Of the Seaview cases, 19 positives are memory care residents, according to a letter to residents, families and healthcare partners that Executive Director Cristi Parada forwarded to The Pilot. "Each is asymptomatic and not showing any signs or symptoms, which we are grateful to see," Parada said in the letter. She was unable to comment on the reported hospitalization when asked. In addition to the nineteen residents, six cases are staff members, some of which are residents of Del Norte County and are not included in Curry County's numbers. "All are at home resting and will begin to return to work in the next few days as their mandatory quaran-

tine period expires," Parada said. Sea View is isolating memory care workers from the independent and assisted living portion of the facility. Drug takeback set for Oct. 24 at Sheriff’s Office in Gold Beach

The Curry County Sheriff’s Office is taking back unwanted prescription drugs from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 24 at the Curry County Sheriff’s Office at 29808 Colvin St., Gold Beach.

The Curry County Sheriff’s Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) have provided 19 opportunities over the past 9 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs.

Bring your pills for disposal to the Curry County Sheriff’s Office. They can only accept pills and patches and cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

“Our last event in October 2019 we collected 100

pounds of unwanted medications between our two collection sites in Harbor and Gold Beach,” said Corporal Jeremy Krohn, Corrections Division, Curry County Sheriff’s Office. “In April 2019 we collected 55 pounds of unwanted medications in Gold Beach, and our first event in October 2018, we collected 110 pounds of unwanted medications. This event typically happens every fall and spring, but due to COVID-19 the spring collection was cancelled.”

This year due to COVID-19 precautions people are asked to observe the recommendations from the CDC by wearing a mask while in the building to drop off unwanted medications.

“It is my goal to do collection events through-



out the county, alternating North vs South county,” Krohn said. “For example, If we did Harbor and Gold Beach in the fall, I would like to do Port Orford and Gold Beach in the spring. But again, due to the COVID restrictions, I have had to consolidate my efforts this year.”

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration’s National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else’s medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet.

In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards. The collected medications are turned over to the DEA for incineration at a regional facility in Washington.

Blood donations play a crucial role in cancer treatment

Diane Doehrman began donating blood during college. In the years following, she became a platelet donor and even helped start blood drives in her community.

More recently, Doehrman’s been on the receiving end of blood donations. Fourteen years ago, she was diagnosed with breast cancer. Now she has an incurable cancer, malignant mixed Müllerian tumor.

“As a cancer patient, I had to have blood transfusions several times when the chemotherapy treatments have destroyed my immune system,” she said. “I am so very thankful for the donations from others. It can truly save a life.”

Cancer patients undergoing surgery and chemotherapy may require red blood cell or platelet transfusions. In fact, patients fighting cancer need more blood than those with any other disease, using nearly one-quarter of the nation’s blood supply.

Important COVID-19 information for donors

The Red Cross is testing blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies. The test may indicate if the donor’s immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus,

regardless of whether an individual developed COVID-19 symptoms. Red Cross antibody tests will be helpful to identify individuals who have COVID-19 antibodies and may now help current coronavirus patients in need of convalescent plasma transfusions. Convalescent plasma is a type of blood donation collected from COVID-19 survivors that have antibodies that may help patients who are actively fighting the virus.

COVID-19 antibody test results will be available within one to two weeks in the Red Cross Blood Donor App or donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org. A positive antibody test result does not confirm infection or immunity. The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test. To protect the health and safety of Red Cross staff and donors, it is important that individuals who do not feel well or believe they may be ill with COVID-19 postpone donation.

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions – including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff – have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face covering or mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.

assisted living and independent living residents.

The facility is testing in house and sending the tests to Vikor Labs, which is able to return results quick-

ly. “Our teams will provide updates at each shift and notify family if any tests are positive,” Parada said.

The latest outbreak places approximately 82 percent of Curry County’s cases in Brookings. Last week, 23 of 33 cases were from Brookings, but that

number now stands at 45. Statewide in Oregon, cases have also been rising from 35,634 to 38,160, with deaths rising to 608. In Del Norte County, cases rose from last week’s 160 confirmed cases to 170, with 13 considered active as of Oct. 13.

