# State begins takeover of public health services

## After county loses lawsuit, mental health services to move to OHA

After voting to disband Curry County Public Health last week, the board of commissioners are trying to tie up loose ends as the state assumes public health responsibilities in the county.

At an April 28 meeting, the board addressed some of those loose ends, which include the future of integral public health services, such as mental health care, women, infant and children (WIC) services and environmental services.

The county's mental health and addiction services are being offered through the nonprofit Curry Community Health, which has a contract with the county set to expire Dec. 30. However, in an April 13 press

release, CCH announced they had "been approved for legal dissolution." The release also stated the group is in the process of returning all state-funded behavioral health programs to the county. Those programs include: substance use disorder counseling, crisis response, gambling treatment and others.

After the announcement of the dissolution of their mental health provider, the county pursued litigation against CCH, demanding they provide services for the remainder of the year, as contracted.

On April 30, a district court ruled in favor of CCH, meaning their contract with the county will expire on June 30, according to Commissioner Court Boice.

# Musicians ready to perform again 'I chose to

## After losing a year due to COVID, local musicians are excited to return to the stage

After a difficult year of lockdowns and bans on gatherings, local musicians are beginning to hear the music at the end of the tunnel.

Tom Boylan is the one-man band known as Holus Bolus, which he describes as a "psychedelic acoustiloop.'

Psychedelic because his music smacks of Pink Floyd and other psych-rock influences, and "acoustiloop" because Boylan uses a looper pedal to individually record instruments, including drums, guitars and shakers. Altogether, it's as if Boylan has a full band behind

Pre-pandemic, Boylan was performing up to 80 times each year and touring across the West often.

In fact, he had a slew of shows booked across the Pacific Northwest when the virus struck last

"All my shows got cancelled, like immediately," said Boylan. "From the beginning of February to October, I didn't play any gigs at all. That was the first time in my whole life that I didn't have any gigs either with a band or my own solo stuff."

Boylan's first gig in the post-lockdown era was on Halloween, which is also his birthday, at Zola's On The Water in Brookings. With live music beginning to make a comeback, Boylan said he can tell listeners now have a deeper appreciation for something they haven't been able to experience in a while.

"You just see this totally different look in their eye, people are just super stoked," said Boylan.

Another local musician, Zack Freiwald, did what many other musicians across the world did during the pandemic, he performed in his living room and live streamed it.

"In the initial hype of covidness, that was the way to go and everyone was doing it, so I jumped all over it," said Freiwald.

If Boylan is psychedelic acoustiloop, Freiwald is more cozy campfire. During his COVID live streams, he did covers, as well as his own original stuff, usually in front of his fireplace and bookcase.

Freiwald, a prescribed fire and fuel technician at Redwood National and State Parks, said his songwriting has come a long way since he started 25 years ago.

"You may not always just be writing about the one event, or one person, but you might combine multiple things that happened to you over the course of time, but they are semi-related and end up making a tolerable song," said Freiwald.

Freiwald said he has used the last

## Curry remains in moderate risk amid state virus spike

Curry County will stay in the moderate-risk category of COVID-19 restrictions for another week, Oregon officials announced Tuesday.

Virus cases remained steady last week, with 39 cases reported in the previous two weeks and a 3.8% test positivity rate, almost identical to the week before.

The figures are a stark comparison to the rest of the state, where cases have been continuing to rise over the last several weeks.

On Tuesday, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown announced 15 counties would move out of the extreme-risk category of virus restrictions as the statewide hospitalization steadied slightly to below the state's

threshold for imposing the strictest category of restrictions.

"Based on today's numbers, I am keeping my commitment to Oregonians. Beginning Friday, all counties in Extreme Risk will return to High Risk. With Oregonians continuing to get vaccinated each week, my expectation is that we will not return to Extreme Risk again for the duration of this pandemic," Brown wrote in a press release Tuesday.

"I know this will bring relief to many across the state. However, the lifting of Extreme Risk health and safety measures comes with great personal responsibility for us all,"

the governor wrote. As of Monday, 351 in the state were hospitalized with the virus.

# County abandons OpenGov software

Curry County government is abandoning its accounting software, OpenGov, after spending \$140,000 on the rollout of the program.

"The bottom line is we are out money," said Commissioner Court Boice.

