Commissioner Boice calls for declaring housing emergency

"The number-one issue in Curry County, and the need for 'all hands on deck,' is the shortage of affordable and workforce housing," Curry County Commissioner Court Boice told The Pilot as he prepared to present a resolution for an emergency housing declaration during the Curry County Board of Commissioners' weekly business meeting

The meeting is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. at 94035 Moore St. in Gold Beach.

The resolution notes that Curry County has the fifth-highest homeless rate in Oregon. For every 1,000 people in Curry County, 7.1 of them are homeless.

When it comes to children, the situation is worse. Only two counties have a higher rate than Curry, which has 86.1 students who are homeless per 1,000 enrolled students.

Rates of student homelessness are elevated in coastal and rural counties, according to a March 2019 report titled "Homelessness in Oregon" and prepared for The Oregon Community Foundation.

Homelessness also disproportionately affects veterans, according to the same report. "In 2017, Oregon veterans accounted for 7.5 percent of the total state population but accounted for 9 percent of the homeless population," the report

By contrast, in Curry County, 15.4 percent of the total population (22,364) are veterans, with nearly 13 percent (2,891) falling below federal poverty guidelines, according to the Boice's draft resolution.

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation says 17 percent of the residences in Curry County have

"severe housing problems," defined as overcrowding, high housing costs, or lack of kitchen or plumbing facilities.

"Curry County is in transition and has been slowly moving along the current trajectory for more than three decades. The economic and demographic inputs that initiated and continue to enable this transition have been relatively constant

Former school superintendent, school board members are sued

he former vice principal at Brook-a \$750,000 lawsuit against former district Superintendent Sean Gallagher and five Brookings-Harbor School Board members.

In court documents, Mark Hebert alleges that Gallagher and school board members Katherine Johnson, Bruce Raleigh, Alan Nidiffer, Jay Trost and Sue Gold violated his civil rights by unlawfully forcing him to resign March 14.

Hebert had been vice principal at the high school since July 2018.

The lawsuit, filed July 29 in U.S. District Court in Medford, said Raleigh, Nidiffer, Johnson, Trost and Gold, individually or collectively, advised Gallagher that the board did not intend to renew his contract for the 2019-20 school year, and that Gallagher was to get Hebert's resignation - without formal notification or non-renewal, and without hav-

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Curry Health to get \$2 million for **Brookings Emergency Department**

Curry Health Network CEO Ginny Williams and its board of directors have learned the organization will be receiving \$2 million from the State of Oregon to open an emergency department at the Curry Medical Center, the network's clinic in Brookings.

Brookings is the largest rural community in the state without a hospital, said Wil-

She added that Oregon legislators and Gov. Kate Brown were aware a local emergency department could improve patient outcomes, save lives, and bolster local and state economies.

Curry Health Network has invested more than \$1.75 million in past years to prepare the facility to provide emergency medical care, Williams said.

"There are so many people and organizations that were instrumental in the passing of HB 5050, for which we are profoundly grateful," she said. "Rep. David Brock Smith and Sen. Dallas Heard led the effort, and Curry County Commissioners Court Boice and

Chris Paasch were also key." In addition to Smith. Heard, Boice and Paasch, Williams thanked the cities of Brookings and Gold Beach, Cal-Ore, Advanced-Health, AllCare, Curry Community Health, Coos-Curry-Douglas Develop-

ment Corp., Coquille Valley

Hospital, Southern Coos

Hospital and Health Center, Curry Public Library, Southwestern Oregon Community College, Waterfall Community Health Center, Southwestern Oregon Workforce Investment Board, Curry General Hospital Auxiliary, Curry Health Foundation, Pac/West, and numerous other organizations, busi-

nesses and individuals.

Williams said, "We expect to learn specific details from the state about spending requirements within the next one to two weeks, and are currently working to finalize a revised budget to include the state funding and emergency care services at Curry Medical Center."

Fireman's breakfast 'a success'

"Come to our breakfast; we'll come to your fire," advertised a flyer for the Gold Beach Fireman's Breakfast, held Aug. 10-11 at Buffington Park in Gold Beach.

The firemen have been holding their annual fundraiser for 63 years.

