


plan your visit ...

This year, there is no required timed-use permit to access the Gorge Waterfall Corridor. However, from May 26 through September 4, a daily timed use permit will be required to park in the Multnomah Falls parking lot entering from Interstate 84, Exit 3, between 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. Permits are \$2 a vehicle, and must be purchased in advance (find them here: www.recreation. gov/timed-entry/10089144). Reservations are made on an hourly basis and permits will be available for purchase up to two weeks in advance of your desired visitation date. A permit check-in location will be located on the walkway between the parking lot and the falls. There is a limit of two permits per vehicle per day. A timed use permit reservation does not guarantee parking. Permits are not required for those using shuttles or transit services. Find more info at www.recreation.gov and www.oregon.gov.

GORGE PASS

The GOrge pass is an annual transportation pass that grants you access to the four transit services, Columbia Area Transit (CAT), The Link Public Transit, Mt. Adams Transportation Services (MATS) and Skamania County transit, all located within the Columbia River Gorge for unlimited access to all fixed-route services. For the yearly fee of \$40 for adults or \$20 for children under the age of 17, you can visit and experience all the Columbia River Gorge has to offer without the requirement of a timed-use permit or parking, as well as have access to easy transportation to and from Portland, Ore., and Vancouver, Wash.

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
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

From intimate views to sweeping panoramas, lush forest and farmland to arid high desert, the Columbia River Gorge has something for everyone and these byways and backroads will help you explore the best of it — or grab a map and stick a pin in it. There are no wrong turns in the Gorge.



Columbia Gorge Loop

Dramatic views of the western Gorge from Crown Point and Cape Horn, and of the eastern Gorge from Highway 14. Take a side trip on the Columbia River Historic Highway between Corbett and Ainsworth Park for a look at some of the most spectacular waterfalls around, including misty and majestic Multnomah Falls.

From Troutdale, follow the Columbia River Scenic Highway east to Ainsworth State Park, then continue eastbound along Interstate 84 past Hood River to The Dalles. Cross The Dalles Bridge and head west on Highway 14 through Lyle, Bingen, Stevenson, North Bonneville and Camas to Interstate 205. Cross the Columbia River on Interstate 205 (Glenn Jackson Bridge) to Interstate 84, then return east to Troutdale.

Mount Adams Loop

Scenic, backcountry route to the foothills of Mount Adams and the Klickitat River Canyon. From Bingen, follow Highway 141 north through White Salmon, Husum and BZ Corners to Trout Lake. Then head east on the Goldendale-Glenwood Road through Glenwood, down the Klickitat River Canyon toward Goldendale. After you've climbed out of the canyon, head right back into it again by traveling south on Highway 142 to Klickitat and Lyle. At Lyle, head west on Highway 14 back to Bingen.

Mount Hood Loop

Dramatic views of Mount Hood and the scenic Hood River valley. From Hood River, follow Highway 35 south through the community of Mt. Hood to the junction with Highway 26, then west on Highway 26 through Zigzag, Welches and Brightwood to Gresham. From Gresham, head north to Interstate 84 and the return trip to Hood River. To extend the trip, take a side trip from Government Camp, going up the mountain to historic Timberline Lodge.

East Side LoopBroad vistas of wide open wheatfields,

Deschutes River Canyon and juniper rangelands of the eastern Cascades. From The Dalles, head south on Highway 197 through Dufur, Tygh Valley and Maupin to the junction with Highway 97. Then go northeast on Highway 97 to the historic community of Shaniko, continuing north through Grass Valley and Moro to Biggs Junction and Interstate 84 for the return journey westbound to The Dalles. Worthwhile extensions to this loop may be made by traveling farther south on Highway 97 to the Highway 216 junction, then back north through Antelope to Shaniko. Or, keep traveling south on Highway 97 to Madras, then follow Highway 26 northwest to Warm Springs and the junction with Highway 216. Follow Highway 216 east to Highway 197 near Maupin and the return journey north to The Dalles.

SHORTER ROUTES

Rowena Loops

These offer spectacular driving on the eastern end of the Historic Columbia River Highway. Start at Mosier and head East on Highway 30 or The Dalles and head West on Hwy 30 for a combination of up-close and panoramic views that regularly draw car companies to film their commercials. For variety, loop back on the State Road-Sevenmile Hill route for spectacular panoramas of both the eastern and central Columbia Gorge.

Dalles Mountain Road

An unpaved route through a working cattle ranch, deeded by its last owners to the state of Washington. The ranch is now part of Columbia Hills State Park and the ranch house is a departure point for hikes and offers occasional historical and interpretive programs. The rugged road itself travels through spectacular viewing for wildflowers and wildlife. At the crest of the Columbia Hills it meets up with paved roads toward Centerville and Goldendale. From Interstate 84, turn north at The Dalles Exit 85 onto Highway 197, turn right at the junction of 197 and Washington Highway 14, then take the next left.


Hood River Fruit Loop

A picturesque trip through the orchard country of rural Hood River County. From Interstate 84 take the Hood River Bridge exit, travel south on Highway 35 to the community of Mount Hood, turn right through Parkdale and take the Dee Highway back to Hood River.



Summer, fall, winter and spring, the Columbia Gorge is a playground waiting for players: Get out on the water, stroll the fairways or take to the slopes for world-class active fun.

Move

During the warm summer months, the place to be is the Columbia River, whether you're interested in windsurfing, kiteboarding, stand-up paddle boarding (SUP) or other water sports. Thanks to both public and private entities, there are many different points of access to the Gorge's waterway. The Columbia Gorge Wind & Water Association (CGW2) has compiled an exhaustive list of various Gorge beaches. We've listed some of the more popular areas below, but for a complete list, go to the CGW2 website at cgw2.org.

