Deputies investigate package

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies and bomb squad personnel on Monday afternoon secured a suspicious package addressed to President Donald Trump at a local post office.

Authorities and the sheriff's Hazardous Devices Team responded at 1 p.m. to the Crystal River Post Office at 18 NE Fourth Ave., where they revealed the package contained nothing threatening, sheriff's spokeswoman Jodi Sanders said.

Old Courthouse museum reopens

Citrus County announced Monday the re-opening of the Historic Citrus County Courthouse, the Old Courthouse Heritage Museum, and the Citrus County Archives at 1 Courthouse Square, Inverness on Wednesday, May 20, by appointment.

The museum will schedule senior tours at 10 and 11 a.m. with family tours at 1, 2 and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. There will be signage throughout the museum encouraging social distancing, and CDC recommendations.

The museum will continue to provide educational programming and make content available through its Facebook and other social media platforms, at www.cccourt.org and on Facebook at The Old Courthouse Heritage Museum.

Passport services have resumed

Effective May 11, Citrus County Clerk of Courts has resumed passport services for regular routine service applications by appointment only. While you can still apply in person for a U.S. passport and renew through the mail, the Department of State's application processing, receipt of your passport, and return of citizenship evidence documents is significantly delayed beyond the normal turnaround time of six to eight weeks for routine service. Expedited passports remain suspended by the Department of State.

Citrus has plan for rentals

County will submit proposal to state for reopening of vacation properties

Citrus County's short-term vacation rentals may soon be back in business and Paula Black can't wait. "My phone's ringing off the hook," Paula Black, owner of Sunset Point on the Homosassa River, said.

"Scallop season is our biggest money maker of the year." Gov. Ron DeSantis's next phase of reopening includes short-term vacation rentals, but only after counties submit plans to the state on how that will be done safely to protect staff and guests from

contracting or spreading COVID-19. Citrus sent its plan to the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, or DBPR, on Monday. It's mirrored after ones sent Friday by a pair of Panhandle counties, and allows rentals from U.S. states with a

COVID-19 case rate of less than 700 cases per 100,000. DeSantis himself said he wouldn't approve opening vacation rentals from hot spots, specifically mentioning New York. County Administrator Randy Oliver told commissioners in a Monday morning email that the county

plan will not have any chance of approval if it didn't echo the governor's concerns about hot spots. "We think this is something they'll accept," Oliver said in an interview. Along with encouraging rentals from in-state, the

Facilities allowed to open under state's phased approach

When Kayleigh Meshil opened the doors of Dynabody gym in Inverness at 7 a.m. Monday, there were already seven of her regulars waiting.

Deprived of the weight machines and other fitness equipment for two months, they were aching to return to their workout routine.

The Dynabody staff was prepared. The staff wore masks. A greeter took people's temperature upon entering. Surfaces were

sanitized. They were allowing only 12 clients inside the gym at any one time to maintain social distancing and workouts were limited to one hour.

Meshil admitted she had some trepidation about coming back to work. She'd been off since since March, when the state ordered gyms closed due to the coronavirus pandemic. How would people react when they returned, she wondered? What would the mood be?

Crumps Landing reopens Thursday

Nearly a year after fire engulfed Homosassa's most iconic tiki destination, the party on the river will soon begin again.

Crumps Landing, a popular restaurant and bar, is set to reopen at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, May 21, after a long road of rebuilding and delays due to the COVID-19 shutdown.

Claudia Ratcliff, assistant general manager at Crumps, said she "is absolutely excited."

"I love this place with all of my heart," she said. "It's going to be pure

joy seeing all these people back in here the way it should be."

The reopening comes as Gov. Ron DeSantis allowed for 50% capacity at Florida restaurants in full Phase One of COVID-19 reopening.

The Crumps Landing tiki structure and restroom facilities were damaged by a fire on July 13, 2019, which was believed to have started in a mobile cooking trailer at the restaurant at 11210 W. Halls River Road on the Homosassa River. The large fire went viral as Citrus residents and passersby posted videos of the blaze on social media.

plan includes many of the coronavirus guidelines that have been in place for weeks, plus additional cleaning and providing copies of Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines to guests.

The Citrus County plan will be reviewed weekly and updated as needed, officials said.

As for enforcement, officials are counting on rental owners to follow the rules.

"All we can ask is that people cooperate, that people try to do the right thing," Commissioner Jeff Kinnard said. "We're trying to get things going as quickly as possible. These are reasonable restrictions to help people get

their short-term vacation rentals going again, while still protecting the residents who live here."