"I still look forward to this," said Gold Beach Fire Chief Tyson Krieger, "it's a good chance for everybody to meet up with the public. And we get to make a little extra money so we can buy few extra tools."

Last year, the volunteer fire department used the funds to add extra gear to its new rig, a service/rescue vehicle.

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Tax bases fund the department's regular operating costs.

The total amount raised at the 2019 breakfast was not available at press time. The expectation had been for serving 1,100 to 1,200 people over the two days, at \$7 for pancakes plus scrambled eggs, ham and a breakfast drink.

Children could have their pictures taken in front of the fire trucks and rescue vehicle, and talk to firefighters.

The Gold Beach Volunteer Fire Department serves the greater Gold Beach area with fire-protection services. Its service area includes the Gold Beach/Wedderburn RFPD.

"Last year was the most calls we've ever gone to, with 222 calls," said Krieger. Compared to five years ago, the average was 135 calls per year.

"It's about 85 percent medical calls," former Gold Beach Fire Chief Bruce Florence said.

'Structure fires are only about 1.5% to 2.5% of our calls," said Krieger. "Last year, they had four struc-

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ture calls in January, but none for the remainder of the year. Behind medical calls, are car wrecks and wildland fires," he said.

"The department has 32 firefighters right now. The average age is about 30, whereas in other areas it's 50 to 55 years old. It's a good problem to have," Krieger said.

Despite the younger average age, their combined firefighting experience is several hundred years.

The department currently runs three Type 3 units, plus a rescue vehicle and a water tender (tanker). By fall, it will have another Type 3 truck.

A Type 3 fire engine is designed for mountainous or rural communities. Typical equipment includes a pump that operates at 120 gpm, a 500-gallon tank, 1,000 feet of 1.5-inch hose, 800 feet of one-inch hose, and a minimum of four firefighters.

Public Works Director Tony Baron said that 20 yards of concrete went into the new patio, which replaced an older one that had enhanced the former event center.

The previous structure was an event tent that had been damaged in a windstorm nearly two years ago. It was replaced with the current 48by 72-foot metal structure.

The more permanent structure has allowed the venue to host more weddings and tournament events through a longer season than the previous tent structure could accommodate, said City of Brookings officials.

Food Bank gets \$16,300

The Brookings Harbor Food Bank's "Independence from Hunger" fundraiser partnering with the local Grocery Outlet has brought in \$11,514.

"The food drive is a corporate-wide promotion that initiated with the marketing team," Lori Panter said.

Panter is co-owner of the Brookings Grocery Outlet with her husband Hal.

'The fundraising drive brings attention to the food bank in the summer when food banks run low on food," Lori said. "We've been doing this fundraising drive for about eight years."

To spur the success of the drive, Lori and her husband offer incentives to donate for customers. Customers who donated \$5 or more received a \$5 coupon for use the following week in the store. The store also offered the traditional round-up option for customers not making a larger donation.

"Between those two incentives is the way they raised more than \$11,000 this year," Lori said.

The Panters also offer incentives to inspire employees to actively promote the drive. Cashiers compete for having the most donations at their registers. The incentives offered to employees are paid time off and other cash prizes.

This year the top winners for getting donations were: First Place, Lisa Wyland; Second Place, Marsha Stem and Third Place, Noemy Alfaro. Wyland and Alfaro also were top winners last year.

The monies from the fundraiser that recently wrapped up will help the food bank provide food to its clients every day, **Brookings Harbor Food Bank** Executive Director Pamela Winebarger said.

"One of our biggest challenges at the food bank is having plenty of food on our shelves to give to people in need," she said.

By the numbers According to Winebarger, in 2018, the Brookings Harbor Food Bank served 4,291 families will food boxes, and served 11,253 clients with a daily

counter service. The food bank's snack pack program provided over 8,000 children under 18 with a snack pack in 2018, and served over 30,000 men, women and children.

"In 2019, we helped over 2,300 families receive monthly food boxes; 5,957 clients receive our daily counter service; and over 5,000 children receive snack packs, and we are only halfway through the year," she

Another partner in the community, Wendy Capitano, recently held a fundraiser at Khun Thai restaurant in support of the food bank. The total raised was \$500. In April,

"The food bank would not operate without all our generous donors in this community," Winebarger said. "Another

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
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Consumers alerted about phone scams

you hear me?'

