Death case still open

Oregon State Police (OSP) are investigating the Aug. 13 death of a 23-year-old Brookings man following a high-speed chase that began in Brookings and ended at Pistol River State Park near Gold Beach.

The chase began following a downtown traffic stop attempted by the Brookings Police Department at 11:21 p.m.

“Our officer was passed by the suspect, who was driving recklessly at a very high rate of speed within the city limits,” Brookings Police Chief Kelby McCrae said. “This same officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop for this driving behavior.”

The driver of the vehicle, later identified as Dylan James Smith, failed to stop and continued along U.S. Highway 101, said law-enforcement officials.

Curry County Sheriff’s Office deputies assisted in the pursuit and deployed spike strips.

According to an OSP report, the suspect’s vehicle turned into a pullout in Pistol River State Park, where the driver committed suicide.

McCrae said his police officer did not discharge his weapon. OSP Capt. Timothy Fox confirmed that no other officers fired shots during the incident, which remained under investigation at press time.

BOAT PARTLY DOWN IN BROOKINGS HARBOR

A 37-foot boat, with no one aboard, partially sank at Brookings Harbor early Friday.

“We got a report that at about 9 a.m. on Friday, a boat was sinking,” said Brookings Port Master Gary Dehlinger.

He said no one was on the craft as it took on water. The harbor’s incident-response team was mobilized and responded to the scene.

“We began working on getting it out of the water by pumping the water out of the boat and attempting to raise it with straps,” Dehlinger said. “The boat damaged the dock

during the sinking.”

Dehlinger said he did not have at hand an estimated cost of the damages to the boat or the dock, or details about what caused her to sink.

Jimmy Quella owns a boat directly across from the sinking and said he saw the craft partially underwater after being alerted to the incident by his neighbor. The neighbor had first called authorities.

“There hasn’t been any activity on that boat for a good, long time,” said Quella.

“Somebody was on it last week and fired it up, and that’s the only activity I’ve seen in 10 years.”

Dehlinger said the boat owner had been notified and was heading to the harbor.

Lost child found

A child missing in the early hours of Friday morning was located near the south bank of the Chetco River in Brookings.

At 2:52 a.m., said officials of the Curry County Sheriff’s Office, the department received a call from the 6-year-old’s mother, Nicole Beaman, who was camping in a teepee with her husband and children at “At Rivers Edge RV.”

Beaman reported that her autistic son had been missing for more than an hour and that her husband was searching for the boy. Apparently, the child had slipped out after the family went to sleep. He was wearing a tank top and shorts.

Three sheriff’s deputies responded, along with a private security service, and began searching the park.

A request was made to the Brookings Police Department for Officer Zane VanZelf and his K-9 dog Hulk. Curry County Sheriff’s Search and Rescue was called as well.

Hulk tracked the child to a brushy area on the opposite side of South Bank Chetco Road from the RV park, where the scent was lost. Officer VanZelf then said he believed he heard a child cry out from somewhere in the area.

Search and rescue members entered into the brushy woodland and at about 5:44 a.m., team members found the child and returned him to his father.

Cal-Ore Life Flight responded to ensure the child’s health.

Harbor fire board reviewing concerns cited by volunteers

The Harbor Rural Fire Protection District Board said it is reviewing concerns from about a dozen of the district’s volunteers regarding their chief.

“The board has received a petition from 11 active volunteer firefighters, which indicates there is no confidence in Chief Robert Lar-

son,” Harbor Rural Fire Protection District Public Information Officer Neville Hill said.

“The board is conducting an investigation to determine what the basis of ‘no confidence’ is.”

Hill said neither Chief Larson nor the board could comment about the firefighters’ petition or the investigation.

U.S. Coast Guard rescues kayakers near Gold Beach

The U.S. Coast Guard is cautioning kayakers heading to the ocean to be aware of a variety of risks.

That advisory follows the rescue Aug. 13 of an adult and two children kayaking near Whale Cove in the Gold Beach area.

“We received reports at about 1:30 p.m. that there were three kayakers in need of assistance and one of the three was hanging on the kayak,” said U.S. Coast Guard North Bend Sector Lt. Ryan Brown.

“We sent a 47-foot motor lifeboat from Chetco River Station and also diverted a helicopter from a training flight near North Bend to the site of the incident.”

Brown said the three people made it to shore on their own. As the helicopter arrived, a rescue swimmer was lowered into the water and swam to shore to help the kayakers paddle out to the Coast Guard lifeboat. The boat transported

the three to Brookings.

“One of the kayakers suffered mild hypothermia, but nothing serious,” Brown said.

He said anyone considering kayaking in the ocean should realize the dangers. “This is the wild Pacific Ocean and you need to be prepared. Know the

approaching weather conditions, the tides and currents.”

He encouraged ocean kayakers to take survival gear such as life vests and a locator beacon. “The beacons will alert us to their location and the fact that they are in distress.”

A vets’ ride to remember on the Rogue

Curry County veterans have been invited to join a second free jet boat excursion along the Rogue River courtesy of Curry County Commissioner Court Boice, in partnership with Jerry’s Rogue Jet Boats in Gold Beach.

The ride, scheduled for Aug. 25, will be similar to a previous excursion July 28, which included 51 veterans.

Boice and Jerry’s Rogue Jet Boats operations manager Scott McNair said the trip is to express their apprecia-

tion for the veterans in Curry County. “Court is the lead in charge of this,” McNair said, “we are just the support role, but we think it is important to give back to these guys.”

