Experts: Spike not second wave

Officials say rise in new virus cases due to expansion of testing

In the past week there have been 13,624 new Florida coronavirus cases.

Between June 9, 2020, and June 15, 2020, that's the most cases Florida has recorded over seven days since the state began keeping track. It is more than all

the cases in more than 100 other countries since the pandemic began.

The trend has also hit Citrus County.

In the past six days Citrus County has had 24 cases, also among the highest number recorded over that time period.

With more than 80,000 cases in Florida and nearly 3,000

Two new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest FDOH update. No new deaths were reported. To date in the county, 152 people have tested positive and 12 have died.

deaths in our state alone, are we seeing the second wave many health experts have warned us about and braced against?

Local and national health leaders said no.

"We're still riding the first wave. We're just seeing the results of (additional) testing. We're testing like crazy," Ernesto "Tito" Rubio, the Citrus County health department director, told the Chronicle.

As of Tuesday, the DOH has tested nearly 7,700 people in Citrus County for the virus. Of those, 152 tested positive, or about 2%. In late April it was 7%. Florida-wide, nearly 1.5 million people have been tested and 5.5% were positive.

One indication that this is not a second wave is that despite the

increase in cases, the percent testing positive has remained about the same for the past few weeks, Rubio said.

During a second wave of the pandemic, Rubio said he would expect an increase in the number of infected people sent to intensive care units or needing ventilators and that's not happening.

Originally, businesses and public places were shut down and people asked to stay at home so local and national

■ **Why are you running?** Citrus County, he said, is growing. The Sun-coast Parkway will attract more people here once it's extended. This year alone saw 4,000 new Homestead exemptions filed. Dalton said he wants to be part of the growth and, with his experience at the sheriff's office and working for the

■ **Why are you running?** Having worked in the property appraiser's office for 14 years before retiring, Gregory said he sees "a few issues" that he believes could be improved. One of the biggest, he said, is taking a hard look at the contract paid to the Ohio-based company that

Newest principal of Inverness Middle School is former student

It probably didn't come as a surprise to 33-year Inverness Middle School teacher Steve Crandall when he learned a student from the school became its principal.

"Our mission here at IMS has been to make life-long learners," Crandall said. "It's a testament that

we are working on a mission, and I'm sure with Ms. Baird that will continue that mission smoothly."

"I am humbled and blessed for this opportunity," Melissa Baird said about the latest title in her 23 years of education. "I truly believe things happen for a reason and our paths take us exactly where we need to go, and I'm exactly where I need to be."

Baird became Inverness Middle's principal at the start of June 2020, when her former teacher Crandall also retired as a math and science teacher for seventh and eighth graders.

"She would have been a great boss," Crandall said. "It would have been wonderful." Crandall left Baird with some advice: "Love your IMS family."

Baird, who was then

Missy Zaniewski, and her family moved to Inverness in 1984 from her birthplace of West Palm Beach.

She entered Inverness Middle as a fifth grader, who was "sheltered, very nervous and very shy" because of time in private school.

However, the local school embraced her without a second thought.

Sumter County property appraiser's office, he believes he's the right man for the job.

■ *What changes would you bring to the office? No changes. Rather, he said he would enhance the already strong foundation of the office and emphasize greater interaction with the community by visiting schools, deed companies and organizations to educate folks about how the property appraiser works.*

■ *I really want to put the property appraiser office out there as a public organization,* Dalton said.

■ *Duke Energy is the county's largest taxpayer and its valuations can require special expertise. How would you deal with Duke?* Dalton said he would rely on the expertise of the office's experts and consult with other counties who have dealings with Duke. Communication is the key, he said.

cited his servant philosophy and people skills.

"I'm not a politician and never will be," Dalton said. "I'm a public servant."

■ *What about the property appraiser's \$3.5 million budget? Too much? Not enough? Just about right?* The state sets the budget and it's just about right, he said.

"We've managed the last eight or nine years with the same budget and staffing and we're going to continue that."

■ *What about some folks who get a tax break by claiming an agricultural use of their property?*

Dalton said he's bound by Florida Statutes which allows the exemption.

"I can't look into the future and guess what someone is going to do (with the future use of their land)," he said.

■ *How do you deal with property owners angry or frustrated about their valuations?* Dalton said this comes with the territory and the key is educating the public about the process and — above all else — effectively communicating. That's why an up-to-date and informative website is key, he said.

hosts the office's website, Tyler Technologies.

■ *What changes would you bring? "No big changes," he said. "I want a smooth transition."*

■ *Duke Energy is the county's largest taxpayer and its valuations can require special expertise. How would you deal with Duke?* "I think we're handling (Duke Energy) the right way," Gregory said.

■ *What strengths do you bring to the position?* "Experience, experience, experience," he said.

Gregory worked as a field appraiser and also did inspections via his office computer. Much of his time was spent dealing with the public and he said he went "above and beyond" in solving people's needs. Some of his suggestions were adopted by co-workers, he said.

Not enough? Just about right? Gregory said the \$3.5 million is about right for the office. Some savings could be realized, he said, after examining the technology company's contract. But that will prove difficult because once these corporations gain a foothold it's difficult to remove them, he said.

The staff of around 48 employees is just about right, he said.

■ *How do you deal with property owners angry or frustrated about their valuations?* It comes down to a d e q u a t e l y

communicating with people, he said.

That is an area Gregory said he excelled at while at the property appraiser's office.

"You have to explain to people," he said. "You just have to make it clear to customers that we follow the Florida Statutes and that that's what we have to do."

