What's closed? What can you still do?

Changes to the rules are happening so quickly with the current health crisis caused by the novel coronavirus, many people are confused about what is still allowed and what's not. The confusion continues to grow after Gov. Kate Brown's most recent Executive Order No. 20-12 issued on Monday, March 23.

"I started by asking Oregonians to stay home and practice social distancing," the press re-lease announcing the order said. "Then I urged the public to follow these recommendations. Instead, thousands crowded the beaches of our coastal communities, our trails, our parks, our

city streets, potentially spreading COVID-19 and endangering the lives of others across the state. Now I'm ordering it. To save lives and protect our community.2

At a press conference on Monday afternoon, Brown was clear about the intent of the new order. It limits travel to "home, work, the doctor and essentials," she said. Since the order came down, more people than ever are asking about what's still allowed and what's not. Lots of misinformation is being spread, and in some cases harming the community's ability to respond.

BUSINESSES

The order doesn't close all businesses.

Some businesses are deemed essential, such as grocery stores, pharmacies, health services, hardware stores, auto parts, gas stations, auto repair shops, animal feed stores, communications businesses and media like newspapers and radio.

Before the recent order, businesses affected the most were restaurants, bars, taverns, brewpubs, wine bars and coffee shops. They have been limited since March 17 to having no onsite consumption and providing only takeout, curbside or delivery. That's still true, with no changes.

Brookings declares state of emergency

The Brookings City Council declared a local state of emergency on Monday, March 23, and backed a resolution that they hope will curb tourists from flooding into the city and keep the novel coronavirus at bay.

Rep. David Brock Smith (R-District 1) presented the resolution to the council that asks Oregon Gov. Kate Brown to include in a future order the temporary closure of transient tax facilities such as hotels, motels or any short-term rental of fewer than 28 days through May 8. It received unanimous approval from the council.

Brock is chairman of the Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus and was presenting the resolution on behalf of the Caucus to as many government entities along the coast that he could. He did not know when or even if the governor would close hotels and motels to tourists.

The resolution specifically targets tourists. People living in hotels or motels and people such as truck drivers, traveling nurses, doctors or other essential workers would still be allowed to stay in transient tax facilities.

"Never in my time did I think that I would be advocating for closing tourism in our communities but that is exactly

Gold Beach passes flurry of declarations

Ordinance temporarily closes transient lodging to overnight visitors

old Beach City UCouncilors passed a trifecta of measures at an emergency meeting held via teleconferencing on Tuesday evening, March 24. The flurry of ordinances and declarations followed a hectic

weekend of tourism that prompted many citizen complaints about the endangerment of their health and safety and the decimation of limited essential supplies and fresh foods from store shelves.

Councilors first considered whether to declare a temporary state of emergency for the city, which will remain in effect until April 28 unless extended by the council. The declaration delegates authority to the City Administrator "to take actions and issue orders necessary and reasonable to protect health, safety and welfare of the City and the public and to conduct activities that

minimize or mitigate the effect of the emergency' caused by the coronavirus. The declaration also designates two additional staff members to serve as "acting in capacity" City Administrator, Will Newdall, Public Works Superintendent, and Police Chief Tracy Wood. "Our city is at risk,

and we need to protect it," said Mayor Karl Popoff. "To hit some sort of balance is the best we can possibly do." The emergency declaration passed unanimously, with all five council members present.

Port of Brookings Harbor closes Beachfront RV Park

Port of Brookings Harbor commissioners temporarily closed the Beachfront RV Park but kept open access to Sporthaven Beach, the boat launch and boat docks during a special meeting Tuesday morning, March 24.

"It is difficult to have to make these decisions," said Commissioner Chairman Roy Davis. "We are publicly elected officials and we have to make these decisions to try and do the best we can. Please be kind and courteous to our Port staff because they are out there on the front lines, there are a lot of people out on the front lines and I would ask everybody to please be kind and courteous to those people.'

On Monday, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown directed people to "stay-at-home" as much as possible or face Class C misdemeanor charges through May 8. Also Monday, March 22, Oregon State Parks System closed its campgrounds and day-use areas to the public through May 8 after initially stating they would do so on April 3.