OREGON

The Hook

Located on the west side of the Hood River Waterfront, the Hook is a recently revamped launch site for windsurfers, although it is extremely popular with kayakers, canoers, and SUPers. Nearby Wells Island provides a wind shadow that makes this an ideal area for beginners.

The Event Site

Located on the east side of the Hood River Waterfront, the Event Site is the busiest location for water sports in the Gorge. The lawn and beach will often be filled with people engaging in a variety of activities; kiteboarders launch throughout the summer from the adjacent sandbar that formed due to a debris flow from a flood a decade ago.

Swell City/The Hatchery

As the name suggests, an area that sees some big swells on classic west wind days. Both are popular windsurfing launch sites for more experienced sailors. The hatchery is next to the Spring Creek National Fish Hatchery, and both locations are on the Washington side of the river near milepost 56 of State Route 14.

Mayer State Park

While people have been known to windsurf here (a picture on the park website shows a stack of sails and boards at the park), Mayer State Park's sheltered cove provides better opportunities for swimming, boat launching, and SUPing.

Rufus

This small community is located on the far east end of the Gorge, Interstate 84 at Exit 109. A mixture between intermediate and advanced, Rufus is touted to have some of the biggest swells in the Gorge, and is used by both windsurfers and kiteboarders. Also features a boat launch.

Arlington

Another small community located on the Oregon side of the east end of the Gorge (Exit 137 off I-84), the launch site at Arlington was recently improved by the CGWA and offers advanced territory for both windsurfers and kiteboarders. Also features a boat launch.

WASHINGTON

Doug's Beach

Located just east of Lyle, directly off SR 14 at MP 74, and managed by Washington State Parks. This windsurfing site is also considered to be a prime location for expert sailors, especially when areas near Hood River and White Salmon are busy.

PARKING FEES

Note that effective June 2018, the Port of Hood River began charging for parking in portions of the Hood River Waterfront (in addition to the existing paid lot at Event Site). Parking pay kiosks were installed for the following areas: Nicolas Boat Launch, North First Street, East Port Street, Event Site Overflow Lot 1, West Jensen Beach and West Portway.

Waterfront Parking at kiosks/meters is \$2.50 per hour. Fees must be paid via credit or debit card at a kiosk or through the Way to Park mobile app. portofhoodriver.com

SNOW

Timberline Summit Pass

Formerly known as Summit Ski Area, Timberline Summit Pass is officially part of the Timberline ski area as of 2021, increasing Timberline's vertical terrain to 4,540 feet, the longest in the United States. Located in Government Camp, Ore., the Summit Pass Lodge and base area offer affordable access to its beginner ski and snowboard terrain, as well as lessons, rentals, a restaurant and snow tubing area. Summit Pass lift tickets, passes, and rentals must be purchased on arrival. Lessons can be booked in advance. timberlinelodge.com

Mt. Hood Meadows Ski Resort

Mt. Hood Meadows operates on a special use permit in the Mt. Hood National Forest, and the resort sprawls across Mt. Hood's southeast flank. The Meadows offers more than 2,150 acres of terrain, and a highest lift-served elevation of 7,300 feet. Located off Oregon Highway 35 east of the Highway 26 junction. Plenty of summer hiking, too. For more information, call 503-337-2222 and press 0 for an information specialist, or reach out via Facebook, Twitter or the Mt. Hood Meadows Blog, skihood.com.

Cooper Spur Ski Area

Family-oriented resort on the north side of Mount Hood overlooking the Hood River Valley. 541-352-6692 or cooperspur.com.

Mt. Hood Ski Bowl

Known as America's Largest Night Ski Area, with 36 lighted runs, 69 day runs and has the most lit black diamond runs in Oregon. Chairlifts and surface tows in the winter; dual alpine slide, miniature golf, mountain bike park and more in the summer, 87000 East Hwy. 26 at Government Camp. 503-272-3206, 503-222-BOWL or skibowl.com.


Other cross-country

All the major resorts around Mount Hood offer cross-country opportunities, as do other areas. Try exploring Trillium Lake, two miles east of Government Camp, and White River, east of the Highway 26 and Highway 35 junction. In contrast to the developed slopes of Mount Hood, Mount Adams in south-central Washington State offers a wilderness experience, for both skiers and climbers. There's plenty of backcountry for cross-country and snow-shoeing, with access via the communities of Trout Lake and Glenwood in Klickitat County. The Mt. Adams Ranger Station is based in Trout Lake; call 509-395-3400. Finally, a network of cross-country ski trails - plus snowmobiling — is open on the Wind River Ranger District in Skamania County. Routes such as the Hard Time Loop and Scenic Loop are accessed from the Wind River Highway. Call the Skamania County Chamber for details, at 509-427-8911 or 800-989-9178.































It's hard to imagine any location with more hiking trails per square mile than the Gorge. From short, tree-lined strolls with family to rugged ridge treks, you'll find something to meet all tastes.

HIKE

Before you visit: Keep in mind certain trails may be partially or temporarily closed due to natural disasters such as landslides or wildfire damage. Be sure to check with the local state parks office, visit ReadysetGOrge.com or Gorge-Friends.org for updated trail openings and closures before you go hiking.

WASHINGTON

Dog Mountain Trail #147

Rated: Most difficult.

Length: 3.1 miles with 2,600-foot elevation gain. Premier wildlife and flower hike in May through early June. Watch out for poison oak on the lower reaches, and pack a windbreaker. During the winter, the peak is snow-covered and even the most intrepid hikers should come prepared with mountaineering gear such as traction devices, poles and a good GPS.

Access: Trailhead 13 miles east of Stevenson on Washington Highway. 14. Same trailhead leads to Augsberger Trail #4407, an eight-mile route gaining 3,050 feet. Northwest Forest Pass required.

