Keeping up tradition

Local man puts up vintage Christmas display

On Christmas Day 1955, the front page of the Dubuque, Iowa, Telegraph-Herald ran a story and photo about a Christmas display on the grounds of Crystal Spring Farm in neighboring Wisconsin.

"The Crystal Spring Farm is ablaze again with the magic glow of hundreds of colored lights," the story starts. "And nightly, Santa Claus waves jauntily from behind his sleigh and reindeer team on the farm grounds.'

The farm, owned by Joe V. Kunkel, and its cluster of white and red buildings, was set on a slope of a valley off Highway

Before going into the military, Kunkel's son, Duane, had started the tradition of stringing colored lights throughout the property.

In 1955, Kunkel and his 19-year-old daughter, Iola, built a giant Santa with his

sleigh and a team of reindeer to add to the festive display.

This Christmas, 66 years later and 1,250 miles from its origins, the vintage Santa and company have found a new home in Florida on the lawn of Kunkel's grandson and Iola's son, Randy Thor.

"I'm a true believer in tradition," Thor said as he put some finishing touches on his family's holiday heirloom. "When I was a kid, I thought it was so impressive."

Back then, it belonged to his aunt and uncle, who lived

After they both died, the family held an auction and one of the items up for bid was the Santa display.

"I bought it for \$25 about 25 years ago," Thor said. "It didn't need too much work on it then, but over the years I've replaced some of the reindeers' antlers and tails."

It still has the original wiring for Rudolph's red light bulb nose that his grandfather used, and Thor still has the original light bulb, although after 66 years much of the red has worn off and now he keeps it

Pruitt also downloaded multiple files of videos and images depicting child pornography from the IP address on Oct. 4, Nov. 14 and Sept. 3 gather as evidence.

Authorities executed a warrant on Tuesday to search Deckant's apartment, where Pruitt found files of child pornography on Deckant's computer and on a USB flash drive attached to a TV in Deckant's bedroom, according to his arrest report.

Deckant's Mirandized statements to Pruitt were redacted in his arrest report.

Upon hearing the deputy, Keo jumped up from the chair and reportedly threw something from his hand. The deputy observed one 9mm round rolling on the floor near his foot.

During a criminal history check, the deputy found Keo was a convicted felon as of Dec. 14, 2001. He was placed under arrest and transported to the Citrus County Detention Facility.

Two days later, a deputy spoke to the woman via phone, who reportedly admitted to receiving phone calls from Keo between Dec. 4 and 6. Keo's outgoing calls were checked and it was discovered he called her 23 times.

Keo had been served a pre-trial release on Dec. 5 under the condition of no contact with the woman. The deputy responded to the detention facility and placed him under arrest again.

Sienna Miller settles phone hacking claim against tabloid

LONDON (AP) — Actor Sienna Miller on Thursday accepted "substantial" damages from the publisher of British tabloid newspaper The Sun, which she accuses of hacking her phone and leaking news of her pregnancy.

Miller, a performer whose films include "Factory Girl,"
"Black Mass" and "The Lost
City of Z," joins a list of dozens of people who have received payments from News Group Newspapers over illegal eavesdropping that took place over a decade ago.

News Group Newspapers has paid millions of pounds to settle lawsuits from hacking victims. Most of the cases have involved the now-defunct News of the World, which was shut down by owner Rupert Murdoch in 2011 after revelations that its employees had snooped on the voice mails of celebrities, politicians and even crime victims in search of scoops.

News Group Newspapers has acknowledged hacking by the News of the World, but not by The Sun, which continues to operate.

Nonetheless Miller, 39, said she felt "fully vindicated" after the publisher agreed to pay her undisclosed "substantial damages" without admitting liability.

Outside court, Miller said journalists and management at the newspaper "very nearly ruined my life. I have certainly seen how they have ruined the lives of others.'

"Their behavior shattered me, damaged my reputation –

Chopin's last piano gets its 19th-century features back

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - The last piano on which Frederic Chopin played and composed in Paris is being renovated by a U.S. expert who is giving it back its original mid-19th century characteristics.

Paul McNulty is spending days at the Frederic Chopin Museum in Warsaw filling in some cracks in the soundboard and putting in wire strings like the ones used by Paris piano manufacturer Camille Pleyel – Chopin's favorite – in 1848.

"We're very, very close to at times beyond repair - and the character and the identity

of this instrument when we put the correct strings on, everything else being in very good condition," McNulty told The Associated Press on Thursday.