Black, who has four rentals on the Homosassa River, agreed that precautions are necessary to re-start rentals. Her concern is that the DBPR, which now neither regulates, nor licenses short-term rentals, will use the situation as a reason to start doing so.

"The big picture I see is this is just the beginning of licensing vacation rentals," she said. "I don't want the state to hold us up while they figure out how to license us."

Kinnard said he doesn't see that happening.

"I like the idea that they're asking for county input on this," he said.

"Each of the counties are so different. We certainly have different short-term vacation rentals here than

they have in Pinellas County, down on the beaches. There's not a one-size-fits-all."

John Pritcher, director of the Citrus County Visitors Bureau, said the limitation of guests to mainly in-state shouldn't be an issue for most county vacation rentals as summer approaches. Scallop season is July 1 to Sept. 24.

Citrus has an estimated 800 to 900 short-term vacation rentals, Pritcher said.

Pritcher said he hopes rental owners will do what's asked.

"These guidelines are in place to keep everybody safe," he said. "We're counting on folks who own these properties to follow the guidelines so everyone can be safe and business can resume."



Parkview Lanes used downtime for maintenance

When the state of Florida started preparing for COVID-19 and potential shutdown of businesses, Parkview Lanes in Holder initially cut out open bowling for two weeks and started "cleaning everything in sight," owner C.H. Crockett said.

Then on March 20, his 27-year-old business was one of the many that was required to close its doors. "We had to furlough our three customer service

employees, but all will return when we reopen," Crockett said.

He and the other four employees took the downtime opportunity to do "about five years' worth of maintenance," he said.

After purchasing the business in 1992, Crockett, a retiree from Tennessee, totally transformed it — replacing the wooden lanes, installed new pin machines and the newest technology, redid the floors, repainted. "We did a lot of things to

remodel a year ago, including a new entrance," he said.

With the recent stay-at-home orders lifted, the biggest challenge Crockett faces is ensuring and assuring his customers that "bowling at Parkview Lanes will be as safe from a virus as we can possibly make it," he said.

He said they will require open bowlers to wear masks and recommend that league bowlers wear them.

"We cleaned every single bowling ball we have and will be asking open bowlers to leave balls on the returns when they're

finished so we can clean them before someone else uses them."

He added that during open bowling, bowling groups will use every other lane to maintain "social distancing."

"We anticipate the leagues returning to strong participation soon," Crockett said, "but think open bowling will be slower to return, similar to the recession recovery."

Man faces cocaine charge

A 20-year-old Crystal River man was arrested Saturday night on charges of trafficking in cocaine following a traffic stop in Homosassa.

A Citrus County Sheriff's Office arrest report states a deputy stopped Joshua Robinson Carter shortly before midnight near the intersection of West Meadow Street and South Oldfield Avenue for inoperable rear tag lights. While speaking with the driver, the deputy could detect the odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle.

Carter consented to a search of the vehicle, which resulted in the location of a clear ziplock baggie containing a "large amount of white powdery substance," which field tested positive for cocaine. Deputies also discovered a small unused clear plastic baggie that is common for the packaging and storing of illegal drugs, the report states.

Carter told deputies the baggie belonged to him and he had placed it in the vehicle. However, he denied that he knew it contained cocaine.

"The defendant advised that he had no knowledge of there being cocaine inside the baggie and he believed it to be laundry detergent," the report states.

The total weight of the cocaine was 162 grams, or about 5.7 ounces.

Bond was set at \$25,000.

CARES supports struggling veterans with \$2M

Earlier this spring, representatives from St. Vincent de Paul CARES (SVdP) joined with members of the Inverness Elks Lodge to celebrate formerly homeless local veterans who had moved into their own housing.

"At the March Move in Celebration... we were able to experience the power of

what stable housing and support services can do for those that are homeless," said Mary Burns, spokeswoman for SVdP in St. Petersburg. "Though we are not able to move forward with any face-to-face celebrations just yet, SVdP CARES is celebrating the recent funding we received from the VA — \$2 million to disperse to struggling veterans in need during the

COVID crisis."

Eligible veterans living in Pinellas, Hillsborough, Pasco, Polk, Citrus, Lake, Sumter, Hernando, Desoto, Highlands, Hardee, Lee and Collier counties may be eligible for rent and/or utility assistance through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) program. Eligibility requirements

include: ■ Must lack the resources to maintain stable housing. ■ Military discharge or service must be under "other than dishonorable" conditions. ■ An income less than 50% of the area median income of the county. ■ Verification of income or loss of income.

