# **Democrats office vandalized**

A window at the office of the Curry County Democratic Party in Brookings was smashed over the weekend, according to party officials.

It's not the first time the office has been vandalized, and party officials are asking for the community's support in avoiding another destructive period like in 2014, when windows at the office were



charged for five previous incidents at the office, but she is hopeful the rise of security cameras and social media will help bring more evidence this time.

The office's security camera caught footage before and after the incident, which took place between 5:15 and 5:30 p.m. Feb. 12, but not during it. Some footage shows a group of people walking by the office a few minutes before the incident, glancing at the office and using an expletive toward President Joe Biden.

# Curry virus cases on the rise

County could face increased restrictions if numbers stay high

COVID-19 cases have increased slightly across Curry County over the past two weeks, according to state and local data.

Between Feb. 9 and 15, the county public health department was notified about 16 new COVID-19 cases confirmed by the county's contracted health officer.

Four cases were connected to south county residents, and 12 were in central Curry County. A majority of the cases were connected to previously reported cases, according to Public Health Administrator Sherrié Ward.

"(Curry County Public Health) is reaching out to all reported positive cases to make sure they are insolating and monitoring for symptoms," Ward wrote in a press release. "CCPH is currently investigating the cases through contact tracing to identify any possible contacts and exposures relevant to the cases and will reach out to anyone suspected of exposure to COVID-19."

Since the start of the pandemic, the county has seen 373 cases of the virus, and six virus-related deaths, according to Ward.

Curry County remains in the lowest-risk category of the state's virus restrictions, but that could change if current virus trends continue.

On Tuesday, the Oregon Health Authority reported the county had 36 cases of the virus between Jan. 31 and Feb. 13, the most recent

damaged four times.

"This is the sixth time since 2012 our windows have been violently smashed and, so far, nobody has been charged," party spokesperson Lisa Neher wrote in a statement. "We hope this kind of senseless violence and vandalism gets the attention of our elected officials."

Images of the vandalism show the window almost completely smashed. No projectiles have been found inside the building, and party

officials have reported the information to police.

Still, party members aren't con-

fident any charges will result from the incident. Party Treasurer Teresa Lawson said no one had been At the time of the incident, a poster celebrating Black History Month was on display on the impacted window, which the party speculated could have been a reason the window was targeted.

This month's vandalism was the first incident at the office since 2014, but Lawson and Neher said political tensions have been high in recent months.

# **Chrome Challenge seeks steelhead**

Chetco River steelhead anglers have a chance to win big — and use their catch for a cause.

The Oregon South Coast Fishermen have launched this year's Chetco Chrome Challenge, asking anglers to donate their catch in exchange for raffle prizes and the chance to be crowned "King of Chrome."

"This is designed to be fun. Catch fish, and donate your fish to the broodstock program," said Dave Kuehn, who's heading the challenge.

It's simple to enter: Pay the entry fee, and you're in the general raffle pool.

But if you want to be in the "Chrome" prize pool? You've got to catch and donate a wild steelhead.

The goal isn't just the giveaway: Kuehn and his crew are using the competition to help spur donations to the Chetco River Broodstock Program. The target is to collect 50 pair of steelhead this season to donate to the program.

Usually, anglers on boats and along river bars have just two options when they catch a steelhead: They can release the fish back to the stream or harvest it if they haven't met their limit. But the broodstock program offers another option: Donating fish to the Elk River Hatchery to spawn more steelhead.



## DeFazio urges Biden to release harbor funds

House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure Chair Peter DeFazio urged President Biden to fully utilize the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund in his upcoming budget request, a move that would make billions of dollars in already-collected fees available to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to maintain U.S. ports and harbors, which create jobs and help drive the economy. In total, the country's maritime transportation industry

supports more than \$4 trillion


in commerce and employs more than 23 million people. In the letter, DeFazio

noted that while the HMTF with approximately \$10 billion sitting idle in the trust fund and an additional \$1.6 billion in collections being deposited annually — the bipartisan Water Resources Development Act of 2020, signed into law late last year — has given the president

new tools to finally unlock these much-needed funds and make them available to communities across the country.

"By taking advantage of these increased spending limits in your FY 2022 budget request and releasing these funds, you can maximize the capability of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to meet existing federal harbor maintenance obligations and have an immediate positive benefit on our Nation's economy and critical infrastructure.

