Convicted murderer re-sentenced in 1988 killings

After spending more than 30 years on Oregon's death row,, a man convicted of raping and killing two German tourists in 1988 now has a chance at freedom. But not if Coos County District Attorney Paul Frasier has anything to say about it.

After the Oregon Legislature changed the state law regarding aggravated murder in 2019 and the state Supreme Court ruled all inmates on death row that do not qualify based on the new standards must be re-sentenced, David Lynn Simonson had a

new sentencing hearing in Coos County on Monday.

Frasier explained that since life in prison without the possibility of parole was not available when the crime was committed, the most he could ask for was life in prison with a possibility of parole after 30 years.

"I made the argument based on the facts of the case that if there ever was a case that deserved consecutive sentencing, this was the one," Frasier said. "Judge (Martin) Stone agreed with me."

Stone sentenced Simonson to consecutive sentences of life in prison with the possibility of parole after 30 years. That means if Simonson were granted parole on one case, he would still have to serve the second before being released. Maybe.

Frasier admitted he was not certain what the state law was in 1988, so there is a chance Simonson could ask for parole. But if that happens, Frasier vowed to fight every attempt in an effort to keep the convicted murderer behind bars.

"As long as I'm district attorney, we will appear at the parole board and appeal any parole," Frasier said.

Frasier said his insistence on



With the award of \$60,000, the director of Brookings Harbor


Community Helpers, Pamela

Curry Historical Society Museum hosting book signing

On Wednesday, June 22, between 3-7 p.m., the Curry Historical Society Museum, located at 29419 Ellensburg Ave. in Gold Beach will be hosting Dan Edgerton for a book signing event. He is the author of the newly released War Drums along the Rogue: The Rogue River Indian War, The Rogue River Indian War, 1851-56, volumes 1 and 2.

Edgerton takes a fresh look at this epic struggle with thorough, well documented research, introducing primary source documents never- before cited in previous works.

Edgerton discusses the evolution of relationships beginning with first contact between the Native Americans and the early frontiersmen. He addresses both inter and intra-tribal rivalry both before and during the problematic relations with the frontiersmen. Edgerton identifies and provides insights into

the cultural characteristics of many of the Indian tribes and bands that played major roles in the conflicts that followed. He fully addresses the causes that led to war. The natives sought to defend their homelands, their cultures, and their ways of life. The chiefs of the various tribes and bands met in annual war councils with the avowed purpose to exterminate the frontiersmen leading to conflict each

year from 1851 through 1856. Primary sources link this war to those of the Yakima and Puget Sound Wars in 1855-56. In October 1855, this grand coalition culminated in the nearly simultaneous outbreak of hostilities in three different theaters of war in the Pacific Northwest. Although few authors wrote that a major alliance of Native American nations existed, none could provide conclusive proof until now.



DeFazio, Sanders introduce legislation to expand and strengthen America's Social Security program

Congressman Peter De-Fazio and Senator Bernie Sanders today introduced joint legislation, the Social Security Expansion Act (SSEA), to strengthen and expand Social Security for current and future gener-

"As a trained gerontologist, I have devoted my career to protecting and expanding programs that are vital to seniors. Currently, workers have 12.4 percent taken out of each paycheck and contributed to the Trust Fund, half paid by the employer and half by the worker. This bill would require the wealthy pay the same 12.4 percent on their investments and business income by increasing the net investment income tax by 12.4 percent and applying it to certain business income not already covered by payroll taxes.

Improve the Special Minimum Benefit for Social Security recipients. This bill will help low-income workers stay out of poverty by updating and increasing the Special Minimum Benefit and indexing the benefit level




Then we could say with joy "we live in a good Christian community."

The Colorado River Compact hasn't aged well

The Colorado River Compact turns 100 this year, but any celebration is damped down by the drying-up of the big reservoirs it enabled. The Bureau of Reclamation's "first-ever" shortage declaration on the river acknowledges officially what we've known for years: the Compact and all the measures augmenting it, collectively known as The Law of the River, have not prevented the river's over-development.

Nearly every pronouncement from the water establishment about the centennial of the Colorado River Compact calls it the "foundation," "the cornerstone" of the Law of the River – as though before the Compact was adopted, the river was lawless.