At this time, the program

has the ability to pay rent expenses, but not mortgage expenses. However, homeowners may be eligible for utility assistance.

To get started, veterans should call 844-455-SSVF (7783). An initial screening will be completed by phone, and eligible veterans will be contacted by their local SVdP CARES office. Funding is available through July 31.

'This Is Us' stars Moore, Hartley co-host Red Nose special

LOS ANGELES — "This Is Us" stars Mandy Moore and Justin Hartley will co-host NBC's Red Nose Day special to raise money and awareness for children in need.

The network's sixth annual event, airing 9-11 p.m. Thursday, will include musical performances, sketches and short films that illustrate how donations are used for children living in poverty in America and other countries.

Among the actors and musical artists taking part: Julia Roberts, John Legend, Bryan Cranston, Kelly Clarkson, Paul Rudd, One Republic, Steve Martin, 5 Seconds of Summer, Sarah Silverman, Ray Romano, Sam Smith and James Taylor.

Funds raised by this year's Red Nose campaign will be directed to help combat the effect of COVID-19 on youngsters and the organizations that aid them.

In the pandemic, "some of the most vulnerable parts of our population are obviously going to be children," Moore said. "The need has never been more critical to make sure that kids have health care and education and housing and food, all of the things that Red Nose Day and the campaign supports."

Because of the crisis, the fundraiser's Red Noses aren't being sold in drugstores as is usual. Instead, they're part of NosesOn.com, a website to make donations and get a "digital Red Nose" to share on social media, NBC said.

Red Nose Day has raised \$200 million annually for programs including Boys & Girls Clubs of America, Children's

Health Fund and Feeding America. The U.S. campaign, run by the nonprofit organization Comic Relief, follows in the footsteps of the original British fundraiser founded in 1988.

Big Cat Rescue founder now selling coronavirus masks

CITRUS PARK — Are you a cool cat or kitten? There's now a coronavirus mask out there for you.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that Big Cat Rescue founder Carole Baskin, prominently featured in Netflix's "Tiger King: Murder, Mayhem and Madness," started selling face masks with her oft-quoted catchphrase Saturday.

The dual-layered tie masks feature the words "Hey all you cool cats and kittens" above a whiskered feline smile. Viewers of the popular docu-series know that's Baskin's catchphrase.

Masks cost \$11 each and come in black or leopard print. The masks are being sold to

raise money to help big cats. Portions of the proceeds also support first responders.

Big Cat Rescue is closed to the public due to the coronavirus outbreak. A post on bigcatrescue.com said the animal rescue is losing \$160,000 a month in tour revenue.

Big Cat Rescue and its founder have been the subject of much attention since being featured in "Tiger King." The streaming series stars gun-toting Oklahoma zookeeper Joseph Maldonado-Passage, aka Joe Exotic. He was sentenced to 22 years in prison after killing five tigers and plotting to have Baskin murdered.

Baskin was upset with how the show portrayed the captive tiger trade. "Tiger King" spent much of its time focusing on the feud between Baskin and Maldonado-Passage, which included accusations by him that Baskin was behind the disappearance of her ex-husband, Don Lewis. Baskin has denied that.





She didn't have to worry. Except for the visible nods to health, all was as it was before.

"Overall, it was a good morning," said Meshil, the gym's front-desk associate.

Dynabody personal trainer John Hockley said staff went above and beyond cleaning the place to adhere to U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines.

"We cleaned this place from head to foot the last three days," he said. "It's extremely squeaky clean."

Gov. Ron DeSantis announced last week he was implementing a "full Phase One" reopening, which means gyms and fitness centers can open to 50% capacity.

They had been shut down to prevent the spread of COVID-19, the respiratory disease caused by the coronavirus. DeSantis urged people to take precautions as they work out.

The governor said hygiene in enclosed areas where exercising people sweat always has been a concern and remains so.

When the news broke that gyms would reopen Monday, Nancy Weedman said there was a lot of "excitement" about coming back.

"I couldn't wait," said Weedman in between her workout Monday morning at Dynabody. Normally, she works out Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, but having missed her weekly routine, she was one of the first gym members to walk through the doors Monday. "The biggest challenge the past six weeks has been losing muscle tone."

Weedman had no reservations about being back in the facility "because I'm healthy," she stressed.

"I've been working out for 40 straight years now," she said.

Inverness resident Jerry Brailsford brought his mask to Dynabody just in

case staff told him he'd have to wear it while working out. Although he was told the gym "strongly recommends" he do so, Brailsford didn't don the mask.

Brailsford said he's spent the past two months riding his bike and walking to keep in shape.