Boice formerly operated a jet boat excursion business on the Rogue in the early 1980s, and McNair said he helps as a boat pilot for Rogue Jet Boats in the summer months.

“He has a need to get back on the river, and he enjoys introducing people to the river and showing them the spectacular views,” McNair said.

“The trip in July was a smashing success. We ended

up with a standby list, so we wanted to get all those guys that want to do it this time.”

Boice said the jet boat ride for veterans is a natural fit for him. “Yes, it’s what I do, or at least did, for over 40 years - a love for the river, the outdoors and the combination of all that we have here, so incredibly unique - brings a responsibility to share.”

McNair said Boice will pilot the veterans’ boat ride and estimated the coast to his company at about \$2,000 for each of the two excursions. Boice said he has offered to pay the fuel costs, estimated

at \$250.

“There are many veterans in our county who could use some Wild Rogue therapy,” said Boice, “so ask them or their reps to contact me, at boicec@co.curry.or.us, to be added as space allows.”

The boat ride’s check-in time will be 2:30 p.m., with departure set for 3 p.m., at Jerry’s Jets Boat Office at the Port of Gold Beach.

The river tour will last about six hours. A barbecue dinner is available at the Agness Cougar Lane Restaurant for \$15, said the organizers. Snacks will be available at the C.L. Country Store.

Bruin Brother Camp: kids helping kids

Elmer Bankus Field has been busy, of late.

Earlier this month, NFL Flag Football scrimmages were held for youngsters. This week, older kids participated for the second year of the Bruin Brother Camp.

For four days, the “Home of the Brookings-Harbor Bruins” was been abuzz with kids in the third through eighth grades hoping eventually to play prep football.

Head football coach Shaun Bravaro leads the camp, along with the coaches and members of his current varsity high school football team. They’re playing it forward by mentoring the young players for the day when they, too, can proudly wear the Blue and Gold.

Bruin Brother Camp teaches participants,

by example, the fundamentals of blocking, tackling and passing, while going over some of the rules governing Oregon high school football play.

Running nightly 6:30-7:30 p.m., the camp began this past Monday and concluded Thursday.

“This is a good, hands-on experience for these kids, with my (varsity team) showing them the ropes in order to promote football,” Bravaro said. “Everyone I have talked to says the kids are having a blast.

“We go over skills, fundamentals, really the whole of football.”

No pads or helmets are used during the practices. And although high school-level tackling is discussed, only two-hand-touch tackling is in effect.

In addition to the core offensive and defensive skills, Bravaro said, “We teach these kids special-teams play, because important players like a good kicker or punter

are sometimes hard to find. Or finding that individual who has the talent to run back a kickoff, for example.”

During the Bruin Brother Camp, the head coach said rotating positions for each player is important. The youngsters will be trying out for any number of positions as they advance. “One never knows where their own particular talents may lay until they try it all,” he said.

At the same time, there’s “no pressure, just a fun way to see what might be a good

fit for them.”

Last year was the first for the camp, with 32 kids turning out.

“We (the varsity team) are excited to put (the camp) on,” he said. “My assistant coaches are helping me, but it is really great to see my team helping.

“That’s where we got the name, Bruin Brother Camp. Big brothers helping little brothers ... or sisters. Just kids helping kids.”

The Bruins’ varsity football team starts practicing for the regular season on Aug. 19.

Curry County formally OKs housing emergency declaration

More work is ahead before Curry County sees potential results of a housing emergency declaration resolution approved Aug. 14 by the board of commissioners.

The resolution passed 2-1 during a Curry County Board of Commissioners business

meeting in Gold Beach. Commissioner Sue Gold cast the “no” vote.

Earlier in the week, Commissioner Court Boice had declared the need for additional affordable housing countywide, proposing that local officials petition the State of Oregon for help.

Members of the public were on hand Aug. 14 to address the

commissioners. Mary Rowe, who has been a homeless advocate in Curry County for more than a dozen years, spoke in favor of the proposed emergency declaration. “The statistics (in the proposal) don’t adequately reflect reality,” Rowe said, adding that two local homeless shelters have closed recently and there’s a 12-year waiting list at one subsidized-housing unit in Curry County.

Connie Hunter of Brookings, another homeless advocate, supported creating more affordable housing, especially to help veterans. She said an

emergency declaration would get the attention needed from housing developers and the community.

David Barnes of Gold Beach disagreed and urged caution, saying the county’s proposed declaration was meant for a “true emergency. They (the State of Oregon) are going to take over,” warned Barnes.

Tim Palmer spoke against the proposal as well, because “nowhere in the resolution” appeared recommendations outlined in the study “2018 Curry County, OR Housing Action Plan.” Palmer said he

was against suspending the limitation of rules in rural unincorporated areas because they “protect property values” and “protect against expenses rising for public services,” such as fire protection, police, water and sewer infrastructure.

Joy Wolf of Port Orford lobbied for no changes in zoning. She said the county’s focus should be on requesting funding, instead of remedying existing housing conditions.

Commissioner Boice thanked those who spoke, then noted that a new four-plex construction project on Leith Road in Gold Beach is “high-end. It helps, but does not solve the problem.

“How do we get developers to come in? We need more development at all housing levels,” he said. “It affects every part of our culture here.”

Gold reported that, “I received several calls from rural communities from people who have concerns,” pointing out that more than 50% of Curry County’s population is rural.