Weekend permits required and parking restrictions apply. For more information: www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/crgnsa/recreation/recarea/?recid=29900&actid=64

Sam Walker Trail #4402

Rated: Easy, universal access hike suitable for all seasons. Length: 1.1 miles with elevation gain of 60 feet.

Views of the Columbia River and Horsetail Falls. Trailhead 10 miles west of Bonneville Dam on Washington Highway 14.

Access: Turn south on Skamania Landing Road and proceed one-quarter mile to parking lot on west side of the road.

Fees: \$5 per vehicle per day, or Northwest Forest Pass required.

Catherine Creek

Rated: Easy.

Length: Several choices, including a 1.5-mile paved, handicapped-accessible path on the south side of the road with waterfall viewpoint, interpretive signs, benches and a stand of old-growth white oak along the way. Unpaved, limited-access trails north of the road. Rolling, open countryside abounds with wildflowers in the early spring. Located off old highway above Washington High-

way. 14 between Bingen and Lyle.

Access: From Bingen, turn north at Rowland Lake and follow paved highway around lake to plateau, and watch for parking area on the north side of the road. No fees apply. *As of press time, a damaged bridge on lower trail impedes ADA wheelchair access on the west side (out and back OK) East side is wheelchair passable. Visit www.fs.usda. gov/recarea/crgnsa/recarea/?recid=29892 for updates.

Hamilton Mountain

Rated: Moderate to difficult. Length: 7.6 mile loop with a 2100-foot elevation gain

Rigorous but rewarding climb to the top of Hamilton Mountain along Hamilton Creek with several waterfall viewpoints. Overlooks Beacon Rock in the western Columbia Gorge.

Access: Take the state park access road north from Washington Highway 14 opposite Beacon Rock. Washington State Discover Pass required. For more info, go to gorgefriends.org/hike-the-gorge/hamilton-mountain-loop.html.

Crawford Oaks Trail

Rated: Easy to moderate

Distance: 5 to 8.5-mile loop with 1300-foot elevation gain

Hiking, biking and equestrians are welcome at this trailhead that offers two different loops that take you through grasslands, scrub oaks and wildflowers in the spring. The lower loop offers grand views of the Columbia River while the upper loop offers some great wildflower viewing in spring months.

Access: The lower loop trailhead is located at milepost 87 on Washington Highway 14. The upper loop is accessed by turning onto Dalles Mountain Road at milepost 84.5 on Highway 14. Travel several miles past the barns to the parking lot. Washington State Discover Pass required. gorgefriends.org/hike-the-gorge/columbia-hills-historical-state-park--crawford-oaks.html

GIFFORD PINCHOT FOREST

East Crater Trail #48

Length: 2.5 miles with moderate elevation gain. One of several trails in the Indian Heaven Wilderness, located west of Trout Lake in the Gifford Pinchot National Forest. Trail passes small meadows, shallow lakes and alpine forest. Details at the Mt. Adams Ranger District in Trout Lake or visit the website at www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/gifford-pinchot/recarea/?recid=31748. Wilderness Permit required.

OREGON

Rowena Dell-Tom McCall Nature Preserve Rated: Easy.

Offers stunning views of the Columbia Gorge, the mouth of the Klickitat River to the north, and a collection of spring wildflowers. Trailhead is at top of Rowena Loops. This is a relatively small area with rolling terrain and small lakes. The dirt foot paths are easy to follow and you won't need a map.

Access: Just 10 miles west of The Dalles on Columbia River Scenic Highway (Hwy. 30). Can also be accessed from Interstate 84; take the Rowena exit to Highway 30 and head west, or take the Mosier exit to Highway 30 and head east. gorgefriends.org/hike-the-gorge/tom-mccall-point.html

Mosier Twin Tunnels

Rated: Easy to moderate.

Length: 9 miles round trip with 430-foot elevation gain

This section of the Columbia River Scenic Highway is closed to motorized vehicles; open to bicyclists and hikers. From Mosier end, it's a fairly easy half-mile walk to the first outlook and the Twin Tunnels. Watch for the historic rock parapet railings. At the Twin Tunnels you can still see some original rock work built by Italian craftsmen.

Access: Parking at either end of trail, at Mosier or at Hood River (Mark O. Hatfield trailhead). Oregon State Parks Pass is required. gorgefriends.org/hike-the-gorge/ mosier-twin-tunnels.html

Wahclella Falls Trail #436

Rated: Easy to Moderate
Wahclella Falls Trail offers a relatively easy,
2.4 mile out-and-back day hike through a
slot canyon to one of the more spectacular
waterfalls in the Gorge. It originally had a
short loop at the end, but the upper section
is closed due to damage from a 2017 fire. At
the end of the trail lies Wahclella Falls, a 350foot two-tiered plunge. The upper falls are
15-25 feet, while the lower 60-foot "horsetail" style falls plummets into an enormous
splash pool

Access: From Portland, travel east on Interstate 84 to exit #40, Bonneville Fish Hatchery. Turn right and right again (south) and follow the road to the trailhead. Day use fee of \$5 per vehicle per day or a valid pass required.www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/crgnsa/recarea/?recid=29992

Lewis & Clark Riverfront Trail, The Dalles Length:10 miles.

Rated: Easy.

Paved flat pathway along the Columbia River, winds from the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center (through a tunnel under the railroad tracks) to downtown The Dalles and out to The Dalles Boat Basin and Riverfront Park. Also follows Chenoweth Creek, near the animal shelter, and past Taylor Lake. Watch for water fowl, ospreys, great blue herons and an occasional beaver.

Access: Many different locations to get on the trail, including downtown The Dalles at the Union Street underpass, the Pocket Park at Crate's Way in The Dalles, the Discovery Center, and the Boat Basin (Exit 84 off I-84).