Pleyel made the instrument, with serial number 14810, available to Chopin, already seriously ailing at the time, in the fall of 1848. After Chopin's death in October 1849, the piano was bought by his Scottish student and friend, Jane Stirling, who then offered it to Chopin's eldest sister, Ludwika Jedrzejewiczowa.

The piano arrived in Warsaw in 1850 – it still bears the red customs seal of Russia that ruled Warsaw at the time. It survived two world wars, including the destruction of the 1944 Warsaw Rising.

Given the provenance and the good condition of the instrument, McNulty said it is 'priceless."

Texas-born McNulty says this is the "best preserved Pleyel piano in the world," despite having quite a dramatic



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Jussie Smollett found guilty

Attorney says will appeal guilty verdict

CHICAGO — Former "Empire" actor Jussie Smollett was convicted Thursday on charges he staged an anti-gay, racist attack on himself nearly three years ago and then lied to Chicago police about it.

In the courtroom as the verdict was read, Smollett stood and faced the jury, showing no visible reaction. He and his family later left the courthouse without comment.

The jury found the 39-year-old guilty on five counts of disorderly conduct — for each separate time he was charged with lying to police in the days immediately after the alleged attack. He was acquitted on a sixth count, of lying to a detective in ers after the verdict. mid-February, weeks after

Smollett said he was attacked.

Outside court, special prosecutor Dan Webb called the verdict "a resounding message by the jury that Mr. Smollett did exactly what we said he

Smollett "wreaked havoc here in the city for weeks on end for no reason whatsoever," then compounded the problem by lying under oath to the jury, Webb said.

Defense attorney Nenye Uche said Smollett would appeal the conviction. He said Smollett was disappointed but "holding up very strong," and is "committed to clearing his name." He expressed confidence the actor would be cleared by an appellate

"Unfortunately we were facing an uphill battle where Jussie was already tried and convicted in the media and then we had to somehow get the jury to forget or unsee all the news stories that they had been hearing that were negative for the last three years," Uche told report-

Judge James Linn set a

post-trial hearing for Jan. 27, and said he would schedule Smollett's sentencing at a later date. Disorderly conduct is a class 4 felony that carries a prison sentence of up to three years, but experts have said if convicted, Smollett would likely be placed on probation and ordered to perform community service.

The damage to his personal and professional life may be more severe. Smollett lost his role on the TV program "Empire" after prosecutors said the alleged attack was a hoax, and he told jurors earlier this week, "I've lost my livelihood.'

The jury deliberated for just over nine hours Wednesday and Thursday after a roughly one-week trial in which two brothers testified that Smollett recruited them to fake the attack near his home in downtown Chicago in January 2019. They said Smollett orchestrated the hoax, telling them to put a noose around his neck and rough him up in view of a surveillance camera, and that he said he wanted video of the hoax made public via

A sell-off on Wall Street left stocks broadly lower Thursday, giving back some of the market's gains from a three-day winning streak.

The S&P 500 fell 0.7%, with more than threefourths of the companies in the benchmark index closing lower. The techheavy Nasdaq composite fell 1.7%, while the Dow Jones Industrial Average slipped less than 1 point.

Small-company stocks fell more than the rest of the market, sending the Russell 2000 index 2.3% lower. Roughly three stocks fell for every one that rose on the New York Stock Exchange.

The pullback follows a 3.6% gain for the S&P 500 index over the first three days of the week, largely in response to easing worries about the omicron variant of the COVID-19 virus. That marked an aboutface for stocks following two weeks of losses over concerns about rising inflation and the coronavirus potentially crimping economic growth.

Investors welcomed reports this week of early indications suggesting the omicron variant may be

including word from 1.51% late Wednesday. Pfizer that its lab tests suggest the drugmaker's COVID-19 boosters provide protection against the new strain.

"Today, because of that, folks are taking a little bit of a breather to gauge other information that could suggest a more sustained direction for the market, particularly on the economic data front," said Greg Bassuk, CEO of AXS Investments.

The S&P 500 fell 33.76 points to 4,667.45. The Dow slipped less than 1 point to 35,754.69. The Nasdaq fell 269.62 points to 15,517.37. The Russell 2000 gave up 51.50 points to 2,220.71. Every major index is still on track for a weekly gain.

Technology stocks and a mix of retailers and other companies that rely on direct consumer spending weighed on the S&P 500 the most. Chipmaker Nvidia fell 3.4%, while Tesla slid 6.1% for the biggest drop in the index.