Weeks said he thought he was being recorded during the call and were he to answer, "Yes," that reply could then be used to approve whatever was being pitched via the robocall.

Weeks said he hung up once he determined it was a suspi-

"Dorado is not what most would call an everyday fish here in Brookings," Cohen said. He estimated it weighed in at 40 to 50 pounds, and the other dorado at 30 pounds. It took about 15 minutes to land each of them.

"Dorado are not usually that close to shore," he said. Cohen recalled them being 40 miles out in previous years.

The often-golden-colored fish are

found in offshore temperate, tropical and subtropical waters worldwide, according to online sources. Described as one of the world's most popular gamefish, they often are found with

The two men were trolling Zuker lures at 8 to 9 knots. Cohen said they used two "meat lines" with bungees trolling 30 feet behind the boat, then four rods, with the first two at 80 feet out and the next two at 120 feet.

The lures are trolled on top of the water using 50- to 60-pound monofilament line.


"We ended the day with 37 nice

tuna and two big, old dorado," Cohen said. "We can a great deal of the tuna for ourselves and as gifts, but we also like to barbecue it."

He said they began canning their own tuna about 10 years ago, and haven't eaten commercial tuna in cans

The two fishermen maintain RV spaces in Brookings year-round.

In other fishing news, Cohen said he heard someone had caught an 8-foot marlin that same day. Mark from the Chetco Outdoor Store in Brookings confirmed the rumor.

and incremental. The consequences, however, have been significant and have decidedly skewed the county's housing market." So says a 60-page document published in 2018 and titled "Curry County, OR Housing Action Plan."

"The demographic shift is rooted in the proportion of in-migration by retirees from other areas.

"As expected, the housing market has responded to this demographic shift with increased production of higherpriced homes to address these new in-migrants, who often arrive with significantly higher household incomes than are the norm for the county," the Housing Action Plan said.

The problem for local workers and people on a fixed income is that the area's percapita income is not enough to afford the current cost of a rental or mortgage, to where a "single person would spend

gage," according to Boice's draft resolution.

In other words, most people in the workforce here can't meet income requirements for a mortgage, nor even afford a rental.

"Housing insecurity' is affecting our middle class, our seniors and sadly creating a larger homeless class. If we don't act wisely and decisively, it will negatively impact the quality of life of every Curry County citizen," Boice said.

The draft resolution resolves that "monies be directed to ensuring an adequate number of housing units are created and made available to house all residents, with a particular focus on our children and families, and Veterans."

requests that "Governor Kate Brown declare a 24-month State of Emergency and consider Curry County an 'emergency area' as provided in ORS 401.165, and provide assistance to help with the availability, adequacy, and affordability" of housing in the county.

rules per ORS.401.168(2), which prevent housing options in the unincorporated areas of Curry County."

"I see the continual division between rural and urban - lots of talk around the state, but little action to bring country and metropolitan together - too restrictive on the regulatory part of 'land-use planning," said Boice.

'We simply do not have the votes in the Legislature for even the slightest bit of adjustments, and it is very tough on almost all rural areas.

"The Governor won't likely do much with the declaration," added Boice, "but our efforts will bring good attention to the stress we're dealing with, and in the overall big picture we'll get

"The Department of Land Conservation and Development is just one category where there has to be some common-sense relief," he said.

The most-recent effort to develop affordable housing began with League of Women Voters townhalls covering homeless resources and housing. Boice said he attended all three townhalls and made a commitment to generate affordable housing for Curry County.

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Local schools: 'Working on absenteeism'

With the new school year beginning in September, school officials in Crescent City, Brookings and Gold Beach said they'll be closely monitoring student absenteeism rates and developing solutions to lower those rates.

> **Central Curry School District 1**

According to Central Curry School District 1 Supt. Tim Wilson, the absenteeism rate in Oregon is defined as the percentage of students who attend at least 90% of the scheduled school days.

Wilson said each year's rates for school years 2015-2018 at Riley Creek Elementary School were 78%, 79%

The rates at Gold Beach High School for those same school years were 85%, 81% and 65%.

'The elementary rate continues to climb with proactive promotion of the importance of attending school regularly, and targeted student/family interventions by school staff," Wilson said.

