he Southwestern Or-The Souurwestern egon Community College Board of Directors will soon schedule a work session to review concerns raised by community members regarding operations of the Curry

County SWOCC campus.

During a regular board meeting held at the Brookings campus July 15, board chair David Bridgham, along with the six board members, listen intently as several community members outlined their concerns, with some offering solutions.

Those concerns ranged

from declining enrollment, the college's operating costs, and how tax money supporting the college is being spent, to Curry County's representation on the college board.

# Money for hospital emergency department

Efforts to establish an emergency department at Curry Medical Center, 500 5th St. in Brookings, are one step closer to reality following the Oregon Legislature's approval of \$2 million for the project.

Brookings is the largest rural community in the state without a hospital.

Curry Health Network's CEO Ginny Razo said the network's vision is to be the region's premier rural healthcare system.

To accomplish that, it aligns all of its services with optimizing each patient's experience through exceptional service and quality

She said that when the Brookings emergency department opens, it will operate within the current Curry Medical Center (CMC) facility, as the walk-in clinic is transitioned into space that can support the emergency department.

"The emergency department facility space

will be fully equipped to handle emergencies with staffing, equipment and supplies to provide for timely stabilization of most life-

threatening emergencies," said Razo. 'Examples of equipment currently located at CMC that support an emergency

# Brookings 'Lights for Liberty' supports detained immigrants

Holding signs that read "Protect the Dreamers" and "Close the Camps," while singing patriotic songs, about 75 people gathered at the Bankus Fountain in Brookings to support immigrants at U.S. detention camps and to protest the Trump Administration's immigration policies.

Brookings resident Mike Bradley said he came to the July 12 evening vigil to seek change. "It is a travesty with what's going on," he said.

"I grew up believing that our county was a generous, caring place. We set an example for the rest of the

world."

Bradly said America is sliding backward with its current policies regarding immigration.

"We have adopted a policy of cruelty," he said.

Veronica Spalding of Brookings led the effort for the local vigil, "Because I was so distressed by seeing the pictures of what is happening at the boarders.

"But what really go to me was the children," said Spalding. "It just broke my heart."

Spalding, originally from South Africa, said her greatgrandparents were held in detention camps during the war. "So this strikes a chord for me," she said.

the Brookings vigil, and those held around the world, would spark public awareness of the boarder issues and the conditions at the detention centers.

"I hope the public becomes more compassionate and that the detention camps are improved or closed down." she said.

"I would also like to see the children reunited with their parents, and that those people that are being detained are fed and housed like human beings."

During her speech at the vigil, Spalding said many of the immigrants fleeing from Mexico to the United States are being forced from their county. "All of them are fleeing grinding poverty, lack of opportunity to better their lives, and violence," she said.

"Violence within the family, violence on the streets and violence from law enforcement.'

Spalding said the extraordinary surge of asylum seekers is testing the limits of just whom, exactly, the U.S. is willing to protect, challenging the stone-carved idea that America is the

place that welcomes the tired and poor "yearning to breathe free."

"It has also presented Trump with one of the most vexing policy challenges of his presidency, and virtually every measure taken so far has made the problem

worse," she said.

"The world will not stand for what this administration is doing. Not now. Not again.'

Spalding read aloud the names of seven immigrant children, including a 21-month-old, she said have

died in detention camps on U.S. soil, asking for a moment of silence and prayer for the children and their families.

said Dongelmans.

Oregon communities faced numerous hardships during the destructive event, most significantly the loss of life in Douglas County resulting from a swollen river.

In Curry County, near Brookings, Gardner Road collapsed. It's one of the region's logging roads, which is a

major source of revenue for

Portions of U.S. Highway 101 were closed during the storms as well.

A joint preliminary damage assessment was conducted the week of May 13 in the affected counties, including the Confederated Tribe the Umatilla Indian Reservation. More than \$8 million in damages were documented by the Oregon Office of Emergency Management and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

From these assessments, the estimated costs for this disaster were categorized as:

\$154,675

• Emergency Protective Measures: \$534,125 · Roads and Bridges:

Debris Removal:

• Water Control Facilities: \$425,000

• Public Buildings:

\$15,000

• Utilities: \$1,394,624 • Parks/Other: \$317,840 The disaster declaration

announced by Oregon Gov. Kate Brown on July 9 makes federal funding available to the state and eligible local and tribal governments, plus certain private nonprofit organizations, on a costsharing basis for emergency work.

