Cliff rappelling to get at pesky gorse

Traffic in both directions on U.S. Highway 101, north of Brookings at Harris Beach, was routed around a worksite this week during an invasive weed-abatement project.

Two workers repelled down Rainbow Rock, a steep cliff on the east side of the highway, to clear patches of gorse, a state-listed noxious weed that's highly flammable and difficult to control once established, said Curry County Soil and Water Conservation District technical coordinator Erin Minster.

She said gorse seeds can remain viable for 30 years or more.

The work that began Aug. 19 was expected to last five days. ODOT is controlling nearby traffic and said there had been minimal delays.

The conservation district and the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) have partnered to remove gorse on the steep cliff adjacent to U.S. Highway 101. Both organizations are

part of the Gorse Action Group, whose mission is "to control and reduce the spread of gorse, minimize the impact of gorse on our economy and natural resources, and provide a successful process to share with others facing gorse infestations."

Minster said gorse is found primarily in the Bandon area along the regional Oregon coast, although infestations have been found around the Harris Beach area north to Lone Ranch.

"The cliff removal is a demonstration project to gauge the efficacy of that proposed treatment technique," Minster said.

ODOT has contracted with Triptych Construction, LLC of Glide, Oregon to conduct cliff work that includes rock scaling and brush removal on steep slopes. "The method involves workers on ropes rappelling their way down the cliff, removing the gorse bushes with power tools, then applying herbicide to the stump," Minster said.

"This is known as cut-stump application, which greatly minimizes the

amount of herbicide applied."

Minster said the removal of gorse on steep slopes and cliffs had not been tried previously, "but the technique is needed at numerous sites along the Oregon coast." She said the cliff at Rainbow Rock was chosen as a good demonstration site.

"Gorse seeds can eject up to 30 feet from the bush, thus landing on the highway, allowing transport to other locales," said Minster. "(Rainbow Rock) is a simple slope with one major plane, thus making for a more-simple approach."

"The location is highly visible, which makes it a good candidate for bringing awareness to the need for gorse control."

The eradication project is funded primarily by ODOT, with additional funding provided by Wild Rivers Coast Alliance for documentation and monitoring. Specific cost figures for the project were unavailable at press time.

100 YEARS STRONG

Whenever there's a cheese competition somewhere in the world, it's a good bet the name Rumiano will be among those acclaimed.

The Crescent City business at 511 9th St., in its fourth-generation of ownership, now with Joby Rumiano in charge, has recently added another seven awards to its office walls.

Which, frankly, you might expect of Rumiano Cheese Co., which titles itself Cali-

fornia's oldest family-owned cheese factory.

Yet the family's reputation didn't get its origin in cheese. Rather, it was the milk.

Joby Rumiano figures everyone has heard the old tales from their own grandparents or great-grandparents ... about the milkman making daily deliveries of fresh milk and taking the empty bottles to recycle. He wonders how many stop to think what happened to that milk supply when it got hot in the dead of summer?

"The demand got to be pretty high for milk," said

Rumino. "But what do you do when there's no demand?"

"That's kinda how the whole cheese factory started back in the early 1900s."

The year was 1919 when Italian brothers Richard, Fred and John Rumiano purchased a small dairy in Willows, California, about 300 miles south of Crescent City. They shifted the emphasis on production to making cheese and grew to be the biggest cheese factory in California by the mid-1930s.

Then, they sold all but

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Rumiano announces new product line coming in soon

Come September, look for a new product line from Rumiano Cheese Co. in Crescent City — Raised to Matter Ghee.

Ghee, or clarified butter, is what results when all the moisture is evaporated out of butter. “It becomes 99.9% fat and is used as an oil substitute for cooking,” said Joby Rumiano, director of product development and fourth-generation owner of the century-old family business.

He said ghee will be a smaller, independent release for Rumiano, primarily in Humboldt, Trinity and Del Norte counties as well as the North Bay area, focusing on independent and higher-end grocery stores.

The ghee will come in five varieties: unsalted, sea salt, garlic, turmeric and black pepper.

Ghee is regularly seen on television cooking shows and TV competitions for its versatility. “You can get it to 482 degrees burning point, can get it rockin’ hot, and make big, old, thick steaks or veggies or baking,” Rumiano said.

“It goes a lot further than a stick of butter. You use less of this, say, frying in a fry pan. Use just a spoonful. It becomes an oil, making the pan anti-stick.”

