PELICAN BAY STAFF IS EVACUATED, ISOLATI

ore than a hundred More man a Pelican Bay State Prison employees were quarantined after a suspicious substance was found in a letter. The employees were reportedly released the following morning.

A statement from the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) said a letter that claimed to contain a suspicious substance was received Tuesday, July 23, in the administration building at the prison. Investigators sealed the letter in a bag to contain the threat of exposure and the building was

No injuries were reported and an investigation is ongo-

ing. Prison officials from the state are working with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies to identify the substance contained in the letter. CDRC said local law enforcement was considering potential secondary exposures and taking necessary steps to mitigate safety concerns.

A Humboldt Countybased hazardous material team was called to the prison the day the letter was received. Preliminary testing was done and the FBI is conducting follow-up testing of the substance inside the envelope.

CDCR assistant secretary Jeffrey Callison said results of the FBI analysis have not yet been received. He confirmed that the prison's administration building

remained closed as of press time.

Terry Thornton, CDRC deputy press secretary, gave a statement to news station KRCR in which he said 116 employees who work in the administration building, mailroom and warehouse were put on a precautionary quarantine because of the suspicious letter. He said the employees were released Wednesday morning with no signs of illness or injury.

Operations at Pelican Bay State Prison are otherwise normal and the inmate population is unaffected, according to Thornton.

Centinela State Prison reportedly received a similar letter and evacuated staff from its mailroom. There were no injuries reported in that incident either.

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Curry 4-H: Supporting kids (and Buster) at the county fair

The Curry County Fair was in full swing on grandopening day July 24.

Down in the animal pavilion, a favorite attraction was one of the critters.

Amidst turkeys, cattle, horses, ducks, chickens, goats and more, hosted by the Curry County 4-H Club, was a sky-blue, sweatered sheep that goes by the name Buster.

"Hello! Can I answer any questions you have about sheep?" asked Buster's owner, Atticus Wahl, offering a ready handshake.

Wahl, a 17-year-old Pacific High School student, is knowledgeable, polite and poised when it comes to all things lamb. She joined the Curry County 4-H Club with her cousin when they were both 9 years old.

As to why she raises sheep, she doesn't try to pull the wool over your eyes.

Declared Wahl: "I love sheep! They are mild-mannered. And sheep ranching runs in my family."

Wahl said her grandmother and two of her sons began raising the animals in the Langlois northern reaches of Curry County, an area known for legendary wool products.

The younger Wahl brushes back a lock of black hair and grins mischievously, acknowledging, "I wouldn't

mind raising a goat." For that matter, she laughs, looking around quickly and confessing, "Or maybe even ... a

At the same time, she admits the option of raising goats is "off the table" because Wahl's mom says goats are "too ornery."

Buster, for his part, is oblivious to the press invading his cage, concentrating instead on munching away at his grain cereal.

Buster's soft, snowy white coat has been brushed to perfection. His facial markings are black, common for a Hampshire/Suffolk mix.

Wahl explained that Buster is known as a wether, a male sheep that's been castrated to eliminate impregnating females and to improve the marketability of the animal for size and appearance when it goes to market.

"You don't want an animal that is too fat or too thin," she said. "Buyers are wanting a well-filled-out animal at sale."

On the other hand, "Does that date with destiny make it tough on 4-H kids tending livestock?" Wahl is asked.

She ponders a bit, then says, "When I was younger, (her animals) were too much like pets. Tthen, I only wanted to show them.

"Now I understand this is part of the lifecycle and I try not to get too attached. The whole point is to take very good care of them while they

are here."

Wahl said she likes getting together with "other clubbers' about once a month. 4-H has been with the Curry County Fair since its inception more than 50 years ago.

"I like the way 4-H helps us to learn lots of life lessons for success," said Wahl, "by teaching us to work hard. And that hard-work ethic pays off in life no matter what you choose to do.

"We aren't afraid to get a little messy."

Earthquake safety project is planned for Brookings City Hall

A \$1.2-million seismic retrofit project at Brookings City Hall is expected to begin in the next few

The project will include reinforcing wall and roof diaphragms on the police and fire wings of city hall.

It also includes providing a separation joint between the administration wing, which includes the water, finance, city manager and public works development services offices, and the police and fire wings.

Brookings City Manager Janell Howard said the work is essential in ensuring that police and fire personnel can respond to

The building will be seismically sound," said Howard. "Therefore, police and fire will

Howard said that during the construction, no police equipment will be moved. However, some non-critical fire equipment

will be moved to another city-

owned facility. She said no personnel will be moved while the project is

'We do not anticipate disruption at city hall to the public," Howard said.