### **David Allen Boice** May 1, 1937 - February 13, 2021



David was born May 1, 1937, to Marjorie LuElla Carmack Boice and Fred Guerin Boice while they were driving the Roosevelt Highway (Hwy 101) from Langlois to the Bandon Hospital in a borrowed 1937 Chrysler. David was born at Four Mile, Oregon in front of a service station owned by Dewey Keeler. (Now West Coast Game Park.) David's life-long nickname became 'Dewey' that day - as applied by David's father's five Boice brothers and 6 Boice sisters, who are the children of Judge Allen H. Boice and Carrie Guerin Boice of Langlois, Oregon.

David attended school in Langlois except for his junior year which was spent in Roseburg where he lived for a time with his Aunt Hilda (Boice) and Uncle Don Auer. Returning to Langlois, he began his senior year but decided to enlist in the United States Marine Corp in 1955. In March of 1956, he was assigned to "B" Company 1 BN. 2 INF. TR. Regt., in Camp Pendleton, CA. He received Combat Training and was awarded the Rifle Expert Badge.

The Marines sent David to school for three months in Tennessee and 6 months in Florida. He was then stationed at Iwakuni, Japan, in the Air Wing Overhaul Squadron where he worked as a fully trained Metal Smith on Jet and Prop AD Sky Raiders. Dave's last six months of service in the Marines was as Sgt. of the Guard at El Toro Marine Air Base in California, now a closed base. He was proud to be a Marine and appreciated the teachings of the service at age eighteen!

When David returned home from military service in 1960, he lived on Langlois Mountain with his brother-inlaw and sister, Hal and Patti Strain. Later they all moved to Coquille where Dave worked for Johnson Truck Service in 1961 loading plywood into railroad boxcars at Johnson Reload for two years. Dave

drove truck for Johnson Truck Service until it was bought out by West Coast Truck Lines. In those days, he hauled plywood from Gold Beach Plywood to Johnson Reload where it was loaded into railroad cars and sent east from Coquille. (Johnson Truck Service migrated from Tillamook. Oregon to Coquille in the late 1950s.) Dave finished his accident-free driving career with 81/2 years at Stalcup and 18 years at Knutson trucking firms. But Dave wasn't done driving yet! Next was the church bus runs of thirty years delivering children to Bay Area Bible Baptist Church

and safely home. On June 24, 1962, Dave married Shiela Carolyn James. They purchased a home in Coos Bay's Englewood District and later moved to Oak Street in North Bend where they lived many years. They were saved by the Lord Jesus in 1980; giving their lives to the Lord and attending the Bay Area Bible Baptist Church in North Bend. Dave and Shiela weren't blessed with children, but found God gave them a heart to love the kids of their city and bring them to church. Together, they went out in the church bus weekly and picked up children in the areas of Charleston, Empire, and North Bend, taking them to church and delivering them safely home each Sunday. Shiela always rode with Dave and attended to the smaller children and maintained order in the bus. They met and visited with many parents who were pleased to have a safe way for their children to attend church. Dave and Shiela also



asked Jesus to save them from their sins because of the effort of this couple married for over 55 years.

Dave's sister and her husband Hal provided Dave with a large extended family. Dave is survived by his sister Patti Boice Strain and her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren: David Strain (Kathy), Darcie Strain Stone (Bob), and Douglas Strain (Dawn) and by their (and Dan's) nine children; Sasha, Sabra, and Sareal Strain; Teal Geib (Kyle), Wayne Parrish (Kaylie) and Tara Goffic (Nathan), Caitlyn Meals (Kyle), Chris Strain and Emma Strain. Their eleven children are: Brodie Parrish, Connor, Caleb, Zane and Zach Goffic, Avie and Adley Parrish, Wrigley Meals, and Kylie Geib.

### Brock Smith introduces legislation aimed at helping businesses suffering during pandemic

State Rep. David Brock Smith (R-Port Orford) recently introduced legislation that will bring equity across the business sector during the remainder of the state of emergency related to the Covid-19 pandemic.

"For nearly a year of a rollercoaster of business closures, tens of thousands of Oregonians have been unemployed from the hospitality sector across our state," said Brock Smith. "Many of these entrepreneurs in the hospitality sector are being forced to close their doors forever. These business owners, their hardworking employees and their families have faced extreme hardships with devastating delays in business relief, unemployment insurance payments, with little to no income and no relief in sight. Many of these restaurants and hospitality

industry businesses will close their doors forever, taking these jobs with them. Further, the majority of these impacted Oregonians are the most vulnerable working families across our state."