Being in the gym again meant there was no time for complacency, Michael Rinaldo said.

"Home workouts are not that fun because you procrastinate," he explained. "You come to the gym, you come for a reason. At least you have motivation when you come here."

He understands the concerns others might have, Rinaldo said, but his advice for others was simple.

"Stay healthy and work out," he added. "That's the best you can do."

It was more good news at the Work It Out Fitness Gym inside the Crystal River Mall.

"It's going pretty good," owner/trainer Bob Lamarre said Monday morning. "We were ready for it. Everything's clean and sanitized. We were hoping for 50 people today through the door and we're up to 30 and it's not even 11 a.m."

Lamarre said the 50% capacity stipulation is not a problem because he usually sees about 70 people per day anyway so it's easy to meet the requirements.

Darrell Richmond, general manager at Too Your Health Spa in Dunnellon, opened at 5 a.m. Monday.

"We just had our manageable number of people coming in and out, which is nice," he said. "Everyone's been super as far as





Ken Osmond, who played Eddie Haskell, dead at 76

LOS ANGELES — Ken Osmond, who played the two-faced teenage scoundrel Eddie Haskell on TV's "Leave It to Beaver," died Monday, his family said.

Osmond died in Los Angeles at age 76. No indication of the cause was given.

"He was an incredibly kind and wonderful father," son Eric Osmond said in a statement. "He had his family gathered around him when he passed. He was loved and will be very missed."

Ken Osmond's Eddie Haskell stood out among many memorable characters on the classic family sitcom "Leave it to Beaver," which ran from 1957 to 1963 on CBS and ABC, but had a decades-long life of reruns and revivals.

Eddie was the best friend of Tony Dow's Wally Cleaver, big brother to Jerry Mathers' Beaver Cleaver. He constantly kissed up to adults and kicked down at his peers, usually in the same scene, and was the closest thing the wholesome show had to a villain. Viewers of all ages loved to hate him.

"He was a terrific guy, he was a terrific actor and his character is probably one that will last forever," Dow told The

Associated Press on Monday.

"He was one of the few guys on the show who really played a character and created it," Dow added, chuckling as he mimicked the evil laugh Osmond would unleash when his character was launching one nefarious scheme or another and trying to pull Wally and his younger brother Beaver into it.

Osmond was born in Glendale, California, to a carpenter father and a mother who wanted to get him into acting.

The role of Eddie in season one of "Leave It to Beaver" was supposed to be a one-off guest appearance, but the show's producers and its audience found him so memorable he became a regular, appearing in nearly 100 of the show's 234 episodes.

He would give up acting and become a Los Angeles police officer.

"I was very much type-cast. It's a death sentence," Osmond told radio host Stu Stoshak in a 2008 interview on "Stu's Show." "I'm not complaining because Eddie's been too good to me, but I found work hard to come by."



Local race action back in the fast lane

Anderson picks up SLM victory

INVERNESS — Race action picked up right where it left off two months ago when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the closure of most businesses throughout the state of Florida.

Citrus County Speedway track officials opened the gates for over 600 fans on the main grandstand, and over 500 pitside that included over 80 drivers and their crews, for a much-anticipated night of intense race action that left most fans at the edge of their seats most of the night.

Amongst the excitement was a three car battle in the Super Late Model 50.

“My car was really good,” Wayne Anderson said of his No. 84 Super Late Model race car. “I knew I wasn’t going to qualify fast, but it would race fast.”

Anderson qualified eighth of 23 cars, landed the pole position after an eight-car inversion, and led the field through the first seven laps before an early race caution tightened the field and put Cody Stickler on the outside lane for the restart.

“I got caught and lost the lead,” Anderson said of the restart. “I was doing my best not to knock the 5(K) car out.”

Stickler led the next 27 laps before Anderson had a good shot at regaining control of the race.

With 35 laps complete, the field had fallen into its fifth caution of the night and pitted Anderson and Stickler side-by-side for a final time.

When the race resumed, Anderson made his move and was able to clear Stickler on the backstretch. The night’s fast qualifier, Anthony Cataldi, followed Anderson’s lead.

“The first 40 laps was just a normal race for me,” Cataldi said. “I started eighth and worked my way through the field.”

Cataldi made it to Anderson’s rear deck lid within five laps before caution came out again.

This time it was Anderson and Cataldi restarting from the front row with just 11 laps to go. The pair continued to battle first side-by-side, then nose-to-tail through two more cautions as they raced their way to the finish.

“The 00 run down into me,” Anderson said of the contest with Cataldi.