OREGON

MT. HOOD NATIONAL FOREST

Camas Trail #490A

Length: 3.1 miles.

One of many hikes in the Barlow Ranger District on the Mt. Hood National Forest. This trail leads along Camas and Clear creeks, with views of the White River Canyon and Mt. Hood. Good spring or fall hike. For details, contact the Barlow Ranger Station in Dufur, or visit the Forest Service website at fs.fed.us/r6/mthood/dayhikes.htm.

Umbrella Falls #667

Length: 3.1 miles (one way)
One of many hikes on the Hood River

Ranger District, Mt. Hood National Forest. This is a forested route to Umbrella Falls viewpoint, connecting with Sahalie Falls Trail #667C. Details at Hood River Ranger District in Mt. Hood south of Hood River, or visit www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/mthood/recarea/?recid=53316 for more information. Northwest Forrest Pass Required.

Eagle Creek Trailhead and Trail (#440)

Rated: Moderate

Length: 13.1 miles overall

One of the most popular trails in the Columbia River Gorge, this spectacular cliffside hike passes through a forested basalt cliff overlooking Eagle Creek. It affords spectacular views of the creek's slot canyon, where a cool, ethereal fog offers a reprieve on a hot summer day. Sheer cliffs have no handrails on parts of this trail, so this hike is not recommended for children or those afraid of heights, despite its gentle overall grade. Trail continues into the Mark O. Hatfield Wilderness on the Hood River Ranger District.

Access: From Portland; Travel east on Interstate 84 to exit #41 which is just past the interstate tunnel. Get in the right lane before entering the tunnel. Take a right at the end of the off ramp and follow the signs to the Eagle Creek Trailhead/Picnic Area. Wilderness Permits are required when entering Mark O Hatfield Wilderness. Free permits are

self-issued at the Wilderness boundary.

As of press time. recovery efforts from the 2017 Eagle Creek wildfire are still underway on some of these multi-day loop trail opportunities. Please check the Columbia River Gorge Scenic Area alerts & notices page for the latest information. www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/mt-hood/recarea/?recid=53172


Historic Highway State Trail

A new waterfall stretch awaits hikers and bikers at Starvation Creek, part of the Columbia River Historic Highway State Trail, a years-long project to build a paved path from Troutdale to The Dalles. A 1.2-mile route from Starvation Creek to Lindsey Creek, dedicated last fall, is ADA accessible and offers views of Starvation Creek Falls, Cabin Creek Falls, and Hole-in-the-Wall Falls. Adventurers can access the trail from Exit 55 on Interstate 84. A new extension — 3.2 miles running from Lindsey Creek to Wyeth — is in the works, with construction beginning in late spring and wrapping up this fall.

Rail to Trail and single track along The Deschutes River

You can bike or hike for 22 miles (round trip) along the site of last railroad war in North America while enjoying the stunning views of rapids in the fast-flowing Deschutes River in this arid region. Bring plenty of water in





warmer months and guard against puncture vine by using Slime in your innertubes if riding a bike. There is also several hiking only trails including the Blackberry Trail, which includes some shade, The Riverview and Ferry Springs trails. Trailheads are located at the park which is 15 miles east of The Dalles. No fee unless vehicle is left within the park overnight. Indian Creek Trail, Hood River

Bridges and boardwalks await pedestrians at the half-mile South Side Indian Creek Trail, a new spoke of the trail network that brings a forest vibe inside Hood River's city limits. The original trail, which has been pieced together through the years, includes:

- East Indian Creek Trail: stretches from Third Street and Hazel Avenue to 12th Street (now expanded by the Southside Connector). You can get to this section from downtown by taking the Second Street stairs, at State Street, and watching for the green Indian Creek trail signposts.
- A middle piece: Trail head starts at the entrance of the Columbia Gorge Community College and continues to where it meets private property; access takes walkers to the Avalon neighborhood, along a busy stretch of Indian Creek Road. Go south to Arrowhead Drive, turn west 100 or so yards to where the trail picks up next to the 14th hole of Indian Creek GC, and turns into West Indian Creek Trail.
- West Indian Creek Trail: Two trailheads next to Hood River Valley High School, one next to the ball fields and one west of the school parking lot, connecting to the Arrowhead access.

The trail continues west across Alameda Drive with a short loop around Barrett Park.





THE DALLES

Sorosis Park & Tree Top Play Park 300 East Scenic Drive. Park offers: Group shelter (electricity available, working fireplace) group picnic area (barbecue pit available, electricity available with permit), picnic tables, play equipment, softball fields, soccer fields, tennis courts (2), volleyball court (sand), horse shoe pits, walking paths (8/10 of a mile), 18-hole disc golf course, exercise equipment, memorial rose garden and Veterans' memorial.

Riverfront Park Riverfront Park, off Interstate 84 Exit 85. Opens Memorial Day weekend and is open through Nov. 1 each year. Park offers: beaches, kayak and bike rentals with Celilo Paddle Company, restrooms, outdoor shower, picnic tables, group picnic shelter (45feet diameter, three tables), play equipment, walking paths and access to the Riverfront Trail.

City Park

707 Union Street, (Fifth and Union). Park offers: Restrooms, picnic tables, play equipment and stage for entertainment (electricity available). It is the location of The Dalles Farmers' Market.

Thompson Park & Ted Walker Swimming Pool 602 West Second Street. New splash park and swimming pool open now through Labor Day.

Ben Rockwell Memorial Skate Park Adjacent to Thompson Park, offers structures for skateboard and BMX stunts.