Travel-related companies slipped after spending the last few days gaining ground. Carnival fell 1.7% and United Airlines fell 1.8%.

Bond yields fell slightly. The yield on the 10-year less dangerous than delta, Treasury fell to 1.49% from next week.

Energy futures closed mostly lower. The price of U.S. crude oil fell 2% and helped pull energy stocks lower. Devon Energy fell

Health care companies rose. CVS Health climbed 4.5% after raising its dividend and issuing a solid forecast. Pfizer, which has been touting the potential benefits of a vaccine booster against the latest COVID-19 variant, rose

Investors received an encouraging update on job market's recovery. The Labor Department reported that the number of Americans applying for unemployment benefits plunged last week to the lowest level in 52 years.

The employment market's recovery has been a key focus for Wall Street while it gauges the strength of the economy as it moves past the virus pandemic. Rising inflation has been another focus, and investors will get an update Friday when the Labor Department releases its Consumer Price Index for November.

US unemployment claims at 52-year low

WASHINGTON — The number of Americans applying for unemployment benefits plunged last week to the lowest level in 52 years, more evidence that the U.S. job market is recovering from last year's coronavirus recession.

Unemployment claims dropped by 43,000 to 184,000 last week, the lowest since September 1969, the Labor Department said Thursday. The fourweek moving average, which smooths out week-United States hard in

March 2020. volatility Seasonal likely contributed to last week's drop as the Labor Department adjusted the numbers to reflect job market fluctuations around the holidays, said Stephen Stanley, chief economist at Amherst Pierpont Securities. Before seasonal adjustments, claims actually rose by nearly 64,000 to almost 281,000.

Still, Stanley said in a research note that "the underlying trend remains downward and should be lower than it was prior to the pandemic ... The unfilled demand for workers is much larger than it was then and layoffs appear to be noticeably lower.'

Overall, just under 2 million Americans were collecting traditional unemployment benefits the week that ended Nov. 27.

Weekly claims, which are a proxy for layoffs, have fallen steadily most of the year since topping 900,000 one week in early January. They are now below the

Based on this news, the Dow Jones has dropped sharply, all the other international stock markets are reacting negatively, and Europe has stopped all flights to South Africa.

We need to be concerned about this because, as I have constantly remarked, COVID has not gone away. A month ago, I wrote that the Delta Plus variant has been surging in many areas of Europe and would soon be on its way to the USA. Now we are seeing this becoming a fact as many US states are experiencing increases in infections, hospitalizations

Citrus County is not yet seeing significant increases, but that will soon happen. We are entering another surge. Then, we must assume this variant in South Africa will become a major problem. It will follow the usual path to Europe and from there it will show up on our doorstep in the near future.

All of this comes as our entire country is under the delusion that it has all gone away and everything is back to normal. All of our stores, bars and restaurants are fully open; millions are travelling on airlines; cruises are back in operation; football stadiums are packed with people shoulder to shoulder; barely anyone is wearing a mask. And still 40 percent of the country is unvaccinated! How stupid can we be?

We will have the benefit of a new medication in tablet form that is said to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death. But it will not prevent infection by COVID with the possibility of some unpleasant symptoms. There is no indication it will prevent long-haul COVID with a potentially significant impact on our daily lives in future months or years. And no one knows if it would be effective against this new African variant.

We are all tired of this. Is there no end to it? It makes life tough, almost unbearable. But any exposure to the devastation of COVID is not a good option.

Be more creative in attracting workers

Steven D. Ervin's column, "New system check needed" in the Sunday, Oct. 17, Chronicle seemed to push the myth that the state unemployment system is a socialist handout for people who are gaming the system in order to avoid work. While I sympathize with his difficulties in hiring personnel for his

restaurant, he seems to have some misconceptions about the state's very flawed unemployment system.

The CONNECT system (Florida unemployment) debuted in Oct. 2013 under then Gov. Rick Scott. Gov. DeSantis himself said that the system was internally constructed to put as many

kinds of pointless roadblocks along the way, and it was definitely done in a way to lead to the least number of claims being paid out. Yet, Gov. DeSantis barely acted to improve the system – even during the worst of the COVID crisis.

In fact, the computerized system is so flawed that people are waiting weeks, sometimes months, just to get a weekly payment. Software glitches are causing people to be falsely told that they are ineligible, forcing them to go through time-wasting appeals processes.

