

State outlines plans for public health in county

In April, the Curry County Board of Commissioners relinquished the county’s public health duties to the state in reaction to a letter from the Oregon Health Authority, which said the county was not fulfilling its public health responsibilities.

Since then, the Oregon Health

Authority assumed some legally required public health responsibilities and has contracted with Josephine County to supply other services, such as Women Infant and Children (WIC) services, to Curry. As of July 1, OHA will take over the remainder of public health services in the county, including:

- Monitoring communicable diseases and controlling outbreaks,

including the COVID-19 pandemic response.

- Ensuring access to safe drinking water.
- Ensuring access to WIC services.
- Licensing and inspecting food, pool and lodging facilities.

Members of the Oregon Health Authority hosted a town hall for Curry County residents Tuesday to

provide more details and answer questions about the transition. Below are some of the questions residents asked during the meeting, as well as the responses provided by OHA.

By what means will public health information and notices be communicated to Curry residents?

OHA: “We are communicating with residents of the community

with every opportunity. We have distributed press releases when we have updates to the transfer process. We will soon provide a press release about WIC services, which will let people know where they can access those services and contact information.”

“We will be giving regular up-

Volunteers work to track Chinook salmon

A fish trap that has been collecting out-migration data from Chinook salmon in the Winchuck River near Brookings for the past 30 years was nearly scrapped for the season due to low water levels.

However, rain showers earlier this month revived the river, as well as this year’s iteration of the longtime project, which is operated through a partnership between Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife’s Salmon and Trout Enhancement Program and volunteers from the South Coast Fisherman group.

John Weber, STEP biologist with ODFW, has been leading the project on the Winchuck since 1992. Weber said he was glad to see the trap installed again but warned low water levels could be an annual issue.

“It was looking bad,” said Weber. “This water that I’m standing in now that’s knee deep or more, it was barely ankle deep.”

The screw trap spins like a concrete mixer and funnels fish into a live box at the narrow end of the drum. In doing so, it collects many juvenile Chinook salmon, called smolts, during their summer migration from the Winchuck to the ocean.

The project is a capture, recapture study. After the trap is installed, volunteers work in two-person teams, five days a week, measuring, counting and marking each captured Chinook smolt by clipping a fin, at which point they are released upstream and hopefully recaptured in the trap. A statistical formula is then used to estimate a greater population.

Can the ocean adapt to rising water temperatures?

Rising temperatures, possibly from man-caused climate change, are putting ocean life at risk. Maybe.

During a presentation Thursday to celebrate the 50th year of Oregon Shores, Steve Palumbi, a biologist and author, said studies have shown some ocean animals have the ability to evolve and adapt to the changes in the water.

Palumbi, who also works as a professor at Stanford University, was invited to talk about the Extreme Life of the Sea, which is also the title of a book he and his son wrote.

“I’ve spent a lot of time on the Oregon coast,” he said. “It’s a fabulously beautiful place.”

Palumbi started off by talking about the extreme life in the ocean. For example, some rock-

fish can live to be 120 years old. And some fish can “fly.”

“Fish and marine life are amazing creatures,” Palumbi said. “Flying fish are only fast out of the water, and they don’t actually fly, they glide.”

Palumbi said the fish evolved to fly as a means of survival because that is their only way to escape faster hunters.

“What are really the fastest fish?” Palumbi asked. “We eventually came down to the billfish. Swordfish and marlins are the fastest fish in the ocean. They can get up to 40 miles per hour. These marlins and billfish are not only swimming at 40 miles per hour, they’re eating and 40 miles per hour.”

As the water temperature has risen, going up 1.5 degrees over the last 100 years, one thing that has intrigued marine biologists are animals that can survive in the hottest water. In the ocean,

that’s near the hydrothermal vents off the west coast.

Palumbi said red tube worms thrive in the hot water, and one specific worm, the Pompei worm, is stunning to scientists. The worm lives at the end of the underwater smoker chimneys, with half its body inside and half outside. One end of the worm is at 176 degrees with the other end at 35 degrees.