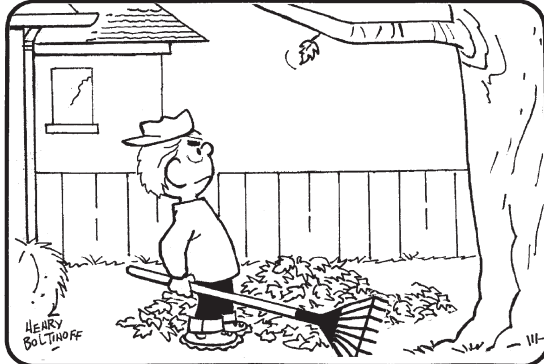

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the state?
Firstly, the economic impact of the recent restrictions placed on Oregonians, especially rural Oregonians to perform work due to the State mandates. Secondly, while rural Oregonian’s property taxes have skyrocketed, most people don’t know that between 1990 - 2012 Oregon’s political leadership drastically altered property tax laws for Wall Street Timber corporations. Wall Street Timber had a 90% decrease of property tax, and a 99 percent cut in

harvest severance.
Before 1990 this went to fund Public Safety and other rural county services. On real numbers that is a \$50 million loss to rural Oregonians every year
How would you try to address those issues?
We need logical and factual solutions to these issues that are based on the numbers and data, not emotions. The first thing I will do is address this foreign control of rural Oregon by creating legislation that protects the primary and sovereign rights of Oregonians. Oregonian’s have the right to work, the right for that work to be profitable, and for that profit not to be stolen and

misdirected. Rural Oregon is struggling because they haven’t had skilled, hard working, or mature representation.
What would you like to accomplish if elected?
When elected I will work hard to represent working Oregon for the first time with solutions based on real economics. We will no longer have a system that serves the elite agenda.
How should the state address the current COVID-19/economic crisis?
Since Oregonians are being forced to stay home it is crucial that they have access to State Unemployment Reserves. It is my opinion that the current

application process is intentionally complicated to keep Oregonians from being able to receive the reserves that they have the right to access. I’ve spoken to many constituents who say they waited over 3 months in many cases to receive their pay and had been unable to cover rent or utilities. It is unconscionable for the State bureaucrats to break Rural Oregonians in this way, while simultaneously forcing mandates restricting us from working. The process for accessing these reserves should be simple, straightforward, transparent, and timely, because people’s homes and families are at stake.

What do you feel the relationship should be between state representatives and the public?

During my time as a Registered Nurse I have worked in nearly every hospital in Oregon, I grew up on the coast, and have lived in Southwestern Oregon my entire life. I believe that elected officials should act in the best interest of the public that they serve, not corporate interest. Most importantly State Representatives should have to prove their worth to the public by the results that they produce, that is leadership.

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the state? I have been a business-minded person since I was a small child. I started my own company at 19 years old and still own it to this day. Knowing the ups and downs of starting, maintaining and hopefully growing a small business is a critical life experience that helps me see the coming consequences of reckless legislation that we have become all too familiar with in the Oregon Legislature over the past couple decades. If a citizen’s rights are being infringed upon, I am their advocate no matter who they are.

Election 2020: Curry County Clerk

Past political/civic experience: I currently work for a local non-profit that helps persons with disabilities find and maintain meaningful employment. Previously I worked for the Oregon Department of Human Services-Aging and People with Disabilities to create the Transition/Diversion Program in Curry County serving our most at-risk seniors. I served as the elected Chair for SEIU 503 representing Coos and Curry Counties, not only did I represent local DHS staff, I was also elected to the bargaining team for the Statewide contract that covers all represented staff working in the state of Oregon.

What inspired you to run?
I was elected to a position that afforded me the opportunity to travel to Salem and advocate for the needs of rural state employees. During that time, it became clear to me to make a true impact in my community I would need to focus on a more localized level. Although I was not charged with representing County Employees, I was made aware of issues within the county that were unaddressed. Curry County is not dissimilar from our Federal Government in that it has many elected officials that have governed unopposed for decades.

