School district COVID update

As of Sept. 15, the Citrus County School District has reported 1,281 positive COVID-19 cases since the first day of school, Aug. 10.

In August, the district reported 846 total cases with 435 so far in September. Of the total cases, 109 have been employees and 1,172 have been students.

So far, Crystal River High School has experienced the most positive cases, with a total of 134 among staff and students.

The district has also been reporting the number of quarantined students and staff per day. The highest number of quarantines were reported Aug. 25 with a total of 1,806. The lowest was reported on Aug. 10 with a total of 219.

Most recently, a total of 12 positive cases of COVID-19 were reported on Sept. 15 with 262 students and staff in quarantine.

Officials back ending tests

Board members, superintendent say current system not useful for teachers

On Sept. 14, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced a legislative proposal to eliminate the Florida Statewide Assessment (FSA) and replace it with the Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST).

So far, Citrus County School District administration and board members seem to agree with the proposal.

According to a news release from DeSantis' staff, FAST would make Florida the first state to implement progress monitoring, rather than standardized testing. The progress monitoring approach is designed for teachers to help students improve in real time with three individualized assessments per year.

Citrus County School District Superintendent Sandra "Sam" Himmel shared her response with

the Chronicle.

"We thank Gov. DeSantis for his bold vision in eliminating the last traces of Common Core. We've always known that a single summative test score, like FSA, should never carry so much weight.

"Our schools struggle with utilizing the data to drive instruction when they are only administered at the

Secretary says agency 'working hard' to resolve Halls River problems

For weeks, residents who live near the Halls River in Homosassa have complained of the degradation of the water a faulty due to

stormwater drainage pool nearby.

State agency representatives have visited the area to view the situation and have promised remedial efforts will soon take place.

Now, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) District Seven Secretary David Gwynn is urging patience.

Gwynn, in an email to county commissioners and residents, said his agency is "truly working hard to resolve this

issue." "We will continue to monitor and improve our erosion control measures and we hope to have a completion contractor on board

very soon," he wrote. John Powanda, Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) compliance

engineer, said the faulty pool was only 50% completed during the nowstalled U.S. 19 widening project and there were no erosion or soil stabilization measures in place.

Crystal River Council approves city, CRA budgets

Millage rate rises

After going through a lot of number crunching and public scrutiny, Crystal River has its al-

lowance to spend for next year. City Council members voted 5-0 the evening of Wednesday, Sept. 15, to approve a higher property tax rate, along with the city's two

budgets for the 2021-22 fiscal year. Council's votes established a millage rate of 6.59 to help fund the city's \$6,887,513 general fund and its Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) District's

\$5,328,308 budget. For more on the budgets, visit

tinyurl.com/5bfhdmmn. City officials, who've workshopped the city's latest finances for months, said the millage rate increase from 4.8 mills was necessary to cover costlier expenses.

'It solves structural issues in the budget that's been discussed for almost a year at this point," City Manager Ken Frink said Wednesday. "This is a very transparent and balanced budget that addresses significant financial issues.'

A few city residents were in the audience Wednesday to either question or criticize council on its decisions to raise their property

"I wish more people were here," David A. Matthews said. "I got big problems with this budget. ... It's frankly outrageous, it's outrageous. ... What's going on here?'

Council in July announced a tentative millage rate of 6.9 mills, with hopes the city's finance department could lower it before Wednesday.

"We were living on borrowed time ... on that millage rate," Mayor Joe Meek said. "We're still an affordable place to live, and this also moves us forward. ... Long-term, I feel it's a fiscally responsible budget, and it's the right thing to do.'

Council also had to make sure Crystal River's general fund could pay for the \$151,271 in city staff wages moved over from the CRA budget.

Staff wages had been moved under the CRA a number of years ago, which kept the city's millage rate low but drained its reserves as the CRA took on more expenses and debt.