“The worm lives at iced water to hot tea in the length of its body, which is about an inch,” Palumbi said. “If we are all concerned about the oceans for the next 50 years, we need to think about the extremes.”

Palumbi said as the water changes, life in it has four options. It can move, acclimate, adapt or die. Scientists are conducting studies with the idea of seeing if something can be done



dates throughout this process to make sure everyone knows what's going on. We will be updating the website regularly. Of course, we want to hear from you as well, and anything you want to get more information about."

Will reproductive and sexual health services be offered?

OHA: "We are working to build our clinical connections within the community. We do want to make sure that we do have access points for reproductive health services, so that's going to be a big focus for OHA along with other public health clinical services. We'll share more information as we have those connections built up with the provider community."

How does OHA plan to address low vaccination rates and vaccine hesitancy?

"We recently secured additional funding to address some of these questions around vaccine confidence and low turnout rates. We understand things have been moving quickly in the county recently, especially with this ongoing public health trans-

fer, and we know that there have been a lot of questions."

"We have a strong partner base now and we have a regular supply of vaccines moving into the county. We also have been increasing the number of vaccination events throughout the county. You should start to see those numbers climb in the near future."

I am worried about coverage in the north part of the county. Will OHA partner with providers in north county?

OHA: "We are not limiting partners. We are excited to be modernizing public health with as many community partners as possible, so we're trying to think broadly about who can serve the community, and who can get to the places we need to get to, to ensure everyone in the county has access. We are open to ideas and looking forward to talking to you about that."

What procedures will OHA assist with in case of wildfire in Curry County?

OHA: "Our primary responsibility in case of wildfire is communicating the risk of wildfire smoke to the community. We'll work with local governments and municipalities within the county, as well as emergency

management to let people know about those risks to wildfire smoke as they occur, or hopefully right before they impact people."

"We also work with your health systems and hospitals to evacuate. A coordinated evacuation is something we have had to test before."

"Throughout the wildfire season, we often communicate about what people can do to keep themselves safe, including resources they can access, places they can go to get away from the smoke and how to protect loved ones, neighbors and friends."

How can community-based organizations assist with providing non-mandated services?

OHA: "Our connections with community-based organizations within the county is absolutely essential, particularly as we are trying to reach our goal of eliminating health inequities by 2030. The communities that you help to support, and the networks and trust that you build, are essential for us to be able to move the needle on that for Curry County."

"I think there are plenty of ways we can explore working together, whether that's sharing information or being able to engage with the community as we start to make plans. There could be many touch points and opportunities to work together."

Resident: Who will assume vital records for Curry County?

OHA: "Nothing will change with vital statistics. In Curry County, it is run out of the county clerk's office and you also have access to your vital records through the OHA vital records website, or through our phone number."

Will easing restrictions lead to another surge?

As Oregon moves closer to lifting most COVID restrictions, experts at Oregon State University admit the thought of easing government regulations could lead to a surge in new cases.

Oregon Gov. Kate Brown has promised to reopen the economy and lift most COVID restrictions when the state reaches 70 percent of adults who have received at least one dose of the COVID vaccine.

As of Tuesday, the state needed just more than 40,000 people to get the first dose to reach the number.

Brett Tyler, the director of the Center for Genome Research at Oregon State University, said he was concerned about the impact of lifting restrictions.

“In Britain, they have 80 percent vaccinated, and they’re having a surge right now,” Tyler said. “I’m very concerned if all the regulations are dropped it will send the wrong message to people. They will get the message,

oh, it’s over, I can go back to business and normal. So, I’m very concerned there will be a surge.”

Chi Chunhuei, a professor of global health at OSU, said a mass surge was not likely, but he was concerned more people need to get vaccinated.

“With the level of vaccinations we have now, I don’t expect to see a big surge,” Chunhuei said. “I’m still concerned about the people who are not vaccinated, given the potential of the Delta variant to become the dominant one.”