The funding will also be used to repair or replace facilities damaged by the severe winter storms, flooding, landslide, and mudslides in the six eligible counties.

have a connection from the Curry residents to the campus here," Bridgham said. "They also want more vocational courses."

During the meeting, SWOCC Curry County Campus Executive Dean Douglas Bunn outlined the success of the school's operations and its students, as well as the future direction of the campus.

Bunn said he is planning

additional efforts to attract more students to the Curry campus through social media and traditional advertising sources.

He outlined more outreach efforts to support and promote the Curry RN program, utilize broadcast technology, expand partnership programs, promote university partnership and community education programs, and expand the advisory council.

Bunn told The Pilot before the meeting that the focus is on increasing certified nursing courses. "It is one of the needs in our community," he said.

We need public safety, teachers and healthcare providers. So it makes sense to build around the nursing. These courses will help the college and the community."

Bunn added that the college's vision for its Curry campus is strong. "The pathway to our goals is bright," he said.

"We are going to be

serving more students and we are going to use technology to expand the services. We are doing all things to try to connect to our students in the most-efficient

ways. That's the key." As the board took public testimony during Monday's meeting, first to speak was Curry County Commissioner Sue Gold, who said she hoped efforts would be made to encourage more people to apply to be a board member representing Curry County.

"I am also concerned about the classes being dropped at the Curry campus," she said. "I hope more people will sign up.'

Gold suggested some solutions to the board, including a review of lowering the tax rate, offering additional courses to seniors, and developing business and medical internships to attract more students.

Curry County Commissioner Chris Paasch, who has been critical of the amount of money spent to

operate the Curry campus and the services offered there, told the board, "We are not getting our bang for

the buck. "This is more of a vocational college than it is an academic college," he said.

Paasch encouraged the board to develop yet additional vocational courses at the Curry campus. "This will keep our children here," he said.

Curry County Commissioner Court Boice also spoke at the meeting. "There is a division here," Boice told the college board.

Dave Gilman, who said he has been in the medical field for 38 years and currently works with Curry Health, told the board there are many job opportunities

in the healthcare field. "We have 52 openings for certified medical assistants right now," he said. "We also need leadership and management-development courses here. We need to build for the future."

Following the meeting, Brigham told The Pilot that the board will review all of the public comments made during the meeting. "And we will organize a work session with the necessary experts on hand who can inform us about the tax revenue law, district representation, things like that, so we can make informed decisions," he said

"We will report back to the citizens. My sense, when the meeting was over, is those that attended went away feeling they had had an opportunity to voice their concerns and that we listened."

department include, but are not limited to, diagnostic imaging including X-ray, 64-slice CT scanner, ultrasound and MRI.

"Other equipment includes a tele-stroke robot and cardiac monitoring.'

Razo said Curry Health Network began updating CMC to meet current building codes in 2015 and therefore no major construction is needed on the building to open an emergency department.

The network also has invested approximately \$1.75 million in construction and capital equipment at the medical center, she

"Management continues to work with the board of directors to finalize a budget," said Razo, "but we anticipate \$2 million will be sufficient to allow CHN to open the Curry Medical Center Emergency Care Department."

She said residents of the southern portion of Curry County currently are faced with limited choices for emergency care.

"They can call an ambulance or drive to either Crescent City, California, where Sutter Coast Hospital operates an (emergency department), or to Curry General Hospital in Gold Beach," she said.

"The only 'immediate care' service in Brookings is available at Curry Medical Center, in the form of the walk-in clinic.'

Razo said many residents do not completely understand the limitations of the walkin clinic, and therefore arrive at that location with life-threatening conditions.

Clinic staff have limited resources and must use 911 to summon an ambulance to transport the patient 30 miles to one of the available emergency departments. That delay in emergency care, said Razo, poses a significant threat to the safety of the community.

The American College of Emergency Physicians has emphasized that "for life-threatening emergencies in which minutes count, a visit to an urgent care center [i.e., walk-in clinic] may create a dangerous delay in care while the patient is transferred to a hospital."