"I really enjoy talking to people," Gregory added.

If elected, Gregory said he would get out of his office and work on the "front line" every so often with the rest of the employees.

"What I remember most is the loving and caring atmosphere the teachers and staff provided," Baird said. "Also the friendships I formed ... are the same ones I have today — lifelong friends."

Crandall said he remembers teaching Baird his first year at Inverness Middle during the 1987/88 school year.

"I have always thought very kindly of her as a student — very positive, a good work effort, sense of humor and citizenship," he said, "and she thought I was a pretty OK teacher, too."

Baird later graduated from Citrus High, where teachers honed her talents as a reader and writer, and then from the University of Central Florida.

She started teaching English Language Arts in 1998 at Orlando's Cypress Creek High School and Freedom High School.

"I have always wanted to be a teacher," Baird said. "When you play games as a kid, I was always playing pretend school."

Baird returned to the

Citrus County School District and was hired in 2006 to teach English at her alma mater, Citrus High.

"It was surreal, just like it was returning to Inverness Middle School," Baird said. "It was so exciting and a lot of the teachers I had were still there."

While at Citrus High, Baird transitioned into an administrative role, serving in various supervisory capacities and obtaining her masters degree in leadership.

When then-Citrus High Assistant Principal Linda Connors moved to Crystal River High to become its principal in 2013, she hired Baird to be an assistant principal there.

Even though she's managing much more than a classroom as an

administrator, Baird said she tries to emphasize success in her relationships with staff the same way she did with students.

"That never goes away," she said.

Baird never thought she'd be principal over her old school, Inverness Middle.

"It was mixture of pure happiness and terror at the same time," she said about hearing the news. "To have the opportunity to be principal is huge ... and I'm an overachiever so I don't want to mess this up."

She also can't wait to meet her students.

"If we keep student well-being at the forefront of our minds," she said, "we will always be doing the right thing and we'll

always be heading in the right direction."

With the exception of some refurbishments, Inverness Middle's campus looks similar to its days of the mid-1980s, Baird said.

"It was a blast from the past," she said. "Some teachers I had are still there, some students I taught at Citrus High School are now employed there."

Rachel Albrecht was a student of Baird's Advanced Placement English class in 2011 at Citrus High before graduating from there in 2012.

"She was great," Albrecht said about Baird. "I remember we did lots of fun projects."

Emily Thatcher, Albrecht's classmate from Citrus High, also thought

Baird was invaluable when she applied to colleges.

"She was a great resource," Thatcher said.

Albrecht and Thatcher said Baird helped inspire them to start teaching English at Inverness Middle in 2017, and they're looking forward to having Baird motivate them as a principal.

"I'm really looking forward to working with her," Thatcher said. "I'll just be learning something different here, especially in a professional capacity."

"I was super excited to

say 'hi' to her again," Albrecht said. "As a teacher, she was kind, helpful and really helped me get through the class and pass the AP test, and she should be the same, helpful and kind leader."

After meeting with school staff, Baird said Inverness Middle's personality still hasn't changed since she was a student there.

"Every single one said what they love most are the people and the loving and caring atmosphere there," she said. "We're a family."

Florida county reconsiders housing Confederate statue

TAVARES — A Florida county with a fraught racial history is having second thoughts about housing a Confederate statue at a tax-supported historical museum at a time when Confederate monuments across the U.S. have been removed.

Lake County officials said Tuesday they will ask the state to find a more appropriate place for the statue of Confederate Gen. Edmund Kirby Smith.

Lake County commissioners last year endorsed moving the statue to a historic courthouse in Tavares, which houses the Lake County Historical Society northwest of Orlando.

FHP reminds motorists of dangers

Troopers keep eyes on U.S. 19

Florida Highway Patrol said it has multiple purposes for staging troopers along U.S. 19 including seat belt compliance and monitoring speed as motorists enter a construction zone south of Crystal River continuing into Homosassa.

Trooper Recruit McCullough said following posted speed limits is always smart and driving too fast can have dire consequences. "Speed kills," he said following pulling over several motorists Tuesday. "When you do not obey the laws as far as the speed limits that are set it can cause you or someone else their life. It's very important that you follow that guideline."

Southbound motorists entering

the extended construction zone on U.S. 19 are faced with speed limits reduced from 45 mph near the West Venable intersection to 35 mph inside the

construction zone.

"We're sitting in this spot because traffic is going into a construction zone," Master Trooper Tod Cloud said. "Just yesterday

we had a reconfiguration of the lanes."

He added that lanes regularly are shifted as work continues making travel tricky on the crowded highway. Receiving traffic ticket inside a construction zone can also become costly in a financial sense as fines are increased in a construction zone when workers are present.

"Once motorists are in the actual construction zone the fines are doubled," he said.

Congested work zones require extra attention and distractions like cell phones or other devices are frowned upon, according to the Troopers.

McCullough said it only takes a second to take eyes off the road before an accident can happen.

"It is so important to drive and only pay attention to the road, not your phone. Your phone will be there. Texting is not important enough to cause you or somebody else their life," he said.

Warner Bros to hold massive virtual event for DC Comics fans

LOS ANGELES — Comic-Con may be canceled this year, but Warner Bros. will convene a 24-hour virtual gathering of the biggest names in the DC Comics universe.

The studio announced Tuesday that DC FanDome will be held on Aug. 22 starting at 1 p.m. The event will feature talent announcements and reveal new content from WB games, comics, film and television.