Chunhuei said he was concerned younger children, who are not eligible for the vaccine, could be the source of new cases unless vaccines are approved for younger children.

While the Delta variant is causing concern worldwide, Oregon has not seen a major outbreak.

“We track the frequency of the different variants,” said Courtney Campbell, a professor of medical ethics at OSU. “Right now, it seems Oregon is rather lucky, and

the number of Delta cases is very low. Our wastewater testing has picked up a few weak signs here and there.

Tyler said even though numbers are low, there is concern.

“There is concern about the variants,” he said. “In Britain, 99 percent of new infections result from the Delta variant. It also shows the ability to overcome immunity in people who only have the first vaccine.”

Tyler said those who are fully vaccinated show strong resistance to all variants of the disease.

The OSU experts also said even as the state reopens, there needs to continue to be an effort to get more people vaccinated.

“I see it as we still need to push for reaching a majority of the population with a vaccine,” said Daniel Lopez-Covallus, a professor and expert on health equity issues. “I think the primary model of using mass vaccination sites has been exhausted and we need to shift goals, meet people where they are, in communities, in workplac-

es. We cannot afford not to continue to push.

“There is some evidence that 70 percent is not enough, particularly when we have some segment of the population, children under 12, who are not eligible for the vaccine. The 70 percent, I see as the low end of the threshold. From my perspective, it has to go well beyond that.”

With vaccines slowing, the experts also discussed how to get people resistant to getting vaccinated to take the shot. Aimee Huff, a consumer behavior expert at OSU, said the state needs to change the way it is marketing the vaccine.

“People really need just one good reason,” Huff said. “For a lot of people, the good

reason for them is they trust the science. For some, the one good reason they need is they won’t be able to do something if they don’t have the vaccine.

“They won’t be able to travel, they won’t be able to be with friends. I think the public health message now needs to be more nuanced and more targeted.”

But, it didn’t end there. When handing off the citation, an arresting officer told Gayman she could not drive her scooter home, as she still did not have a helmet. So, when Gayman took her citation and drove off anyway, police pursued her in a low-speed chase with sirens and lights and requested backup.

Once Gayman arrived at her home, police arrested her inside her garage for eluding.

She was later convicted by a jury and sentenced to five days in jail.


Now, more than two and half years after her arrest, the state court of appeals has reversed Gayman’s conviction with a June 9 ruling. In their report, state judges concluded the trial court “plainly erred,” in their conviction because Gayman was operating a motor assisted wheelchair — top speed of 23 miles per hour — not a motor vehicle.

According to the ruling, a person must be operating a motor vehicle in order to be charged with eluding or fleeing a police officer.


“The actions of the state in this case — from the police officers’ decision to pursue defendant in a low-speed chase for the ... traffic violation of not wearing a helmet, to the prosecutor’s decision to pursue a felony charge under those circumstances, to the attorney general’s office’s decision to defend those decisions on appeal — should not be ignored,” the court ruled.

In March of 2020, Gayman filed a federal lawsuit against the city of Brookings, as well as the Brookings Police Department, the Chief of Police Kelby McCrae, and several officers. According to the complaint, Gayman is seeking \$500,000 in damages, as well as punitive damages of an unknown amount. The complaint claims Gayman’s rights, under the American Disability Act, were violated by the arresting officers.

Since the incident, Gayman has moved out of Brookings and could not be reached for comment. Police Chief Kelby McCrae did not respond to a request for comment.

Guest Opinion Looking back to when water was plentiful

During his 50 years in rural western Colorado, Jamie Jacobson has seen a lot of flooding. While caretaking a farm in 1974, Jacobson watched three acres of its riverfront float away. More recently, it's been drought, and then worse drought. Jacobson farms on Lamborn Mesa, perched above Paonia, population 1,500. He keeps his orchard of peaches, nectarines and cherries alive thanks to the Minnesota Canal that serves 170 customers.

