Outbreak leads to case surge

County is up to 55 cases after 21 are reported at Sea View Senior Living facility

Curry County added 22 more cases in the week since Oct. 7, bringing the total to 55 cases. Except for one, all of the new cases are centered in Brookings at Sea View Senior Living's long term memory care unit, with one patient hospitalized with symptoms, according to the press release from Curry County Public Health. Other Sea View patients were

Of the Seaview cases, 19 positives are memory care residents, according to a letter to residents, families and healthcare partners that Executive Director Cristi Parada forwarded to The Pilot. "Each is asymptomatic and not showing any signs or symptoms, which we are grateful to see," Parada said in the letter. She was unable to comment on the reported hospitalization when asked.

In addition to the nineteen residents, six cases are staff members, some of which are residents of Del Norte County and are not included in Curry County's numbers. "All are at home resting and will begin to return to work in the next few days as their mandatory quarantine period expires," Parada said.

Sea View is isolating memory care workers from the independent and assisted living portion of the facility.

"We have two teams employed at Sea View; one is memory care focused, and the other assists our independent and assisted living residents," she said. "We are relieved that our independent and assisted staff continue to pass their tests.

"We strive to maintain a heightened awareness and vigilance to this pandemic. Visitors are restricted and Sea View continues to implement social distancing during meals, using disposable dining ware, and modifying activities for our

Broadband project moves forward

Weighing the risks vs. the rewards

Zoom meetings, telecommuting and online school are now the daily struggle with internet speeds resembling molasses in January on a jammed internet superhighway. High-speed internet has gone beyond being just a good idea for entertainment to becoming an essential tool for work and school.

Last March in a story by The Pilot, Coos-Curry Electric Co-op (CCEC) announced plans to explore installation of a fiber optic network to provide high-speed internet to all CCEC members. Fast forward to today and they are now taking names, deposits and commitments for their future products with a nearer future on the horizon for serving their first group of customers by mid-April 2021. For many southern Oregon coastal residents the new service would be welcome — the sooner the better.

CCEC first began exploring interest amongst its co-op members with a December 2018 survey. While the company isn't willing to publish the survey, Jacob Knudsen, Marketing and Membership Services Manager shared that "17 percent of CCEC members do not have access to the internet at their homes and another 15 percent are critically underserved. Additionally, nearly 60 percent of members indicated they are likely or very likely to subscribe to broadband service if offered by CCEC."

Beacon Broadband, a for-profit subsidiary of CCEC, was incorporated this past June. In September, a webpage with a low-key rollout emerged on CCEC's website announcing the new subsidiary. "Accessing twenty-first-century digital services such as telemedicine, remote telecommuting, and distance learning can be challenging, given the current bandwidth constraints in much of CCEC's service territory," according to the website. "CCEC's Beacon Broadband project is intended to solve this problem by bringing the high-speed fiber experience where no one else will go."

The Beacon Broadband webpage provides suggested pricing, describes internet plans, plus TV and phone services. Internet costs range from \$55 per month for the most basic internet service plan to \$130 per month for their 1 Gigabit service. Optional TV packages and phone service are additional. The FAQ section of the website discusses in depth the potential rewards as well as risks.

The website also asks those who are interested in the service to pre-register. The registration fee of \$50 is a modest request of earnest money that will help the company gauge the degree of commitment and interest in the project. It is actually a deposit that will double in value as a bill credit once the services are available in the subscriber's area.

Curry County does not currently have any fiber optic

Curry County finalizes ballot drop sites for election

Voter registrations surge in county before deadline

Curry County has 18,964 registered voters as of Oct. 14, an increase of more than 6 percent from 17,789 last year, with 138 of those new registrations just in October. "We've been very busy lately," said Shelley Denney, Chief Deputy in the Curry County Elections Office. Where those ballots end up is important. Ballots of registered voters need to be marked and received in an official drop box or in the County Clerk's office by 8 p.m. on election day, Nov. 3. to be counted in this year's general election.

Postmarks do not count in Oregon. The County Elections Office recommends mailing no later than Oct. 27. Postage is not required.

If you want to be certain your ballot is received on time, you can drop it off at one of the locations below.

Drug takeback set for Oct. 24 at Sheriff's Office in Gold Beach

The Curry County Sheriff's Office is taking back unwanted prescription drugs from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 24 at the Curry County Sheriff's Office at 29808 Colvin St., Gold Beach.

The Curry County Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) have provided 19 opportunities over the past 9 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs.

