COVID deaths rise as case count stays low

New COVID cases in Curry County remain low, but the impact of the virus continues to have a deadly toll.

On Thursday, the Oregon Health Authority reported six new COVID cases in the county, continuing a trend of single-digit cases being reported.

But in the same report, OHA reported two new deaths from county residents who died and had COVID as the cause or a contributing factor. Both deaths were months old, but were just added to the state's total after death certificates were released.

The OHA reported a 64-year-old man died August 13 at Curry Medical Center, with COVID listed as the cause or a contributing factor in the death. The presence of underlying conditions is

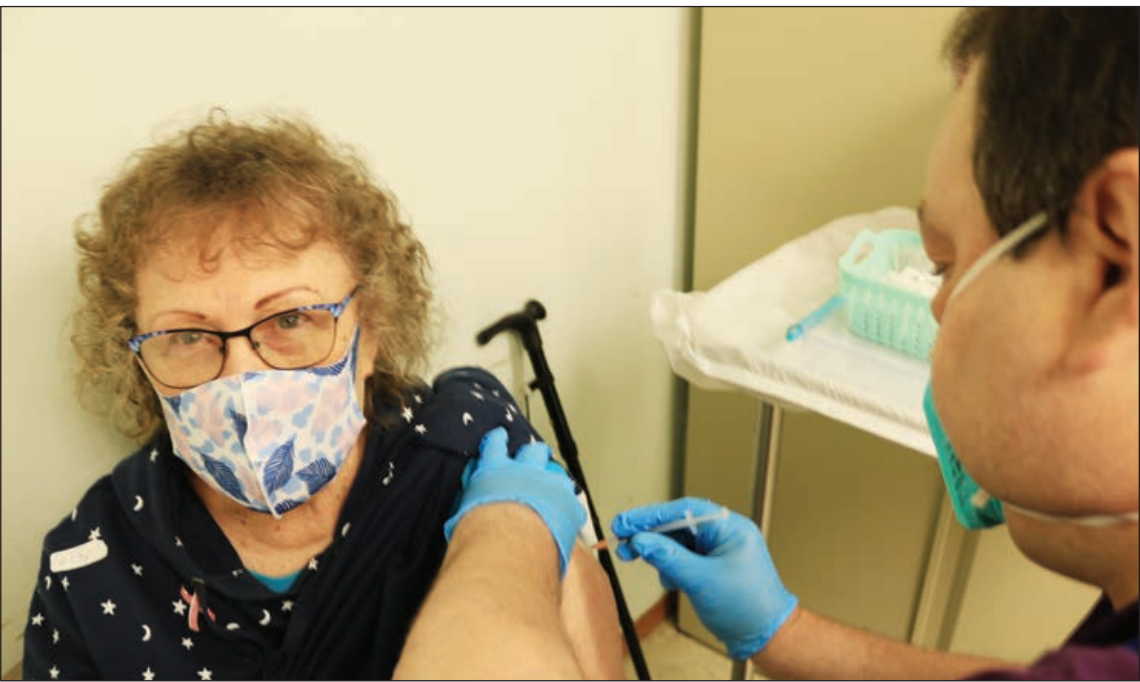
being confirmed.

The OHA also reported a 66-year-old woman died August 5, and the death certificate listed COVID as the cause of death or a contributing factor in the death. She had underlying conditions.

Across Oregon, the number of cases and deaths continues to fall as the impact of the Delta variant eases across the state. Oregon reported 1,160 new cases Thursday and 13 new deaths.

Curry County has moved up the state in terms of vaccinations, with 63.9% of adults vaccinated. That was an increase of 0.4% in the last week, and puts the county near the middle of the state rates. Hood River County leads the state with 83.6% of adults vaccinated. Lake County is last in the state with a 44% rate.

Across Oregon, 78.2% of all adults have received at least one dose of the vaccine.

Curry housing market shows signs of slowing

Curry County home values showed signs of slowing in October, but the market is still strong.