"Last year's drop at the high school is of major concern and is currently being studied in preparation for the new school

Wilson said that at the elementary level, the challenge begins as the school sets the tone and importance for regular attendance. "If that culture is set in the early years of school, then it becomes the expectation for all parties," he

"If those patterns are not established in the early years, it certainly has an impact on older students, who are more independent."

Wilson added that in addition to employing a marketing campaign promoting regular attendance, the district has received grant funds to hire an attendance advocate who will work with families and schools to encourage atten-

> **Brookings-Harbor School District**

The Brookings-Harbor School District includes Brookings-Harbor High School, Azalea Middle School and Kalmiopsis Elementary

The Oregon Department of Education's State Report Card lists the Brookings-Harbor

School District's three-year average absenteeism rate as 72.9% for K-5, 79.4% for grades 6-8, and 74.7% for grades 9-12.

"Our district's rate of students who miss school remains too high," said the district's public information officer, Nancy Raskauskas-Coons. "In all three schools, at least a quarter of all students met the criteria for chronic absenteeism, meaning they missed more than 10% of school time for excused or unexcused absences or travel."

Raskauskas-Coons said there are a variety of factors that pose a challenge to regular school attendance for Oregon families, including economic barriers, health issues, transportation problems, cultural differences, bullying, or the belief that missing

a little school will not have negative consequences for a student academically.

"Our region of 10 school districts has received funding and support to improve attendance, as all of our districts struggle with these issues," she said.

"Acting Supt. Dawn Granger is also the regional capacity builder for our area through the South Coast Education Service District, and will be working with Brookings-Harbor School District this year with targeted and strategic support to improve attendance at every school."

cious call.

Another call Weeks said he received began with a recording stating, "The Department of Social Security" has suspended the Social Security number because of a problem.

"The real federal agency is not called the Department of Social Security, it's the Social Security Administration," Weeks said. "So, I wanted to see where it was going and I finally just hung up.'

Weeks was so frustrated with the continuing suspicious calls that he alerted The Pilot's news team. We immediately contacted the Oregon Justice Department's Consumer Affairs Division in Salem, which acknowledged that the scam calls are increasing and the fraud callers are more aggressive.

'Unfortunately, we do get many complaints about robocalls and other threatening scam calls," Oregon Justice Department spokesperson Krisina Edmunson said. "These calls are very difficult to track, because

the callers are often overseas.

When we can, we will work with the FBI or the Federal Trade Commission to shut them down."

Edmunson said the callers often impersonate a member of law enforcement. Or a government agency, such as the IRS or the Department of Revenue, or in Weeks's case, the Social Security Administration.

"The callers can be very

threatening," she said. Sheriff's departments around the state report citizen complaints about scam callers masquerading as law-enforcement agents. Officials said the callers tell people they have a warrant for their arrest and so to avoid jail, they must pay hundreds, sometimes thousands, of dol-

Other law-enforcement agencies report continuing complaints from citizens who say they've received calls from scammers claiming to be a friend of a family member who is in a foreign county, and that money is needed immediately to get the relative out of jail.

Utility companies, such as Pacific Power, have issued various fraud alerts over the past two years following

citizens' complaints about calls threatening service cutoffs unless there's an immediate fee payment.

This summer, a Columbia County youth sports nonprofit issued an alert about an out-ofstate company sending fraudulent invoices to businesses until a bank manager noted a sudden increase in commuter fraud reports by customers.

'We are probably seeing one case a week of a customer that has been coerced through a story or a situation into letting somebody access their computer to help or assist them," Umpqua Bank's Monica Hastings said. "The scammers operate on a sense of urgency."

According to Hastings, in one case a woman was told through a pop-up screen that her computer had been hacked and that to get it fixed, she needed to pay \$2,000.

Edmunson said the scammers many times target senior citizens. "Older adults are often home, have access to a retirement account and are easier targets," she said. "We encourage all family members, friends and neighbors to be on the look-out for your older neighbors and family members.

"The scammers will get creative and will gain access to your personal information through social media, so they may call you out of the blue and seem like they are your friend. They are not.'

The specific number of fraud-call victims is hard to determine, said Edmunson, because often the victims won't file a report. "Unfortunately, when older adults fall victim to a scam, they are often embarrassed and may try to hide it from their family or friends,"

Edmunson added there are ways to protect yourself from the scams. Her advice:

she said.