Bring your pills for disposal to the Curry County Sheriff's Office. They can only accept pills and patches and cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

'Our last event in October 2019 we collected 100

pounds of unwanted medications between our two collection sites in Harbor and Gold Beach," said Corporal Jeremy Krohn, Corrections Division, Curry County Sheriff's Office. "In April 2019 we collected 55 pounds of unwanted medications in Gold Beach, and our first event in October 2018, we collected 110 pounds of unwanted medications. This event typically happens every

fall and spring, but due to COVID-19 the spring collection was cancelled." This year due to

COVID-19 precautions people are asked to observe the recommendations from the CDC by wearing a mask while in the building to drop off unwanted medications.

"It is my goal to do collection events through-



out the county, alternating North vs South county," Krohn said. "For example, If we did Harbor and Gold Beach in the fall, I would like to do Port Orford and Gold Beach in the spring. But again, due to the COVID restrictions, I have had to consolidate my efforts this year."

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.º

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines-flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards. The collected medications are turned over to the DEA for incineration at a regional facility in Washington. 



Curry nonprofits receive funds

THE PILOT

Coronavirus Relief Fund Cultural Support (CRFCS) grant awards totaling \$25.7 million will be distributed to 621 cultural organizations across Oregon through a partnership between the Oregon Cultural Trust and its County and Tribal Cultural Coalitions. The funds, allocated to the Cultural Trust for Oregon cultural organizations facing losses due to the COVID-19 health crisis, were made available through a \$50 million relief package for Oregon culture approved by the Emergency Board of the Oregon Legislature in July.

In Curry County, a total of \$57,264 was awarded to seven organizations: Brookings Harbor Education Foundation, Inc., Brookings, \$3,086; Chetco Valley Historical Society, Brookings, \$6,989; Curry Coast Community Radio, Brookings, \$3,985; Curry County Historical Society, Gold Beach, \$8,317; Harmony & Me Music Outreach, Brookings, \$7,326; Nature's Coastal Holiday, Inc., Brookings, \$14,007; and Wild Rivers Coast Foundation for Dance, Brookings, \$13,554.

"Many cultural organizations and institutions have closed their doors to help keep us all safe during this pandemic. These grants will mean that more than 600 Oregon arts and culture organizations across our state's counties and Tribes will be able to keep up their vital creative work," said Governor Kate Brown. "Everything from museums to fairgrounds to the summer events we all know and love can continue to enrich our lives-connecting us to


one another and giving us the hope and inspiration we need."

"These funds are life blood to Oregon's cultural community," added Chuck Sams, chair of the Cultural Trust Board of Directors. "While they won't replace all the losses suffered during the pandemic, they will ensure Oregon culture survives this crisis. We are deeply grateful to the Oregon Legislature for making this possible."

The largest award is \$1.4 million to the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry; the average grant award is \$41,458. Just under \$90 million in requests were received from 751 organizations; 130 organizations were ineligible for awards based on program guidelines.

"Due to the incredible need, we were able to fund a percentage of organizations' eligible expenses," said Brian Rogers, Cultural Trust executive director. "Smaller organizations received a higher percentage of their eligible expenses. The final awards represent a statewide, equitable distribution plan that was approved by our Board of Directors, the Governor's Office, Business Oregon and our legislative sponsors."

The organizations to receive funding include cultural institutions, county fairgrounds, cultural entities within federally recognized Indian Tribes based in Oregon, festivals and community event organizations, in addition to some for-profit organizations that have significant cultural impact in their communities. Awards will be issued directly to the organizations by their local County or Tribal Coalition.

networks. The experience of a fiber optic network is like night and day compared to cable, satellite and cellular network services. Imagine being able to download a high-definition, full feature-length, broadcast-quality movie in a matter of seconds instead of hours. It can be that fast, as in up to 100 times as fast as your current service.

Having high speed broadband available would not only improve daily life in our "new normal" but could even attract high-tech companies and good paying jobs to replace timber and fishing jobs that have diminished over the last decade or two. That outcome could allow grown children to remain in their communities with living wage jobs instead of taking flight to the bigger world to make their fortunes.

CCEC views the broadband project to be as important to our rural communities as the Rural Electrification Project. "Needless to say, we are very excited about the benefits high-quality reasonably priced broadband will bring to our communities," Knudsen said. "I personally feel this is as important as bringing electricity to underserved rural communities was 80 years ago."

Every big project inherently contains risks that go along with rewards. To explore some of the questions people in the community need to consider, we asked CCEC a few questions. Here are the questions, and replies from Knudsen.