Local governments use accounting software to record and report how funds are used and managed. In a June 2019 report by former finance director Sharlyn Harvey, she recommended switching the county's accounting software from Caselle to OpenGov for a number of reasons.

The report stated the county's

last five audits had demonstrated a "history of material insufficiencies, material weaknesses and a lack of internal controls...Current operational practices create heavy workloads at an above average cost to taxpayers."

Later in the report Harvey wrote, "OpenGov is a cosy-effective solution that promotes accuracy, efficiency, unity and transparency.'

In December 2019, the board of commissioners voted 2-1 to approve switching to OpenGov at the former finance director's request.

Commissioners Court Boice and Chris Paasch voted yes, while former Commissioner Sue Gold

## save lives': Governor defends lockdown

Oregon Gov. Kate Brown defended her decision to impose more COVID-19 restrictions on some parts of the state the same day 15 Oregon counties were forced to close indoor dining and recreation.

'Cases are widespread, driven by new, more contagious variants. Oregon leads the nation for our rate of increase in cases over the last two weeks," Brown said Friday. "I was presented with data showing two paths Oregon could take."

Brown explained last week's decision to cancel a warning period and force the counties into the extreme-risk category of virus restrictions as the choice between those two paths: One path without restrictions and with additional virus deaths, and another path with

more restrictions and fewer deaths. "As your governor, I chose to save lives," Brown said.

Since she announced her plan to re-impose the restrictions on indoor dining and recreation, the governor has faced significant opposition from impacted businesses and local government leaders concerned about the damaging economic effects of the plan.

Earlier this week, dozens of county officials from across the state signed onto a letter from the Association of Oregon Counties and the Oregon Restaurant & Lodging Association, calling on the governor to pull back on her plan.

"The variants are indeed troublesome, and we share your concern for their spread. But shutting down our restaurants and further depriving Oregonians of their right to make calculated community engagement risks when the virus continues to spread elsewhere will not result in success," the 78 county commissioners wrote in the letter.

The county leaders pointed to the toll the pandemic's restrictions have taken on their communities and economies, saying the restrictions are dividing communities "rather than bringing Oregonians together" and asking for greater local control over pandemic restrictions.

In response, Brown pointed to the state of the virus.

"What I would respond to in

Jewell was an active Mason for more than 46 years, first in the Port Orford Lodge and, after 2019, in the Bandon Lodge.


He was a Master Mason

Curry Community Health comment on this story, however, their earlier press release includes these excerpts, "CCH will equip patients with resources and information regarding when the crisis services will be available, and the number they can call to access care...Our goal is to ensure continuity of care with little to no disruption...By returning the Oregon Health Authority behavioral health programs to the county... services are expanding, not reducing. We anticipate that the number of service providers in the community will increase."

Sheriff John Ward commented on the importance of having readily available mental health services for subjects who are arrested during a mental health crisis.

"The sheriff's office, the local police department and the state department use mental health services every day," said Ward. "When we deal with suicidal people and people with mental illness every day, we contact mental health locally...We take them to the hospital and mental health is supposed to come deal with that. If they don't, we have to take them and put them right back to the situation we pulled them out of."

As for other services, WIC duties were carried out through Josephine County Public Health, however, those services were transferred over to the Oregon Health Authority on May 2.

Josephine County had also been coordinating environmental services for Curry County, which includes

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handling of restaurant inspections and environmental complaints, but those also transferred to OHA on May 2.


During the meeting, Paasch rebuked the other commissioners for voting to disband public health.

"Basically, our public health will be run from Portland and basically everything will be long distance," he

Boice defended his vote. "We would have liked to maintain this, it's one of the toughest decisions I've ever made, but I'm going to stake my reputation on being able to work with OHA," said

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




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## Some regions could avoid virus surge with precautions

Vaccinations and gathering safely could be the keys for some communities to avoid the surge in case rates and virus hospitalizations seen across the state, according to a panel of Oregon State University experts.

"The larger share of the population that is fully vaccinated the better, the better the shield," said Daniel López-Cevallos, an OSU professor of ethnic studies with a focus on health equity, during a panel April 27.

While much of Oregon is seeing large increases in case counts in what experts have called the "fourth wave" of the virus, some counties, including Coos, Curry, Tillamook, Lincoln, and Clatsop still have virus numbers low enough to keep them out of the state's extreme-risk category.