“I got into the outside of the 84 (of Anderson) and made a pretty good run at it,” Cataldi said. “He used me up in the lane and I got into the third groove before I was able to get behind him off of (Turn No. 2) to do a cross-over.”

With each attempt Anderson was able to hold onto the lead.

“I finally got by him and just stayed on the gas,” Anderson said.

“I could tell he was tight through the turns so I dove underneath him on the last lap,” Cataldi said. “We were racing for the win.”

Anderson held on to win the event while Cataldi fell to third when Jesse Dutilly timed a last-lap move on the pair and finished second at the stripe. Stickler followed for fourth, Keith Roggen in fifth.

Pure Stock action saw Sammy Coghill hold off James Peters in a late two-lap battle that wasn’t settled until the checkered flag. Coghill started fifth and worked his way to the front and to a 1.2 second advantage over Peters at one point in the 25-lap feature event.

“I changed a bunch of stuff,” Coghill said of his car after an early afternoon practice session. “I didn’t know how it would work out.”

As soon as he drove his No. 21 race car through the first set of turns he knew he had the car to beat.

Peters was able to reel in the race leader and pulled to Coghill’s rear bumper as the pair drove nose-to-tail for the last two laps of the event.

“I had nothing left on the table,” Peters said after his second-place finish. “My grandfather passed away this week and he was definitely in my heart tonight. I gave it everything I had. It was a heck of a race.”

Rounding out the top five was Larry Welter Jr., Kyle Peters and Jason Waller.

In Street Stock action, Eric Sharrone inherited the lead from Richie Smith when Smith’s No. 42 race car fell off the pace as he slowly drove down the front stretch on his way to the pits. Smith had set the night’s fastest lap early in the race. Sharrone went on to win the event by

0.580 seconds over Geoffrey Blotz, Sal DeFranco, Matthew Bibbins and Flynn Prevatt.

Robert Anthony drove to a 1.683 second advantage over Sharrone to win the Anything Automotive Mini Stock 25 feature. James Erb followed the pair in third but parked his car in the pits instead of heading to the post-race mandatory technical inspection. With Erb out of the top five, Thomas Peet gained the spot ahead of Brittany Hart in fourth and Jason Simmons in fifth.

Rounding out the night’s action, Peet threaded his way to the Ford Outlaw Figure 8 win over James Craford Jr., Michael Autenrieth, Martin Moff and Jesse Veltman.

Stock car action returns Saturday, May 30 for the Wheel Man Sportsman 50 that pays \$1,000 to the winner. Added to the race card is the Pure Stock 25, Anything Automotive Mini Stocks, Legends Cars 25 and Ford Outlaws 25.

AP source: Marlins will allow players access for workouts

MIAMI — The Miami Marlins will allow players on their 40-man roster access to their spring training complex to pitch off a mound or hit in batting cages beginning Tuesday, a person familiar with the decision told The Associated Press.

The person confirmed the decision to the AP on condition of anonymity Monday because the Marlins made no announcement. The rest of the complex in Jupiter will remain closed, the person said.

The optional workouts will be individual, with a staff member present, and those involved will abide by social distancing guidelines, the person said.

Major League Baseball is considering proposed methods to salvage a season delayed by the coronavirus pandemic. Plans have been formulated to possibly start the season in early July.

Pocono may have to resume races without fans

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Wolf said Monday that NASCAR can hold its races at Pocono Raceway in late June if the coronavirus situation improves in the area, though the races might have to go

off without fans.

Pocono Raceway is in Monroe County, which currently is under Wolf’s strictest pandemic orders, or a red designation. But Wolf said that if Monroe County moves to yellow before the races, then NASCAR may hold the two races as long as there are no spectators present and guidelines are followed to keep competitors safe.

NASCAR resumed its Cup Series schedule Sunday at Darlington, South Carolina, without fans.



Given the predicted worst case scenario of 2.2 million COVID-19 deaths in the U.S. with no vaccine or targeted antiviral treatment available, fear of an uncontrollable virus made risk unacceptable. Accordingly, governments across the country implemented unprecedented social restrictions to control the spread and level the curve of the virus.

While the restrictions generally served to diminish the spread and blunt the curve, they have had a profoundly paralyzing impact on the economy with every sector, except technology, suffering catastrophic losses.

Within a span of six weeks, national unemployment soared to 14.7% with close to 34 million Americans suddenly facing financial calamity. For Florida’s economy, it was a cataclysmic six weeks that witnessed a historic unemployment rise from 4.3% to a Great Depression level of about 18%.

