

SAFETY FIRST

New MFD Station No. 3 to serve community for decades to come

In the summer of 2025, the Morristown Fire Department finished a serious upgrade to its arsenal on the east end of the city; the new Station 3 and training facility on Thompson Creek road near Frank Lorino Park was handed over to the fire department and is fully operational.

The improved location was necessary after highway expansion plans were announced near the original Station 3; the new location improves capability, maintains access to important corridors and won't be impacted for the time it will take to construct the new highway expansion.

The large, 12 acre lot also houses a state-of-the-art training facility that can accommodate special requirements needed to maintain the MFD's various high-level certifications.

"This station is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the firefighters who serve our community, and it's a symbol of our commitment to their safety and well-being," Sonja Shannon, the station's architect said. "The advanced systems and tech-



nology incorporated into this station are in contrast to the exterior, which serves as a reminder of the department's history. It's important to this department not to forget."

One of the first design

decisions incorporated was a tower to house the original fire bell from 1893. Another early decision was the dedication of the training facility and classroom to the memory of Deputy Chief Tim Green, photo-

graphs and memorabilia throughout the station are additional reminders of the importance of that history."

The City worked in co-ordination with Shannon to design and build the 9,755 square foot facility. The

station includes full living quarters with 4 bunk rooms, three engine bays, and study areas.

The City worked with East Tennessee Turf and Landscape, engineering firm Mattern & Craig, and General Contractor McSpadden Inc. to complete the project.

Morristown Mayor Gary Chesney spoke about the realities of what being a firefighter means and the kind of training it now takes to maintain a well-trained, modern fire department.

"Keeping the public safe from dangers, both real and potential disasters, in this day and time, requires what's often considered college-level training and study," he said. "That means identifying hazardous materials in an industrial fire, being prepared to protect innocents from possible tragic consequences, recognizing what a person in the midst of a medical emergency requires just to stay alive until a higher level of help is at hand... And I think we'll all agree that a bigger portion of time now is with educating and teaching the public about the value of fire prevention and fire safety."

The new station and training facility allows for all of those things.

The comprehensive fire training center includes a large training classroom that can double as an Emergency Operations Center and a fire training tower from Fire Training Structures, LLC. The tower contains a burn room, a reconfigurable maze, and a repelling wall, all of which allow firefighters across the region to get hands-on training.

"The main thing is our guys have a place to come in here," Battalion Chief

Keith Rouse said. "We have 192 hours of company training that we have to meet every year.

That's not counting our 18 hours of facility training or medical training or hazmat training. This is just fire-related training, so we're in this classroom a lot.

"We also host rookie school in the spring and fall with the Northeast Regional Training Fire Association. We have those guys for three weeks out of the 13 weeks. They're going to be in this classroom or on this training campus. So it's important to have a very nice facility, something for 20 years down the road."

Not many communities of Morristown's size exhibit the commitment to training and certifications that have been a hallmark of the MFD in recent years.

That commitment means the heavy industrial base of the city and the surrounding community can rest easy that the unexpected can be handled.

"The inclusion of the training tower and classroom space in this project exhibit the Mayor and City Council's commitment to the continuous training and development of our Fire Department personnel – and to the general safety of the community," City Administrator Andrew Ellard said.

Rouse and other officials fondly remembered and referenced Deputy Chief Tim Green for whom the center is named in memorium.

"When you walk in the breezeway, the first thing you're going to see is Tim Green's picture, his plaque honoring him, Rouse said. "He was a training officer here for several years, and he promoted up to deputy chief. And we thought that was very important to put this whole training ground in the memory of Tim. And you're going to see a beautiful tribute in there for him. We're going to have a tree here as well for him. In time, it's going to be up here at the front. You all will see it."

Green's family was present for the opening.

Now retired Fire Chief Clark Taylor said he was proud to have overseen and been a part of the group that has brought important projects like the training facility and recent hazmat certification into fruition.