Boice said, “Urban and rural community differences are what stops us from developing more housing.” When it comes to land-use planning, he said “one size doesn’t fit all. We need middle-income housing.”

In fact, said Commissioner Christopher Paasch, “Housing issues in this county are actually worse than what’s in the draft proposal.”

He described some of the distressed properties he had seen because people “don’t have the money to fix them.”

“We could build 200 housing units and still have a shortage of affordable housing,” he said. “but (at least) it would drive down the cost of housing. The housing emergency declaration could open up HUD money and funding

for veterans.”

“The declaration serves to put LCD (Land Conservation and Development) on alert that we will be proposing some things that are outside of the box,” said Community Development Director Julie Schmelzer.

The Pilot contacted Oregon Gov. Kate Brown’s office to determine what happens next when the governor receives the Curry County’s housing emergency declaration resolution.

“When a county declares a housing emergency like this, the way our emergency system works is such that there are no direct response actions to come from the governor’s office,” said spokesperson Natalie King.

“We still take note when counties make these declarations, and (we) are acting swiftly to address the housing crisis across the state. We made significant investments (\$330 million) this legislative session that will address needs across the housing spectrum, from increasing affordable housing to preventing rent gouging to homeownership support.”

That legislation includes programs that are “focused on rural areas like Curry County,” said King. Two such programs that received significant investment, she said, are Local Innovation Fast Track, which brings housing development to underserved communities, and the Greater Oregon Housing Accelerator, a continuation of the Governor’s Workforce Housing Pilot that helps local governments and employers create homes for local workers.

The Curry County Board of Commissioners will hold a workshop Aug. 28 to continue its discussions on the topic.

GOP quiet as white-right attacks mount

Dear Editor:

As we have seen again in recent weeks, this nation is facing an epidemic of right-wing domestic terrorism. Gunmen, openly boasting white-nationalist views, targeted Latino immigrants for mass murder in El Paso and Gilroy, just as white supremacists previously slaughtered Jews at Pittsburgh and Poway synagogues, and black churchgoers in South Carolina.

It's the worst spasm of radical-right political terror since the Oklahoma City bombing.

But you'd never know it, to hear Republicans speak. From the White House on down to talk radio, conservatives who have eagerly described Antifa thugs and a Muslim congresswoman as "terrorists" perversely refuse to use the T-word to describe the horrific acts of their own unhinged supporters.

If Muslim extremists were responsible for this recurrent

carnage, the political right would declare us under attack from Islamic terrorism and demand the nation mobilize for a domestic war on terror. But the Republican response to mass killings by white-right extremists is to declare them "mentally ill" and ignore the political motivation – and deny they could have been encouraged by the hateful rhetoric from the administration, rhetoric that killers have quoted word for word.

And make no mistake, domestic terrorism today is overwhelmingly a right-wing issue. In 2017-18, according to the Anti-Defamation League, 87 Americans died in radical-right terror attacks. Over the same two-year period, the U.S. death toll from Islamic terrorism was eight (the Manhattan truck attack), and the number of deaths attributed to leftist violence was... zero. None.

Federal law enforcement has no trouble characterizing white-nationalist violence as terrorism. Homeland Security calls it an "increasingly concerning threat." The FBI considers the conspiracy lunatics of QAnon

as possible domestic terror sources, and the agency is also investigating a shocking 850 right-wing attacks against synagogues and predominantly black churches in just the past three years.

Yet Republicans, from the West Wing down through Congress, continue to blatantly avoid that T-word word, at least in public, because they're afraid to offend part of their voting base.

It's a shameful abandonment of two principles American conservatives once claimed to cherish – honor and courage.

Climate change certainly isn't 'false news'

July was the hottest month in human history, Aug 2018-July 2019 were the wettest 12 months in the U.S. in 124 years, 18 of the hottest years ever recorded occurred since

2000 – so, climate change is already hard upon us. Yet, the average global temperature has increased by only 1.4 degrees F. since the Industrial Revolution.

The Paris Climate Accord set a target of keeping global warming below 3.6 degrees F. (2 C.). However, the 2018 IPCC special report indicated that the most catastrophic changes can be avoided only if global warming stays below 2.7 degrees F.

Even at 1.4 degrees F., we see polar vortices freezing the eastern U.S., stalled hurricanes rains dropping 10 times more rain than the previous record ... and we're only halfway to the lower target for limiting global warming to avoid the REAL disasters!

The science of greenhouse gases is 150 years old; reliable climate models have been around for 40 years; and, more than 97% of professional climate scientists agree that the warming is due to human activities.

The good news is that since we caused it, we can fix it. We

can reverse global warming by reducing the 110 million tons of greenhouse gases we are pumping into the atmosphere daily. The bad news is that the time left to avoid even greater weather disruptions (and the ensuing social upheaval) grows shorter every day.

Because we continue to increase our greenhouse gases emissions, we don't really know what the final concentration of those gases will be, what the ultimate global temperature will be, or what specific climate changes will occur.

Will we have a climate that supports sufficient agriculture to feed the world's population? Will the tropics become too hot for people to live without massive infrastructure to keep them cool? Will we have to abandon coastal areas or build levees to keep back rising sea levels, especially higher storm surges during more intense storms?

Skeptics got one aspect of the climate change discussion right. We aren't certain what will be the consequences of our dumping greenhouse gases into the atmosphere at rates not seen

in 66 million years. However, the 21st Century has already given society a glimpse of what could be coming, and it's not pretty.