Brown's order came after a mostly sunny weekend that saw people not staying at home and practicing social distancing.

Following the unanimous vote, 4-1, Port officials

informed people at Beachfront that Wednesday it would be closed through May 8 and they had to leave. Port Manager Gary Dehlinger said they would cancel any future reservations and would be giving refunds.

Commissioner Vice Chairman Richard Heap, who voted no, was in favor of more stringent action closing the boat ramps but allowing moorage holders access to remove their boats, and was inclined to close the Sporthaven parking lot and beach access.

"It is a lure and an attraction," Heap said. "It does provide people an opportunity to come to our community and use that beach. I don't think that assuming just locals are going to show up is completely appropriate. I'll agree temporarily but if it gets out of hand we are going to have to shut it down."

"We will revisit if necessary,"

ness undertaken was considering whether to pass an ordinance similar to communities to the north of Gold Beach. After considering ordinances passed by the cities of Astoria, Manzanita and Bandon, and Tillamook County, the preferred option was modeled after Bandon's ordinance. The Tillamook ordinance closed all outdoor recreation, including beaches, boat launches and parks, whereas the Bandon ordinance focused on shutting down transient lodging for tourists.

The ordinance is effective immediately and orders the evacuation of all overnight visitors by 8 a.m. on Friday, March 27. The ordinance defines visitors as those who are spending time in the city for pleasure, recreation or non-business reasons and is not a resident, property owner or business owner.

"The purpose of the emergency declaration is to limit 'Virus Visitors' from hot zone states or communities who are deliberately flaunting Governor Brown's executive order to 'Stay Home, Save Lives," says the packet provided personally to lodging operators by City Administrator Jodi Fritts. "These individuals are treating this health crisis as a spring break or extended vacation, and potentially infecting local citizens.'

said Davis. "I do not recommend closing the beach access. My recommendation to the board would be to not close public access to the beach or the parking spots along the beachfront. Only our RV park should be closed down."

Also, closed was the fishing pier near the U.S. Coast Guard Station Chetco River. The fish cleaning station remains open. Signage about the closures and social distancing was in place Tuesday afternoon.

The special meeting was called after the RV park and Sporthaven had a busy weekend, despite recommendations by Gov. Brown.

"Over the weekend we had a huge gathering at our RV park," Dehlinger said to the commissioners. "We estimated over 60 to 70 percent occupied. The public parking spaces were near full capacity. So, there was quite a crowd at our RV park this past weekend probably because the weather was good and spring break type of thing. Pretty big hoopla about our RV park being open."

Resolution R1920-12 passed 4-1 with Councilor Becky Campbell opposed.

As a final measure of protection, the City Council unanimously approved a similar resolution as those passed by Curry County Commissioners, the City of Brookings and the Port of Brookings Harbor earlier this week. That resolution has been advocated by State Rep. David Brock Smith (R-District 1) as part of the Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus. The resolution requests Gov. Brown close all

if fishing was being allowed following Monday's order from the governor.

State Rep. David Brock Smith (R-District 1) called into the meeting and said beaches were still open and that fishing and hunting for that matter were allowed as long as people could so while also abiding by social distancing guides.

The commissioners unanimously approved, 5-0, Smith's resolution on behalf of the Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus that asks the governor to include a temporary closure of motel, RV and campground stays of less than 28 days to discourage visitors from staying overnight at the coast during the stay-home order.

As of March 24, there were no confirmed COVID-19 cases in Brookings or Curry County, but there were 209 confirmed cases in Oregon and eight deaths related to the virus.

"This is not a good time for all of us," said Commissioner Sharon Hartung. "We have to try to get through this the best we can and also protect our Port staff as well."

> transient lodging facilities in Curry County until May 1, with exceptions for essential workers, the trucking industry and others.

"I know we are in a very difficult time and the economic impacts now are severe to our communities," Smith said in an email to city administrators. "But to prevent a statewide stay at home order that would be even more devastating to our economies... these proposals could go a long way to keep people from outside our area from coming here at this time while minimizing the economic impact to our communities further."



"We are getting too many travelers who are putting our aging population at risk," Councilor Tamie Kaufman said. "Visitors are raiding stores, and we have a frail population, limited hospital beds, and no ventilators."

