Fire training site eyed

Aparcel of land near Brookings Regional Airport is being considered as a prime training area for the Brookings Fire Depart-

The Brookings City Council is continuing to work on a plan for the site that already has involved significant groundwork, following a presentation Sept. 16 by Brookings Police Chief Kelby McCrae and Brookings Fire Operations Chief Jim Watson.

At the heart of the proposal is creating a single site where local firefighters can learn and hone their skills. The facility would provide live-fire training opportunities, as well as a place to practice vehicle extraction, water pumping, collapsing structures and wildland firefighting.

McCrae said the training currently takes place at a variety of locations around the city, which "affects the amount of training that can be accomplished in an evening." Having all of the training components in a single location would make it possible to do more-extensive simulations.

Beyond the training value, a single site could

11,000 LOSE POWER

lectricity was disrupted for an estimated E11,000 Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative customers, from Gold Beach south to the Oregon-California border, from 2:30-6:30 p.m. Tuesday, according to utility spokesman Jacob Knudsen.

"A switch opened up at a Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) substation north of Gold Beach," Knudsen said. "The switch opened after detecting a ground fault in a transmission line. That could be a broken pole, a tree on a line, or a downed pole."

Crews from Coos-Curry Co-Op and the BPA were dispatched to locate the outage and repair the break.

Meanwhile, motorists driving through rainswept Brookings were struggling to cope with darkened traffic signals, as intersections jammed.

Knudsen said the utility was able to track the outage to a broken insulator on a BPA transmission line about two miles north of Gold Beach.

We worked with BPA to transfer the load to an alternative line," Knudsen said. "Once that was completed, we reenergized the seven substations impacted by the outage and began staggering electricity back to our customers.'

Knudsen said full power was restored to all customers by 6:30 p.m.

The Tuesday outage followed on the heels of a similar incident Sept. 16 in Crescent City that affected 1,400 customers. That outage was caused by a tree limb that fell across a power line.

BROOKINGS QUILTER SHARES NATIONAL PRIZE

resident of Brookings and her partner in North Dakota are the winners of the Janome America Best of Show Award for their quilt, Diamond Efferves-

Beth Nufer of Brookings and Clem Buzick of Fargo are sharing \$20,000 in prize money.

The award came during the American Quilters Society Quilt Week, held Sept. 9-13 in Fall Paducah, Kentucky. The event features nearly 700 quilts on display from around the world, according to spokesperson Alyssa Ragsdale.

"The high point of the show recognizes the artistry of today's quiltmakers," she said. "Hundreds of quilters compete for \$121,250 in cash awards."

Ragsdale said that following the judges' selection of the top seven winners, the public has 24 hours to vote online for their favorite quilt. The next day, the winning quilt is put on display at

the event. "So when people walk in, that quilt is the first thing they see at the show," Ragsdale said.

Neither Nufer nor Buzick attended the

event in Kentucky, receiving word of their accomplishment by phone. "We were both taken by surprise," Nufer said.

Their vision for the guilt had been to create a three-dimensional image using silks and an ombre sateen background fabric, said Nufer. It took some nine

months to complete. Nufer said she searched for a new quilting partner after the Brookingsbased woman she had been working with gave up the hobby a few years ago. After trolling major quilting shows, Nufer found Buzick's quilts on display.

The two arranged their partnership about five years ago. "I do the piecing and she does the quilting," Nuder said. The two said there are challenges

inherent in their quilting hobby, including trying to create an original piece of art. "This is accomplished with long hours of using graph paper, compasses, rulers and protractors," Nufer said. "And the reward is that we get to pretend we are artists during the

process." Nufer said her inspiration came in part from her husband. "He purchased some silk

fabric, which allowed me to start and buy a heck of a lot more fabric," she said.
"I am also very grateful to the people

who have either inspired me or helped me

along the way, especially Michelle Fallert, who encouraged me to enter international and national quilt shows," said Nufer.

Her mother, Barbara, also a Brookings quilter, said her daughter became interested in quilting in about 2002. A second daughter, Dianalee, also quilts. "Beth has become a nationally known quilter and we are real proud of," said her mom.

Near-record ocean warming along Pacific Coast

Researchers say the Pacific Ocean is seeing the second-largest marine heatwave tracked since the 1980s, touching from the Alaskan coast to Hawaii.

Having developed early in June, the heatwave is 50 to 100 feet thick. It stretches for hundreds of miles along the coast, about two-thirds of the distance of the U.S., said Nate Mantua, a research scientist with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Southwest Fisheries Science Center.

For that matter, said NOAA, the summer of 2019 was the hottest on record for the Northern Hemisphere. And last month was the second-hottest August worldwide.