According to the Oregon Employment Department, Oregonians employed within the hospitality industry are the most racially diverse and the second most ethnically diverse in Oregon.

"We are not only losing our hospitality businesses across the state and the jobs associated with them forever, we are losing our unique, locally family owned, independent small eateries. These businesses do not have the ability to weather the income deficits from closures, unlike their corporate chain competitors," said Brock Smith. 'There must be equity across the all business sectors

regarding Covid-19 mandates and closures. The hospitality industry takes great measures assuring safety and provides an extremely sanitary environment for dining. Big box stores and other essential open businesses are less sanitary and require far more individual self-regulation than conditions within eateries."

"Us legislators have been telling our constituents that while not in session, we have no authority to intervene on the governor's executive orders related to the COVID-19 emergency, subsequent mandates and their closures. We have now begun the '21 Legislative Session and it is past time for the legislative branch to assert our responsibility; and I would argue the obligation, in guiding policy and lead in this work for the residents that put us here to do so," said Brock Smith.





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# **OHA** says 'breakthrough' cases are no surprise

### Some pharmacies begin receiving doses

Oregon health officials are now reporting four cases of COVID-19 in individuals who have been fully vaccinated against the virus.

The cases, called "breakthrough cases," come as no surprise, as no vaccine for any disease is completely effective, according to Dr. Dean Sidelinger, the state epidemiologist who spoke to reporters in a briefing Friday, Feb. 12.

"These breakthrough cases are not unexpected," Sidelinger said. "No vaccine provides 100% protection, and clinical trials of both vaccines presently in use included breakthrough cases. In those cases, even though the participants got COVID, the vaccines reduced the severity of illness."

Those clinical trials have shown that around 95% of people who get vaccinated don't end up catching

COVID-19 — and that those who do catch it have significantly milder symptoms than if they hadn't, Sidelinger said.

Officials from the Oregon Health Authority say two of the cases were reported in Yamhill County, and two were reported in Lane County. That's just four breakthrough cases of over 177,000 people the state's reporting are fully vaccinated against the virus.

Oregon is one of the first states in the nation to report breakthrough cases, since most states have only just begun to have people who fall into the "fully vaccinated" category, which comes two weeks after their second dose of the vaccine.

Still, Sidelinger said the vaccine is going to be the state's most important tool in fighting the COVID-19 pandemic.

"More Oregonians are getting vaccinated by the day, and the existing vaccines offer unprecedented levels of effectiveness," Sidelinger said. "The quickest and most direct route out of this pandemic is to get

vaccinated while you're eligible." Vaccinations will need to ramp

up to about 25,000 per day statewide in order to achieve community immunity by Autumn, according to OHA Director Patrick Allen. While some days the state has already hit that target, vaccine dose supply is still far below the state's capacity, Allen said.

He added that the state is slightly behind its expected timeline for vaccinating teachers and educators across the state. Three weeks ago, OHA projected it would have allocated 59% of the vaccine doses needed for educators by this point, but it's only reached about 50%, Allen said.

In positive news, Sidelinger reported Friday the state has returned to levels of daily virus transmission not seen since the fall, allowing some counties across the state to reopen some businesses for the first time in months.

"These decreases are a testament to the actions all Oregonians have taken to slow the spread of COVID-19," Sidelinger said.

### Vaccine availability expands

The state is also getting more help in its race to distribute the COVID-19 vaccine. Allen said Friday the state's weekly dose allocation would be increasing to about 82,000 doses, up from the previously announced 75,000 a week.

Select pharmacies across the state have begun receiving and administering doses of the vaccine. According to Stephen Certo, who directs pharmacy operations for Safeway and Albertsons stores in Oregon, that set of pharmacies includes over 100 Safeway and Albertsons locations across the state.

"We as a company, we're thrilled to be a part of it, and be able to provide vaccines to the communities we serve. So, we are really excited," Certo said Friday.

Residents can see available locations and sign up for vaccination appointments at www.albertsons. com/pharmacy/covid-19.html or www.safeway.com/pharmacy/ covid-19.html.

Some Costco stores and Health Mart Pharmacies have also received doses of the vaccine and will begin scheduling appointments. OHA's Allen confirmed that, starting Feb. 15, individuals over 75 will become eligible to receive the vaccine.

While the state's projected increase in weekly doses is a good sign, the effects won't be immediate.

"That's good news, but we know those doses are still months away," Allen said.

What's more, even the very small number of breakthrough cases signals Oregonians must continue to keep their guard up against the virus, even if they've been fully vaccinated against the virus. He pointed to the spike in cases the state saw during the spring and summer, as some activities began reopening after the pandemic's initial lockdown.

