

Vandal tries, fails to disrupt Dracula

Messages decrying the “evil” content of the play Dracula at the Chetco Pelican Players in Brookings were sprayed last Friday across the theater’s primary signage and promotional vinyl banners.

According to Mary Anne Trailor, who is president of the CCP, performers were rehearsing at the theater the night prior, but when they returned the next day around 3:30 pm they noticed several of the signs promoting the Dracula play had been defaced or torn down.

“Obviously someone is perceiving this play to be evil, but in my opinion whoever did this doesn’t understand what fiction is,” said Trailor. “When someone equates literature to be representative of a true belief system, then if we do a play about Dracula we must believe in vampires.”

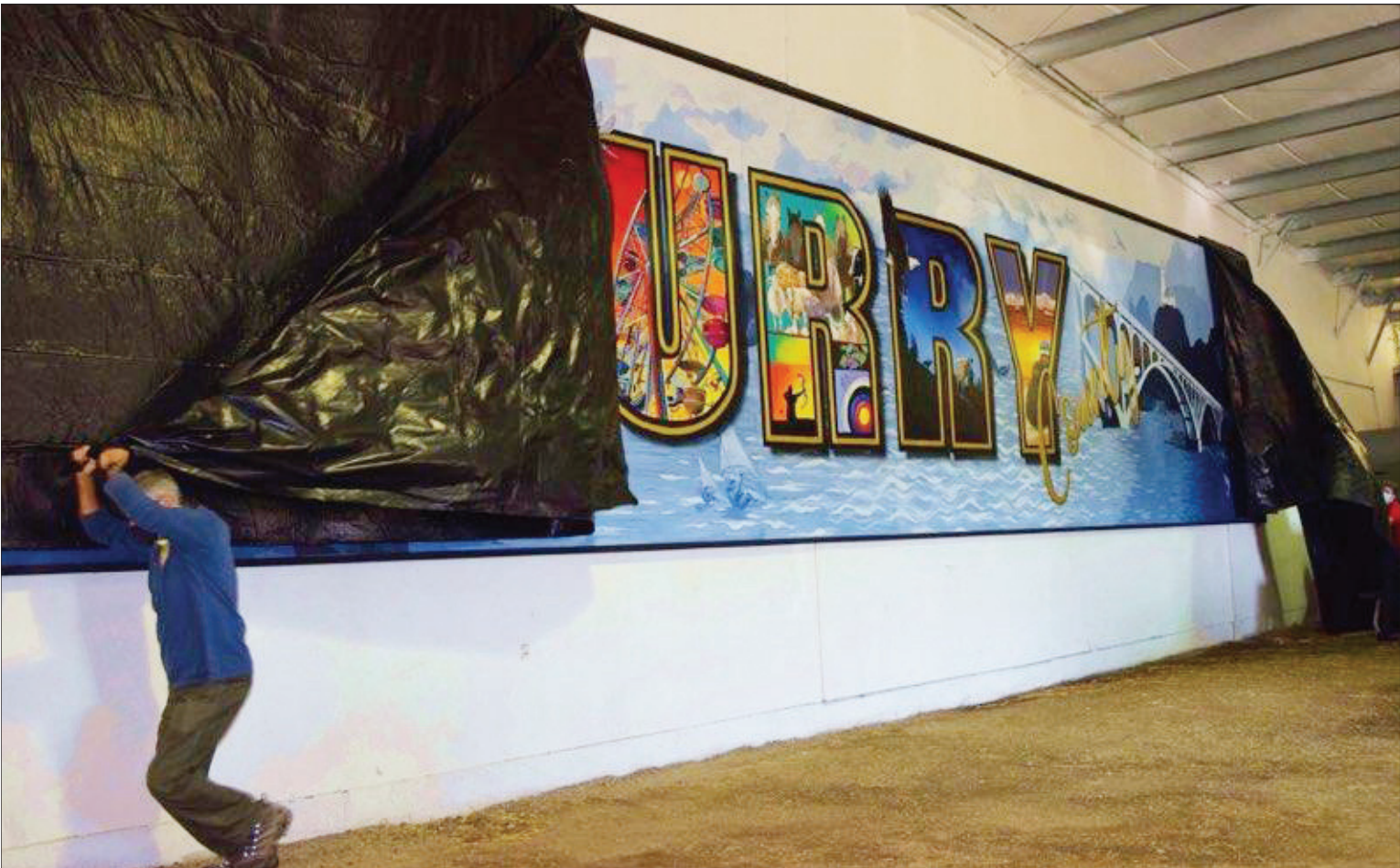
Trailor said the damage is likely under a thousand dollars, but her greater concern is the possible perception the culprit may have for upcoming Halloween festivities.

