What we can learn from fish snouts

Each evening one of about 15 volunteers from Curry Anadromous Fishermen (CAF) makes the rounds to collect hatchery salmon snouts from three locations on the Rogue River Estuary. What on earth do they want fish snouts for, you might ask?

The snouts are placed in collection bins by fishermen, who are then entered into a drawing for fishing gear. Bins are located at fish cleaning stations at the Port of Gold Beach, Jot's Resort and Lex's Landing. Once collected, they are saved for ODFW fish biologists to examine. The group started collecting snouts on October 1 and will continue

through November.

They are collecting the snouts because CAF and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) want to learn about the survival rate of the hatchery fish because they operate the Indian Creek Hatchery (ICH) under the supervision of Oregon ODFW's Lower Rogue salmon and trout enhancement program (STEP).

"We remove a small wire tag from the snout that has data scribed on the tag," said STEP biologist John Weber. "The data tells us what state, hatchery, and release group. Once we have that data we can go to a database and learn a lot about the status of the fish when they were young and in the hatchery being reared." Indian Creek Hatchery tags about 33% of the Chinook salmon released.

"The effort has been going great," Weber said. "We have had more participation then what I expected for a first year project." As of Oct. 21, 97 snouts have been turned in resulting in 63 tags total with 40 coming from Indian Creek Hatchery Chinook (ICH). In addition, there are 34 non-coded wire tag (CWT) fish, which are presumed to be mostly Indian Creek fish as well. So ICH has 63.5 percent of the CWT fish and presumed 70 percent to 80 percent of the hatchery fish caught in the Rogue Estuary thus far.

Reopening schools

Local COVID-19 cases affect decisions as **Brookings and Gold** Beach districts delay on-campus classes

David Marshall, Superintendent of Brookings-Harbor School District, announced on Friday afternoon, Oct. 16 that the recent spike in cases in Curry County will delay holding in-person classes for grades 4 to 12.

The weekly report from Oregon Health Authority and Oregon Department of Education (ODE) that was released on Oct. 12 confirmed Curry County experienced a spike in cases that pushed the county significantly over the 30 cases per 100,000 people metric.

"Under the ODE rules that permit us to have in-person classes for our kindergarten through third-grade students, we are permitted to continue in-person classes as long as the outbreak or spike is not connected to the school," Marshall

The increases in local cases are attributed to an isolated outbreak in an elder care facility and not indicative of expanded community spread, and no current active cases have been traced to the schools, according to Curry County Public Health.

"We will continue to keep in contact with Curry County Public Health to ensure that we are aware and can take action should the information change," he said.

"Unfortunately, the new cases do impact our county-wide metrics that determine the district's ability to start regular in-person classes under the hybrid model for grades 4 to 12.'

County and state virus metrics must meet the target numbers for three weeks in a row in order for regular in-person instruction to begin in grades 4-12.

The BHSD Board of Directors will discuss potential timelines and options for returning to in-person instruction allowable under state guidelines at its upcoming meeting at 5:30 p.m.



Some tags early in the project revealed a few fish from the Klamath River and from random hatcheries in the northwest.

"We would expect to see fish in the Rogue estuary fishery in the summer and early fall from other basins as these fish enter the bays to feed," Weber explained about the fish from Klamath River and other hatcheries. "We historically have a small number of Chinook that spawn in the Rogue from other basins, with the majority of them being from the Klamath River. It is very rare to have a fish return to Indian Creek from outside basins."

Weber was encouraged with the results. "We are headed in the right direction to determine survival in the future," he said. "We have observed a significant number of jacks (2-yearold males) in the catch; this indicates that last year's release had some survival. With a good jack return we can make the assumption that we may have a decent 3-year-old return next year."

ODFW would like to see volunteers continue to head up the effort to continue

monitoring the hatchery fish on the Rogue. In addition to the snouts, ODFW also collects data from hatchery fish they catch when seining, collecting broodstock, and spawning fish surveys.