"I think we all need to remember that period and remind ourselves we're still not going back to the way things were before," Allen said. "We're going to need to continue to wear masks, to socially distance."

# DeFazio re-introduces Southwestern Oregon Salmon and Watershed Protection Act

Congressman Peter De-Fazio recently re-introduced legislation to make permanent a 20-year ban on new mining projects in the Pistol River and Rough and Ready Creek watersheds in southwest Oregon.

"These watersheds provide critical drinking water for several communities and support highly sensitive ecosystems for salmon as well as the highest concentrations of rare plants in Oregon," said DeFazio. "This legislation is necessary to maintain the current 20-year ban on mining in the area and will enable Congress to make that ban permanent. For the health of our communities and ecosystems throughout the region, it is imperative to protect this area from the threat of foreign-owned mining companies."

"The headwaters of our wild rivers are no place for strip mining," said Ann Vileisis, president of the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society in Port Orford. "We're grateful that Rep. DeFazio continues to fight to protect Southwest Oregon's cherished rivers."

"As a brewer, I care deeply about protecting the source of the water I use to make great beer," said James Smith, Arch Rock Brewery in Gold Beach. "I applaud Congressman DeFazio for introducing legislation to permanently protect the headwaters of Hunter Creek and other amazing wild

rivers in southwestern Oregon from the threat of strip mining."

# 'Gun Nut' has a warning about new culture

When I was a young man growing up in rural Oregon, there was a term for people like me: "gun nut."

By my 20s, I had a sizable collection of rifles, pistols and shotguns. Some people I knew had a "pre-64" Winchester, a rifle renowned for its quality. Or they had a Browning Auto 5, a beautiful shotgun. A friend had 10 of those in various gauges.

But gun nuts today are a different breed entirely. When they talk about guns, they don't get into describing graceful lines, tight grain wood or immaculate bluing. At gun stores today what I hear praised is firepower that comes out of black plastic and steel. And these weapons are not for hunting, they're assault rifles sometimes called "modern sporting guns." The kind of sport they're good for is not spelled out.

One of the gun stores I visited recently boasted a back wall lined with assault-style rifles, pistols and defensive shotguns, all black except for a choice few in hot pink "for the ladies." The staff mostly wore black as well.

Their T-shirts for sale featured some amalgam of the American Flag and warnings such as "Don't tread on me" and "MOA $\Omega$ N AABE", an ancient Greek phrase roughly meaning "Come and take them." Everybody - and I mean staff and other customers - was packing holstered pistols. I felt out of place and time.

In my sleepy Oregon town, sentiments like this don't stop at a gun store. A trip to the supermarket is not complete without several sightings of men or women packing a pistol on their hip.

It is as if we are living in a fetishized version of the Wild West. Some of these folks probably envision themselves as the whitehat cowboy, a character prepared to defend against marauders.

My town boasts one of the oldest independent newspapers in Oregon, but the readership is a quarter that of the Facebook page for the local police scanner. Every crime committed is conveniently pinged to each follower's cell, providing a steady feed of this world's ills. But when we see the world through a lens of fear, it is no wonder that we look at our neighbors with suspicion. Maybe that explains the amazing statistic last year from Axios. com that "an estimated 5 million Americans bought their first gun."

Dana Loesch, the former spokeswoman for the bankrupt National Rifle Association, talked about this free-floating fear: "The government has proven it cannot keep us safe, yet some people want to disarm all of us."

This new group of men and women who wear guns as political statements apparently no longer experience weapons as tools for hunting or for sport. Even claims of defense are suspect. What type of threat necessitates military firepower? Somehow, guns have become identified as symbolizing freedom, individuality or just plain cantankerousness. It makes me miss the old days when a gun was just a tool - albeit sometimes a beautifully crafted one.

The irony of the modern gun movement is that a take-no-prisoner stance on gun rights might just turn into a groundswell of support for tighter regulations of guns. But when the patriots start to lose gun nuts like me, they teeter on the brink of irrelevance.

Meanwhile, as the FBI cracks down on extremists who like to brag about their weapons on social media, we could be looking at more outbreaks of violence. LaVoy Finicum, who was killed by the FBI during the Malheur Refuge occupation in Oregon, seems to have become a martyr. Kyle Rittenhouse, the young man charged in the slaying of two civil rights protesters, has even developed a cult-like following.

