"Without a navigable channel, we are going to lose our fishing, we are going to lose our recreation, we are going to lose our tourism, and the economic fallout from that will be huge," declared Curry County Commissioner Chris Paasch.

Paasch's warning came during a discussion of issues affecting the Rogue River at the Aug. 7 Curry County Board of Commissioners meeting in Gold Beach.

"The (Rogue) has received an inordinate amount of rock coming down it the last several years." Paasch said. "We've started to look into how we can make changes to that and how we can correct it."

Paasch said he contacted U.S. Rep. Peter DeFazio's office several times to prompt the congressman to speak with the Department of Transportation, instead of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, to free up the permitting process for dredging.

"I'm afraid for the public," Paasch said during a subsequent phone interview. "A boat could be unaware of the shoal in the (Port of Gold Beach) entrance and hit it at 20 to 30 knots, and people could suffer serious injuries. "The losses sustained ... because of the loss of recreation

and fishing are devastating to the lifeblood of this county. The revenues lost cannot be regained. This river needs some attention and we need to restore it to its former greatness.' The Corps of Engineers is in charge of keeping the Rogue

River open from the mouth to the port's business entrance, said Paasch. "The Corps of Engineers should keep the traditional channel clear up to Elephant Rock," he said.

"That would traditionally ensure that the river flows freely

2,000-POUND GENTLE GIANT

magine you're paddling your ■ kayak off-shore along the southern Oregon coast. Suddenly, you spot a giant, seldom-seen sea

creature in the water ahead. That's exactly what happened to South Coast Tours owner and guide David Lacey and his group last week during a sea kayaking tour near the Thomas Creek Bridge.

"Conditions were stellar this day and we were enjoying some of the best conditions I've seen in two years," Lacey said. "We had finished our lunch break on an actual secret beach north of the famed 'Secret Beach.'

After paddling alongside a school or two of harbor porpoise and through 10 natural rock arches, the group saw a fin in the distance. "I was very apprehensive as we approached this finned creature, as

I had this childhood horror movie rhythm in the back of my head," Lacey said.

"Turns out this sea beast was not the white shark that I first envisioned, but none other than a large ocean sunfish commonly known as a Mola mola.'

The huge, flat fish is the heaviest bony fish in the world. Adults weigh from 545 pounds up to as

Wait almost over at highest bridge in Oregon

mprovements are wrapping up along a wildly used stretch of U.S. Highway 101 that leads from Oregon into California.

The stoplight controlling one-lane traffic at Thomas Creek Bridge over Highway 101 is set to shut down any day now, according to Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) Public Information Specialist Dan Latham.

Commuters will soon enjoy a 5-minute shorter drive by using both lanes.

The stoplight was installed to regulate traffic coming from both directions. The bridge was open with just a single lane during the multiyear, multi-million-dollar construction project.

Motorists who travel the

route frequently may have noticed that workers began packing up the scaffolding and other equipment and loading it up onto trucks a few days ago.

Located 8 miles north of Brookings, the Thomas Creek Bridge, built in 1961, is Oregon's highest, at 345 feet.

Bridges along the coastal highway are particularly vulnerable to wear and tear from traffic, marine-air corrosion, and occasional earthquakes, according to ODOT.

The paint on the bridge's steel truss sections had deteriorated. The project, which began in August 2017, removed all existing paint, repaired areas where corrosion had damaged the steel, replaced damaged rivets, and repainted the 58-year-old bridge's trusses and towers.

All of work performed on the bridge was below the deck, but containment structures could be seen from the bridge's deck. Its surfaces had been rehabilitated in 2016.

"They completed work on the north tower a few weeks ago," Latham said. "They are doing some touch-up work now, and removing the scaffolding and containment.

"Everything appears to be on schedule for completion this month.'

The painting work was contracted through S&K Painting, Inc.

The Thomas Creek Bridge work cost approximately \$10 million, of an estimated \$11.7 million slated for work on both that bridge and Reinhart Bridge south of Port Orford.

