# **County drops to moderate risk**

With COVID-19 cases falling in Curry County, the county will drop from the extreme risk tier to moderate risk beginning Friday.

Curry County Public Health Administrator Sherrie Ward made the announcement Tuesday after the governor's updated county risk assessments were released. Curry County is the only county in the state to drop in tiers this week.

There are currently 26 counties in extreme risk, two in high risk, two in moderate risk and six in low risk.

Ward said in the week running from Jan. 5-11, 17 new COVID cases were confirmed in Curry County. Fourteen cases were from south Curry County with three from central Curry County. Most were linked to close contact with previously reported cases.

Since the beginning of the pandemic in March, there have been 313 total COVID cases in Curry

County with three COVID-linked deaths. Ward reported there were 38 active cases countywide.

With the reduction from extreme risk to moderate risk, COVID restrictions will be eased countywide beginning Friday.

In the moderate risk category, indoor gatherings at home are limited to eight people from two households. Indoor dining at restaurants will be allowed with a maximum capacity of 50 percent or 100 people, whichever is smaller.

At restaurants, there will be a maximum of six people per table indoors and eight people outdoors. All restaurants must close by 11 p.m.

Indoor entertainment establishments such as movie theaters, museums and concert halls can open with a maximum capacity of 50percent or 100 people. Retail stores can open with a maximum capacity of 75 percent. Malls can also open at 75 percent capacity.

Churches can have 50 percent capacity with a maximum of 150 people while indoor gyms can open with 50 percent capacity.

The move to the moderate tier ensures loosened restrictions for at least two weeks. Any change in the tier status will be linked to the number of positive COVID cases and the percentage of positive tests in the community.

Ward urged all residents to continue to practice COVID safety, especially wearing masks, maintaining six feet between yourself and others, washing hands frequently and staying home if you are sick.

# National Guard will assist with vaccines

Two of the state's top priorities are to ramp up vaccinations in Oregon and get children back into classrooms, Gov. Kate Brown announced last Friday.

For the former, Brown said she will be deploying the Oregon National Guard to assist with COVID-19 vaccination efforts to help reach the goal she set earlier this week of administering 12,000 vaccine doses a day.

National Guard members will be providing vaccine support in Oregon starting last weekend at a mass vaccination event at the state fairgrounds in Salem, Brown said. The goal is to vaccinate 250 people per hour and guard members will be providing logistical and nursing support.

The Oregon Health Authority has delivered vaccine doses to 190 sites across the state already and expects to allocate doses to an additional 30 next week, OHA Director Pat Allen said. The 12,000 vaccine doses per day plan comes on the heels of a raised COVID-19 transmission rate across the state, Allen said. The transmission rate estimates how many people an infected person will spread the virus to; a transmission rate of 1.0 would indicate that a person with the virus passes it to one other person. The state's estimated state transmission rate fell in late November to 0.8 and stayed low through mid-December, but the winter holidays brought a sharp increase, Allen said. The estimate the OHA has, as of Dec. 23, is a transmission rate between 1.14 and 1.45. "This estimation does not reflect any potential further increase in transmission related to social gatherings over Christmas and New Year's Eve," Allen said. "This means we could continue to see a sharp increase in diagnosed cases."

# More students are back in the classroom

Students in Brookings are finally back in the classroom – well, most of them.

Since Jan. 4, the Brookings-Harbor School District had been phasing in a return for students who've opted in to faceto-face classes. By Jan. 14, all of those students are scheduled to be in school buildings for at least a few hours a day.

So far, the return has been going smoothly, said Superintendent David Marshall.

"In general, especially with the kids, it's worked pretty well," Marshall said.

The changes were made possible by loosened requirements from state health and education authorities. Just two days before Christmas, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown announced the four-tier risk framework for reopening schools that

had been imposed in late October was to become only advisory, not mandatory.

At the time, Marshall was a little surprised by the announcement, which meant his district had more responsibility in deciding what form of school would be the safest for its students.

"This one was just sort of

dropped on everyone," Marshall said.

Earlier in December, the district had moved all students back to online classes for the few weeks before winter break due to rising case counts in the county and uncertainty about what future state requirements would allow.