Circle of Gold Mural unveiled at fairgrounds

The unveiling of the Circle of Gold Mural at the Curry County Fairgrounds occurred Oct. 3 before a crowd of Gold Beach residents.

“The mural idea started out as a passing shared thought in January that this was a blank wall that should have something painted on it,” said Becky Schafer. So, she turned to her friend Janee Lensing, and the two co-lead the project.

According to Schafer, the idea received a nod of approval from the Curry County Fair Board in February, and the duo set off to pursue donations and community support that would allow them to completely fund the mural on the inside wall of the south end of

the Livestock Pavilion. Lensing applied for and received grants from the Curry County Cultural Coalition and Curry Art Inc., for \$550 and \$1,000 respectively. After that,

Gold Beach names new police chief

Chief Jordan White became the newest member of the Gold Beach Police Department when he was sworn-in by Mayor Tammy Kaufman during the city council meeting on October 4.

Before joining the Gold Beach Police Department, White spent three years with the Curry County Sheriff’s Office, where he served as a patrol sergeant. He is also a home builder in his off-time and has been developing property in Gold Beach to increase the inventory of work-force housing.

White has had a dynamic public safety career spanning over 25 years and has included emergency medicine, firefighting, search and rescue, law enforcement and public safety aviation. White spent most of his life and career in northwest Montana where he began serving his community when he was 18 years old. The excitement of helping people led him to the Flathead County Sheriff’s Office where he served as a patrol supervisor, SWAT team member, rescue diver, search and rescue coordinator and was ap-

Webinar looks at impact on Oregon coasts

An online panel discussion, hosted by Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition Thursday, Sept. 30, discussed human impact on Oregon coastal landscapes. Moderators discussed how the coast has been transformed by human impact over the course of history to present day.

William Robbins, a professor of history from Oregon State University, discussed how market-related values reshaped the ecology and landscape of the coastal environment. This began with the Europeans’ presence becoming dominant around 170 years ago.

“On the Oregon Coast especially, there is a plethora of language groups and tribal peoples,” Robbins said. “It’s that indigenous world that was relatively stable that was abruptly disrupted beginning in 1800 but especially in 1830s and 1840s.”

The reoccurring malaria epidemics, around 1830, were devastating to Native Americans along the lower Columbia River, in the Willamette Valley and in the villages on Oregon’s coastal estuaries, Robbins said. Around 90 percent of the indigenous population was killed from 1830 to 1833.

The Euro-Americans brought values of trade. In the 1840s through the 1880s, systematic changes were brought to the valley and coastal regions. Euro-Americans realized the market value of fish

Please don’t pet the wildlife

“I can’t believe that person is getting that close.”

Just off the road stands a bull elk — a 700-pound animal with three-foot tall antlers — and a woman is standing not even four feet away from it. All it would take is for the elk to make one sudden swing of its head and the woman would be hospitalized.

“Here we go again,” I say, rolling my eyes. Then I hop out of the van, instructing my clients to wait here while I try to handle the situation.

I work as a privately contracted guide to lead visitors on wildlife and geology tours of Grand Teton and Yellowstone national parks. Leaning on my wildlife biology degree and six years of living in the Rocky Mountain West, I educate clients about the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. At 22 million acres, it’s the largest nearly intact temperate ecosystem on earth. Almost all plants and animals that existed prior to human presence in North America still exist here today. So people flock here from all over the world to see wildlife as it is truly meant to be — wild.