Razo added that while some area residents value the less-expensive cost and convenient access of a walk-in clinic in the south-county area, the American College of **Emergency Physicians** says that when these patients require transfer to an emergency department, any cost savings disap-



In addition, when utilizing the clinic causes delays in receiving emergency care and treatment, the medical problem often becomes significantly more dangerous and ultimately costly to treat.

State Rep. Brock Smith (R-Port Orford) and State Sen. Dallas Heard (R-

Roseburg) advocated for the emergency department funding during the 2019 legislative session, which concluded June 30.

They stressed that investment in an emergency department could improve patient outcomes, save lives, and bolster both the local and state economies.

# U.S. Highway 101 projects continue

The Oregon Department of Transportation's \$5.2-million improvement project is continuing along U.S. Highway 101 in Curry County between milepost 295 and 300, Childers Road to Garrison Slough.

The project will pave five miles of U.S. 101 and repair four bridges between the Sixes area and the north end of Port Orford.

The speed limit has been reduced to 40 mph at milepost 295, a one-mile section of highway between Crystal Creek and Sixes River.

# County's emergency manager addresses tsunami warning system

In light of the many questions I have been receiving regarding tsunami sirens, I wish to provide an overview and update of our tsunami warning systems in Curry County.

We have a couple of different ways to notify the public in regards to a threat from a distant tsunami. (Emphasis on distant: I will expound on that point later.)

Most often, we associate a tsunami warning with the sounding of warning sirens. We do have a few sirens throughout the county that are utilized for this purpose. These sirens are tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 11 a.m.

Full disclosure: Not all sirens work. These systems are surplus World War II-era air raid sirens and most are beyond repair. Sirens that are still online are maintained in an effort to keep this limited part of the warning system going.

Replacement of these sirens is very expensive. For example, while attempting to bring Floras Lake's siren back online, it was determined by technicians that the siren itself would first have to be replaced. Invoice cost: \$22,000. Just for the

If, in fact, the siren controller, power system, radio components, etc., have to be replaced, then that cost of repair climbs rapidly. Complete new systems run between \$50,000 and \$100,000 each, depending upon range and operational

capabilities.

Thirteen of the sirens in Curry County are in a state of failure. During the previous 18 months, despite my limited budget, two (Port Orford, Harris Beach) have been fixed; currently, four work.

The limitations and costs of this system, juxtaposed with

current and more robust alerting methods, is quickly making tsunami sirens along the coast obsolete.

Another warning system we utilize is our public-safety partners. Some may remember that during the 2011 Japanese tsunami, which impacted our coastline, law enforcement, firefighters and first-responders went door to door in the lowlying areas to make notifications and ensure areas at risk were evacuated.

During a distant tsunami event, these partners will be utilized to their full extent where possible.

### Reverse 911

The most robust warning system we have in Curry County is the Everbridge Reverse 911 notification system. This allows us to notify you of a public-safety threat such as (but not limited to) a tsunami warning.

Residents who have signed up for this notification system most likely received a phone call, text, and/or email on July 3 making them aware of the tsunami siren test. In an emergency, this warning system is the quickest and most effective way we can communicate the hazard to our residents.

You can sign up for Reverse 911 notifications online at https:// member.everbridge.net/index/892807736723773#/login

Finally, Curry County in October will begin to receive updated abilities through Everbridge. This will include the ability to use the public-safety system WEA, which allows for certain wireless phones and other compatible mobile devices to receive geographically-targeted, text-like messages alerting them of imminent threats to safety in their

Check with your cellular provider to see if you can receive this type of alert, and how to enable the feature on your phone.

I've highlighted the fact that

the tsunami warning system is used to warn the public regarding distant tsunamis. Why is this system not used for local tsunamis? And what is the difference between a local and a distant tsunami, and the difference between a tsunami warning, watch or advisory?

### Tsunami warnings

•Tsunami Watch

- A tsunami watch is issued when a tsunami may later impact the watch area. Emergency management officials and the public should prepare to take action.

• Tsunami Advisory – A tsunami advisory is issued when a tsunami with the potential to generate strong currents or waves dangerous to those in or very near the water is imminent, expected or occurring. Significant inundation is not expected for areas under an advisory. Appropriate actions to be taken by local officials may include closing beaches, evacuating harbors and marinas, and re-positioning ships to deep waters when there is time to safely do so.