But now with future options more in the hands of local officials, and case counts declining, Marshall said district leaders felt getting as many students as possible back into classrooms would be the most beneficial option.

Now, Marshall said the district is keeping an eve on case counts locally and is better able to make decisions based on what's going on in the district, not in Curry County as a whole. The goal with the slow phase-in is to avoid having to jostle students and teachers between online and in-person classes.

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### In-person learning

In the effort to get students back into classrooms, Brown announced in December the state guidance and metrics on when districts can be reopened moved from mandatory to advisory giving districts more local control. The change took effect at the start of the new year.

"All of our schools will still be required to adhere to health and safety measures," Brown said. "They must continue to work in close consultation with local public health departments."

Colt Gill, director of the Oregon Department of Education, said two factors remain important for districts determining when students will return to in-person instruction. The first is to ensure community case rates stay low so COVID-19 is not regularly introduced to the schools and disrupting the learning environment.

# Employees air grievances to county commissioners

A discussion about a proposal to get rid of the director of operations in Curry County turned into much more as several county employees aired grievances to commissioners, complaining about a toxic work environment at the county annex.

The workshop was planned to discuss whether Curry County needed a director of operations. The administrative position is designed as the top unelected employee in the county. Commissioners have long

questioned the position, with many claiming the elected commissioners should be doing most of the work the director of operations does.

Several county employees, or their spouses, asked to speak about the topic before commissioners.

Economic Development Coordinator Summer Matteson told commissioners she took an hour of vacation time to address them Wednesday.

"I assure you, there would be more like me here if they weren't in fear of losing their jobs or retaliation," Matteson said. "Security in

the director of operations provides continuity that county employees need to be successful. With the election of a commissioner, there is no required management experience, professional development or administrative skillset. Keeping a liaison between the board of commissioners and departments provides needed consistency and the development of system needs."

Matteson told the board complaints about a lack of productivity has more to do with commissioners than with staff.

"The lack of efficiency and

productivity is not due to the staff you've hired," she said. "In my opinion, it lends a great deal to the lack of a strong and consistent foundation. Your employees are not a liability. They are assets. When I look at the amount of time an employee is drawn into the politics of the county outside of their job duties, it ends up costing the taxpayers a lot of money, and when I see the fear and doubt of employees because of job security, I am assured their productivity is impacted."

Children in need along the South Coast could get a boost if there are volunteers to do it.

A regional nonprofit is looking for local volunteers in Curry County to help speak for children in painful family situations as the organization tries to rebuild operations in the county.

The volunteers are called CASAs - or court-appointed special advocates -– and they work with children facing instability at home.

"There's a missing person — a missing advocate – when you don't have a CASA on board," said Greg Dalton, the program director for CASA of Coos and Curry Counties.

Whereas an attorney for a foster child has to advocate for whatever a child wants, and a state case worker is bound by certain agency requirements, Dalton's trained volunteers give the judge their outside perspective about a child's best interest, he said. What's more, a CASA typically only assists one child or family, while attorneys and case workers serve many at a time.

That means appearing in court to speak on the child's behalf — but it also means spending time learning about the child. That can include speaking with doctors and case workers about a child with special permission granted by a judge and visiting regularly with a child at their foster home (or virtually during the pandemic).

"It's just about sitting and being present," Dalton said. Until October, the program

The department has over 160 health and safety protocols that need to be in place at schools that reopen and remain mandatory, he said. Some of the requirements include entry screening

run through the program in Douglas County.

But when the Douglas County program let go of some staff in Curry County early last year, and volunteers' ability to meet with staff and youth became more challenging with the COVID-19 pandemic, the program began to struggle.

"The volunteers down there, with the pandemic going on, not having staff, were kind of isolated," Dalton said.

At the time, he was heading the CASA program in Coos County through Oregon Coast Community Action.

Community members would reach out to Dalton and ask if his organization could help fill the need to the south - but since volunteers have to be sworn in by a county's judges, the Coos County CASAs couldn't help kids in Curry County.