“Excuse me!” I shout from the roadside, trying to get the woman’s attention. “Please back up!”

She doesn’t even flinch.

I try again. “Excuse me, woman in the white top and white hat! Please give this animal at least 75 feet of space!”

She still ignores me.

Although I do not have the authority that comes with being a park ranger, I do have George N. Wallace’s advice in his paper, Authority of the Resource. He says the average person can claim the power to confront someone whose behavior harms the environment or the public’s ability to pursue recreational activities in that environment. If, for example, you see someone approaching wildlife too closely, you can speak up.

Far too many times this summer, I’ve had to speak up. In May, Grand Teton National Park recorded over 360,000 visitors, a 30% increase from May 2019. In July, Yellowstone had over a million visitors, a record. There’s a rule of thumb: more people mean more opportunities for them to get into trouble with wildlife.

Because some of these visitors were traveling to wild places for

the first time, things sometimes went south quickly. Yet most rule-breakers were lucky enough to walk away unscathed; few even recognized the danger they were in.

But it’s heartbreaking to watch elk or bears become agitated by human ignorance. It is even more heartbreaking to know that these instances will only increase as more people visit these national parks. Wildlife may change their behavior, heading farther into the backcountry and therefore farther from view.

I love my job. I love driving around these two magnificent national parks and watching animals live their lives every day. Hearing the mating call of a bull elk echo through the valley at sunrise is nothing short of magical. Watching grizzly bears dig for food in preparation for hibernation never gets old.

Because these are experiences I want everyone to share, here are some tips for visitors:

Know the wildlife-viewing regulations of the area you visit. National parks require you to stay 25 yards away from most wildlife and 100 yards away from predators. Check relevant websites before you travel.

Follow the instructions of authority figures. Often, this will be a park or forest ranger stationed in wildlife hotspots.

Don’t block the road. Please do not stop in the middle of the road! And turn your car off so everyone can enjoy the silence.

Book a wildlife-viewing tour. While no wildlife guide will ever guarantee an animal sighting, experts know their stuff and will keep you — and the animals — safe.

Carry binoculars. This is an incredible tool for viewing wildlife from a distance. I never leave home without my pair.

Become an authority for the resource. Speak up if you see someone breaking the rules, and don’t be discouraged if you get a nasty response. You have the right to protect everyone’s access to nature.

As you know, I was vaccinated with my colleagues in April and contracted Covid from another vaccinated individual in August. Breakthrough cases are on the rise, OHA recently reported “that of the nearly 12,000 new cases in the week ending Sept. 18, nearly 2,800, or 23%, were among those who had been vaccinated against the disease.” Recent CDC Data released showed even more breakthrough cases as published by Johns Hopkins, “469 COVID-19 cases were identified among Massachusetts residents who had traveled to the town during July 3–17; 346 (74%) occurred in fully vaccinated persons.” Further, “Data from COVID-19 tests in the United States, the United Kingdom and Singapore are showing that vaccinated people who become infected with Delta SARS-CoV-2 can carry as much virus in their nose as do unvaccinated people.”

There is also emerging data on the vaccines effectiveness over time, “Amid persistent concerns that the protection offered by COVID-19 vaccines may be waning, a report released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention finds that America’s workhorse shot is significantly less effective at preventing severe cases of disease over the long term than many experts had realized.” Further, the FDA panel recently, “first rejected, by a vote of 16-2, boosters for nearly everyone. Members cited a lack of safety data on extra doses and also raised doubts about the value of mass boosters, rather than ones targeted to specific groups. Then, in an 18-0 vote, it endorsed the extra shot for select portions of the U.S. population — namely, those most at risk from the virus.”

Your administration’s urgency of vaccinations was to limit the number of hospitalizations caused by severe illness from

Covid, as Oregon has the least number of hospital beds per capita than any other state. However, more data continues to become available regarding those carrying natural antibodies due to prior infection and recovery of Covid, “a new study suggests that not all memory B cells are created equal. While vaccination gives rise to memory B cells that evolve over a few weeks, natural infection births memory B cells that continue to evolve over several months, producing highly potent antibodies adept at eliminating even viral variants.” Further, data continues to mount on those with highly potent natural immunity or what scientist are calling hybrid-immunity, “a series of studies has found that some people mount an extraordinarily powerful immune response against SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus that causes the disease COVID-19. Their bodies produce very high levels of antibodies, but they also make antibodies with great flexibility — likely capable of fighting off the coronavirus variants circulating in the world but also likely effective against variants that may emerge in the future.”