• The IRS or local police will never call you to demand a payment for a warrant or unpaid taxes. If they need to contact you, they will send you a letter.

• If a scammer is offering you something out of the blue, or asking you to keep something secret, it's most likely a scam. Hang up the phone.

• Use your caller ID to screen calls. It's okay to send phone calls to voicemail.

• If you get a scammer on the phone, do not engage with them. We've had reports of people yelling at them, or engaging in conversation. This just tips the scammer off that this is an active phone number and you are real person. Hang up the phone, or don't answer

• Never wire money, or buy a pre-paid gift card! This is almost always a tip off that

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something is a scam. A gift card or wire transfer cannot be refunded. Once it leaves your bank account, it's gone.

ing the matter come before the Brookings-Harbor School Board.

Hebert said in the lawsuit that Gallagher met with him March 14 and said the school board "wanted him out and he needed to resign or his career would be seriously jeopardized."

Hebert said he was "shocked" by Gallagher's statement, since neither the School Board nor Gallagher had spoken with him about performance issues or even had a professional conversation with him about his employment.

Hebert said in the lawsuit that he resigned as directed, based on threats communicated by Gallagher.

Hebert is alleging he has suffered lost income and other benefits. Hebert said he also has suffered personal and emotional distress, and damage to his professional reputation.

Salem attorney Loren Collins is representing Hebert and said the lawsuit seeks \$250,000 in in economic damages and \$500,000 in non-economic damages.

"The next step will be that we will ask

the defendants to waive formal service of process," Collins said. "After service of the summons and complaint or waiver of service, the defendants will file an answer to the complaint. Then, both sides will exchange initial disclosures of documents"

The Pilot's repeated requests to the attorney representing the Brookings-Harbor School District for responses to specific questions concerning the lawsuit have gone unanswered,

Bravaro grins: "Yeah, we have lots of girls signed up to play, and that's great!"

Bravaro said the nationwide NFL flag camps benefit not only the kids, who are out having fun and getting some exercise, but the local game of football overall.

Bravaro and his fellow coaches are able to help the young players learn some of the fundamentals of amateur football. "Ultimately," he said, "some of them will grow up to play football on area high school football teams, and the knowledge

learned here goes a long way to preparing them for that."

Today, there are four teams from four age groups scrimmaging down on the field. The teams are from Gold Beach and Brookings, with kids from Del Norte County mixed in on the Brookings teams, said Bravaro. Two-thirds of the participants are from Brook-

"The teams typically get to play six games a year and some of them are double-

headers" Bravaro said. In flag football, no helmets or pads are worn, no blocking or tackling is allowed. The offense is primarily catching and running the ball in the open field.

The goal of the opposing defense is to pull the brightyellow flag from the ball carrier's belt to represent tackling the runner.

The emphasis, Bravado said, is on "safety and fun!"

During the camp, practices are hold on Mondays and Wednesdays for about an hour, with game days on Tuesdays. The summer season wrapped up a few

days ago. Bravaro said several local high school students mentored the young players by helping as assistant coaches and referees, as part of their senior projects at Brookings-Harbor High School.

As one of the sessions winds down, two mothers, Maria and Kendall, watch their children from the grassy edges of the field,

enjoying the sun and each other's company. What do they think of the NFL flag program?

"I think it's great! " said Maria, nudging her friend. " It gets them off of the couch, away from the video games, and out having fun." Kendall nods in agreement.

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'I ESCAPED HUMAN TRAFFICKING': **B**ROOKINGS MAN SHARES HIS STORY

This is the first of a twopart series. The Brookings man who is sharing his story asked The Pilot to hide his identity and identify him only as "M."

Randy Robbins For The Pilot

Oregon has one of the highest per-capita ratios of illegal human trafficking for labor or sex in America, especially in the Portland metropolitan area, according to a report released by the Oregon Department of Justice.

Sitting in a Brookings restaurant across the table from me is a local resident we'll refer to as "M," to protect his privacy. He also asked that no pictures be taken of his face.

Sitting with "M" is Oasis Shelter Home advocate Mellanie Caldera, who has been helping him transition back to freedom after he eluded his captors. On speaker phone is an interpreter; "M" originally is from Thailand and doesn't speak English.