COVID-19 Regional **Response Fund launched**

Humboldt Area Foundation and its affiliate the Wild Rivers Community Foundation have launched the CO-VID-19 Regional Response Fund to address the immediate and emerging needs of our region's most vulnerable residents - from mitigation to eventual recovery from the coronavirus pandemic.

The fund was established to collect contributions and then provide grants to charitable organizations in Del Norte, Curry, Humboldt and Trinity counties, foundation officials stated. The number of people affected by the coronavirus in the fourcounty region continues to grow. Many are grappling with sudden changes to our everyday lives. For some, the effects are particularly dire.

"Our number one priority is to the region we serve and the amazing people who get to call this place home," said WRCF Director Gina Zottola. "Our communities have a history of resiliency and now more than ever as a Foundation we must garner all of our resources and tools to assist our residents."

HAF and WRCF, with the support of foundation partners The California Endowment and The California Wellness Foundation, committed \$150,000 to seed the fund, which launched last Friday. The organizations invite civic groups, individuals and community

partners to join this regional effort.

By being responsive during times of uncertainty, HAF and WRCF embrace its roles as community foundations to respond to the evolving needs of our diverse residents.

"Deciding to help our most vulnerable neighbors and collaborating to ensure the health and well being of our citizens during times of crisis is what we do best as a community," said Zottola.

Grants from the fund will be made on a rolling basis to nonprofits, other charitable organizations and Native Indigenous organizations in Trinity, Humboldt, Del Norte and Curry. The fund's initial focus will be on seniors, low-wage families, tribal communities and the nonprofits serving those populations. HAF and WRCF are not able to make grants from this fund to individuals or small businesses at this time. The process for making grants from the fund is being developed and will be available and shared soon

The COVID-19 Regional Response Fund is just one part of the planned response by HAF and WRCF, which includes other grantmaking resources, information and support and community leadership.

aily, and at times Dlike now when the news is full of epidemics and contagion, many turn to the Bible for inspiration and comfort.

In Isaiah 59:19, we read, "When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him.'

We read of many instances of contagious diseases (often called "pestilence" in the Bible) and plagues being stopped in their tracks (e.g. Numbers 16). Rather than feeling helpless and hopeless in the face of overwhelming dire predictions, we have many assurances that we can turn to God for our protection, i.e. "I will...strengthen that which was sick: they shall dwell safely, and none shall make them afraid' (Ezekiel 34:16, 28).

I think that perhaps the most sought-after comfort, though, is the 91st Psalm, which begins, "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." It continues later on:

but it does close all state

"Surely he shall deliver thee... from the noisome pestilence....Thou shalt not be afraid...for the pestilence that walketh in darkness....Because thou hast made the Lord, which is my refuge, even the most High, thy habitation; There shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling. For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways."

Surely Jesus felt the assurance that he dwelled in the secret place of the Almighty; that he lived, moved, and had his being in God, as we are told we do also (Acts 17:28).

When he healed people of leprosy, considered to be a contagious condition, he was not afraid to reach out and touch them. He was living out what we read in Psalm 56:4, "in God I have put my trust; I will not fear what flesh can do unto me." In Luke 7:21, we find that Jesus "cured many of their infirmities and plagues."

Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, who was an avid, life-long student of the Bible, saw

that "the history of Christianity furnishes sublime proofs of the supporting influence and protecting power bestowed on man by this heavenly Father, omnipotent Mind, who gives man faith and understanding whereby to defend himself, not only from temptation, but from bodily suffering" (Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, p. 387).

She also saw the wisdom of conquering the fear which leads toward disease, rather than away from it. She said, "The press unwittingly sends forth many sorrows and diseases among the human family. It does this by giving names to diseases and by printing long descriptions which mirror images of disease distinctly in thought. A new name for an ailment affects people like a Parisian name for a novel garment. Every one hastens to get it. A minutely described disease costs

many a man his earthly days of comfort" (ibid p. 196).

