Deputies investigate package

Old Courthouse museum reopens

Citrus County announced Monday the reopening of the Historic Citrus County Courthouse, the Old Courthouse Heritage Museum, and the Citrus County Archives at 1 Courthouse Square, Inverness on Wednesday, May 20, by appointment.

The museum will schedule senior tours at 10 and 11 a.m. with family tours at 1, 2 and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. There will be signage throughout the museum encouraging social distancing, and CDC recommendations.

When Kayleigh Meshil opened the doors of Dynabody gym in Inverness at 7 a.m. Monday, there were already seven of her regulars waiting.



Crumps Landing reopens Thursday

Nearly a year after fire engulfed Homosassa's most iconic tiki destination, the party on the river will soon begin again.

Crumps Landing, a popular restaurant and bar, is set to reopen at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, May 21, after a long road of rebuilding and delays due to the COVID-19 shutdown.

Claudia Ratcliff, assistant general manager at Crumps, said she "is absolutely excited."

"I love this place with all of my heart," she said. "It's going to be pure

joy seeing all these people back in here the way it should be.'

The reopening comes as Gov. Ron DeSantis allowed for 50% capacity at Florida restaurants in full Phase One of COVID-19 reopening.

The Crumps Landing tiki structure and restroom facilities were damaged by a fire on July 13, 2019, which was believed to have started in a mobile cooking trailer at the restaurant at 11210 W. Halls River Road on the Homosassa River. The large fire went viral as Citrus residents and passersby posted videos of the blaze on social media.





COVID-19 causing blood shortages; blood donors needed



LOS ANGELES — "This Is Us" stars Mandy Moore and Justin Hartley will co-host NBC's Red Nose Day special to raise money and awareness for children in need.

The network's sixth annual event, airing 9-11 p.m. Thursday, will include musical performances, sketches and short films that illustrate how donations are used for children living in poverty in America and other countries.

Among the actors and musical artists taking part: Julia Roberts, John Legend, Bryan Cranston, Kelly Clarkson, Paul Rudd, One Republic, Steve Martin, 5 Seconds of Summer, Sarah Silverman, Ray Romano, Sam Smith and James Taylor.

Funds raised by this year's Red Nose campaign will be directed to help combat the effect of COVID-19 on voungsters and the organizations that aid them.

In the pandemic, "some of the most vulnerable parts of our population are obviously going to be children," Moore said. "The need has never been more critical to make sure that kids have health care and education and housing and food, all of the things that Red Nose Day and the campaign supports."

Because of the crisis, the fundraiser's Red Noses aren't being sold in drugstores as is usual. Instead, they're part of NosesOn.com, a website to make donations and get a "digital Red Nose" to share on social media, NBC said.

Red Nose Day has raised \$200 million annually for programs including Boys & Girls Clubs of America, Children's

Big Cat Rescue founder now selling coronavirus masks

CITRUS PARK - Are you a cool cat or kitten? There's now a coronavirus mask out there for

The Tampa Bay Times reports that Big Cat Rescue founder Carole Baskin, prominently featured in Netflix's "Tiger King: Murder, Mayhem and Madness," started selling face masks with her oft-quoted catchphrase Saturday.

The dual-layered tie masks feature the words "Hey all you cool cats and kittens" above a whiskered feline smile. Viewers of the popular docu-series know that's Baskin's catchphrase.

Masks cost \$11 each and come in black or leopard print. The masks are being sold to

raise money to help big cats. Portions of the proceeds also support first responders.

Big Cat Rescue is closed to the public due to the coronavirus outbreak. A post on bigcatrescue.com said the animal rescue is losing \$160,000 a month in tour revenue.

Big Cat Rescue and its founder have been the subject of much attention since being featured in "Tiger King." The streaming series stars gun-toting Oklahoma zookeeper Joseph Maldonado-Passage, aka Joe Exotic. He was sentenced to 22 years in prison after killing five tigers and plotting to have Baskin murdered.

Baskin was upset with how the show portrayed the captive tiger trade. "Tiger King" spent much of its time focusing on the feud between Baskin and Maldonado-Passage, which included accusations by him that Baskin was behind the disappearance of her ex-husband, **Don** Lewis. Baskin has denied that. - From wire reports

Vaccine trial news rallies stock market

The stock market bounced back from its worst week in nearly two months Monday as optimism about a potential vaccine for the coronavirus and hopes for a U.S. economic recovery in the second half of the year put investors in a buying mood.

The S&P 500 climbed 3.2%, its best day since early April. The gains erased all of its losses from last week, when the index posted its worst showing since late March and its third weekly loss in the last four. Bond yields rose broadly in another sign that investors were becoming more optimistic.