The so-called patriots of today risk the very rights they've pledged to uphold with their lives. I know it's a far less exciting thing to promote, but what makes America great is getting things done by talking and compromising.

I do not own an AR-15, and depending on my mood I can make an argument both for and against further regulations. After all, is my favorite deer rifle any less deadly than the scariest-looking assault weapon?

But on Jan. 6 at the Capitol, as I witnessed some of my countrymen threaten to use their weapons against our government, I found regulations more appealing.

It may be tedious to take part in politics on the level of reading about issues and engaging with people, but so far, that's what makes America the best place to live. If I had to come up with a T-shirt slogan about a weapon, it wouldn't be a threat, a warning or a brag. How about: A gun is just a gun.

# Guest Opinion March is Self-Harm/ Self-Injury Awareness and Prevention Month

Self-Harm Awareness Month (also known as Self-Injury Awareness Month) is an annual global awareness event and campaign where people make special efforts to raise awareness about self-harm and self-injury. The goal of the people who observe this event is to break down the common stereotypes surrounding self-harm and to educate medical professionals about the condition.

According to the National Alliance of Mental Illness, self-harm or self-injury means hurting oneself on purpose. One common method is cutting with a sharp object, but any time someone deliberately hurts themself is classified as self-harm. Some people feel an impulse to cause burns, pull out hair or pick at wounds to prevent healing. Extreme injuries can result in broken bones. Hurting oneself is a sign of emotional distress. Self-harm also causes feelings of shame. The scars caused by frequent cutting or burning can be permanent. Drinking alcohol or doing drugs while hurting yourself increases the risk of a more severe injury than intended. Selfharm is not a mental illness, but a behavior that indicates a need for better coping skills. Several illnesses are associated with it, including borderline personality disorder, depression, eating disorders, anxiety or posttraumatic distress disorder. Self-harm occurs most often

during the teenage and young adult years, though it can also happen later in life. Those at the most risk are people who have experienced trauma, neglect or abuse. For instance, if a person grew up in an unstable family, it might have become a coping mechanism. If a person binge drinks or uses illicit drugs, they are at greater risk of self-injury, because alcohol and drugs lower self-control. The urge to hurt yourself may start with overwhelming anger, frustration or pain. If a person doesn't feel many emotions, they might cause themself pain in order to feel something "real" to replace emotional numbness.

Self-harm is not the same as attempting suicide. However, it is

a symptom of emotional pain that should be taken seriously. If someone is hurting themself, they may be at an increased risk of feeling suicidal. It is important to find treatment for the underlying emotions.

The Curry County Suicide Awareness and Prevention Council meets monthly to coordinate services and resources related to suicide in our area. # economic stimulus payments

LINCOLN CITY – This week, Senator Dick Anderson (R-Lincoln City) is drafting legislation that would prohibit the state of Oregon from taxing federal economic impact payments.

"The sole purpose of federal stimulus checks was to give people help when they needed it the most," Anderson said. "There is no justification for the state to be taking some off the top. Helping people get back on their feet means helping them keep more money in their pockets."

An estimated 870,000 Oregonians will be sending part of their federal stimulus checks to the state government because of a reduced federal tax subtraction on state returns. Because federal subtractions are phased out at higher income levels and not applicable for low-income earners with no federal tax liability, middle-class families are hit hardest by the loophole.

"Struggling working families need our help, not for the government to be taking more money from them during these challenging times," Anderson continued. "It's an issue of fairness. Should the state be taking money that was intended to help people? I don't think so, and most my constituents from the coast don't think so either."

An average family of four would see nearly \$300 of their federal stimulus money go to the state in personal income taxes, bringing over \$110 million over the next few years in state revenue, according to a Legislative Revenue report.

"\$300 can make a big difference

### for families who are struggling to afford groceries, childcare or making rent," Anderson said. "While we will be dealing with the impacts of the economic devastation the pandemic has brought for years, this is a good first step. I look forward to finding more ways to help our small businesses and working families recover."

Per state law, the earliest bills that affect state finances can go into effect is 91 days after the end of the legislative session. Thus, filers may opt to amend this year's tax filing or apply for a tax credit on next year's taxes. Other provisions included in the legislation would also exempt any future stimulus checks from state taxes. The bill is currently being drafted with Legislative Counsel and a bill number will follow.

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


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

# Merkley named chair of key subcommittee

U.S. Senator Jeff Merkley recently announced that he will serve as the chair of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee that funds the U.S. Department of Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Forest Service.