We would all do well to keep thought focused on Psalm 91 or other comforting angel thoughts from God, rather than the dim pictures we're constantly being bombarded with. "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee" (Isa 26:3). Then maybe we'll be able to say with Isaiah (14:7), "The whole earth is at rest, and is quiet: they break forth into singing.'

restaurants open in this area, see the display ad in this paper for what's available. If you are tired of eating your cooking, now's a good time to call up your favorites for take-out or delivery. Treat yourself and take it out of the box and serve it up like it was at the restaurant to make it even more special. Linens are optional.

Brown's order is not as prohibitive or restrictive as orders in other states.

"If a business isn't specifically listed in the order, you can stay open if you can maintain social distancing," Brown said. "If they

are closed, except for food, grocery, health care, medical, pharmacy or pet store services. Yes, Fido does get to have treats and toys.

Other businesses not specifically listed can continue to operate so long as they maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet. Businesses in this category can operate by offering curbside pickup of merchandise. Otherwise, they must have an employee who enforces social distancing policies.

GOVERNMENT **OFFICES**

Law enforcement, state, city and county governments are operating, but many are choosing not to provide lobby or open office hours, with contact instead through phone, email and payments in drop boxes. Call before going to their offices.

If people don't get the message that clumping up and overwhelming local areas is a bad idea, they will have to revisit the decision to leave all beaches open. The parking lot at Sporthaven Beach is still open but could be closed if people don't practice social distancing.

County parks: Curry County doesn't have a lot of parks. The campers at Boice Cope Park near Floras Lake aren't allowing any new check-ins but as of Monday were allowing those who made reservations to stay until the end of their reservation. Golf: Yes, Salmon Run Golf Course is open. Remember though, social distancing

Fishing: Yes, you can go fishing. are not following the rules and complying, we will shut them down."

The extensive list of new business closures has fewer impacts for Curry County than in larger metropolitan areas, but they still hurt all the same. If you were thinking of getting a haircut, hair salon treatment, or your nails done, those are now do-it-yourself projects. Either that, or we are all going to look a little rough in another month or so.

The tanning salon is now in your backyard, so long as the weather cooperates. That spa visit to help you relax from your viral anxiety is not on the horizon until the governor lifts the order. That tattoo or piercing you may have been thinking about getting? You will need to think about it awhile longer. Jewelry shops and boutiques are closed except where goods are provided through pickup or delivery service. Art galleries can only be open by appointment.

The new furniture you were planning on getting with your tax refund is on hold, too. Furniture stores are closed, but federal tax filing deadlines have been moved to July 15, so there's plenty of time to do both. The state tax deadline is still to be determined.

No more meetings at Elks and Moose lodges or similar, or anything at senior activity centers. No theaters, yoga studios, gyms and fitness studios, tennis clubs, dance studios, jumping gyms, arcades, laser tag or youth clubs. Add museums to the libraries that are already only offering curbside and telephone services.

The good news is that Curry County doesn't have cosmetic stores, bowling alleys, skating rinks, ski resorts, hookah bars or an aquarium because they would be closed, too.

THE GREAT OUTDOORS

With recreational shopping being mostly off limits, perhaps getting out into the great outdoors is your next big idea of what to do, especially with the kids being around until at least the end of April. You could walk the dog, entertain the kids, get your exercise workout in since the gym is closed - all at the same time. It seems like a simple solution, but state, county and city parks are closing faster than a dog getting off his leash. So far, it's not banned — at least not everywhere. And keep your social distance because more restrictions can be enacted.

Walking, jogging and bicycling are encouraged. Team sports are not - no shooting hoops at the public parks.

State parks: Oregon State Parks closed all its campgrounds and day-use areas on March 23 when the Governor's executive order came out. The park closures include parking areas, restrooms, picnic areas, trails, viewpoints and all other facilities. This closure will last at least until May 8. They will decide before then whether it's time to re-open.

The park service recommends: "Go out if it's important. Take a walk around your neighborhood where it's easier to avoid clumping up, if that's what you need. Please do not travel to any popular recreation hotspot. You might think, 'Well, if everyone else stays home, that means I can go.' This works only if we all do our part."

Beaches: What about beaches? The state parks' decision doesn't currently affect the ocean shore,

grounds have been ordered to close down but it does not extend to RV parks or other housing.