The city is using a seismicrehabilitation grant of \$1,287,988 from Business Oregon for the improvements to the police and fire wings of the city hall

A local match of \$209,672 will be taken from the city's capital projects reserve fund and/or from urban renewal expenditures.

Howard said the city would use grant funds from Business Oregon to pay the engineering fees associated only with the seismic retrofit work identified in the contract, estimated to be \$164,500.

The city selected WRK Engineering in 2017 to prepare construction documents for the project. Howard said the documents currently are in plan review.

Southern Oregon's Ausland Group has been selected as the building contractor.

The seismic retrofit does not include increasing the pitch needed to address roof drainage at city hall or new roofing over the administration wing. Ausland Group estimates that additional work would cost \$122,000.

WRK Engineering estimates the additional design work at

Howard said in an April memo to the Brookings City Council that the seismic retrofit project would provide an opportunity to address the pitch and roofing issues.

The seismic project is estimated to be completed in three months.

Reasons, without data, might be wrong

In November, I lost my bid for mayor of Brookings, but I did not lose my interest or passion for Brookings.

The primary reason I ran for mayor was because I wanted more detailed financial analyses from our City Council.

Elections are the cornerstone of democracy; I respect the vote of the people and our current city government. I have a sincere respect for our mayor, Jake Pieper. He and I have spoken in detail about several issues since the election.

I also respect the right of every citizen of Brookings to be able to ask questions of their government. Asking questions of our city officials is important, whether it is an \$800,000 salary increase, or why there are no hanging flower baskets on Chetco this summer.

I watch or attend every city council meeting. I also attend every city workshop and budget meeting, because they are not televised. I am often the only citizen there.

My interest in Brookings' finances, operations, parks, festivals and residents didn't end with the election.

I addressed several salary decisions at last Monday night's council meeting, with questions that any salary compensation professional would ask. Are salaries competitive to retain and attract quality employees? Why are increases above cost of living warranted

for some employees and not others? Should all union salary increases apply to non-union employees?

My questions were acknowledged by the council and somewhat addressed, but not answered directly. All proposed increases were

I also purposed that an independent salary study be conducted to evaluate whether salaries are in line with like positions in comparable cities. Such studies are based on verifiable data and are affordable. The council recently considered a \$20,000 study for a stop sign, and approves many engineering and other professional studies.

The city council and staff spent a lot of time working on the contracts that were approved Monday. They made their decision based on facts and/or reason. Reasonable conclusions, without solid data, may not be reasonable.

Example: There is one component of the recent salary negations, intended to save the city money, that actually will cost the city approximately \$6,000 every year. Health insurance cost are increasing faster than inflation. City employees were paying 10% of their premium cost; the city proposed an increase to 12.5%.

During labor negations, the city agreed to give all employees a 1% compensation increase to help offset the additional cost to the employee. It appears that no one did the actual calculations prior to agreeing to this.

Employees paying 12.5 % will save the city

\$22,000. However, the cost for the 1% salary increase is \$28,000; net cost to the city, \$6,000

More importantly, several years from now the perception will be that employees pay 12.5%. In reality, they are paying slightly less than 10%. Employees and unions will be less likely to agree to any additional health insurance cost, thinking that they recently increased their share of the cost.

This decision appeared reasonable. However, it is \$6,000 the city could have saved. More importantly, it will impact future salary negations, which could have additional costs for the city.

City of Brookings salaries have had a trend of increases higher than the cost of living, and other decisions, based more on reason than fact. Over time, these decisions based on reason can cause salaries to be lower or higher than comparable jobs in comparable cities. The result can be difficulty retaining and attracting qualified employees, or unnecessary costs to the city.

Salaries are one of the largest costs for any organization, and one of the most important decisions. An independent salary study would provide the city with data it needs to make the best decisions going forward, and guide salary decisions to retain and attract qualified employees ... while assuring that taxpayer dollars are wisely spent.

No surprise: Wildfire season could be bad

Firefighters across Curry County and throughout Oregon are bracing for an intense and explosive wildfire season, with the human element a key concern.

Coos Forest Protection Association district specialist Jeff Chase said this summer already has been a busy one for firefighters.

'We've had about 25 fire calls this month alone," he said. "Half of those calls turned out to be false alarms, which is a good thing.'

Chase said many calls involve human-caused fires. "We are having issues with transient camps and fires," he said. "The transients are a hard group to (get to) listen to fire-prevention messages."