Are you willing to bet your kids' and grandkids' future on this being an unusual 40-year stretch of "bad weather" when the science tells us clearly that we are the cause? Wouldn't it be better to recognize the signs, trust the evidence-based science, and work toward a better, safer future?

Please support data-based decisions on policies to fight global warming, make changes in your personal life to reduce your impact, and elect leaders who will make those extremely tough choices.

It's not a partisan issue; no group, political party, ideology, religion, or country has all the answers. These challenging times require everyone to pull together to win the war of our own making, for our future and that of all subsequent generations.

Victim of human trafficking now lives here

This is the conclusion of a two-part story. The Brookings man who is sharing his account asked The Pilot to hide his identity and refer to him only as "M."

It has been two years since his abduction at the hands of a human trafficker. "M," formerly a chef living in Thailand, has worked virtually around the clock at a Lake Oswego, Oregon restaurant. He has endured grueling 14-hour shifts, with no rest and little or no pay.

His captor, once the owner of the restaurant, has enslaved two other Thai natives after luring the three of them to America with promises of large salaries and a lavish lifestyle.

Staring at the ceiling of his bare room, "M" hopelessly pictures the faces of his family and the girl he was about to marry. He wonders if he will ever see them again.

The trafficker now has summoned "M" to his office. In the man's hand is the Thai's passport. It was one of the documents the owner had claimed to have destroyed 18 months earlier to ensure his captives feared fear being reported to U.S. authorities as illegal aliens.

He said the petition was presented prior to the board's regular monthly meeting the evening of Aug. 14. During that meeting, held at the Harbor Fire Station, one firefighter said a lawsuit would be filed, according to Hill.

That said, "We are not aware of a lawsuit, or any details of a lawsuit," Hill added. "It has not been served at this time. Therefore, we can't comment."

Two unsigned typewritten notes left overnight Aug. 13 at the front door of The Pilot's office outlined concerns about the Harbor Fire Department's management and urged people to attend the next fire board meeting.

The board meets at 7 p.m. the second Wednesday of each month at the Harbor Fire Department, 98069 West Denham Lane in Harbor.

Hill said the board had not set a specific date to discuss the petition or the investigation,

He said there had been no resignations by staff or volunteers within the Harbor Rural Fire Protection District.

"It is business as usual," Hill said. "We are meeting our expected response time and, as usual, we have an automatic aid agreement with Brookings Fire, which means both departments always respond together in case of a fire.

"I need for you to get a driver's license to make some deliveries for me," said the man. "You will need this to prove who you are."

He eyed "M" carefully before tossing the passport on the table. "Go, now! Get your license and bring this back to me immediately."

"M" gathered up his passport and was escorted to the Department of Motor Vehicles by his boss's dutiful wife.

Returning to the restaurant, "M" quickly stashed his passport. What he didn't know was that his visa had expired, and his captor was secretly dreading an Immigration and Customs Enforcement visit.

Eventually, one of the other captors at the restaurant escaped in broad daylight to take his chances as an illegal alien. A few months later, he contacted "M" as "M" was making deliveries for his trafficker.

"I am working at another Thai restaurant across town," his friend reported. "It is so much better. Better pay, better working conditions, and most of all I am treated with respect.

"You can leave with me now!" he told "M."

So, abandoning his delivery vehicle in an abandoned parking lot, "M" bolted with his friend for a new job, a new life.

As months went by, things improved for "M" in every way. He was happily employed at a different restaurant with his friend, and had begun saving money to return to Thailand.

He even traveled home to visit his parents and marry his fiancé, although he was careful to conceal the details of what he had endured, given his mother's failing health. "I didn't want to burden her, it would serve no purpose," he

said.

Yet once back at his job, he was stunned one day when his former captor's wife walked into the restaurant where "M" worked. Ducking out of sight, he alerted his co-worker.

If discovered, they feared, the trafficker would make their lives difficult with their new employer and the immigration authorities. After all, who would believe them in a land of strangers?

What they couldn't know was the FBI recently had raided his captor's business, where he was arrested and charged with human trafficking. His wife had been charged, too, but had been offered a lighter sentence for her cooperation in the probe.

In that raid, the FBI found the documents that had been stolen from "M" and suspected he might be working for a competing Thai restaurant ... which is how they located

him.

After extensive questioning, the FBI notified the two Thais' current employer, asking if he knew of a restaurant job outside the Portland metro area in a move to protect "M" from potential retribution.

Indeed he did – a restaurant in Brookings.

With the FBI's help, as well as a trafficking victims' assistance program, "M" and his co-worker relocated here, where they found employment and were put in touch with the Curry County Oasis Shelter Home.

Executive director Lea Sevey referred "M" to case worker Mellanie Caldera, whose job it is to help victims of human trafficking transition to a life of freedom.

Today, "M" has been reunited with his wife and they now have a family. He con-

tinues to work at the Brookings restaurant that hired him, where he's a master chef.

"M" and I are talking in a Brookings restaurant together with Caldera and, by phone, a translator. In his native Thai, "M" says to the translator, "Tell them thank you for me ... Thank everybody that helped me obtain my freedom!" He says he can't say enough about the kindness of the Oasis Shelter Home's staff. "They are my angels!"

As for the human trafficker, Caldera says, "He was convicted of his crimes and is currently serving a long sentence."