All this for a maximum of \$275 per week for 12 weeks – agrand total of \$3,300. And that's the maximum. Some people are getting far less than that - not even enough to buy groceries, let alone pay rent and other bills. Does Mr. Ervin really think that's what is holding up his hiring process?

While there are always some people who will consider gaming the system, past research has shown these numbers are extremely low. Most people would prefer to work so they can provide for their families. And, given the current high demand in the job market for workers, people have more choices now than in the past – they are looking for higher wages and more benefits. This is the basis of the American marketplace – competition. Mr. Ervin's problem is he is not able to match the competition.

Mr. Ervin's claim that, "we are heading toward more people receiving than contributing," is simply false. Florida's unemployment rate is 5 percent; in Citrus County, it is a bit higher at 6.5 percent. That's a lot more contributors in the job market than a year ago.

The reality is that there are more jobs than people seeking employment. Job seekers can afford to be picky. Employers need to be more creative in attracting workers.

Spending \$226.5 million to increase Medicaid payment rates for health- and human-services providers such as nursing homes as a way to address staffing problems. The budget also would provide \$100 million for cancer care and research, an increase of \$37 million from the current year.

Providing \$225 million for pay increases for state employees, in addition to the increases sought for correctional officers and law-enforcement officers.

Eliminating state gas taxes for a fivemonth period and holding a series of sales-tax "holidays." That includes a 10day period in which back-to-school shoppers could avoid paying sales taxes on clothes, school supplies and personal computers.

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

Court rejects Trump's efforts to keep records from 1/6 panel

WASHINGTON — A federal appeals court ruled Thursday against an effort by former President Donald Trump to shield documents from the House committee investigating the Jan. 6 insurrection at the Capitol.

In a 68-page ruling, the three-judge panel tossed aside Trump's various arguments for blocking through executive privilege records that the committee regards as vital to its investigation into the run-up to the deadly riot aimed at overturning the results of the 2020 presidential election.

Judge Patricia Millett, writing for the court, said Congress had "uniquely vital interests" in studying the events of Jan. 6 and said President Joe Biden had made a "carefully reasoned" determination that the documents were in the public interest and that executive privilege should therefore not be invoked. Trump also failed to show any harm that would occur from the release of the sought-after records, Millett

Reality TV's Josh Duggar convicted of child porn possession

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — Former reality TV star Josh Duggar was immediately taken into custody Thursday after a federal jury convicted him of downloading and possessing child pornography.

The jury found the 33-year-old Duggar guilty on one count each of receiving and possessing child pornography. He faces up to 20 years in prison and fines of up to \$250,000 for each count when he's sentenced.

U.S. District Judge Timothy Brooks said sentencing will happen in about four months.

WASHINGTON — Bob Dole lay in state Thursday at the U.S. Capitol, as the president and others gathered to pay tribute to a "giant of our history" who served the country in war and in politics with pragmatism, self-deprecating wit and a bygone era's sense of common civility and compromise.

President Joe Biden, a longtime friend, said Dole, the former Republican senator, presidential contender and World War II veteran, should have the final word as he read from his colleague of 25 years' own observation that he had served the country best when putting "principles over party."

U.S. health authorities again expanded the nation's booster campaign Thursday, opening extra doses of Pfizer's COVID-19 vaccine to several million 16- and 17-year-olds.

The U.S. and many other nations already were urging adults to get booster shots to pump up immunity that can wane months after vaccination, calls that intensified with the discovery of the worrisome new omicron variant.

Florida signs veteran secondary coach Raymond away from LSU

GAINESVILLE — Veteran defensive backs coach Corey Raymond is leaving LSU for Florida, a big-time coup for new coach Billy Napier.

Napier officially announced Raymond as the team's cornerbacks coach and assistant head coach for the defense Thursday.

A three-year starter at LSU (1989-91) who went on to play six years in the NFL for the New York Giants and Chicago, Raymond spent the last 10 seasons at LSŪ. He also served as the program's recruiting coor-

dinator the past two years. Raymond's secondary at LSU produced seven All-Americans: Eric Reid (2012), Jalen Mills (2015), Jamal Adams (2016), Tre'Davious White (2016), Greedy Williams (2018), Grant Delpit (2018-19) and Derek

Stingley Jr. (2019-20). Raymond previously spent time at Nebraska (2011) and Utah State (2009-10). His also served a prior stint at LSU

(2006-08).Napier negotiated a \$12.5 million salary pool to hire 10 full-time assistants and dozens of support personnel. He is expected to part ways with most or all of former Florida coach Dan Mullen's staff, which is preparing the team to play UCF in the Gasparilla Bowl in Tampa on Dec. 23.