So he and his staff began conversations about taking over Curry County's operation. Eventually, he took it to ORCCA's board, which has been looking for ways to expand its support in that county.

"It was just like a big, 'Yes, we need to do that. We need to be there for those kids," Dalton said.

And in October, ORCCA took over the operation of Curry County's CASA program — and Dalton started looking for volunteers.

"I got on the phone and called every number I had," Dalton said.

Before the county's CASA office closed, Dalton estimates that the county had around 18 advocates to serve around 35 youth. But now?

The need could become even greater soon, according to Dalton. The number of children coming into care has actually decreased since the pandemic began.

That's not necessarily because fewer children need help — instead, they're just not in school, where teachers and other mandatory reporters can raise red flags about possible abuse or home issues. So when schools eventually reopen for in-person instruction, Dalton anticipates there could be an influx of children in need.

Retired teachers and former social workers often make ideal CASA volunteers, but there's no requirement for prior experience, since "volunteers come from all walks of life," according to Dalton.

"It's about having that passion, empathy and an open mind to be able to do this work," he said.

Volunteers can make a big impact on foster children. Dalton still gets phone calls from kids he volunteered for a decade ago.

The process to become a volunteer begins with an interview. After a 30-hour training session, background checks and continual review by staff, CASAs are sworn in by judges in the county they'll serve in.

# **Commissioners move ahead with noise ordinance plan**

After receiving a complaint from a resident about noise near her home, Curry County commissioners chose to move ahead with the idea of creating a noise ordinance.

A woman, who only identified herself as Becky, spoke to commissioners during the public comment session at their meeting Wednesday and said noise issues near her home have made life very

difficult. With no county ordinance in place, there is little law enforcement can do when her neighbors play loud music at all hours, Becky said.

"It's deliberate, and they know it," she said. "They think they can do this because there's no noise ordinance in the county. It's all day. I can't even go on without this boom, boom, boom of a subwoofer. This has got to be stopped. People can't continue to do this and ruin our lives. Something has to be done for my rights." **Commissioner Chris** 

Paasch recommended commissioners consider a noise ordinance, saying he would lead the effort if the other commissioners approved.

"I think law enforcement and code enforcement needs to be the ones to deal with whether they're doing this, how far and how fast it should be dealt with and if it's a warning or it's a fine," Paasch said.

Sheriff John Ward told

commissioners noise issues are not just one-sided.

"I personally haven't taken any complaints from this lady," Ward said. "I know she's frustrated, and I feel her pain, but we also have to deal with other people's rights. As far as what's reasonable, that's a judgement call."

The sheriff said he would ask for more patrols in the area for the time being to help ease any concerns. Ultimately, he said if the county did create a noise ordinance,

same thing we've heard at the pulpit and the sheriff say, saying 'We're scared for our jobs, we're in a toxic work environment.' They're upset about those things, but they're fearful to come in.

"Even with these comments I'm saying now, I worry about retaliation against myself. The comments my wife said, I worry about retaliation against myself. Commissioner Boice, you've told me on several occasions you will support me and want to set me up for success. Yesterday you called me into your office and said the same words and in the next breath told me of your plan of doing away with the director of operations position. Instead of giving me the tools to succeed, you're taking away the job I'm hired for. I question the logic in that decision."

Several other county leaders, Public Health Director Sherrie Ward and Richard Christenson who leads the county road department, also told commissioners they have heard from employees who are upset and afraid.

County Counsel John Huttl told commissioners one of the problems, as he sees it, is most of the employees come from the private sector and are not used to government jobs, with oversight from elected officials.

Boice said all the calls to different department heads is a sign of the problems he is trying to fix.

When they do that and they're not working, this is when the public comes in and goes, my goodness do they really have it that rough and are you leading them out of it," he said. "Well, I'm isolated from those people. I don't have any interaction with employees. So, to hear Commissioner Paasch continually

enforcement would fall more on code enforcement than his staff. He explained his deputies primarily enforced state law, while code enforcement concentrated on county ordinances.

After hearing from the sheriff, Paasch said he would happy to spearhead the effort.

"I would like to volunteer to pull up some ordinances and bring that back for a workshop with code enforcement," Paasch said.