October Multiple Listing Service numbers for closed sales were up compared to a year ago, by 5.2%, but that's still below the double digit increases seen in 2019 and 2020.

"This modest growth in pricing is healthy and a good sign the upward trajectory of home values is leveling off," said Bret Curtis, who along with his wife Marie own and operate two RE/MAX Coast and Country brokerages.

Compare last month to September of 2020, and new listings and pending and closed sales numbers suggest that the deceleration may be more than just a slight tap on the brakes.

"This is the first month of the year I've seen all three categories down 10 percent or more," Curtis said.

These downticks, however, follow several years of exponen-

Oregon preparing to spend infrastructure windfall

With the bipartisan infrastructure package now signed into law, Oregon is preparing to spend the extra funding coming its way.

Last week, the Oregon Department of Transportation discussed the new funding and what it is expected to be spent on.

Travis Brouwer, assistant director for revenue, finance and compliance, said the money will make a big difference in the state, especially in the more crowded metro areas.

"It's truly historic in size and scope," Brouwer said. "That's for all types of infrastructure, everything from wastewater and water to broadband and transportation and other areas of infrastructure as well."

Brouwer said not all the money in the package is new money, but he said there will be a lot of new funding as well as \$100 billion set aside in a discretionary fund that will be doled out via grants.

"We are all going to be getting our grant writing pens out and spending a lot of time trying to bring additional money back to Oregon," Brouwer said. "This is one of known unknowns. With that much money on the table, we know there are going to be opportunities, but we don't know how much money Oregon will bring home."

Brouwer said traditionally Oregon receives 1% of federal funding, which would bring an additional \$1 billion to the state.

Some of the projects being

tial real estate home value growth due to low inventory and little to non-existent home development.

“Let me put it bluntly,” said Jude Hodge, a broker at RE/MAX Coast and Country. “I sold a house last June on Old County Road for \$465,000, and then I sold that same house one year later - with no improvements - for \$605,000.”

The 30% year-to-year increase in home value may not be surprising. According to Hodge, she typically sees only six to seven new listings each month.

“Turnover comes from nature,” Hodge said. “We are a retirement community. People pass away naturally or move into assisted living, and that’s my average seller.”

Investment homes that sit vacant are also impacting inventory.

“I don’t want to see more turnover of existing homes, but we definitely need more builders or anyone sitting on an empty home to list their property,” Hodge said.

Hodge added that she’s not sure how many sit vacant, but many of them sit along the coastline.

“They buy them as a second home and come maybe once or twice a year,” Hodge said. “I know somebody who has a \$2

million dollar house that they want me to list next year, and they haven’t been there for three years.”

A lack of new development is also a problem.

“The developers we do have are single-family people with maybe 12 employees,” Hodge said. “Unfortunately, for the person building it may not be worth their while to build because we aren’t in an area where materials are readily available.”

For comparison, Hodge said homes in Cave Junction are being built quickly for under \$400,000, whereas a similar development

in Curry County could cost \$125,000 for the land and another \$500,000 to build the home because building materials have to be shipped in.

While a lack of land and building material doesn’t bode well for moderately to low-priced purchase opportunities, the conditions are fueling a strong seller’s market.

A home commonly referred to as ‘The Castle’ on Hazy Lane sold Nov. 15 for \$2.55 million.

“Everybody said ‘You’re never going to sell that in Brookings, it’s too much money,’” Hodge said.

MLS data for the month of October showed an overall 7.7% increase in median sale prices for all of Curry County compared to the year prior, with Port Orford showing the largest increase at 32.3%.

Collectively, Curry County homes sold within 33 days at an average price of \$478,400.

“Demand has been high,” said Hodge. “We are so short on listings that if you price it right, you have the opportunity to have multiple offers and get over asking.”

As an example, the home that sold in June for \$605,000 was listed for \$525,000.

