Three confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Curry County

Late Sunday evening, Curry County Public Health received information through Coos County Public Health of two Curry County residents who tested positive for the novel coronavirus (COVID-19).

According to a press release from Curry County Public Health Administrator Sherri Ward, the tests were performed in Coos County and those tests were confirmed positive Sunday for the COVID-19. The two individuals have been self-isolating.

It was not immediately clear why the two individuals

were tested in Coos County rather than Curry County.

Also on Sunday afternoon, Curry General Hospital notified Curry County Public Health of another confirmed COVID-19 case of a Curry County resident who has also been self-isolating. This is unrelated to the first two cases.

"Curry County Public Health has been in contact with all three individuals who are apparently symptom free at this time and will monitor them on a daily basis," Ward wrote in the press release.

The Oregon State Health Authority has been notified

and will be assisting Curry County with information and direction. No further information is being released at this time, said Curry County Director of Operations Julie Schmelzer in an email.


"It is imperative that we all follow the Oregon Health Authority, the Centers for Disease Control and the Governor's guidelines about social distancing, protecting yourselves and staying home to slow the spread and save lives," Ward wrote.

It is important to note that other than information from the OHA and CDC, press releases from

the Curry County Public Health administrator have the most accurate information, Ward stated. Information put out by other individuals in Curry County on COVID-19 without the Public Health administrator's input may not have the most accurate up-to-date information.

Curry County Public Health stated it will continue to keep the public informed with all the information they can to keep its citizens safe.

Del Norte's airport expects rough skies during pandemic

As the airline industry continues to feel the financial squeeze of less travel during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Del Norte County Regional Airport and the Brookings Airport have so far avoided the economic crunch.

The Del Norte County Regional Airport finds itself in a fairly unique situation operationally.

Randy Hooper, Del Norte County Airport Director, said this is because the airport receives a federal subsidy through the Department of Transportation's (DOT) Alternate Essential Air Service (AEAS) program. The program guarantees service in rural locations through a contract with specific carriers.

"A lot of the larger airports don't have an essential air service agreement, so there are a lot more, bigger questions for them," Hooper said.

However, many questions remain for Del Norte's airport, as the grant under the AEAS program was in the process of being renewed by Sept. 30. An online survey last month sought public input on priorities for continued and future service at Jack McNamara Field. Hooper said the initial date to send those community comments back to the DOT was April 14. But because of complications and health concerns over the coronavirus, that's been pushed out to May 14.

The airport currently has a contract with Contour Airlines to provide flights in and out of Oakland. But Hooper said it's out of his hands whether the federal government decides to continue its contract with Contour or go with another carrier.

"Either way, we expect an orderly transition, whether it's another round with Contour, or through a selection of a new carrier," Hooper

said. "The government would be giving them time set up operations, so they could be up and running Oct. 1. But with the coronavirus complications, it's a moving goal post. But I think we're still on track."

For now, Hooper said to not expect any disruption in service, as aviation is a sub-sector of transportation, which is considered a "critical infrastructure sector" by the federal government. Thus, the airport is required to remain open during emergencies such as this. However, he urges those who do not need to travel at this time to not do so.

With fewer flights, Hooper expects the regional airport can stay operational with fixed tenant contracts with Cal-Ore Life Flight and Federal Express and additional landing fees coming in through UPS.

We're making changes to get you a newspaper

Dear Reader,

Nine months ago, Country Media saved the twice-weekly newspapers in Crescent City and Brookings from an uncertain fate by buying them out of bankruptcy proceedings.

Our goal then was to implement a business model that would sustain those newspapers' long-term business operations and ensure their longevity.

That goal is unchanged. What has changed is the difficulty of achieving it, given the advent of the coronavirus pandemic, which may remain with us for months to come.

Longtime newspapers in California and Oregon now are working hard simply to survive. At least one Oregon daily has begun publishing just three days a week. Another has reduced its distribution from seven days each week to six.

And more than one weekly newspaper has ceased publication altogether.

As you can see from a quick drive down U.S. Highway 101, the virus's impact on local businesses is severe. Many stores have closed their doors, some permanently.

These local businesses rely on newspapers to connect them to potential customers. We, in turn, rely on their advertising dollars for 90% of our total revenue.