In addition, said Rumiano, ghee has beneficial fats, short-chain fats, that are more beneficial for diets, such as keto.

“It’s said you get the benefits from beneficial fats, then flush out all the negative stuff,” said Rumiano. “A lot of science behind that that I’m trying to understand — medium-chain triglycerides, amino acids, short- and long-chain fats, all this stuff on back-end testing it.”

Even the trademark, Raised to Matter, went through the ringer. “We’re pretty excited about that. It’s taken a while to get that brand to fruition.

“It has to pass through a trademark attorney, where you learn that many ideas are already taken. Luckily, this one was not taken,” Rumiano said.

He added that Brookings restaurants already have expressed interest in Rumiano’s ghee, like Superfly Martini Bar & Grill and Great American Smokehouse, which will require his company to produce bigger tubs.

“It’s kinda a new thing to me,” he said. “I think it’s going to be pretty cool, adding another uniqueness to our products.”

two of their facilities when modern shipping and mechanization allowed large manufacturers to surpass the smaller, local cheese factories.

Brothers Baird and John returned operations to the Rumiano family by purchasing the company in 1980. The third generation of brothers again shifted the focus of operations, this time to distribution. They further focused on updating and refurbishing their entire factory.

Now 42, Joby Rumiano said he never had a doubt he’d follow the trail his father, Baird, established.

“I had opportunities to do other things, but the biggest part of what’s important is carrying on legacy and tradition,” he said.

“I’m the oldest out of the fourth generation. I’ve worked here since I was a little kid, doing everything from putting stickers on bags to cleaning and making cheese, and everything else in between.”

That included conducting milk-based science experiments in grade school and inventing his own cheese “pizano” in college (which eventually would become the Mediterranean Jack and Sicilian Olive Jack cheeses that Rumiano sells now).

“I’ve been involved in the science and chemistry of it. I enjoy that, the how-cheese-is-made. It’s been educational,” Rumiano said.

He’s proud to have expanded the Rumiano Cheese brand, including certifications into the organic (2003), American Humane Treatment of Animals (2007) and first non-GMO certified, or genetically modified organism (2011).

While giants like Tillamook Cheese, based in Tillamook, Oregon, are about 10 times larger in scale than Rumiano, said Joby Rumiano, his company takes pride in making inroads into niche markets, such as organic cheese, which currently is about 70% of Rumiano’s production.

“We’ve really worked hard making our cheese very consistent, using high-quality milk, making cheese that can be used for multiple things,” said Rumiano. “It’s very versatile: sliced, diced, shredded, chunked, whatever, it wouldn’t be for just one function. Whether it’s for food service, retail, private-label, slices or shreds.

“Our rule of thumb is, get our cheese in someone’s mouth, they’ll come back and buy it again,” Rumiano said.

That commitment to excellence is why their cheese products win so many awards, he said. Their most recent plaudits include:

— First place, dry jack cheese, at the 37th-annual American Cheese Society Judging and Competition, July 22-25, in Portland.

— Sweet cream butter, bronze medal, United States Championship Cheese Contest, March 5-7, in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

— Four awards at the 2019 California State Fair, including gold medals for smoked mozzarella and dry jack, silvers for peppato dry jack and organic raw medium cheddar, and bronze for sriracha jack.

“That’s a fun part of the business,” said Rumiano, “but it’s (also) a credit to our hard work and dedication as a whole company, as a team. So we all get satisfaction with an award, the acknowledgments.”

The demand for their cheese has grown along with their collection of honors. For example, Rubiano said, many of this region’s Mexican food restaurants buy the company’s shreds, including Crescent City establishments such as Christina’s, Gordi Bro’s, Los Compadres and SeaQuake Brewing, Seattle-based Pagliachi Pizza gets 100% of its cheese from Rumiano.

In Del Norte County, Rumiano cheese is sold at Shop Smart, Safeway and Harvest Natural Foods in Crescent City; and Gasquet Market in Gasquet, among other stores. One Curry County location is Seaweed Natural Grocery in Port Orford.

Meantime, Rumiano said he’s always trying something new, including a local take on a Wisconsin favorite. “There, available at any bar, are fried fish and fried cheese. I thought, ‘These are good. Someone needs to do them around here.’ Vista Pub, Sea Quake and Fat Irish in Brookings now offer our fried curds,” he said.