Route 197 closure at midpoint

The closure of California State Route 197 north of Crescent City for work on roadway culverts has reached its midpoint.

Motorists will need to continue to use State Route 199, a short distance to the south, through Aug. 15, said state transportation officials.

Highways 197 and 199 are the primary routes between Grants Pass and U.S. Highway 101, ultimately leading to Crescent City and Brookings.

Myles Cochrane, the California Transportation public information officer for Humboldt and Del Norte counties, said Route 197 remains completely closed about 3 miles from the Highway 101 junction for the repairs to drainage systems.

He said the project was the more cost-effect

measure of two choices. "The other option we looked at, of allowing one-way traffic control

on Route 197, would have cost \$2.1 million and taken 12 weeks," he said. "A full closure of Route 197 only had a duration of three weeks and a cost of about

\$613,000. Cochrane said local residents have been able to access their driveways from each endpoint of Route 197.

"We like to do culvert work during the summer months," he said. "A, it's quicker and more efficient; and B, it prepares the ditches for winter storms."

Fishing options abound on ocean



It has been a good week for sportfishermen on both sides of the California-Oregon border as the tuna have moved in about as close to shore as they ever come, lots of California halibut have been biting on the beaches, and bottomfish has remained consistent as usual.

Surf perch are also pleantiful in Northern California and Southern Oregon for anglers who prefer to keep their feet on land.

On the ocean

The tuna have moved in close out of both Crecent City and Brookings. The fish started being hauled in between 15 and 20 miles from shore early in the week, after being caught between 30 and 40 miles from shore late last week.

There have also been lots of California halibut caught throughout the week, both

on the beaches of Southern Oregon, and on South Beach in Crescent City.

Anglers fishing from the beaches are still finding lots of surf perch as well throughout the Wild Rivers Coast.

Some of the most consistent fishing in the area is always bottomfishing, and rockfish and lingcod continue to provide relatively easy limits for anglers who are targeting them.

Crescent City is still seeing its fair share of Pacific halibut throughout the week as well.

The only fish on the ocean that don't seem to be biting much at the moment are salmon. The salmon bite has been slow all season out of Crescent City. There have been some strong fishing weeks for ocean salmon out of Brookings this summer, but the catch as slowed up there as well this week with warmer water close to shore.

River fishing

With salmon fishing still slow on the ocean, an anglers best bet to nab a salmon right now is the Klamath River.

Although fishing on the Upper Klamath is still slow, the Lower Klamath River saw a bit of a surge this week. If that continues, the start of the fall salmon season should get off to a good start on Thursday.

This year the spring salmon run has been subject to unprecedented regulation due to concerns about the stock. After the season opened with a full closure, anglers have been allowed to retain a daily bag limit of one salmon per day

When the fall run officially kicks off the daily bag limit will expand to two adult salmon, and two jacks (juvenile salmon) per day and will count towards the river's quota for the season.

The only other place to fish for salmon this time of year is in the Rogue Bay, but that has reportedly slowed significantly over the last week.

Now, that warning has become a

"Instead of a full emergency department, the Roseburg VA has decided to operate a Monday through Friday urgent care clinic in its place. VA officials cited the difficulty in hiring specialized staff, such as lab technicians, who are needed to support an emergency care facility."

Bad news for local veterans. I may be wrong here, but I think the only fullservice VA hospital in the entire state of Oregon is in Portland, five hours away.

The VA clinic here in Brookings has but one physician. Dr. Matty left a few months ago for Coeur d'Alene and we had no physician for a month. I tried to get an appointment and the wait is two months, backed up because they could not find a physician.

Curry officials need to do right regarding SWOCC

Dear Editor:

On Aug. 7, the Curry County Board of Commissioners voted 3-0 in favor of further inquiry regarding the Southwestern Oregon Community College Tax District's financial circumstances, as pertains to the Curry campus.

The main reason behind this vote is that Curry County citizens pay \$2.13 million in taxes to the college district. The expenses for Curry's programs have been cut back to only \$850,000 this year.

That is, approximately \$1.3 million of Curry County's taxpayers' tax revenue was taken from Curry County for use at the Coos County campus, or for expenses otherwise not specified by the college tax district.