For those counties. López-Cevallos said vaccination could have the potential to help prevent infections

and a move to that level of pandemic restrictions.

"The more, I think in rural communities particularly, (effective you are) in reaching your community, and getting the vaccines to them, (the more) you'll be in a better position to weather that next wave that we're seeing in other parts of the state," López-Cevallos said.

Still, vaccinations take time, with doses still hard to access in some areas and with time required between

In the meantime, Chunhuei Chi, the director of the university's Center for Global Health, said community members can take steps to avoid spreading the virus until they're vaccinated.

"Based on the Oregon Health Authority's statistics, one of the biggest contributions to the peak, to the spike in Oregon recently, has been group gatherings. All kind of group gatherings," Chi said. "So one way to prevent that before you have enough of the population vaccinated is to restrict the group gatherings, particularly indoor."

And Marion Ceraso, an OSU professor affiliated with the university's extension service, said local communities will need to continue finding new ways to administer vaccines as more become available.

"I think local communities really are beginning to see that now that they have full availability to vaccinate everyone, and that they have the supply, that they're needing to reach out ... through other mechanisms," Ceraso said. "Not just physicians' offices, but also some communities, some counties are reaching out, sending messages to community-based groups to say, 'can we bring a vaccine clinic to you? Can we bring it to your local

Beyond the preventative impact, federal officials this week provided another reason for community members to get vaccinated, which some experts say could keep demand for the COVID vaccine high.

organization?"

Last month, the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention eased its public health guidance for wearing masks, saying fully vaccinated individuals no longer need to wear facemasks while doing outdoor activities alone,

or in small gatherings. Since the guidance only applies to those who've been fully vaccinated, OSU medical ethics professor Courtney Campbell said it provides a good reason to get the shot.

"It's also trying to provide, if you will, a kind of incentive, a kind of carrot, for the numbers of unvaccinated people in Oregon and throughout the country to encourage vaccination," Campbell said. "Then some of these other precautions that people have felt have been so hampering and inhibiting of their return to normality can at least start to be paled back a little bit."

## Emergency SNAP benefits available in May

Most Oregonians who receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits will receive emergency allotments in May. The federal government has approved emergency allotments every month since March 2020, to give SNAP recipients additional support during the COVID-19 pandemic.

There are two important federal changes to the SNAP **Emergency Allotments in** 

Households that are already receiving the maximum SNAP benefits for their household size will now receive an additional \$95 in emergency allotments in

This increase will impact

approximetly 284,000 households (67% of Oregon SNAP households) and will have an impact of \$28 million in additional benefits for households in Oregon.

Households who are eligible for \$0 in regular SNAP benefits will not receive the May emergency allotments.

This change is because the federal government clarified households must receive regular SNAP to be eligible for emergency allotments. This change doesn't impact other SNAP benefits and services these households may receive, such as employment and training services. This change will impact approximately 4,300 households. Those impacted by

this change are encouraged to report any changes that may impact their regular SNAP amount, such as loss of income or increase in expenses.

"We are grateful to have the opportunity to increase emergency benefits available to some SNAP households in Oregon," said Oregon Department of Human Services Director Fariborz Pakseresht. "We also know that for those 4,300 households who will no longer receive the emergency allotments, that this change can be significant and difficult. We encourage them, and all Oregonians who are struggling to meet their basic needs to contact our partners at 211 and the Oregon Food

On the vaccination front, 40% of the county's population has received a COVID-19 vaccine, ranking it 14th among Oregon's 36

But vaccinations have been slowing slightly in recent weeks.

According to data from the Oregon Health Authority, the county is averaging around 150 doses administered per day, down from an average of over 230 in mid-April.

In general, younger people in the county tend to have lower vaccination rates than older people, possibly due in part to the state's phased approach to vaccine eligibility.

Around three quarters of those over 80 in the county have been vaccinated, while less than half of those under 65 have received a shot.

Every age group is lagging behind state averages too, according to the state's data. The difference is most pronounced in the 40 to 49 age group: On the state level,

nearly half of that population has been vaccinated. But in Curry County, that vaccination rate is 27%.