"Putting salaries in the CRA was an obvious choice at the time but it had gone too far," Frink said, noting the wage reallocation would also free up \$350,000 for the CRA

to fund projects downtown. Frink said the new millage rate would also be enough to allocate \$400,000 toward capital projects outside of the CRA, like road re-

surfacing and flooding controls. However, the funding toward city projects would decrease \$100,000 annually to help offset the yearly increase of wages for city employees, until it's depleted

in 2026. To be fair to every city worker, Crvstal River is budgeting to give each of its employees an annual \$1-per-hour raise.

City resident Gail Kostelnick asked council to keep exploring ways to lower future millage rates as housing developments continue to build, strengthening the city's tax collections.

Council members said the city will look for those opportunities.

"This is a conservatively fiscal panel; we're all careful with your money, and we're good stewards of your money," Councilman Ken Brown said. "Hopefully, things

'New' Van Gogh drawing to go on display

AMSTERDAM — A drawing newly attributed to Vincent van Gogh that has never been displayed publicly before is going on show at the Amsterdam museum that bears the Dutch master's name.

The "new" Van Gogh, "Study for 'Worn Out," from November 1882, is part of a Dutch private collection and was known to only a handful of people, including a few from the Van Gogh Museum.

The owner, who is remaining anonymous, asked the museum to determine if the unsigned drawing is by Van Gogh.

From the style, to the materials used — a thick carpenter's pencil and coarse watercolor paper — it conforms to Van Gogh's Hague drawings, Senior Researcher Teio Meedendorp said Thursday.

There are even traces of damage on the back linking it to the way Van Gogh used wads of starch to attach sheets of paper to drawing boards.

"It's quite rare for a new work to be attributed to Van Gogh," the museum's director Emilie Gordenker said in a statement. "We're proud to be able to share this early drawing and its story with our visitors."

It comes from a time in the artist's career when he was working to improve his skills as a painter of people and portraits by drawing them. Over and over again.

The museum already owns the almost identical drawing, "Worn Out."

"It was quite clear that they are related," Meedendorp said. The study has been loaned to

Despite late blip, stocks end lower

Another day of choppy trading on Wall Street left stocks mostly lower, cutting into the major indexes' gains for the week.

The S&P 500 and the Dow Jones Industrial Average each lost about 0.2%, while the tech-heavy Nasdag managed to eke out a gain of 0.1%. More stocks fell than rose in the S&P 500, and most of the benchmark index's sectors took slight losses.

The market had edged higher in the early going after a surprisingly good retail sales report for August, but then quickly turned lower and remained there for much of the day. By late afternoon, major indexes had clawed back the ground they lost earlier and turned slightly higher, only to shed some of those gains in the final minutes of trading.

Markets have been choppy as investors shift money between various sectors while they parse any data coming out that

signals on the potential direction of the economy and how the Federal Reserve will react.

The central bank will meet next week, and investors will listen closely for any comments about when and how much it will taper support for low interest rates that have helped fuel gains for stocks throughout the

"What you're seeing over the last month has been hesitation to really commit," said J.J. Kinahan, chief strategist with TD Ameritrade. "Until we have more clarity from the Fed, the pattern will continue.'

The S&P 500 fell 6.95 points to 4,473.75. The index remains within 1.4% of the all-time high it set on Sept. 2. The Dow dropped 63.07 points to 34,751.32, while the Nasdag added 20.39 points to 15,181.92.

Small company stocks also gave up some ground. The Russell 2000 index

could give more clues and slipped 1.54 points, or 0.1%, to 2,232.91.

Investors were given another mixed bag of economic data to review as they try to gauge the economic recovery's path ahead amid the virus pandemic, inflation and other factors.

The Commerce Department reported that retail sales rose 0.7% last month. Economists had expected a 0.85% contraction over concerns that people would have pulled back on spending as the highly contagious delta variant of COVID-19 prompts consumers to pull back on shopping.

Consumers simply shifted spending to more online purchases and away from businesses that are still struggling to recover from the pandemic, including restaurants and other business that rely on in-person spending.