Stocks were already headed for a higher opening on Wall Street when a drug company announced encouraging results in very early testing of an experimental coronavirus vaccine. The stock of the company, Massachusettsbased Moderna, jumped

Investors were also encouraged by remarks over the weekend from Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell, who expressed optimism that the U.S. economy could begin to recover in the second half of the year. Once the outbreak and industrial stocks

said, the economy should be able to rebound "substantially."

The S&P 500 gained 90.21 points to 2,953.91. The benchmark index is still down 12.8% from its all-time high on Feb. 19.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average climbed 911.95 points, or 3.9%, to 24.597.37. The Nasdag composite rose 220.27 points, or 2.4%, to 9,234.83. Small-company stocks fared better than the rest of the market. The Russell 2000 index picked up 76.70 points, or 6.1%, to 1,333.69.

Investors are hoping that a working vaccine for COVID-19 can be developed and that it will help reassure people and businesses as the economy reopens.

Traders are also encouraged that, so far at least, there hasn't been a lot of data implying the reopening of the economy is going to lead to a resurgence in the number of COVID-19 cases, said Sam Stovall, chief investment strategist at CFRA.

"Of course, because we are responding to impressions, we could end up giving back some of these gains should additional information contest our beliefs," he said.





FBI: Shooter at Pensacola base coordinated with al-Qaida

The gunman who killed three U.S. sailors at a military base in Florida last year repeatedly communicated with al-Qaida operatives about planning and tactics in the months leading up to the attack, U.S. officials said Monday, as they lashed out at Apple for failing to help them open the shooter's phones so they could access key evidence.

crimes as president, repeatedly tweeting, "OBAMAGATE!" The claims have become a rallying cry among Trump supporters, while Democrats view it as a desperate attempt to shift the focus from the president's handling of the coronavirus outbreak and the nation's soaring unemployment.

Barr insisted that the Justice Department would not be swayed by political pressure to investigate the president's opponents and that the "criminal justice system will not be used for partisan political ends."

Stroke? Act

'ith May being American Stroke Awareness month, we decided to bring focus to this critical topic.

Stroke is one of the leading causes of the death across the globe, second only to coronary artery disease. However, it is the leading cause of disability. Stroke is defined as poor blood flow to the brain resulting in cell death.

The two main types can be classified as an ischemic stroke (lack of blood flow) or hemorrhagic stroke (excess bleeding) within the brain housed within the confines of the

Disruption of the blood supply to the brain, typically from a blood clot in an artery, results in an ischemic stroke. Conversely, blood escaping in or around the brain from disruption of a blood vessel, yields a hemorrhagic stroke. Ischemic events comprise the majority of strokes, contributing to

approximately 87%. While many people assume that strokes only occur in the elderly, it is important to know that strokes can happen to anyone at any age. Certain lifestyle habits, medical conditions and hereditary factors can increase your chances of having a stroke.

Some medical conditions that can increase your chances of a stroke include previous history of stroke or transient ischemic attack, high blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol, heart disease and sickle cell disease.

High blood pressure is the leading cause of stroke. This is important to know since many times warning signs of having high blood pressure go unnoticed.

It is important to check your blood pressure daily. If you have high blood pressure, you can try to lower it with lifestyle changes such as exercise and diet, but many times use of medication becomes necessary. Mitigating high blood pressure by these measures can lower your risk of stroke.

Stroke is considered a medical emergency and like any life-threatening event, every minutes counts. Analogous to extinguishing a fire rapidly, caring for a stroke promptly can curtail irreversible damage to the brain.

The pneumonic FAST can help you remember suggestive signs of a stroke and remind you to ask the following questions when you witness such signs.

Stroke: Act FAST - Face: Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop or is one side numb?

A — Arms: Ask the person to raise both arms.


Serious medical situations don't just stop during pandemic

Dental care in tough times

hope that all of you are coming through COVID-19 healthy and in good spirits.

My family and I, as well as my staff, are doing well. By now, some of you have had the chance to go back to your dentist and some of you might have been seen by your dentist during our lockdown for emergency needs. I've chosen a return date of May 18 for administrative needs and May 19 to see patients at our office.

Things will likely be a little different at your dentist's office, too, so I thought I would share portions of the information I have sent out to my patients to give you an idea of what to expect. Please realize every office will be a little different, but we all have the same thing in mind, the safety of our patients and staff.

In this new world we live in, we want to assure you that we will not waiver from the priority of your safety, and we will follow the guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and the American Dental Association, as well as Gov. Ron DeSantis, to insure that you and our staff remain safe when returning to our office.