The announcement comes a couple months after Comic-Con, which attracts tens of thousands of comics fans to San Diego, was canceled due to the coronavirus-related restrictions around large gatherings.

Virtual panels will feature cast and creators from DC films including "The Batman," "Black Adam" and "Wonder Woman 1984." The panels will also highlight casts from television shows such as "The Flash," "Stargirl" and "Black Lightning."

"Wonder Woman 1984" was expected to be one of the summer's biggest releases, but its arrival in theaters has been delayed until October.

FanDome will be spread out across six different areas on the event's website: Hall of Heroes, DC WatchVerse, DC YouVerse, DC KidsVerse, DC InsiderVerse and DC FunVerse.

Content will be available in 10 languages.

Oprah picks James McBride's 'Deacon King Kong' for book club

NEW YORK — Oprah Winfrey has chosen James McBride's "Deacon King Kong" for

her book club. McBride's novel is set in a Brooklyn housing project in 1969 and centers on the shooting of a drug dealer by an aging and tipsy church deacon. But it also pays tribute to community and to McBride's own childhood in a Brooklyn project.

"I wanted to write about a world I love and respect and how we learned to get along," he told The Associated Press during a telephone interview. "We had racial problems in the '60s and '70s, but we weren't at each other's throats. It was a little different, and the police weren't militarized, with all of these military weapons."

Tuesday's announcement of "Deacon King Kong" continues Winfrey's partnership with Apple that began last fall and includes such previous choices as "Ta-Nehisi Coates' "The Water Dancer" and Jeanine Cummins' controversial "American Dirt." Her most recent selection was the nonfiction "Hidden Valley Road," by Robert Kolker. Winfrey's interview with McBride will

air this summer on Apple TV Plus.

The 62-year-old McBride has known both commercial success and literary acclaim. His memoir "The Color of Water" has sold more than 2 million copies, and his historical novel "The Good Lord Bird" won the National Book Award in 2013. Two years later, he received a National Humanities Medal "for humanizing the complexities of discussing race in America."

But he wasn't expecting to receive the call from Winfrey about "Deacon King Kong," which came out earlier this year.

"I never thought something like that would happen with one of my books," he said of the call from Winfrey, which countless writers dream about. "We talked a little about the pandemic, and the craziness that is now America. Then she said she liked 'Deacon King Kong' and had been a fan of my previous work. I was very pleased to know that she had followed my work."

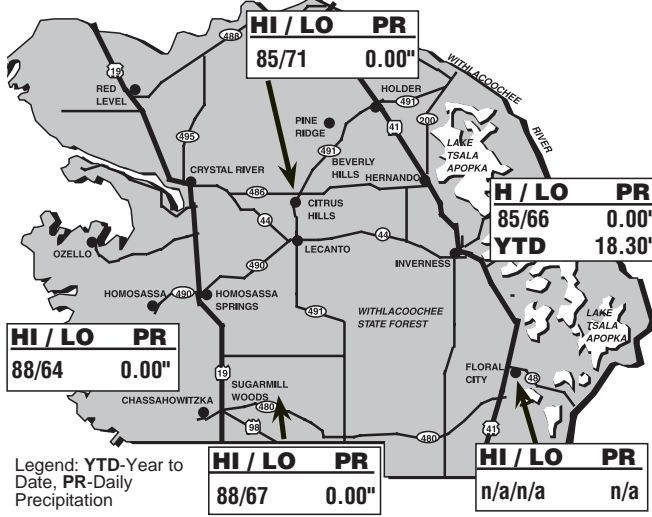

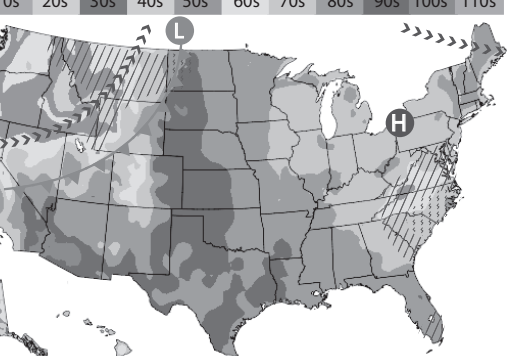

outgoing Cook, who has endorsed him.

■ *What changes would you bring?* “My goal is to keep (the department) on keel and keep it steady,” Reynard said.

There is no need right now, he added, to “upset the apple cart” because the office is working efficiently.

“Things are running great,” he said.

■ *Duke Energy is the county's largest taxpayer and its valuations can require special expertise. How would you deal with Duke?* Reynard said he's looked at Duke's past submissions and caught a problem with a submitted cap rate, which he brought to Cook's attention. That “catch,” he said, comes from long experience in reviewing proposals.

Reynard said his job is not to attack any company or business but to defend

■ *What strengths do you bring to the position?* Besides the obvious one of experience, Reynard said he brings a sheer love for the job. He also believes he can foster good working relationships with employees to make them want to stay with the office long-term.

■ *What about the property appraiser's \$3.5 million budget? Too much? Not enough? Just about right?*

Just about right for the number of employees in the office, he said.

■ *How do you deal with property owners angry or frustrated about their valuations?* That comes with the job, he said. Usually, dissatisfied people are mollified after the process is explained, he said. That's where experience in dealing with people comes in, he added.

“I like a good challenge and being in an appraisal situation that is challenging,” he said. “I kind of thrive on it.”

Citing HIPPA, Frink would not share how many city staff members also went to get tested.