"I'm extremely proud of the outcome and what this station, state-of-the-art classroom and training facility has transformed into," he said. "This station and training campus will serve this city for generations of firefighters to come."

Healthstar Physicians medical offices to open in Spring of 2027

Healthstar Physicians, P.C. is building a new medical office building at the corner of Merchants Greene and Veterans Parkway in the rapidly growing area on the west end of Morristown.

Surrounded by newly constructed healthcare facilities, retail, restaurants and hotels, the 79,166-square-foot facility offers a convenient location and will bring several of Healthstar's existing specialties together in a modern, patient-focused environment.

The new facility will feature Family Practice, Internal Medicine, Pediatrics, Endocrinology, Orthopedics, Physical Medicine, and Podiatry, along with Laboratory and Imaging services, administrative offices, and shell space for future expansion.

The project strengthens Healthstar's presence in Morristown and

demonstrates its ongoing commitment to providing high-quality, accessible healthcare across the region.

"This facility reflects our investment in Morristown and our mission to deliver comprehensive, patient-centered care close to home," said Mickey Brabson, CEO of Healthstar Physicians, P.C.

Healthstar, in partnership with Realty Trust Group, began planning in February 2024 and launched construction in October 2025.

The project is expected to be completed in spring 2027.

RTG is serving as master developer, project manager, and property manager. Project partners include Earl Swensson Associates as architect, The Christian Company as general contractor, First Horizon Bank as lender, and Land Development Solu-

tions for site work.

The master site also includes additional building pads for future complementary medical development adjacent to the Healthstar facility.

Charging Up: MU opens fast chargers at Exit 8 Weigel's

Drivers living, working, or traveling along Interstate 81 and US Highway 25E near Morristown now have a new, convenient option for charging their electric vehicles. Fast chargers are available at the newly installed site at Weigel's Travel Center off Exit 8.

Morristown Utilities hosted a ribbon-cutting event at the charging station on May 7, celebrating its partnership with the Tennessee Valley Authority, Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation, and Seven States Power Corporation.

This site is officially part of the TVA/TDEC Fast Charge Network, which aims to upgrade major travel corridors across TVA's seven-state region.

It's part of the even broader initiative of the National Electric Highway Coalition, aiming to enable long distance EV travel by placing fast

chargers along interstates and major highways throughout the United States.

The Fast Charge Network is attempting to place charging stations at practical intervals along the corridors across Tennessee and TVA Customer Relations Manager Chris Quillen said progress in the region is going well.

"This is the 53rd site in the Fast Charge Network," he said. The idea behind the Fast Charge Network is that wherever you're at in the Tennessee Valley, you're no more than 50 miles from a fast charger.

"One of the barriers, or hindrances, to people adopting electric vehicles is charging infrastructure. We've got gas stations all over, but we're just now starting to see these (fast chargers) pop up. We're at Strawberry Plains. There's one at Exit 30. There's one at the Pinnacle

up in Bristol. There's one downtown Johnson City. And we're working on one in Mountain City. So we'll have all the interstates and all the primary and secondary state routes covered with just a few more charging stations."

The site is unique in the region with four pull-through charging stalls utilizing the popular ChargePoint network allowing customers to use the app, credit card, or phone wallet to pay.

Seven States confirms the site recharges electric vehicles at speeds up to 350kW providing 17 miles of driving per minute of charging.

"The Seven States team is committed to relieving the anxiety some drivers have about electric vehicles due to the scarcity of charging stations along their route," said Betsey Kirk McCall, president & CEO of Seven States Power Corporation.

MAHLE's \$10 million expansion bringing 50 new jobs

In the summer of 2025, foundational member of Morristown's industrial base announced an expansion in a move that comes with a \$10 million investment and nearly 50 new jobs.

Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee, Department of Economic and Community Development Commissioner Stuart C. McWhorter and MAHLE GmbH officials made the announcement in a joint statement.