DUFUR

Dufur City Park
Take Highway 197 south from
The Dalles south 13 miles to the
first Dufur exit, follow the main
road into Dufur and watch for
City Park, home of the Dufur Play
Park, picnic area, ball fields, and
the newly resurfaced city swimming pool. http://www.dufurcitypark.org/contact.html

CASCADE LOCKS

Marine Park
Off WaNaPa, it is a great place
to watch the river and admire
the scenery, and even adults
will feel the pull of the extensive
playground structure, designed
as homage to the sternwheeler
vessels that are so important to
local history (and still operate
today).

ODELL

Mid Valley Elementary 3686 Davis Drive in Odell, it has a variety of playground equipment, ball fields, and open space.

Odell Community Park Located off Midway Road in Odell, it is a neighborhood park boasting green space, playground equipment, exercise stations, a covered basketball court, picnic tables and a paved skateboard/bicycle trail.

Wy'east Fitness Park 3000 Wy'east Road in Odell (Wy'east Middle School), on the west edge of the school grounds, is a new park containing fitness equipment. It is located adjacent to the Wy'east track, suitable for walking; on the other side of the historic Wy'east stadium is a popular soccer field. Hard to miss on both sides of the stadium are large substance abuse prevention murals created in 2013 by students and community volunteers.

MT. HOOD-PARKDALE

Parkdale Elementary 4880 Van Nuys Drive, Parkdale, has ball fields, playground equipment and lots of open space.

Railway Park
Baseline and Clear Creek roads,
Parkdale: Railway Park has an
open lawn and pavilion for picnics, and across the street is the
Parkdale Community Center,
with a playground geared for
younger children.

Mt. Hood Town Hall Located on Highwa. 35: The facility is used for many community groups for events and classes and is home to New Visions School. Students in 2012 created a mural on the back of the adjacent Mt. Hood fire hall building.

Toll Bridge Park
7360 Toll Bridge Road south
of Mt. Hood (two miles from
Parkdale) has playground
equipment, horseshoe pits, a
covered picnic area, and plenty
of picnic tables and green space.

PINE GROVE

Pine Grove School Van Horn Drive, Pine Grove: playground equipment and a large open field are available for use.

TROUTDALE

Glenn Otto Community Park Access to the site is off East Columbia River Highway. It is bordered by the Sandy River on the east, Beaver Creek on the west, and a few residential properties on the south. Facilities at Glenn Otto Park include a swimming beach, riverfront access, picnic area, children's playground, open play area, restroom building, meeting hall and the caretaker's home. troutdaleoregon.gov

Mayor's Square Park Located at 114 East Historic Columbia River Highway between Columbia River Highway and SE Second Street. Filled with bronze sculptures and home to a historical mural, the park contains walkways, open space, lighting, a fountain, structures, park furniture, litter receptacles, drinking fountains, plaques, signs, brick retaining walls, and landscaping. troutdaleoregon.gov

Columbia Park/ Imagination Station Located at 1900 SW Cherry Park Road, west of Reynolds High School. In addition to the Imagination Station, a large adventure playground structure, the 19.9 acre site contains a soccer field, Little League fields, open recreation areas, covered and open picnic areas, six acres of wooded area with trails, public restrooms, and a concession facility operated by East County Little League Association during their baseball season. troutdaleoregon. gov

Depot Park

Located off East Columbia River Highway, this 2.25 acre park lies adjacent to the Union Pacific Railroad and Beaver Creek. Park is home to Gateway to the Gorge Visitor Center and Gateway and the Troutdale Historical Society's Depot Rail Museum. The park includes a parking area, picnic spot and viewpoint along Beaver Creek. troutdaleoregon.gov

Harlow Park
Located at 726 East Historic
Columbia River Highway, the
site is comprised of 1.4 acres
and is located off East Columbia
River Highway. It is bordered by
residential property on the north
and south sides, and vacant land
on the west. Facilities consist of
the Harlow House and "The Barn"
museums, and a parking area.
This site is also the trailhead for
Robin's Way Trail. troutdaleoregon.gov

Lewis and Clark
State Recreation Site
Located at the western gateway
of the Columbia River Gorge, the
park is situated near the mouth
of the Sandy River where it spills
into the Columbia River and
at the west end of the Historic
Columbia River Highway. Park
includes a public boat launch,
is adjacent to a popular swim
hole. A trail climbs the cliffs to
Broughton's Bluff. Provides excellent year-round rock climbing.

Sandy River Delta State Park This 1,500 acre natural area is a gateway from Portland to the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area. Park offers horseback riding, hiking, biking, wading, and fishing. www.fs.usda.gov

BIKERS PARADISE

Before you visit: Keep in mind that state parking passes may be required to park at trailheads. Always be sure to check the weather and trail conditions before you ride.

HOOD RIVER AREA

Post Canyon

A 15-mile network of scenic trails for skilled bikers. From Hood River, head west on Cascade then follow Country Club Road for 1.5 miles to Post Canyon Drive on the right. Follow Post Canyon Drive for approximately 1/2 mile to the end of the pavement and park there.

Family Man Mt. Bike Area

The Family Man area is accessible from Riordan Hill Road, which is off of Country Club Road. It is about a mile beyond where Riordan turns to gravel. Family Man has some of the best mountain biking trails in the Northwest — all challenging enough for endless hours of fun, but safe enough for off-road rookies.

Surveyor's Ridge

A classic mountain trail that runs north-south from Mount Hood to the Columbia River on the east side of Mount Hood. This ride starts at the end of Pinemont Drive, 11 miles south of Hood River off Highway 35.

Falls Creek Falls Trail

A trail north of Carson, Wash., that runs through old growth forest and ends at the beautiful Lower Lewis River Falls. From Carson, take Wind River Road for 15 miles and turn right onto NF-30 / Meadow Creek Road and travel 1 mile. Turn Right onto NF-3062. After 2 miles, trailhead is located on right where road becomes NF-057.