Business closures intended to prevent the spread of the coronavirus have dramatically reduced our advertising revenues. While we all hope to emerge from this situation soon, there's no way to predict the duration or severity of the pandemic on the economy.

We must make some changes to ensure the sustainability of the newspaper business. So beginning the week of April 12, we

Curry Health Network reduces workforce

Decline in revenues due to COVID-19 precautions lead to layoffs, contract changes

Curry Health Network (CHN) outlined staff cuts that have been made and other expense reduction measures during a special meeting on April 3.

CHN CEO Ginny Williams reported on the organization's economic situation and what they are doing "to ensure financial viability" in the future. The hospital's forecast modeling calls for about \$2 million in revenues

every month, but work volumes at the hospital began declining around March 8. Revenues took a sharp decline after Governor Kate Brown declared the cessation of elective surgical and medical procedures on March 15 to preserve Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

Since the outbreak, clinic office visits dropped by 65%, elective surgeries have dropped by 80%, emergency room visits in both Brookings and Gold Beach by 60%, and lab work by 70%.

"The drops are significant," Williams said, "because these drive our revenue."

Workforce Reductions

After analyzing what services are most essential to support patient and emergency services, CHN implemented a workforce reduction plan of \$1.4 million each month, which will be fully realized after the first month. The delay is due to payments of severance and paid time off owed to employees who were furloughed.

Staff reductions affected 192 employees either through layoffs, reductions in hours or changes to per diem contracts. The strategy was to offer medical providers the option to move from full-time to per diem, which would allow the hospital to rebound as volumes come back after the outbreak. The providers are eligible for unemployment insurance, Williams said, adding "It was the kindest way to treat our employ-

However, Contour is experiencing a rough go during these times. Hooper said in February, Contour's operations were down to 80% from normal. Today, that's down to 10%. He explained they still provide flights out of Crescent City at 7 a.m. and return flights at 7 p.m.

"What they did previously is after Oakland, the same plane would continue on to Santa Barbara and then on to Las Vegas and turn around for the return trips. But because of the drop in demand, the second leg has suspended because Contour doesn't get a subsidy for that leg of the flight," Hooper said.

To compound Contour's financial losses, its headquarters were severely damaged during the tornadoes in Tennessee March 2 and 3.

"The tornadoes destroyed their home base of operations, so their losses were already in the of tens of millions before the drop of traffic," Hooper said. "They're going through tough times for sure."

Hooper isn't sure either what the times ahead will be for Del Norte's airport. Its peak season is June, July and August. He said while other regions are expected to have reached their peak exposure to the coronavirus by then, there's no guarantee when that will be here.

"The coronavirus seems to be geographic. So, we'll reach a different peak in our neck of the woods. Public health people keep saying that's further out. But God

forbid we be in a position that happens during our summer peak in Del Norte. That could obviously influence continuation with service," Hooper said.

In the meantime, Hooper said to check in with the airport's website, www.flycrescentcity.com, for updates and guidelines to help prevent the spread of the coronavirus, especially by eliminating all but essential travel plans.

Meanwhile the Brookings Airport, as a small municipal airport, does not rely on commercial traffic to remain operational.

"We do get a lot of calls asking how do I get a flight into Brookings," said Jay Trost, Brookings Deputy Director of Public Works and Development Services. "I tell them, no, you want to fly into Crescent City."

Trost said Brookings does not get a lot of traffic overall, other than Ameri-flight delivering UPS packages, Cal-Ore Reach delivering air medical service and local aircraft owners. Trost said the Brookings Airport has not felt the effects of coronavirus restrictions yet.

"Operations have been business as usual. We have taken some precautions at the fuel farm, taking sanitation precautions after people are done fueling," he said.

Trost added that while the airport has seen a large reduction in private use recently, that shouldn't impact overall operations. He said funding comes out of the city's general fund and is supplemented through ground leases.

"Not much has changed in our revenue stream," Trost said.

Southwest regional airport 'will survive' this pandemic

NORTH BEND — The last time Helen Mineau saw flights canceled like she is now it was after 9/11.

As chairman of the Coos County Airport District for Southwest Oregon Regional Airport and owner of Globe Travel in North Bend, Mineau has a front-row seat to another economic crisis. Except this time, it is being brought on by the novel coronavirus, which she said is different than the 2001 terrorist attack because, "Now we have no idea what's going on ... But the reality is it will probably take another month or two before it goes back to normal because people are still getting sick."

