Duke to build solar plant in Citrus County

Duke Energy announced late Monday it will construct two new solar energy plants in Florida. One of those will be built at the energy complex north of Crystal River. The Citrus County facility will be a 74.9-megawatt solar power plant on 500 acres near the Crystal River Energy Complex (CREC).

The plant, which will be named the Bay Trail Solar Power Plant, is located on the Holcim property about two miles north of the Citrus Combined Cycle Station and northeast of the Holcim mine. The proximity to CREC provides the project with an existing substation for tying into the grid and shows Duke Energy's continued commitment to Citrus County.

Work is expected to start in late March and be in service in the first quarter of 2022.

Teen dies in boating accident

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is continuing to investigate the Saturday death of a Citrus County teenager.

Agency spokeswoman Karen Parker said at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, March 13, a boat was traveling on the north body of water of the Tsala Apopka Lake chain in Citrus County. The driver was heading north "at an unknown speed" with a passenger in the boat with him and was pulling another juvenile on an inner tube behind the boat, Parker said.

The person being pulled has been identified by the Chronicle as Serra Sullivan. The Citrus County School Board confirmed for the Chronicle that one of its high school students had died in an accident this weekend.

Parker told the Chronicle in an email that the driver turned left through a curve and the tube swung right, hitting a cypress tree, knocking the victim into the water.

After a 30-minute search, the victim was found.

According to Citrus County Fire Rescue, she was taken to a boat ramp at East Muir Place in Inverness.

Emergency workers and law enforcement was called to the scene and paramedics performed lifesaving efforts while they transported her to Ocala Regional Medical Center.

Sullivan was later pronounced dead.

Parker said the incident is an ongoing investigation.

Planning progress in Pine Ridge

Golf course owner sets his sight on new homes, townhouses, recreation center

Golf courses nationwide have hit on hard times because the outdoor sport has fallen out of favor with many who would rather get the same thrills from a computer screen.

The popularity decline has forced golf course owners to think out of the box and the new owner of the Pine Ridge Golf Club in Beverly Hills believes he has a

way not only to keep his course viable but also bring needed housing to the entire county.

Neil Surati, president/owner of Shanti Golf LLC, pitched a plan to Pine Ridge Property Owners Association members at a special presentation last week.

The idea is to close the 9-hole executive/par course and build the following on the 40-plus acres:

- 25-30 upscale townhomes, from \$250,000 to \$375,000.
■ A recreation center with an

office; walking trails, fitness center; indoor pool, tennis and pickleball court.

■ Three- to four-story apartments for 55-and-older seniors who would pay rent from \$900 to \$1,200. There would be four buildings in all.

The ambitious plan still must clear the Pine Ridge Property Owners Association. Nothing has been submitted to the county.

One part of his project has already hit a snag.

Amy Bidwell, senior planner for county land development, said the affordable senior housing component would not fit on the property because it is designated as a golf course.

Bidwell, in a memo to Surati, said he would need to go through the comprehensive plan amendment and also needs an amendment to the Pine Ridge master plan.

Manatees find better life with plentiful food in Citrus County waters

It's been a tale of two Floridas for manatees living along the state's opposing coastlines, and Citrus County's resident marine mammals are enjoying their real estate.

Fewer than a dozen sea cows perished from Jan. 1 to March 5, in county waters, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC's) preliminary mortality data.

However, for the Sunshine State's east-coast manatees, recent death counts have been worrying a nonprofit that's been advocating the species since 1981.

"It started back in late 2020," Save the Manatee Club Executive Director Patrick Rose told the Chronicle, "and, as we started out the new year, those numbers just kept going up and up."

Rose said his warning message focuses on the six counties making up Florida's Indian River Lagoon — 156 miles of coastline and waterways from Volusia County to Palm Beach County.

In Brevard County, which leads Florida in manatee mortalities, FWC documented 179 carcasses from Jan. 1 to March 5 — six more deaths than what FWC reported there for the whole year of 2020.

Broward (51), Palm Beach (32), Martin (26), Volusia (19) and Indian River (15) counties follow in FWC's manatee mortality rankings.

More than 50% of each of those counties' manatee remains have yet to be necropsied by FWC to determine a cause of death, leaving marine biologists, like Rose, wondering about the spike in deaths.

COVID-19's arrival last March halted FWC's ability to

conduct necropsies — another term for autopsies — even though the agency continued to record deaths.

Of Florida's 637 manatees deaths FWC recorded in 2020, 67% underwent a necropsy compared to 31% of the state's

432 manatee mortalities FWC reported since January.

Jurors return to courthouse for felony trials

Jurors returned to the Citrus County Courthouse after COVID-19 put their summonses on hold for a year.

Of the 300 jurors summoned to appear at the courthouse Monday, March 15, 91 showed to be selected for trials on Circuit Court Judge Richard "Ric" Howard's felony docket, according to Lindsay Tozer, spokeswoman for the Citrus County Clerk of Courts. Of the 18 defendants due to

stand trial over the week, three decided to take their cases to jurors while the others either accepted plea offers or had their hearings continued.