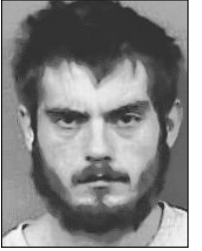

Jailed man faces new charges

After his arrest June 7, 2020, a Homosassa man made a bold claim after Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies were securing him in a patrol car.

"I'll do six months, I don't care, I'll be back out," uttered Drenane Michael Lee Martin, 20, as charges of aggravated battery using a deadly weapon and burglary with

battery were levied against him in a June 6, 2020, incident.

Already in jail on charges of aggravated battery using a deadly weapon and burglary with battery, Martin now faces additional charges from a separate incident.

Martin, who is still in the Citrus County Detention Center, was handed his new charges June 12, 2020. Those charges are one count of burglary, becomes armed with explosive or other dangerous weapon, and grand theft, \$100 or more, but less than \$750, from a dwelling, stemming from an October 2019 incident in the 6400 block of West Erlen Lane in Homosassa.

Detectives on Friday, June 12, 2020, were notified DNA swabs taken from the interior of the residence were a match for Martin, the report stated. Authorities contacted the victim, who advised detectives he did not know the person, nor give them permission to be in the home.

Law enforcement officials learned Martin was already incarcerated on similar charges, where detectives told him of the newest charges, according to the report.

During the October 2019 burglary, the report stated, Martin took three black powered rifles and security cameras from the residence.

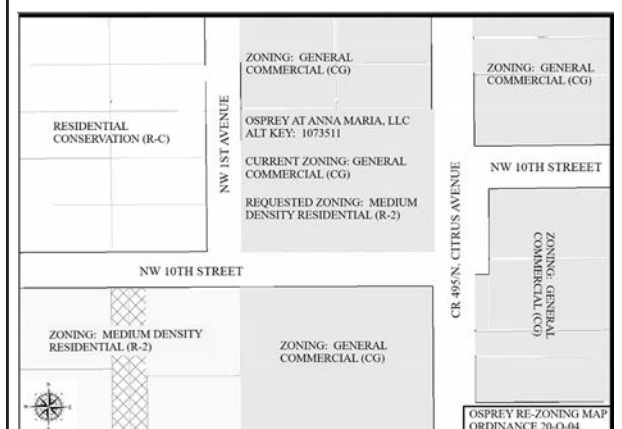

■ *What changes would you bring?* Tessmer said it's foolish to expect wholesale changes as soon as he arrives on the job. Rather, he would evaluate conditions as he grows into the job. However, a priority will be to improve outreach to the community and build partnerships.

■ *Duke Energy is the county's largest taxpayer and its valuations can require special expertise. How would you deal with Duke?* Tessmer said he would tab office staffers with the most expertise in dealing with Duke. You can't go into negotiations with the largest taxpayer in the county with an antagonistic attitude, he said.

■ *I would work with them, negotiate the best possible scenario for the county and for Duke and know contractually where you can dig your heels in the sand.*

■ *What strengths do you bring to the position?* As a real estate broker with about 20 agents under him, he said he has experience leading people and helping

them grow in their jobs.

■ *What about the property appraiser's \$3.5 million budget? Too much? Not enough? Just about right?* Tessmer said he plans to dive into the efficiency of the budget and see if there are any possible savings.

■ *With a proper review of different processes and applications, we can find ways to be more efficient.* he said.

■ *What about some folks who get a tax break by claiming an agricultural use of their property? If the exemption is fair and valid, the property owner should have every right to have it.* Tessmer said.

■ *How do you deal with property owners angry or frustrated about their*

valuations? Tessmer said once people understand the process and all the variables (including exemptions) that go into it, they will understand why it sometimes seems as if their neighbor's tax valuation is sometimes much lower.

■ *It's not an easy concept for people to get,* he said.

■ *That's why Tessmer said he will make two-way communication a priority if elected.*

■ *We need to engage the front line employees and give them tools to walk through (for) people,* he said.

■ *For example: "I don't want someone to come and say I didn't get any help in trying to apply for my homestead exemption."*

Patrick Crippen, in the Aug. 18 Republican primary with three other candidates, said he was moving between Texas, Brevard County and Citrus County over a period of two years dealing with the aftermath of his mother's death and hadn't realized he walked away from \$11,000 in credit card debt.

All three lawsuits have been settled, he said, while providing the Chronicle copies of settlement documents.

"This stems from my mom being sick," he said Tuesday. "We were all trying to help her as much as we could. I got a little sideways but it's all corrected now."

Crippen said he learned of the Brevard County cases after receiving a subpoena in May for a lawsuit filed against him in Citrus County court.

He said he then ran a credit check on himself because "I wanted to make sure I had no issues."

That's when he discovered two lawsuits, both filed a month apart in fall 2019, for unpaid credit bills. Process servers were unable to locate Crippen to serve him notice of the lawsuits because by then he had vacated both his

Justin, Texas, home where the bills had been sent, and a Palm Bay home that was his last known address, court records show.

One lawsuit was for an unpaid \$3,548 credit card bill and the other was a \$1,737 debt to Rooms to Go.

Crippen said he wasn't trying to avoid paying his debts.

"It just slipped my mind and when they went to notify me, I wasn't there," he said. "I just totally forgot and that's the truth. I forgot them. It's hectic. I made it right."

Records from all three cases show Crippen stopped making payments in December 2017. His mother died in March of that year.

Brevard County court records show Crippen agreeing on May 29 to pay Portfolio Recovery Associates Inc \$109 a month toward the \$3,548 owed since December 2017 until it's paid in full.