Young retirees, some

of them outpriced by the Southern California real estate market, are common purchasers.

“We are a destination area,” Hodge said. “My average buyer, or 67% of them, are over the age of 53 with an average household of two. That’s the people who want to live here.”

Hodge added that she sold 158 homes last year, and only four of those homes were sold to local residents.

Meanwhile, individuals looking to purchase or even rent moderate to low-income housing have found it hard to do so.

In October, the Brookings City Council ap-

proved zoning changes that allow residents to build accessory dwelling units - commonly referred to as granny flats - which may ease the housing crunch. But that’s likely to take awhile. Despite rising home prices, Hodge encouraged potential buyers to not give up, saying that a \$300,000 home can be purchased for three percent down, or \$9,000.

“While it may sound like a lot of money, if you look at where you spend your money every month and what you’re getting for that money, I bet there are a lot of people who can make a three year plan,” Hodge said. “It just takes a little sacrifice.”

Wyden, senators urge fix to broken credit reporting system

U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) said recently he has joined with U.S. Sens. Brian Schatz (D-Hawaii), Sherrod Brown (D-Ohio), Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), Jack Reed (D-R.I.), Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.), and Ben Ray Lujan (D-N.M.), to urge

the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) to take concrete steps to reform the credit reporting industry.

The senators urged CFFB Director Rohit Chopra to use the CFPB’s existing supervisory, rulemaking, and enforce-

ment authority over the largest nationwide consumer reporting agencies, in order to improve the accuracy of credit reports, streamline the dispute resolution process, and hold consumer reporting agencies accountable for addressing persistent errors.

“In an industry that affects all Americans so directly, even a small error rate means tens of millions of people can be denied jobs or housing through no fault of their own. As a result of simple mistakes, consumers may pay more for credit or be denied loans altogether; they might face obstacles applying for a job, getting a mortgage, or renting an apartment,” the senators wrote. “These impacts can persist for years, putting innocent people in positions that are nearly impossible to resolve. ... Accordingly, we request you take immediate action to protect consumers and introduce much-needed accountability into the credit reporting system.”

eyed with the discretionary money is interstate work around Portland as well as major bridge repairs in the state.

Brouwer said the pack-age funds the traditional highway funding the state receives for five year and adds \$1.2 billion for trans- portation repairs and \$200 million for public transpor- tation.

Exactly where the mon- ey is going to be spent has not been decided yet, but Brouwer said those deci- sions will be made quickly.

“The Oregon Trans- portation Commission is going to be working fairly

quickly in order to get this money out the door to projects,” he said. “Nor- mally, whenever we do our statewide transportation improvement program, from the time the com- mission allocates funding among programs to the time we actually get the project out the door, we have about four years. This go around, we have about four months. This federal funding is use-it-or-lose-it. If you don’t use it in the fiscal year, you lose it. We don’t want to do that.”

One area that will be a focus is repairing the state’s aging bridge infra- structure. Brouwer said ad- ditional funding for bridges is desperately needed.

“Bridges have been the single largest area of

investment in the bill,” he said. “That’s a good thing. We know that we have sig- nificant needs on the state’s bridges. The majority of ODOT’s bridges are over 50 years old, and that’s about the age you would expect them to be headed toward retirement.”

Brouwer said there are 2,800 bridges in the state highway system, and Ore- gon traditionally replaces three a year.

An additional \$200 mil- lion will come to Oregon for public transportation, but Brouwer said almost all will be for Portland, Salem and Eugene since they have the largest trans- portation systems. Other communities will have an opportunity to gets grants to make improvements.

A grassroots effort can defy the odds

This year marks the 25th anniversary of one of the most spectacular conservation victories in recent history: the defeat of a massive gold mine planned for the doorstep of Yellowstone National Park.

Called the New World mine, it was proposed by the Canadian corporate giant Noranda, and it had a lot of momentum behind it. Yet the mine would have destroyed world-class trout fisheries and wild places for grizzlies and other wildlife in and around the nation's first park.