Here are the highlights from Howard's courtroom:

Hernando 36-year-old Miranda Jeanette Parker accepted a plea offer to serve 15 years in prison for trafficking in a handful of narcotics with children in her home. Parker pleaded no contest to

trafficking in more than 200 grams of methamphetamine, trafficking in more than 10 grams of ecstasy, trafficking in more than 10 grams of eutylone, possessing half a pound of marijuana, possessing 15 oxycodone hydrochloride pills.

She also changed her not-guilty plea to charges of child neglect and using a residence for drug dealing with minors present.

Parker's punishment is the minimum-mandatory sentence of her meth trafficking charge.

Citrus County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested Parker in March 2020 during a raid of her home, where the drugs were seized alongside two children, ages 6 and 7.

Assistant State Attorney Bryan Caughey told Howard on Monday he had to amend Parker's charges after the Florida Department of Law Enforcement recently

Man arrested in SWAT raid

An early morning SWAT team raid at an Inverness home Friday resulted in one arrest and charges of a felon possessing ammunition and drug paraphernalia.

The arrest of Matthew Steve Williams, 36, began at 5:27 a.m., when the Citrus County Sheriff's Office tactical impact vice/narcotics unit executed a search warrant at a home at 1200 Clay-

more St. in Inverness.

According to the arrest report, the deputies ordered the occupants in the home out of the residence and searched the house. In Williams' bedroom, deputies found two safes. Deputies reported that Williams volunteered the combinations for both safes.

In one safe, deputies found eight rounds of 9

ammunition and 29 rounds in the second safe, according to the report.

Deputies also found in the bedroom a baggie and two scales with methamphetamine residue on them using field tests performed at the scene, the report stated.

Deputies conducted a criminal history check on Williams and reported he had several felony convictions

including one for armed burglary, according to the report.

Deputies noted in the report that they found Williams during the raid in the living room. His girlfriend was asleep in Williams' bedroom.

Deputies arrested Williams and took him to the Citrus County jail.

His bond was \$10,000 for one count of a felon in possession of a firearm/ammunition and \$1,000 for possession of drug paraphernalia.

Capitol doors won't swing open soon

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Capitol is expected to remain largely closed to the public for the rest of the legislative session because of the COVID-19 pandemic, as lawmakers get more comfortable meeting face to face.

Despite new COVID-19 cases trending down from late fall and early winter and the federal government increasing vaccine supplies to the state, Senate President Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, doesn't anticipate lifting health precautions before the scheduled April 30 end of the session.

"I don't think everyone in this building will be vaccinated in the next seven weeks," Simpson said last week. "We have a major concern for our senators. But are equally as concerned for our staff."

Simpson estimated it could be the summer before such vaccinations could be completed.


"That leads us to believe that next year we would go back to a much more traditional model of having folks come back into this chamber and visit us," Simpson said.

Gov. Ron DeSantis expects that sometime in April vaccines might be available to all Floridians, with lines shorter than they were in the early stages of vaccinations when fewer doses were available and seniors rushed to get shots.

"I think as you get into some of the younger demographics where the risk is just a lot lower, I think it's going to be less than 50 percent are going to opt for it," DeSantis said Friday while in Sebastian.

On Thursday, President Joe Biden, stressing the need for vaccinations because the fight against COVID-19 and its variants "is far from over," also said he envisions everyone will be able to get in line for shots by May 1.

"Let me be clear, that doesn't mean everyone's going to have that shot immediately. But it means you'll be able to get in line beginning May 1, every adult will be eligible to get their shot," Biden said. "And to do this, we're going to go from a million shots a day that I

promised in December, before I was sworn in, to maintaining, beating our current pace of 2 million shots a day."

More than 4.2 million people in Florida have received at least one dose of the vaccines, according to the state Department of Health.

The Senate and House have set up protocols that have led to major changes in the way this year's legislative session has been conducted.

Lawmakers, staff members and the news media are expected to get tested for COVID-19 weekly.

Senate Minority Leader Gary Farmer, D-Fort Lauderdale, said Democrats are starting to feel more comfortable meeting in small groups and plan to begin in-person caucus meetings.

"We're going to ask for limited staff attendance, I don't think every legislator needs to bring one of their staffers in,"

Farmer said Friday. "We'll have some of our minority caucus staff in there. But we'll be there in person. Then stakeholders and the press can attend on Zoom, ask questions, participate in that manner. That way I think we're doing the best we can to have that in-person togetherness that I think we rely on so much as legislators."

The Senate has implemented more restrictive access requirements to the Capitol than the House, where lobbyists and other visitors must register online at least three hours before committee meetings, show identification and pick up passes to gain access to meeting rooms.

People who want to speak before Senate committees must go to the Donald L. Tucker Civic Center, a few blocks west of the Capitol at Florida State University, and appear through a livestream.

While some lawmakers have discussed expanding the livestream option to other locations in the state for public input during future sessions, Simpson said it's too early to consider if any COVID protocols will become standard practice once the pandemic is deemed conquered.