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In the holy service of the Lord – and the inmates

There are numerous ways one might spend those golden years after retirement — traveling, spending more time with family and friends, pursuing a hobby . . .

In 2001, Leo Appel was just one year away from retiring after owning a furniture store in Brookings for three decades, when he determined his golden years would be spent serving God.

And now he's Deacon Leo.

The 72-year-old has been volunteering at Pelican Bay State Prison, just north of Crescent City, for more than seven years now.

For the five years following his retirement, Appel commuted from the south coast to Portland, earning a master's degree in pastoral ministry from the University of Portland and Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington.

"I was very fortunate," said Appel. "Twenty of us started and just three of us were ordained five years later."

Appel's new career was to seek ordination as a deacon.

He said two types of deacons serve the Catholic Church: A transitional deacon has one more year to go before being ordained a priest. The other type is a permanent deacon.

"I'm a permanent deacon. This is as far as I want to go. I don't want to be a priest, even should I have the opportunity to be," he said.

Both a priest and a deacon are ordained by the church, can perform marriages and baptisms, teach and preach. But a priest conducts Mass, said Appel; he does not.

Nor is he paid by the church to serve as a deacon. In that regard, he said, he sees himself as an unpaid servant of the Lord.

"I don't charge anybody for anything I do, including ministering at Pelican Bay. No mileage reimbursement, no paycheck from the CDC (California Department of Corrections). That's the way I like it, because I can come and go as my schedule allows."

That schedule often takes him to Pelican Bay once a week, usually on a Thursday, up to three times a month.

When a good friend, a Catholic chaplain, died suddenly in 2012, Appel said he

had the privilege of conducting the funeral Mass and, later, at the burial.

"Afterwards, these gentlemen wearing these fancy outfits approached me and asked, would you be interested in doing temporary ministering help at Pelican Bay?"

"Well, temporary to me meant may be a month or two months," Appel said. "Fifteen months later, they finally hired somebody who knew what he was doing."

The prison had hired Chaplain Samuel Smolinisky (or Chaplain Sam, as the inmates and Appel call him) in 2013, who arrived there after serving for eight years in Los Angeles County.

"I enjoy talking to the men and enjoy serving with them," said Appel. "But Chaplain Sam is an amazing man. He puts in long hours. And the inmates love him."

"He also speaks fluent Spanish, which is really an advantage. And I don't speak a word of it."

On the other hand, said Smolinisky, the credit goes to Appel for holding down the fort until the permanent chaplain arrived at Pelican Bay. "I'm not the hero, Leo is. He single-handedly provided Catholic services."

"I'd heard so many good stories of his interactions, I wanted to meet this guy," Smoninisky said.

"There's a gap between age and social economic status. Inmates come to church and are amazed by this man willing to bridge that gap and serve the poor. (So) there is no more gap here."

"That's what Jesus Christ does, bridges that gap going from Heaven to Earth."

The group Appel ministers to in B Yard numbers between 20 and 30 men. Services usually begin at 11 a.m.

Smolinisky will talk to the men beforehand, and go on to perform Communion but not Mass. Then Appel will get up and speak on whatever topics he chooses.

"I love the interaction. Sitting as close to them as across a table, to someone who is never getting out of the prison system because of his crimes. I feel very comfortable in that environment," he said.

But his wife of 49 years, Cathy, initially didn't share his comfort with the prison, its inmates or the job.

"I once asked a chaplain there what would happen if one of these men put a shank in my neck," said Appel. "He said the prisoner would be dead within 24 hours."

"The CDC has their rules and we do our best to fol-

low them. And the inmates have their own rules. One of those rules is, you don't touch a volunteer. Because if you do, then all volunteers will disappear," Appel said.

He relayed that to his wife, then a short time later asked if she would join him on one of his visits to Pelican Bay. She said yes, and he arranged for her visitor's pass and escorted her in.

"So here she is," said Appel, "a little old lady sitting in the back with all these men. I introduced her, then did my service." As they were leaving at the end of the day, his wife surprised him with, "I really like those men."

"Now that's really a strange thing to say about the men incarcerated at Pelican Bay," said Appel. "She enjoyed the time. In that room, with not a cop in sight - though Sam has an alarm and we carry whistles if something happens - she felt very safe."

Added Appel, "(The inmates) feel very isolated. Many of their families have totally written them off. I want to let them know that somebody on the street cares about them. I do care, and they feel it."

"Sometimes, you meet some fascinating people. They'll tell you their life story. Some of the holiest men I have met, and this is true, have been prison inmates."

"One chapel clerk I met down there was the only person I know who has read the Bible from cover to cover four times. He quotes chapter and verse better than

anybody I could think of."

When not assisting at the prison, Appel, who is deacon at Brookings' Catholic Church Star of the Sea, volunteers for hospice care and with the City of Brookings' community kitchen program.

For about eight years, five churches in Brookings have been providing a free, five-course hot meal for anybody who walks through the front door. Episcopalians, Seventh-Day Adventists, Presbyterians and Lutherans all have joined in, Appel said. "Everybody takes a different day, so nobody in Brookings has to go hungry."

"Most of the people we serve in the community kitchen are retired people; not the transients, not the homeless. These are people on limited incomes who have to choose, do I eat this week or do I buy my meds this week? And now they don't have to make that choice," he said.

"That takes up a bulk of my time. That's all day Wednesday for me," he said, "so that's why I get to Pelican Bay only on Thursday."