Added Chase, "We send a great deal of time trying to change human behavior. Many folks do not realize the amount of heat left in their campfire when they are done. You also get people that aren't paying attention, and those that don't believe anything bad can happen to them."

Under Oregon law, said Chase, those found responsible for wildfires can face fines in the millions of dollars.

As Chase and other firefighters deal with the human element, they also are keeping a keen watch on natural conditions that could lead

to wildfires, such as summer's increasing heat waves, drying conditions, winds and lightning.

We do get the winds off the coast, which always causes problems when it comes to putting fires out," he said.

One of the key elements Chase watches is energyrelease components. "That tells us the fire resistance to control," he said. "The higher those numbers climb, the more resources are needed to put a fire out."

That information, along with moisture levels, wind speed and direction, are monitored and released to fire agencies through the National Weather Service.

'Those numbers have been in the moderate level, but with the increasing drying and hot weather, those numbers will climb higher. Chase said.

The Coos Forest Protection Association covers Coos, Curry and western Douglas counties, working in partnership with the Oregon Forestry Department, the Bureau of Land Management, and private and smaller landowners.

"It is a huge chunk of land," he said. "A checkerboard of intermixed land, so we have multiple agreements to protect those lands."

Mother Nature and topography also are challenges for the firefighters in southern Oregon and Curry

County. "We do get lighting and those storms can spark wildfires," Chase said. "We attempt to get those fires out as fast as we can."

He said the region's steep hills and bluffs, cliffs and thick timbered areas can be significant challenges.

"It can make this very interesting," he said," but there are ways to get in and around the buffs safely, and get to the fires and put them

Chase said preparations began earlier this year with specialized wildfire training. "We completed our fire training in June with 35 new firefighters, so that gives us about 100 employees ready for the fire season."

The Coos Forest Protection Association utilizes a variety of on-the-ground equipment and a contracted helicopter for initial attacks when wildfires break out. Larger planes with retardant can be called in from the

"Each day, we get a list from the state coordination center in Salem of what planes, helicopters and crews are available," Chase said.

Meantime, said Chase, "Make sure you have a wide, defensible space surrounding your home. Keep yards mowed and water your yard when you can."

Plus, keep your lawn trimmed. "The tall, dry grass can be dangerous," he said.

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Slow week of fishing, but lots of bottomfish still being caught



Fishing has slowed some this week on the Wild Rivers Coast. Although the week closed with some rough weather that limited ocean anglers, the Pacific halibut bite seemed to slow down even before things got bumpy. There have been a few salmon caught on both sides of the border this week, however.

Anglers are still catching a few salmon and steelhead on the Klamath River, and the Rogue Bay is still producing some nice salmon as well.

On the ocean

Andy Martin of Wild River Fishing said Tuesday was a good day for salmon fishing out of Brookings Harbor, with lots of coho and chinook salmon in close. The bite has slowed down a little bit since, however, as winds started to pick up throughout the coast.

A few anglers out of Crescent City have also been able to haul in some chinook salmon, but the bite is still slow in Northern California. Jim Mitchell of Gotcha Hooked Fish Trips said although he didn't have any luck catching salmon this week, he has seen a lot more bait in the area throughout the week. He also said he was able to see several salmon swimming in the bait balls but he wasn't able to coax any of them into biting.

Meanwhile, the Pacific halibut bite has been slow on both sides of the California-Oregon border.

Bottom fishing has remained a good bet for anglers on the ocean, especially when winds keep boats from getting out too far. Mitchell said he was able to catch limits of black snappers, lots of coppers, and some good sized lingcod on Monday out of Crescent City.

South Beach has also been fairly productive this week as well with California halibut being caught in close to shore. There are also thresher shark starting to show up in the area.

Surf perch fishing from the beach has also been productive

Martin said he heard of several sportfishermen going out to search for tuna out of Brookings this week, but they haven't had any luck yet. Anglers have been catching tuna about 30 miles out from Charlston, Oregon, and there have been reports of tuna caught out of Eureka as well. That could mean tuna fishing in the area will pick up when the wind dies down.

"The next good weather break that we have there will probably be some tuna out of Brookings, because it usually starts in Coos Bay first," Martin said.

River

There hasn't been much change in the Rogue Bay this week. Anglers are still catching chinook salmon and Martin said they seem to be getting bigger, but it still hasn't been red hot.

Martin estimated that there have been 30 to 40 salmon caught per day in the Rogue Bay, spread out between 40 to 50 boats targeting the fish.