Rubiano emphasized that the company’s success is attributable to a collaborative process that stretches from their 42 employees in Crescent City to the cows in Humboldt County. “The thing people don’t really understand is, the whole ecosystem is pretty vast and large when it comes to Humboldt and Del Norte County. We know the government owns 85 percent of the land around here, which returns zero tax revenue coming back to the community. But farms like Alexanders, Westbrooks, Hastings, Donny Crockett, Ocean Air Farms, they are generating tax revenue for the local economy. What happens when we buy milk - our number-one input cost, millions and millions and millions of dollars a month - it’s paying the dairymen for milk. Then, they’re going out and buying other stuff they need for their ranches: tractors, fuel from the local fuel guy, feed from the local feed guy, the truck from a local car lot.

“The ecosystem spreads out, contributing to the local economy.”

DeFazio schedules visits here

Oregon U.S. Rep. Peter DeFazio (D) has scheduled townhall meetings for Gold Beach and Brookings this month.
A press release from the congressman’s office said the two townhalls will focus on transportation and infrastructure on the southern Oregon coast.

Last fall, DeFazio secured \$13 million from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to fund dredging and safety projects in southwestern Oregon. He also secured a \$20-million grant to rehabilitate and replace as many as 15 rail bridges along the Coos Bay Rail Line.
And DeFazio’s staff noted he secured a \$3-million grant for Southwest Oregon Community College to help build a Health, Science and Technology Building.
The Gold Beach meeting will be Aug. 27, 5-6 p.m., at the Curry Public Library, 94341 3rd St.
The Brookings townhall will be Aug. 28, 10:30-11:30 a.m., at the Chetco Community Library, 405 Alder St.
In other public appearances, DeFazio is scheduled to deliver the keynote address at the Oregon Coastal Caucus Economic Summit today in Florence.
His remarks will address the need for investment in and modernization of roads, bridges, ports, airports and wastewater systems, according to his staff.
Following his public appearances in Gold Beach and Brookings, DeFazio will hold a Coos Bay townhall Aug. 28.

“No changes are anticipated to station programming,” Timpe said. “Fans will still see the same familiar faces in the community. Sharon Toney continues to ‘Stuff the Bus’ in the station’s school supply drive, and KURY stations will still offer the ability to buy coupons to area businesses.”

A veteran broadcaster, Timpe said, “I’m very excited about KURY Radio being a part of the

Bicoastal Media family. KURY Radio fits our philosophy of being the ‘local’ radio station: Broadcasting high school sports, supporting local groups and providing listeners with local information.

“We pride ourselves in being involved in the places where we live and work, and by being the go-to source for information when the community needs it most.”

The local radio stations’ combined group reportedly now employs about 13 full-time employees.

The stations will be operated under a local marketing agreement while the transaction is pending FCC approval.



Gasquet American Legion works to bolster its ranks

Jamie Brassard is eager to get the word out about the Gasquet American Legion, especially thanks to recent actions of President Donald Trump.

Trump signed the LE-GION (Let Everyone Get Involved In Opportunities for National Service) Act on July 30, which declares the United States has been in a state of war since Dec. 7, 1941.

While the declaration honored about 1,600 U.S. service members who were killed or wounded during previously undeclared periods of war, it also opened the door for some 6 million veterans to access American Legion programs and benefits for which they previously had not been eligible.

“Congress originally set up the charter that in order to join the American Legion, you had to have served during war periods. This act opens it wide up as to

who can join the American Legion,” said Brassard, the adjutant at Gasquet American Legion Post 548.

Now, new members need to have served during World War I, World War II, or from 1946 to present.

Located at 1555 Gasquet Flat Rd., about 14 miles northeast of Crescent City on Highway 199, Brassard said the Gasquet American Legion is the only one remaining in the region after the branches in Crescent City, Smith River and Brookings all closed from a lack of membership.

That’s why she’s planning a membership drive Sept. 11, 10 a.m.-2 p.m., at the Veterans Service Office, 810 H St. in Crescent City.

Brassard said she and her husband, James, who’s the current post commander, have succeeded in boosting membership a bit since they moved to Gasquet six years ago. That membership now is 64.

Jamie Brassard has been a member for 35 years, after her service in the Marines was cut short by health issues, from 1972-74.

James Brassard served with both the U.S. Navy during Vietnam and then the U.S. Army. He retired from the military with 28 total years of service and has been an American Legion member for 41 years.