The man in front of me is tentative about sharing his story with the press. It is a painful look back into a chapter of his life he'd just as soon forget, but he knows that others are now caught in the same web of bondage that once held him and so "for them," he says, he wants to speak out, hoping doing so might possibly contribute to their freedom.

Leaving Thailand

His story begins in his home town of Lampang. It's a mountainous Thai village where he helped his family tend their rice farm. A good student and quick learner, "M" attended local schools and after the 10th grade, moved away from his parents' home to get a better education.

By the time he completed the 12th grade, he had become fascinated with cooking and enrolled in a culinary school to become a Thai master chef.

After returning to his home, his skill in the culinary arts

quickly advanced him to the head chef position at a local hotel.

At about the same time, he met the girl who would eventually become his wife. The young couple began making plans for their wedding.

Somehow, word of "M" and his culinary abilities reached the far shores of the U.S. and Oregon.

"M" picks up the story, his interpreter pausing here and there to listen to his native Thai and repeat it back to us in English.

'A man I didn't know contacted me and explained he had heard of me, that I was famous, and he wanted me to go to work for him at a restaurant in the U.S.A.'

He says the man asked if "M" would meet him at a certain hotel, where the man would outline his proposal. The man added that the job "would be very, very lucrative, much more money than I was making in Thailand."

The man's proposition intrigued the young chef. He talked it over with his fiance and his parents, both of whom voiced reservations about "M" leaving Thailand to work in a faraway country.

"I assured them it would be okay," "M" told me through his interpreter. "I told my fiance that we could make a lot of money in a short amount of time, and when I got back we would be set for our future.

"And after all, it was the United States. Surely I would be safe there!"

With his family's reluctant agreement, "M" arrived at the hotel, where he was informed by his contact that the restaurant where he was to work was in Lake Oswego.

And, he was told, the pay would start at \$2,000 in U.S. dollars a month, which "M" said is about four times what he could make in Thailand.

Not only that, the man, who struck "M" as congenial and sincere, sweetened the deal by promising "M" he would have a free, upscale room and free

meals. The man told "M" he would be working six days a week but could do "whatever I wanted to do on my day off."

So valuable an employee would "M" be, the man said, that "he was even going to gather all of the required paperwork - visa, Social Security card and passport - together. And because I was such a great chef, he would fly me to Oregon free, and someday back to Thailand free as well.

"M" said yes. Arrangements were made, papers delivered, tickets purchased. Upon his arrival in the U.S., "M" was greeted at the airport by "what I thought was a very nice woman" who

Arriving at a pleasant hotel for his first night's stay in Oregon, "M" thought everything was on track for his new career. "I was so excited," he

The following day, the woman explained that "M" would be relocated to a private residence where he would have his own room, until the owner of the restaurant could arrange for permanent hous-

Shortly after arriving at his temporary quarters, said "M," the woman's demeanor changed significantly. No longer smiling, she pointed to a stark room with only a sleeping bag crumpled in the corner, and declared, "This is your room."

"There was no bed, no furniture, nothing," he said. "I thought it was odd, but figured they didn't have time to furnish it. So, I took the sleeping bag they provided and went to

Early the next morning, "M" was roused by shouting and someone pulling on his shoulder. "Get up! Get going!" he was told. "You have work

A bewildered, jet-lagged "M" was pulled to his feet and shoved towards the restaurant kitchen where he would work. And work. And work.

He would be joined by two others who shared his circumstances. The trio would work the kitchen from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., with no rest periods and only a few quick bites of food ... and then, only on the rare occasion when the restaurant's pace of business slowed.

Rather than serving as a Thai chef, "M" had been relegated to chopping vegetables and meats, busing tables, cleaning up the trash.

He said the restaurant's owner would appear at a moment's notice "screaming insults and obscenities at us. "M" said the man was "very mean, not only to us, but to his wife as well, often hurling plates against the walls of the kitchen, then ordering us to pick up the shattered shards off the floor."

As for the wage paid to "M." the traffickers' first installment was but half of what he had been promised. Then, his subsequent pay was docked to "reimburse them" for the airfare, his meals, his lodging, and the costs of getting his documents.

Ultimately, "M" said, the traffickers simply worked him all hours of the day and night, taking all of his pay for themselves.