Madam Governor, your vaccine mandates do not take into account any of this data! So, what exactly is the end goal? Emerging data of naturally acquired antibodies and immunity show far better results against severe infection, long term. The FDA is only allowing boosters for a small segment of the population, the majority of which are retired and not in the workforce. So why force a vaccine; which data shows that it continues to lose effectiveness after four months, on a majority of Oregon workers that are not eligible for a booster?

Our state, healthcare and education workers provide vital roles for all Oregonians, from our oldest to our youngest populations. As I told you in August, “Covid is here to stay. I and my family are vaccinated by choice. I have and continue to encourage Oregonians to be vaccinated against Covid. I and thousands of others like me are proof however that you can still contract and spread Covid even if vaccinated. Forcing vaccines on Oregonians is wrong. Forcing vaccines on Oregonians based on their profession is worse.”

Madam Governor, I urge you to change course on your vaccine mandates. If not for some of the emerging data I have outlined above, then for the freedom of choice for every Oregonian. I encourage you to provide all of the best scientific data to Oregonians and let them make a decision after consulting with their medical professionals. You shouldn’t have to be in a Union to be afforded a delay from your forced vaccine mandates. Data continues to come in and I urge you to delay your vaccine mandates for all Oregonians.

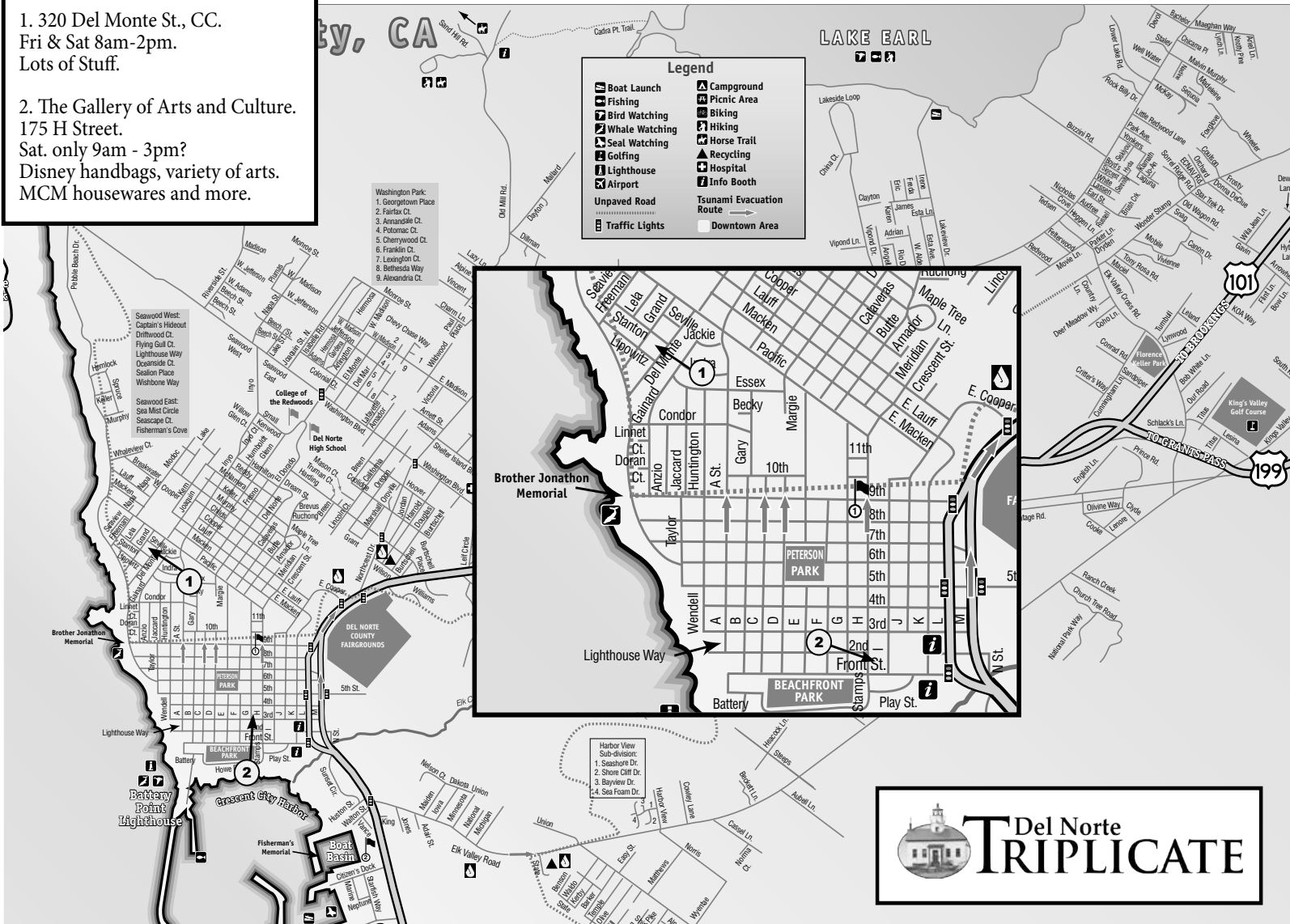

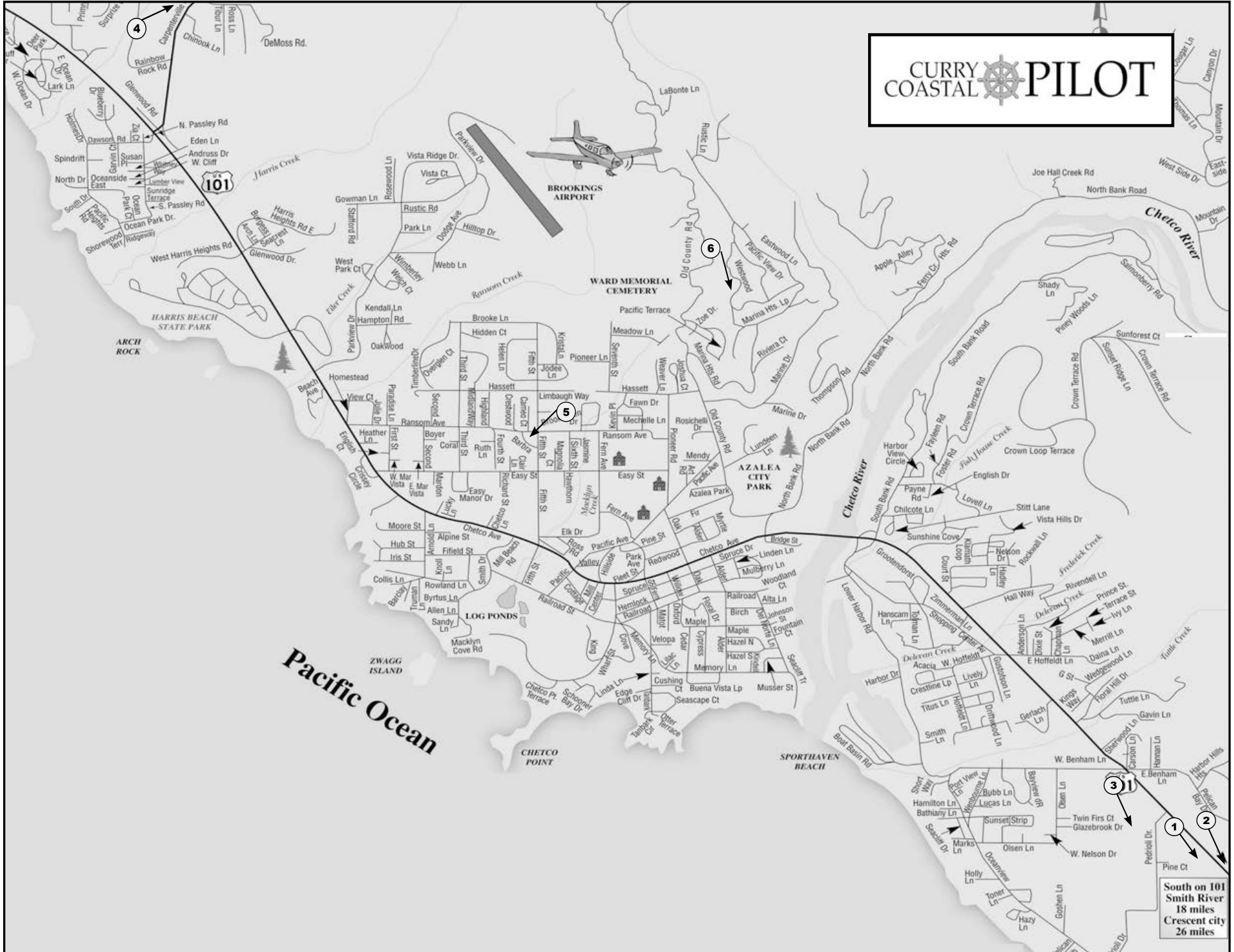

Siskiyou Mountain Club restores trail to historic Madstone Site

Siskiyou Mountain Club has brought the 14-mile trail route to Madstone Site back to life after decades of no maintenance.

The historic cabin site is located on the mainstem Chetco River about 50 river-miles above Brookings, deep in the 180,000-acre Kalmiopsis Wilderness Area.

"This happens to be one of the most remote trails in the Pacific Northwest," says the club's Executive Director Gabriel Howe.

He points to a big blank spot at the bottom-left corner of an Oregon map. "There's a lot of nothing out there." The project took Howe's crews four years to complete.

In 2002 the Biscuit Fire burned through the area, and "the trail all the way to Madstone hadn't been maintained since at least then," Howe said. "It had

been left to disappear and I guess everyone was just OK with that. We weren't."

Corps member Tiffani Ayres says the crew got off to a rough start, their first day involving a long hike carrying packs weighed down by eight days of food and provisions.

"We got about a mile from camp," says Ayres. "The sun went down as we looked for the trail. And then it just got dark."

She went on to describe the final off-trail descent to Madstone.

"At some point we lost the trail and we started bushwhacking down," she said. "I kept falling. Everyone kept falling."

The crew camped near the old cabin site, and the pristine water quality stands out to Ayres.

"You could see to the very bottom and open your eyes under water,"

she said. "The water was amazing."

The work wasn't so amazing.

"We were cutting through brush that was like 30 feet tall," Ayres said.

She describes scooting on her hands and knees to reach the base of trunks that had grown into 20-year-old brush fields consuming the trail. She would cut the base of those trunks and keep scooting along.

"We started calling it the jungle," says Ayres's supervisor, Owen Brodie. "It's very claustrophobic in there."

Alfred and Charlie Fattig built a cabin at Madstone Site during their foray as WWI draft dodgers.

The full account was published by their nephew, Paull Fattig, in his 2019 book Madstone. Brodie

recalls what it was like to read Madstone at Madstone.

"There was this moment where we were reading about their smoker that sat on two rock piles," says Brodie. "We looked over and saw the same two rock piles. They were still there. Reading the book became like following a treasure map."