Curry taxpayers' portion is 38.8% of the total tax base for the college district.

The previous year, the amount was \$1 million taken from Curry tax revenues to be used other than in Curry County.

Similar numbers go back years. We get taxed, and Coos Campus grows. There isn't even a budget for marketing the Curry campus.

But hold on, that is not the only money SWOCC takes from Curry County citizens and Curry campus's programs. The SWOCC Foundation also solicits donations from Curry County.

We need to know how much of those donations are designated for use in Curry County (and if those donors' wishes and designations were honored), Or if those donations were undesignated or unrestricted and taken into the college district and

not for the benefit of Curry

Additionally, other local special districts are filling in the gaps in services because the college administration cut those services, such as G.E.D. testing.

That means the college district "partners" with the special districts, then passes off the special districts' work and programs as if they were in the SWOCC budget still.

The problem is, special districts in Curry County are now picking up the tab using their own resources, not the college's resources, to do the work the college once did. Is that "double dipping" into Curry County taxpayers' pockets?

If there was any interest in fiscal parity between the two campuses, Curry would have at least one-third of what the Coos campus has in terms of facilities, programs and services.

I would have appreciated having a better understanding of the specifics of why the California requirements result in higher construction costs, and perhaps why industry professionals might believe those requirements to be inappropriate.

much as 2,200 pounds. They're native to tropical and temperate waters worldwide.

"This one was about 7 or 8 feet across," Lacey said, "and close to 2,000 pounds. It was a giant beast. A gentle beast, too."

In 25 years of ocean life

off Curry County, Lacey said, he had yet to see a Mola mola in the nearshore.

"The Mola mola swam all around our kayaks, while it absorbed the warmth of the sun, and did not seem to be worried about our presence," he said.

The kayakers were on South Coast Tours's Arches Territory Tour, a 15-mile sea kayak paddle that begins near Pistol River and ends at Whaleshead State Park.

This particular tour is for experienced paddlers only, unless they pair up with a guide, said Lacey. Even then, they must be physically fit.

"Fifteen miles is a long time to be handling a paddle and the conditions can get rough around Crook Point National Wildlife

Refuge," Lacey said.

"Blisters are not entirely uncommon. And sea sickness can ruin an inexperienced paddler's day, and jeopardize the safety and fun of the entire group.'

As for Arches Territory, Lacey said it's not an easy place to paddle. "There are not a lot of safe landings, and the hydraulics inside these rock arches are crazy. "Inside the arches and

sea caves, the swell can more than triple as it gets compressed between the rock walls, leading to very dangerous situations." To learn more about

and the mouth stays open." Dredging work conducted at the mouth of the harbor last month has "made it worse than it was. Someone from the federal level signed off on it, but the work wasn't com-


plete," Paasch said. In a video presentation during the commissioners' meeting, Paasch showed drone footage of the Rogue River estuary area. First in the video was an overhead view of the former Mailboats property, which used to run a fleet carrying mail and tourists

The property's docks were in a channel that had been 6 to 8 feet deep. In Paasch's video, which was shot at a +1-foot tide, there was no visible channel. The pilings that moored the dock now were surrounded by sand.

Visible just downstream in Paasch's video presentation was Lex's Landing, an RV resort for fishermen on the north bank of the Rogue just upriver from the U.S. Highway 101 Patterson Bridge.

Larry Prestininzi, owner of Lex's Landing, testified that when he arrived here in 2002, the winter-time river flows would need to be at 90,000 cubic feet per second to breach the concrete at the resort's fish-cleaning stations. In 2008-09, he said, that number had dropped to 60,000 cubic feet per second.

"In the last few years since they took the dams out, a lot of this aggregate is moving down," Prestininzi said. "This has been doubling every year in about the last five or six years.



"We have the premier salmon fishing river on our western seaboard. This is the place to fish, and the salmon are our livelihood in this county. There's nowhere for these salmon to acclimate. The fishing is really slow this

year. "The water is 74 degrees in front of my place, a 20-degree difference from the ocean.'