I believe that everyone deserves a choice in representation so I decided to run, if for no other reason to give the citizens of Curry an option. I am dismayed by the lack of candidate choices presented on the ballot. I have actively tried to find solutions and the only solution I had was to add my name is a small attempt to provide a choice. I believe that as an honorable and transparent Clerk I would be an asset to the county elected team.

I am inspired by the generations of amazing women who came before me that knew we needed to have a voice. This year commemorates the 100-year anniversary of the passage of the nineteenth amendment, which guaranteed the right of women to vote. It is in honor of the women that came before me to not only exercise my right to vote, but to run for the office that is entrusted with coordinating and conducting elections

throughout the county in an effort to provide that choice I would like to see in governance.

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the county?
Curry County has experienced multiple devastating economic events in the last few years from the Chetco Bar Fire, to the 101 washout, and now COVID. We cannot survive as a tourist economy when tourism can be heavily impacted at any time. We need to recruit for different revenue streams and economic sustainability while diversifying the county to be less reliant on inconsistent revenue sources.

As a Gerontologist I have concerns that we have hindered our citizens in ease of access to changing policy and procedure enacted at the state and federal level. Partnership between county departments is critical for our citizens. I would like to see fruitful collaboration with departments like Assessor, Board of Commissioners, Community Development and the State to cultivate a program where building and sustaining a livelihood isn't a bared by inefficient processes. Like many counties we face a housing shortage that disproportionately affects our workforce and creates barriers to recruiting and retaining a solid workforce capable of providing the services we need. I believe it is imperative that we use all our resources collaboratively to create a sustainable future for the county.

How would you try to address those issues?
Many issues facing our county cannot be solved by one person, rather I believe we need to work towards collaborative efforts that engage many community partnerships working towards common goals. I have been a part of the housing task force for some time. It is a great example of a collaboration of many people coming together to find solutions to a common problem. I have developed and implemented two different programs in the community and have learned from those experiences that buy-in from the community is a requirement to success.

As I networked throughout the County, I often found visitors voicing frustrations with wanting to marry and bring family in for the celebration, only to be denied resource from the Clerk's office. Working with Economic Development and county partners, I would help build a sustainable event program that would bring significant visitor dollars while allowing others to share in the beauty that we get to call home. Implementing changes can be a costly process as the Clerk's office is already heavily reliant on the general fund, I will use my background in grant writing to seek

out opportunities to help develop more accessible programs without burdening the taxpayers in the process.

What would you like to accomplish if elected?
I would like to see greater transparency in budgets and services provided, understanding staff needs for adequate supportive training services, improve upon employee retention and building capacity in the effort to more efficiently budget for a department that is not self-sustained. I would support implementing technology programs that would give citizens easier and efficient access to data. I would support outreach to the community to assist in understanding the ORSs and what they can expect from an elected official. I would pursue grant funding that would reduce the Clerk's office dependency on the general fund and help explore ways to capitalize on the possibilities of revenue generation within the office.

I would like to see greater transparency with the public; elections are a time to pay attention. Elected officials should be held accountable for providing updated and accurate information in a timely manner. I would be more active with the citizens in making sure they know what is going on throughout the elections process. The people elect officials to lead; any good leader knows that the mark of success is measured by the ability to ensure everyone they represent is equally accounted for.

What do you feel the relationship should be between county departments and the public?
The relationship should be that of trust and engagement in the decision-making process. The public should expect that an elected official will represent their needs while maintaining compliance of law. County departments should have a countywide plan for transparency in communicating changes that affect the public. This really should start at the top with the Board of Commissioners and Elected setting a precedence and example for department heads and in turn, other jurisdictions. The public expects government on every level to work together, collaborate, and streamline for efficiencies, cost saving measures, and planning for the future based on data and research. Government is established to work for the people and should make every possible effort to represent the needs of the collective. Individual departments are created to specialize in their given duties and find the most prudent and fiscally responsible ways to serve the public. Together they should ensure a cohesive and sustainable future for the county.