It wasn't. The real foundation of the Law of the River is the appropriation doctrine that all seven river basin states embraced from their start, an evolving body of common law foundational to all water development in the arid American West

There is much to appreciate in the appropriation doctrine. It allows water to be claimed only by those who are actually putting it to beneficial use, thus precluding speculation. It protects existing downstream users from having their supply dried up by new upstream users. It has shown flexibility in incorporating new uses.

But the appropriation doctrine also evolved as a powerful engine for growth. Its "first in time, first in right" promise of perpetual secure use rewards those who get to the water first.


Judicial decisions then increased its potential for spurring growth. The abstract "right to use water" came to be a property right that could be bought and sold like an automobile, and water whose use was so purchased could then be moved anywhere - along with its seniority. This enabled cities and other large entities with concentrated economic power to buy and move water far from its origin, including water they were not yet ready to use, which clashed with the appropriation doctrine's anti-speculation intent.

The Colorado River Compact commission came together 100 years ago to impose some control on that growth engine. The seven Basin states had finally acknowledged that they would have to honor each other's prior appropriations, and they knew that could precipitate a chaotic seven-state horse race, with each state trying to appropriate as much water as possible as quickly as possible.

Their initial strategy was to prevent that by determining what each state could "equitably" use. That failed because the cumulative sum of what they each believed they deserved added up to considerably more than the river's average flow.

Finally, they just divided the seven-state horserace into threestate and four-state horse races, details to be worked out later, and that became the essence of the Compact. It wasn't quite what they had set out to do, but it satisfied the federal government enough to allow Reclamation's eager beavers to begin developing the river's mainstem.

The Compact and subsequent laws, agreements, contracts and other measures we know as The Law of the River impose public priorities on the Upper and Lower Basins, limit water for California, designate water for Mexico, add recreation as a beneficial use, incorporate environmental restrictions, limit California again, construct shell



games with reservoirs, et cetera.

But a good question for evaluating the Compact and the Law of the River today is this: Would the situation on the Colorado River today have been any worse, or different, had there been no Colorado River Compact and its augmenting "Law of the River"?

Given that the desert empire watered by the Colorado River continues to grow virtually unchecked, with 50 to 80 percent more growth anticipated by mid-century, even as the water supply shrinks four to five percent for every degree of temperature increase, it may be time to stop trying to construct control systems around the growth engine, and look into the engine itself.

This is, of course, something no one wants to touch. But what can else be done when an appropriation doctrine has nothing left to appropriate and the growth it enables has become dollar-driven and spiraling out of control?



keeping Simonson behind bars is because the case was heinous. In 1988, Simonson and Jeffrey Ray Williams picked up two female German tourists who were hitchhiking up the coast near the Oregon/ California border. The women were picked up just inside the California border and driven through Curry County into Coos County.

"These two kidnapped two German citizens,' Frasier said. "They kidnapped them in California, brought them into Oregon and eventually into Coos County. They raped and murdered both individuals.'

Frasier said Simonson and Williams took the young women deep into the forest, where they raped them, tied them up and shot them in the head. They were found several

days later tied together with their pants down.

"At the time, police had no idea who did it," Frasier said.

But law enforcement quickly learned that Simonson was talking about the crime. When they brought him in, he readily admitted he shot the women, although he said Williams made him do it.

"Mr. Simonson personally killed both of them," Frasier said.

"He was arrested and confessed to the murders."

Coos County Sheriff Craig Zanni said he feels Simonson should have remained on death row.

"One of the reasons the Simonson case is significant is the two victims were raped and murdered, neither of them spoke English and they were scheduled to leave the company in a couple of days," Zanni said. "It didn't have to happen."

Simonson pleaded

guilty to the murders and was sentence to death. Simonson appealed the sentence and three times was able to have it overturned. But every time the facts were presented to Coos County juries, he was re-sentenced to death.

Williams died in prison in 2020, shortly after the Legislature changed the law regarding aggravated murder.

Frasier said he is disappointed Simonson is off death row, but he

respects the law. "The problem I had and

I still have is the voters in Oregon voted to have the death penalty," Frasier said. "The Legislature decided the best way to stop executions in Oregon is to change the definition of aggravated murder, which is what they did. It is almost impossible to get the death penalty anymore."

The last time an inmate was executed in Oregon was 1997.