Wall Street also weighed a disappointing report showing that weekly unemployment claims rose more than expected.

MassMutual fined for failing to monitor GameStop saga star

NEW YORK - Massachusetts regulators are fining MassMutual \$4 million and ordering it to overhaul its social-media policies after accusing the company of failing to supervise an employee whose online cheerleading of GameStop's stock helped launch the frenzy that shook Wall Street earlier this year.

The settlement announced Thursday by Secretary of the Commonwealth William Galvin centers on the actions of Keith Gill, who was an employee at a MassMutual subsidiary from April 2019 until January 2021. His tenure ended as GameStop's stock price suddenly soared nearly 800% in a week, as hordes of smaller-pocketed and novice investors piled in, to the shock and awe of professionals.

Gill's job at MassMutual was to create educational materials for current and potential customers, but regulators say he was also posting more than 250 hours of videos on YouTube and sending at least 590 Tweets about investing and GameStop through accounts that were unaffiliated with the company.

Massachusetts regulators cited those messages while alleging MassMutual failed to monitor the social-media accounts of Gill and other employees who were registered as broker-dealer agents in the state, and therefore subject to certain supervision requirements. The MassMutual unit where Gill worked prohibits broker-dealer agents from discussing generic securities on social media.

In his online messages, Gill would often talk about why he owned and was optimistic about GameStop's stock, even though it had been struggling for years. He used the nicknames "Roaring Kitty" and "DeepValue," with an expletive in the middle of the latter one, and he amassed tens of thousands of followers. He also posted regular updates

on Reddit about his GameStop holdings, which ballooned into the tens of millions of dollars.

Ford adding 450 jobs to meet demand for new electric truck

DEARBORN, Mich. - Ford Motor Co. plans to spend \$250 million and add 450 jobs at three Michigan plants to meet demand for the new F-150 Lightning.

Ford already has taken more than 150,000 reservations for the new electric version of its immensely popular F-150 pickup truck, Kumar Galhotra, Ford's president of the Americas, said during a news event Thursday.

"As the orders have been coming in, as the reservations have been coming in, it was iust time for us to (increase) the capacity to meet that demand," he said.

Galhotra made nouncement at the new Rouge Electric Vehicle Center

in the automaker's hometown of Dearborn, where the first pre-production trucks are being made.

Ford provided tours of the Rouge Electric Vehicle Center to members of the media as well as government officials, including Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, who said the facility "will be a place where the future is determined and built by the hard-working men and women of the UAW."

Ford officials hope the F-150 Lightning will be the catalyst that hastens America's transition from gasoline to battery-powered vehicles. The new truck, which will be available to customers by next spring, will be able to travel up to 300 miles per battery charge and carries a starting price of around \$40,000.

Ford's \$250 million investment will create 450 hourly direct jobs, with most of those workers assembling the F-150 Lightning at the Rouge Electric Vehicle Center.

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

Springs protection begins with each of us

any communities are built around their most distinctive feature.

The community of Homosassa Springs is not only built around, but also named after its most impressive natural wonder. For thousands of years, the Homosassa main spring has allured humans and wildlife alike. Florida's earliest people camped near the spring's banks while thousands of fish swirled through the steady flow of glistening fresh water. Today, visitors from around the world come to those very spring banks to view the dazzling water and wildlife found in and around this massive spring.

The water bubbling out of Homosassa's springs, including the main spring's 40-foot basin, arrives from the Floridan aquifer deep beneath our feet. This underground river flows with water that percolated down into the grounds of nearby farms, forests and residential communities. This area of land, called the Homosassa springshed, spans about 270 square miles across Citrus and Hernando counties and is the source for the water that emerges from Homosassa's springs. The above-ground activities in the springshed directly impact, either positively or negatively, the quality and quantity of water exiting the springs.

Does that mean that someone living on the other side of Citrus County can impact what comes out of the springs in Homosassa?