Q: Has preregistration on the Beacon website provided any indication of how the project is being received now that people are being asked to provide "earnest money" to back up their support?

A: People seem to be very interested in the project and we have exceeded our early benchmarks for preregistration. Despite a soft rollout of the preregistration program, we are excited about the number of registrants and the grassroots efforts by community members to help spread the word.

Q: Where has Beacon Broadband planned to begin deployment or building the broadband project?

A: The Beacon Broadband project is in the early stages of development. CCEC has applied for federal funding and will know the status of that request by the end of the year. Once funding is secured, detailed engineering will begin and building the network will follow. Beacon Broadband will use a rolling design and build process in which some areas will be built before other areas are designed. Our current timeline is to provide service to the first group of customers by mid-2021 and the

network completely built by 2025. Q: What is the basis for building makes economic sense. Some non-CCEC members may receive service before it is available to all CCEC members. The network will be built following a deployment plan designed to achieve the highest chance of success.

Q: While I'm excited about possibly getting Broadband, I don't live in a densely populated area and my address is 5 miles from U.S. Highway 101. Previously, I lived less than a half-mile from a DSL line, which the provider would not extend even that very short distance because the farms were too far apart for it to pay off. Is it possible my address may be low on the priority list? or possibly the never list?

A: Beacon Broadband will make service available to every person in the designated service area who wishes to subscribe to service. We plan to have the network built in its entirety by 2025.

Q: When we spoke last spring, Mr. Bischoff, General Manager and CEO, indicated that CCEC planned to make fiber broadband available to every single CCEC customer. Has this changed, especially since the company is now for profit?

A: The initial goal of bringing fiber to the premise of every CCEC customer, who wishes to subscribe, has not changed - this goal is a fundamental cornerstone of the project.

Q: I was a little surprised to see that the Broadband business model is "for profit" and not as a cooperative. My earlier perception of it as a cooperative venture led me to believe services would be covered more or less at cost, which would certainly advantage CCEC over competitors. What happens to the profit (or loss) and how does that affect CCEC members?

A: Our planning process involved examining several possible organizational structures ranging from being a division of CCEC to a fully independent and investor-owned company. All organizational structures had pros and cons. We found that the wholly-owned, for-profit subsidiary structure aligned best with CCEC's goals, provided the best opportunity for providing services and for receiving state and federal funds, and offered the greatest regulatory flexibility. As a wholly-owned subsidiary of CCEC, any profit (or loss) passes through to CCEC. The commitment to service those that other internet service providers choose not to demonstrates Beacon Broadband's focus on community benefit over profit margins.

Q: What is the total expected cost of the Beacon Broadband Project?

A: The total cost of the project is expected not to exceed \$64 million.

Q: The project description says that you will be seeking grant funding but also apply for loan funding. How much of the cost is expected/ hoped to be received in federal and state funds?

of opportunities that should be made available through the expansion of Oregon's broadband fund approved this year.

Q: Will you be applying for any nongovernmental grant funding?

A: We may apply for nongovernmental grant funding; however, we are very careful of the other uses of these funds. Many nongovernmental foundations provide funding to critical social services programs throughout southwest Oregon. We want to ensure we do not draw funds from these programs to support our project.

Q: How much would be paid for with a loan? the anticipated dollar amount of the loan? Worst or best-case scenarios?

A: All of the projects costs not covered by grant funds will be covered by loans. Because of the 10-year subsidy payment model of the primary federal program we are working with, we may have to borrow up to \$60 million.

Q: Would there be financial investors with a stake or interest in having broadband?

A: Beacon Broadband will be wholly owned by CCEC; we will not solicit other financial investors.

Q: What is the security for the loan?

A: CCEC has the borrowing capacity and relationship to lending institutions necessary to secure the loans needed.

Q: If the project fails, who will be responsible for the loan?

A: The project is backed by a business plan that uses very conservative assumptions regarding the number of subscribers and worst-case scenarios for construction costs. In the unlikely event the project fails, CCEC will be responsible for the unrecovered costs after the network assets are sold.

Q: Is it possible the loan might compromise CCEC's ability to handle an emergency for its electric services by compromising the coop's borrowing ability?

A: CCEC is in a very healthy financial position. CCEC's board has directed that the broadband project not jeopardize CCEC's ability to respond to an emergency. Despite the decrease in equity as money is borrowed to build the fiber network, CCEC will still have sufficient borrowing capacity to respond to an emergency.

Q: What are the financial goals of Beacon Broadband within the first year of deployment?