What inspired you to run?
When I first decided to run for Curry County Clerk in 1992 it was because I wanted to make a difference. The current County Clerk was retiring and I was the Elections Coordinator in the Elections Department so the time felt right for me to step up and run for public office.

I continue to run because I am a proud public servant, we have built an excellent team, and we are passionate about what we do.

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the county?
The County Clerk is responsible for the administration elections and maintaining the Public Land Record for Curry County. We are Passport Agents, issue Death Certificates

and Marriage Licenses. These mandated services are extremely important to our citizens.

The important issue is keeping these services modernized, viable and free from outside influences to meet the needs of the public.

How would you try to address those issues?
When I first started in the county elections office, elections were conducted at the polling place and ballots were counted by hand. By 1988 we moved to automate the counting process and we conducted our first election using optical scanned ballots in September 1989.

About that same time, County Clerks were finding that half of the voters were going to polls and others were voting absentee. We were conducting a "polling place" and a "vote by mail" election at the same time, which was extremely challenging and expensive.

In 1998 the people placed the vote by mail issue on the ballot and it passed statewide with 70 percent in favor. Vote by mail has dramatically increased voter participation.

In 2005 I participated on the steering committee to help implement Oregon's Statewide Voter Registration System.

In 2008 Curry and Yamhill Counties were first in the state to upgrade to a digital tabulation system.

In 2016 Oregon's Motor Voter Bill was implemented and Curry County's voter registration climbed from approximately 14,000 to over 18,000.

We have also conducted many separate conversions to modernize and update the Recording Department's Computer Systems which also makes it easier for the public to use since 1992. Additionally we are digitizing the County Clerk

Historical Land records from 1856 to 1960. The next conversion phase will digitize the microfilm records from 1960 through 1992. County Clerks Records from 1992 to present have already been digitized.

We have implemented the "Digital Research Room" for Citizens who want to look up indexes to the land records "online."

E-recording was successfully launched in 2017 and we are now recording about as many electronic recording instruments as we do paper instruments.

We are close to deploying our new Marriage License Application to assist the public in applying for their marriage license "online."

What would you like to accomplish if elected?
Our goal is to continue to monitor trends in modernizing the Elections and Recording functions and implement those trends that are right for the citizens of Curry County. We will continue to cross train our employees, keep them current and, as always, continue our efforts to provide effective and efficient public service with a smile.

What do you feel the relationship should be between county departments and the public?
As county officials we should always strive to be available to our citizens to listen, learn and remain open to changes in our citizen's attitudes. We need to remember that we are here to serve and to provide proven, experienced and trusted public services.

I am pleased to report the in a 2015 public survey, the Curry County Clerk's office received the highest approval rating of all county departments for services provided.

Oregon Health Authority surveys residents on pandemic attitudes

The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has a glimpse into Oregonians' actions and attitudes relating to the COVID-19 pandemic.
In two statewide surveys commissioned by the OHA, the results show a majority of Oregonians' are taking steps to limit the spread of COVID-19, but some are still wary of the efficacy of personal protective measures as case counts across the state continue to trend upward.

"Over the past few weeks we've seen a steady rise of COVID-19 cases in Oregon," OHA Deputy State Health Officer Thomas Jeanne said. "When a virus is in a community, we know it will spread if people don't take precautions. This increase in cases has reversed the progress we made in late summer."
The study illuminated the patterns and behaviors of individuals around the state and gives the OHA a baseline to move forward with public health messaging to encourage residents to stay safe.
"We did find that Ore-

gonians are avoiding large group gatherings, somewhat," said Michelle Neiss, president of DHM Research, the company that conducted one of the surveys. The results of the DHM survey, which sampled 1,009 residents, indicated that 20% of Oregonians attended a gathering of 10 people or more in the two weeks prior to responding.
"Those are the kinds of events that are high risk and can further community spread which brings the virus into workplaces, nursing homes and make people sick," OHA Direc-

