





The titles listed on pages 6-7 are just some of the Best Books of the Independent Northwest 2023 gift guide—for children, tweens, teens, and adults, fiction and nonfiction. If you don't find quite the perfect match you were hoping for, head down to one of our Gorge-area local bookstores and simply ask for a recommendation. Booksellers are a wealth of knowledge and rarely are they reticent to talk about books! If you're still having trouble deciding, gift certificates are available and equally welcome.

#### Children:

Millie Fleur's Poison Garden by Christy Mandin. Ages 4–8; \$18.99. Millie Fleur La Fae builds her new garden one strange plant at a time, reminding us all to embrace the things that make us wonderfully weird.

*In Praise of Mystery* by Ada Limón, illustrated by Peter Sís. Ages 4–8; \$18.99. From the U.S. Poet Laureate and a Caldecott Honoree, a transcendent picture book featuring the poem that will travel into space aboard NASA's Europa Clipper.

Simone by Viet Thanh Nguyen, illustrated by Minnie Phan. Ages 5–9; \$18.99. From the Pulitzer Prize-winning author comes an unforgettable story of a Vietnamese American girl whose life is transformed by wildlife.

All the Books by Hayley Rocco, illustrated by John Rocco. Ages 4–8; \$18.99. Join an adorable chipmunk as she gets her first library card and unlocks a world of books in this charming ode to reading, sharing, libraries, and librarians everywhere.

West Coast Wild ABC & West Coast Wild Baby Animals by Deborah Hodge, illustrated by Karen Reczuch. Ages 0–3; \$12.99 each. Babies and toddlers everywhere will delight in these two lovely companion books. In gorgeous watercolor scenes, West Coast Wild Baby Animals offers a sweet introduction to names and behaviors of wild babies and their parents, while West Coast Wild ABC showcases the beauty of the coastal landscape and the creatures who call it home.

The Mighty Red by Louise Erdrich. \$32.00. From the award-winning author, a stunning novel of love, natural forces, spiritual yearnings, and the tragic impact of uncontrollable circumstances on the lives of ordinary people.

#### Nonfiction:

300 Mason Jars: Preserving History by Joanne Thomson. \$34.95. The fragmented history of one family's hopes, challenges, failures, and persistence is beautifully depicted in watercolor images by artist Joanne Thomson. Combining still-life painting with visual storytelling, Thomson presents

everyday artifacts — from flowers to fruits, tools to toys, photographs to farm equipment — preserved in glass jars that explore gender roles, food security, renewal, hope, heirlooms, and family secrets.

Anyway, even if I'm not technically a senior, I do have seniors in my life (hi Mom, Dad and favorite Mother-in-law!). I want to emphasize, however, that this list isn't exclusively for seniors. I like to think it's ageless, really.

#### **Experiences**

Carson Hot Springs, 372 St. Martin's Springs Road, Carson, has a full-service spa. Which means you can give a soak in the hot springs or a massage. There's also an option of an overnight stay in one of their 28 rooms. They offer a variety of specials as well; visit carsonhotspringswashington.com/specials.

There's also Tenzen Springs, 932 Berge Road, Stevenson, which features six cabins on a 100-acre property. Each has a wraparound deck, queen size beds, small kitchenette, indoor steam sauna shower and a geothermal hot spring water soaking tub. Cabin reservations require a 2-day minimum and 7-day maximum. Massages: I don't know if you've noticed, but it's a stressful world out there. Again, there are many licensed massage therapists in the Gorge — send your recipient to any one of them for a self-care session.

Our local museums are still recovering from COVID-19 closures. Memberships help keep their doors open, and all have gift shops with unique merchandise you won't find anywhere else. When was the last time you visited? Here's your chance — and a list to get you started:

The Workshop in The Dalles has beautiful 1,000-piece puzzles by Lantern Press — of the Columbia River Gorge, Oregon and the Pacific Northwest (prices vary). You can also find great puzzles at both Waucoma and Klindts bookstores (Hood River and The Dalles, respectively).