Jamie Brassard said the American Legion, established in 1919 by President Theodore Roosevelt and founded in Gasquet in 1946, has services and activities open to military veterans regardless of whether they’re members of the local post.

“A lot of vets don’t understand that we’re not just a bunch of old drunks sitting around a bar,” she said. “Heck, our bar isn’t even open!”

What fun the Gasquet post may be renowned for, Brassard said, is its annual raft race in July down the Smith River, an event now in its 50th year. Plus its sponsorship of two American Legion baseball teams, one for high school play-

ers and another for players under age 14.

The American Legion offers scholarships, too, such as to Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps programs, and grants, like the \$1,500 they presented to U.S. Coast Guard members who didn’t receive a paycheck during the recent federal government shutdown.

Brassard is especially proud of the 3 million hours the American Legion members dedicate to volunteer programs, among them helping vets get Veterans Administration benefits “they need and deserve.”

“A lot of these guys have to go to White City or Roseburg in Oregon, or Eureka in California,” she said. “That’s too far for them to drive.”

“Brookings has a clinic, but it’s always booked solid.”

Brassard said she’s making it her primary project this year to ensure local veterans are counted in the national Census so their numbers show a real need for getting VA help locally. That effort includes reaching out to a number of homeless vets.

“You would not believe the number of homeless vets in this county,” she said. “The vets don’t want people to know they’re homeless. They’re embarrassed that with their VA paycheck, they can’t even afford to pay rent.”

Regardless of whether the vets join the Gasquet American Legion ranks during the current membership drive, said Brassard, they can count on comradeship and a helping hand from the post.

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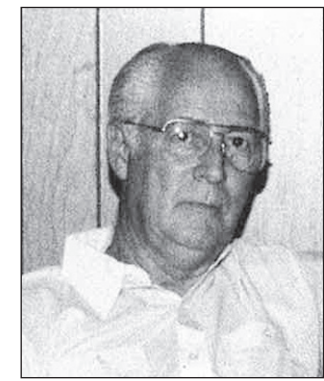
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Chester (Chuck) E. Ralstin

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Wanted: Families for felines and canines

The Pilot carries an Adopt-a-Pet full-page ad on alternating weeks that features photos of four-legged friends looking for a family. Why are there so many photos? Because local animal shelters are filled to capacity with rescued animals.

“We get about 550 intakes and succeed in 520 adoptions a year,” said Jennifer Alcorn, the shelter manager at the South Coast Humane Society in Brookings.

She added that in addition to cats and dogs, the shelter houses everything from rabbits to turtles. “You never know what crazy creatures we find homes for,” Alcorn said.

The shelter charges a \$100 adoption fee for dogs, which includes spaying and neutering costs, vaccinations, flea and tick control, deworming and microchipping. The fee for cats is \$65, which includes the same services as for dogs minus the microchipping, which is an additional \$25.

Meantime, the plight of homeless pets is just as severe in Del Norte County to the south.

“We have 32 dogs right now,” said Justin Riggs, director of Del Norte County Animal Control. “That puts our building at absolute capacity. An optimal capacity would be 24.

“We reached double our capacity twice last year.”

Riggs said the Crescent City shelter’s staff keeps the dogs on site as healthy and as long as they can. He said animals are euthanized only for health or severe behavior problems. He estimated that 300 to 400 dogs

are taken in over the course of a year, with only three or four needing to be euthanized.

The Del Norte County Animal Control Shelter, at 2650 West Washington Blvd., accepts dogs abandoned by their owners – say, when an owner is relocating and can’t move with the pet – as well as strays. Especially this time of year, Riggs said: “We get a lot of tourists that see a wandering dog and scoop it up and bring it to us.”

For the last couple of years, the shelter has seen a run of Nordic dog breeds, shepherds, Huskies and pit bull mixes.

Not to mention the “bully” breeds that are harder to adopt out: pit bulls, dobermans and rottweilers. “They’re good dogs,” said Riggs, “they can just be a little animal aggressive, needing extra-care handling or training.”

Riggs said the region’s stray-dog problem stems from owners who fail to have their pets spayed or neutered. The shelter will absorb that cost for perspective new owners, requiring only a flat adoption fee of \$75, which is reduced to \$30 for military veterans.

The shelter has an adoption event the second Saturday of every month, usually overseen by volunteers. The volunteers, Riggs said, help the dogs’ quality of life by taking them for walks, and feeding, training and bathing them.