Curry Health Network is continuing to offer vaccines weekly. The hospital currently has clinics scheduled for May 7 in Port Orford, May 10 in Gold Beach and May 9 and 10 in Brookings.



## We blame the trees, but whose fault is it?

Just like you, I live with the fear of wildfire. My southern Oregon town of Ashland nestles against the foothills of the Siskiyou Mountains, whose forests become tinder in our hot, dry summers.

One lightning strike or tossed cigarette on the wrong windy day, and Ashland could be destroyed as completely as the town of Paradise, California, in 2018.

This reality was brought home with terrifying force last September, when a wind-driven wildfire roared through the nearby towns of Talent and Phoenix, destroying over 2,500 residences in a matter of hours. Ashland was largely spared, but only because the wind pushed the fire in another direction.

Over the past several years, the city has implemented the ambitious "Ashland Forest Resiliency" project to reduce flammable fuels on thousands of acres of public lands. Tools in the Ashland Watershed include thinning and controlled burns. The project is considered to be a model ecological approach, not mere window-dressing to justify commercial timber harvest as is true of many "forest health" projects.

As a homeowner, I've supported the project, and as a conservation biologist, I've been impressed with how it's been carried out.

Yet even as the city and its partners are diligently reducing forest fuels, more and more homes are being built in every nook and cranny of private land abutting the watershed. Many are McMansions commanding expansive views of the valley below. All these homes are at extreme risk of wildfire. As if the sense of crisis surrounding fuels reduction wasn't enough, this adds another crisis, one we've made ourselves.

Recently, I took a favorite trail leading from the edge of edge of town into the watershed. I always look forward to walking through an avenue of small manzanita trees. In spring, their pink urn-like blossoms are mobbed by bumble bees and hummingbirds. In fall and winter, their berries — the "little apples" that give these shrubs their Spanish name — feed robins, thrushes and bears. Winter storms turn these groves into an enchanted labyrinth of green leaves, red bark and white

Not this year. Not again in my lifetime. I found that this once intact and healthy wildlife habitat had been reduced to "defensible space." The manzanitas had been harshly hacked back; those that had been spared stood isolated in a barren expanse of blood-red stumps.

I counted the rings on one of the stumps, revealing that it had been at least 55 years old when we decided it was too dangerous to live.

The Forest Resiliency Project con-



sidered these manzanitas a threat because they were close to the city limits — and even closer to the big new homes being built outside the city limits.

They were sacrificed to increase our sense of security, and for no other reason. They were mostly healthy and important for wildlife. They shaded the soil and hosted mycorrhizal fungi integral to the nutrient cycles of the forest.

Yes, someday a wildfire would have burned here. But without our presence, that fire would not have been a tragedy, merely an episode in the long life of the land, and an opportunity for renewal. Manzanitas are well-adapted to fire; some species actually require fire for seed

Oregonians take pride in being environmentally aware. Yet we accept the ecological destruction of the "fuels reduction" paradigm, rather than putting limits on our relentless expansion into the rural landscape.

Perhaps my town is becoming safer than it was before. But it's questionable that any amount of "thinning" could protect Ashland from a wind-driven firestorm coming out of the watershed.

The fire that destroyed much of Talent and Phoenix, Oregon, like many of last summer's devastating California wildfires, did not start on heavily forested public land.

Instead, it ignited and roared through a typical valley mosaic of creekside woodlands, orchards and residential neighborhoods. The hard truth is that for Ashland and many other towns around the West, avoiding catastrophic wildfire is as much a matter of luck as preparedness.

Still, we have to try, right? That means some degree of fuels reduction. But we must acknowledge the losses to the ecological integrity, the habitat value and the beauty of this land that we love so much.

## The last thing we need is a gold mine

As a citizen of the Nez Perce, or Nimíipuu, which means the People, I look at gold mining as a symbol of broken promises.

In 1855, when my ancestors entered into a treaty with the United States, we ceded millions of acres in what eventually became Idaho, Oregon and Washington. In exchange we reserved an exclusive homeland and rights to fish, hunt, gather and pasture throughout our vast aboriginal territory.

Then in 1860 gold was discovered, and thousands of prospectors flooded across our borders in violation of the treaty, damaging our sacred places and natural resources and causing unspeakable injury to our people.