Concert, theater, movie and art tickets: There are so many different music, theater, movie and art gallery options in the Gorge. Pick your favorite. Find an upcoming event. Purchase the necessary tickets. Then go have fun.

Professional portraits: There are many photography studios in the Gorge, as a quick internet search will tell you. Gift a photo package — let the recipient pick the date and time.

#### Consumables

One of my parents' favorite gifts to give comes from Muirhead Canning Co., 5267 Mill Creek Road, The Dalles — canned pears (halves), peaches (halves or slices) and cherries (light or dark sweet), though they also have plums, apricots and applesauce. Cans are sold in boxes of 12 and prices vary from \$54-\$80. Muirhead Canning Co. also offers a gift pack, \$46, that includes one can each — pears, peaches, cherries, apricots, plums and applesauce (and there's also apple butter and maple syrup). You can order online at muirheadcanning.com or call the office at 541-298-1660 Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

White Salmon Baking Co. in White Salmon has gorgeous treats — and a holiday menu that includes breads (like Rosemary Olive, \$7, and chocolate-hazelnut Babka, \$10), cookie boxes (\$22 for a box of 20), quiche (classic ham and gruyere or mixed vegetable, \$28) and cinnamon rolls (\$18). While it's closed Christmas Day, it is open Christmas Eve.

The Fruit Company, Hood River, has beautiful gift boxes

filled with everything from fruit to nuts, crackers to candy. You can stop by the packing house to pick something out in person (they have a truly lovely gift shop) at 2850 Van Horn Drive or place an order online at thefruitcompany.com. Prices vary.

Sigman's Flowers in downtown The Dalles has lots of offerings under this category: Pumpkin Spice Quick Bread or Chocolate Whoopie Pie mixes (\$11.99 each), lemon curd (\$9.50) and traditional scone mixes (\$8.50), as well as fresh flowers (always a hit) and Moonstruck chocolates (prices vary).

Waucoma Bookstore, downtown Hood River, has books, of course, but they also have Wavertree & London natural plant oil soaps enriched with pure shea butter. They come in a variety of scents — including Strawberry Shake, Cosmopolitan, White Orchid and French Pear — for \$9.99 each. These are identified as a staff favorite, so you know they're good.

Meraki Beauty PNW Salon and Boutique, downtown The Dalles, has scented lotions like cardamon-vanilla and apricot bloom for \$25. Also in downtown The Dalles, The Workshop has all sorts of jams (pictured above, \$10), barbecue sauces, hot sauces, salsas and teas.

Coffee cards: Give a gift card from one of the many cafés in town. Tie it to a bag of locally roasted beans and you are guaranteed a smashing success. Coffee shops also have tea options for those who are less coffee-minded.

#### Keep warm

Vibe in downtown The Dalles is a curated consignment shop with lots of jackets, sweaters and coats. Be warned, though, that if you go in there, you're also going to find something for yourself, too. Prices vary.

In Hood River, try Dream Street Boutique (women's fashion), Doug's (men's and women's fashion and outdoor gear), and the Ruddy Duck (men, women and kids) — all in downtown. Prices vary.

And in White Salmon, check out Blackbird + Ivory, 115 N Main St., suite 119, where you'll find a curated collection of women's clothing, including a growing line of ethically made, fairtrade and made in America products.







# Gifts Far Petr

Some may balk at excessively pampering your pets, but I'm all for it. I mean, dogs and cats are basically like children, right? They need nutritious food to thrive, benefit from enrichment activities and just look so cute in new clothes or booties. Spread some love to your furry friends by checking out Dog River Pet Supplies, located on the Heights at 118 12th St., and Gorge Dog in downtown Hood River at 412 Oak St.

If you're looking to feed your dog or cat better food, Dog River is the place to go. Owner Molly Lewis takes special care to avoid brands that use hormones, antibiotics and genetically modified organisms. She looks for the best quality meats and vegetables, valuing fresh over processed — and

remember, only wet food for the felines.

