nified basketball anticipates successful season

BERLIN - Veteran Coach Karen Turgeon returns and is looking forward to another exciting and successful season of Berlin High School Unified Basketball. For those not familiar with the New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association's unified program, it consists of students with special needs along with "partners" who assist them on the court.

As Karen told me, "It was nine years ago that the New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association and the New Hampshire Special Olympics got together and established the Unified Sports Program, which consisted of soccer, basketball, vollevball and track and field."

In the basketball program, there are three Special Olympic athletes and two typical peers (partners) on the court at the same time. Those three athletes can score baskets, while the partners can

help out in any way they can on the court, but they are not allowed to shoot baskets.

Turgeon said, "The partners not only help out the athletes on the court but also they are so very valuable in the locker room, on the bus and other places as they are great role models for the Special Olympic athletes."

Berlin got into the program eight years ago with six Special Olympic athletes and four peers, now they have 10 athletes and six peers," she said.

The program has been extremely successful, in fulfilling the purpose of fair play and opportunities for all, but also in terms of wins and losses, as they have advanced to the finals a number of years in a row.

Great coaching, excellent partners and a fantastic group of Special Olympic athletes to go along with tremendous support from the school and the community at large has created that success.

Berlin boys' basketball team sees rebuilding year

BERLIN — For Berlin High School's boys' basketball team and coaching staff, the 2019-20 season looks to be an almost total rebuilding year, with only three returning players with any varsity experience and, other than senior Jalen Lacasse, that experience is limited.

Coach Jared Lauze, who is working with assistant and junior varsity coach and former Berlin High basketball standout Nick Fodor, said the lack of Division III varsity experience this season will be a challenge for sure.

Lauze said, "Since we really have no standout

areas of strength, we will need to focus on the basic fundamentals, doing the little things and working to improve our basketball IQ, which means we will need to play smarter than our opponents to obtain success."

Lacasse, a lean, lanky lefty, is, as Lauze said, "most experienced player and most talented shooter, who can certainly knock down some shots, so we will need to create scoring opportunities for him."

Another senior, Matt Landry, Lauze described as a "very smart player with lots of hustle, who is considered the 'glue guy,' who sets standards with his work ethic, which results in improved play each day."

Senior Greg Brown is a newcomer to basketball

but his athleticism, quickness and strength, along with the fact that he is working hard on his game and learning the game daily, will be a plus for the team as the season progresses.

Also on the team is junior Shaun Goyette, who Lauze said is athletic, a quick defender and slasher to the basket. And once his confidence in his game improves with experience, his play will be a factor in the team's success.

Also playing a huge factor in that success will be sophomore Jacob Mercier, who as Lauze said, "is new to the varsity but with his strength and work

BERLIN — Berlin High School will bring back Nordic skiing, a sport that was very popular back in the day (including during my high school years of 1963-67)

It eventually was dropped, then reintroduced again 20 or so years ago, and for the past number of years has not been part of Berlin's winter sports programs

Rick Treiss will be the coach of this 'club sport', which normally consists of jumping, biathlon, and cross-country ski racing.

The team currently has only one athlete, Rick's daughter Cora Treiss, who will concentrate on cross-country ski racing.

Cora is a student at Berlin High School (and ran for the fall cross-country team) but will race as an independent athlete, training with the Kennett High School team in Conway, and competing with them in eight meets.

According to Rick, Cora has quite a background in cross-country ski racing, "having graduated from the Great Glen Trails Bill Koch Program, participated in those program races and trained under former Olympian Sue Wemyss (who heads the ski school at Great Glen Trails."

Coach Treiss sees this season as the "proof of concept phase for the club," adding, "My modest goal is to successfully represent Berlin High School at meets around the state, and hopefully inspire other athletes to take up Nordic skiing."



seen lots of time on the floor last season, is a smart player and strong leader. He is a 'glue guy,' helps keep everyone together, is very unselfish and will take on any role needed for the team to be successful."

Then there's Bailey Saladino, who Morrissette described as "a physically strong player, who will certainly contribute through tough play in the paint."

Trevor Doherty, he said, "comes back to the team after a year off and has shown great improvement and with his size, strength and natural ability will be a big part of any success we experience."

And, he said, "Aiden Booth comes into the program for the first time as a senior and is paying attention, working hard and contributing and should, even more, as the season progresses."

The juniors on the team consist of Aiden Etienne, Anthony Frisk, Wyatt Deblois, Richard Burton and Cullen Anderson.

Etienne, is a returning starter. Morrissette said he "has excellent instincts offensively and defensively, attacks the basket and can score from the perimeter, and will definitely be an impact player for us."

"Anthony Frisk is also a returning starter with solid ball-handling skills and looks to push the ball up the court in transition. Not only can he attack the basket but he can spot up for perimeter shots, and with the speed he has and his ability to score, combined with the potential to be one of the floor leaders he is another impact player," Morrissette said.

He described Deblois as "a smooth offensive player, with a good mid-range shot, he can handle the ball at the guard position or play as a forward. His size has increase and therefore should be a force in the paint regarding rebounding."

Burton, he said, "is long, athletic, has good instincts around the basket and each and every day continues to improve his game."

Rounding out the team, Morrissette said, "Anderson comes to us as a first year player and he has speed and explosive moves and I am looking forward to watching him improve throughout the season."