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



Bear canisters now available for rent for those hiking the Rogue River National Recreation Trail

The Wild and Scenic Lower Rogue River and Rogue River National Recreation Trail draw tens of thousands of visitors annually to enjoy recreational activities including rafting, fishing, hiking and backpacking. As the river and trail are surrounded by undeveloped wildlands, wildlife viewing opportunities abound—particularly the chance to observe black bears.

While viewing black bears from a distance is a cherished, sought-after experience, there is also a record of human-bear conflict in this area. The

origin of these conflicts is human-provided attractants (food, garbage, scented toiletries, etc.) made available to bears by recreators who lack knowledge or get complacent about bears and methods for keeping bears from gaining access to them.

To keep wild bears wild and thriving in the Lower Rogue River corridor, beginning May 2022, Rogue River National Recreation Trail hikers can now rent a BearVault bear canister from Whitewater Cowboys, located in Merlin. The bear canister rental program is a partnership

between the U.S. Forest Service's Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest, the Bureau of Land Management's Medford District, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Oregon State Police, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Kalmiopsis Audubon Society, Rogue Riverkeeper, and the Humane Society of the United States.

The goal of this pilot program is to reduce human-bear conflicts, inspire personal stewardship, and foster human-bear coexistence along the Wild

and Scenic Lower Rogue

"The Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest values its partners, and their stewardship of public lands and the wildlife who call them home. I am very pleased to see this partnership working together to keep both bears and humans safe along the Lower Rogue River corridor," states Elizabeth Bly, Acting District Ranger for the Gold Beach Ranger District on the Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest.

"All user groups must do their part to keep food away from bears," states

Frances Oyung, program director for Rogue Riverkeeper. "When hikers use a bear canister to store bear attractants like food, garbage, sunscreen and even ChapStick, hikers protect wild bears."

"We are thrilled to be a part of this pilot program and hopeful that we'll get many requests to rent canisters," states Kory Mahr of Whitewater Cowboys.

"This program a great example of how different groups can come together to work toward a common goal: protecting bears and hikers," states Susan Getty, wildlife protection public

policy specialist for the Humane Society of the United States.

Bear canisters are only \$5.00/day and can be rented online at Whitewater Cowboys or in person at 210 Merlin Rd, Merlin, Oregon.

People with rare diseases have poor health-related quality of life, OSU study finds traveling more than 60

People with rare diseases frequently wait years for a proper diagnosis, have to travel long distances for specialty care and face

high out-of-pocket health care expenses, a recent Oregon State University study found.

Impact

This combination of challenges in accessing appropriate medical care leads to poor health-related quality of life, low patient satisfaction and high levels of anxiety, depression and stigma, the study concluded.

A major factor in addressing these challenges is the ongoing education of medical professionals, said Kathleen Bogart, one of the lead authors and an associate professor of

psychology at OSU.

"A really important area of intervention is ensuring that health care providers have a general knowledge of rare diseases," Bogart said. "We're not expecting them to know all 7,000 of them, but we're expecting them to know some of what the clues are that you're not dealing with a prevalent condition or a condition that's easily diagnosed."

If a doctor sees a patient who has been seeking a diagnosis for years with no success, that ought to trigger a different approach, she said — rather than the doctor sending the patient home with the conclusion that nothing can be done to help them.

According to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), a disease qualifies as "rare" if there are fewer than 200,000 cases of it in the U.S. The NIH lists approximately 7,000 diseases that meet this qualification, and though each disease is rare on its own, in total they affect approximately 1 in 10 Americans.

The study

For the study, researchers surveyed 1,128 patients with rare diseases and parents of children with rare diseases from across the country. Participants answered questions about their process of receiving a diagnosis, how informed they felt their medical providers were, their own knowledge about their disease, their insurance coverage, whether they felt adequately supported in their daily lives and what kind of stigma they experienced.

Researchers also included a questionnaire to assess patients' health-related quality of life, asking about physical function, fatigue, depression, anxiety, sleep, pain and ability to participate in daily activities.

Time between onset of symptoms and diagnosis was one of the most striking results: 16% of people waited 10 or more years to get an accurate diagnosis, while 17% waited between four and nine years.

Participants also reported having to see multiple providers to secure that diagnosis:

38% saw two or three providers.

24% saw four or five providers. 5% saw more than 15

providers before being diagnosed.

Nearly half reported

miles to receive care for their rare disease.