tor of Communications Rob Cowie said.
Overall, the survey found that people who gather together frequently are the ones who are more skeptical that protective measures help, Neiss said.
For example, 52% of respondents who answered that they are unlikely to quarantine if they contract the virus also answered that they do not believe it is necessary.
A separate survey focused on Latinx Oregonians by Lara Media found that 69.4% of the 468 respondents said they were

very likely to stay home if they experienced any COVID-19 symptoms or were exposed to someone with the virus.
Of those who answered they would not stay home, 42.9% said they would not stay home because they are the only one in their household who works and they need to support their family.
"Keep in mind most of the people we interview are essential workers, which puts them in a higher risk of getting the virus," said Victoria Lara, owner of Lara Media.
Of Latinx residents between the ages of 18-24, about seven out of 10 stat-

ed they were very worried about friends and family getting the virus more so than themselves.
About four in 10 respondents to the DHM survey said they would definitely get the vaccine if it becomes available, and about three in 10 of respondents to the Lara Media survey said they would definitely get the vaccine.
The important thing to focus on is continuing to take personal protective measures, Cowie said.
"Even when vaccine comes, it will not be a silver bullet," Cowie said. "We will all need to engage in these behaviors for a while."

Sheriff's Office urges caution about scams

Phone and internet scammers are back at it. They love to use the same old tricks in new ways. One of their favorites is to pose as a business or government official to pressure you into sending them money or personal information. Now, some scammers are pretending to be popular online shopping websites, phishing for your personal information.
Phishing, pronounced "fishing" is the fraudulent practice of sending emails or making phone calls purporting to be from reputable companies in order to induce individuals to reveal personal information, such as passwords and credit card numbers.
For example, you get a call from someone who claims to be with "Amazon.com." (Spoiler: they're not from Amazon.) The person will say that your credit card has been charged a large amount of money for an order. Then, they'll give you the "Amazon Support" phone number and tell you to immediately call if you didn't make that purchase.
If this seems suspicious, that's because it is. Scammers want you to call the number they give so they can ask for your passwords, credit card number, and other sensitive information to get your money.
Another version of the same scam is to call and "alert you" that your card has been charged \$40.00 or \$50.00 to open an Amazon Prime account. The person on the phone will ask you if you want to continue service with Amazon or cancel it. Regardless of your choice, the person

will direct you to get onto your computer and enter a web address into the web browser so you can fill out the service/cancellation contract.
The issue is, once you enter the web address you are provided and hit the "enter" button, your computer is connected to THE SCAMMER'S network and they now have full access to YOUR computer. That includes all programs, pictures, files, emails, contact lists, Facebook, etc.
Even if you don't have your banking information on your device, they will harvest all the information they can from it. This can lead to further attacks and potential scam attacks on your family and friends as well.
If you get a call like this, there are a few steps you should take:
#1 Hang up. Don't call them back on the number they gave you. Do not enter any websites into your

computer, phone or tablet at their direction.
#2 Check your credit card account. If you see a charge you don't recognize, file a dispute with your credit card company immediately.
#3 Notify local law enforcement. The people perpetrating these scams are from overseas more often than not and out of reach for local law enforcement. However, should you suffer a financial loss, your banking institution/credit card company is going to want to know it was reported.
Finally, these are only two of the most current scams people are actually falling victim to on a daily basis. The people perpetrating these scams have nothing better to do than to figure out new ways to separate you from your money and there are endless phone, email and check cashing scams out there. Always be suspicious of unsolicited emails

or text messages; delete them without opening them if you can.
If it seems too good to be true, it is. You should never have to pay money to get money. And no one is going to pay you \$8,000 a month to drive around with a Dr. Pepper sticker on your car.
Should you feel the need to contact the company they are reporting themselves to be, you can locate the company's contact information on their actual website to include a contact phone number. You can also call 411 and ask directory assistance for the company's information.

How would you try to address those issues?