The second Brevard

case, from Credit Corp. Solutions Inc., is a \$1,737 Rooms to Go bill, records show. While the court file shows the case still open with no activity since September 2019, Crippen provided the Chronicle with a copy of a settlement agreement that calls him paying \$50 a month for six months, then \$100 a month until the debt is paid.

In May, First National Bank of Omaha sued Crippen in Citrus County court for \$5,740 it said Crippen owed on a Mastercard account issued through Jeep. While records show that case is still open, Crippen offered a one-time \$3,500 payment to settle the claim and it was accepted June 1, according to documents Crippen provided the Chronicle.

Crippen said he does not have financial issues.

"I'm fine with handling my money," he said. "I have gone through nothing more than anybody else has gone through."

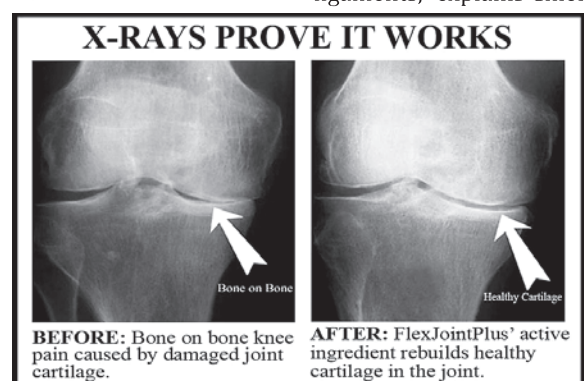

Hurricane hunter base in Florida hit with COVID-19

FORT LAUDERDALE — Five employees of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's hurricane hunter base in central Florida have tested positive for COVID-19, officials said.

The areas where the employees worked at the Aircraft Operations Center in Lakeland were closed on June 9 and cleaned "out of an abundance of caution," spokesman Jonathan Shannon said.

The employees had last worked in the center between June 3 and June 8, Shannon said.

Anyone who was known to have been in contact with the employees has been notified of the test results and those employees have been asked to self-quarantine for 14 days, Shannon said.

He said the base continues to follow guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and state and local officials on social distancing and working remotely when possible.

The hurricane hunter aircraft are flying with the minimal crew members necessary to conduct missions, Shannon said. The agency has increased cleaning of aircraft before and after flights, and a medical officer is monitoring the health of flight crews and support personnel, he added.

"The health and safety of our employees and partners is our top priority and we will continue to share COVID-19 information and impacts as they become available," Shannon said.

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 to Nov. 30 and the so-called hurricane hunter planes routinely fly missions to measure the intensity of the storm systems.

Officials solve 1991 rape, murder of teen

KEY WEST — Officials have solved the killing of a teenager in the Florida Keys who was raped and strangled with her bikini top on Valentine's Day 1991.

The victim has finally been identified as 18-year-old Wanda Deann Kirkum of Hornell, New York. The Monroe County Sheriff's Office said her killer was Robert Lynn Bradley, who was murdered a year later in Texas at the age of 31.

Officials used DNA technology to identify both the victim and the suspect. DNA obtained from the 1991 crime scene in the Florida Keys matched DNA from Bradley's own homicide scene in April 1992. The Tarrant County, Texas, investigation also indicated that Bradley had lived in Miami in late 1990.

The case became known as the "Valentine Jane Doe Homicide." Kirkum was seen hitchhiking out of Key West that evening.

Windsurfers found her body the following morning off a dirt road in an area known as the "Horseshoe." She was face down, nude and had been strangled with her bikini top.

Sheriff's officials said Kirkum was never reported missing, and both her parents are now dead.

Police: Young child killed in apparent accidental shooting

JACKSONVILLE — A child died following a shooting on Monday night at a home in Jacksonville, police said.

The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office told news outlets that the shooting appeared to be accidental.

Officials didn't release the child's name or gender, but family members told WJXT that the victim was a 2-year-old boy.

Emergency responders took the child to a hospital, where he died.

Another child was in the home when the shooting occurred, and there were adults inside and outside of the house at the time, sheriff's officials said. They were questioning everyone at the home.

An investigation is continuing.

Man charged in deaths of two women

TALLAHASSEE — A Florida man faces murder and kidnapping charges in the deaths of a missing Black Lives Matter protester and another woman, authorities said Tuesday.

Aaron Glee Jr., 49, was arrested in Orlando on Sunday, a day after Oluwatoyin Salau, 19, and Victoria Sims, 75, were found dead in a Tallahassee home, according to a Tallahassee police Facebook post.

Authorities didn't say whether the women had any previously connection between each other or to each other or Glee.

Salau, who had participated in recent demonstrations against police brutality, was reported missing by family members earlier this month, authorities said. Tallahassee police officers reached out to friends and known associates, as well as victim advocate groups to which she recently had been referred following a possible sexual battery.

Sims also was reported missing by her family, authorities said. Officers found that her home had been ransacked and burglarized, and her vehicle was missing. An investigation led to Glee's Tallahassee home, where both women were found dead, authorities said.

Police said they learned that Glee had fled on a bus to Orlando before they arrived at his home. They contacted Orlando police, who were able to intercept Glee.

Glee was being held at the Orange County jail on a Leon County warrant. Jail records didn't list an attorney for Glee.

Earnhardt Jr. headlines class

*Joins father in
NASCAR HOF*

All Dale Earnhardt Jr. needed was a chance to prove he could win in stock cars.