Curry County Sheriff John Ward said the channel formerly went to the north of Elephant Island. He characterized fishing in the bay this season as "pretty slow, with a lot of moss" needing to be cleared frequently from bait rigs because the "water is so warm."

"If something isn't done in the next couple years, you won't be able to get in and out of this port at all," Ward said. "I agree and wholeheartedly support what the commis-

sion's trying to do." Paasch next showed video of the entrance to the port, reporting that one of Jerry's Jet Boats with passengers once tried to maneuver at low tide through the narrowed navigation channel and nosed into the gravel. It needed to reverse and repoint to negotiate a route out of the port.

Another portion of the video showed a large gravel bar, only slightly under water, covering nearly the entire width of the river in the area in front of The Landing restaurant and boat dock on Jerry's Flat Road. Local resident David Barnes testified that at minus tide, the shoal in front of The Landing actually became an island, leaving only two small channels on either side.

He told the commissioners that only 18 fish were caught during the Curry Anadromous Fishermen's three-day fishing derby held Aug. 2-4. "That's down about 80 percent from last year," said Jim Carey of the Rogue Outdoor Store in Gold Beach, responding to a Pilot question regarding the number of fish caught in the

"This is in the disaster category," Commissioner Court Boice said. He has been a jet boat pilot and lived on the river his entire life.

According to the commission's testimony, the Port of Brookings is having similar

problems. Wintertime debris measurements normally have shown 4,000 tons coming down the Chetco River. This year, the debris was estimated at 40,000 tons in the Chetco estuary.

"While we are doing things for the Rogue, we probably need to do it for the Chetco, too," Commissioner Sue Gold

Meanwhile, Lower Rogue Watershed Council coordinator Kelly Timchak offered her organization's resources to the commission because that group collects water-quality data with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife in the estuary and has a stakeholder group representing a variety of communities.

Timchak said recent temperature measurements in the estuary showed the water was "actually quite cold."

"I wish people weren't so adverse to changes and differences, because I know 60 years is a long time, but it's not." Timchak said. "I'm not against doing something. I just say let's think about it before we do it.

"Because I have photos from 1939 forward and anyone can look at them. That river has been full of sediment before, and (then) not full of sediment. There's giant gravel bars and there's no gravel bars."

"We would like to have help from the watershed (council)," Boice responded.

Responding to The Pilot's queries regarding the Army Corp of Engineers' dredging operations this year, Public Affairs Specialist Jeffrey Henon said:

"In order for the corps to dredge a location, we need both authorization and funding from Congress. We are authorized to dredge the Rogue River entrance, Gold Beach boat basin and access channel. We do not have authority to dredge further upriver."

For that matter, the Corps of Engineers does not have funding for any additional dredging in 2019, said Henon. The cost to dredge the boat

basin entrance and access channel is about \$2 million, which is separate from the Corps of Engineers' typical annual dredging of the Rogue River entrance. Funding re-

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quests to Congress are made two years in advance.

"The shoaling (gravel bars) that occurred in front of the Gold Beach boat basin was unexpected," Henon said. "Due to the urgency, we were able to find some funding for emergency dredging. But this isn't always possible.

"We worked with the Port of Gold Beach to determine the highest-priority area to focus on with the limited funding we had."

A spokeswoman with Congressman DeFazio's office said he is working on bipartisan legislation that may offer a solution.

DeFazio chairs the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. According to his office, the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund collects more revenue from shippers than Congress has appropriated for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. H.R. 2440, the Full Utilization of the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund Act, would unlock billions in already collected fees to maintain federal ports and harbors.

Approximately \$9.3 billion collected already is in the U.S. Treasury and not being used for its intended purpose, said DeFazio's office.

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Wonder Stump Road residents fear what county may be planning

Over the years, residents of Wonder Stump Road have expressed concerns that Del Norte County officials are moving toward an unnecessary widening of the road, all the while receiving assurances no such plan is in motion.

Their biggest ongoing concern, the say, is actions the county is taking without first notifying the residents.