Patients generally had much lower ratings for their initial provider than for the provider who was able to correctly diagnose them, often reporting that they didn't feel their initial provider was willing to research different possible diseases or to ask other providers for help in diagnosing.

The study also asked patients about access to dental and mental health care. While most respondents felt their medical support was sufficient after receiving a diagnosis, they reported insufficient dental and mental health support. Rare diseases often require specialized dental care that is difficult to find; and mental health providers rarely receive training on

rare diseases, Bogart said. The study began as a

collaboration with the Minnesota State Chloe Barnes Advisory Council on Rare Diseases, which was established to work on legislative policies addressing factors like insurance coverage and provider education. Next steps

Bogart said he hopes to see more states creating rare disease councils, including Oregon. The council is working to learn more about the biggest challenges facing patients with rare diseases, along with building resources for providers to help guide them through rare diagnoses.

Oregon State research sheds light on how bacteria communicate their way to causing infection

Oregon State University scientists have identified proteins that prevent a bacterial cell from becoming misguided by its own messaging, allowing it to instead wait for collective communication from its group.

The research is important because understanding this type of signaling, known as quorum sensing and integral to bacterial pathogens, opens the door to potential new drugs that can disrupt it and thwart infection.

Findings were published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of

Martin Schuster, a professor in OSU's Department of Microbiology in the colleges of Science and Agricultural Sciences, and doctoral student Parker Smith study quorum sensing in the pathogen Pseudomonas aeruginosa, a gram-negative bacterium that displays a variety of social behaviors.

P. aeruginosa, a common cause of lung and wound infections among hospital patients and people with weakened immune systems, is a model organism for quorum sensing research with a well understood signaling circuit, the scientists said.

"Sometimes single-celled organisms need to work together with other cells," Schuster said. "Bacteria and other single-celled microbes can coordinate behaviors and act as a group via quorum sensing,

in which cells produce and sense a small chemical signal that is shared within the population."

As the signal is released from cells and reaches a high enough concentration in their environment, a quorum is achieved – certain genes are simultaneously activated and specific group behaviors are set in motion, Smith said.

It's a strength-in-numbers approach that allows bacteria to join forces to do things they could not do by themselves, like causing infection in animals and plants, acquiring certain nutrients and competing against other microbes.

"Bacterial infection often involves toxins that only harm the host at high levels, when produced by all bacterial cells at once," Smith said.

A major unresolved question about quorum sensing, the researchers said, has been why the signal that's produced inside an individual cell is not sensed by that same cell before it is released, spurring the cell into premature, solo action.

"In essence, what prevents signal 'short-circuiting' from happening?" Schuster said. "Our research addresses this question that's fundamental to our understanding of quorum sensing."

Smith and Schuster learned that a set of proteins called antiactivators are crucial for short-circuit prevention. The proteins work as a quorum sensing "tuner" by causing cells

to be less sensitive to the quorum signal.

The researchers developed bacterial strains that lacked two different types of antiactivator proteins and then looked at quorum sensing behaviors in individual cells.

"We found that without antiactivators, a fraction of cells in a P. aeruginosa population engaged in 'self-talk,'" Smith said "In these cells, signal short-circuiting had activated quorum-sensing-dependent behaviors at all times, irrespective of cell density and without any communication with other cells. Our research shows how bacteria put the brakes on quorum sensing to achieve true communication in a group.'

In addition to helping the quest for new antibiotics that can inhibit quorum sensing in bacterial pathogens, the findings also provide background knowledge useful for the engineering of cells with new properties in a field called synthetic biology, Schuster said.

The study was funded by the National Science Foundation.

Robert (Bob) Miller

February 26, 1930 - May 25, 2022



Dr. Robert O. (Bob) Miller, former owner of Dahlstrom & Watt Bulb Farm and professor passes at 92

Bob Miller peacefully passed away at his home in Gasquet, California on May 25, 2022, surrounded by family, after a lengthy battle with cancer.