The United States failed to uphold the terms of the 1855 Treaty and instead forced the Nez Perce to enter into a new treaty in 1863. Known by us as the "steal treaty," it reduced the size of our homeland by 90% and allowed miners and other non-Indians to remain on lands they had illegally occupied.

When several Nez Perce bands led by Chief Joseph demanded that the United States uphold the promises it had made in the 1855 Treaty, and refused to move to the new reservation, the federal government resorted to military force, prompting the Nez Perce War of 1877.

A century and a half later, the

promise of gold once again threatens our homeland and way of life.

The Stibnite Gold Project is proposed by Perpetua Resources, formerly Midas Gold, a Canadian company that recently moved to Idaho. The mine site is located within Nez Perce ceded territory in the headwaters of the South Fork Salmon River, a watershed that once was home to one of the largest Chinook salmon runs in the Columbia River Basin. We have treaty-reserved rights in this culturally significant area, and have worked over the years to restore fish habitat that benefits everyone, an effort that cost millions of dollars.

The Stibnite Gold Project would be one of the largest gold mines in the country. The company aims to extract between four and five million ounces of gold from three open pit mines during the estimated 21- to 28-year life of the project.

Despite Perpetua's claim that it will "restore the site" that is already heavily polluted by a legacy of mining, the proposal to expand the area and mine it again will add hundreds of millions of tons of additional mining waste and tailings. The proposal will also require storage of the new toxic waste, plus active water treatment long after the company is done mining the site.

Perpetua's mining would also restrict or prohibit treaty-reserved access for more than two decades or even longer. It would also destroy

critical habitat for endangered Chinook salmon and bull trout and other resources cherished by the Nez Perce and all Idahoans.

The Nez Perce doubt that Perpetua Resources will stick around if the mine is permitted by the federal government. Perpetua is now majority-owned by a New York-based corporation that recently replaced most of the mining company's governing board. The company might opt to sell

its shares for a huge profit and then exit the scene. A new corporation could then step in to extract gold, leaving behind a legacy of toxic contamination and resource destruction that will plague our communities for generations to come.

We know all too well the pattern of exploit-and-abandon. Corporations don't keep their promises. We want this permit denied.

The United States, as a signatory to the 1855 Treaty and trustee to the Tribe, has a responsibility to protect and honor our treaty rights and resources. These treaty obligations, which predate the 1872 General Mining Law, are rooted in the Supremacy Clause of the Constitution and represent the solemn word of the United States.

- 1. Loss of a loved one 2. Divorce or separation of their
- parents 3. Any major transition – new
- home, new school. 4. Traumatic life experiences,
- like living through a natural disaster
- 5. Teasing or bullying 6. Difficulties in school or with
- classmates If you think your child is in

danger of harming themselves or others, seek immediate assistance and teach them the Crisis Text Line and text SOS to 741741 since they probably prefer to text about emotional issues than talk about them.



terms of the elected officials and businesses is that COVID is surging across Oregon right now," Brown said. "It takes community-wide measures to make sure that we can protect our most vulnerable Oregonians."

While showing no signs of letting up the extreme-risk closures, Brown offered one concession for businesses impacted by the current closures: A plan with state legislators to provide \$20 million in relief funds.

Those funds will be passed to the 15 counties in the extreme-risk category for distribution to businesses, the governor said.

"Economic relief is something I can do as your governor to help Oregonians impacted by this fourth surge. What I can't do is bring back someone's life lost to this virus," Brown said. "That's why, as hard as this is, we must act immediately."

State health officials also placed a timeline on the closures, saying Friday the counties in the extreme-risk category will stay there for a maximum of three weeks if case rates follow predicted

Those trends are the basis of the extreme-risk closure policy, said Peter Graven, the Oregon Health & Science University data scientist who helps the state predict how the virus will spread.

"The good news is, when we pair these data together, it shows us that we have just three to four more weeks until we are in good shape," Graven said. "That's when cases will fall and our vaccine levels will be high enough that — with basic preventive measures — the virus cannot effectively grow."

The state officials again pointed to the data to explain why the current spike pushed them to force more closures.