In the days spent away from our office, we have spent many hours studying all of the information available to us about an easy transition back to work. We attended many virtual seminars on the necessary equipment needed and procedures we will implement to provide a safe environment for all.

While we have always cleaned and disinfected all of our patient areas and equipment using hospital-grade EPAregistered disinfectant, and have always sterilized our instruments according to ADA guidelines, there will be many new protocols we will follow for your safety in this COVID-19 era.

As we implement these changes, we ask that you be patient with us and know that, while some of the new procedures may be inconvenient, they are necessary for the protection of all.

Look for changes with confirmation calls, such as we are doing at Masterpiece Dental Studio. You may be asked questions about your health; for example, we will ask if you have had any symptoms of flu or COVID-19, if you have had any contact with anyone who has or may have the virus, and we will ask if you have a fever. We will also ask questions about recent travel.

Offices will be following social-distancing guidelines and will not accommodate numerous

Add-on drug approved for Parkinson's treatment

I heard that a new drug was approved to treat Parkinson's disease. What can you tell me about it?

A: The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Ongentys (opicapone) as an add-on treatment to levodopa/carbidopa in patients with Parkinson's disease (PD) who are experiencing "OFF" episodes.

An "OFF" episode is a time when a patient's medications are not working well, causing an increase in PD symptoms, such as tremor, muscle rigidity and stiffness, slowness of movement, or impaired balance and coordination.

According to the National Institutes of Health, PD is the second-most common neurodegenerative disorder in the U.S. after Alzheimer's disease. An estimated 50,000 Americans are diagnosed with PD each year. and about 1 million Americans have the condition.

The neurological disorder typically occurs in people older than 60, although it can occur earlier. It happens when cells in the brain, which

produce a chemical called dopamine, become impaired or die. Dopamine helps transmit signals between the areas of the brain that produce smooth, purposeful movements.

Ongentys (opicapone) works to protect levodopa/ carbidopa by reducing its breakdown in the blood, making it more available to

reach the brain, prolonging its clinical effects and symptom control

The approval of Ongentys

was primarily based upon two multinational clinical trials involving more than 1,000 patients with Parkinson's disease who experienced at least 1-1/2 hours of "OFF" time daily despite taking levodopa/ carbidopa.

Results from these studies showed that patients receiving oral Ongentys once daily in addition to their levodopa/carbidopa experienced significantly less "OFF" time compared to patients taking levodopa/ carbidopa alone.

The most common side effects of Ongentys were constipation, low blood pressure, weight loss, an increase in

blood creatine kinase (an indicator of possible muscle damage) and involuntary dance-like movements known as dyskinesia.

For instance, we ask that you call us from your cell phone to let us know that you have arrived and we will let you know if the office is ready for you to come in. This is to insure that any previous patient is no longer in the office and that all sterilization and disinfecting procedures have been carried out.

As you may have heard on the news, PPE, or personal protection equipment, is a top priority for the safe return to

dentistry. We will all be wearing a mask, but you may be asked to arrive wearing a mask and continue to wear it while having any discussion time or consultations prior to and after your treatment.

This may seem like an overabundance of caution, but we must follow the recommended guidelines for everyone's well-being.

We realize that change is difficult and that you may have questions. Call your

dentist's office for questions about protocol, appointment and so on. These are unprecedented times for sure, but we are all in this together and we will get through it.

Does one arm drift downward or appear

S – Speech: Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase such as "You can't teach an old dog new tricks." Is the speech slurred or strange?

T — Time: If you see any of these signs, call 911 immediately.

Early detection and treatment is the key to improved outcomes for stroke victims. Some treatment modalities are most effective if the stroke is recognized and interpreted within three hours of the first symptoms. It is also important to realize certain therapies require being within a certain window of time from the onset of symptoms, so it is best not to delay and seek medical attention immediately if symptoms are noticed.



three robots, when you are the dummy, the play will be so quick


that you cannot possibly follow it. Today's deal was played at Bridge Base Online, and West forgot a key defense guideline.

How should the defense have proceeded against four spades after West led the club five?

South stretched when he bid four spades, but he had the vulnerability on his side. Then East judged poorly. His side would have made five hearts unless North led the diamond seven, and declarer then made the likely misguess. Also, four spades doubled could have

cost 300. However, East did not defend well. At trick one, South smoothly dropped his club queen under East's king. Suitably fooled, East shifted to a low heart. South ruffed the second heart, drew trumps and led the club jack to establish dummy's suit and get home.

East forgot that when someone opens with a pre-empt, then leads a side suit, that is a singleton. East should have cashed his club ace at trick two and given his partner a club ruff. Back in with the heart ace, East could have led his last club and sat back to await another trick with the diamond king down two.