There are shelves upon shelves to choose from, but if you want some Christmas flavor, grab a bag of Portland-based Grandma Ada's Turkey & Yams (\$7). Made with 11 natural ingredients and slow-cooked in small batches, the supplement is healthier than more traditional kibble. Lewis also stocks advent calendars for cats and dogs (\$22), an assortment of 12 treats made with ingredients like cod skin, chicken breast and peanut butter.

Gorge Dog is a great spot for treats too. Sam Gross, who bought the store last summer, sources gourmet natural dog treats from Bubba Rose Biscuit Co. in Florida (\$1-4.50) that not only have fun designs but are baked with care. Other nutritious options include pig ears (\$4), tracheas (\$1.50-4.50) and No-Hide long-lasting chews (\$8-11).

Even with fur, dogs and cats can get chilly over the winter, and snow is harsh on paws. Supplied by Ruffwear, Dog River has snow boots for paws of all sizes (\$40-50) and clothes for essentially any weather condition: Rain jackets (\$60), sweaters (\$80) or insulated jackets (\$90). Cats can fit in some of the clothing too depending on their size.

Don't forget about a new collar, either. Gorge Dog has several different brands, such as Pendleton Wool Collars (\$40). Locally made, proceeds go toward buying essential supplies for Hood River Adopt A Dog, one of few animal shelters in the Gorge — plus your puppy will feel so confident.


According to Lewis, enrichment for cats and dogs can be in the form or play or how they eat. Cats love to play with their people, so Lewis suggested the classic laser pointer or wand toy (\$12), but she also has interactive scratchboards (\$38). If you sprinkle some of Lewis' catnip (\$5-10) in one of her rocket-shaped, three-level hideouts (\$80), I'm sure your kitty would be pretty pleased as well. To spice it up further, both stores sell lick mats and puzzle feeders (\$14-32), which make eating more mentally stimulating.


As for dog toys, Gross said her Pacific Northwest-themed collection has been popular, with folks jumping at the opportunity to throw around plushy salmon (\$16.50-22). Conscious that some pets struggle with anxiety — or have too much energy — Gross also has calming hemp chews on hand (\$70), perfect for those big holiday gatherings.













# Pharitable Gifts

The holidays are a season of giving, but let's be honest
— all of us probably have too much stuff. Do you really
need another wind foil? For that reason, I'm a strong
advocate of donating to the vulnerable and marginalized, whether it be money, food or your time, in place of
a physical gift either for you or someone else in your life.

Luckily, organizations throughout the Gorge are working to ensure everyone's safe, warm and fulfilled. I promise the joy of contributing to a good cause feels better than receiving a random trinket, and if it doesn't, let's just say that might require a longer conversation. But enough of that, here are some options.

#### Washington Gorge Action Programs (WAGAP)

WAGAP is essentially a one-stop-shop for helping those in need: The nonprofit supports victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, provides emergency housing, works to uplift youth mental health, runs several food banks and more. Founded in 1966, WAGAP has been a critical pillar of Klickitat and Skamania counties for decades. Visit www. wagap.org/donate to make a one-time or monthly donation of any amount, which you can direct to a specific program.

WAGAP also accepts non-perishable goods, specifically canned meat, fruit and vegetables, for its food banks, along with things like shampoo, dish soap and toothpaste. Visit www.wagap.org/food-banks-nutrition for a list of drop-off locations and other items to bring.

#### Greater Oregon Behavioral Health, Inc. (GOBHI) and The Next Door, Inc. (TNDI)

Nearly 8,000 children spent at least one day in foster care across Oregon in 2022, according to the Child Welfare Data Book. This included 96 kids in Hood River and Wasco counties, but there were only 36 foster homes.

Through their Therapeutic Foster Care program, GOBHI and TNDI certify new foster homes and, according to GOBHI's website, they offer a higher level of service than traditional options by training new parents on trauma-informed care, de-escalation techniques, collaborative problem solving and cultural awareness.

Help GOBHI and TNDI continue this program by donating at www.gobhi.org/donate or www.nextdoorinc. org/individual-donations. If you're willing and able to take the next step, contact ARodakowski@gobhi.org or fosterinfo@nextdoorinc.org to learn about becoming a certified foster parent.