"We collect this data whenever we get our hands on hatchery fish while sampling," he said. "Also, when the fish return to the hatcheries we take snouts, as well. This project is particularly important as there are a good number of Indian Creek fish caught in the estuary fishery and we don't get them for data collection. Collecting these Rogue estuary-caught hatchery fish is really

important to gauge the success of the volunteer Indian Creek Hatchery program.

"I would just like to thank the anglers for their efforts to cut snouts and get them into the buckets at the different stations. With the drought conditions lasting into December over the past few years, Curry Anadromous show the success of their program. "When we have reviewed punchcard data over the past few years, we have seen that hatchery fish are being caught, but we have had little data to show that they are Indian Creek fish. This year it looks like the majority are in fact from Indian Creek."

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

Curry County School District 1

In Gold Beach Superintendent Tim Wilson announced on Oct. 20, "The State COVID-19 metrics have been released and, as predicted, do not allow the opening of both schools to on-campus learning at this time. However, if the reports on Oct. 27, Nov. 3 and Nov.10 show allowable data, then the District would have the potential to open up in the hybrid model the week of Nov. 16."

The CCSD1 Board was scheduled at its next meeting on Oct. 21 to discuss

these options as it relates to the Operational Blueprint and acknowledgement by the Curry County Public Health Department for the opening of who and when in the hybrid model.

"With that said, the District is pleased to announce that Riley Creek will begin bringing in K-2 students starting next Monday, Oct. 26," Wilson said.

Under the rules of CDL (Comprehensive Distance Learning), cohorts or groups of up to 10 students can come to school for two hours a day. Students will attend their synchronous online lessons in the morning and then come on campus from 1 p.m. to 3

p.m. Transportation will be provided for those who request it. Based on the size of the grade level, students will be on campus once or twice a week. Parents are asked to not contact the school, and wait for the school to call and provide all the information needed.

If all goes as planned, then Riley Creek will add the grade 3-5 students starting on Monday, Nov. 2, under the same rules of cohorts/groups of 10 in afternoon sessions. The grades 3-5 addition will be confirmed next Tuesday, Oct. 27.

GB council reviews fair board plan

Curry County Fair Board member Robert Chibante presented the final version of the Event Center on the Beach's 2020 Redevelopment Plan at the Gold Beach City Council's regular meeting on Oct. 12.

The plan encompasses a complete overhaul of the Fairgrounds' nearly 14-acre property. Chibante detailed some of the strategies to convert the property into a modern event center that can accommodate large events that will boost tourism in the county. The idea is to promote work and travel vacations where organizations and companies in the Northwest and West could bring their employees together for a meeting and a vacation without having to travel

"Back when I was with the Chamber, we always spoke about trying to get people to stay 'one more day," Chibante said. "If we have a center that is current, modernized with having the rooms to get things done and infrastructure for them, it's not going to be one day anymore; it might be three days, four days, five days. It will benefit the entire county.'

An RV park that starts with tent camping for bicyclists is one of the ideas that sticks out.

"Back in the days when Travel Oregon was involved, in 2014 statewide it (bicycle tourism) was over \$400 million,' he said. On the coast it was \$4 to \$5 million at the time. There's no real place where they can have a secure place where they can pull over the bike and have a tent without being on the side of the road. When looking at the RV camping, the tent camping would be the first way to get a foot in the door." The camping and RV park would allow them to generate income for the Event Center.

The horse arena would also add additional stables and barn area so they can camp there and have a place for their horses to where they can ride on the beach the next day.

"The biggest change of all would be the new convention center," Chibante said. The convention center would attach to Docia Sweet Hall and stretch over to encompass the Showcase building. "The end goal is to develop a closed campus. With a closed campus, we can have a concert or a car show or road show." The closed campus would allow the Event Center to hold gated ticketed events.