"First, they started counting cars," said Mac Eller, who's lived on Wonder Stump Road, which is 3 to 4 miles from the north Crescent City line, since 2007. "Nobody said they were going to do that. They marked the trees. Nobody said a word

about that to us in advance." When residents discovered

the orange paint blots on trees along the lane in 2018, marking them for potential removal, Del Norte County Community Development Director Heidi Kunstal said at the time that the county's roads superintendent flagged the trees as candidates for removal but that the project had neither been prioritized nor funded.

"It's an opportunity for us to look at what type of options we have," she told The Triplicate on June 19, 2018. "But one thing I'd like to make very clear is, we all know the importance of that canopy to people in our area.'

Jump ahead a year, when

a surveyor showed up along Wonder Stump Road on July 12 without notice. Eller said he asked him why he was surveying the road and was told it was in case the county wants to widen it.

Residents' fears peaked when they received a July 22 letter from the county seeking to "thoroughly discuss community and stakeholder concerns and solutions and the pros and cons of potential improvements to the County's property better known as Wonder Stump Road."

The letter outlined a process, including meetings and studies, to be completed by June 30, 2020. The result would be a summary of engagement that could be adopted by the Board of County Supervisors at that time.

Kunstal last week declined to comment further, saying she had nothing to add that wasn't in the letter sent to the residents.

Wonderstump Road, which is about 2 miles long, got its name after an enormous, 1,500-year-old redwood toppled, and over the next 3,500 years another redwood grew up, over and around the original.

The upper portion of the growth was logged in the 1800s, leaving behind an unusual stump growth that remains to this day near Eller's property.

The lane itself features redwoods along both sides, creating a canopy effect.

"To make this two lanes, you're going to have to take out a bunch of trees, which will ruin the aesthetics of our little tree tunnel," Eller said. "And the speed limit will go from 25 to 45, (which is) not a good idea with people pulling out of their driveways.'

The county's letter also cited its concern for trees being damaged by passing vehicles. But the local residents insist such accidents, few in number, have involved vehicles running into or clipping a tree as the result of operator error, not due to the trees' close proximity.

The county also says one of the concerns is for emergency vehicles," said local resident Jim Coop. "In the 30 years I've lived here, I've seen maybe a handful (of emergency vehicles), and never a problem. Same with school buses. No problems.

"And they say this is a heavily trafficked road? Oh, my

Coop, simply changing the lane's signage would be an easy fix for some of the perceived problems.

"At each end of the tunnel is a squiggly arrow with an 'island ahead' sign," he said. "Well, who cares about that sign? Just put up signs saying 'turn your lights on, 25 miles per hour, one-way traffic yield to oncoming traffic.' And that's



that he's reached the point he doesn't know what to believe.

"I understand the need for the county to do research to determine whether or not we do need to put in a culvert or not," Eller said. "But you know what? They're just not being forthcoming.

"They're not being 'transparent,' is the key word with

One solution proposed by local residents to address the perceived danger their narrow lane presents to fire emergency vehicles is to install fire hydrants along the route. A city water main runs the length of Wonder Stump, they said.

"They want us to come up with solutions? None of us are engineers," said Eller. "We just live here. But that's one (solution) right there."

As for the county's concerns about flooding, said Eller, he's never experienced flooding issues in the dozen years he's lived there. "So building a culvert along the road to address flooding doesn't make sense, either."

In a heavy storm, Wonder Stump Road can become covered with a thick blanket of pine needles. The clean-up can clog the adjoining ditches. But

that's simply a maintenance issue, said the nearby residents. They've never seen the road blocked or impassable.

"I want to be proactive," said Eller, "and not reactive after they've gone in and done what they're going to do."

Meantime, their message has reached outside the state's borders. Daniel Russ, now living in Sparks, Nevada, has had family ties to the Wonder Stump community dating back to the 1800s. When he heard of the community's concerns through the Facebook page Save Wonderstump, he contacted the page's creator, Donna Eller, to brainstorm ways to get their message a wider audience.