Noranda planned to industrialize a rugged corner of the Beartooth Mountains of Montana and Wyoming with its underground mine, mill site and work camp, and 70-mile long, high voltage transmission line. An 80-acre lake of mine waste would have flooded a wetland, all this at the headwaters of three drainages in a landscape prone to avalanches, earthquakes and blizzards.

As Stu Coleman of Yellowstone National Park put it, "If you threw a dart at a map of the United States, you could not hit a worse place to put a mine."

Still, the mine seemed a sure thing. No mine on public land had ever been stopped, thanks to the power of the Mining Law of 1872, passed the same year that Yellowstone Park was designated. It gives hard-rock mining priority over all other activities. Working back then for the Greater Yellowstone Coalition, I recall being told that fighting Noranda was futile and perhaps dangerous.

What happened, though, felt like a miracle. A coalition of unlikely allies came together: anglers, hunters, ranchers, snowmobilers, park visitors, conservationists, scientists, artists and local businesses. All agreed that Yellowstone Park and the nearby wild country were more precious than gold. Together with officials from Yellowstone Park and the Interior

Department, they created such a storm of opposition that President Bill Clinton finally intervened.

Looking back, what we did seems like textbook organizing, combining legal and media work supported by generous donors. It took a seven-year campaign until Noranda, beaten in court and bruised by negative public opinion, was eager for a way out.

Negotiations were complex, but on Aug. 12, 1996, President Clinton announced a deal that stopped the mine, bought out Noranda's interest, retired its claims, and restored lands that had been heavily damaged by mining activity from decades earlier.

I remember feeling amazed when this David and Goliath battle ended. It would still take years for the government to purchase most of the mining claims, and almost two decades to restore the area's toxic streams.

At a celebration this year of the 25th anniversary of Clinton's announcement, veterans of the fight shared reminiscences, marveling again that we won. Some had gone on to lead other successful campaigns, including bringing back wolves to Yellowstone and protecting the Wyoming Range and Montana's Rocky Mountain Front from oil and gas development.

All of these campaigns needed strong coalitions and luck to succeed. What did they have in common?

Locally, they shared a diverse and fired-up grassroots base. Then they were able to develop legal and communications strategies that reached out regionally, even nationally. And, because the battles dragged on, they required stamina, leadership, a high level of coordination — and, crucially, substantial funding.

What helped was that the battles centered on wild places or species whose iconic status generated wide support.

In more than 40 years of conservation advocacy, I have seen numerous campaigns fail. Advocates often misunderstood the complexity of what they faced or the need to adapt as circumstances changed. They lacked the skill and openness to sustain a broad-based coalition, ran out of money, or the political climate soured. Sometimes, champions abandoned the fight because the struggle just lasted so long. Success, I'm sorry to say, is hardly the norm.

Yet how wondrous it is when you save a place or restore a species. The New World site is not an industrial nightmare now.

Cutthroat trout swim again in upper Soda Butte Creek. Wildflowers abound in areas where tons of poisonous waste from earlier gold mining is now safely buried. A weasel has created a palace in a collapsed miner's cabin, and grizzlies excavate whitebark pine seeds nearby that were cached by squirrels.

To me, the New World campaign was not just about stopping a mine. It was about a burning love for a special place that inspired us to keep working together to achieve a shared goal.