The plan is meant to serve as a "blueprint" for the process with the priority goal of redevelopment and rehabilitation to if the facilities and properties to accommodate future

Backyard Chicken Fees

The Council also considered a citizen request to lower the fee for a backyard chicken permit, which costs \$100. After discussion and consideration of the request, councilors voted unanimously to keep the current fee in place because of actual costs to do the inspections and enforcement of rules.

Food Carts

The food cart ordinance drafted by staff after receiving direction during the September meeting, met the approval of councilors, with only one minor change, which added the industrial zone 5-I to the previous 4-C and 7-PF zones in the draft ordinance. The ordinance was praised by the Institute for Justice representative, which focuses on vending issues, as not being burdensome with regulations that would prevent people from opening a business.

Councilors voted unanimously to adopt the new vending rules with Resolution R2021-09 and also to lift the previously placed moratorium on new food vending carts.

Proposed Annexations

Finally, City Admin-

istrator Jodi Fritts announced an upcoming hearing for the November meeting to consider proposed annexation of several parcels within the Urban Growth Boundary into the City Limits. The City has been planning to annex its water intake and water treatment plant parcels due to upcoming capital projects. At the same time two adjacent property owners approached the city about annexing their properties.

The City hasn't annexed any properties since 2007. Because the annexations are voluntary, an election isn't required and the public hearing process is much easier.

The properties to be annexed in addition to the city-owned lots include the approximately 152acre Old Mill site that extends on both sides of Jerrys Flat Road, and another 32-acre parcel adjacent to the southwest side of the Old Mill parcel. Both parcels are currently proposed to retain similar zoning to their current status, with the Old Mill site remaining mostly industrial with 20 acres zoned 4-C Commercial and the smaller adjacent parcel Residential 2-R. The City's lots would be zoned 7-PF Public

Facilities. The hearing scheduled to be held in November is to designate the zoning on the parcels.

COVID-19 cases show slight decline

For the week of Monday, Oct.12 through Sunday, Oct.18, OHA recorded 2,327 new daily cases, a 4 percent decline from the previous week's pandemic high of 2,418. The Oregon Health Authority released its COVID-19 Weekly Report on Wednesday, Oct. 21.

The number of newly tested Oregonians rose to 28,960, as did those who tested positively, to 6.5 percent.

Twenty-seven COVID-19 associated deaths were reported during the week-compared to 25 during the previous week. One of those reported deaths was a Curry County resident

from Sea View Long Term Memory Care in Brookings.

People hospitalized with the virus remained the same at 143.

The age group with the highest incidence of reported infection has been in persons aged 20 to 49. They represent 39% of Oregon's population and they account for 56% of COVID-19 cases.

Hospitalization and death rates increase with age, with persons 80 or older accounting for 51% of COVID-19 associated

Curry County's total number of cases is at 56, with one death as of Oct. 21. Oregon's total number of cases has reached 40,443 with the death toll

Pedestrian dies after being struck by car on Highway 101

BROOKINGS-On Tuesday, Oct. 13 at approximately 10:10 p.m., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to a vehicle crash on U.S. Highway 101 near milepost 358.

Preliminary investigation revealed a Toyota Camry, operated by Benjamin Demaris (64) of Crescent City, was southbound when he struck a pedestrian, Michael Christian (32) of Crescent City, as he walked across the highway.

Christian sustained life threatening injuries and was transported to Sutter Coast Hospital for treatment and then to Rogue Valley Hospital.

Christian was pronounced deceased at the hospital.

OSP was assisted by Curry County Sheriff's Office, Harbor Fire Department and Cal Ore Ambulance.

Oregon State Parks adds more hiker-biker pods

The Oregon State Parks and Recreation Commission accepted during a meeting Wednesday, Sept. 16, a donation of \$39,875 from Oregon Parks Forever for hiker-piker pods. Oregon Parks Forever had partnered with Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) to install hiker-biker pods in six state parks along the Oregon coast: Fort Stevens, Nehalem Bay, Cape Lookout, Devil's Lake, Cape Blanco and Harris Beach.