He and his two co-workers were in Oregon as slave labor.

So the three plotted their escape - only to find their handlers always a step ahead.

The restaurant owner told "M" and his co-workers that their visas, passports and Social Security cards had been destroyed. If they tried to escape, "I will report you to the police, and you will be arrested and thrown in prison for being illegal aliens!

Garden Plots

Chip Bubl For The Pilot

Beets and chard clobbered by leaf miners

Every year, insects surprise us. Sometimes, it's by their absence. So far, there have been few stink bugs and yellowjackets.

But this summer, chard, spinach and beet greens were attacked by an explosion of the beet/spinach/chard leaf miner. Why so many this year? We really don't know, but the general consensus is that the mild winter may have played a role in getting them off to an early start.

Leaf mining starts with small gray-to-black flies with yellow stripes. You probably will never see them. The adult flies mate and the female deposits her three or four hexagonal eggs on the undersides of nice leaves. Sometimes, she sucks sugar from the leaf herself.

Eggs hatch in three to 10 days, and the little legless maggots burrow into the leaf and then proceed to mine out all the juicy bits between the upper and lower leaf surface.

What they leave, besides some frass (aka poop), are sizeable papery leaf epidermis blotches. These blotches can get quite large when several maggots sometimes join in a feeding frenzy.

From a farmer's standpoint, leaf miner-damaged leaves are unsaleable and can represent quite a loss. (An intrepid home gardener will eat the undamaged portions of the leaf with no concerns.)

On sugar beets, the maggots reduce the amount of sugar produced.

After feeding, the maggots pupate. Sometimes they stay within the leaf, comforted by its protection. But generally, they drop to the ground and seek out a 2-inch or so crack in the soil to hide them while they undergo their conversion to a fly. That takes 10 to 25 days.

There can be three to four generations per summer. The last set of maggots winters over in the soil and emerges in late April to early May. Usually, damage is worse on your

first crop, since they are often attacked just when they are really starting to grow.

So what can a gardener do? Since the maggots often overwinter in the soil below their feeding site, rotate spinach, beets and chard each vear. Protecting the crop with row covers from start to finish works great IF you rotate your plots. Otherwise, you trap the soil-emerging flies inside the

Insecticides don't really work for home gardeners, since the proper timing is hard to determine. Other methods that may help include squishing the tiny maggots in small blotches when you first see them. Alternatively, remove and destroy large, infested leaves.

Sometimes, tiny beneficial wasps will attack the maggots, but they are fairly protected inside the leaf. I have seen yellowjackets trying to get to active leaf-feeding maggots to eat them.

She said Wild Rivers Land Trust provided extensive documentation and underwent a third-party evaluation. The Land Trust Accreditation Commission then awarded accreditation, signifying its confidence that Wild Rivers Land Trust's lands will be protected forever.

In May 2018, Wild Rivers Land Trust expanded its service area to include the Coos and Tenmile Lakes watersheds in Coos and southern Douglas counties. This increased the Land Trust's services from 1.7 million acres to 2.2 million acres, extending from the northern Tenmile Lakes watershed down to the California border.

There are 12 river basins in this area, four of which are nationally-designated Wild and Scenic rivers (the Elk, Rogue, Illinois and Chetco).

Recently, Wild Rivers completed a 160-acre conservation easement in Signal Buttes above the Rogue River in Gold Beach. The conserved land contains forests, prairies and meadows, as well as tributaries feeding into the lower Rogue River and Hunter Creek watersheds.

The protected area will contribute to a larger conservation landscape that contains the proposed Veva Stansell Botanical Reserve plus two Hunter Creek BLM Areas of Critical Environmental Concern.

To date, Wild Rivers Land Trust has protected more than 860 acres of forest and critical habitat on Oregon's southern







Even if you leave your pet inside a locked, running car with the air conditioning on, that's still not acceptable. Your pet will be very anxious without you present, and anything might happen while you're away.

If you want to take your pet with you, make sure the places you go will welcome pets inside. (Your pet

should be well-trained and responsive to your commands, and not aggressive to other dogs.) Or, have a friend come along and sit in the running car with your dog or walk them in a nearby grassy area or park while you shop.

Otherwise, leave pets at home. The risk is not worth it.