The answer is yes. "What goes on the ground must go down," says Ranger Kate! Heavy pesticide use, unauthorized landfills, leaking storage tanks and chemical spills can cause groundwater contamination with the effects felt far past 50 years. That's quite a few State Park.

COVID-19 overload forcing rationing in parts of West

BOISE, Idaho — In another ominous sign about the spread of the delta variant, Idaho public health leaders on Thursday expanded health care rationing statewide and individual hospital systems in Alaska and Montana have enacted similar crisis standards amid a spike in the number of unvaccinated COVID-19 patients requiring hospitalization.

The decisions marked an escalation of the pandemic in several Western states struggling to convince skeptical people to get vaccinated.

Idaho is one of the least vaccinated U.S. states, with only about 40% of its residents fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

Study: Childhood obesity in U.S. accelerated during pandemic

NEW YORK — A new study ties the COVID-19 pandemic to an "alarming" increase in obesity in U.S. children and teenagers.

Childhood obesity has been increasing for decades, but the new work suggests an acceleration last year especially in those who already were obese when the pandemic started.

The results signal a "profound increase in weight gain for kids" and are "substantial and alarming," said one of the study's authors, Dr. Alyson Goodman of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

It's also a sign of a vicious cycle. The pandemic appears to be worsening the nation's longstanding obesity epidemic, and obesity can put people at risk for more severe illness after coronavirus infection.

The CDC on Thursday released the study, which is the largest yet to look at obesity trends during the pandemic. It found:

■ An estimated 22% of children and teens were obese last August, up from 19% a year earlier.

■ Before the pandemic, children who were a healthy weight were gaining an average of 3.4 pounds a year. That rose to 5.4 pounds during the pandemic.

■ For kids who were moderately obese, expected weight gain rose from 6.5 pounds a year before the pandemic to 12 pounds after the pandemic began.

■ For severely obese kids, expected annual weight gain went from 8.8 pounds to 14.6 pounds.

The rate of obesity increased most dramatically in kids ages 6 to 11, who are more dependent on their parents and may have been more affected when schools suspended in-person classes, the researchers said.

The research was based on a review of the medical records of more than 432,000 kids and teens, ages of 2 to 19, who were weighed and measured at least twice before the pandemic and at least once early in the pandemic.

Court halts use of health order to expel migrant **families**

WASHINGTON — A federal judge ruled Thursday that the U.S. government must stop using a Trump-era public health order to quickly expel migrants with children who are apprehended along the U.S.-Mexico border.

U.S. District Judge Emmet Sullivan gave the government two weeks to halt a practice that opponents say is unnecessary and improperly relies on the threat posed by COVID-19 to deprive people of their right to seek asylum in the United

Sullivan granted a preliminary injunction in response to a lawsuit filed by the American Civil Liberties Union and others on behalf of migrant families, saying they were likely to succeed in their challenge to the use of the public health law known as Title 42.

"President Biden should have ended this cruel and lawless policy long ago, and the court was correct to reject it today," said Omar Jadwat, director of the ACLU's Immigrants' Rights Project.

Minnesota high court OKs ballot question on Minneapolis PD

MINNEAPOLIS — The Minnesota Supreme Court cleared the way Thursday evening for voters in Minneapolis to decide on the future of policing in the city where George Floyd was killed, just ahead of the start of early and absentee voting.

The state's highest court overturned a lower court ruling that rejected ballot language approved by the City Council. A district judge said the wording failed to adequately describe the effects of a proposed charter amendment that would replace the Minneapolis Police Department with a new Department of Public Safety that "could include" police officers "if necessary."

But Chief Justice Lorie Gildea said in a three-page order that the justices concluded that the challenge to the ballot language did not meet the "high standard" that the court set in earlier cases. She said the court will issue a full opinion laying out its legal reasoning sometime later to avoid impeding the start of voting.

