

Kennett field hockey reloads for championship run

CONWAY — The Kennett High field hockey team was ranked No. 1 in Division II for much of last season, but fell just short of its goal of a championship reaching the semifinals. This flock of Eagles hopes to take care of that business this season and got their fall off to a strong start with an impressive 2-0 victory over Goffstown at Centola Field on Tuesday.

"We have to finish better," Cassie Daley, Eagles' head coach, said. "We dominated most of the game but we all know in field hockey it takes just one shot and then you find yourself playing catch up."

Kennett (15-1 in 2018 and reached the Final Four), was the only undefeated team out of 54 schools in New Hampshire during the regular season.

The Eagles finished the regular season with a 14-0 record with a staggering 12 shutouts and outscored their opponents 77-4.

"What they did was so special and something no other team in New Hampshire did with 77 goals scored and 2 goals scored against in the regular season and 4 goals total scored in all, that is crazy and unheard of," Daley said.

Kennett lost Alex Gutowski, Ashton Coleman, Olivia Stewart, Madigan Avery and Alex Iannuzzi to graduation in June.

Ashton Coleman and Alexa Gutowski suited up for the Granite State represented New Hampshire in the 36th annual New Hampshire versus Vermont Twin State field hockey game in Grappone Stadium at Saint Anselm College in Manchester on June 21.


Daley, in her fourth year at the helm, has a new junior varsity coach in Kayleigh Lepage.

Raiders want to build on their field hockey tradition

FRYEBURG — According to Coach Deanne Frost this year's Fryeburg Academy field hockey team will be full of young players as seems to be the case for many teams this fall season.

Frost said her players were energized about the season that kicked off with a home game against York on Thursday. Results were not known as of press time.

Last October, Fryeburg dominated every facet of play, except the most important one — the final score on the scoreboard in the playoffs. The No. 2 seeded Raiders held a 17-5 shots on goal advantage along with eight more penalty corners than No. 3 seeded Freeport, yet it was the Falcons who mustered the lone goal with just over three minutes to play in overtime for the 1-0 in this Class B South semifinal.

"It's a hard thing when you lose any time, but it's tougher when you lose in the playoffs, and even tougher when you lose in the playoffs and think you could have won," said Frost, who was disappointed in the results but not in her

team's play and was quick to give Freeport credit for the win.

"This was one of those games where we were certainly prepared physically and mentally, but things just didn't go our way," she added. "We couldn't seem to finish it off. Not to take anything away from Freeport, but they had a defender who saved two goals. One was full-out diving save and the other was on a really nice stick save. We should have put the ball in the net, but it didn't happen."

She will be missed greatly until her return.

Brooke Emery put the Raiders in front in the first half, on a rip from distance with her left-foot that floated over the goalie's outstretched fingertips and just below the cross bar for the early lead. Emery made it 2-0 with a similar shot a few minutes later.

The difference in the game seemed to be Fryeburg's ability to gain the advantage by trapping and passing accurately to gain an advantage on their opponent. In soccer there are times when the ball is loose and available to both teams. When this

occurred Fryeburg was quick to the ball, seeming to come up with loose balls quite frequently.

Kayrin Johnson was responsible for many steals as she anticipates so very well. She slowed the Falcon offense to a crawl in the shut out. Luna Barrioneuvo is the quarterback of the team directing the offense with her superior skills and soccer knowledge. Madison McIntyre was also very effective in chasing down the loose ball and passing accurately to team mates for offensive opportunities. Amanda Howe will certainly be in the mix this year with her speed and skill-set.

It was impressive to see how the Raiders came out after halftime and continued to put pressure and score on Mountain Valley putting the game in the win column most impressively. Fryeburg crossed the ball into the 18-yard box frequently, and it was only some dramatic saves from point blank that kept the score from being greater.

KHS volleyball has a new look on the sidelines this fall

CONWAY — There will be a couple of new faces on the sideline this fall for the Kennett High volleyball team, but that's not to say they aren't familiar with the Eagles and bring a love of the game to the court.

Craig Bartolomei was hired as the varsity head coach and Angela Acone as the junior varsity coach in early August.

Diana Germain, who led the program for the past four years, retired last November. The JV coach, Keith Hutchins, who stepped up last fall when there was a need, also retired.

Volleyball was a specific area of concern for the Conway School Board as there is an overall shortage of coaches for the sport statewide.

The New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association on the Notebook page of its website listed nine schools (Newfound Memorial School, Portsmouth, Bishop Guertin, Moultonborough Academy, Mascenic Regional, Hillsboro-Deering, Milford, Prospect Mountain and Concord High School) in need of either a varsity or JV coach or both as of mid-August.

Kennett went 1-13 last fall in its debut in Division III after petitioning to move

down from Division II in 2017. The lone win was 3-0 over Hillsboro-Deering, 25-20, 25-6 and 25-17. The Eagles overall were far more competitive in their Division II debut.

Kennett lost five players — Tayla Hutchins, Sam Johnson, Zoey Martins, Courtney Micciulla and Alex Samuel — to graduation in June.

Bartolomei is familiar with Kennett volleyball, having been a volun-

teer coach and a member of the Mt. Washington Valley Volleyball Club (formerly known as the Killian Mountaineers), which plays under the umbrella of the New England Region Volleyball Association (ages 6-18) and is made up primarily by players from Conway, North Conway, Bartlett, Jackson, Madison, Freedom, Center Conway, Fryeburg, Chatham, Meredith, Wolfeboro, Ossipee, Tamworth,

Berlin, Brownfield, Eaton, Effingham and Gorham.

Bartolomei also played the sport in high school and at the club level.

You always wish you had more time in the preseason," Bartolomei said by phone on Wednesday. "We do have some talent to work with. I coach in the (MWVV) Club and know a bunch of the girls."