Currently, 70 percent of this revenue goes towards tourism promotion, 25 percent goes to the Sheriff’s Department and 5 percent goes for administration. I was tasked by the Board of Commissioners with doing research on a possible consumption tax. I feel very strongly that any consumption tax should include taxes on nonessential items and no tax on essential items that individuals purchase. We have many visitors coming to our area and they currently do not help in paying for the essential services that are needed in our County such as road maintenance and law enforcement services that include search and rescue needs. We will have to look “outside the box” for solutions because, in my opinion, raising property taxes should not be a successful option. I feel that one of the best solutions would be to stimulate the economy in Curry County in a responsible and thoughtful way. Our County is one of the most beautiful places in the world and many people from all over the world come to enjoy this beauty. One way to capitalize on this would be to encourage and expand the eco-tourism industry here.

b. Curry County has a lot of properties that are “eye sores” and in need of major cleanup and repair. We hired a code enforcement officer and an assistant code officer to help with this endeavor.

Our Code Enforcement Department currently has over 1,400 closed or pending cases. It is important that we keep our County safe, clean, and a place where property values will not be diminished by blighted properties that are nearby. There have been abandoned RVs filled with garbage on County roads and the County has been responsible for taking these vehicles to the dump. I was able to negotiate a 20 percent discount from CTR to help defray some of the cost to the County. The County has saved thousands of dollars as a result.

c. Affordable, accessible and quality health care is needed in Curry County. We have many individuals leave our County each year because they are unable to get the services they need. I advocated for a satellite critical access hospital for south Curry County because I felt that it was the best option. I also led the charge in Curry County against Sutter Coast Hospital’s exorbitant emergency room charges because their provider did not accept out-of-network insurance rates of pay. As a result patients now going to the Emergency Room at Sutter Coast Hospital pay far less.

What would you like to accomplish if elected? There are several things that I would like to accomplish if elected:

- a. I would like to continue working on more stable sources of revenue for the County.
- b. As the liaison to the County Parks Department, I would like to see our County Parks expand and improve so that more tourists visit our County and help our economy grow

as a result. It is important to note that our Parks Department is currently self-funding.

c. I would continue to look at the best ways to implement more efficient and cost-effective uses of the County’s resources. This would include: (1) getting our property tax assessments up-to-date (we are currently 18 years behind and only 6 years of back taxes can be collected); (2) getting all homes in the County properly permitted so that their property taxes are accurately assessed; (3) use up-to-date software in the various departments so that those departments can be more efficient; (4) make sure that replacement costs for equipment are included in the budget so that costly “surprises” can be avoided; and (5) use the newly-implemented strategic plan for the County as our “road map” in making decisions.

How should the County address the current COVID-19/economic crisis?

This is a very difficult issue for the County on two fronts: (1) it is difficult because we have a population that is at higher risk of being infected with COVID-19. Our Public Health Administrator, Sherrie Ward, is working very closely with OHA and other entities to make sure that all cases are traced and reported in the proper manner. We are implementing the guidelines that have been enacted by the Governor’s office such as mask requirements and social distancing; and (2) many of the businesses in this County have suffered because of the measures that were taken to slow the spread of COVID-19.

The County’s economic development department has been reaching out to the small businesses in our County to give them information about low-interest loans that are available during this crisis and making sure that they have the necessary guidelines and equipment (masks) to open their businesses safely.

What do you feel the relationship should be between the County and the public?

Commissioners represent the citizens of Curry County and it is important that they listen to the public and make decisions that are in the best interest of all of the citizens in this County. I think it is VERY important to study all of the pertinent facts about the issues coming before the Board of Commissioners before each meeting, listening to all public comment regarding the issues, and then voting on the issue based on what I feel is in the best interest of residents of our County. I realize that everyone will not always agree with my decisions but the people can be assured that I will always treat all individuals equally under the existing laws and I will be true to my oath to follow the Constitutions of the United States and Oregon.

It is important that County government is transparent. The County is in the process of instituting new software that will allow more public access to financial and other pertinent information.