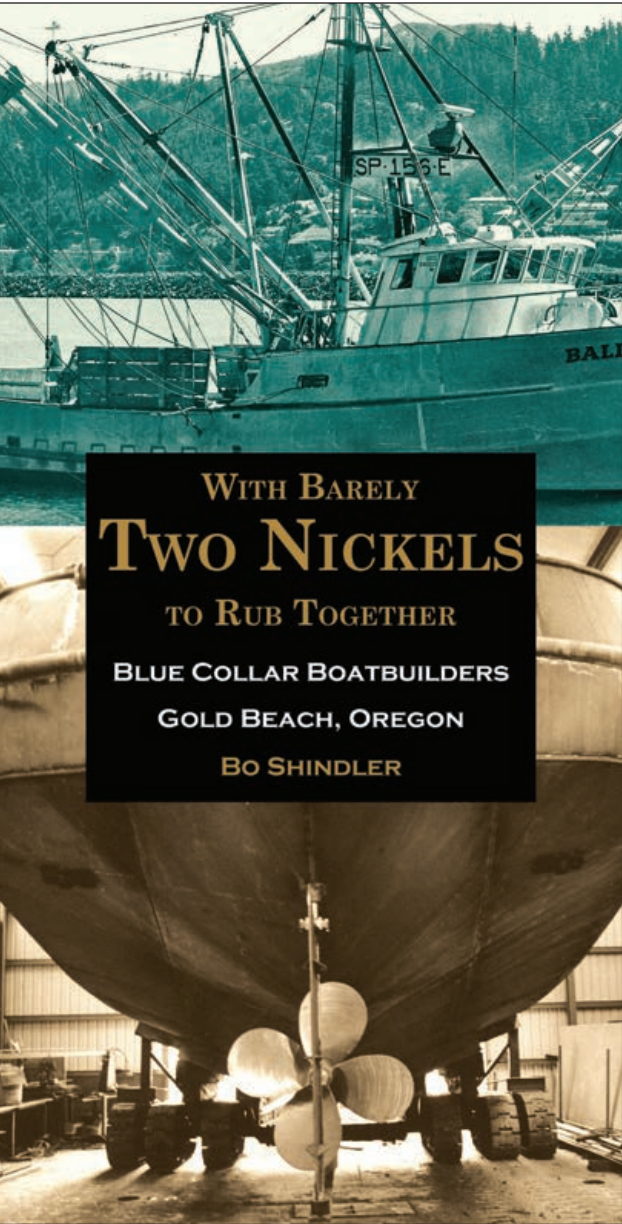
Ayres says it feels good to become part of the history.

"We were all really proud when we got to the top."

Shindler to release new book tonight

Bo Shindler, a Gold Beach resident for the last 50 years, will be launching his book "With Barely Two Nickels to Rub Together" at a signing party on Friday, October 8, from 3-7p.m. The event is being sponsored by the Curry Historical Society at its museum at 29419 Ellensburg Ave., in Gold Beach.

Shindler's book is based on a true story about Ed Freeman, who in 1939 escaped a forced family arrangement in North Carolina and hopped onto a railcar and headed out west, where he eventually settled in the coastal mountains of Southwestern Oregon. Thirty years later, Freeman, along with his son Dugie, built the largest aluminum commercial fishing boats in the United States at that time - spanning nearly four football fields with a total vessel weight of more than a million pounds.

According to Bo Shindler, he wrote the book to recognize the contributions craftsmen and women make to their communities. Contributions that provide insight to rural life, and testament of how hard work merged with careful and focused thought compounds over time to better all parts of people's lives.

Kerry Tymchuk, executive director of the Oregon Historical Society, recently praised the book.

"It is a colorful story that blends all that was

and is iconic about life on the Oregon coast - timber, fishing, boats, the call of the Pacific, creativity, persistence, colorful personalities, and hard work," Tymchuk stated in a press release. "At 350 pages with 280 photographs and illustrations, it is a true coffee table book that will provide many hours of enjoyment."

Voters can use an official ballot drop site located at the Curry County Courthouse as well as city hall in Brookings. Postage is not required should a voter choose to mail their ballot and should be mailed no later than October 22 to ensure that their ballot is received by 8 p.m. Election Day.

An elector may verify that their ballot has been received by the election office through the Oregon Secretary of State's website at www.oregonvotes.gov "My Vote."

Legislators announce \$16.5 million purchase of Pacific Seafood

Oregon's U.S. Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden, along with Representatives Peter DeFazio (D-OR-4) and Suzanne Bonamici (D-OR-1), today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will purchase \$16.5 million of Pacific seafood through its commodities purchasing program, with over 80 percent of the fish and shrimp coming from Oregon.