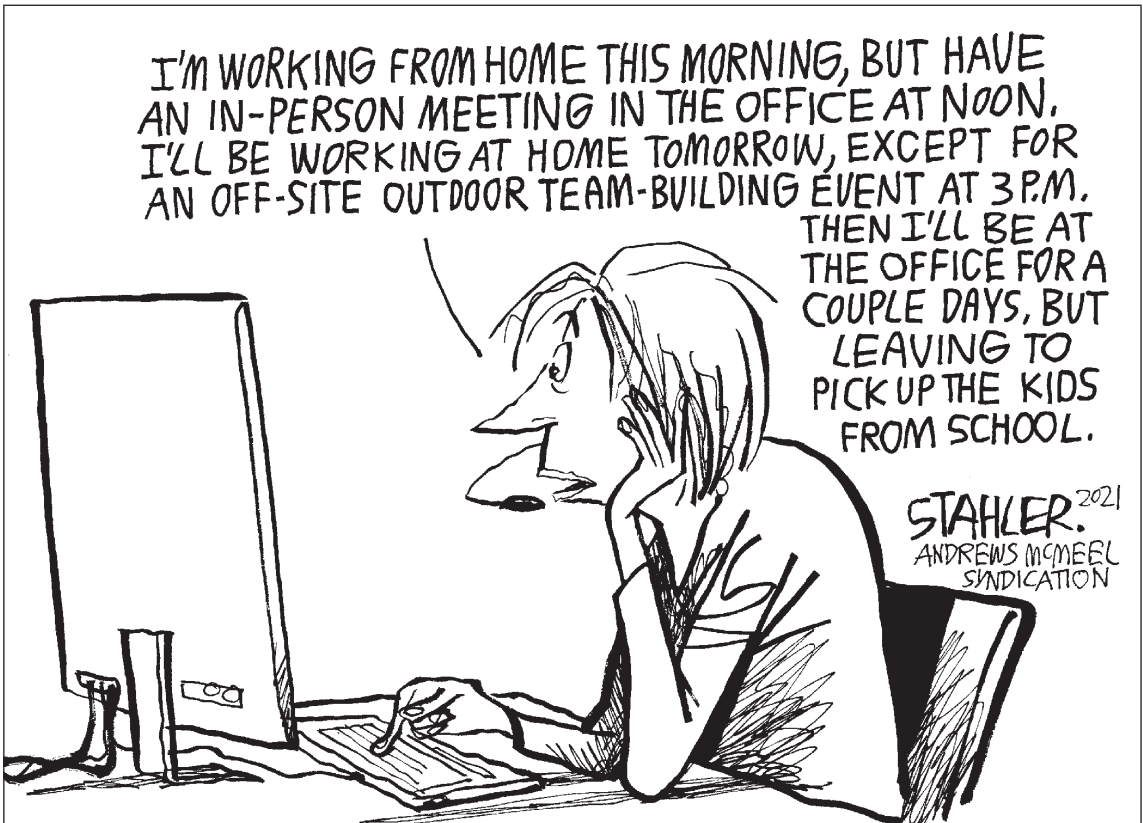
I read your article "KCIW goes dark after lease with City Ends." A three week extension cannot be granted?

The Board of Directors' vote adopting the ordinance is as follows: Ayes: Alan Cranmore, Richard Gugliemini, Ron Mayhue, Wes White; Noes: None; Abstain: None; Absent; Mark Ephland.

In 1992 the state required all water customers to have water meters installed for water conservation purposes. A few residences within the district did not have water meters. California Assembly Bill 2572 was enacted which required all California residents to have water meters installed on or before January 1, 2025.