"What we don't know is, what are the CDC (federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) guidelines going to look like in August?" Simpson said. "If you were to tell me that the circumstances are going to be 100% vaccinated, all restrictions lifted on travel and so on, I would say we will go back to the way it was. But the realities are, as we don't know, if some of these additional strains will bring additional problems, we certainly hope that it goes back to normal where people are visiting us in our offices, and the public is welcome in this building."

Miami taps Houston's top cop for police chief post

MIAMI — Art Acevedo, the Houston police chief who forged a national profile by calling for gun control, marching with protesters after George Floyd's death and criticizing former President Donald Trump, is taking the top job in the Miami Police Department, officials said Monday.

"We went out and got what I feel is America's best chief," said Miami Mayor Francis Suarez standing alongside

Acevedo at a news conference Monday after describing him to The Miami Herald as the Tom Brady or Michael Jordan of police chiefs.

Acevedo, 56, is expected to begin the job in four to eight weeks. He is replacing Chief Jorge Colina, who retired in February, becoming Miami's fifth chief the past decade.

Acevedo was born in Cuba but came to the U.S. as a refugee with his family when he was 4 years old. He became the first Hispanic to run Houston's

police department in November 2016, overseeing a 5,400-person force with a more than \$1 billion yearly budget.

The Miami police force is much smaller, with a staff of 1,400 and is overshadowed by the Miami-Dade County Police Department with more than 3,000 police officers. When asked why he had taken on a smaller force, Acevedo said his time was coming up in Houston with Mayor Sylvester Turner's final term coming to an end and said he

had enjoyed visiting Miami and highlighted the downtown and Little Havana districts.

"I want to be part of that," he said adding that he had opportunities in Los Angeles and with President Joe Biden's administration. "My heart was here."

He sent an email to his department, calling the move "truly bittersweet," the Houston Chronicle reported.

"We have been through so much as an extended family; Hurricane Harvey,


two World Series, a Super Bowl, Irma, the summer of protests, and most recently, an ice storm of epic proportion," Acevedo wrote. "On top of all of this, sadly we have buried six of our fallen heroes. No matter the challenge, you have all risen to the occasion, and you have honored the sacrifices of our fallen comrades with resiliency and sustained excellence."

Acevedo is a registered Republican who spoke by video on the opening night of the last year's Democratic convention.

Surati is so confident his idea will score a hole-in-one that he already plans to use the proceeds from the housing/recreation investment to improve the remaining 18-hole course.

“That is my goal,” said Surati.

Surati said he is well aware of golf courses closing around this area and he doesn't want Pine Ridge added to the list. Surati bought the 126-acre Pine Ridge Golf Club in October for \$600,000-plus.

“I see a need for housing (in Citrus County),” he said.

“COVID had really set back the ability to better understand ... what was happening,” Rose said. “It's not a criticism of the (FWC); they're doing the best job they can possibly do; they're being overwhelmed because there's so many needing rescue and there's so many that are dying.”

To report a sick, injured, tagged or dead manatee, call FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline at 888-404-3922. Cellphone users can also dial *FWC or #FWC. Rose said a lack of food is the culprit behind the high death rates of east-coast manatees, with acres of sustainable seagrasses dying off in the last decade.

“We're getting animals that are very malnourished and are, in fact, dying of starvation,” he said.

More than 1,000 manatees huddle for warmth near the power plants of Titusville during the winter, Rose said, but their dwindling food source has them choosing between either staying put and starving or dying from cold stress in an attempt to forage farther offshore.

Rose said too many nutrients from manmade developments have leached into waters, leading to blooms of invasive algae that outcompete the natural seagrasses for

survival. “It goes back to man, and our activities,” he said.

With watercraft remaining as the highest cause of manatee deaths, Rose said boaters still need to be diligent alongside manatees.

Florida's west coast has been more hospitable to manatees.

Lee County, in the southwest, has been the scene of the highest death count with 33, according to the FWC, followed by Hillsborough County with 12.

Citrus and Monroe counties are tied at nine. Last year, Citrus County reported a total 15 manatee deaths.

Citrus County is a winter refuge for an average 800 manatees, according to USFWS wildlife biologist Joyce Kleen, who's been counting local manatees from the skies for almost 31 years.

When Kleen flew March 9, she tallied 495 manatees in county waters — 355 in King's Bay; 111 in the Homosassa River, east of Halls River; 14 at the Crystal River Energy Complex discharge canal; 12 in the Homosassa River, west of Halls River; and three at the Cross Florida Barge Canal.

While she doesn't have her December count finalized, Kleen estimates more than 550 manatees in county waters then.

Unfortunately, Kleen was unable to go airborne in January, when her winter manatee counts are

traditionally the highest.

Kleen doesn't include the Chassahowitzka River, which has been the home to roughly 20 manatees Kleen thinks is the growing family of Rachel, the adopted manatee released from the Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park in 1997.

After arriving to Citrus County's shores, where they hunker down during their annual winter migrations from November to March, manatees take trips between the spring waters and river mouths while it's warm to feed on offshore seagrasses.

Rose said Citrus County's numerous springs provide a large, constant and natural source of warm water for manatees to seek refuge in.