• Tsunami Warning – A tsunami warning is issued when a tsunami with the potential to generate widespread inundation is imminent, expected or occurring. Warnings alert the public that dangerous coastal flooding, accompanied by

powerful currents, is possible and may continue for several hours after initial arrival. Appropriate actions to be taken by local officials may include evacuating low-lying coastal areas, and re-positioning ships to deep waters when there is time to safely do so.

A distant tsunami is just that ... a tsunami generated from a distant location, such as Alaska, Japan, Chile, etc. With a distant tsunami, we have time to make notifications and to evacuate low-lying areas.

For instance, a tsunami generated in Alaska gives us approximately four hours to evacuate areas at risk.

However, a local tsunami is one that is generated as a result of a very large earthquake located near the coast of Northern California and Oregon, and as such there is very little time between the ground shaking and the arrival of the tsunami surge.

The severity of the earthquake we expect to experience here is such that public-warning systems will be rendered inoperable. Don't rely on a warning system to tell you to evacuate to high ground after an earthquake. The ground shaking IS your warning, and will probably be the ONLY warning you get.

As soon as you are able to safely move during a local earthquake, grab your "go bag" and evacuate inland and to high ground immedi-

Be prepared to leave on foot, as the roads most likely will not be available for vehicle traffic.

# Crosswalk safety decisions pending

The Brookings-Harbor City Council has yet to approve a request to the Oregon Department of Transportation to enhance safety at Chetco Avenue pedestrian crossings.

# History

**Brookings-Harbor** City Councilor John McKinney originally

asked the council to review a plan to install crosswalk in-pavement warming light. Yet such a system is not allowed on Oregon highways, such as U.S. Highway 101, otherwise known as Chetco Avenue.

McKinney then asked that the city review Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons (PHB), a special type of beacon used to warn and control traffic at an unsignaled location to

help pedestrians cross the highway.

The cost of such a system is said to start at \$100,000 and would require meeting traffic signals warrants and/or specific pedestrian columns, as well as require specific site requirements similar to a mid-block, according to the Oregon Department of Transportation.

ODOT would need toconduct a specific

engineering study before such a system could be

approved. **During City Council** workshops July 1 and April 1, the need for pedestrian safety improvements at the crosswalks at the Redwood Theater was discussed. The council's consensus was that additional flashing lights at the sidewalk on each side of the crosswalk would enhance visibility for motorists, because the flashing lights above

the sidewalk are difficult

the day, depending on the angle of the sun.

# What's next?

According to the staff report to the City Council, any additional enhancements would require ODOT to tie into the existing flashing-light beacon and add to the existing crosswalk lighting system.

The report states that more research is required to see if such enhancements could be implemented.

that a formal request from the City Council to ODOT would help ODOT prioritize the crosswalk safety improvements.

During its July 8 regular session, the council moved further discussion about the pedestrian safety issue to a public meeting July 22.

fter 58 years of cow-Aboys and cowgirls strutting their stuff, the Orick Rodeo hasn't lost a step, although this year's event did feature a few bumps and bruises.

Here's a rundown of results from the California Cowboys Professional Rodeo Association.

### **Calf Roping** (\$695.60)

In the calf roping, or tiedown roping, competition, a rider on a horse tries to lasso a calf, dismount, then tie down the calf as quickly as possible.

Brushton Minton won

\$347.80 in the calf roping event for a 12.1-second time, followed by J. Cody Jones at 13.1 seconds for \$208.68, Savras Halikas got \$139.12 in 22.8 seconds.

### **Steer Wrestling** (\$620.40)

Also known as bulldogging, steer wrestling pushes the limits of physicality, requiring a galloping horse rider to drop onto a sprinting steer and wrestle it to the ground, then toss it off balance by gripping and turning its horns.

Brushton Minton took the big payout with \$310.20 in 23.35 seconds.

**Breakaway Roping** 

#### (\$1,071.60)

A variant of calf roping, breakaway roping is an event in which a calf is roped but not tied.

Marla Zuber won \$535.80 at 4.6 seconds. Hannah O'Connor took home \$321.48 for coming in a hair behind at 4.9 seconds. Sienna Radelfinger's 13.1-second time earned \$214.32.