A summary of the ordinance is as follows: In order to comply with state law, the district adopted an ordinance to allow property owners to install water meters in accordance with the district's specifications or, if the district's water customers fail to do by a certain time, the district will install the meters and charge or assess the property for the district's costs of installation. It is estimated that installation will cost \$1,160 per residence but the cost will vary depending on the time and labor needed to locate each water line. The ordinance requires: a) its customers to comply with the district's rules and regulations; b) to allow the district access to water customer's property to service the water facilities; c) to install or have installed the required water meter; d) imposes the charge of the direct cost of installation and levies a property assessment on the benefited property if the district's invoice is not timely paid; e) establishes time limitations for the election of whether the property owner or the district will perform the installation; and f) finds the ordinance exempt from CEQA. AMENDED MOTION FOR LEAVE TO PARTICIPATE AS AMICUS CURIAE
Pursuant to this Court's Order of October 12, 2021, the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation submits this Amended Motion for Leave to Participate as Amicus Curiae in both of the above-captioned cases. Under the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation Tribal Code Title 1, Chapter 3, Rule 9, the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation (Nation) respectfully moves this Court for leave to participate in the above captioned actions as amicus curiae in support of the Tribal Court's jurisdiction over these matters. Participation as amicus curiae is warranted because the Nation has a distinct interest in establishing and defending the Tribal Court's jurisdiction over these matters. The Nation's request for leave to participate as amicus curiae should be granted for the following reasons:
1. The Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation is a sovereign, federally recognized Indian tribe with responsibility under the Constitution of the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation to safeguard the sovereignty and jurisdiction of the Nation and its institutions, including the Tribal Court.
2. This Motion is timely and will not impair or impede the prompt resolution of the issues presented in these actions. The Nation's participation will assist the Court and the parties in resolving jurisdictional issues.
3. These actions raise issues regarding the nature and scope of the Tribal Court's civil jurisdiction. The Nation's interest in these cases is to promote and protect the jurisdictional authority of the Tribal Court over matters arising within and affecting the territorial jurisdiction of the Nation.
4. Pursuant to Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution of the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation, these cases arise within the territorial jurisdiction of the Nation because, upon information and belief, the residence of the Parties is located within the Nation's territory, and the alleged events occurred within the Nation's territory, which includes "all Aboriginal Lands, service areas, and all lands subsequently and hereafter acquired by or for the Nation, whether within or outside of the Nation's Aboriginal Lands."
5. Pursuant to Article 1, Sections 5(a) and (b) of the Constitution of the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation, the Tribal Court also has jurisdiction over the Plaintiff as a member of the Nation. The Nation's inherent sovereign authority and laws extend to "all Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation citizens" and to "all persons who are eligible to be enrolled as Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation citizens, wherever located."
6. Pursuant to Tribal Code Title 1, Chapter 3, Section V(A)(a),

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this Court also has jurisdiction over the subject matter of these actions because these are matters "in law or equity arising within the territorial jurisdiction of the Tribe."
7. Because of the importance of the jurisdictional issues at stake in this case, the Nation as amicus requests an opportunity to participate in briefing in these matters and in oral argument if it is held.