Seagrass beds are also healthy off the county's shores, Rose added, and

Save Crystal River King's Bay Restoration Project is revitalizing more growth inshore to help keep manatees closer to warm waters while they feed.

Crystal River's ongoing septic-to-sewer programs are also keeping fewer nutrients from entering King's Bay, Rose said.

“Citrus County is kind of completely different situation altogether,” he said. “There's no issue I'm aware of in terms of the population being malnourished.”

“The animals don't seem to have a problem finding food to eat,” echoed Jim Valade, assistant refuge manager for the Crystal River National Wildlife Refuge Complex under the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS).

“There's nothing unusual going on that I'm aware of.”



So much for the GOP and unity

Sen. Simpson off to strong start in 2021 session

State Senate President Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, opened the 2021 legislative session citing his list of priorities for state government.

It’s a pleasure to see Sen. Simpson is placing state issues above national politics by omitting Gov. Ron DeSantis’ politically oriented bills from his agenda. Legislation backed by Gov. DeSantis’ would revamp vote-by-mail practices, crack down on violent protests, make it difficult for local government officials to trim spending on law enforcement and target large social media companies that block users from their platforms. All are partisan hot-button issues, especially the vote-by-mail legislation, which critics say would make it harder for Floridians to vote.

Simpson is focused on interests that affect constituents, rather their ideological battles. His priority list is on target for a better Florida. One of his top priorities is to take care of foster children and fix some of the broken processes. He is on the right track to try to do the right things.

Other priorities on Simpson’s list include the expansion of school choice, helping the state’s lowest-paid employees by accelerating the minimum wage timeline, and support for the storage of water north of Lake Okeechobee before it enters the lake.

Sen. Simpson has a broader view of the state’s needs than Gov. DeSantis. Simpson is open to a lot of

different ideas and his style is to delegate to committees, but not to micromanage them. That’s good news for Florida residents who hope to see some positive action from the state Legislature this year.

The shovel-ready road and water projects list of his is making local governments push to have projects in place before the governor decides their fate. Simpson wants to pump money into those projects from the next round of coronavirus relief funds, which the president signed into law on Thursday. He also maintains his support for the legislation aimed at protecting businesses and health care providers from COVID-related lawsuits, which seems well on its way to passing. That’s a big positive for businesses that have been struggling for the past year to not have to worry about frivolous litigation.

“The vast majority of these businesses made a good-faith effort to adhere to ever-changing guidelines,” Simpson said. “Our bills strike the right balance by shielding those that did their best under difficult circumstances, while also protecting consumers.”

Simpson said the governor has handled COVID stimulus funds during the past year, but he expects now that the session is underway, the Legislature will be “engaged” in the process. If Sen. Simpson can accomplish his goals with support from both parties, Florida will be on its way to recovery.

The AstraZeneca vaccine. Nations suspend AstraZeneca vaccine use

BERLIN — A cascading number of European countries — including Germany, France, Italy and Spain — suspended use of AstraZeneca's COVID-19 vaccine Monday over reports of dangerous blood clots in some recipients, though the company and international regulators say there is no evidence the shot is to blame.

AstraZeneca's formula is one of three vaccines in use on the continent. But the escalating concern is another setback for the European Union's vaccination drive, which has been plagued by shortages and other hurdles and is lagging well behind the campaigns in Britain and the U.S.

The EU's drug regulatory agency called a meeting for Thursday to review experts' findings on the AstraZeneca shot and decide whether action needs to be taken.

The furor comes as much of Europe is tightening restrictions on schools and businesses amid surging cases of COVID-19.

Defense asks for delay in ex-cop's trial

MINNEAPOLIS — An attorney for a former Minneapolis police officer charged in George Floyd's death asked the judge Monday to delay the trial, saying the announcement of a \$27 million settlement for Floyd's family could make a fair trial impossible.

Defense attorney Eric Nelson also raised the possibility of renewing his previously unsuccessful motion to move Derek Chauvin's trial to another city.

VP Harris, Jill Biden promote aid plan

LAS VEGAS — From a vaccination site in the desert West to a grade school on the Eastern seaboard, President Joe Biden's top messengers — his vice president and wife among them — led a cross-country effort Monday to highlight the benefits of his huge COVID relief plan.

Biden, Vice President Kamala Harris and their spouses are embarked on an ambitious tour this week to promote the \$1.9 trillion plan as a way to battle the pandemic and boost the economy.

The road show — dubbed the "Help is here" tour by the White House — began with Harris visiting a COVID-19 vaccination site and a culinary academy in Las Vegas and first lady Jill Biden touring a New Jersey elementary school. Biden himself heads out on Tuesday.

Storm keeps Denver airport closed

DENVER — Denver's airport was closed for a second day Monday after a powerful late winter snowstorm dumped over 3 feet of heavy, wet snow on parts of Colorado and Wyoming, shutting down roads, closing state legislatures in both states and interfering with COVID-19 vaccinations.

The 27 inches that had fallen by the end of Sunday at Denver International Airport on the plains east of downtown made it the fourth biggest snowfall in the city's history, according to the National Weather Service in Boulder.