"Last year's unprecedented wildfire season serves as another haunting reminder that the health and safety of our communities depend on our ability to maintain healthy forests and aggressively tackle the climate crisis," Merkley said. "I'm honored to be leading the Appropriations subcommittee that is at the heart of those fights. I will keep working to secure the resources Oregon needs to take on these and other challenges — addressing Sudden Oak Death, protecting fish habitat, improving forest

health, boosting our recreation economy, protecting our drinking water and preserving Oregon and America's many natural treasures.

"I also take seriously the critical role this subcommittee plays in delivering resources for tribal nations and native communities in Oregon and across our country. All too often, the United States has not fulfilled its promises to Indian Country, and I will work hard to make sure their needs are heard and reflected in our nation's spending plans, while honoring tribes' self-determination and sovereignty."

Merkley is a long-time member of the subcommittee and has used his seat on the Senate Appropriations Committee to advocate for and secure critical resources for top Oregon priorities that fall

within the subcommittee's jurisdiction. In December, those resources included \$2.35 billion in additional funding for fire suppression, and \$6.5 million to support strategies to restore fish habitat and scale up ongoing efforts to restore healthy populations of shortnose and Lost River sucker in the Klamath Basin.

Merkley also worked to ensure that the 2021 Interior funding bill maintained the additional \$5 million in funding that he secured for habitat restoration in advance of the removal of Klamath River dams; funneled \$85 million to the U.S. Geological Survey to support regional earthquake initiatives; and directed \$6.21 billion — \$163 million more than in fiscal year 2020 — to the Indian Health Service, which provides

health care to thousands of tribal members in Oregon. And Merkley maintained \$40 million for the Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program (CFLRP), which helps fund collaborative and community-based forest management and has a proven track record of improving forest health, reducing wildfire risk, and supporting rural communities.

### Agency manages **Del Norte County Regional Airport** and two others

Brookings City Manager Emeritus Gary Milliman has been elected as vice chair of the Border Coast Regional Airport Authority.

The BCRAA is a joint powers agency created by the cities of Brookings and Crescent City, counties of Del Norte and Curry, and tribal governments of the Elk Valley Rancheria and Tolowa DEE-ni' Nation. The BCRAA manages the Del Norte County Regional Airport and two other general aviation airports in Del Norte County.

Milliman will be the first Oregonian to serve in a BCRAA leadership capacity and was elected by the board at its February 4 meeting. Del Norte County Commissioner Gerry Hemmingsen was re-elected board chair.

"I am honored to be selected by my fellow board members to serve in this role," Milliman said. He has served on the BCRAA Board representing the city of Brookings since 2008 and was instrumental in expanding the BCRAA membership to include Brookings and Curry County.

"We have achieved much to improve air service to our region by working in partnership through the BCRAA," Milliman said. "We have a new, state-of-the art airport terminal and recently signed a five-year agreement to stabilize passenger air service at the DNCRA. We have attracted a new air carrier,

Contour Air, and they are providing consistent, quality service."

Milliman noted the BCRAA is currently evaluating a change in the connecting airport from Oakland to Sacramento.

"Flying through Sacramento would enable Contour passengers to book-through to any destination served by American Airlines, eliminating the current need re-check baggage and change terminals," Milliman said. "I believe most Curry County residents seeking to use air service do so to make connections with flights going to more distant destinations. If we can make those connections easier through an interline connection between Contour and American, the flying public will be better serviced."

Milliman also serves as chair of the South West Area Commission on Transportation, representing Brookings since 2008. He was first selected to serve as SWACT chair in 2015.

SWACT members include

representatives of cities, counties, Native American tribes, ports, airports, transportation agencies and alternative transportation stakeholders in Curry, Coos and Douglas Counties.

The SWACT makes recommendations to the Oregon **Transportation Commission** and the Oregon Department of Transportation on transportation policy matters and project funding. For example, the SWACT recently reviewed grant applications submitted for airport improvement projects in southwestern Oregon.

Milliman's experience in transportation policy has included serving as chair of the Mendocino Transit Authority and the North Coast Railroad Authority (California), and on the boards of directors of the Orange Line (maglev) Development Authority and the California Short Line Railroad Association. As a city manager, he managed many aspects of transportation. He also served as president/CEO of California Western Railroad.

# Contest helps with study on return of salmon to river

### BY DAVID RUPKALVIS The Pilot

It was wet and dreary outside, but that didn't stop around 10 anglers from gathering to celebrate a successful salmon fishing season with awards to three people who turned in snouts to better help officials track salmon.