I have not taken donations for my campaign so none of my decisions will be influenced by special interest groups or individuals.

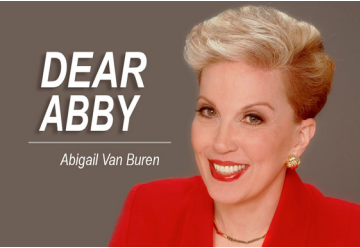

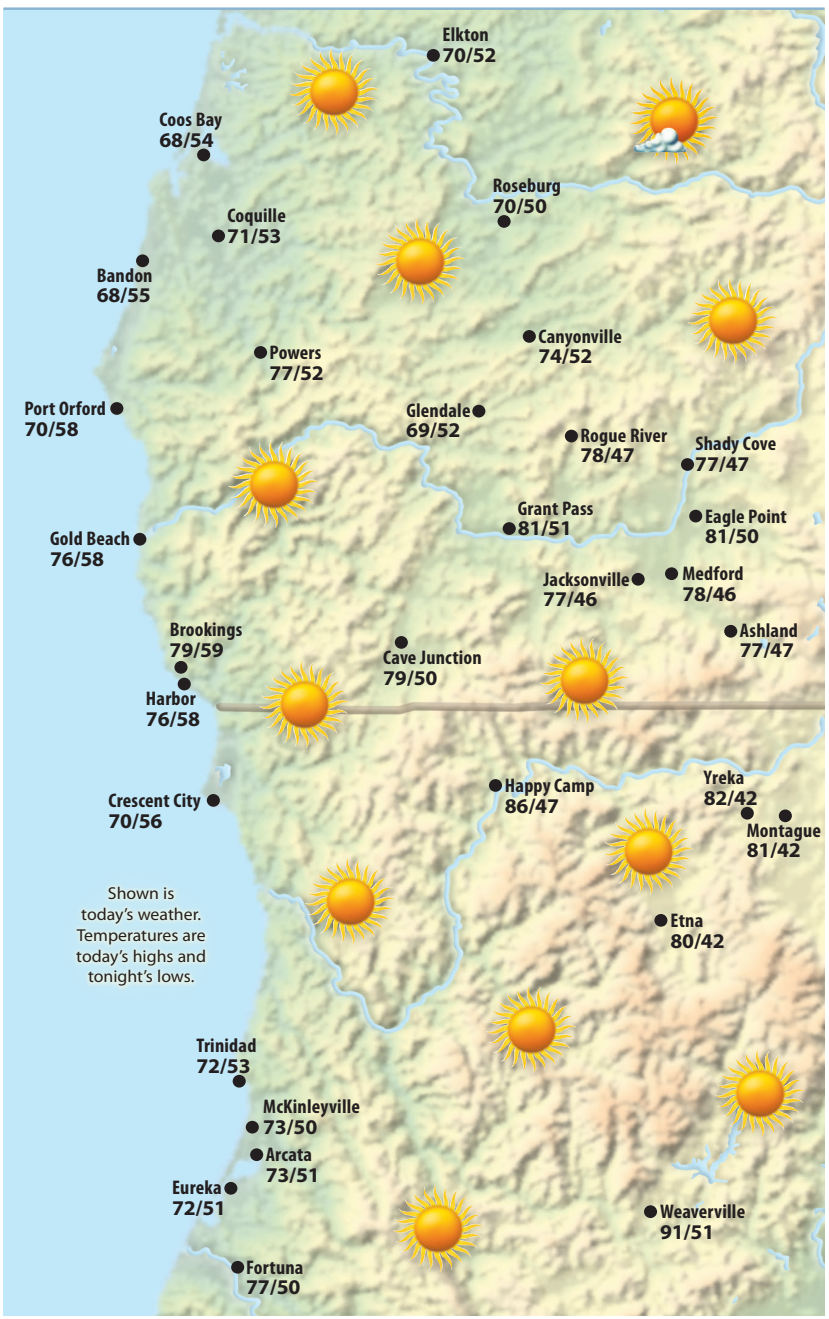