"Oregon's fisheries are an economic engine for our coast, our state, and nation. They create and sustain jobs, support coastal economies, and feed American families," DeFazio said. "USDA's purchase will ensure that fishermen and seafood processors along Oregon's coast can weather the economic impacts of COVID-19."

"Not only do our fisheries deliver incredible

products all around the world, they have also been the lifeblood of communities up and down Oregon's coast for generations," said Merkley, who led several Congressional pushes to ensure that USDA included Pacific Northwest fishermen and seafood processors in important purchasing programs. "That's why I've been pushing to ensure that our fishermen and seafood processors receive the assistance they need to weather the coronavirus crisis, and I'm glad the USDA has delivered on this significant purchase of quality Pacific Northwest seafood."

"This is great news for our coastal fisheries and the processors that provides them well-deserved support for their signature Oregon industry—generating jobs and economic activity rippling out

statewide," Wyden said. "The financial fallout from this public health crisis has landed hard along the Oregon Coast, and I'm gratified that USDA has come through with these resources for our state's world-renowned fisheries and processors."

"Fisheries are an integral part of coastal economy," Bonamici said. "I advocated for fisheries to receive the support they needed to survive the pandemic, and I'm encouraged that USDA is making this

large purchase from Pacific Seafood. This purchase will benefit our fishermen, workers, and the local economy."

"We'd like to thank our Senators, Congressmen, and USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack for their support," West Coast Seafood Processors Association Executive Director Lori Steele said. "These purchases will continue to help supplement and stabilize our fishing and processing crews and their families through these difficult times.

private donations filled in funding gaps to meeting the \$3,000 required to complete the project.

“Countless individuals have donated money or time or supplies, and many businesses have given of their professional talent for everything from painting the main wall white, mounting the mural panel frame on the wall, hauling the panels from the painting room, mounting the panels on the big wall, framing the artwork and even finishing touch up painting,” Schafer said.

Federal disaster relief requested for Oregon commercial salmon industry

At the recommendation of Oregon’s coastal legislators, Governor Kate Brown issued a formal request October 4 to the U.S. Department of Commerce for federal disaster relief for Oregon’s commercial salmon industry.

This request comes in response to diminished salmon landings for the 2018, 2019 and 2020 seasons.

The Coastal Caucus, a bipartisan coalition of Oregon’s coastal legislators, worked in conjunction with the Oregon Salmon Commission to pursue this request.

In response to the governor’s letter, Representative David Gomberg (D-Otis), the Coastal Caucus chair stated, “Salmon landings in Oregon have fallen from \$14 million in 2014 to \$1.5 million in 2020. The salmon industry is reeling, and the Oregon Salmon Commission asked coastal legislators for help. I’m pleased the governor is lending her support to the hardworking men and women of our commercial salmon industry and our coastal economy.”

In her letter to the U.S. Secretary of Commerce, Governor Brown stated, “salmon are a vital component of Oregon’s natural resources and provide significant commercial, recreational, economic, and aesthetic benefits to the state.

Salmon are also highly valued by Native Amer-

ican tribes for cultural, subsistence, and economic benefits.

While economic assistance will be essential to address the impacts of closures and restrictions on our salmon fisheries, it is vitally important that federal, state, tribal, and local governments continue to work together to recover and restore salmon populations and develop management strategies to ensure the long-term health and sustainability of our salmon fisheries.”

The 2020 fleet-wide salmon landings of approximately \$1.5 million in value represents a historic low only surpassed by the results of the season closure in 2009. Salmon landings in both 2018 and 2019 sit at \$2.4 million and \$2.1 million respectively, far below the 2016 season, which was declared a disaster at a fleet-wide \$4.3 million.

The Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus includes bipartisan representatives and senators from coastal districts from Astoria to Brookings.

It is chaired by Representative David Gomberg (D-Otis), Vice-Chair Senator Dick Anderson (R-Lincoln City), and includes Senators Betsy Johnson (D-Scappoose) and Dallas Heard (R-Roseburg) and Representatives Suzanne Weber (R-Tillamook), Boomer Wright (R-Coos Bay), and David Brock Smith (R-Port Orford).

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