"Tennessee is leading the nation in attracting leading global brands like MAHLE thanks to our pro-business climate and highly skilled workforce. These nearly 50 new jobs will create greater opportunity for families in Hamblen County, and I'm grateful to MAHLE for its continued investment in our state," said Lee.

The company's continued investment will allow MAHLE to start production of electric compressors used on fuel-cell electric vehicles, plug-in hybrid vehicles and full electric vehicles.

"Starting the e-compressor production in Morristown, Tennessee, marks an important milestone for MAHLE as we further strengthen our footprint in the USA and our role as local employer. This extension is a great example of successfully transforming a production plant formerly fully dedicated to internal combustion engines by launching electrification products for future mobility – a clear investment in the plant's future," said Arnd Franz, Chairman of the Group Management Board and CEO, MAHLE.

The chairman of the Industrial Development Board of the City of Morristown, R. Jack Fishman played a lead role in originally bringing MAHLE to Morristown in the 1970s. He said he's thrilled to see another MAHLE expansion.



Morristown Experimental Aviation Association Chapter 1494 breaks ground on a new facility

Big things are happening for the Morristown Experimental Aviation Association Chapter 1494, broke ground on a new facility in June and things are looking up.

The new Aviation Learning Center is going to be a facility that will be an upgraded permanent facility for the EAA chapter, house workshops and support youth aviation education by providing STEM based learning opportunities.

"We'll be able to bring all of our aviation and STEM-related activities under one roof in this building," Chapter President Karen Hughes Collins said. "There'll be an 80-by-80 hanger and then a 30-by-70 condition space with a nice front porch. We are looking forward to having that space and being able to expand our workshops and bring our airplane build over to our own space."

Work has started on the facility and is moving quickly that will gather all of the chapter's activities under one roof.

The construction machinery wound down for a moment so chapter leaders and local officials could give remarks at the Morristown-Area-Chamber-of-Commerce-organized event.

Morristown Mayor said that when he talks about Morristown, he's got a list of things he brags about.

"At the very top of that list, Morristown Municipal Airport is right up there with the best things to brag about," he said. "We also have a unique program that goes a

long way in promoting future interest in flying with young folks. This (EAA) program introduces young people to fly and not only do you teach them how to fly small aircraft, they also teach them how to build it. The recently held Young Eagles program that was here a couple of weeks ago—it taught first-timers or showed them how to fly, got a lot of them off the ground for the first time."

The mayor praised Hughes Collins as a driving force behind the chapter and a positive influence in aeronautic community in Morristown.

"The motivational force behind all of this is Karen Hughes Collins," he said. "She recently became the President of the Tennessee Aviation Association. So she's serious about that work and has helped motivate and fuel the drive to where we are for this program."

Hughes Collins, in her remarks, described Chapter 1494 and their dedication to promote aviation in the community.

"We're a local chapter of a national organization, and we were founded about 10 years ago," she said. "Our home has always been Morristown. There are a number of the founding members that are still active with the chapter—there were about seven, I think, who helped found it. So that's pretty cool that they're still active."

She described the chapter's passion for developing the next generation of pilots and enthusiasts.

"I think we provide an overabun-

dance of enthusiasm about our airport, aviation of all flavors, and other STEM-related topics — what does that look like on any given day?" Hughes Collins asked rhetorically. "Well, today it looks like this: it looks like inviting pilots and the local community to the airport breakfast every month. It looks like building the airplane that we talked about. It looks like free Young Eagle flights. It looks like private pilot ground schools and aviation day camps and workshops, flight scholarships, airport tours. It looks like going out to schools and talking to all different grades of classes. So it looks like a lot of different things."

She thanked supporters of the airport and the EAA and mentioned Howmet Aerospace and a recent, large donation.

"Howmet just helped fund our workshops and our day camps with a \$25,000 grant," she said. "So we are very grateful for that."

Board Member Nelson Collins recognized R. Jack Fishman, chairman of the Morristown Industrial Development Board and longtime supporter of local aviation.