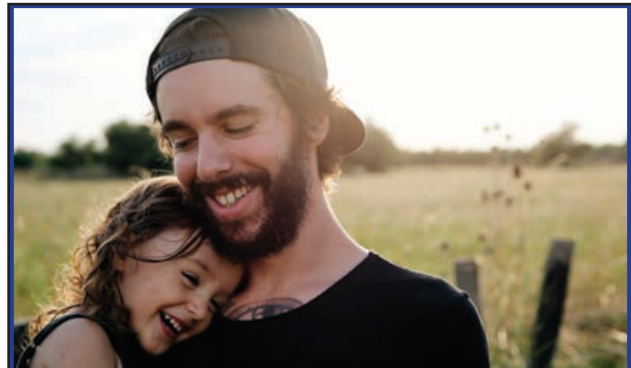

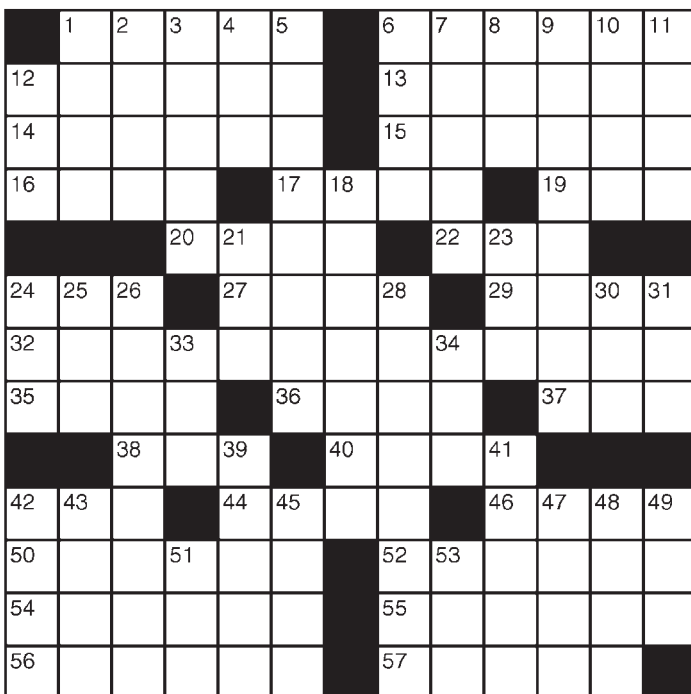

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Disaster safe power grid proposal signed

U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) and U.S. Rep. Joe Neguse (D-Colo.)'s proposal to upgrade America's power system and protect local communities from extreme weather events was signed into law Monday as part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

Wyden and Neguse introduced the Disaster Safe Power Grid Act earlier this year to ensure that power companies do their part to reduce the risks of power blackouts and wildland fires through power system

upgrades, fire and disaster safety equipment installation, and proper vegetation management. Based on this vision, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act delivers \$5 billion for this program to upgrade power infrastructure to ensure powerlines and energy technologies are able to handle the challenges of the future.

"Oregon's severe weather events in 2020 and 2021 -- from windstorms that downed powerlines and sparked catastrophic infernos to ice storms that

left hundreds of thousands without power -- prove that aging grid infrastructure is no match for the climate crisis," Wyden said. "This historic investment to make our power grid more resilient will go a long way in keeping Oregonians and Americans across the country safer and with power as we continue the climate fight."

"Coloradans are no stranger to extreme weather, whether the devastating wildfires we experienced last year, intense flooding or heavy winter storms,"

Neguse said. "It's time we make a significant investment in making our power grid more resilient to extreme weather events and properly equip American families and communities. We're thrilled to see our vision for a disaster safe power grid delivered on through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. This historic investment will ensure families in Northern Colorado are protected from power outages in the wake of climate-related weather incidents."

Special tax provisions in 2021

Usually, taxpayers who do not itemize their tax returns cannot claim a deduction for charitable contributions. This year, however, the Taxpayer Certainty and Disaster Relief Act of 2020 created a temporary provision that allows individual filers who do not itemize their returns to claim a deduction of up to \$300 for cash contributions made to qualifying charities during 2021, or up to \$600 for married individuals filing joint returns.

Donor Advised Funds (DAFs)

Donor Advised Funds allow donors to establish a fund for immediate tax benefits and then recommend grants to nonprofits on their timeline. Humboldt Area Foundation and Wild Rivers Community Foundation offer DAFs, as do many financial institutions.

Individual Retirement Account (IRA) Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD)

Individuals age 70½ and older can direct up to \$100,000 per year tax-free from their IRA to operating charities through Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD). However, it is important to note that Donor Advised Funds (DAFs) cannot receive QCDs.

Non-cash gifts such as appreciated stock

By making a gift of appreciated stock to a charitable organization, you can maximize your gift and avoid paying capital gains tax and may receive a charitable deduction for the fair market value of the stock.

Important dates & reminders for 2021 year-end contributions:

- Gifts sent by US Postal Service must be postmarked by Dec. 31, 2021.
- Credit card gifts and online gifts must be completed by 11:59 pm, Dec. 31, 2021, local time.
- Gifts of securities must be received in the nonprofit's account by Dec. 31, 2021 – consider initiating these gifts no later than Dec. 20, 2021, to ensure time for processing.
- Sites like www.guidestar.org can be used to confirm the charitable status of organizations you would like to support.
- Always consult your tax advisor regarding your specific situation.