Dave Kuehn, president of the South Coast Fishermen, said the snouts are collected to look for wire tags that give information about the fish. By collecting the information, such as age, when they were put into the water and when they returned, state officials can get a gauge on the overall salmon fishery.

To encourage people to participate and turn in snouts, the club raffled off three fishing poles to those who participated. The drawing was last Thursday at Les Schwab Tire Center in Brookings, one of the key sponsors of the drawing.

"It's noting their original and return site, where they were released in the river," Kuehn said. "It's very valuable data."

Most of the salmon caught during the spawn are three years old, but there are some two-year-old and even some ages four or five.

Every year, hatcheries released 40,000 tiny salmon

that are tagged into the Ferry Creek Reservoir, where they can stay for two weeks to get acclimated before moving into the river for the trip to the ocean. Another 40,000 tagged salmon are deposited directly into the river system. Almost 180,000 additional salmon are released without tags.

"It's a study to see if the

return rate is the same or does it matter where they were put in," Kuehn said.

During the salmon fishing season, anglers face a challenge because salmon in fresh water are no longer eating. The key to catching them is to put bait right in front of them, where they will react out of instinct and not hunger. Anglers can keep

Once caught, steelhead to be donated are transferred by anglers into plastic tubes. From there, Kuehn and his volunteers transfer the steelhead into pens, which sit in the river while they wait to be collected by Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife staff.

There, while the lucky angler enjoys their entry into the raffle and goes home with a fresh "Catch 'em & Hatch 'em, I gave back" sticker, the fish's journey is just halfway done.

"It's quite involved," Kuehn said. "But it's working."

ODFW staff bring the fish to the Elk River Hatchery, where they mate and their offspring are returned to the Chetco, beginning the lifecycle again.

"The goal of the hatchery program is to provide extra fish to supplement the fishery," said John Weber, an ODFW biologist who leads the department's Salmon and Trout Enhancement Program on the river. "You're supplementing the fishery by having the additional fish return that are produced in the hatchery." According to Weber, hatchery fish tend to have higher reproduction rates than wild steelhead. Since they have less natural loss during the first two years of life in the natural environment, more fish survive from a pair of hatchery steelhead than a pair of wild steelhead.

on the Mad River in northern California, where an annual derby rewarded the angler each season who caught the largest hatchery fish.

That got him thinking about what could be done on the Chetco, and he turned his attention to the broodstock donation program.

"I just thought maybe I could do something fun," he said.

So he launched the challenge and the raffle to give anglers the chance to be crowned "King of Chrome," if they catch and donate the most steelhead to the broodstock program.

Kuehn doesn't keep many of the steelhead he catches – they're essentially just large trout as far as cooking and eating them is concerned, he said. The rest of his catch he either releases back into the river or donates to the broodstock program.

For him, it's not about what he takes home, but about being on the river.

"I like the sport of fishing. The angling, the catching," Kuehn said. Anglers must have an ODFW permit to collect or transport live steelhead. Permits are available to those who sign up for the Chrome Challenge by submitting a form to Kuehn, who can be reached at 805-350-0542. The possible raffle prizes, including fishing equipment or guide trips, are one incentive. But for Kuehn, the goal of expanding Chetco steelhead angling odds is incentive enough to donate his fish.

two salmon a day, only one that can be wild. All hatchery fish are marked.

Kuehn said the study so far shows fish that have time to acclimate return better than those put directly in the river. In 2020, 58 snouts were turned in and 29 had tags in them. All of those people were eligible to win the new rods and reel packages.

Jason McClure, manager at Les Schwab, drew the winners Thursday. He said his company participates because it supports important community endeavors.

"Our community is super important," he said. "They drive our business, and it's why we're here. That's what keeps Les Schwab strong, our customer base."

On a personal side, Mc-Clure enjoys fishing himself. As a relative newcomer to Brookings, he is looking forward to salmon fishing.

"I got my first opportunity on a steelhead last week, so that was fun," he said.

Les Schwab purchased one of the rod and reel packages for the winners and Jim Carey with Rogue Outdoor Store in Gold Beach donated the two other packages.

The winners of the drawing were Kay Krug, David Satterlee and Dave Castellanos.

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"You have high survival of the offspring in the hatchery," Weber said. "The value is that we're going to essentially have more fish return to the river."

Over time, that higher survival rate increases the population of hatchery steelhead in the Chetco, allowing anglers the opportunity to harvest hatchery steelhead while releasing wild fish to their native environment if they choose.