Road Bike Ride: Rowena Loops


A mind-blowing seven-mile loop; start in Hood River and follow the Columbia River Historic Highway through the famous twin tunnels to Mosier. Then, pedal up a gentle grade up to the Rowena Crest and blaze downhill on a series of sweeping curves.

Lake Branch/Lost Lake Loop

A large hill with excellent pavement and a beautiful reward at the end. Follow Tucker Road to the Odell/Dee intersection and veer right. Go six miles at the Dee turnoff to find the parking area.

Parkdale's Eastside Trails

From Hood River, head east on Highway 84 to Highway 35. Follow 35 south to Robin Hood Campground, the trail entrance. Visit local bike shops for more information on local trails.



MAUPIN

Sherars Falls Scenic Bikeway

The 33-mile paved route starts at the shady oasis of the city park in Maupin and heads north through town climbing to a plateau between the Deschutes and White rivers. Riders will enjoy a long downhill into Tygh Valley before heading East on Highway 216 past White River Falls State Park. The road then descends for 500 feet into the Deschutes Canyon and passes Sherars Falls. About one quarter mile after crossing the bridge, make a u-turn onto the Deschutes River Access Road, heading north. You will return to Maupin park in about 10 miles. CASCADE LOCKS

Cascade Locks Easy CLIMB Trail

Fun for the whole family, the Easy CLIMB Trail has several hours worth of trail to ride as you explore a restored section of the Columbia River Highway. This gentle path is perfect for bicycles or a leisurely afternoon walk. Don't forget your camera! Exit Interstate 84, at Cascade Locks. The trail is .4 miles north on Industrial Parkway at the east end of town.





HOOD RIVER

History Museum of Hood River County

With a wide-ranging collection of 12,000 artifacts, it is a fun place to learn about people living in the Hood River Valley and Columbia Gorge. Western Antique Aeroplane and Automobile Museum

WAAAM has the largest known collection of flying three cylinder radial engine aircraft in the world. One of the museum's jewels is their 1917 Curtiss JN4D Jenny, serial No. 001. The museum also features a wide range of cars. WAAAM is a living museum dedicated to the preservation and operation of antique aircraft and automobiles through education, displays and participating in events nationwide.

THE DALLES

Columbia Gorge Discovery Center and Wasco County Historical Museum

This is the official interpretive center for the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, located on Crate's Point, just west of The Dalles off Old Highway 30. The Discovery Center focuses on natural history and human cultures of the scenic area, with hands-on exhibits, films and recordings on subjects including Lewis & Clark, native flora and fauna, the Ice Age and more. The Wasco County Historical Museum features collections that illuminate both Native American history and pioneer development. Open daily except Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. Location: Interstate 84 at exit 82, then follow signs 1.5 miles west. For info call 541-296-8600, or check their website gorgediscovery.org.

Fort Dalles Museum

The oldest historical museum in Oregon. this museum was established just after the turn of the 20th century, preserving the legacy of this regionally strategic military base. Fort Dalles (originally Camp Drum) was established in 1850, serving as a base of operations for U.S. Army troops. The ornate, wooden Surgeon's Quarters is one of the fort's last two surviving buildings, and houses a variety of tools, weapons, photos and other memorabilia from the 19th century. There's an impressive collection of antique vehicles and wagons. Visitors are also able to tour the Anderson House, a hand-hewn wooden homestead crafted by Swedish immigrants in Wasco County. There's also a barn and granary. Fort Dalles Museum is located at West 15th and Garrison streets in The Dalles.

Admission for adults: \$8, seniors 60 plus: \$5, ages 7-17: \$1, and free for children 6 and younger. Military discounts offered. The museum is open March through November, 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. daily for tours. For more information visit fortdallesmuseum.org or call 541-296-4547.

Original Wasco County Courthouse

This wood-frame, two-story building in The



Dalles once was the seat of government for the largest county in the United States, when Wasco County extended all the way to Montana. The old courthouse, constructed in 1858, was nearly destroyed at least twice and was relocated on several occasions, but today it enjoys a permanent home, preserving a unique heritage as one of the oldest courthouse buildings west of the Mississippi River. Tour season opens May through September, other times by appointment. Contact 541-296-4798 for updated hours or to schedule a tour. Directions: Take Interstate 84 to The Dalles, then take the City Center exit toward downtown. Rorick House

The oldest home in The Dalles was built by an officer stationed at Fort Dalles in 1850, and operates today as a historical museum with period furnishings and implements. It's located at 300 West 13th Street, The Dalles. 541-296-1867.

St. Peter's Landmark

Former Catholic Church in The Dalles, preserved as a historical museum. Completed in 1898, the building features Carrera Italian marble, Kilgen pipe organ made of tigerwood, 40-foot stamped metal ceilings and a 176-foot steeple topped by a six-foot weathervane rooster crafted by Frank S. Gunning. Its stained-glass windows were created by the Povey Brothers of Portland, and many of these windows memorialize pioneer families. A wooden Madonna inside the museum was carved from the keel of a sailing ship that sank off the San Francisco coast in the 1850s. Located at Third & Lincoln Street, The Dalles. Open 11 a.m. - 3 p.m. Tuesday and Friday, 1 - 3 p.m. Saturday and Sunday; 541-296-5686. oldstpeterslandmark.org

The Dalles School District **Archives Museum**

Contains memorabilia from both District 12 (1854-2004) and District 9 (1964-2004) before the merger and up to present day as District 21. Displays include yearbooks, photo albums, trophies, sport uniforms, Booster Girl and other club records. Elementary, junior high/middle and high schools are represented. The museum is open every Saturday, 10 a.m. - 3 p.m., June through Sept. or by arrangement with Rymmel Lovell, 541-296-6546, tlovell@ netcnct.net. The National Neon Sign Museum