The storm system, fueled by moisture from the Gulf of Mexico, had moved out of the region and into northeastern Nebraska by Monday, said Evan Drenzo, a meteorologist for the weather service in Boulder.

"It's definitely behind us," he said of the storm's snow and wind.

There was still plenty of digging out to do. Denver's airport runways were

closed just before noon on Sunday due to blowing snow and poor visibilities and some stranded passengers spent the night at the

airport. With the sun shining on Monday, over 200 plows were working to clear the snow and ice but the runways were not

scheduled to reopen until 2 p.m. Mountain Daylight Time, the airport said.

In Wyoming, the National Weather Service warned

that driving would remain dangerous for the next several days there because of slick and snow covered roads.

Two charged in assault of Capitol officer

WASHINGTON — U.S. officials have arrested and charged two men with assaulting U.S. Capitol Police officer Brian Sicknick with bear spray during the Jan. 6 riot, but they do not know yet whether it caused the officer's death.

George Tanios, 39, of Morgantown, West Virginia, and Julian Khater, 32, of Pennsylvania, were arrested Sunday on an array of charges, including assaulting a federal officer with a dangerous weapon, conspiracy and other offenses. The idea that Sicknick died after being sprayed by a chemical irritant has emerged in recent weeks as a new theory in the case.

The arrests are the closest federal prosecutors

have come to identifying and charging anyone associated with the deaths that happened during and after the riot. Five people died, including a woman who was shot by a police officer inside the Capitol. But many rioters are facing charges of injuring police officers, who were attacked with bats, sprayed with irritants, punched and kicked, and rammed with metal gates meant to keep the insurrectionists from the Capitol.

Investigators initially believed that Sicknick was hit in the head with a fire extinguisher, based on statements collected early in the investigation, according to two people familiar with the case. But as they've collected more evidence, the theory of the case has evolved and investigators now believe

Sicknick may have ingested a chemical substance — possibly bear spray — that may have contributed to his death, officials have said.

Sicknick and other officers were standing guard behind metal bicycle racks as the mob descended on the Capitol on Jan. 6.

"Give me that bear s-t," Khater said before he reached into Tanios' backpack, according to court papers. Tanios told Khater "not yet" because it was "still early," but Tanios responded that "they just f---ing sprayed me." Khater was then seen holding a can of chemical spray, prosecutors say.

Khater walked through the crowd toward the bike rack barrier. Rioters began pulling on one of the racks, and Khater was seen with his arm in the air and the canister in his hand while standing just 5 to 8 feet from the officers, authorities said.

Video footage shows

the officers reacting one by one — bringing their hands to their face and rushing to find water to flush out their eyes — after they were hit with the spray, according to court papers.

Another officer eventually spotted Khater deploying the substance and

sprayed Khater himself, authorities said.

The men each made brief court appearances from jail via videoconference on Monday and will remain locked up pending future hearings. A detention hearing was scheduled for Thursday for Tanios.

LGBTQ Catholics stung by Vatican rebuff of same-sex unions

The Vatican's declaration that same-sex unions are a sin the Roman Catholic Church cannot bless was no surprise for LGBTQ Catholics in the United States — yet it stung deeply nonetheless.

Marianne Duddy-Burke, executive director of DignityUSA, said her organization's membership includes same-sex couples who have been together for decades, persevering in their love for one another in the face of bias and family rejection.

"The fact that our church at its highest levels cannot recognize the grace in that and cannot extend any sort of blessing to these couples is just tragic," she said.

She was responding to a formal statement Monday from the Vatican's orthodox office, the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, saying Roman Catholic clergy may not bless such unions since God "cannot bless sin." It was approved by Pope Francis.

"Having sin be explicitly included in this statement kind of brings us back to zero," said Ross Murray, who oversees religious issues for the LGBTQ rights group GLAAD.

He expressed dismay that "the ability for us to

live out our lives fully and freely is still seen as an affront to the church or, worse yet, an affront to God, who created us and knows us and loves us."

Francis DeBernardo, executive director of New Ways Ministry, which advocates for greater LGBTQ acceptance in the church, said that if those priests who have already been blessing same-sex unions now stop doing so, lay Catholics could be moved to take their place.

"If priests and pastoral ministers no longer feel they can perform such a blessing, the Catholic laity will step in and perform their own rituals," DeBernardo said. "The toothpaste is out of the tube, and it can't be put back inside."

The Rev. Bryan Massingale, an openly gay Catholic priest and professor of theology and social ethics at Fordham University, said priests who want to engage in pastoral outreach to the gay and lesbian community "will continue to do so, except that it will be even more under the table ... than it was before."

For Catholics in same-sex relationships, he said, the Vatican's new message will hurt.

"Every human being is born with this innate desire to love," he said. "For

those who are oriented toward members of the same sex ... to have it being described as inherently or innately sinful without any qualification, that is crushing."

Vatican doctrine holds that gays and lesbians should be treated with dignity and respect, but that gay sex is "intrinsically disordered" and that same-sex unions are sinful.