The ditch is nine miles long and carries water from the snow-pack that's accumulated around 12,725-foot-high Mt. Gunnison. This mountain of many ridges used to hold water like a sponge, but snowfall has been light year after year, and the ground sucks up a lot of the melting snow.

"Back in the 1970s it was different," says Jacobson, who moved from New York where he started his career as a cameraman on film shoots. "Paonia was snow-covered in winter, and when the melt came, the river tore at its banks. One of my first jobs was using machinery to stuff boulders into junked cars and then cabling them to the riverbank. Now it's scary because of water that isn't there."

This summer, Jacobson's ditch rider told him irrigation water would run out by the end of June. "That would have been unthinkable decades ago," Jacobson says. But the canal's two reservoirs have filled only one year out of the last four. "In the old days, daily highs in summers were in the 80s," Jacobson says. "Last May it got really warm, and in June this year the temperature is hitting 100 degrees."

So it's not surprising that his orchard is suffering. "My trees are stressed, and some I've had to let go. I've lost a great deal," he says flatly.

But Jacobson, 75, remains resilient and upbeat, though he was diagnosed with arthritis at age 10 and has suffered from back pain all his life. He even underwent a kidney transplant from a friend three years ago.

Now getting around in a wheelchair, he still hopes to fly in his ultralight - equipped with a parachute. During the 1970s, he enjoyed a moment of fame when he turned 20,000 gallons of spoiled apple cider into alcohol that substituted for gasoline.

"Coal company execs visiting their mines around Paonia all wanted to try out my alcohol-fueled car," he recalls. "We had some great joyrides on moonshine."

Jacobson's ditch company was founded in 1893 by farmers and ranchers who knew they had to

import water to make the semi-desert land valuable.

"They dug those ditches with hand labor and mule scrapers and built the canals incrementally," says Western historian George Sibley. "You either bought in with money or sweat equity, enlarging the canals as neighbors down the ditch bought in." It's a similar story throughout the Western states, moving water from mountains through a system of prior appropriation - first to put water to work, first to claim it.

For example, Southern Idaho, in the grip of extreme drought, is braced for prior appropriation cutbacks. Junior water users in the Wood River Valley who pump water from wells have been notified that their water might be shut off early this summer. Meanwhile New Mexico's ancient system utilizes a water master or mayordomo to administer cutbacks. And if one state knows drought, it's Nevada, where Las Vegas sends most of its sewage-treated water back to where it came from - Lake Mead.

The water flowing through piped canals or open ditches into Paonia and its mesas was never meant to stick around. Farmers who flood-irrigate use roughly 20 percent of the water on their land. Eventually, that water may be reused by farmers and homeowners as much as seven times before crossing into Utah as part of the Colorado River.

These days, a lot less water ever gets there. The river's two big reservoirs, Lake Powell and Lake Mead, are only about 35 percent full, and river managers in the seven states that rely on the Colorado are trying to figure out how to cope. It's a daunting prospect, squeezing out water in the midst of a drying climate.

Meanwhile, Jacobson looks at his diminished orchard and hopes he'll have enough fruit for the people who came last summer. They brought their own baskets and wandered the orchard to pick what they wanted.

"People had a good time, and at \$1.50 per pound we sold out the crop last year," Jacobson says. "If we go down this year, we'll do it in style."

I suggest Mr. Brandon and his 29 petitioners contact the other Christian priests and ministers in Brookings who profess to follow the "Sermon On The Mount."


The fearful petitioners could or should request or even demand that the other ministers and priests who claim to follow Jesus's commandments and offer similar services to the needy of our town.

to avoid the fourth option.

“The ocean is a lot warmer than it has been, and that’s affecting organisms in a pretty strong way,” Palumbi said. “But if the worm living at 176 degrees can adapt to it, what are the chances other species can adapt?”

He said some fish species have already started moving in response to changing temperatures. He said as water temperatures rise, many fish that live in cold water are moving north to maintain the water temperature they prefer. Canary rockfish, which are currently spread throughout the west coast, are expected to move all the way to the Aleutian Islands by 2080.