"I decided to start a petition, to see what would happen," Russ said.

Found at https://bit. ly/2ZCCaOp, his petition caught the attention of people from beyond the region, with the number of signatures currently nearing 4,000. "Personally, I didn't expect to get 100," Russ said.

The group's plan is to present the petition, with an organized front by the residents, during the next County Board of Supervisors meeting, on Aug. 13.

At the same time, Mac Eller said, given the current alignment of the county's board, he fears the landowners' concerns will fall on deaf ears.

If that happens, said Coop, "I'll invite in groups like the Sierra Club and the Save the Redwoods Organization.

"I never thought I'd approach that level of activism. But I know we won't have any problem at all finding groups in Humboldt County to come up here and support our efforts to maintain the road the way it is right now."

He mused that he hadn't thought he'd have anything in common with the stereotypical "treehugger." "Whenever I saw somebody protesting on TV, I was like, 'Get a life. Don't you work?

"Well, here we are. We're making a stand because it means something to us.

"If you allow for more traffic, we're going to get more traffic. If you remove the trees, you remove what makes Wonder Stump Lane special."

"One of the neighbors said the tree tunnel is where the trees hold hands for us to pass through together," said Donna Eller, "forever in peace."




enjoyed painting with her many artist friends.

school graduates, two are home-schooling graduates, and one is a mother returning to school to complete midwifery training.

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
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



Imagine an alien invasion last night in Crescent City. A group of youthful musicians here did just that, playing an appropriate soundtrack to accompany such a sci-fi spectacular.

The performance featured this year's participants in Amy Ross's North Coast
Summer Band Camp at Crescent Elk
Middle School.

The musicians were fifth-through eighth-grade band members from Crescent City and Brookings schools, sprinkled with more-experienced high school musicians filling in.

Now in her 25th year running the camp, and the first year since she retired as music teacher at Crescent Elk, Ross said this year's theme was "Solar System and Space."

The students practiced Aug. 5-9 to perform recognizable sci-fi staples such as John Williams's "Theme from Star Wars" and the lesser-known but equally challenging "Aliens Landing in the Backyard."

Ross said the camp is a good way for the developing musicians to keep their skills honed over the summer break.

"On Monday, it always sounds pretty ragged," said Ross. "With only one or two years of experience, this music can be a lot harder (for the students) than anything they've done before. There's a lot of notes to learn and new rhythms to read.

"But it's amazing the progress they make over

In past years, the camp has enrolled as many as 70 band members. (Sorry, no strings in the band, Ross said.) But this year, there was a smaller turnout, 25 campers. So, the 10 high school helpers and seven staff took on greater importance as mentors and fill-ins.

Joshua Peterson, 19, a recent Brookings
High School graduate, was one of those who
volunteered to be a helper as he awaits enrolling
at Southwestern Oregon Community College's
Curry campus.

"I love this camp," said Peterson. "It gets everyone together to prepare them for the next year."

Peterson has been playing bass guitar for five years. After three years of participating in the camp, this was his first as a high-school helper.



"As the experienced musician, you have to help more than those in your own section," he said. "You get questions like how to play a rhythm, was this the right note.

"Ms. Ross does a great job with the kids, making sure they get the help they need."

Some students attend the camp for reasons easy to understand, such as Patince Diehl, a Crescent Elk Middle School student now in her second year on baritone sax (or barry sax, for short).

"Why'd I join band camp? Why not? I love band. It's really fun, spending time with people and playing music."

For others, summer band camp offers an opportunity to hone up on an instrument they're still just learning, like Del Norte freshman James Appel, who has been playing tenor saxophone for just half a year.

"I switched over from percussion, after starting with the clarinet," said Appel. "So, I joined band camp to warm up for high school. I changed to sax because I like the feeling of moving your fingers and changing notes. It's really fun, being part of a band"

part of a band."

Appel isn't the only one who's switched instruments before settling on one instrument of choice.

Charley Tygart initially followed her father, as a

trombonist, in the third grade. But school district music programs don't begin until the fifth grade, when she chose to switch to percussion.