Kuehn puts the goal simply: "To increase angler opportunity."

"We're just trying to make

sure we have steelhead to harvest," Kuehn said. "It's to maintain a robust run."

This is the third year Kuehn and OSCF are running the Chrome Challenge on the Chetco, but Weber said ODFW has been relying on volunteer donations of steelhead to the broodstock program for six years, since the department stopped netting the river to catch fish.

Kuehn has been fishing for steelhead on the Chetco for about seven years. He started the Chrome Challenge with OSCF after visiting his son

"It's so much fun," Kuehn said. "Once you catch a steelhead, you're addicted."

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




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### GRANDMOTHERS REFUSE TO FOLLOW PRACTICAL GIFT-GIVING REQUEST

DEAR MAMA BEAR: Of course your daughter should be taught that her feelings — and opinions are important. But accepting gifts graciously is proper etiquette. It is considered rude for a recipient to tell folks their gifts are unwelcome or unwanted.

It would not be rude, however, for YOU to run interference by reminding these clueless grannies about your daughter's problem and telling them what has been happening to their impractical gifts --- that they are given away, donated, etc. because she cannot wear them. A far more welcome gift would be something she's interested in or a gift card to a store that carries items she might like. Then suggest an area of interest of hers they may be unaware of. "The Christmas trees provide cover," said Eric Himmelreich, a habitat restoration biologist for ODFW. "These little fish need cover. It gives the juveniles a place to hide."

Camp Creek provides habitat for Chinook and coho salmon, as well as a variety of other fish species.

Himmelreich and ODFW Salmon Trout Enhancement Program Biologist Evan Leonetti and the volunteers from Oregon Coast Anglers jammed the Christmas trees into crevices among boulders or logs in the creek, hoping the trees would stay in place through the spring, when heavy rains swell the creek.

"You can see some of the trees we put in last year," Himmelreich said.

The trees are the latest additions in what has been a multi-year project on Camp Creek and some of its tributaries.

That started in 2015 and 2016 when the large boulders were added to the creek in patterns to slow the water down, forcing it to meander through the creek.

"Before, it was all bare rock," Himmelreich said. "It was hard to find any juvenile fish."

In addition to the boulders, over the years 170 logs have been put into the creek, also to slow the water and catch smaller rocks flowing down the creek and create spawning ground for the salmon

### and steelhead.

Himmelreich said over time four of the logs have broken free from their original spots.

"I was pretty upset," he said. "These projects are expensive."

The Christmas tree planting isn't expensive, but it is labor-intensive and relies on the community and volunteers.

This year, about 200 trees were left at the Les Schwab Tire Center parking lot in Reedsport, which is down some from past years because some regular tree vendors did not have them for sale during the holiday season, said Steve Godin of Oregon Coast Anglers, who coordinates the volunteer effort for the tree program every year.

"This wasn't one of our big years," Godin said. "We've got enough to do the job."

Godin said this is the seventh year Oregon Coast Anglers has worked with ODFW to plant the Christmas trees in Camp Creek and some of its tributaries, including Buck Creek.

"We had one of the highest (returns) of Chinook in Camp Creek last year," Leonetti said. "I think it's making a difference."

Last week, about 20 members of Oregon Coast Anglers loaded the trees from the Les Schwab lot into trailers to be transported to Camp Creek, where Himmelreich had scouted ahead and marked seven spots to drop off trees. There a smaller group of volunteers, along with Himmelreich and Leonetti pulled them down to the creek and placed them in the water.

They took advantage of a morning free from rain and a creek that had a little lower water flow because of a relatively dry week. They had planned to do the project a week earlier, but it had rained so much that week that the creek was flowing too high.

One element was noticeably absent last week — high school students.

"Normally this is an educational opportunity for us," Godin said. "We've had the Boy Scouts out here as well."

Leonetti likes that aspect, having a chance to teach the students about the life cycles of salmon and steelhead and why the stream work is important.

But due to the COVID-19 pandemic, students were not included this year.

The ODFW workers said they are grateful for the volunteer effort and for Les Schwab donating a corner of its parking lot as a tree dropoff site.

"Steve (Godin) has been great organizing this for us," Leonetti said.

Oregon Coast Anglers has about 200 members on the South Coast, including several in Curry County, Godin said.

The group's website said it works to "enable our anglers, businesses, and community members to increase fish populations and improve fish habitat, while growing camaraderie among our anglers, and increasing awareness, interest, abilities, and the economy in communities from Florence to Brookings."