"I think what we're seeing now is similar to what we saw in the fall. We are seeing an increase in cases across the state, traced to multiple different sources," said Dr. Dean Sidelinger, the state epidemiologist. "We're also seeing an increase in hospitalizations like we saw in the fall: A curve that became very steep and pushed us close to not having the specialized care in intensive care units that every Oregonian deserves, whether they have COVID, or a heart attack or

motor vehicle crash."
Graven said that last point, the increase in hospitalizations, is the state's main concern, since hospital capacity

is limited.

He said his mathematical models show the state could have lost 178 additional lives by the end of summer without the added restrictions, with most coming in the next several weeks.

The governor is still optimistic about lifting restrictions, saying the economy could see a reopening to pre-pandemic life by the end of June.

But that'll only happen if vaccination rates finally outpace virus spread and hospitalizations, the OHA officials said Friday.

"The balance we've had in fighting this disease has really been it's not policy that drives the change, its policy with people following that policy," Sidelinger said.

"The vast majority of Oregonians are doing what they can to protect themselves and their loved ones, but over these next few weeks, we need more Oregonians to join us."

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## Treatment will begin at new site where sudden oak death found

The Oregon Department of Forestry and USDA Forest Service have begun work that will allow treatment in May in Curry County of a newly detected infestation of sudden oak death. Five tanoak trees at the site were infected with the EU1 strain of Phytophthora ramorum, the pathogen that causes SOD. The pathogen can infect many plants but kills

The new site is just beyond the current 515-squaremile SOD quarantine area on the north shore of the Rogue River. Located within the Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest, the site is near the Myrtle Tree Trail and about six miles north of the nearest known sudden oak death infestation.

The USDA Forest Service identified the infected trees from high-resolution aerial imagery as a part of the annual USDA Forest Service/Oregon Department of Forestry Aerial Detection Survey. The trees identified were sampled by ODF crews who sent samples to the Oregon State University's Forest Pathology Lab. After the initial test at OSU showed P. ramorum, DNA samples were sent on April 14 to the ODA Plant Health Lab in Salem. The ODA Plant Health Lab is certified by the USDA to perform official confirmatory testing for P. ramorum. The lab confirmed the

samples as presumptive positives on April 16.

As per federal protocol, the samples have been shipped to the U.S. Depart-

ment of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service Lab in Maryland for final confirmation. New infestation sites must be confirmed by APHIS' Plant Protection Quarantine unit before regulatory action may take place.

In the meantime, the Oregon Department of Forestry and USDA Forest Service SOD crews have marked off an area 1,000 feet from the sampled trees and are looking for more trees with signs of the disease.

Until treatment begins, SOD crews will continue to heavily monitor the area for the presence of infested trees and plants. The area will also be monitored on an ongoing basis by aerial disease survey experts.

Oregon regulations require a property officially confirmed as infested with SOD to undergo eradication treatments. In Oregon, federal land managers cooperate with the Oregon Departments of Forestry and Agriculture to carry out eradication treatments on infested sites on federal lands.

Federal funds are available to cover the cost of treating the area, which is now the highest priority site for the SOD program. Treatment consists of cutting, piling and burning all tanoaks.

ODA maintains the Phytophthora ramorum Quarantine, which allows any area in the state to be placed under quarantine where a SOD infestation is confirmed (OAR 603-052-1230(2)(d). Thus, an emergency quarantine order does not need to be issued. Oregon's SOD Program will consult with stakeholders regarding any potential expansion of quarantine boundaries. USDA Forest Service staff are evaluating whether access restrictions to recreation use in the treatment area might be needed.

#### **Background**

The invasive non-native pathogen that causes the sudden oak death in tanoak was first detected in Oregon in 2001. A plant quarantine of the area was promptly set up, which has gradually expanded to cover almost a third of Curry County. When attempts to eradicate the disease - which can survive on several native and non-native plant species – proved impossible, Oregon's SOD program switched to slowing the spread of the disease.

In 2010, a Generally Infested Area within the quarantine area was created. Within that zone, where the disease is well established, eradication treatments are no longer required. The GIA was enlarged in late 2020 and now covers 123 square miles within the quarantine area; it is about 19 miles north to south and nine miles east to

In Europe, the EU1 strain of P. ramorum has been found to damage and kill several conifer species, including Douglas-fir, western hemlock, grand fir and larch. That strain was first found in Oregon in 2015 within the existing quarantine area. Infestations of the EU1 strain


