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INTRODUCTION | From the Editor

elcome to the 2019 annual edition of *Destination Weddings*—Columbia River Gorge.

It's no wonder the Gorge is a premier wedding location,

with its stunning backdrops of the Columbia River, the Gorge and the Cascade Mountains. Along with all the natural beauty comes an outdoor recreation mecca; a variety of unique and friendly small towns; a farm-to-table foodie scene; a wine region boasting more than three dozen wineries and tasting rooms and some 80 vineyards; a dozen craft breweries; and a serious contingent of cideries and distilleries. In this issue, we feature real weddings at a variety of venues around the Gorge. We've included weddings in the heart of the Hood River Valley — at Mount Hood Bed & Breakfast and Mt. View Orchards — and at the farther flung locales of Timberline Lodge and The Balch Hotel in Dufur. We've also included a wedding from one of the many beautiful venues on the Washington side of the Gorge, the Tin Roof Barn in the White Salmon River Valley.

You'll find helpful Q&As with two Gorge wedding vendors: Lucy Gorman, of Lucy's Informal Flowers, who has been creating floral arrangements for weddings in the Gorge for more than 25 years; and photographer Michael Peterson, who has been photographing weddings for 14 years. These talented professionals are just two examples of the many vendors working their magic in the Gorge wedding sphere. 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LUCY'S INFORMAL FLOWERS

Lucy Gorman is owner and designer at Lucy's Informal Flowers in Hood River. She has been designing floral arrangements for weddings in the Gorge for 25 years.

Q: Where do I start?

A: Couples should determine their budget for flowers, or at least have some sort of idea. Most floral budgets are about 8 to 10 percent of the overall wedding budget. I get asked all the time for prices, and I tell couples that it can depend on so much. For example, simple dai-

sies are a lot less than garden roses or peonies.

Q: What are the current floral styles and trends?

A: Wine barrel toppers.



They're used at the end of the aisle and where an altar might be. Using these do not block the

view of the mountain! We're also doing a lot of arbors, but fuller and covered with garlands and flowers — a big statement. We do a lot of macramé backdrops on arbors and flower hoops, which

are repurposed to hang behind the bride and groom at their dinner table. Also, garlands and more garlands . . . everywhere.

Q: What are the current color trends?

A: Cream, blush, gray with navy — and lots of greens. More muted tones of pinks and peach, hints of mustard and lavender. It's an overall soft palette. Weddings after Labor Day are almost always done in fall colors — gold, terra cotta, wine and plum.

Q: Can you create arrangements with locally grown flowers?

A: We're big into using locally grown flowers. We source from many flower and foliage growers throughout the Gorge and the Pacific Northwest. I try and use 100-percent American-grown flowers.

Q: What are some do's and lon'ts?

A: Never assume that the photos you find on Pinterest are what you're going to get. When I get photos sent to me, I have to analyze them and determine what it is about them that inspired the couple. Do send them for the sole purpose of inspiration. Also, don't be afraid to ask questions.
















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Callie Reed & Todd Shypertt MARRIED ON JULY 28, 2018

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


Why they got married in the Gorge

Advice for other couples: Make sure the vendors you hire are reliable and trustworthy — it will make your special day much more worry-free. "We used Trello and it really helped us stay on top of where we were in the planning process and prioritize outstanding needs."





Q: What should I look for in a wedding photographer?

A: It's important to select a photographer that is experienced with weddings and it is equally important to pick one whose company you enjoy. This very special day can be stressful at times. A good wedding photographer will help you through the day, offering

advice when needed and help keep everything on schedule.

Q: How do you describe your style of photography?

A: When is comes to style



we really try to give the couple what they want. Some couples have a lot of special people in at-

tendance so we will shoot more portraiture. Some couples would prefer us to be flies on the wall so we will shoot more photojournalistic. One thing

we try never to be is trendy. We very quickly and make it a fun believe these photos are family heirlooms and should still look great in 50 years.

Q: What important advice do you give to couples?

A: Be sure to communicate with your photographer what you would like from the photos. It is your wedding and we want to make sure your photos are the best for you. Also, we always request a list of "formal portraits" well before the wedding date. These are the posed group shots and can eat up a lot of time. If we have a list, we can move through the photos

part of wedding day.

Q: How long after my wedding will it take to get the images?

A: Depending on the size of the wedding, it takes about 3 to 6 weeks to get the photos back to the couple. We look at every single photo and make it print-ready. There is no way to rush that.


Q: What's your favorite part of photographing weddings?

A: I've tasted some of the most wonderful cakes.









WEDDING CHECKLIST

16 TO 9 MONTHS

- ☐ Think about the type of wedding you want. Formal or informal? Big or small?
- ☐ Decide what time of year you want your wedding to take place. Summer weddings are popular in the Columbia Gorge, but spring and fall are equally beautiful, and there are plenty of venues perfect for winter weddings.
- \square Create a budget.
- ☐ Hire a planner. This is even more important if you're not from the area.
- ☐ Scout venues, if possible, and meet with vendors and/or your local wedding planner.
- ☐ Determine your wedding party.
- ☐ Settle on a head count.
- ☐ Choose a date. Remember, many venues in the Columbia Gorge get booked well in advance.

9 TO 6 MONTHS

- ☐ Purchase a dress. Custom gowns can take months to make, and even if you're buying off the rack, you'll typically need three fittings. When buying, think about how you'll transport the dress to your destination.
- ☐ Shop for the bridesmaids' dresses. Allow at least six months for the gowns to be ordered and sized.
- ☐ Book a photographer. Wedding photographers in the Columbia Gorge are in high demand, especially during the summer months. The farther ahead of time you book your photographer, the better.
- Book a block of hotel rooms or rent accommodations for your wedding party and guests.
- $\hfill \square$ Book your flight and accommodations.
- ☐ Hire a florist.
- \square Choose your menu and dessert.
- $\hfill \square$ Book the entertainment.
- \square Launch a wedding website that includes

- important links for guests (accommodations, activities in the area etc.).
- ☐ Make arrangements for pre- wedding events and activities.
- ☐ Create a gift registry.
- \square Send save-the-date cards.

6 TO 4 MONTHS

- ☐ Book the welcome party or rehearsal dinner venue.
- ☐ Arrange wedding day transportation for you and your guests.
- ☐ Plan and order favors.
- ☐ Arrange hairdressers and make-up artists.
- \square Choose songs.

3 TO 2 MONTHS

- ☐ Confirm details with all your vendors.
- ☐ Mail out invitations.
- \square Review the song list with your band or DJ.

ONE MONTH

- ☐ Get your marriage license.
- ☐ Mail the welcome party or rehearsal dinner invitations.
- ☐ Purchase gifts for your bridesmaids.
- ☐ Assemble welcome bags and prepare welcome letter.
- ☐ Write your vows.
- ☐ Confirm details of your ceremony.
- ☐ Create a seating chart.
- ☐ Enter RSVPs into the guest-list database.
- ☐ Confirm flight and accommodations bookings.

WEEK OF WEDDING

- \square Delegate small wedding-day tasks.
- ☐ Send a timeline to the bridal party.
- ☐ Book a spa treatment (manicure, pedicure, facial, spray tan) for the day before the wedding.
- ☐ Confirm final guest count.



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




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