A: The network will be deployed in a manner that allows us to connect subscribers as soon as possible so Beacon Broadband can start covering its loan payments.

Q: If the goal is to be a self-sustaining for-profit subsidiary of CCEC, how long will it take and how many CCEC members would need to become subscribers (average between 100mbps-1GB)? A: The timeline to achieve self-sustaining revenues depends largely on the amount of subsidy funding we receive from the primary federal program we have applied to and how fast we are able to build the network and connect subscribers. We have based our business plan on fairly conservative assumptions (that is, lower take rates and higher construction costs than we hope for or expect) We expect the broadband project to be self-sustaining by the fourth year of the project.

A: Many factors contribute to deciding which areas Beacon Broadband will build first. Some of the key drivers include the layout of the network, the cost to build network segments, and the interest shown by communities through pre-registrations.

Q: Would non-CCEC members possibly get Broadband before all CCEC members are served?

A: Beacon Broadband will be serving customers outside of the CCEC service territory where it



Past political/civic experience: I currently work for a local non-profit that helps persons with disabilities find and maintain meaningful employment. Previously I worked for the Oregon Department of Human Services-Aging and People with Disabilities to create the Transition/Diversion Program in Curry County serving our most at-risk seniors. I served as the elected Chair for SEIU 503 representing Coos and Curry Counties, not only did I represent local DHS staff, I was also elected to the bargaining team for the Statewide contract that covers all represented staff working in the state of Oregon.

What inspired you to run?

I was elected to a position that afforded me the opportunity to travel to Salem and advocate for the needs of rural state employees. During that time, it became clear to me to make a true impact in my community I would need to focus on a more localized level. Although I was not charged with representing County Employees, I was made aware of issues within the county that were unaddressed. Curry County is not dissimilar from our Federal Government in that it has many elected officials that have governed unopposed for decades. I believe that everyone deserves a choice in representation so I decided to run, if for no other reason to give the citizens of Curry an option. I am dismayed by the lack of candidate choices presented on the ballot. I have actively tried to find solutions and the only solution I had was to add my name is a small attempt to provide a choice. I believe that as an honorable and transparent Clerk I would be an asset to the county elected team. I am inspired by the generations of amazing women who came before me that knew we needed to have a voice. This year commemorates the 100year anniversary of the passage of the nineteenth amendment, which guaranteed the right of women to vote. It is in honor of the women that came before me to not only exercise my right to vote, but to run for the office that is entrusted with coordinating and conducting elections

throughout the county in an effort to provide that choice I would like to see in governance.

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the county?

Curry County has experienced multiple devastating economic events in the last few years from the Chetco Bar Fire, to the 101 washout, and now COVID. We cannot survive as a tourist economy when tourism can be heavily impacted at any time. We need to recruit for different revenue streams and economic sustainability while diversifying the county to be less reliant on inconsistent revenue sources.

As a Gerontologist I have concerns that we have hindered our citizens in ease of access to changing policy and procedure enacted at the state and federal level. Partnership between county departments is critical for our citizens. I would like to see fruitful collaboration with departments like Assessor, Board of Commissioners, Community Development and the State to cultivate a program where building and sustaining a livelihood isn't a bared by inefficient processes. Like many counties we face a housing shortage that disproportionately affects our workforce and creates barriers to recruiting and retaining a solid workforce capable of providing the services we need. I believe it is imperative that we use all our resources collaboratively to create a sustainable future for the county.

How would you try to address those issues?

Many issues facing our county cannot be solved by one person, rather I believe we need to work towards collaborative efforts that engage many community partnerships working towards common goals. I have been a part of the housing task force for some time. It is a great example of a collaboration of many people coming together to find solutions to a common problem. I have developed and implemented two different programs in the community and have learned from those experiences that buy-in from the community is a requirement to success. As I networked throughout the County, I often found visitors voicing frustrations with wanting to marry and bring family in for the celebration, only to be denied resource from the Clerk's office. Working with Economic Development and county partners, I would help build a sustainable event program that would bring significant visitor dollars while allowing others to share in the beauty that we get to call home. Implementing changes can be a costly process as the Clerk's office is already heavily reliant on the general fund, I will use my background in grant writing to seek

out opportunities to help develop more accessible programs without burdening the taxpayers in the process.

What would you like to accomplish if elected?