City parks: Brown's executive order closes all pools, skate parks, outdoor sports courts and playground equipment areas. Public recreational areas require signs posted at all entrances and exits and in prominent areas that state social distancing is required. Restrooms must have trash cans and soap and water or hand sanitizer. That said, Gold Beach's Buffington Park is completely closed, including trails and disc golf, not just the tennis courts and playground equipment.

Brookings has closed the skate park, all playgrounds, sporting facilities. and park public restrooms. Azalea Park KidTown and ballfields, Easy Manor Park, the Skate Park, Bud Cross sports fields, basketball and tennis courts and Chetco Point Park will be among those closed. Barricades block access to the parking areas and restroom facilities will be closed. But in a Facebook live-stream on March 24, Brookings Mayor Jake Pieper clarified the park rules despite barriers up across parking lot entrances. "Azalea Park itself isn't actually closed," he said. "Go ahead and walk your dog. Don't be afraid to use our parks."

Campgrounds: All private and public campgrounds were closed immediately by the governor's order, but the closure does not extend to RV parks and other housing. "Riverside RV Resort on the North Bank Chetco River Road is closed to everyone except our fulltime, monthly tenants who are sheltering in place," said Debbie Newsome. "We made the decision to close the resort just before the Governor's order came that she tried to implement rules that would apply across the state. However, people are misinterpreting the new rules.

Essential workers: A visiting nurse called The Pilot because the RV park where she's staying is forcing her to move - even though she's a healthcare worker and the RV park is considered housing that is exempt from camping closures. The RV park may want to rethink that decision.

Most truckers who deliver to our remote area need to stay overnight somewhere. Truck drivers need lodging and meals, so if we ever want to see toilet paper again, we are pretty sure businesses will accommodate them.

Hanging out: Many people still think it's OK to go hang out with friends. It's not, because nonessential social and recreational gatherings outside of a home or residence are prohibited, regardless of group size if a distance of at least 6 feet can't be maintained. The consequenc-

es: Failure to comply with Brown's order is considered an immediate danger to the public health and subject to a Class C misdemeanor, which is punishable by up to 30 days in jail, a fine of up the \$1,250, or both. "All Oregon law enforcement are united on the premise that police action is extremely undesirable and we hope to educate Oregonians if congregating in violation of the Governor's Order," Says a post by Oregon State Police on Facebook. "Citation or arrest would be an extreme last resort if a person failed to comply with the lawful direction of a police officer." If you see a violation, law enforcement agencies are asking the public not to call 911, and either selfeducate the public or dial the non-emergency number for police.

Oregon requests federal government open up HealthCare.gov

Governor Kate Brown on Tuesday, March 24, to ensure all Oregonians have access to the health insurance they need during this unprecedented public health crisis, called on federal Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar to open a special enrollment period for Oregonians to buy health insurance and apply for federal subsidies through HealthCare.gov.

The open enrollment deadline passed on Dec. 15 and does not open again until November.

"Many Oregonians are uninsured or underinsured and now find their families' budgets significantly tightened due to this national emergency," Brown said in

a letter to Azar. "In order to run by the federal governremove any potential barriers that remain, it is critical for all Oregonians to have access to a special enrollment period.'

A widespread special enrollment period would allow anyone legally present in the United States to buy a private plan and apply for a subsidy to help afford it. The governor requested that the enrollment period open as soon as possible and last at least 30 days.

Oregon needs Azar to allow the special enrollment period via HealthCare.gov because the application consumers need for federal subsidies, and Oregon's online system for selection of plans available through HealthCare.gov is

ment. HealthCare.gov sells individual health insurance plans to Oregonians under an agreement with the state and in partnership with the Oregon Health Insurance Marketplace, a division of the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services.

"The Marketplace is our state's pathway to coverage and federal subsidies," said Chiqui Flowers, administrator of the Oregon Health Insurance Marketplace. "Until the federal government unblocks the gate to those options for all Oregonians, the only people who can enroll now are those who just lost other coverage or had another major qualifying event."

The governor's letter to Azar emphasized the importance of meeting the needs of income-strapped families during a national crisis.

"Your administration has stressed the value of allowing Americans to make their own coverage choices. During open enrollment last fall, a moderate-income adult might have made a rational decision to skip coverage or buy one of the extremely limited, short-term plans

now available under federal rules that currently are not required to cover testing for the novel coronavirus and waive cost-sharing for COVID-19 treatment, Governor Brown wrote. "A national emergency has changed conditions vastly, and those Oregonians deserve a chance to get the coverage they need.