Turns out, he was a natural — on and off the track.

Now the longtime fan favorite and two-time Daytona 500 winner will join his famous, late father in NASCAR's Hall of Fame after being selected as one of three members of the 2021 class. The other inductees are Red Farmer and the late Mike Stefanik. Ralph Seagraves was chosen as the Landmark Award winner.

Earnhardt Jr. received 76% of the votes in his first appearance on the ballot.

"My wife was here, my family, my sister, so surrounded by a lot of close folks," he said on NBCSN's announcement show. "It was great to see my face pop up on the screen."

Being an Earnhardt name certainly provides some advantages.

His grandfather, Ralph, was inducted into the International Motorsports Hall of Fame in 1997 and was selected as one of the 50 greatest drivers in NASCAR history in 1998. Junior's father also made that list.

The Intimidator reached victory lane 76 times, winning a record-tying seven Cup championships and hordes of fans with his fearless style. And when Dale Earnhardt was killed in a crash on the final lap of the 2001 Daytona 500, many of his fans started rooting for his engaging son.

Earnhardt Jr. also got his first big break in 1998 when he raced full-time in the Busch Series — for his dad. He took full advantage by winning back-to-back series titles in

1998 and 1999 before posting his first two Cup wins as a rookie in 2000.

But even without a Cup title on his resume, Junior carved out his own niche in the series.

He won 26 races, including the Daytona 500 in 2004 and 2014. He won the Pepsi 400 in July 2001, the first race at Daytona following his father's fatal crash. He also won four straight races at Talladega from 2001-03.

Bailey, Freeney debut on College FB HOF ballot

Georgia cornerback Champ Bailey, Syracuse defensive end Dwight Freeney and Kansas State running back Darren Sproles will appear on the College Football Hall of Fame ballot for the first time.

The National Football Foundation on Tuesday announced the 78 players and seven coaches from major college football who are up for selection to the Atlanta-based Hall of Fame. There also are 99 players and 33 coaches from outside the highest level of college football eligible for induction.

The College Hall of Fame class of 2021 will be announced early next year.

Bailey was the Nagurski Award winner as the nation's best defensive

player in 1998, while also playing receiver and returning kicks for the Bulldogs.

Freeney holds the NCAA record for career sacks per game at 1.61 and was co-Big East defensive player of the year in 2001 for Syracuse.

Sproles finished fifth in Heisman voting in 2003 for the Wildcats.

Among the other notable players on the ballot for the first time are kickers Sebastian Janikowski of Florida State and Luis Zendejas of Arizona State and quarterback Ken Dorsey from Miami. Former Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops is also up for induction for the first time.

Heisman Trophy winners Carson Palmer from Southern California and Rashaan Salaam from Colorado are among those returning to the ballot.

health care systems wouldn't be overwhelmed, he said.

The number of people who were hospitalized in Citrus County was 33. The county's number of dead because of the virus has remained at 12 for the past month.

So the county's health care system still has the ability to respond to an uptick in cases, Rubio said.

Another indicator that we are not seeing a second wave is that many of the new cases are young people in their 20s, 30s and 40s, he said. The age group from 55 years to 64 years still makes up the bulk of cases since the pandemic began, but the newest cases have shifted toward the

younger group.

While health officials want fewer people to get infected, the benefit with younger people getting sick is that they are less likely to need hospitalization, Rubio said.

National health leaders such as Dr. Anthony Fauci said that a second wave is not inevitable and people can take precautions. Fauci is the director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and advisor to President Donald Trump on the coronavirus and spoke with CNN Friday.

Fauci said that despite a recent rise in cases of coronavirus, the United States may not see a second wave of infections later this year.

He said last Friday that increases in the number of cases in several states were not necessarily indicative of a second

spike of infections, and a seasonal resurgence was "not inevitable."

"However, when you start to see increases in hospitalization, that's a surefire situation that you've got to pay close attention

to," Fauci told CNN.

"(But) if we do the kinds of things that we're putting in place now, to have the workforce, the system, and the will to do the kinds of things that are the clear and effective identification, isolation and contact tracing, we can prevent this second wave that we're talking about," Fauci told the news network.

More than 116,000 people in the United States have died from coronavirus infection, according to the Johns Hopkins University Medicine website.

The increase in Florida cases "is alarming" but locally there haven't been any additional deaths due to the virus in more than 30 days, said Audrey Stasko, spokeswoman for the department of health in Citrus County. And hospitalizations are down, she said.

What would a second wave of the pandemic look like?

"The second wave would look like positive rates ... 5% to 7% and ER visits climbing, then I'd say we were in a second wave," Rubio said. "And I haven't seen that yet."

Meanwhile, Rubio said that avoiding infection is a personal choice.

To avoid infection, stay at home or continue wearing masks if you have to go outside into public places.

The DOH in Citrus County also gave away through local charities and service organizations 67,500 cloth masks. Rubio said he is expecting more free masks soon through federal and state programs to give away.