I would like to see greater transparency in budgets and services provided, understanding staff needs for adequate supportive training services, improve upon employee retention and building capacity in the effort to more efficiently budget for a department that is not self-sustained. I would support implementing technology programs that would give citizens easier and efficient access to data. I would support outreach to the community to assist in understanding the ORSs and what they can expect from an elected official. I would pursue grant funding that would reduce the Clerk's office dependency on the general fund and help explore ways to capitalize on the possibilities of revenue generation within the office.

I would like to see greater transparency with the public; elections are a time to pay attention. Elected officials should be held accountable for providing updated and accurate information in a timely manner. I would be more active with the citizens in making sure they know what is going on throughout the elections process. The people elect officials to lead; any good leader knows that the mark of success is measured by the ability to ensure everyone they represent is equally accounted for.

What do you feel the relationship should be between county departments and the public?

The relationship should be that of trust and engagement in the decision-making process. The public should expect that an elected official will represent their needs while maintaining compliance of law. County departments should have a countywide plan for transparency in communicating changes that affect the public. This really should start at the top with the Board of Commissioners and Elected setting a precedence and example for department heads and in turn, other jurisdictions. The public expects government on every level to work together, collaborate, and streamline for efficiencies, cost saving measures, and planning for the future based on data and research. Government is established to work for the people and should make every possible effort to represent the needs of the collective. Individual departments are created to specialize in their given duties and find the most prudent and fiscally responsible ways to serve the public. Together they should ensure a cohesive and sustainable future for the county.

What inspired you to run?

When I first decided to run for Curry County Clerk in 1992 it was because I wanted to make a difference. The current County Clerk was retiring and I was the Elections Coordinator in the Elections Department so the time felt right for me to step up and run for public office.

I continue to run because I am a proud public servant, we have built an excellent team, and we are passionate about what we do.

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the county?

The County Clerk is responsible for the administration elections and maintaining the Public Land Record for Curry County. We are Passport Agents, issue Death Certificates

and Marriage Licenses. These mandated services are extremely important to our citizens.

The important issue is keeping these services modernized, viable and free from outside influences to meet the needs of the public.

How would you try to address those issues? When I first started in

the county elections office, elections were conducted at the polling place and ballots were counted by hand. By 1988 we moved to automate the counting process and we conducted our first election using optical scanned ballots in September 1989.

About that same time, County Clerks were finding that half of the voters were going to polls and others were voting absentee. We were conducting a "polling place" and a "vote by mail" election at the same time, which was extremely challenging and expensive.

In 1998 the people placed the vote by mail issue on the ballot and it passed statewide with 70 percent in favor. Vote by mail has dramatically increased voter participation.

In 2005 I participated on the steering committee to help implement Oregon's Statewide Voter Registration System.

In 2008 Curry and Yamhill Counties were first in the state to upgrade to a digital tabulation system.

In 2016 Oregon's Motor Voter Bill was implemented and Curry County's voter registration climbed from approximately 14,000 to over 18,000.

We have also conducted many separate conversions to modernize and update the Recording Department's Computer Systems which also makes it easier for the public to use since 1992. Additionally we are digitizing the County Clerk Historical Land records from 1856 to 1960. The next conversion phase will digitize the microfilm records from 1960 through 1992. County Clerks Records from 1992 to present have already been

digitized. We have implemented the "Digital Research Room" for Citizens who want to look up indexes to the land records "online."

E-recording was successfully launched in 2017 and we are now recording about as many electronic recording instruments as we do paper instruments.

We are close to deploying our new Marriage License Application to assist the public in applying for their marriage license "online."

What would you like to accomplish if elected?

Our goal is to continue to monitor trends in modernizing the Elections and Recording functions and implement those trends that are right for the citizens of Curry County. We will continue to cross train our employees, keep them current and, as always, continue our efforts to provide effective and efficient public service with a smile.

What do you feel the relationship should be between county departments and the public?

As county officials we should always strive to be available to our citizens to listen, learn and remain open to changes in our citizen's attitudes. We need to remember that we are here to serve and to provide proven, experienced and trusted public services.

I am pleased to report the in a 2015 public survey, the Curry County Clerk's office received the highest approval rating of all county departments for services provided.

Oregon Health Authority surveys residents on pandemic attitudes

The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has a glimpse into Oregonians' actions and attitudes relating to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In two statewide surveys commissioned by the OHA, the results show a majority of Oregonians' are taking steps to limit the spread of COVID-19, but some are still wary of the efficacy of personal protective measures as case counts across the state continue to trend upward. "Over the past few weeks we've seen a steady rise of COVID-19 cases in Oregon," OHA Deputy State Health Officer Thomas Jeanne said. "When a virus is in a community, we know it will spread if people don't take precautions. This increase in cases has reversed the progress we made in late summer."