"In some of these men (at Pelican Bay) - and they're rare - although they're never getting out of the prison system, they have turned around their lives, become totally different men."

"And I've actually done full Catholic marriages, when I was doing full-time ministry, for men who married women they will never have a conjugal visit with. And that bothered me a little bit," said Appel, "until I talked with one of the ladies after I did the marriage."

"I asked, why did you marry so-and-so? Her answer was simple: 'I love the man.' Now, how do you respond to that kind of answer?"

Soon, Appel said, he'll have a career choice to make. Permanent deacons have optional retirement when they turn 75. They can either retire, or write a letter to the archbishop asking to continue their service.

"It depends on how I feel, mentally and physically," said Appel. "When I reach that point, I'll know and say it's been a great ride. (But) right now, I don't see retirement."

"I'll make that decision when I turn 75. If I still enjoy what I'm doing, I'll keep doing it as long as I can."

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Many no-shows in traffic court

Curry County officials say they remain perplexed as to why local traffic court systems are experiencing a high rate of no-shows, especially with a stiff penalty for those facing only minor citations.

“Half of the people listed on the court docket for traffic citations fail to appear each month,” said Brookings Municipal Court Clerk Pamela Ganey-Welburn.

She estimated the number of no-shows in Brookings averages 15 to 20 monthly.

Penalties for failure to appear are severe, with fines and fees doubling, driver’s licenses affected, and citations sent to collections with additional fees.

Those who fail to appear or pay their fines prior to court are found guilty by default, according to a City of Brookings press release.

“The Oregon Statutes allow a court to fine a person up to \$2,000 for a class A violation,” said Ganey-Welburn.

“Driving while suspended is a class A violation and the presumptive fine is \$440. If you fail to appear on a class A violation, that presumptive fine doubles and becomes

\$880.

“Then, there’s a \$25 failure-to-appear fee, a \$25 license/sanction processing fee, and a \$25 collection fee, which brings the total to \$955.”

The Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles charges \$75 to reinstate a driver’s license. A collection agency may add an additional amount for collections, according to ORS 697.105.

“The situation is very frustrating to me, when four people show up in court when there were 30 citations,” said Brookings Judge Richard Harper.

“We just want to communicate. They can come in and plea ‘no contest’ and give an explanation about what happened, and usually I can work it out with them and even reduce their fine.”

He said that in only one or two instances in 23 years has someone who fails to appear been from out of state or country.

The court sometimes sentences person to community service if they can’t afford their fine, said Harper. Others might be able to take an online driving course in lieu of paying a fine.

In all cases, people can make arrangements for a

payment plan if they cannot pay their fines immediately. “It’s not about making money,” Harper said, “but to make people aware they committed an infraction.”

“I haven’t once fined a minor. I talk to them, and then I make them bring up their grades. It’s just a matter of being a responsible citizen.”

As an aside, “The traffic court time is changing to 10 a.m. starting in September, instead of 1 p.m.” said Ganey-Welburn said.

To the south, in Del Norte County, officials say they’re also experiencing a high percentage of no-shows for traffic court.

“About half of the people cited each week don’t show up for court,” said Esperanza Esparza, Del Norte Superior Court’s executive officer.

The county’s traffic court is in session Mondays and Thursdays, with 25 to 30 people each day coming before the commissioner.

Monthly, that’s up to 270 people who face higher fines, a failure-to-appear citation, a hold on their driver’s license, and collection actions for not showing up.

If for some reason people miss their court dates - for example, the ticket blew out of the car window - they

aren’t immediately at risk. “They should try to contact the court within 15 days,” Esparza said.

She said the court uses a three-step process to give people a chance to clear up a citation:

1. After waiting 15 days, the court sends a courtesy notice.

2. If that doesn’t result in a response, the next step is to review whether the address for the courtesy notice was correct.

3. As a last step, the commissioner reviews whether all the notices were correct, after which the court sends another letter notifying the recipient they have been “initially tried in absentia” and now have a choice of paying immediately - plus the added failure-to-appear fine - or to appear in court to offer an explanation.

Esparza said Del Norte Superior Court offers two payment options:

1. Pay in full within 90 days, and no additional fees are added.

2. Or pay \$50 a month plus a \$35 processing fee.

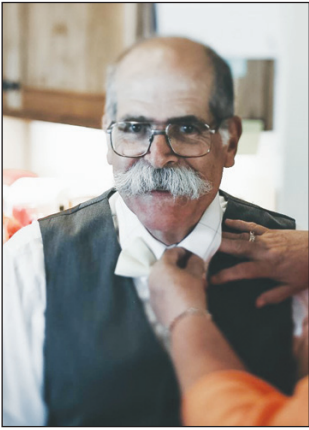

Free fishing this weekend

If you've been watching as anglers haul in a big salmon or steelhead on the Rogue River, or you've wanted to get some tasty bottom fish at Brookings Harbor, this weekend is a good time to venture out.

You don't need a fishing license or even special tags to fish Aug. 17-18.

You can fish, crab or clam for free anywhere in Oregon, regardless of where you live, according to the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife (ODFW).

At the same time, it's not a holiday from other fishing regulations. "Bag limits, closures and size restrictions are in effect, and you need to know the rules and regulations where you are fishing," said Gold Beach ODFW office specialist Blair Krohn.

If you're fishing for salmon, steelhead or marine species such as rockfish, remember to check the fishing section of the recreation report on the ODFW website.