The economic costs of the pandemic restrictions are not an abstraction. Thousands of Florida businesses are facing permanent closure. Hundreds of thousands of jobless Floridians are suffering financial devastation. And, the longer the restrictions are in place, the greater and more lasting the economic consequences for all Floridians.

This exceedingly grim economic reality has seen public sentiment mount for a pandemic exit plan to reopen Florida for business. Balancing pandemic and economic risks, however,

makes any exit plan a difficult and uncertain proposition that carries a degree of public risk.

The greatest public risk for Florida’s “Safe, Smart, Step-by-Step” exit plan is its implementation prior to a downward trajectory of documented cases within a 14-day period, as suggested by CDC guidelines. Other implementation risks are the current lack of large-scale virus testing, insufficient means to trace close contacts of infected individuals, and a mixed message that the worst of the pandemic is behind us, despite the possibility of a second wave of infections.

Nonetheless, the plan’s phased implementation is a reasonably measured approach for reigniting Florida’s economy.

With nearly 60% of the state’s COVID-19 cases and deaths concentrated in the three counties of Broward, Dade and Palm Beach and 40.8% of the state’s deaths occurring in long-term care facilities, the May 4 statewide implementation of phase one that excluded these three counties and long-term care facilities was a targeted, cautionary first step for reopening Florida.

The plan’s baby steps implementation and provision for local governments to have more restrictive policies than the state also facilitate an incremental testing of the waters that enables both state and local governments to make timely public compliance protocol and confidence building adjustments, if needed.

Thus, as the plan cautiously navigates the uncharted waters of balancing the risk of COVID-19 with the reigniting of Florida’s economy, common sense — not fear — should be the guidepost for all.

Eakley has the needed experience

In the near future, Citrus County will need to prepare for significant changes in population, demographics and density, and safety considerations. The election for sheriff, has for the first time, had us engaged in the political process. My husband and I have had serious conversations with Mel Eakley, and were impressed by his grasp of the issues and the experience he brings to the table. This position requires leadership and a strong background in law enforcement. There is only one clear choice on the ballot, and I would encourage you to research his background and experience and endorse Mel Eakley for sheriff of Citrus County in this year’s election. Experience counts, we need change in Citrus County.



US autoworkers return to factories

Possible vaccine shows promise

WARREN, Mich. — More than 130,000 autoworkers returned to factories across the U.S. for the first time in nearly two months Monday in one of the biggest steps yet to restart American industry, while an experimental vaccine against the coronavirus yielded encouraging results in a small and extremely early test.

Stocks rallied on the vaccine news and signs that the worst of the crisis has passed in many countries. The Dow Jones Industrial Average soared about 900 points, or nearly 4%.

Meanwhile, President Donald Trump said he's been taking a malaria drug to protect against the virus even though his own administration has warned it should only be administered in a hospital or research setting because of potentially fatal side effects.

Automakers reopening dozens of factories had screening procedures in place. No one was immediately cranking out vehicles, because it will take time to get the plants restarted. But workers appeared reassured by the precautions.

At a Fiat Chrysler pickup truck assembly plant in Warren, outside Detroit, workers entered a giant white tent with a sign reading, "Let's restart and keep each other safe." Inside they had their temperatures checked and answered questions on whether they had symptoms of COVID-19.

"I feel safer than being anywhere at any stores, because they got the screening and everything," said Ann'alazia Moore, a janitor at the factory. "I feel like that's amazing. That's smart. I like that. So, I feel more safe. I won't get sick."

Cole Stevenson, who installs steering wheels at a Ford pickup truck plant in Dearborn, Michigan, said, "The parts of the plant where people would be closer together, they've put up a lot of partitions. You can tell they've taken tape measures to just about any surface two people would need to be near each other."

Meanwhile, an experimental vaccine by Cambridge, Massachusetts-based Moderna Inc. triggered hoped-for immune responses in eight healthy, middle-aged volunteers. They were found to have antibodies similar to those seen in people who have recovered from COVID-19.

Further studies on the

vaccine's safety, effectiveness and optimal dosage still need to be done. But with people desperate for any sign of progress against the scourge, the findings caused excitement on Wall Street.

Worldwide, about a dozen vaccine candidates are in the first stages of testing or nearing it. Health officials have said that if all goes well, studies might wrap up late this year or early 2021.

The malaria drug that

Trump says he's been taking daily "for about a week and a half now" has not been shown to combat the coronavirus.

"I started taking it, because I think it's good," Trump said. "I've heard a lot of good stories."