Volunteers are always needed, be they serving as foster families or drivers who transport the dogs to other facilities. And, said Riggs, the shelter can always use help maintaining and fixing the kennels.

For their part, kids pitch in by writing dog biographies, taking

photos and helping with the adoption events.

Married couple Scott and Lisa Miller have been volunteering at the shelter for four years and have fostered 40 dogs. “We love dogs,” said Scott Miller, “and just want to see them get good homes.”

He added that the couple fosters dogs in their home that are awaiting adoption because some dogs don’t integrate well with others at the shelter. That would describe Willie the

chihuahua, their current foster pet. “Little dogs come to the shelter and just shut down around big dogs,” Miller said.

Elis Dickson, who volunteers at the county’s animal-control shelter, also serves as the rescue and adoption director for Dogs of Del Norte. She said some of the best-adjusted dogs the shelters see come from what might seem an unlikely source. “The homeless-population dogs are like the best,” she said. “They end up so adjusted to life.”

While the Del Norte County Animal Control shelter cares for dogs, the Humane Society of Del Norte County takes in the cats.

Shelter manager Eileen Bennett said that shelter has room for a maximum of 12 adult cats. Because many of those come in as expectant mothers, the shelter has 35 to 40 kittens available at any given time.

She said the Humane Society of Del Norte does not euthanize. “We’ll keep a healthy

adult cat as long as it takes to adopt,” Bennett.

“Sometimes, (the cats) end up becoming the shelter mascot, if they don’t get adopted out. They’ve been with us so long, they end up loving everybody.”

The Human Society has a \$50 adoption fee, which includes spay and neutering costs, updated vaccines, and a one-pound bag of food to take home along with the cat.

Unfortunately, that facility is in quarantine for another two weeks or so because of an outbreak of distemper in May, soon followed by a string of feline upper-respiratory and bacterial infections. Bennett said the facility has been completely disinfected, but the shelter has only a couple of kittens currently available.

She added that many of the shelter’s cats were found in the usual “dumping” locations; for example, in Crescent City on the beach along Front Street, or near the U.S. Coast Guard Station on Anchor Way.

Other cats at the Humane Society were found after they’d had litters under houses or in barns. Bennett added that feral cats occasionally are sought by clients because they make good barn cats that help control the rat population.

For 6-month old Nox Toler and his 2-year-old brother, Theo, of Crescent City, it was an up-close and personal visit with first-responders and superheroes ... with no emergencies to deal with.

Sam and his wife, Jaclyn Toler, brought their children to the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Curry County Heroes Breakfast on Aug. 17, at the Brookings Elks Lodge. Outside, Brookings fire trucks, Cal-Ore Light Flight ambulances and Curry County sheriff's vehicles were on display in a fun setting.

As Jaclyn Toler held Nox, Curry County Sheriff's Deputy Jeremy Krohn carefully pinned a junior deputy sheriff's badge to the front of the boy's red shirt.

Cal-Ore Life Flight paramedic Art Tarin said the first-time Heroes Breakfast is a positive connection for first-responders and small children. "In an emergency, it can be chaotic and confusing, and they may be scared," he said. "We want to show that we are not somebody

they need to be afraid of.

"We want them to run to us and know that we are here to support them. So it's good catching them at this age."

Brookings Police School Resource Officer Rob Johnson spent plenty of time at the breakfast greeting the children. "This is important," he said, "because it helps us make connections with children as being people, as being human."

"Being in a setting where it is not an emergency, they are not being traumatized. We get to meet with them and see them one-on-one on their level and spend a little time with them."

Johnson said the experience builds positive relations between police and children. "If they already have that connection and experience in a good setting, then we're not somebody in a scary uniform."

"So in a scary time, we are someone they can turn to and who they can trust," Johnson said.

MOMENTS IN TIME

* On Sept. 8, 1504, one of the world’s most beloved works of art, “David,” by Michelangelo Buonarroti, is unveiled to the public in Florence, Italy’s Piazza della Signoria. It reportedly took 40 men four days to move the 17-foot-tall, 12,000-pound marble masterpiece 1/2 mile to the site.

* On Sept. 4, 1951, President Harry Truman’s speech before a conference in San Francisco becomes the first television program to be broadcast from coast to coast. It was picked up by 87 stations in 47 cities.

* On Sept. 2, 1969, America’s first automatic teller machine (ATM) makes its public debut, dispensing cash to customers at Chemical Bank in Rockville Center, New York.