Lawyer: Arizona Senate's 2020 election review out next week

PHOENIX — An attorney representing the Republican-controlled Arizona Senate told a judge Thursday that the long-delayed review of 2020 election results in the state's most populous county will be released next week.

The results of the

so-called audit of President Joe Biden's win and their unprecedented review of Maricopa County's vote counts, elections procedures, voting machines and related computers will be made public on Sept. 24, attorney Kory Langhofer told the judge.

Langhofer was ordered to say when the final report would be ready by Maricopa **County Superior Court** Judge Michael Kemp at the conclusion of a hearing on a public records lawsuit related to the review. The Senate had fought to keep its records and those of its outside contractors secret, but Kemp ruled both the Senate's records and those of its outside contractors must be made public.

The Arizona Court of Appeals upheld the ruling on the contractors' records last month in a decision allowed to stand Tuesday by the Arizona Supreme Court.

German police detain teen after **Yom Kippur** synagogue threat

BERLIN — A 16-year-old boy was detained Thursday in connection with a possible plan for an Islamic extremist attack on a synagogue in the German city of Hagen, authorities said.

The detention took place on Yom Kippur, the holiest day in Judaism, and two years after a deadly attack in another German city on the Yom Kippur holiday.

Police cordoned off the synagogue on Wednesday and a worship service planned for the evening was called off.

Officials had received "very serious and concrete information" that there could be an attack on the synagogue during Yom Kippur, said Herbert Reul, the interior minister of North Rhine-Westphalia state, where Hagen is located. The tip pointed to "an Islamist-motivated threat situation." and named the possible timing and suspect,

New justice minister takes over as Haiti's instability grows


PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti - Haiti's new justice minister on Thursday pledged to find those responsible for high-profile killings as he spoke publicly for the first time since taking over from his predecessor fired by Prime Minister Ariel Henry, who recently dismissed officials seeking to interview him as part of the investigation into the president's slaying.

Malmberg lifts Lecanto at running back rather than QB

Luke Malmberg admitted to some nervousness coming into the season. The Lecanto senior expected he'd have to take on the task of playing quarterback for the Panthers.

He used to be a quarterback, but when he reached the varsity level Lecanto already had the established Ryan Rogers under center. So he shifted to running back, and the Panthers ultimately decided this season that he should stay there.

"He's a hard runner, a good leader, has a good attitude. He's just a good kid," Lecanto head coach Wyndell "Chop" Alexander said. "We wanted him to be the quarterback but felt it was better for us to put him at running back and have him pound the ball. Dunnellon is led by senior Trent Townsend under center, and while he has only thrown for 139 yards and a touchdown, in a four-year varsity career he has totaled 3,988 yards and 40 touchdowns passes against just 13 interceptions.

"They have outstanding team speed on both sides of the ball," Lohrey said. "They have multiple weapons who can get the ball in their hands and do damage with the ball. They have a near four-year starter at quarterback who has total command of the offense.

"Defensively, they run to the

THIS DATE IN BASEBALL

1912 — Brooklyn's Casey Stengel makes his major league debut against the Pittsburgh Pirates, finishing with four singles, two RBIs and two steals in a 7-3 win.

1920 — Bobby Veach of the Detroit Tigers hit for the cycle in a 14-13 12-inning win over the Boston Red Sox at Navin Field. Veach had six hits, achieving the cycle with a double in the ninth.

1968 — Gaylord Perry of the San Francisco Giants pitched a no-hitter, a 1-0 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals and Bob Gibson. Ron Hunt homered for the only run.

1984 — Reggie Jackson became the 13th player to hit 500 home runs. The milestone shot came off Kansas City pitcher Bud Black. His homer came exactly 17 years after his first career hit.

1984 — Rookie pitcher Dwight Gooden of the New York Mets struck out 16 Phillies in a 2-1 loss at Philadelphia. Five days earlier, Gooden fanned 16 Pittsburgh Pirates tying a major league record for 32 strikeouts in two consecutive games.

West led the spade ace and shifted to a club.