The National Neon Sign Museum is located at the heart of The Dalles downtown historic district. The museum captures the history, craftsmanship, and culture that shaped America, as seen through the lens of the signage and advertising industry. With its focus on the evolution of the electric sign, from pre-electric and gold leaf signage to the invention and widespread use of plastic, the museum's current assets represent one of the largest collections of neon storefront signs in the world. Located at 200 East Third Street, the museum is open to the general public March – June, 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. Thursdays through Saturdays, or by tour boat docking schedule. TROUTDALE

Historic Columbia Highway Exhibit

Locally known as "The Barn Museum," the exhibit hall was built in an all-volunteer effort by community members, residents, and historical society members in cooperation with the City of Troutdale. Built in the style of a 1926 Troutdale barn, it is 6,400 square feet with two levels. The Troutdale Historical Society office and conference room are located at the rear of the building. It was completed over a 10-year period on a pay as you go basis. Located in Harlow Park at 732 East Historic Columbia River Highway. Fred E Harlow House Museum

The Harlow House was built in 1900 by a son of Captain John Harlow and was acquired by the Troutdale Historical Society in 1979. It is maintained as a turn of the century home representing the kinds of furniture and belongings typical of local families. It is on the National Register of Historic Places, Located in Harlow Park at 732 East Historic Columbia River Highway, Troutdale. Depot Rail Museum & Caboose

Troutdale was a bustling railroad stop from the time that trains first traveled east from Portland along the Columbia River in 1882. After the original depot burned in 1907, it

was replaced by the current depot, which was acquired from Union Pacific Railroad in 1976 and moved across the tracks to its current site on the Historic Columbia River Highway. The Depot Rail Museum, a Troutdale Historic Landmark, houses train memorabilia and includes a 1975 Union Pacific CA-10 Caboose. Located in Depot Park at 473 East Historic Columbia River Highway, Troutdale. Open Monday – Thursday, 9 a.m. - 3p.m., and Friday – Sunday, 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. Free admission, donations accepted. 503 661-2164. www.troutdalehistory.org *As of press time, the 1975 Union Pacific CA-10 Caboose is currently unavailable for tours. Dufur Historical Museum

Smock Prairie Schoolhouse

Shaniko is located 57 miles south of Biggs Junction on Highway 97, a few miles north of its junction with Highway 197.

Sherman County Historical Museum

A window into Oregon's heartland, the museum comprises 14,280 square feet and more than 15,000 artifacts used in Native American families, Oregon Trail migration,

rural households, churches, schools, businesses, livestock production, dryland wheat farming and conservation, military units and patriotic efforts. Exhibits of interest include photographs of Joseph and Jane Sherar, Sherar's Falls and Bridge; photographs of World War II Training Camp, Camp Rufus; monthly Sherman County artists series. 




Tell ghost stories on the bank of a lake where boat motors will never be heard, fall asleep to the rush of rivers glacial and historic or fix your morning coffee in the utter stillness of a forest. It's these kind of experiences that exemplify overnights in the outdoors of the Gorge.

Before you visit: Keep in mind certain campgrounds may potentially be closed or inaccessible for reasons such as damage from natural disasters like fire or landslides. Burn bans may also be in effect for certain campsites. Contact the state park you are planning on staying at for up to date information on campground accessibility and guidelines.

ON THE WATER

If whitewater, drifting or fishing are your thing, the world-renowned Deschutes River might be the ticket. And Maupin, Ore. is your place of destination — 40 miles south of The Dalles on Highway 197. The cool green water from underwater aquifers cuts through basalt in this arid section of the state. With several rafting companies to choose from, thrill seekers can ride out class-IV rapid "Oak Springs" or take a float in your life vest through the Elevator Shaft. Trips range from guided to self-guidedand options of half, full and multi-day trips are available. Guided fishing trips for those seeking summer steelhead or wiley "Redside" trout are also on tap. The town offers a full range of services including food, supplies, restaurants, lodging, fuel, shuttles and fly-fishing shops.

The White Salmon River also offers a thrill ride down a crystal blue, spring-fed stream complete with a 10 foot waterfall that can be run when water levels are safe.



WATERFALLS

Vertical basalt walls along the Gorge are graced with the greatest concentration of waterfalls in North America, particularly along the Oregon side of the western Gorge. It's a matter of geology, not coincidence.

The ancestral Columbia Gorge was a V-shaped river valley, but beginning around 15,000 years ago (at the end of the latest ice age) a series of tremendous floods swept westward from a glacial lake near the present-day border of Idaho and Montana.

These "Bretz" floods, named after one of the geologists who discovered their traces, ripped the topsoil from eastern Washington and carved away at the valley walls of the Columbia Gorge,

leaving steep ramparts and tributaries abruptly hanging in midair. The flood cycles lasted for thousands of years. Many more thousands of years passed since the last flood, and each winter brought another freeze-thaw cycle, sculpting away the rock behind those waterfalls. As a result, several waterfalls now plunge into semi-circular amphitheaters; others fall out into midair, to be wafted away by the wind.

Most waterfalls are limited to the Oregon side of the Columbia River Gorge because landslides modify the steepness on the Washington side. The entire region's bedrock material is tilted slightly southward. When it's saturated by water, the upper basaltic layers on the north side of the river slide into the gorge.

The greatest number of waterfalls is accessible from a portion of the old Columbia River Highway (Hwy. 30), which can be reached from Interstate 84. If you're coming from Portland, take Exit 17 at Troutdale, Exit 18 from Lewis & Clark State Park, Exit 22 from Corbett.