"Thank you, Mr. Jack Fishman," he said. "We appreciate you so much. And this guy loves this city over all of his life. And I love this city, Jack—and I love you, my friend."

Collins described the support from club members and others who raised funds by doing things like "folks that donated the sale of a plane."

Summertown Metals expanding Hamblen County facility

Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee, Department of Economic and Community Development Commissioner Stuart C. McWhorter and Summertown Metals officials announced in the Summer of 2025 the company will expand for the first time outside of Southern Middle Tennessee, locating additional distribution and manufacturing operations in Morristown.

Summertown Metals is in the process of investing \$22.6 million and will create 170 new jobs in Hamblen County through the project.

Upon completion, the company will employ nearly 600 people across its facilities in Summertown, Hohenwald and Morristown.

"Tennessee is shaped by brands like Summertown Metals that call the Volunteer State home, and as companies continue to upskill and automate, Tennessee

seans will be the ideal workforce to fill these new positions," said Gov. Bill Lee. "I thank Summertown Metals for their continued investment in our state and look forward to the opportunity these new jobs create across East Tennessee."

The company is adding to its new facility on property in the Lowland area, near Exit 12. The property is at the former site of the Enka ballfield.

Established in 1947, the American Enka Company, a rayon fiber producer, operated a 230-acre site until 1985 when it was acquired by BASF. Lenzing AG purchased the plant in 1992, then a company purchased and renamed it Liberty Fibers in 2002.

In 2005, the plant was closed. The former industrial site and its adjacent wastewater treatment plant have since been annexed into the City of Morristown.

Masengill Landing adds housing options in the heart of Morristown

In a city starving for housing options, a bunch of opportunities are available in the Masengill Landing development between W. Economy Road and Walters Drive,

The unique nature of the development has attracted attention from other communities that have visited to study the steel framing and potential positive impacts.

Round and Round: City addresses problematic intersection with roundabout

The job didn't take nearly as long as expected.

When the city of Morristown announced the construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Cherokee and Walters Drive to begin on December 1, it was estimated the work would take up to three months.

Due to favorable weather conditions, it only took about six weeks.

The construction of the roundabout is a local project approved by the Morristown City Council, with no grant sources.

The project began with a discussion among council members during a work session held in August 2023.

The intent by the city, as indicated by Jason Elliott with LDA Engineering during a presentation at the work session, was to preclude, or rule out, the need for a traffic signal at the high-traffic intersection.

The project had been estimated at the time to cost \$850,000.

It was included in the city's 2026 budget as a capital project under

construction at the same amount.

According to City Administrator Andrew Ellard, council approved the construction contract with Summers-Taylor at \$720,885 at the May 6, 2025 meeting.

"We were pleased that stayed well below that original estimate," he said.

City council approved a contract for the purchase of property for additional right-of-way and easement necessary for the construction of the roundabout for \$25,000.

Only two properties involved ROW acquisition according to Ellard:

"One to the southwest of the intersection was a construction easement, and the only real ROW purchase was to the southeast of the intersection for a portion of the property," he said.

During its Oct. 21 meeting, with the start of the construction in sight, council approved an agreement for inspection services for the project with LDA Engineering.

Inspection includes overall supervision of the

project and materials testing during installation. Utility relocation was conducted at the time. The total cost of engineering, design and inspection services is \$159,000.

The construction, ROW purchases and engineering, design and inspection bring the project total to \$904,885.

The roundabout is 110' in the inscribed circle, a size that is smaller than some single lane options that can range in size to 140' feet in diameter.

"We looked at a few different configurations for this one and this is the best option. This one is on the smaller size to lessen the impact on the surrounding properties," Elliott said at the 2023 work session.

Regardless of size, the roundabout now provides room for emergency services and other non-traditional vehicles.

There is a truck apron along with mountable curbs that enable fire trucks and other larger trucks' rear wheels to roll over them, rather than abrupt curbing.