Though the stay-in-place orders have taken a toll on travel and local businesses, SORA Executive Director Theresa Cook said the airport itself is stable for now.

"In the short term ... it doesn't affect how we manage the airport," Cook said.

This is because the airport sees most of its revenue from businesses and organizations renting space on its property. Right now, the airport has 33 renters. This includes office buildings for Oregon State Police, Department of Human Services, Bureau of Land Management, FedEx and UPS.

"We have a very stable base of tenants," Cook explained. "In the long term, we have some businesses that aren't essential services and will feel

an impact."

She pointed out that some of these non-essential services might face trouble making rent if the pandemic and restrictions continue.

"Right now, the Federal Aviation Administration doesn't have an allowance for us to give waivers for airlines or airport users, but we will look at it if — in the long term — it becomes an issue for them to pay rent," she said.

Though the airport isn't seeing an impact in loss of revenue, it has been working to establish flights to Portland. It received a \$750,000 grant from the Department of Transportation, which the airport applied for almost a year and a half ago. Due to the government shutdown last year, the grant wasn't approved until recently.

"... In a way that is fortunate because we might have negotiated a route by now and that might have been shut down," Cook said. "Now when (the pandemic) is over, the airlines that survive — hopefully all but I've heard smaller ones might not — they will look for airports that have capital. So, we might be looked at more favorably and have less competition to get flights to Portland more regularly."

But Mineau sees startling similarities between 9/11 to the ongoing pandemic in terms of her travel business and the cancellation of flights.

In the aftermath of the 2001 attack, she had to lay off all of her employees at Globe Travel because she had no

income at the time to pay them.

"... Which is kind of what's happening now," she said. "Right now, every day you get a new list of rules and airlines (that) aren't giving back any money. It is constantly changing and is more frustrating now because it was easier when no one flew for 10 days"

Now Mineau is busy trying to bring home local residents who were traveling while flights started to be canceled.

"We are working to get them home," she said, adding that as of Thursday last week they were dealing with 75 families. "We're taking care of them by being proactive and not reactive. We're getting them home and are making sure they know what's going on."

According to Mineau, the airport is also entering its busiest season which spans from April through September. Most of those flying are golfers intent on visiting Bandon Dunes Golf Resort, which also has restrictions in place due to the pandemic.

"Right now, May is booked full, all the way into June," Mineau said. "They book 11 months ahead of time."

She said the airport sees even more air traffic in the summer months from corporate jets that fly in for business.

"The airport will survive," Mineau assured. "And from the travel perspective, I'm telling people be patient ... Let's pray this gets over quickly."





ees.”

In addition to furloughs and per diem contracts, the management team voluntarily took a 20% reduction in pay. Traveling positions were eliminated, which saved \$353,000. Besides doctors and nurses, the dietary staff was reduced by offering limited food options for staff, and environmental services reduced staff to correspond with strategies to reduce the scope of housekeeping duties by closing off areas for some clinical services and having managers clean their areas. Some staff are voluntarily sharing reduced hours on a rotating basis.

Hours have been reduced at all facilities, with closures on Saturdays and condensing same-day clinic appointments into morning hours between 8 a.m. and noon when possible. CHN can do Telehealth visits from three computer stations and plans to expand to nine.

Staffing has been reduced across the organization from nursing, to physical therapy, human resources, labs, radiology and more.

“We are not alone in this,” Williams said. “It’s impacting all hospitals in rural places.”

Another hospital in the state will be laying off 200 employees on Monday, she noted.

A large public audience, including some staff and former staff, attended the Friday, April 3 virtual meeting to express concerns about the staff reductions.

Sara Dickerson is a family nurse practitioner, who has been terminated as of April 7.

“What is most upsetting to me was the treatment of my medical assistant, who

was terminated on March 31,” she said. Because she was terminated in March, she has no medical insurance for April.

“It will be difficult to resurrect the clinic at Curry Medical Center [in Brookings],” said Dr. Ken Manuele. “It’s extremely difficult to replace physicians. We’ve got to be careful about shooting ourselves in the foot. Curry Medical Center will need to beg, borrow or steal to keep medical providers.”

Manuele noted the county had lost its only pediatrician and several physicians.