Right now, ocean fishing for rockfish, tuna and coho salmon has been good. Surfperch can be targeted from beaches and jetties by those staying on shore.

NO NEED FOR ...

QUIET HOURS

The words "library" and "a quiet place" seem to go hand in hand.

But special areas of the Chetco Public Library in Brookings, the Curry County Public Library in Gold Beach, and the Del Norte County Public Library in Crescent City can be anything but quiet.

Those areas are filled with voices and music during a special children's story time that's designed for learning and just plain fun.

On Wednesday morning, Aug. 7, a room in the Brookings library echoed with the sounds of music and laughter. The Good Times Jam Band of Brookings was performing for story time.

"I hope we are developing in the kids a sense that music is fun, that it's relaxed. It's not formal and gives them the chance to move and to dance and to sing, and of course to smile and tell stories," said band leader Russ Oelhaim.

"I just love being around kids and teaching. I have taught them all my life."

Oelhaim and his six-member band formed a semicircle in the library room as children and adults sat on the floor or in nearby seats to listen and

sing with the music. Oelhaim invited individual children to come up and sing during the performance as well.

Holding her 9-month-old daughter, Sophie, Katie Peart of Brookings said story time was an important way to help her daughter gain exposure to music. "This is all about enrichment," said Peart.

Gia Podesta of Brookings had brought her two young nieces, Avery and Sophie, to the library. "This is a great class," Podesta said. "I had fun and I enjoyed the music," agreed Sophie.

Chetco Library's youth services director, Lorene Forman, said story time is designed to help small children learn and feel comfortable. "We have the books, the songs and the music, so it is all integrated to enforce the learning," she said.

"And we want the children to know the library is a safe, fun and happy place they can come to all their life."

In Gold Beach, Curry County Public Library story time coordinator Janet Lensing said the session's activities help bridge a potential gap

“What a coincidence!”
“Boy, was that good luck!”

How many times have you said that when something extra good happens? Or when a really narrow escape enables you to avoid serious trouble or even injury?

But in such situations, how many times do you stop and realize that the real reason was that God was looking out for you?

The AGLOW group will be discussing miracles when they meet Tuesday. And the receipt of that information made me stop and think. If you look back over your life, I would bet you could see at least one instance where a close call must have had some form of divine intervention.

I can name several! At age 6, I just missed being hit by a branch knocked out of a tree by lightening. At 16, nearly drowning. In later life, impossibly escaping a collision with a cement truck – and another time, an unexplainable wrong turn on a familiar road kept me away from a fatal accident.

Growing up in upstate New York, our church youth went to Christian camp every summer. Highland Lake Bible Conference was a wonderful place on a beautiful lake.

And if you were in high school, you could work there all summer. You earned a few dollars ... that’s how, in 1956, I bought my first Bible, a King James with a bright-red leather cover ... and got to enjoy the whole summer there.

We had a float tethered in the deeper part of the lake and we all swam out to, sat on, and “hung out” for a little while before it was time to start prep for the evening meal. The lifeguard tower was on the float.

I had climbed onto the float, and sat leaning up against the tower. It was warm and sunny, and I fell asleep. The kids had a habit of rocking the float, but didn’t usually rock it hard. A slow rock was like-

ly what put me to sleep. But, apparently that day, they de-

cided to rock it a lot harder.

Suddenly I was awakened – under water! I had no idea which way was up and my only thought was that I was going to drown.

As I tried to find my way to the surface, I felt a strong grip on my arm, and I was quickly pulled to the surface – but there was no one there! The float was a distance away and everyone denied helping me. God or guardian angel, I have to realize if not for that intervention, I most likely would not be here today. Nor would my kids, or a musically talented grandson who is serving the Lord in Kansas City!

The afternoon will include food and fun, with fellowship enabling the three churches to get better acquainted with each other. In a time when there seems to be so much animosity by some about faith, we need to know each other better to be able to support each other when needed.

On August 23 and 24, you can shop for treasures at the annual sale put on by the Smith River United Methodist Church. Times are 9 a.m.-3 p.m. each day – and you never know what you will find! So why not check it out? You may find just that exact thing you’ve been missing!

August 25 is going to be a special day at the Nazarene Church. “Kids Day” will focus on the children, both in song and the message about David and Goliath. After the service, all will head to Florence Keller Park for a BBQ.