Morrissette said: "There are no easy games on our schedule, and the North Country teams are consistently in the top tier of Division IV. We will be looking to create an up tempo game that will utilize our guard play and the experience of our returning veterans. Defensively, we want to create ball pressure, forcing teams to make plays on offense.

The younger players are improving and finding their niches as they become accustomed to the team's offensive and defensive sets, but Cassady is not sure yet what roles they will have.


Cassady is in his fifth year coaching Gorham basketball and his 11th season overall coaching varsity sports.



Kennett High cross-country skiers eye state championships

CONWAY — Quality over quantity will be the recipe for success this season for the Kennett High cross-country ski teams. While there are 13 girls out for the team this year as the Eagles make a run for sixth consecutive Division II State Championship, there are only seven boys out for the sport this season, the lowest number in more than a decade.

"We have two pretty solid groups," Steve Vosburgh, Eagles' head coach, said by phone Sunday. "I think we have some good skiers and good competitors."

Last winter, the girls' cross-country ski team won its fifth consecutive Division II State Championship in Gilford, while the KHS boys came oh-so-close to winning a record eighth team title in a row, but Hanover turned in sensational scores in the skate race to win the crown by just nine points.

Along with a state championship and a runner-up plaque, Vosburgh's Eagles cleaned up on the individual hardware. Senior Hannah Thelemarck won the classical race, while teammate Helen Badger, a junior, won the freestyle (skate), and senior Aidan Hagerty made it a true daily-double by winning both the classical and freestyle races for the boys. It was the second year in a row that Hagerty won both titles.

The Kennett girls won both the classical and freestyle races to take overall team honors in the 10-school field with 758 points to top Hanover, 739, while Lebanon rounded out the Top 3 with 731 points.

The Kennett boys won the classical team event by five points, but Hanover took the honors in the afternoon freestyle by 14 to win overall by nine points, winning with a combined score of 756 points, followed by KHS, 747, while Bow and Lebanon tied for third with 703 points.

"Hats off to Hanover," Vosburgh said Sunday when talking about last year's championship for the boys. "It was a great performance by them. They had the better day and their skiers worked hard to hold us off."

He added: "I heard my boys afterward, saying, 'That's not going to happen next year.' I think that's serving as motivation for some."

Hagerty and Thelemarck were named to All-State.

The Broomhall Nordic Award was presented to Thelemarck, while the Most Improved Award went to junior Chris Desmarais.

There are just seven boys out for the team (down from 10 last year): seniors Keith Badger and Chris Desmaris; juniors Sam Alkalay, Dominick Perry and Caleb White; sophomore Theo Castonguay, and freshman Ben Biche.

There are 13 girls (down from 21 last year) out for cross-country this winter: seniors Helen Badger, Grace Castonguay and Madelyn Marcotte; juniors Lia Anzaldi, Shannon Derby, Dylan Derby and Kathryn Hawkes; sophomores Maya Gove, Jordan Meir and Grace Perley, and freshmen Jocelyn Anzaldi, Carli Krebs and Mara Taylor.

There were just four cross-country skiers at the middle school level last between Kennett Middle School and Josiah Bartlett Elementary School.

"I think Hannah (Lucy, middle school coach) has 18

out this year, which great," Vosburgh said. "If they can stick with it we stand a chance of growing the numbers (at the high school)."

Kennett has only been practicing since Dec. 10. The start of the season has again been pushed back three weeks statewide for the fourth winter in a row to have teams skiing more and dryland training less.

Vosburgh likes the new season configuration, but this is the first season where winter has been hard to find.

"Let's hope this week we'll get some snow and all will be good," he said. "In Whitaker Woods (in North Conway), if we can get a couple of inches of snow, there are places you can ski."

Unable to get on the snow, the Eagles have been forced to resort to dryland training and working on conditioning. While roller skiing is an option, not everyone is keen to go that route, according to Vosburgh. "Some people aren't wild about pavement," he said.

Vosburgh and assistant coach Scott Lajoie are optimistic about both the team's chances this winter.

"My thing is we try to get better every day and the other things will happen," he said. "I want them to have fun, ski better than the day before and when it's time to race, go out and execute and we'll see what happens."

He added: "We've got a really good group. They're a tight bunch, which makes it quite fun."

The Eagles are scheduled to open the season on Jan. 3 with a sprint race at Gunstock Ski Area in Gilford.

"I'm pretty confident that will happen," Vosburgh said. "If they have the conditions to make snow they can make a pile of it and have the ability to move it with a front-end loader and a manure spreader. It's old-fashioned, but it works."

Kennett is scheduled to host a sprint race at Great Glen Trails in Pinkham Notch on Jan. 15.

"A two-person sprint race ought to be a good early season workout," Vosburgh said. "When you don't have a ton of snow for a base, if we can ski up to a 2K loop, it won't be horribly far off from a regular race when you do three rounds."

Great Glen Trails will be the site of the State Cross-Country Championships for all four divisions on March 3-4, with two divisions skiing each day.

"Next year," Vosburgh said, "the plan is to go to two divisions (down from four) for skiing. I think that will probably be better for the sport. I try to race all of the schools (in the state) at least once. I like to see everyone more than just at N.H. Nordic Coaches Association Series races."

The first NHNCA Series race is scheduled for Feb. 1 at Gunstock, while the second is slated for White Mountains Regional High School in Whitefield on Feb. 22.