Community kitchens adjust to coronavirus

Staff Report

It was business as usual for St. Timothy's Episcopal Church community kitchen on Tuesday, March 17, despite concerns over the coronavirus.

"I'm always going to make sure we have a hot meal. Sit-down as long as Father Bernie says," said cook Victoria Valdez

The only noticeable difference was what wasn't on the tables and counters - condiments - and all of the food was served by the volunteers like at a cafeteria instead of the usual buffet-style.

"If somebody wants it to go, we can give them a plate to go," said Valdez.

Lunch is served out of the kitchen each Tuesday to anyone that shows up. Homeless are the majority of the lunchroom's patrons.

"It doesn't matter who comes in," said Valdez.

Between 60 and 70 people show up at the church at 70 Fir St. each Tuesday. Lunch is served at noon but the dining room opens at about 11:30 a.m.

A shower is available upstairs for people to use Monday, Wednesday or Friday mornings and vouchers are available for doing laundry. Hot oatmeal and cereal are served upstairs Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings as well.

'Father Bernie wants to make sure everyone is healthy and safe and their stomach is full," Valdez said. "It doesn't matter who you are, where you came from, what your background is, as long as you get fed."

St. Timothy's continues to provide its services, but nearly all of the other churches and groups have canceled their community kitchen programs for now.

Brookings Presbyterian Church on Pacific Avenue in Brookings is providing brown bag lunches outside for people to pick up, but "we're still feeding them," said a spokesperson.

Seventh-Day Adventist Church is providing a sack lunch from noon to 1 p.m. on the second and fourth Monday of each

Oregon announces extension of tax filing

At the direction of Gov. Kate Brown, the Oregon Department of Revenue on Wednesday, March 25, announced an extension for Oregon tax filing and payment deadlines for personal income taxes and some other taxes closely following the IRS extension declaration.

This move is a result of the governor's priority to keep Oregonians safe and healthy, while also providing relief and consistency for Oregon taxpayers affected by the federal and state COVID-19 emergency.

"The governor's clearly stated goal is for Oregon families to stay home, save lives," said Oregon Department of Revenue Director Nia Ray. "After consultation with the state treasurer and state budget officials, the Department of Revenue will extend personal and corporate income tax deadlines during this challenging period."

Under the authority of ORS 305.157, the director of the Department of Revenue has determined that the governor's state-declared emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the action of the IRS will impair the ability of Oregon taxpayers to take certain actions within the time prescribed by law. Therefore, the director has ordered an automatic extension of the 2019 tax year filing and payment due dates for certain affected taxpayers as indicated below.

For personal income taxpayers:

• The Oregon return filing due date for tax year 2019 is automatically extended from April 15, 2020 to July 15,2020.

• The Oregon tax payment deadline for payments due with the 2019 tax year return is automatically extended to July 15, 2020.

• Estimated tax payments for tax year 2020 are not extended.

• The tax year 2019 six-month extension to file, if requested, continues to extend only the filing deadline until Oct. 15, 2020.

 Taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call us to qualify for this automatic Oregon tax filing and payment extension.

• If you have questions about your personal income tax, contact questions.dor@oregon.gov.

For corporate income/excise taxpayers:

 The Oregon return filing due date for tax year 2019 is automatically extended from May 15, 2020 until July 15, 2020. Returns due after May 15,

· Taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call us to qualify for this automatic Oregon tax filing and payment extension.

Interest and penalties:

• Because of the extension of the due dates for filing returns and making payments, any interest and penalties with respect to Oregon tax filings and payments extended by this order begin accruing on July 16, 2020.

 No automatic extension is provided in this order for the payment or deposit of any other type of Oregon tax or for the filing of Oregon information returns.

Taxpayers can find resources such as forms and publications, information regarding filing as an individual or business, and helpful tools, such as Where's My Refund and What's My Kicker, on the Department of Revenue webpage. You can also keep up to date with the latest developments and news surrounding impacts of COVID-19 to your taxes at www. oregon.gov/dor/.