Robin Wilcox, planning manager for OPRD, said the pods have lockers that have charging stations inside of them. The goal is to have 11 hiker-biker pods with lockers, electronic charging stations and bike fix-it stations at 11 parks along the 362-mile long coastline.

"They're very popular with folks that are hiking and biking along the coast," Wilcox said during the meeting. "I think some folks who have been car camping have asked for some similar things in the tent camping sites."

According to the staff report, Oregon Parks Forever secured \$39,875 for three additional hiker-biker pods to be installed at three of the following five locations along the Oregon coast: Beverly Beach in Newport, Beachside in

Waldport, Honeyman in Florence, Sunset Bay in Coos Bay or Humbug Mountain in Port Orford. OPRD is able to decide which of the three sites are currently the highest priority and most feasible.

Associate Director Chris Havel said OPRD currently has bike pods at Fort Stevens, Devil's Lake, Cape Blanco, Harris Beach, Cape Lookout, Bullards Beach and Nehalem Bay. The lockers and other

pod features are all firstcome, first-served. The lockers provide a space for bicyclists to store their gear, secured with their own lock.

"The features of a standard pod – lockers, a place to charge devices, a tool station – fill in the gaps that many bikers experience since they travel so light," Havel said. "Our standard hiker-biker sites are just a space to pitch a

These upgrades provide convenience and added safety, Havel added, as keeping cell phones and GPS devices fully charged for a long trip is important. Having a locker to store some possessions gives hikers and bikers the opportunity to explore the park or shower without worry of lost or stolen

Returning your ballot Ballots were mailed to Curry County voters last week.

Voters can mail their ballots free of charge, but should mail them by Oct. 27 to ensure they get back to the courthouse by election day.

The county also has three drop boxes where people can return their ballots. The official drop boxes are located at the Brookings and Port Orford city halls and at the Curry County Courthouse in Gold Beach.

Through Oct. 21, a total of 6,375 voters in Curry County had returned their ballots, which is 33.5 percent of the county's 18,907 registered voters, according to the county elections department. Statewide, 16 percent of voters had returned ballots, 495,082 voters in all.



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

What do you feel are the most important issues facing the state?

Affordable workforce housing and related state land use restrictions. Childcare related to Covid closures of schools, Wildfire mitigation and fuels reduction, Public and Mental Health

How would you try to address those issues?

I continue to draft and pass legislation to address the housing crisis in our communities and across the state that helps incentivize the construction of workforce housing, changes land use laws to allow for ADU and additional housing and grows job opportunities in the trade related career sectors.

The COVID closures have severely impacted our students and their families. Many parents have been forced to choose staying at home with their children or their job. Childcare funding must be allocated to our rural communities so that these parents can continue to work, knowing their children are well

taken care of.

I continue to advocate, draft and pass legislation to address wildfire response, funding and fuels treatment. I worked to draft and pass the Good Neighbor Authority legislation, which focuses on forest fuels treatments in the Urban/Wildland interface and successfully advocated for and recently received \$1.8 million dollars towards that effort a few short weeks ago. We were also successful in working with DEQ to increase the needed days allowed for prescribed

Public and mental health are critically important to our communities and their residents, especially during the pandemic. I continue to work with our health partners to expand services and provide them with the needed resources to do so. I have been a strong advocate for the Curry Health Network (CHN) **Emergency Department** and recently, even with the economic hardships of the state, was able to secure \$2 million dollars to support CHN Emergency Department operations in Brookings.

What would you like to accomplish if re-elected?

To continue my work on all of the above. Additionally, to continue to help our fishers, farmers and ranchers and their industries as well as better local access to the public for their products. To get our rural region the resources it deserves with regards to state & federal funding, rather than allowing Portland and larger cities to take more than their share.

How should the state address the current **COVID-19/economic** crisis?