Now in the seventh grade, she felt drawn back to the trombone at Crescent Elk Middle School.

And, Tygart admits, she came into camp a little rusty. "It'd been all summer since I'd played music or heard music," she said.

"Coming in here the first day, I was like, 'Oh, my gosh, I don't understand.' It's so much more difficult. But I didn't panic."

Helping the young musicians from feeling overwhelmed was Kristen Volta, Ross's replacement as Crescent Elk's music teacher. The 23-year-old recent graduate of Northem Arizona University admitted she probably looks about the same age as some of the older students.

"Band is so enjoyable, so important to education and kids' academic life," she said. "This one-week band camp can be tough for the sixth- and seventh-graders, but it's a helpful jumpstart for those who have been too busy over the summer.

It gets them thinking again about playing music."
One of the exercises Volta uses to help indecisive, often younger, students choose the proper instrument is "instrument petting zoo." She lays out the instruments for the students to handle and play a bit ... ensuring to sanitize the mouthpieces before passing them along.

"The instruments require a different embouchure to play," she said, scrunching up her lips to demonstrate the different pucker it takes to play a trumpet versus a clarinet. "We find that kids adapt better to one over the other, and we help steer them in the right direction."

When Volta took the director's baton during "Planets," a piece she chose for the band camp, Ross sat in with the students on flute. She'll continue to help Volta with the summer program however she's needed.

Said Volta: "Ross is big, big shoes to fill. The kids adore her. She has helped so many of them through the years.





Cholesterol **Plummets After** Giving Up Bread

DEAR DR. ROACH: What is your opinion of the keto diet? I have been doing it for a few weeks now and lost a few pounds, but it goes against everything I usually eat -high quantities of red meat, lots of full-fat foods and dairy. Since I am losing some weight and actually feel better and am sleeping better, I like the short-term results, but I cannot see this as a long-term way of life. I am concerned about all that fat going into my body and clogging my arteries. I exercise every day with Zumba, jogging, etc. --J.P.

ANSWER: The ketosis diet favors very large amounts of fat -- 60% to 80% of calories, with 15% to 20% of calories from protein and 5% or less from carbohydrates. The theory is to cause ketosis, a physiological condition of ketones in the blood as a result of high fat intake. It has been used since the 1920s as a treatment for seizures, but

Like every diet, it has both good and bad aspects. On the good side, it is effective at short-term weight loss. However, much of the apparent early weight loss is due to water weight, which is a universal finding on a highfat diet. Weight gain is likely when stopping the diet. It is highly restrictive. Further, many of the foods that you can't eat on this diet are those that have been shown to be associated with improved health, especially vegetables and most fruits. Most people will have a substantial increase in cholesterol levels (by as much as 50%). The red meat and saturated fat probably present an independent risk of heart disease and cancer (even apart from its effect on cholesterol), although this remains somewhat controversial. I do not recommend the keto diet for long-term use, at all. It may have some benefit in helping with short-term

weight loss, but I think there are much healthier alternatives for most people.

column about the 58-year-old woman who felt like she had oil in her eye reminded me of having a very similar situation.

I described it to my optometrist, and he also diagnosed ocular migraine. I wanted another opinion, because the only symptom I had was the oil, no headache or visual disturbances. The ophthalmologist diagnosed blepharitis, or clogged oil glands at the base of my eyelashes. She recommended placing a warm pack of rice in a sock over my eye and then washing the eye area with baby shampoo on a washcloth. I did this for a week or two, and on my visit with her to recheck the eyes, the problem was gone. -- J.P. ANSWER: Thank you for writing. Blepharitis is caused by changes in the meibomian glands, oil glands that are present in both eyelids, often associated with changes in bacteria. I usually see people with this condition noticing red eyes and a gritty sensation. However, you are quite right that it includes

blurry vision, and the eye-care

professional sometimes can

see an oily or foamy film over the eye.

The treatment the ophthalmologist recommended works for most people. Gentle lid massage may help get additional oily material out of the glands. However, antibiotics or other treatments are sometimes necessary.

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

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