### **Barrel Dacing** (\$1,222)

In this rodeo event, a horse rider runs a cloverleaf pattern around barrels at high speed, combining the horse's athletic ability with the skills of the rider.

### **Team Roping** (\$2,444)

A two-rider competition, team roping brings a header and a heeler to the arena. The header ropes a steer by the horns or neck and drives the animal toward where the heeler can lasso the hind legs. Team roping is the only event in which men and women compete professionally together in both single-gender or mixed-gender teams.

Bryor Minton and Cody Box had the best time at 6.3 seconds, taking home \$611 each. Wes and Clayton Moore won \$366.60 each for an 8.1-second run, and Dennis Fitze and Shawn Manning finished in 9.8 seconds for \$244.40 each.

### Saddle Bronc Riding (\$808.40)

Saddle bronc riders take on a bucking horse (sometimes one with a nasty disposition) that tries to throw them off. The event has evolved from the horse-breaking skills of the old days into a highly competitive crowd-pleaser. Jesse Williams scored







# **Opossum Might** Make a Good **Neighbor**

DEAR PAW'S COR-NER: A family of possums has moved in under my porch. They are hideous looking. Are they a threat to my cat? -- Julia in New Jersey

DEAR JULIA: Healthy opossums pose little or no threat to your cat, as long as it doesn't bother them. As scary as their pointed faces appear, opossums (pronounced "possums") are not a threat to pets nor to you. In fact, they can be beneficial.

Opossums are nocturnal creatures that avoid other wildlife -- meaning they move around mostly at night and try to stay out of

the way of, well, anything bigger than them. If you're out at night and accidently come face to face with an opossum -- as I've done occasionally, especially growing up in the South -you'll probably get hissed at, which is frightening, but not attacked. When threatened, they often flop over and emit a foulsmelling fart. (They're not really "playing dead," as it's a reaction triggered by stress). Opossums may not even do structural damage under your porch, unlike raccoons and other small mammals.

Opossums really are remarkable animals. They're the only marsupial in

North America, carrying their young in a pouch. (Possums without the "o" are an entirely different marsupial species found in Australia and the south Pacific region.) Opossums are omnivorous and eat snakes (even poisonous ones), slugs, grubs and roaches. They are reportedly resistant to the rabies virus and to Lyme disease, and they even eat ticks with no ill effects -- up to 5,000 per year!

In 2008, the U.S. EPA approved amendments to Hoopa's WQCP for several parameters including dissolved oxygen, inter-gravel dissolved oxygen, total nitrogen and total phosphorus, "with the under standing that unless and until the Hoopa Valley Tribe completes the process of establishing Natural Condition reference conditions, the stated numerical criteria... will constitute the operative criteria for all purposes." (EPA approval letter, Feb 14 2008). In December of 2010, U.S. EPA approved the North Coast Regional Quality Control Board's (NCRWQCB) Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) and Basin Plan Amendment for the Klamath River. The water quality simulation model developed for the TMLDs, composed of a series of integrated models, provided a methodology to generate specific and reproducible natural conditions numbers for water temperature and dissolved oxygen. The proposed natural condition clause is considered to meet the natural condition clause requirements. The Hoopa Valley Tribe's Pollutant Discharge Prohibition Ordinance and Feferal Clean Water Act require that the WQCP be be reviewed and updated to accommodate changes in technologies, policies, and physical characteristics of water of the Reservation within a three year period.

SUMMARY OF ADOPTED ORDINANCE 2019-010 AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING THE DEL NORTE COUNTY

**PUBLIC NUISANCE ORDINANCE** 

The following is a summary of an ordinance adopted at the regularly scheduled meeting of the Del Norte County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, July 9, 2019 by the following

Ayes: Supervisors Cowan, Howard, Hemmingsen, Berkowitz, Gitlin Noes: None

The updated ordinance makes mostly technical and procedural changes. The definitions of a public nuisance are expanded. Certain provisions related to animal nuisances have been moved from another title and modified so that animals kept in a manner which constitutes a public nuisance will be enforced by the general nuisance provisions. The hearing provisions have been expanded to better detail the rights and responsibilities of the parties. The costs which can be recovered through a special assessment lien are