Natalia Imperatori-Lee, a professor of religious studies at Manhattan College, said those teachings, put together, are problematic.

"It boggles the mind that the hierarchy can affirm that LGBTQ+ persons are made in the image of God but that their unions are a sin," she said via email. "Are they made in God's image with the exception of their hearts? With the exception of their abilities and inclinations to love?"

Sister Simone Campbell, executive director of the U.S.-based NETWORK Lobby for Catholic Social Justice and an advocate for greater LGBTQ inclusion in the church, said she was relieved the Vatican statement wasn't harsher.

She interpreted it as saying, "You can bless the individuals (in a same-sex union), you just can't bless the contract."

reported Parker possessed eutylone — a form of ecstasy — instead of fentanyl.

Opening statements begin Tuesday in the trial of William D. Vause, the Crystal River 27-year-old accused of having the most meth seized by local authorities.

Vause faces felony charges of trafficking between 200 and 400 grams of them, possessing heroin, possessing cocaine and possessing meth.

Sheriff's office deputies arrested Vause and 28-year-old Cayla Jeanne Coile in March 2019 after they seized more than a pound of meth in the couple's home while responding to a domestic disturbance.

Coile pleaded no contest to her drug charges in January 2020 in exchange for 15 years in prison.

Curtis Mendenhall, Vause's attorney, asked Howard on Monday to postpone his client's trial because Vause told him on Friday to call on Coile to testify at his trial.

Howard denied Mendenhall's request because Coile was not a listed witness for either the defense or prosecution.

"We have no intention of calling her," Assistant State Attorney Blake Shore said. Mendenhall told Howard he spoke with Coile, who, he said, would admit on the witness stand to owning the narcotics in the home she shared with Vause.

"We were considering calling her if the state wasn't going to call her," he said. "The state's not calling her because they know she might be helpful to my client's case."

"People can jointly possess something," the judge responded. "That's way too speculative."

Crystal River 29-year-old Eric Michael Pazian and Inverness 43-year-old Devona Denise Ruiz will stand trial separately before Senior Judge T. Michael Johnson to defend

against related drug-trafficking offenses.

Pazian and Ruiz face a slew of charges connected to the 80 grams of heroin, 16 grams of meth, 15 grams of cocaine and other narcotics sheriff's office deputies allegedly found them with March 2020 during a raid of the Best Western hotel in Crystal River.

Will the coronavirus ever go away?

WASHINGTON — Will the coronavirus ever go away?

No one knows for sure. Scientists think the virus that causes COVID-19 may be with us for decades or longer, but that doesn't mean it will keep posing the same threat.

The virus emerged in late 2019 and it's difficult to predict how it will behave over the long term. But many experts believe it's likely the disease will eventually ease from a crisis to a nuisance like the common cold.

That would happen as people build up immunity over time, either through infection or vaccination. Other viruses have followed a similar path.

The 1918 flu pandemic could also offer clues about the course of COVID-19.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that a third of the world's population became infected with that virus, which originated in birds. Eventually, after infected people either died or developed immunity, the virus stopped spreading quickly. It later mutated into a less virulent form, which experts say continues to circulate seasonally.

However, the emergence of new COVID-19 variants could complicate the picture if future virus mutations cause more severe disease or evade vaccines.

It's unlikely the virus will ever be completely stamped out, given the possibility that people might be able to get reinfected after they've already been sick or vaccinated.

The only virus that's ever been eradicated from the human population is smallpox. That's because people develop lasting immunity to that virus after getting sick or vaccinated.

Colon cancer: A deadly disease

Timely screening, lifestyle key to prevention of widespread cancer

Colon cancer is the third most common cancer in the United States and is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in both men and women.

The American Cancer Society has estimated that in 2021 149,500 new colon cancer cases will be diagnosed and they project 52,980 deaths.

Only 67.3 % of age-eligible Americans are up to date with colorectal cancer (CRC) screening.

Colon cancer does not discriminate, even with those who are known to be in the spotlight. Many famous people like Audrey Hepburn, Ronald Reagan and Sharon Osborne have battled colon cancer.

2020 was a devastating year secondary to the COVID-19 pandemic. Not only did the pandemic lead to over half a million deaths in the United States on its own, but it also decreased the individual rate of colon cancer screening.

Secondary to the COVID-19 national emergency, CRC screening dropped by 86%. It was documented that 95,000 colon cancer screenings were missed between March and June of 2020.

The modeling studies are predicting that CRC screening deficit will lead to over 4,500 CRC deaths over the next decade.

CRC has also recently seen an increase in younger population. Due to the newly noted increase, the United States Preventive Services Task-Force recently submitted a recommendation to decrease the age of initial screening from 50 years to 45 years for average-risk adults.

In 2020 we also lost one of the greatest actors, Chadwick Boseman, to colon cancer. Mr. Boseman was only 39 when he was diagnosed with colon cancer and, sadly, he lost his four-year battle to cancer last year at age 43.

It's been estimated that 18,000 young adults under the age of 50 years will be diagnosed with colon cancer this year, with an increase of 49 cases diagnosed daily.