The recent economic forecast projects that the state has an additional \$200 million in revenues over it's pre-covid forecast. This is some good news,

representatives and the public? First and foremost, I work for the residents and constituents of House District 1 in the Oregon Legislature, and then the other 4.2 million people of Oregon. I have an opendoor policy and listen to all opinions on any given issue. As the Chair of the bicameral bipartisan Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus, I strive to work across the aisle on issues that impact our residents. From bipartisan legislation holding big pharma accountable for prescription drug increases, to protecting our coastal waters from oil & gas exploration, to allowing our Oregon Department of Forestry Fire Personnel to fight fires on federal land rather than the Feds "managing of fire", to coming up with sound Oregon solutions to reduce carbon emissions rather than a rural economically devastating Cap & Trade program, I will continue to work with and for the residents of House District 1 to better their families and communities. This bipartisan work and its accomplishments are evident with just the few examples above, in successfully bringing millions in project funding in a post COVID economic environment.

Rural economies, socially constructed through combined efforts of rural Oregonians, are integral to the success of the Just Transition envisioned in the Oregon Green New to compel them to provide Deal. I will always keep equal protection under the this in mind. law to victims of domestic

What would you like to accomplish if elected?

Because it touches on every outcome in every challenge before us, I would like to help fellow legislators focus through a climate responsibility lens that will inform sound political decision making in all areas of our work together on behalf of our districts.

I would like to move Oregon towards well managed, equitable HealthCare for All Oregonians, and to take part in science-based decision-making regarding climate resiliency and upsurging a sustainable economy that we welcome, design, and implement. These are tasks the Gen-X and Millennials are well equipped to take on, and will surge forward with, despite the COVID-19 pandemic. I will do my part to hold the policy doors open for their strategies to be thoroughly considered, so we can more than begin the forward movement we are allied around.

I will work to dispel the urban-rural-divide myth, by making sure it is not practiced in state decision making. And I will stay and work until each session is finished, for, at maximum, 2 terms, before I retire (again).

How should the state address the current **COVID-19/economic** crisis?


Legislators should consult with their constituents to find what their needs are, then report that information to the governor's office or other agencies involved in the relief efforts. to be certain the relief to the business community is at its maximum possible impact. They need to be following up in their districts to be certain the promised relief has found its way to the folks it is supposed to go to. Legislators should be following best healthcare recommendations themselves, for masking when in public, not touching faces, maintaining social distancing guidelines, washing hands often, self-quarantining if they have been exposed to virus, and setting other examples of best practices for members of the public and for businesses in their districts, especially the

ones put in place by the governor. They should be discouraging public gatherings where attendees do not mask or maintain social distance. They should be certain the testing for people in their districts is readily available, easily accessed by everyone, and has a short turn around time. And recovery of economic well being should become focused through the Oregon Green New Deal, with Oregon made, from Oregon timber, food and other agricultural products, ocean and river harvests, hemp products, cannabis products, and any other made-and-sold-by-Oregonians-to-each-otherand-our-neighbors-in-thewestern region, a priority re-emplacement of labor, not transportation, as the largest portion of the cost of goods in the state.

What do you feel the relationship should be between state representatives and the public?

State representatives specifically represent the interests of their districts. Involving local people in the decision-formation process is critical, as is forming alliances with people in surrounding districts that share regional sensibility and geographic proximity. Challenges that seem the same may need very different strategies to reach success in different locations. Local expertise is crucial in making informed policy decisions. I will strive for successful coalitions between Oregon neighbors, to stretch the idea of "local" into a regional thought process, to better utilize limited rural resources and connect remote, often weather-isolated populations into a thriving grid of such regions in our state.

The public should have access to state representatives through the mail, telephone, email, and in person wherever feasible. Social media and media access is also an important part of establishing ease and transparency of public access, although representatives should be able to maintain a private life not connected to their public service, which is increasingly challenging given the nature of social media. Representatives should make themselves available in Town Hall meetings with the general public, between every session of the legislature, in person if possible or by video with audience interaction easily accessed if in-person is not possible at the time.