Despite warnings from health experts that the virus could make a resurgence without a vaccine or treatment, many states have eased lockdowns under pressure from Trump to save businesses

and livelihoods. About 36 million Americans have applied for unemployment benefits over the past two months, and U.S. joblessness surged in April to 14.7%, a level not seen since the Depression.

U.S. health authorities will be watching closely for a second wave of infections and worry that Americans will disregard social distancing over Memorial Day weekend, the unofficial start of summer. Over the past weekend,

there were already large crowds. Connecticut had to close beaches when they reached capacity under new restrictions. People also packed the Virginia Beach oceanfront before restrictions were relaxed.

Europe pushed ahead with its reopening, allowing people into the Acropolis in Athens, high-fashion boutiques in Italy, museums in Belgium, golf courses in Ireland and beer gardens in Bavaria.

FBI: Shooter at Pensacola base coordinated with al-Qaida

The gunman who killed three U.S. sailors at a military base in Florida last year repeatedly communicated with al-Qaida operatives about planning and tactics in the months leading up to the attack, U.S. officials said Monday, as they lashed out at Apple for failing to help them open the shooter's phones so they could access key evidence.

Law enforcement officials discovered contacts

between Mohammed Saeed Alshamrani and operatives of al-Qaida after FBI technicians succeeded in breaking into two cellphones that had previously been locked and that the shooter, a Saudi Air Force officer, had tried to destroy before he was killed by law enforcement.

"We now have a clearer understanding of Alshamrani's associations and activities in the years, months and days leading up to his attack," Attorney General William Barr said at a news conference in which he sharply chastised Apple for not helping open the phones.

Barr says he doesn't envision investigations of Biden, Obama

WASHINGTON — Attorney General William Barr said Monday that he did not expect an investigation into the origins of the FBI's Russia investigation to lead to criminal probes of either President Donald Trump's Democratic opponent, Joe Biden, or former President Barack Obama.

Trump has stated without evidence that he believes Obama committed unspecified

crimes as president, repeatedly tweeting, "OBAMAGATE!" The claims have become a rallying cry among Trump supporters, while Democrats view it as a desperate attempt to shift the focus from the president's handling of the coronavirus outbreak and the nation's soaring unemployment.

Barr insisted that the Justice Department would not be swayed by political pressure to investigate the president's opponents and that the "criminal justice system will not be used for partisan political ends."



Stroke? Act FAST

With May being American Stroke Awareness month, we decided to bring focus to this critical topic.

Stroke is one of the leading causes of the death across the globe, second only to coronary artery disease. However, it is the leading cause of disability. Stroke is defined as poor blood flow to the brain resulting in cell death.

The two main types can be classified as an ischemic stroke (lack of blood flow) or hemorrhagic stroke (excess bleeding) within the brain housed within the confines of the skull.

Disruption of the blood supply to the brain, typically from a blood clot in an artery, results in an ischemic stroke. Conversely, blood escaping in or around the brain from disruption of a blood vessel, yields a hemorrhagic stroke. Ischemic events comprise the majority of strokes, contributing to approximately 87%.

While many people assume that strokes only occur in the elderly, it is important to know that strokes can happen to anyone at any age. Certain lifestyle habits, medical conditions and hereditary factors can increase your chances of having a stroke.

Some medical conditions that can increase your chances of a stroke include previous history of stroke or transient ischemic attack, high blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol, heart disease and sickle cell disease.

High blood pressure is the leading cause of stroke. This is important to know since many times warning signs of having high blood pressure go unnoticed.

It is important to check your blood pressure daily. If you have high blood pressure, you can try to lower it with lifestyle changes such as exercise and diet, but many times use of medication becomes necessary. Mitigating high blood pressure by these measures can lower your risk of stroke.

Stroke is considered a medical emergency and like any life-threatening event, every minutes counts. Analogous to extinguishing a fire rapidly, caring for a stroke promptly can curtail irreversible damage to the brain.

The mnemonic FAST can help you remember suggestive signs of a stroke and remind you to ask the following questions when you witness such signs.

Stroke: Act FAST

F — Face: Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop or is one side numb?

A — Arms: Ask the person to raise both arms.

Another dark side of being stuck at home is something not often talked about: domestic abuse. Typically, children and spouses of

Dental care in tough times

I hope that all of you are coming through COVID-19 healthy and in good spirits.

My family and I, as well as my staff, are doing well. By now, some of you have had the chance to go back to your dentist and some of you might have been seen by your dentist during our lockdown for emergency needs. I've chosen a return date of May 18 for administrative needs and May 19 to see patients at our office.