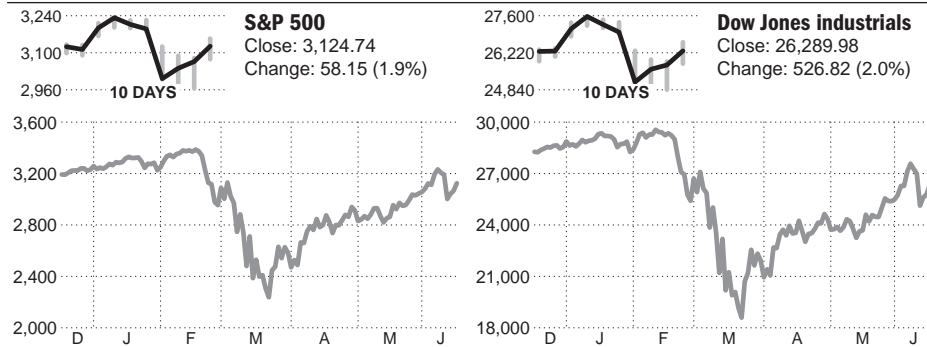

Stocks lifted by rising hope of recovery

NEW YORK — Stocks rose again Tuesday, part of a strong and worldwide rally for markets, after a big rebound in buying at U.S. stores and online raised hopes that the economy can escape its recession relatively quickly. The S&P 500 climbed 1.9% for its third straight gain, bringing it back within 8% of its record set in February. Gains have built in recent weeks as reports bolster investor expectations that the worst of the downturn may have already passed.

Continuing, immense aid from the Federal Reserve is also supporting markets, and its chair said Tuesday that the central bank will continue to use all its tools to cushion the blow of the worst recession in decades. But trading remains very skittish across markets as worsening coronavirus trends in

Pandemic outdoor recreation pushes manufacturers to the limit

Locally, April and May were banner months for the sale of bikes and kayaks. But for every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction. The rush depleted the inventories of most, if not all, of the locally owned and operated bicycle shops in the area.

Kayaks have been getting harder to find, too.

But is the boom attributable to the pandemic and the summer months. When the stores weren't open, nature mostly was, leading to healthier lifestyles for many. Hopefully we've all learned a little bit from our time in quarantine. The hope, however, is the surge in sales and the lack of supply will both be temporary.

But here's the sad reason for the short supply in the past month or more. Most of the inventory comes from overseas, and with facilities shuttered due to the COVID-19 pandemic, fresh supplies weren't being delivered.

American firms have trouble manufacturing bicycles because American

consumers purchase the cheapest option. We want America to manufacture things again, but we won't buy them because they cost too much. Are you willing to

pay more for "Made in the USA?"

For those who are looking for friendly ways to explore the environment, take note: Bike manufacturers generally introduce new styles in August and September. However, it's difficult to say whether "old" new bikes will come onto the market. Several Canadian companies might try to release new lines early to take advantage of demand here in the U.S.

It is great to see families out and about enjoying the trails and nature. This is positive and exciting news we hope continues. The growing interest of city and county leaders in developing and connecting bike paths has contributed to the interest. Now, perhaps, it's time to develop and improve kayak launch sites as well to keep spark interest, especially since Citrus County is a kayakers' paradise.

North Korea destroys empty liaison office with South

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korea blew up an inter-Korean liaison office building just north of the heavily armed border with South Korea on Tuesday, in a carefully choreographed, largely symbolic display of anger that puts pressure on Washington and Seoul amid deadlocked nuclear diplomacy.

Although the building was empty and the North had previously signaled its plans to destroy it, the move is still the most provocative act by North Korea since it entered nuclear talks in 2018 after a U.S.-North Korean standoff had many fearing war. It will pose a serious setback to the efforts of liberal South Korean President Moon Jae-in to engage the North.

A drug offers hope amid spikes

Coronavirus infections and deaths rising

ATLANTA — As nations grapple with new outbreaks and spiking death tolls from the coronavirus, a commonly available drug appeared Tuesday to offer hope that the most seriously ill could have a better chance of survival.

The pandemic has forced countries to impose lockdowns and tough restrictions on daily life and travel, but infections have surged as they eased these rules and reopened their economies. With no vaccine available and much still unknown about the virus, researchers in England announced the first drug shown to save lives.

The drug, called

dexamethasone, reduced deaths by 35% in patients who needed treatment with breathing machines and by 20% in those only needing supplemental oxygen, researchers in England said. It did not appear to help less ill patients.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said the drug was the "biggest breakthrough yet" in treating the coronavirus, and top U.S. infectious disease expert Dr. Anthony Fauci called it "a significant improvement in the available therapeutic options that

we have." Britain is making dexamethasone available to patients on the country's National Health Service. The U.K. Department of Health said the drug had been approved to treat all hospitalized COVID-19 patients requiring oxygen, effective immediately. It said the U.K. had stockpiled enough to treat 200,000 patients.

"It's on almost every pharmacy shelf in every hospital, it's available throughout the world, and it's very cheap," said Peter Horby of Oxford University, one of the leaders of the trial that randomly assigned 2,104 patients to get the drug and compared them with 4,321 patients getting only usual care.

Since the virus first emerged in China late last year and spread around the globe, there have been more than 8 million confirmed cases and more than 435,000 deaths.

The U.S. death toll has reached 116,526, according to Johns Hopkins University. That surpasses the number of Americans who died in World War I, when 116,516 were killed — although both death tolls are far from precise.

Trump signs executive order on police reform

WASHINGTON — Following weeks of national protests since the death of George Floyd, President Donald Trump signed an executive order Tuesday that he said would encourage better police practices. But he made no mention of the roiling national debate over racism spawned by police killings of black men and women.

Trump met privately

with the families of several black Americans killed in interactions with police before his Rose Garden signing ceremony, and said he grieved for the lives lost and families devastated. But then he quickly shifted his tone and devoted most of his public remarks to a need to respect and support "the brave men and women in blue who police our streets and keep us safe."

