East do now? The defenders need one more trick. Declarer is known to have started with five hearts and two diamonds

No matter how his six black-suit cards are divided (unless he made a very strange two-heart bid with 5-5 in the majors), East will get the setting trick if he returns a spade!

After cashing his spade tricks, declarer must have two clubs left in his hand, and East wins a trick with the club king.