Bob led a remarkable life. Born in West Virginia, as a teenager he mined coal in the family mine, later serving in the Air Force where he trained as a diesel mechanic. His brother-inlaw's small greenhouse and florist business sparked an interest in flowers, and after the Air Force he studied horticulture at West Virginia University in Morgantown. Becoming interested in research, he asked his professor to name the most difficult graduate program in the country. The answer was Cornell University, to which Bob immediately applied. Learning of his acceptance the day before classes began, Bob drove

all night to arrive the next day in time for school. As a student, he supported his wife, Dora Alice "Sam" Miller and two young children (Jim and Rob) by delivering trailers throughout the northeast and Midwest while also going to school fulltime. His legendary work ethic would repeatedly bring him success in life and served as a model for his children.

After attaining a PhD in Horticulture, in 1958
Bob started as an Assistant
Professor at Ohio State,
researching poinsettias
and then Easter lilies. In
his teaching position he
influenced countless Ohio
State students who went on
to positions of prominence
in the industry. In 1959 Bob
and Sam had a third child
(Bill).

Bob always said he had more authority to spend money as a graduate student at Cornell than as a professor at Ohio. In 1966, he made a dramatic career change and left academia for industry, purchasing a portion of Dahlstrom and Watt Bulb Farms in Smith River, California. At D&W he was able to directly apply results of his research to the commercial growing of Easter lily bulbs. Bob was a unique individual, having a research degree while developing and modernizing a highly specialized segment of the greenhouse ornamentals

industry. Within two years, D&W constructed greenhouses for year-round production of floriculture crops, notably potted poinsettias and flowering Easter lilies. D&W added another nursery to grow azaleas in the early 1970s, Cottage Gardens in Eureka. Additional D&W crops included hydrangeas, Boston ferns, rhododendrons, and various annuals and perennials, sold wholesale to nurseries and stores across the US. For years, D&W was the largest single shipper on United Airlines air freight from Portland, Oregon. In the 1980s Bob began a twice-yearly open house, selling flowers at retail to the public. Smith River became the "Easter Lily Capital of the World."

At D&W Bob met Alice Kier, whom he married in 1972 and with whom he had two additional children (Brian and Jennifer). Alice became Bob's partner in work as well as life, running D&W's office operations for years. Truly a family business, all five of Bob's children and three generations of Miller's at one time or another worked on the farm. In 2007 he retired from D&W, selling his portion of the business to his son Rob. In retirement Bob and Alice lived in Gasquet, California. He built and equipped a woodshop,

becoming an expert craftsman making Federal style furniture featuring bell flower and leaf inlay. Crafting the furniture for joy and not money, he refused payment for his work and would donate pieces for local charity auctions.

An inveterate storyteller strong in character, opinion, and joviality, Bob is survived by Alice and his five adult children (Jim, Rob, Bill, Brian, and Jennifer), eleven grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren. As a family, we cherish the memories of an icon in the national and international greenhouse industry, a pillar in the local community, a father who instilled strong values in his children, and a caring husband who provided

everything possible. A celebration of Bob's life will be held July 23rd from 1-6 PM at Patrick Creek Lodge, 13950 Hwy 199 in Gasquet. The ages of the children range from 1 to 18 years old. The 1 and 2 year olds received a Melissa and Doug First Bead Maze, which encourages the development of early skills. Art supplies for the other two age groups; 3 to 6 and 7 to 18 year olds received art totes with age appropriate supplies.

Gwenn Childers, vice president, a retired Montessori school director, developed the materials list based on the ages of the children. This is a day of resources and activities for elders, their caregivers and families. Local Native American elders, age 55 and older, can take a survey and receive an incentive. The Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation has received a grant for the Tolowa Elder and Vulnerable Adult Victim Services project. This grant, from the Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime, will use funding to establish a comprehensive victim services program for elders and vulnerable adults who have been, or are at risk of, abuse or exploitation.

Unfortunately, the abuse and neglect of American Indian and Alaska Native elders occurs with alarming frequency and more than 79 percent of elder abuse cases go unreported in tribal communities, according to Dorothy Wait, Tribal Council Member and former director of Community and Family Services. Tribal leaders across the country have identified three major challenges in addressing elder abuse and neglect issues on reservations. There is a need to increase training about elder abuse and neglect, a lack of codes addressing elder abuse issues and a lack of policies and procedures for tribal agencies handling elder abuse and neglect issues. Wait is excited for how this work will impact the Nation. "This is an opportunity to educate our community about Elder Abuse, educate our Elders on how to recognize if they are being abused, or have in the past, and reinforce the cultural practice of honoring our elders."