FRYEBURG — Third-year Fryeburg Academy girls' varsity soccer Aoach Antonio Barrionuevo has shared three seasons with six juniors returning for their third varsity campaign. Combined with fourth-year varsity seniors Madi McIntyre, Sophie Kummer (co-captains) and Kayla Willard, plenty of veteran experience will be brought to the pitch for a group that has been competitive, but struggled to garner many victories as younger players. This autumn, the Raiders may well be ready to make a playoff run.

Coach Barrionuevo has been pleased with the Raiders' preseason, stating there "has been a battle with early injuries, but most of the girls showed up to preseason knowing what to expect and (they) prepared for it during the summer."

The veteran squad and coach have ramped up the soccer passion level and are prepared to approach the regular season with 25 committed athletes in the program.

Plenty of playing time, opportunity to experiment with player combinations and formations, and tightly contested scrimmages characterized the Raiders two preseason jamborees. Opening play at "The Nick" in Wolfeboro saw the Raiders drop a 1-0 session against the host Kingswood Knights and a 2-1 defeat against Maine rival Sacopee Valley. The Raiders bested stateline rival Kennett High 1-0 and finished at .500 on the day with a matching 1-0 win over Moultonborough.

Later last week the Raiders scored two wins, one loss and a tie at host Marshwood's preseason tourney, including a win over the larger Maine host high school. All 25 players gained experience in each of the opening jamborees.

Paring the roster to 15 full-time varsity players and two swing players who will see JV playing time as well, Barrionuevo's Raiders showed great form in a full-length preseason game,

a 6-0 victory over Mountain Valley last Saturday. A final tuneup at Class A Oxford Hills on Tuesday, leads into the regular season opener, at home on Friday hosting Poland at 4 p.m..

The Raiders will be strong and experienced in the middle of the field, starting with junior goalkeeper Morgan Fusco, who has great all-around athleticism.

Junior attacking midfielder Luna Barrionuevo is a year-round soccer player who "brings flare to the game," and will be counted on to orchestrate the attack, according to Coach and Dad Antonio. The entire midfield will be a team strength, with McIntyre, Hummer and Willard bringing "the experience to the game they have been playing for many years."





Windham was second with a score of 400, followed by Portsmouth, 408; Souhegan, 413; Kennett, 416; and Hollis/Brookline, 425.

"We played OK," said Bradley, a KHS Class of 1981 graduate. "I think we would have liked to play a little better. We had a shot at third."

Kennett went 18-7 during the regular season to finish tied for fourth overall with Hollis-Brookline in the

12-team Division II.

The championships were played in stroke format rather than the Stableford scoring system, which was used all season.

Traditionally, teams seek to score low when they are on the links, but not in 2018 or again in 2019. The NHIAA has opted to try the Stableford scoring system against this fall. Unlike stroke play, which rewards the lowest score, the Stableford system places points for various scores on a hole. Officials believed it would also speed up the pace of play.

Stableford scoring rewards 6 points for a double eagle, 5 for an eagle, 4 for a birdie, 3 for par, 2 for a bogey and 1 for double bogey. If the golfer hasn't finished the hole at double bogey, the hole is over and they receive no points.

"It is what it is," Bradley said when asked about the format again this season. "It's the same for every team."

Connor Tofflemoyer, a junior at the time, finished fourth overall on the day at Pease with a round of 76 (par is 71) to earn his way into the state individual tournament, which was played at the Derryfield Country Club in Manchester. Tofflemoyer shot a 94 to finish with a two-round score of 170 and finish tied for 11th, one stroke out of 10th and five away from eighth.

In the team event, Colby Hall, a junior, and Miles Woodbury, a senior, both shot 83; senior Riley Fletcher, 95; and junior Brady King, 100.

Seniors Tyler Brandon, Foster Piotrow and Jeffrey Palmer shot 84, 90 and 107, respectively. The trio were the lone seniors lost to graduation. Bradley and assistant coach Steve Piotrow have 23 athletes (down from a previous record 27 last year) out for the team this fall.

"Having Steve back helping has been great," Bradley said. "He's working with the JV kids which allow me to get on the course and (work with the starters)."

New to the team but certainly not new to the links multi-talented freshman Ben Dougherty, who is ranked No. 4 in the state in the youth golf rankings. Dougherty played in the World Teen Championships at famed Pinehurst No. 5 in North Carolina last summer.

"He's a very talented player," Bradley said, adding that Dougherty has

CONWAY — One more week. That's what Bernie Livingston, head coach of the Kennett High boys' and girls' cross-country teams, would like to see added to an ideal preseason calendar. Four weeks is what it takes to get athletes through a successful preseason and up to speed to put their best feet forward in the meets that count.

"Ideally, in my perfect world," said a smiling Livingston, who enters his 39th season at the helm of the cross-country program at KHS, "I'd like to open the first week with a mile time trial; hill running in the second week, the annual Kennett Challenge 2.2-mile run at the Kennett Middle School the third week, and then ease into the first race during the fourth week. The Kennett girls finished ninth overall out of the 18 scoring schools (teams that had at least five runners finish the race) with 259 points, one point behind Merrimack Valley.

The Kennett boys were 11th out of 19 scoring teams with 288 points. The Eagles were 14 points behind Hollis-Brookline for the 10th spot.

Other than it being a week shorter than they'd like, Livingston and Assistant Coach Eileen Livingston were pleased with how the preseason went.

FRYEBURG — After coming within five minutes of lifting the Class C crown last fall, Fryeburg Academy football fans are hoping for more excitement from the 2019 Raiders. 

Murray and Abrams will see plenty of time in the midfield and upfront.


The Eagles are hoping Habert-Jaques may be able to return at some point from a knee injury this season. She had been penciled in as the team's strike.