A study has found that median time for rectal cancer diagnosis in young adults took four times longer. Symptoms such as rectal bleeding and constipation were ignored in younger populations and many times are

attributed to minor problems like hemorrhoids without undergoing further evaluation.

Although it is commonly known that those who have a prior history of colon polyps should undergo regular colonoscopy for screening purposes due to increased risk, other populations are also noted to have higher risk.

There is increased risk in the African American population of developing colon cancer and it's recommended that they start CRC screening at age 45. Individuals with a first-degree relative with a history of colon cancer are also at significantly higher risk and are advised to undergo early screening.

So what can we do prevent colon cancer? Definitely timely screening plays an important role. Some studies have suggested that high quantities of red meat consumption and frequent alcohol use leads to colon polyps and cancer.

Red and processed meats contain high levels of sulfur. Gut bacteria metabolize the sulfur and this leads to the formation of hydrogen sulfide. Hydrogen sulfide has been shown to damage gut lining DNA and promote inflammation.

One or two alcoholic drinks a day can increase colon cancer risk by 8-10%. More than four drinks can increase to 50%. Tobacco use also has dose-dependent increased risk of CRC.

Colorectal cancer is one of the leading causes of cancer deaths in the United States. Screening saves lives! March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness month, so let's spread the information throughout our communities and help save lives together.

Prevention is better than a cure!

Jarnkrok powers Preds past Lightning 4-1

First win in six meetings this season for Nashville over Tampa Bay

TAMPA — Calle Jarnkrok had a short-handed goal and three assists, helping the Nashville Predators beat the Tampa Bay Lightning 4-1 on Monday.

Pekke Rinne stopped 38 shots and picked up his 14th career assist in Nashville's first victory against Tampa Bay in six meetings on the season. Mattias Ekholm had a goal and an assist, and Eeli Tolvanen and Viktor Arvidsson also scored.

The Predators won for the second time in the past eight games.

Steven Stamkos scored for Tampa Bay, which lost for the second time on home ice this season in 12 games. Curtis McElhinney fell to 2-3-1 on the season after stopping 22 shots.

Nashville opened the scoring in the second period. Tolvanen got his sixth goal when he converted a wrist shot from the left dot at 3:58 after a cross-ice pass from Ryan Johansen.

Arvidsson made it 2-0 with a power-play goal at 9:14. He scored on a one-timer from the left circle from a pass by Erik Haula.

Tampa Bay had a chance to cut into the lead with a power-play chance at 11:03, but Brayden Point was unable to knock a sailing puck out of the air inside the blue line. Jarnkrok then skated away for a breakaway to make it 3-0 on his eighth career short-handed goal.

Stamkos spoiled Rinne's bid for his 60th career shutout when a pass intended for Yann Gourde deflected in off the skate of Dante Fabbro at 10:03 of the third period.

Ekholm scored into an empty net with 19.6 seconds left.



NC State earns first No. 1 seed in women's tourney

UConn coach Auriemma tests positive for coronavirus

UConn is in its normal spot with a No. 1 seed for the women's NCAA Tournament. Familiar territory for Stanford and South Carolina, too.

It's a brand new day for North Carolina State. And the Huskies, while used to their position in the bracket, are facing some uncertainty after coach Geno Auriemma tested positive for the coronavirus.

N.C. State is a No. 1 seed for the first time, joining Stanford, South Carolina and Connecticut on the top lines for the San Antonio-themed regions for the women's tourney. The Cardinal earned the overall No. 1 when the field was revealed Monday night.

Auriemma's Texas arrival will be delayed. He will remain in isolation for 10 days and can rejoin the team on March 24. The other members of UConn's travel party have tested negative for COVID-19.

He'll miss the Huskies' opening game against High Point — one of four first-timers in the NCAAs — and a potential second-round matchup against either Syracuse or South Dakota State.

While the coronavirus caused many disruptions to the schedule throughout the regular season, it looks as if most of the teams in the field made it to the tournament healthy.

Stanford, which will open against Utah Valley, had quite the odyssey this season because of the coronavirus. It had to play on the road for nine weeks after Santa Clara County health officials announced they were prohibiting all contact sports in late November.

The Cardinal, who are looking for their third national

championship, are the top seed in the Alamo region. The Hemisfair, Mercado and River Walk are the other region names.

For the past few years, earning one of the top 16 seeds would give a team home games in the tournament's first two rounds, but that's not the case this year. Every game will be played in the San Antonio area because of the pandemic, with the last four rounds tipping off at the Alamodome.

This could be one of the most wide-open tournaments, with a dozen teams capable of winning the title. There were five different No. 1 teams in The Associated Press women's basketball poll this year, including the Huskies, who

finished the season at No. 1.

The national semifinals take place on April 2, and the championship game will be held April 4.

Tennessee continued its streak of making the NCAA Tournament all 39 years. Joining High Point as NCAA rookies are Stony Brook, Utah Valley and Bradley.

Notre Dame's run of 24 straight NCAA appearances came to an end. The Irish were one of the first four teams out of the tournament.