The study illuminated the patterns and behaviors of individuals around the state and gives the OHA a baseline to move forward with public health messaging to encourage residents to stay safe. "We did find that Oregonians are avoiding large group gatherings, somewhat," said Michelle Neiss, president of DHM Research, the company that conducted one of the surveys. The results of the DHM survey, which sampled 1,009 residents, indicated that 20% of Oregonians attended a gathering of 10 people or more in the two weeks prior to responding.

"Those are the kinds of events that are high risk and can further community spread which brings the virus into workplaces, nursing homes and make people sick," OHA Director of Communications Rob Cowie said.

Overall, the survey found that people who gather together frequently are the ones who are more skeptical that protective measures help, Neiss said.

For example, 52% of respondents who answered that they are unlikely to quarantine if they contract the virus also answered that they do not believe it is necessary.

A separate survey focused on Latinx Oregonians by Lara Media found that 69.4% of the 468 respondents said they were very likely to stay home if they experienced any COVID-19 symptoms or were exposed to someone with the virus.

Of those who answered they would not stay home, 42.9% said they would not stay home because they are the only one in their household who works and they need to support their family.

"Keep in mind most of the people we interview are essential workers, which puts them in a higher risk of getting the virus," said Victoria Lara, owner of Lara Media.

Of Latinx residents between the ages of 18-24, about seven out of 10 stated they were very worried about friends and family getting the virus more so than themselves.

About four in 10 respondents to the DHM survey said they would definitely get the vaccine if it becomes available, and about three in 10 of respondents to the Lara Media survey said they would definitely get the vaccine.

The important thing to focus on is continuing to take personal protective measures, Cowie said.

"Even when vaccine comes, it will not be a silver bullet," Cowie said. "We will all need to engage in these behaviors for a while."

Sheriff's Office urges caution about scams

Phone and internet scammers are back at it. They love to use the same old tricks in new ways. One of their favorites is to pose as a business or government official to pressure you into sending them money or personal information. Now, some will direct you to get onto your computer and enter a web address into the web browser so you can fill out the service/cancelation contract.

The issue is, once you enter the web address you are provided and hit the "enter" button, your computer is connected to THE SCAMMER'S network and they now computer, phone or tablet at their direction.

#2 Check your credit card account. If you see a charge you don't recognize, file a dispute with your credit card company immediately. #3 Notify local law ap

#3 Notify local law enforcement. The people perpetrating these scams are from overseas more often than not and out of reach for local law enforcement. However, should you suffer a financial loss, your banking institution/credit card company is going to want to know it was reported. Finally, these are only two of the most current scams people are actually falling victim to on a daily basis. The people perpetrating these scams have nothing better to do than to figure out new ways to separate you from your money and there are endless phone, email and check cashing scams out there. Always be suspicious of unsolicited emails

or text messages; delete them without opening them if you can.

If it seems too good to be true, it is. You should never have to pay money to get money. And no one is going to pay you \$8,000 a month to drive around with a Dr. Pepper sticker on your car.

Should you feel the need to contact the company they are reporting themselves to be, you can locate the company's contact information on their actual website to include a contact phone number. You can also call 411 and ask directory assistance for the company's information.



scammers are pretending to be popular online shopping websites, phishing for your personal information.

Phishing, pronounced "fishing" is the fraudulent practice of sending emails or making phone calls purporting to be from reputable companies in order to induce individuals to reveal personal information, such as passwords and credit card numbers.

For example, you get a call from someone who claims to be with "Amazon.com." (Spoiler: they're not from Amazon.) The person will say that your credit card has been charged a large amount of money for an order. Then, they'll give you the "Amazon Support" phone number and tell you to immediately call if you didn't make that purchase.

If this seems suspicious, that's because it is. Scammers want you to call the number they give so they can ask for your passwords, credit card number, and other sensitive information to get your money.

Another version of the same scam is to call and "alert you" that your card has been charged \$40.00 or \$50.00 to open an Amazon Prime account. The person on the phone will ask you if you want to continue service with Amazon or cancel it. Regardless of your choice, the person have full access to YOUR computer. That includes all programs, pictures, files, emails, contact lists, Facebook, etc.

Even if you don't have your banking information on your device, they will harvest all the information they can from it. This can lead to further attacks and potential scam attacks on your family and friends as well.

If you get a call like this, there are a few steps you should take:

#1 Hang up. Don't call them back on the number they gave you. Do not enter any websites into your



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


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CCH supports schools