Before you visit: Depending on current or previous natural disasters such as mudslides or fire activity, access to waterfalls could be partially or completely closed. Be sure to check with local state parks or visit ReadysetGOrge.com or GorgeFriends.org for open/closure statuses before your trip.

OREGON

Multnomah Falls

Access: Car or hike.

After Yosemite Falls, this is the tallest falls in North America. Two million visitors a year flock to see this 620-foot plunge, fed by underground springs from Larch Mountain. Its highest flow is during winter and spring. Five flows of Yakima basalt are visible in the fall's cliff face. You can view the falls from your car or take a network of trails up the falls. There's also fine dining at Multnomah Falls Lodge (built in 1925 and on the National Register of Historic Places) and information at Multnomah Falls Visitor Center. Access: From Interstate 84, take Exit 31 to the freeway parking lot.

Please note: From May 26 through September 4, a daily timed use permit will be required to park in the Multnomah Falls parking lot between 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. Permits are \$2 a vehicle, and must be purchased in advance (find them here: www. recreation.gov/timed-entry/10089144). Reservations are made on an hourly basis



and will be available for purchase up to two weeks in advance of your desired visitation date. A permit check-in location will be located on the walkway between the parking lot and the falls. A timed use permit reservation does not guarantee parking. Permits are not required for those using shuttles or transit services. Find more info at www. recreation.gov.

Bridal Veil Falls

Car or short hike.

Bridal Veil Creek abruptly drops twice in a tiered waterfall. The upper falls is between 60 and 100 feet tall, the lower from 40 to 60 feet in height.

Parking is a mile west of Exit 28 off Interstate 84. A short trail winds down to the base of the lower tier. Along the path, look across the Columbia River for seasonal views of falls on the Washington side of the river. The nearby community of Bridal Veil maintains its post office, a popular place to get a postmark for your wedding announcements.

Shepperd's Dell

Access: Car or short hike.

Tiered waterfall two miles west of Interstate 84's Exit 28 on the Historic Columbia River Scenic Highway. Short, paved trail leads to the top of the falls. Lower falls is a horsetail formation (40 to 60 feet drop); upper falls (35-50 feet) is a plunge formation.

Wah Gwin Gwin Falls

Access: Car/short walk.

One of the Gorge's four highest waterfalls, at 208 feet, is located behind the Columbia Gorge Hotel in Hood River. This falls flows from Phelps Creek dropping into the Columbia River. The name comes from Native American dialect meaning "rushing and tumbling waters."

White River Falls

Access: Car or hike.

A 1-mile round trip hike to the bottom of the falls gives majestic views of White River as it plunges 90 feet from a basalt shelf and tumbles into two separate pools before fanning out into a river below. At the base of the falls are the ruins of a hydropower plant which supplied electricity to The Sunshine Flour Mill in the Dalles from 1910 to 1960. Be careful. Swimming in the falls is prohibited due to the huge vortex in the waterfall pools, causing multiple drownings. The roof of the powerhouse is also unstable. Visitors should not go inside. Steep, rugged climbing. Bring water. Access: Take Highway 197 south of The Dalles and drive 30 miles and head east onto highway 216 at Tygh Valley. Entrance to the falls is seven miles ahead on the right. Maupin and river rafting on the Deschutes are within 10 miles.

Sherars Falls

Access: Car

The immense volume of the Deschutes River slams through a horseshoe-shaped bend at Sherars Falls, creating a rapid that is both beautiful and unnerving in its shear power. It is deemed unpassable by river hazard guides. Boaters, by law, are required to portage around it. It is on lands of the Warm Springs Indians and visitors, at times, can watch Native Americans dip net for Salmon and Steelhead from platforms in the way of their ancestors. Sumac, sage and cheat grass flavor the effervescent air of this dessert beauty. Take Highway 197 south of The Dalles and drive 30 miles. Go East onto highway 216 at Tygh Valley. You will pass White River Falls. The entrance to Sherars Falls is 10 miles ahead on the right. Maupin and river rafting on the Deschutes are within 10 miles.

WASHINGTON

Dog Creek Falls

1.25-mile hike. Located off Washington Highway 14 east of Wind Mountain.

Hardy Falls

1.25-mile hike.

A horsetail waterfall, about 90 feet high, located in Beacon Rock State Park west of Stevenson. Turn off Washington Highway 14 to the park access road, drive to the picnic area and trailhead to Hamilton Mountain. Follow the trail 1.25 miles to reach two short spur paths; upper path to right leads to viewpoint overlooking the drop along Hardy Creek.

Shoreline Trail, Hood River

Length: 2.5 miles, flat asphalt and concrete surfaces, including three sections completed in 2015 and 2016. Shoreline Trail runs from Best Western Plus Hood River Inn's east training beach to The Hook recreation area at the far west of the Hood River waterfront, on land owned by both the city and the port. Public restrooms are located at the Waterfront Park, Event Site, and Marina. The City of Hood River built the newest section in March 2016, linking the existing Shoreline Trail to the water sports access ramps on the Hook. Shoreline Trail connects The Hook, Waterfront Park, Event Site, the new Nichols Basin trail (2015) and adjoining Hampton Inn trail section (2016, in front of the hotel but on city land to the Hood River footbridge (aka Rotary Sailpark), History Museum of Hood River County, Port of Hood River marina, and Best Western/ Hood River Marketplace commercial area. Note: Just east of the marina, the trail goes under Hood River Interstate Bridge, where it begins its eastern-most section; there, it goes in front of the hotel but is open to the public.

At the footbridge, walkers have the option of taking the trail under the freeway and looping west along the slough natural area and back to downtown Hood River. Near the footbridge in front of Hampton Inns, the trail overlooks Nichols Natural Area, a habitat restoration project of Columbia Riverkeeper. Please do not enter on foot.