#### Mid-Columbia Community Action Center (MCCAC)

While the holidays bring cheer, they also bring colder temperatures — a reminder that housing is a basic need often taken for granted. MCCAC fills that gap by operating a seasonal warming shelter in Hood River along with two other facilities in The Dalles. The Gloria Center serves as another warming shelter in the winter, but also connects unhoused folks with healthcare professionals, employment services and provides housing placement assistance. The Annex delivers a longer-term shelter option and offers a similar array of services.

If you'd like to help those experiencing houselessness, visit www.mccac.com/donate to make a one-time, monthly or yearly donation of any amount, or contact info@mccac. org if you're interested in volunteering. MCCAC could also use warm clothes (gloves, hats, socks hand warmers, etc.) hygienic products (toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo, conditioner, body wash etc.), pillows, sheets, blankets, sleeping bags and two-person tents.

In Hood River, deliver your donations to Hood River Valley Christian Church at 975 Indian Creek Road on Tuesdays from noon to 2 p.m. MCCAC does not have a drop-off location for The Dalles, but if you're interested, reach out to Community Engagement Coordinator Miriam Starrett at 541-965-8402 or mstarrett@mccac.com to set up a time and location.

#### One Community Health (OCH)

Migrant farmworkers play a vital role across the Gorge by harvesting produce we all love to indulge, and they deserve support even outside of the picking season. OCH was established in 1986 for that exact purpose. Along with five locations scattered throughout the Mid-Columbia, their La Clinica and Wy-Kan-Ush-Pum mobile clinics bring health-care to farmworkers, Indigenous peoples and other isolated, rural residents. Bilingual staff also operate a dedicated farmworkers clinic every summer, offer assistance navigating health insurance and several other services.

In 2023, OCH served more than 22,000 patients. About half of those patients were far below the federal poverty level, 15% were uninsured and 10% identified as a farmworker. Visit www.onecommunityhealth.org/donate to make a donation, or mail your donation to 849 Pacific Ave., Hood River, OR 97031. In addition to OCH, TNDI helps farmworkers secure housing, healthcare and wellness information, and the nonprofit facilitates many other programs specifically designed to support Latino residents. Again, please visit www.nextdoorinc.org/individual-donations to support the largest social service agency in the Gorge.

#### **Columbia Gorge Pride Alliance**

The warmth of fires, days off work and tradition brings families together over the holidays, but for queer people, it can be stressful existing in a space where they might not feel completely comfortable or accepted. The Columbia Gorge Pride Alliance, facilitated by TNDI and part of the broader Pride Northwest network, hosts events where the LGBTQ+community can connect and thrive.

CRITFC, which represents the Yakama, Warm Springs, Umatilla and Nez Perce Tribes, not only seeks to bolster Tribal fishing rights, but also improve native fish populations that we all depend on through monitoring, restoration and more. Over the past two centuries, the number of salmon, lamprey and sturgeon in the Columbia has precipitously declined, jeopardizing Indigenous cultures and livelihoods. We're all one interconnected community in the Gorge, so if you'd like to support CRITFC, visit critfc.org/donate/.

#### Columbia Riverkeeper and Communidas

Like CRITFC, Columbia Riverkeeper is actively working to keep what makes Hood River, White Salmon and The Dalles special — our beautiful river — healthy and thriving. From cleaning up the Handford Nuclear Site to teaching kids how they can prevent different types of pollution, Columbia Riverkeeper works around the basin in local governments, courtrooms and along the shores.

Columbia Riverkeeper also sponsors Communidas, an organization based in Hood River that's amplifying Latino voices for environmental and social justice. Communidas does so by training people of color in community journalism, leadership development and civic engagement.





## Gifts For Birders

About 47 million people were watching birds in the U.S. in 2011, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Chances are you know someone who's best friends have feathers. What do you give them for Christmas?