Raymond joins a staff that already includes co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach Patrick Toney, director of strength and conditioning Mark Hocke, running backs coach Jabbar Juluke and offensive analyst Ryan O'Hara.

Rights groups have called for a total boycott of the Beijing Winter Games, citing Chinese human rights abuses against its Uyghur minority in the northwest Xinjiang region, which some have called genocide. They also point to Beijing's suppression of democratic protests in Hong Kong and a sweeping crackdown on dissent in the semi-autonomous territory.

Canada's move came as little surprise in the context of the sharp deterioration in bilateral ties since China arrested two Canadians in December 2018, shortly

Rutgers beats No. 1 Purdue at the buzzer

No. 23 Seton Hall edges No. 7 Texas

 ${\bf PISCATAWAY, N.J.-Ron\ Harper\ Jr.}$ hit a buzzer-beater from just inside half court, and Rutgers shocked Purdue in its first-ever game as the nation's No. 1 team, winning 70-68 on Thursday night.

Harper finished with 30 points on 10-of-15 shooting and 10 rebounds for the Scarlet Knights, a do-it-all performance that concluded with the most stunning shot of the young college hoops season. Rutgers (5-4, 1-1 Big Ten) beat the top-ranked team for the first time in program history.

Purdue had gone ahead 68-67 on a layup by Trevion Williams with 4 seconds left. With no timeouts, Rutgers inbounded the ball to Harper, who dribbled across the half-court line and let it fly from the big "R" logo. The ball went through as time expired and Rutgers fans stormed the court.

Williams scored 21 points off the bench for Purdue (8-1, 1-1 Big Ten), which was a unanimous No. 1 in this week's AP Top 25, the program's first time atop the poll. Its stay will be brief.

No. 23 Seton Hall 64, No. 7 Texas 60

NEWARK, N.J. — Jared Rhoden scored 18 points and made the go-ahead basket as No. 23 Seton Hall knocked off its second top-10 team this season, beating No. 7 Texas 64-60.

Cold-shooting Bryce Aiken scored five of his 10 points in the final minute, including a clutch 3-pointer, as the Pirates (8-1) won their fifth straight game. Seton Hall also has an impressive road win at then-No. 4 Michigan on Nov. 16.

Tre Mitchell had season highs of 19 points and 11 rebounds for Texas (6-2). which had won five in a row.

No. 5 Gonzaga 80, **Merrimack 55**

SPOKANE, Wash. — Drew Timme scored 22 points, making all eight of his shots, and No. 5 Gonzaga beat coldshooting Merrimack 80-55.

Freshman center Chet Holmgren had 15 points and 15 rebounds, and Julian Strawther added 15 points for Gonzaga (8-2), which has won 57 consecutive home games — the longest streak in the nation and a program record.

Jordan Minor scored 17 points and Ziggy Reid had 16 for Merrimack (4-7).

Following in Ali's footsteps

Grandson to box Saturday as fights return to Madison Square Garden

NEW YORK — Nico Ali Walsh studied everything from a ticket stub to a scale, loving all the memorabilia from some of boxing's biggest names and nights.

Well, except for a picture of his grandfather getting cracked in the head by Joe Frazier's thunderous left hand.

Muhammad Ali's grandson has followed him into boxing and on Saturday follows him into the ring at Madison Square Garden, where The Greatest did everything from box in the "Fight of the Century" to guest referee the main event in the first Wrestlemania.

"This place holds a sentimental value," Āli Walsh said. "If I wasn't related to my grandfather then it would be super special just for the history. But because he fought here and I haven't really anywhere where he fought like my family's going to think the same thing when they come

Ali Walsh, who grew up in Las Vegas, had never been to New York until this week. He looked like any other tourist checking out the inside of the famed arena Wednesday — except his name hung high above in lights, just as the Ali name had when Muhammad Ali and later Laila Ali fought

"I never imagined that this would happen. It's amazing, it's really special," Ali Walsh said. "Like I said, it's not just special because I'm a boxer, this is my career. It's special for sentimental

reasons. This is where my family was. Even my aunt fought here. So, I'm just continuing history and this is just a real, real special time.'