Even without Notre Dame, the ACC is well represented with eight teams in the field. The SEC and the Big Ten each had seven schools earn bids. The Pac-12 had six. The Big 12 had five.

Indiana fires Miller, pays big buyout

Archie Miller's \$10.3 million buyout was one of college basketball's priciest.

Indiana athletic director Scott Dolson decided keeping Miller would prove even more costly to the storied program.

Dolson fired Miller on Monday, armed with enough cash from private donations to cover the buyout and ready to answer a fan base angered by four straight mediocre seasons.

The Hoosiers haven't been to the NCAA Tournament since 2016, haven't been to the Elite Eight since 2002 and haven't won a national championship since 1987 — the longest drought between titles in school history. Indiana has won just three Big Ten titles since 1993 and it's now had five consecutive non-winning seasons in Big Ten play for the first time since 1911-19.

Miller was 67-58 with the Hoosiers and never made the NCAA Tournament though many believed Indiana would have received a bid in 2020 — had the tourney not been canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Gonzaga completes season-long run at No. 1

Gonzaga opened the season at No. 1. The Bulldogs never let go of that ranking.

Now, after a start-to-finish run atop The Associated Press men's college basketball poll, coach Mark Few's Bulldogs are focused on trying to become the first unbeaten national champion in more than four decades.

The Bulldogs (26-0) received all 60 first-place votes to stay atop Monday's final poll, becoming the first team since Kentucky in 2014-15 to be No. 1 in every poll and the 14th overall.

Illinois jumped to No. 2 after winning the Big Ten Tournament, swapping spots with Baylor — which fell one spot after spending 15 of 17 polls sitting in second place. Michigan was next at No. 4, with all three of those teams joining Gonzaga in earning No. 1 seeds for the NCAA Tournament.

UConn finishes No. 1 in women's AP Top 25

In one of the most unconventional seasons ever, UConn finished in a familiar place — at No. 1 in The Associated Press women's college basketball poll.

It's the 16th time that the Huskies have completed the regular season as the top team in the poll. They received 23 first-place votes on Monday from a national media panel of 30 voters.

There were five different teams ranked No. 1 this season — the second most in the poll's history. Stanford, which spent six weeks atop the Top 25, finished at No. 2; the Cardinal received five first-place votes.

North Carolina State was No. 3, matching its best final ranking, achieved by the 1978 squad. The Wolfpack received the other two first-place votes. Texas A&M and Baylor rounded out the top five teams.

Barrett, Gronkowski agree to deals to stay with Bucs

TAMPA — The Tampa Bay Buccaneers feel good about their chances of repeating as Super Bowl champions and aren't wasting time doing whatever's necessary to retain key components of their roster to help Tom Brady pursue an eighth NFL title.

Linebacker Shaquil Barrett and tight end Rob Gronkowski, who came out of retirement 11 months ago to help Brady win No. 7 in his first season with the Bucs, are the latest players to agree to terms to stay with the team.

Barrett agreed to a four-year, \$72 million contract. Gronkowski will return for his 11th season with Brady on a one-year, \$10 million deal.

Minnesota fires coach Pitino after 8 seasons

MINNEAPOLIS — Minnesota fired Richard Pitino on Monday after the coach compiled a 54-96 regular-season record over eight years in the Big Ten and had only three conference finishes higher than 10th place.

The Gophers went 14-15 this season. According to Pitino's contract, the university will owe Pitino a \$1.7 million buy-out of his deal that had three years remaining.

Pitino guided the Gophers to an NIT championship in his first season. Only two NCAA Tournament appearances followed, though, in 2017 and 2019.

Prohm out at Iowa State after 2-win season

AMES, Iowa — Iowa State and men's

basketball coach Steve Prohm have agreed to part ways after one of the worst seasons in the history of the program, athletic director Jamie Pollard announced.

The school said in a statement that Pollard and Prohm met in person Monday night.

The Cyclones were 2-22 overall, 0-18 in the Big 12. They lost their last 18 games.

Prohm was a celebrated hire from Murray State in 2015 and went 97-95 in six seasons with three NCAA Tournament appearances.

ACC to allow transfers within conference to play

GREENSBORO, N.C. — The Atlantic Coast Conference has eliminated its rule requiring athletes to sit out a season if they transfer within the league.

The move is the latest across college sports to loosen restrictions on transferring athletes so they can switch schools and play right away. The NCAA is moving toward making the so-called one-time exception available for all athletes.

Dallas Seavey wins fifth Iditarod title

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — Dallas Seavey on Monday won the pandemic-shortened Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, matching the most wins ever by a musher.

It's the fifth title for the 34-year-old Seavey. He matches the five-win threshold that only one other musher has accomplished. Rick Swenson won his five titles between 1977 and 1991.

Brees joins NBC Sports after retiring from NFL

NEW YORK — Drew Brees is headed from the Superdome to the Golden Dome.

The quarterback great joined NBC Sports on Monday, a day after announcing his retirement from the NFL. He will serve as an analyst for Notre Dame games as well as work from the studio during "Football Night in America" on Sunday nights.

Brees will also be a part of NBC's coverage of next year's Super Bowl.