**Commissioners** Court Boice and John Herzog agreed to let Paasch move forward.

The board also took a stand for small businesses in Curry County, signing on to an effort from Douglas County that asks Gov. Kate Brown to reconsider the strong measures taken to combat COVID-19.

"We're doing everything we can to avoid that," Marshall said. "That is emotionally exhausting for staff and students."

Still, in-person classes don't look the same as they did in the past.

For one thing, only half of all students attend at a time, switching off between morning and afternoon cohorts. There's a whole slew of procedures still required by the state, including mask-wearing policies, sanitation practices and space limitations.

And class on Wednesdays is no more – instead, the day is used by small groups meeting for hands-on activities like shop classes.

Another key difference from school years of the past?

"Boy, they are really psyched to be in school," Marshall said of the students.

For many of them, months of learning through online assignments and video sessions have been a challenge. For some, in-person school was more stable than their home lives, forcing them to get creative – some have done schoolwork in their closets or other quiet corners of their homes, he said.

"Will there be a system-wide impact? Yeah," Marshall said, noting that distance

"We are seeking refuge in the effort to protect our rural economy," Boice said. "Economic security is a pressing issue in Curry County, and the current state lockdown policy continues to have direct negative economic, behavioral health and social consequences."

Boice said the letter he was asking commissioners to support was one page and laid out how the state lockdowns have impacted smaller counties.

"It's not a finger pointing game or blame game," he said. "This is where we are and what we need for our businesses and communities."

Commissioners voted unanimously to support the letter and to ask the state to establish accurate hazard levels, noting Curry County has never had the problems other counties have.

learning has been hardest for families with the least stability at home. "For this year, you're not going to see the growth you would in a normal year."

So, a return to in-person classes is a welcome change for many students – but not all. Some families have opted to remain with online school for the year, finding their students thrive more with that learning style.

Given the success some students have seen, that option will likely remain even after the pandemic is over.

"We've definitely made a lot of gains in distance learning," Marshall said. "It really has informed and will continue to inform the conversation of how we can best meet the needs of our students."

For now though, Marshall is hoping to keep school buildings open for the students who want to be in them. Had the county's case numbers been slightly higher in the previous several weeks, the district may not have reopened all the classes it did.

"Thanksgiving week was a rough one," Marshall said of the increased case counts which came from the holiday.

Since cases still have the potential to rise in the community and in schools, Marshall said the future of in-person classes isn't set in stone either.

"I'm certainly very optimistic," Marshall said.

# County

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Chet Brewer, who works in facilities maintenance for the county, agreed with much that Matteson said. "I come to you with some

concerns," he said. "I really feel I've seen a big turn in the last six months with staff and management. I'm not actually sure of a way to fix or try and remedy these problems. We have employees, including myself, who are scared to talk, are scared to bring things to the table, are scared to discuss their feelings and how we can work together as a team. I'm asking you guys to help figure out a plan to fix that. It's getting to the point where it's medically impacting people."

Courtney Rueckert, whose husband Brad is the director of operations for the county, said commissioners are viewing the position in the wrong manner.

"I was very concerned in reading about this, I was concerned about the language of it," she said. "Most especially that it talks about the employee needs as a distraction. I think that's really negative language. It should be a vital part of a manager's job to listen to their employees' needs.

"I'm pretty astounded that this would be a position you would consider eliminating. This is a position that is here to support you as a board. It's here to support you and enact the procedures and policies that you guys create, to make sure that the day-to-day operations go smoothly, to make sure the employees are protected. It seems pretty odd and counterproductive to go backwards."

Brad Rueckert was hired as director of operations three months ago and moved his wife and three children to Curry County, where they purchased a home. Erin Johnson, a business owner who is very active in Curry County, also spoke out against the way employees are being treated. "They're all disheartened. The behaviors that are happening are unprofessional," she said. "I don't see how any of you want to get up and go to work every day. I really implore you, this board, to start working together to make this a better place, to make a better work environment for the betterment of the county. This county is not moving forward, it's moving backward." Emma DuRock, whose husband is the parks director for the county, said employees are suffering because of the board. "People lose sleep, people are scared, people are not following through with things they are planning on doing because they don't know what their livelihoods look like right now," she said. "They feel under attack. There are physical repercussions, there are mental repercussions. This is no way for people to

feel about, not jobs, these are careers. These people should not be forced to look for other work because they are afraid every single day that their job is on the line."