He characterized the officers who have used excessive force as a "tiny" number of outliers among "trustworthy" police ranks.

"Reducing crime and raising standards are not opposite goals," he said before signing the order, flanked by police officials.

Trump and Republicans in Congress have been rushing to respond to the mass demonstrations against police brutality and racial prejudice that have raged for weeks across the country in response to the deaths of Floyd and other black Americans. It's a sudden shift that underscores how quickly the protests have changed the political conversation and pressured

Washington to act.

But Trump, who has faced criticism for failing to acknowledge systemic racial bias and has advocated for rougher police treatment of suspects in the past, has continued to hold his "law and order" line. At the signing event, he railed against those who committed violence during the largely peaceful protests while hailing the vast majority of officers as selfless public servants.

Trump's executive order would establish a database that tracks police officers with excessive use-of-force

complaints in their records.

The order would also give police departments a financial incentive to adopt best practices and encourage co-responder programs, in which social workers join police when they respond to nonviolent calls involving mental health, addiction and homeless issues.

Trump said that, as part of the order, the use of chokeholds, which have become a symbol of police brutality, would be banned "except if an officer's life is at risk."

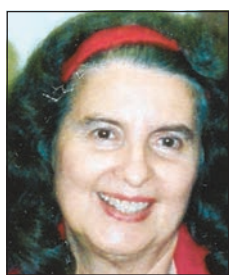

Recalling the bygone days

Hello again. We are still waiting for entertainment opportunities to return to our county — the concert band, the chorus group, the Art Center Theatre productions, the schools' music groups and drama groups — with volunteers making it all happen.

Until then, we can reflect back in time once more to when we dressed up and went out to dinner and a dance Friday or Saturday out at the Plantation or Port Paradise in Crystal River, the Yardarm in Homosassa and the Colonial Hotel in Inverness. I recall Bob Crosby entertaining at the Colonial one weekend (Bing's brother).

At the Plantation, it was organist Marion Mercer, Al Varney on sax and a terrific drummer from Tampa. I recall that if we danced till closing time, he treated us to Ybor City's famous Cuban sandwiches. "Satin Doll" was a popular request for the trio at the Plantation. When the owner of Senns 5-and-10 (where Big Lots is now located) walked in, the trio would play, "I Found a Million Dollar Baby at the 5-and-10-cent Store." Ralph and I always requested our favorites, "Ebb Tide" and "More."

We were often kidded by our friends. While dancing, a dance partner would say to Ralph, "Digger" (as in Digger O'Dell), stop measuring me for a casket." Over the years, he was often introduced as "The Southern Planter" and the "last one to let you down."

I recall when Ralph (Strickland) was president of the Chamber of Commerce, a motivational speaker, who'd written a book, was the guest speaker. His opening remarks included the fact that in his rush to arrive on time in Crystal River, he hadn't had time to have his wife (who couldn't accompany him) help him with his tie and was he surprised when Ralph said he'd need to lie down so he could help with his tie, before being brought to the meeting.

Another time at the Plantation, a lady was giving kisses to all the men. Was she surprised when she kissed Ralph! He had been to the dentist where he had required Novocain and his kiss numbed her lips, which curtailed her kissing spree.

Speaking of kissing, at a Halloween costume dance at Seven Rivers Golf and Country Club, a scholarship fundraiser sponsored by the Junior Women of Crystal River, I recall Mary Dawson had a fundraising kissing booth. The costumes were fabulous, many rented from a Tampa costume house, others homemade.

There were popular luaus with dancing following dinner held at the Yardarm. Colorful floral gowns were worn (I think they were called muumuus). Sometimes we'd take the boat out to the Eagles Nest Restaurant for a dinner dance (the only way to arrive there was by the Yardarm boat). One night we were surprised as Sheriff B.R. Quinn sat down at the piano and began to play (we soon learned it was a player-piano.)

Such fun recalling the bygone days in our beloved Citrus County dancing the night away, sometimes stopping off at Jones Truck Stop for a midnight snack afterward (now Sara's Diner).

Nominations can be submitted by fellow teachers, supervisors or other interested individuals (not relatives). Self nominations are not eligible. Prizes are \$1,000 for the teacher and \$1,000 for the school, plus plaques for both and all-expenses-paid trip to attend the VFW National Convention.

Sun safety

Tick safety

- I check myself and my pets often for ticks.
- Some ticks that attach themselves to humans can cause sicknesses, such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever or Lyme disease. If you find a tick, remove it gently and carefully with tweezers. Do not leave the tick's mouth in your skin. Wash the bite with soap and water, and be sure to tell your parents.



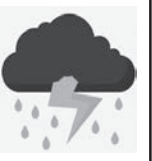
Bike safety

Cook's Corner

Healthy Oat Bran Cookies

- You'll need:**
- 1 3/4 cups oat bran
 - 1 cup whole-wheat flour
 - 3/4 cup quick-cooking oats
 - 1 cup dried cranberries
 - 1 cup chopped pecans
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda

- 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup light brown sugar, packed
- 4 egg whites
- 1/2 cup soft margarine
- 2/3 cup low-fat milk



What to do:

1. In a large bowl, combine oat bran, flour, oats, cranberries, pecans, baking soda and spices.
2. In a smaller bowl, beat brown sugar, egg whites and margarine. Add milk to mix well.
3. Stir wet mixture into oat mixture and blend thoroughly.
4. Coat cookie sheets with cooking spray and measure dough by rounded teaspoons about 1 inch apart.
5. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes until done. Makes 3 to 4 dozen.