The smaller Theater inside Madison Square Garden has staged three cards, but this is the first inside the big room since the coronavirus pandemic prevented and then limited the amount of fans who could attend events. But the New York Knicks and Rangers have long been back, concerts have returned and now it's box-

ing's turn 'It's fantastic, just to have fans in the building for all of our events," said Joel Fisher, MSG's executive vice president of marquee events and operations.

Lomachenko, the two-time

Olympic gold medalist from which Ali avenged at the Garden Ukraine, has been the headliner for big crowds at Madison Square Garden before. But the biggest bouts are now in Las Vegas, unlike when Ali was the star of the

He fought eight times at the Garden, winning all of them except his first fight with Frazier on March 8, 1971. Frazier knocked Ali down in the 15th round and won a unanimous decision to retain his heavyweight title and hand Ali his first loss.

Wearing a "Fight of the Century" shirt during a tour of the venue, Ali Walsh said it was tough to see the picture of Frazier's powerful punch that dropped his grandfather. But he noted that some good came from the defeat,

in 1974 before winning their epic rubber match in the Philippines.

"If he didn't lose that fight, if he won that fight, then we wouldn't have gotten 'The Thrilla in Manila,' we wouldn't have gotten the second fight even with Joe Frazier," Ali Walsh said. "So everything happened for a reason and those were some of the greatest fights in all of boxing, one of the

best trilogies in all of boxing." Ali Walsh, 21, is a long way from anything like that. He only turned pro in August and his middleweight fight Saturday against Reyes Sanchez (6-0) is scheduled

for only four rounds. He used to show videos of his training and sparring to his grandfather, who died in 2016. Ali stressed to him the importance of moving and dancing, part of an arsenal that made him stand out from so many fighters before or

"I remember he used to say he won't miss boxing, boxing will miss him, and I really feel like that makes sense now that he's gone," Ali Walsh said. "His shadow looms over the sport of boxing, so it's not just me getting compared to him because of me being the grandson. Everyone gets compared to him because he is boxing and it's just, he left such an impact on the sport.'

Ali Walsh didn't realize how big that impact was as a child, though it's clear now that the son of Ali's daughter, Rasheda, has launched his own career. While fans in the arena chanted "Ali! Ali!", others watching at home told him they cried because of what that name

meant to their own families. 'Some people said they watched my first fight or my second fight with their parents who used to watch my grandfather's fights with their parents, and they would get emotional because it brings back a nostalgia that people miss," Ali Walsh said. "It brings back my grandfather in a sense and just repeating history, like being here, when he fought here, is really special."

Baylor senior safety Jalen Pitre was named defensive player of the year and second-year Bears coach Dave Aranda was also honored in the AP All-Big 12 team and awards released Thursday, as determined by the vote of a panel of 20 sports writers and sportscasters who regularly cover the league.

Hall is the Big 12 rushing leader with 1,464 yards and 20 touchdowns this season, and has an active FBS record of 24 consecutive games with a rushing touchdown. The junior, who got 16 of the 20 votes for top offensive player, has 3,941 career rushing yards.

Texas freshman receiver Xavier Worthy, who had 62 catches and leads the Big 12 with 981 yards and 12 TDs receiving, was voted newcomer of the year. He is also a first-team All-Big 12 pick at receiver.

Aranda got 15 of the 20 votes for coach of the year. Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy, whose team lost to Baylor in the Big 12 championship game, got the other

Pitre, a first-team safety for the second year in a row, has 17 ½ tackles for loss and was the only player in the nation during the regular season with at least three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and two interceptions. Pitre got 12 of 20 votes for top defensive player while Oklahoma State linebacker Malcolm Rodriguez, with a league-high 119 tackles overall, got five votes.




If South had won the first trick and immediately played a spade, working for a ruff on the board, West would have taken that trick and led her second club. When East got in with the spade ace, he would have given his partner a club ruff. Then, two rounds of trumps would have

been lethal.

Instead, declarer led his diamond king at trick two. First, West dropped her nine as a suit-preference signal for spades; and second, East ducked the trick. (If he had won, South would have either drawn trumps and run the clubs or gotten a spade ruff.) East took the next trump trick and played two rounds of spades. While West cashed her other two winners, East discarded his remaining clubs. Then a club ruff defeated the contract. Sweet!

However, did you notice declarer's missed opportunity?

After the diamond king wins, he cashes the club ace before playing another trump. Then East cannot get a club ruff because West is out of the suit, and West cannot take a club ruff because he is out of trumps. Cool!