"There are a lot of fish, but the moss is still really bad so you have to fish suspended and keep your gear out of the moss, or fish the areas that don't have moss," Martin said. "There have

been a couple really good bite periods every day now, usually at some point during the outgoing tide and at some point during the incoming tide, but it hasn't been really good all day."

Down on the Klamath River

fishing seems to have slowed some on the Lower Klamath River after a decent run came through last week. Up river anglers are still catching steelhead, however, and pulling an occasional salmon in as well.

Virginia E. (Tomasso) Collis June 3, 1926 - July 14, 2019



Virginia E. (Tomasso) Collis, of McLean and formerly of Brookings, passed away on Sat. July 14, 2019. She was 93 years old. Virginia:"Gigi", "Ginny" was born on June 3, 1926 in South Waverly, Pennsylvania, the youngest of five children of Joseph and Minnie (Cocco) Tomasso. She graduated from Waverly High School in Waverly, New York in 1944 and entered the Federal Cadet Nurse Program at Sisters of Charity Hospital in Pensacola, Florida. As Virginia liked to tell it, she and her life-long friend, Romaine, carefully selected this program based on the highlighted directive in the school pamphlet to bring FOUR party dresses. She completed training in 1946 and became an RN, remaining in Pensacola to work.

In 1949 she met her future husband, Jim, a Navy pilot on a blind date. Jim and Virginia were married in Pensacola in June of 1950. The following years were spent as a Navy wife traveling back and forth across the country to eight duty stations, raising four children, forming friendships, packing and unpacking, and making the hard decision each move whether to bring the dog or not.

After 22 years of service, Jim retired from the Navy, and they moved to Falls Church, Virginia. Virginia returned to her nursing career. Their children finished high school, and college and left home. In 1985, Jim and

Virginia retired to Brookings to live on a cliff overlooking the ocean. They were active in community life there joining the Elks, volunteering with Habitat for Humanity, chairing the local Republican party, were members of Star of the Sea Catholic Church, and engaged in a variety of other civic activities - for them every commitment was a joint-effort.

Virginia was a loving and much-loved wife, mother and grandmother. She was a great cook, especially during her 'gourmet" phase in the 70's. She enjoyed golf, she knitted, sewed, refinished furniture, re-upholstered furniture, and helped with the all too many DIY home improvement projects. She was unstinting in her attention and love for her grandchildren - sewing quilts, and stuffed dolls, and sending endless quirky gifts and cards.

She was preceded in death by her beloved husband, Jim, grandson John Gabriel Muller, and her sisters Lena Daugherty, Ann (Mike) DeSisti, Charlotte (Jerry) Wilcox, and sister-in-law Janet Lehr Tomasso, nieces Susan Daugherty, and Carol (David) Keeffe. 

It had been the destiny of the past 2 generations of her family after the Great Depression left her wealthy family destitute. She dropped out of school in the 9th grade to help care for her siblings. She met and married "Scott" when she was only 15 but made him promise they could still care for her younger siblings. 4 years later they had a toddler and 2 babies. She was continuing down the path of generations before and it tore at her soul. It

was at this time that she began to pray what has become our family manta, "Lord, please change MY generation"! In the 1960's, Kibby was the 1st woman in Oregon to work in the plywood mill where she faced profound discrimination. She put her head down and worked even harder. She worked overtime and did the jobs no one wanted like cleaning the bathrooms and lunchroom. She worked until her hands bled. She wrapped her cracked and sore hands around used textbooks and began to study for her GED. Her young children watched her every move and learned about determination and character. As plywood mills began to shutter their doors,

she prayed even harder, LORD PLEASE CHANGE MY GENERATION! Destiny once again tapped her on the shoulder reminding her what she learned as a child...Education was her ticket out of poverty and the only way to "change her generation".

Kibby always put others first. In the late 1970's she sent her husband to college as she continued to work in plywood mills and scrub toilets. She then sent her college age children to school. In the 1980's, it was finally her turn to attend. Her professors told her she would never make it with only a GED and a 9th grade education. Many of us remember her tears; her embarrassment from being "an uneducated dropout that never went to high school". Did that stop her? Absolutely not. Once again, she put her head down and worked ever harder. She hired Math and English tutors. Her essays became vivid and alive. They were raw and real; they were KISMET! Apart from a few grammar and punctuation errors, and despite the closed-mindedness of a few professors, she graduated with honors. She was speechless when those same professors approached her with tears and pleaded for forgiveness. They said she was a gifted writer and begged her to pursue a journalistic career. Her focus was not to be a journalist, but to CHANGE HER GENERATION. KISMET INDEED CHANGED HER GENERATION. With her husband, they sent the rest of their children and many grandchildren to college