“The real health care crisis will occur after this is over,” he said. “How do we get out of the hole we are digging?”

Resident Sarah Kaplan-ski commented on the loss of pediatrician, Dr. Harris because her child is a special-needs patient who views him as his favorite physician. In a good news moment during the call, Dr. Harris spoke up and said he decided to accept a per diem contract because his “patients need a pediatrician.”

Dr. Cornelius “Connie” Britt requested information about N-95 mask availability at the hospital during the call.

“As an employee over the age of 60 and in the high-risk category, we get fitted every year for N-95 masks but I haven’t been advised whether one is to be provided to me,” he said.

“Ample supplies of surgical and N-95 masks are available for all staff,” Williams replied.

COVID-19 Surge Plan

Staff reports also outlined their surge plan in their current environment, including facilities and staffing, in the event of COVID-19 cases emerging in Curry County. As of April 5, there were zero confirmed COVID-19

cases in the county.

“The goal is to optimize what we have right now to keep patients and staff safe,” said a CHN spokesperson.

Already, they have implemented a plan to keep patients with respiratory symptoms separate from other patients coming to the hospital because it helps conserve PPE. In a future scenario, those patients who are “safe” will follow a blue path to a separate floor of the hospital, while patients who are symptomatic of COVID-19 or flu will follow a yellow path to the emergency room.

Once the emergency room is at capacity, the hospital has a waiver to expand the number of beds. The hospital has the physical capacity to expand from its current 18 beds to handle up to 47 patients, but that does not include staffing for those beds. The hospital currently has six ventilators.

Testing, Testing, Testing

The hospital has a testing capacity of 94 swabs on hand as of April 3. The swabs are replenished in small amounts as they are used, reflective of what they are testing, Williams said. Through April 3, the hospital has performed 60 tests. Currently, the tests through Quest have a turnaround of anywhere from 3 to 14 days.

Rapid testing through Abbott will be a year out to implement, Williams said. The hospital has ordered a cartridge for their existing Genex equipment that will allow them to test for COVID-19 onsite. They currently use the

equipment for testing for flu, which takes about 40 minutes to learn results. That testing capability with the additional cartridge will eventually allow the hospital to receive quicker results but the equipment will need to be calibrated and go through quality assurance first. Staff reported they are the only hospital up to Reedsport that can upgrade their equipment to test onsite, so their request for the new cartridge is a high priority in the state.

Other Business

In other business, the Board of Directors unanimously approved policy directives for employees who have been exposed to COVID-19. Workers who are exposed to high- and medium-risk patients are to self-monitor but are not restricted from working other than to wear a mask for 14 days. Low-risk exposures do not require wearing a mask at work.

Future

CHN will hold a similar meeting later this week to discuss financial plans. According to State Representative David Brock Smith (R-District 1), \$200 million has been set aside for rural health care facilities and hospitals by the state to get them through the crisis but it has not been allocated until a special session is called.

Williams also noted that the Oregon Hospital Association has indicated they are eligible for help through the CARES Act passed by Congress on March 27.

two with results from eight tests pending. The county stated that 111 tests have been administered.

Dr. Warren Rehwaldt, Del Norte County Public Health Officer, said in a press release on Thursday, April 2, the first patient is a middle-aged male, who is in self-quarantine, recovering at home.

“All steps for isolation of the case have been implemented. We are investigating the possibility of travel as a source

but, at the moment, the case is still classified as unknown,” Rehwaldt said.

The man’s identity is being withheld due to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), a federal law that protects sensitive patient health information from being disclosed without the patient’s consent or knowledge.

Rehwaldt updated the information the health department had on the case during an online conference Friday, saying it was unclear yet how the patient contracted the virus.

“We don’t think it’s travel related. We’re still classifying it as ‘unknown.’ The reason is it is probably wrong to presume community spread until we see more cases we can confirm or identify in any other way. And then we would make the conclusion of community spread. Going to leave it in the unknown category for the moment,” Rehwaldt said.

“This is not really unexpected. I really expected a case before this. From our perspective, it doesn’t change very much. We still want people to do things we’ve been telling them. We still need people to shelter in place. Keep doing the social distancing we’ve been talking about. Pretty much everything is the same. We just want people to sharpen their focus a little more. It’s clear we have a case here and we’re probably going to get more,” Rehwaldt said.

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