Things will likely be a little different at your dentist's office, too, so I thought I would share portions of the information I have sent out to my patients to give you an idea of what to expect. Please realize every office will be a little different, but we all have the same thing in mind, the safety of our patients and staff.

In this new world we live in, we want to assure you that we will not waiver from the priority of your safety, and we will follow the guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and the American Dental Association, as well as Gov. In the days spent away from our office, we have spent many hours studying all of the information available to us about an easy transition back to work. We attended many virtual seminars on the necessary equipment needed and procedures we will implement to provide a safe environment for all.

While we have always cleaned and disinfected all of our patient areas and equipment using hospital-grade EPA-registered disinfectant, and have always sterilized our instruments according to ADA guidelines, there will be many new protocols we will follow for your safety in this COVID-19 era.

As we implement these changes, we ask that you be patient with us and know that, while some of the new procedures may be inconvenient, they are necessary for the protection of all.

Look for changes with confirmation calls, such as we are doing at Masterpiece Dental Studio. You may be asked questions about your health; for example, we will ask if you have had any symptoms of flu or COVID-19, if you have had any contact with anyone who has or may have the virus, and we will ask if you have a fever. We will also ask questions about recent travel.

HEART ATTACK SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- Chest discomfort and discomfort in other areas of the upper body
- Shortness of breath
- Other possible signs include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. Some women are more likely to experience shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

Add-on drug approved for Parkinson's treatment

Q: I heard that a new drug was approved to treat Parkinson's disease. What can you tell me about it?

A: The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Ongentys (opicapone) as an add-on treatment to levodopa/carbidopa in patients with Parkinson's disease (PD) who are experiencing "OFF" episodes.

An "OFF" episode is a time when a patient's medications are not working well, causing an increase in PD symptoms, such as tremor, muscle rigidity and stiffness, slowness of movement, or impaired balance and

coordination. According to the National Institutes of Health, PD is the second-most common neurodegenerative disorder in the U.S. after Alzheimer's disease. An estimated 50,000 Americans are diagnosed with PD each year, and about 1 million Americans have the condition.

The neurological disorder typically occurs in people older than 60, although it can occur earlier. It happens when cells in the brain, which

produce a chemical called dopamine, become impaired or die. Dopamine helps transmit signals between the areas of the brain that produce smooth, purposeful movements.

Ongentys (opicapone) works to protect levodopa/carbidopa by reducing its breakdown in the blood, making it more available to

reach the brain, prolonging its clinical effects and symptom control.

The approval of Ongentys

was primarily based upon two multinational clinical trials involving more than 1,000 patients with Parkinson's disease who experienced at least 1-1/2 hours of "OFF" time daily despite taking levodopa/carbidopa.

Results from these studies showed that patients receiving oral Ongentys once daily in addition to their levodopa/carbidopa experienced significantly less "OFF" time compared to patients taking levodopa/carbidopa alone.

The most common side effects of Ongentys were constipation, low blood pressure, weight loss, an increase in

blood creatine kinase (an indicator of possible muscle damage) and involuntary dance-like movements known as dyskinesia.

patients anymore in reception areas. If you need to have someone drive you to the office, please ask them to wait in the car, if possible. Also know your dental office's protocol for arrival and check-in.

For instance, we ask that you call us from your cell phone to let us know that you have arrived and we will let you know if the office is ready for you to come in. This is to insure that any previous patient is no longer in the office and that all sterilization and disinfecting procedures have been carried out.

As you may have heard on the news, PPE, or personal protection equipment, is a top priority for the safe return to

dentistry. We will all be wearing a mask, but you may be asked to arrive wearing a mask and continue to wear it while having any discussion time or consultations prior to and after your treatment.

This may seem like an overabundance of caution, but we must follow the recommended guidelines for everyone's well-being.

We realize that change is difficult and that you may have questions. Call your

dentist's office for questions about protocol, appointment and so on. These are unprecedented times for sure, but we are all in this together and we will get through it.

Does one arm drift downward or appear weak?

S – Speech: Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase such as "You can't teach an old dog new tricks." Is the speech slurred or strange?

T – Time: If you see any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

Early detection and treatment is the key to improved outcomes for stroke victims. Some treatment modalities are most effective if the stroke is recognized and interpreted within three hours of the first symptoms. It is also important to realize certain therapies require being within a certain window of time from the onset of symptoms, so it is best not to delay and seek medical attention immediately if symptoms are noticed.

CARDIAC ARREST

■ Cardiac arrest occurs when the heart malfunctions and stops beating unexpectedly. Within seconds, a person becomes unresponsive, is not breathing or is only gasping. Survival depends on getting immediate CPR.