Commissioner John Herzog, who was in his first week on the board, responded to those who spoke.

"I hear the folks and I hear the discontent and the heartache, but as a voting citizen and a long-time member of Curry County, I never wanted a director of operations," he said. "I just met Brad. I'm not talking about Brad, I'm talking about the position. I kind of ran on a platform of a commissioner-run county. I don't want anybody fired, that's not why I ran for county commissioner. I want the board unified and to support our employees."

Herzog said his vision for Curry County is to have the commissioners working as liaisons with department heads. With three full-time commissioners, there would be no need for an administrative lead employee, he said.

George Rhodes, a former county commissioner, said that system was in place when he was in office.

"I think what changed is some folks decided they would work part time and hire an administrator," Rhodes said. "When that changed, some people were working part time and getting paid full time and paying for an administrator."

Commissioner Brad Paasch said he also ran against having an administrator.

"There's a difference between having an administrator who has full control," Paasch said. "I did, as did Commissioner (Court) Boice support bringing back the director of operations. What she became was a conduit between department

aged, being told how to do their jobs when they already know their jobs."

Boice said he asked for the discussion Wednesday because he is looking for ways to save the county money. He said

"Everyone in this room, everyone working for the county, gets a paycheck every two weeks like clockwork," Boice said. "They get medical insurance. My job is to figure out how to keep that going. Sheriff John Ward told commissioners he has also received calls from conweeks.

Paasch explained the director of operations does not hire or fire employees and does not give raises without board approval. Paasch said most of the complaints he has heard have been regarding Boice and his relationship with Herzog.

"I feel a lot of people's pain here because a lot of people have called me the last few weeks with a lot of concerns," Paasch said. "I don't mean this disrespectfully against you, but I think it's a transparency of where we are. They have great concerns that Mr. Boice donated a lot of money to your campaign and now you're on the board. These are the concerns I'm getting from people."

Paasch added that when Julie Schmeltzer, the first director of operations, left last year she pointed the finger at Boice, as well.

'She left here in July, and in her parting letter, she said she could no longer be part of a county where things were done improperly, and she felt some things were illegal," Paasch said. "A large part of what is happening is our employees being micromanheard about Boice.

"Chair Boice, I don't know if you've ever had anyone come to you and make a complaint about me to you since I've been on the board," he said. "I have had many people come to me with complaints about you. That's why we've talked about it in executive session. Miss Schmeltzer, when she resigned from her job, wanted it to be clear she felt she was being micromanaged from one commissioner."

Herzog also joined in, saying the commissioners needed to lead by example.

"I can't help but feel in my heart it can work here if the three of us, the three amigos, make it work," he said. "It's got to start with the three of us being respectful to each other even when we can't. We need to get along."

After listening for several hours, Brad Rueckert finally had a chance to speak.

"Since Monday, I've had numerous employees come into my office saying the

# Curry assessor mails out 2021 personal property returns to business owners

### THE PILOT

Curry County Assessor Jim Kolen reported Monday his office recently mailed Business Personal Property Returns for 2021 to all county business owners the assessor has on record. In Oregon, personal property used as part of a business may be subject to property tax.

Returns must be post marked or filed with the assessor's office no later than March 15 or owners are subject to late filing penalties.

The assessor's office attempts to track businesses within the county and send forms to those owners that they are aware of. It is the business owner's responsibility to report annually, whether they have received notice from the assessor or not. Late filing or not filing can subject the business owner to penalties.

New business owners or business owners who have not yet received their forms should contact Wendy Carpenter in the assessor's office at (541) 247-3256. If your business has closed, this must also be reported to the assessor's office so you are not assessed a property tax.

"We are requesting that Business Personal Property owners call us right away if they have questions," said Kolen. "Ideally if people are timely contacting us, we can work with them to avoid penalties."