“Evolution is pretty common and pretty visible in ocean situations,” Palumbi

said.

As an example, he pointed to pink salmon in Alaska. For years, nets captured the biggest salmon while allowing smaller fish to escape. In response, the salmon began to mature at a smaller size, allowing more and more to survive.

Outside of the water, bighorn sheep also evolved as hunters were only shooting the animals with the largest horns. The result is mature males started growing smaller horns, which led to longer lives and more time to breed.

Palumbi said he and others have spent a lot of time studying coral bleaching, which many believe is a direct result of rising temperatures. He said some areas of coral appear to be completely dead due to bleaching.

“When you look closer, you may see one piece of coral that’s bleached and one right next to it that’s not,” he said.

Palumbi said the difference could be a sign that coral is evolving rapidly to survive the changing ocean. Studies on the coral in Palau show some are heat tolerant.

“Heat-resistant colonies are pretty widespread,” Palumbi said. “They’re pretty common.”

The question for scientists is was the heat resistance due to adaptation or was it genetic? If it was genetic, via evolution, it could be a sign that coral could survive. Studies showed coral from heat-tolerant parents were also heat-tolerant, showing it is likely genetic.

“Coral can continue to evolve if climate change is not too severe,” Palumbi said. “This model shows coral can continue to evolve and keep up.”

Along with rising temperatures, acidification of the ocean is a growing concern. As CO2 levels rise, the ocean absorbs most of it, which

turns into carbonic acid. To see how the ocean is adapting, Palumbi and others studies sea urchins under different conditions.

“You basically could see evolution happening in these experiments,” Palumbi said. “The sea urchins have the ability to adapt to future CO2 events.”

With sea creatures showing the ability to evolve

quickly, what role does science play in protecting the ocean?

“Can we help?” Palumbi asked. “Can we move heat-resistant corals or kelp or sea urchins to other areas? Should we do that?”

That’s the question scientists have not reached a consensus about. While that discussion continues, Palumbi said the challenge

is one that must be faced on multiple fronts.

“Financial, economic and political arms of society must grapple with climate change to solve it over the next 50 years so that the oceans begin to recover in the next 100 years,” he said. “My job is to find the conditions, find the mechanisms so we can keep everything alive over the next decades.”

Igor and the Red Elvises to rock Azalea Park as concert series returns

Back by popular demand it's Igor and the Red Elvises. The project typically runs from mid-June until the end of August. ODFW provides weekly training sessions for the volunteers, although most of them have operated the trap before.

Fisherman and volunteer Matt Hafen said conservation and fishing goes hand-in-hand. "We want to keep the species alive and know what we got," said Hafen. "Try to keep the season open, so we can still fish for them." From estimations based on sample sizes collected in the trap, Chinook smolt populations migrating out of the Winchuck are healthy. Last year, ODFW estimated more than 157,000 juvenile Chinook left the small river, which was more than 50,000 fish than predicted, according to a recent ODFW report.

Weber said habitat improvements in the riparian areas around the Winchuck could be the reason for the healthy population sizes.

Chinook then return as adults during the fall spawn-

ing run, which spans from November to December. Last fall, an estimated 560 adult Chinook salmon returned to the Winchuck to spawn, which was 57 more fish than predicted. Another promising sign that conservation efforts may be working, said Weber. "There's a lot of talk about fish survival, and how well fishing is...from an outmigrant perspective, we seem to be seeding the population with the fish that are coming in," said Weber. Meaning, things are going well as far as fish making it to the ocean, however, ocean conditions have an equal role in survival, as Chinook spend the majority of their adult lives at sea. Weber said the data provided from the Winchuck trap program is vital, as it has allowed scientists and citizen-scientists alike to compare current Chinook populations to those of decades past, but the data wasn't always around. "When I first came around, there wasn't really historical data on out-migrant numbers, and I always wished that I could look back and find some," said Weber. "We've seen some interesting things here over the years, made a lot of different observations."