Well, a lot of us feed birds at home, so we'd probably like a hummingbird feeder, or a big bag of black oil sunflower seeds from Coastal in The Dalles or Cascade Farm and Outdoor in Hood River. (Millet is unpopular and peanuts attract beautiful, pestersome jays who'll stay until spring and then eat other people's eggs and caterpillars.)

Next, a field guide to identify what we find. David Allen Sibley's books are the gold standard, and "Sibley Birds West" is pocket-sized and localized. Second-hand bookstores are fun sources of birdy memoirs and adventures and esoteric treatises. And Skookum Outfitters has a nice selection of bird books, too.

Klindt's Booksellers: 315 E. Second St., The Dalles Waucoma Bookstore: 221 Oak St., Hood River Artifact Books (second-hand): 202-A Cascade Ave.,

Skookum Outfitters: 109 W. Second St., The Dalles

Next, binoculars to observe the birds we identify. Good, usable binoculars come in around \$100 at Walmart or Big Five Sporting Goods. This can be a highly personal choice, with some preferring 8x10 magnification, some very steady-handed people using 12x10, preferences for different brands, and so on. You know what sounds like real fun though? A monocular, with an attachment that turns it into a magnifying lens. Get one at Skookum Outfitters for examining mysterious found feathers — identifiable with a copy of "Bird Feathers" by Casey McFarland, ordered from a local bookstore.

Some birders venture farther afield. They might like a coat with lots of very big pockets, to hold all these field guides you gave them, and a \$30 hat with an embroidered chickadee from Skookum's to keep the rain off their new monocular. Warm scarves in inconspicuous plain colors, practical fingerless gloves; slicks coats to which rain and seedpods don't adhere; and warm, waterproof shirts with birds on them (also from Skookum's!). Waterproof ... well, waterproof anything, trust me on that one — so many fun birds live in messy places!

In art, some birders are fine with charming anthropomorphisms, like a charming owl-shaped jar from The Dalles Art Center.

Others like anatomically accurate birds who come in realistic colors, with no extra swirly bits. Linda Steider, co-owner of Made in the Gorge, shares everything from \$80 metal prints of local owls and hummingbirds, to \$6 or \$7 magnets and metal-print ornaments of same, and \$4 art cards sorted by species.

And if you can afford Nick Miles' rainbow-sheened metal art of great blue heron or California quail, I'm sure it'll be treasured

For small presents, hilarious or thoughtful, Hood River's several gift stores are great. Profits at Spruce Gifts and Provisions benefit Oregon wildlife conservation — also a gift to people who love birds! Here you can find a nest of colorful eggs (just don't ask me what species laid them), a mug covered with iridescent insects (not technically avians but hey, super cool and birds eat bugs, right?), a hat with night scope built in (maybe good for finding owls?), and Birds of America playing cards (so lifelike, I'm afraid my cat might hunt them down — so don't worry, they're still on the shelf).



Shopping on a budget? How about an old but exquisite item from the back of a second-hand shop? Or, wondering what to gift somebody who's got everything? How about a strange, wonderful, vintage object neither of you ever heard of before? Don't underestimate thrift stores: they hold treasure you can't often find elsewhere — like decades-old, hand-embroidered quilts and dresses, or shelves of music's most unusual CDs that have been out of production for ages.



In Hood River, Cajun and Clover holds some unusual displays including vintage glass that glows delicate colors under black light. And Itty Bitty Thrifts specializes in items for youngsters.

In The Dalles, Breezeway shares everything from old editions of bird books and children's classics to a copper music box, shaped like a little house and complete with doorknobs. Vibe Consignment retails the really high-end, elegantly besparkled items. Habitat for Humanity Restore is a good option if you think an old Victrola or a terrifying

power tool would be just the ticket (or you want to support an important charity recovering from a structure fire). I've found some of the best '80s music and tiny miniature forest creatures at Buy Right. And Red Wagon Antiques adds a special display of vintage postcards, sorted by holiday — some truly old and elegant. Oh ... and anyone need a muffin tin of 25-cent scrabble letters? Someone must — it looks like the letter Y was popular.