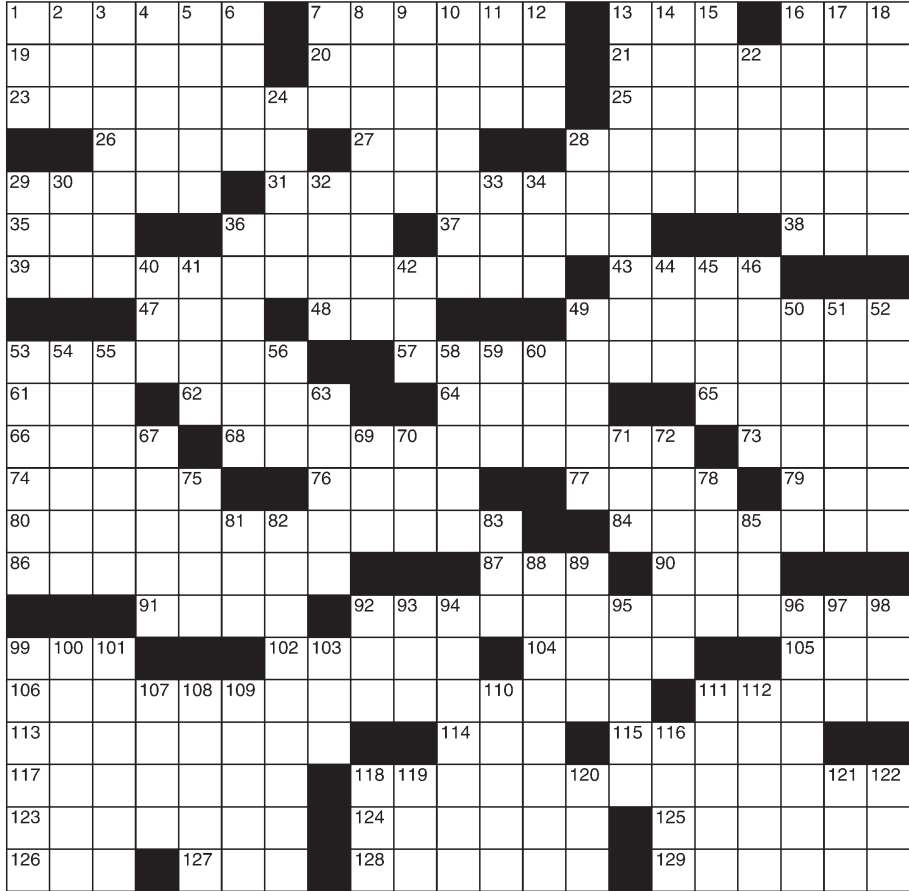

Confusion Over Women's Heart Attack Symptoms

DEAR DR. ROACH: My question is about symptoms for women's heart attacks. I have always heard that symptoms for women can be much different from men's. Instead of the chest-clutching, sharp pain that men can have, I have read that women's symptoms can be any of these: heartburn or indigestion; pain in the jaw, neck, shoulders, back, one or both arms; fatigue and troubled sleep; dizziness and nausea; or extreme anxiety. Are you KIDDING me? I am a healthy, active 63-year-old woman. I have had all of these symptoms at one time or another. If I acted every time I had one of these symptoms, I would be at the doctor's office every day. How is one to know which symptoms to take seriously and act on immediately, and which to wait a few days to see if it is temporary? -- J.

ANSWER: I have seen many letters similar to yours. The

confusing problem is that it's true: In women, heart attack symptoms and the symptoms of angina before a heart attack can include all of those vague symptoms. The same is true of men as well, although it's more likely for women than for men to have symptoms other than the classic left-sided chest discomfort (people are much more likely to describe angina as "discomfort" or "pressure" than "pain"). So your question is entirely valid: How do you know when to take common symptoms seriously? The first thing I would say is that the greater your risk for heart disease, the more seriously you should take any symptom. Age, family history of heart disease, high blood pressure and cholesterol, lack of regular physical exercise and diabetes are among the most important risk factors. The second thing I would say is to take new symptoms seriously. If you never get heartburn, for example, then heartburn at age 63 should prompt concern. Third, context matters. Symptoms such as nausea or

jaw pain that occur with exercise -- even carrying a bag of groceries or walking up stairs -- is definitely a reason to talk to your doctor. Most women don't know that heart disease remains their No. 1 killer, far outstripping breast cancer (or any cancer). Both women and men need to take even vague symptoms seriously, especially if the symptoms are new, exertional or if the person has several risk factors. As a primary-care doctor, I'd rather see my patient for her concerns that symptoms may be heart disease than see her in the ICU with a heart attack. DEAR DR. ROACH: I have diverticulosis. At one time I was told not to eat nuts. I have since read that eating nuts is OK. What is your take? Also, are chia seeds safe? -- E.M.

ANSWER: There are two answers to this question. The first comes from clinical research, and a very large trial showed that nut and popcorn consumption tended to protect against diverticulitis and diverticular bleeding. This may be due to the high fiber content, recommended in people with diverticula. So

most experts allow their patients with diverticulosis to eat nuts and seeds, including chia seeds. The second is practical experience. If someone has had clinical diverticulitis after eating nuts and seeds, especially if it happens repeatedly, it makes sense not to do so.

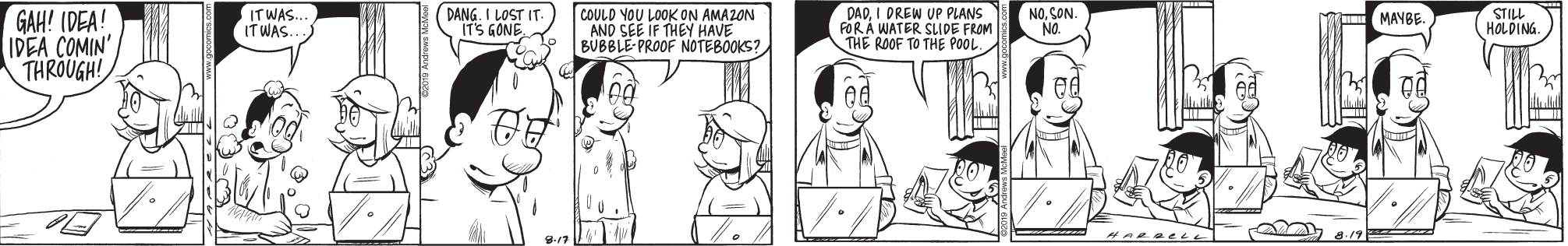