She was injured in a car wreck on January 2, 2016 (not her fault). In May of that year, she fell and became an instant quadriplegic. Did complete paralysis stop her? No! She again put her head down to contemplate her future. The first thing she said was that it was time to "open her toolbox". When questioned on the meaning, she said "The most important thing in life is not money. It is God, love and family". She continued, "Money is only a tool and I have a lot of tools in my toolbox and it is time to use them all. I need to work much harder than before". Until the moment she died, her goal was to continue making dentures and other people smile at PTL Denture Service.







New things always seem to get kinks that need to be straightened out. The lesson learned is that it's a lot harder to schedule two churches for a program to the convenience of all than just one.



DEAR ABBY

DAUGHTER BETRAYED BY **MOTHER STRUGGLES WITH** RECONNECTION

DEAR ABBY: I have an extensive history of childhood trauma. I was sexually abused by my stepfather for 15 years. When I turned him in, my family turned their backs on me. I was told it could have been handled within the family, and they blamed me for acting "sexy." My stepfather spent 10 years in prison and died a few years later.

I suffer from chronic mental health issues including PTSD, anxiety and suicide ideation, which have landed me in the hospital 10 times in the last two years. My mother wants to have a relationship with me, but she refuses to apologize or acknowledge the abuse even happened.

In some ways, the betrayal by my mother has hurt me more than the abuse. I feel guilty for not trying to work on a relationship with her, but on the other hand, I don't feel my heart can handle any more rejection from her. We live states apart. What should I do? -- SURVIVOR IN WISCONSIN

DEAR SURVIVOR: If you haven't talked about this with a licensed psychotherapist, please do it before making a decision about something this important. I'm not a therapist, but I think it would be healthier for you to keep your distance from someone who prefers living in denial rather than facing reality.

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TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

When Specialists Disagree DEAR DR. ROACH: I am

a snowbird who uses two different cardiologists for my health, and I am devoted to both of them. However, they have conflicting advice. I have coronary artery disease and had three stents placed in New York. I am an active 86-year-old woman who walks at least a mile daily and does light weights. My lab results are all normal. I take a daily baby aspirin and Plavix. I've done well with them.

My Florida doctor wants me to discontinue the Plavix and take just the aspirin, but my New York doctor thinks I should keep the Plavix forever. I honestly don't know the right course of action. --S.T.M.

ANSWER: Both aspirin and Plavix (clopidogrel) work by decreasing the activity of platelets, the specialized blood cells that start to form clots. They have been shown to reduce blockages of stents, which hold open blood vessels that have been unblocked via a catheter in the heart. There are several

different types of stents, and some of them have medications embedded in them, which release slowly over many months. These "drug-eluting" stents require using both aspirin and clopidogrel for a longer period of time.

There is some debate about how long to continue these medications, but I have not read any recommendations to continue them for more than 30 months. A study (the DAPT trial) used exact information about the person and the type of stent to make predictions about balancing risks, and the results of the study showed that in your case, using both aspirin and clopidogrel would reduce heart attack risk slightly, but at an increased risk of bleeding. Nonetheless, some cardiologists will continue both medications in some patients if there are no problems.

It sounds like your New York cardiologist may have more knowledge about the stent, as it was performed in New York, so I would try to get the two of them to reach a consensus. There may be

something about your particular case that warrants long-term treatment with these medications.

DEAR DR. ROACH: A few years ago, Johns Hopkins produced an article stating that possibly being hard of hearing and doing nothing about it could lead to Alzheimer's disease. Is that study still valid? -- S.S.

ANSWER: It's been almost 30 years since a link between hearing loss and dementia was first published, and recent research has confirmed this link. It now seems clear that hearing loss increases the rate of decline in brain function by 30% to 40%, independent of other risk factors. Put another way, people with mild hearing loss had double the risk of dementia in 10 years; those with moderate hearing loss, triple the risk; those with severe hearing loss had five times the risk of dementia compared with people of normal hearing and the same age. The brains of people with hearing loss are more likely to atrophy as well. Of course, not everybody with hearing loss develops dementia, and people with normal hearing can.

There is some, but not conclusive, evidence that hearing aids protect the brain from dementia in people with hearing loss. However, it is clear that hearing aids can improve social functioning, well-being and some measures of memory. Despite this evidence, many older people with hearing loss do not get it treated.