Because of the coastal upwelling of deep, cold water, the heatwave has stayed mostly offshore. But along the northern Pacific Coast including northern California

- its edge reaches within 10 to 20 miles of the coastline.

Its temperature is 5 to 7 degrees Fahrenheit - higher than the usual ocean temperatures.

Scientists haven't seen a heatwave like this since its predecessor, nicknamed "the blob," in 2014.

"The warming that we're

seeing is similar to the amount of warming that we saw at the surface during 'the blob' years, but the difference is that this heat wave we're seeing develop right now, it's still pretty young," said Stephanie Moore, a research oceanographer with NOAA's Northwest Fisheries Science Center.

That "blob," the largest marine heatwave scientists have tracked since the 1980s, lasted for three years and caused havoc in marine ecology. It covered some 7.8 million kilometers.

The current heatwave

Every Child is an Artist'

Their work table was littered with shreds of paper, bits of string, beads, paint, sponges and glue. Serious art making was in progress by this group of eight students, ages 6 to 9, who were working on abstract collage self-portraits.

The six-week classes, "Every Child Is an Artist," offered at Manley Center for the Arts in Brookings are in high demand. All slots in the groups for 6- to 9-year-olds are filled through the end of the year, said the center's children's art program coordinator, Sharon Guy. Limited spaces remain for ages 10 to

The sessions cost \$30 and include all materials and supplies. Classes are limited to eight students.

Volunteers from the Pelican Bay Arts Association began teaching the classes in February 2019, identifying a community need. The group believes teaching art is critically important.

"In recent years, school curricula in the United States have shifted heavily toward common-core subjects of reading and math, at the cost of the arts," reads the group's website.

"Brookings School District is no exception. The developmental benefits of an art education are: motor skills, language development, decision making, visual learning, inventiveness, cultural awareness. Sound statistics show the arts help improve academic performances."

According to Guy, art activities indeed are limited in the local schools.

"I'm doing this because, honestly, we don't have this offered in schools," instructor Glencora Powers said. "I don't get paid to do this. I write my own curriculum and buy my own supplies, doing this in between working and schooling.

"There's a huge need in our community for this. It's not being met by the schools. They are working with what they've got. There are no camps this year. All the funding has been gutted."

Powers said the class is designed to explore different kinds of art - abstract, modernism, cubism, realism - and to integrate environmental and social issues and their own consciousness.

"They are exploring undercurrents that they aren't even fully aware of, like these river systems that we are blessed with here, and bringing their awareness of it and integrating it through art," Powers said.

Student reactions varied for the day's project.

"I usually draw and do anatomy," one student said. "I'm not into this kind of art as much," although she agreed it was good to try different things.

ferent things.

"It's fun," another student said. "You just get to be creative. Most of the time, this is where I get to do art, but

sometimes I draw at home."

The program teaches art techniques and vocabulary, focusing on the seven art elements of line, shape, form, space, texture, value and color, according to a flyer advertising the classes. Students are encouraged to view and discuss art, which expands their ability to articulate thoughts and ideas.

After the art project for this day's session was completed, the children were attentive as they took a tour of the gallery exhibit, "Forgeries for Sale," with Guy. They compared the originals with "forgeries" created by gallery artists, and were excited as they discussed the display's various styles, ranging from cubism to realism to western art.

"All of our teachers are volunteers, and the program has been funded by individual members of the Pelican Bay Arts Association," Guy said.


The art center also offers adult classes. Membership in the arts association provides access to workshops and exhibition opportunities.

The group is looking for more teachers so additional classes can be offered to meet the demand. "If anyone is interested in participating as a teacher next year, they can contact me or call the Manley Art Center and leave a message" Guy said.

"Our next organizational meeting will be at 2 p.m. Oct. 9 at the Manley Gallery. This meeting will include scheduling the art sessions for next year."

Rivers and beaches need a good cleaning

Time to talk trash. Maybe up to 4,000 pounds of it, if the Gold Beach and Brookings spring cleanup events are any indication.

Now that it's fall, it's time again for a beach and riverside cleanup.

In Brookings the south-coast event runs from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday. In Gold Beach, the event starts at 9 a.m. and continues until 1 p.m.

Volunteers can pre-register online to help clean in either the Brookings or Gold Beach areas, or report to the event locations on the day of the event

The activity is family- and dog-friendly, although organizers ask that pets be kept leashed.

The project is part of the International Coastal Cleanup, an annual worldwide effort to keep beaches and waterways clean and healthy. On the Oregon coast, volunteers pick up litter and marine debris along the entire coastline.

"Don't forget about the small stuff! The No. 1 items found on Oregon beaches are tiny bits of plastic and cigarette butts, which are harmful to shore birds and marine life. Bring an old colander to sift the sand for these items," according to SOLVE, a statewide, Portland-based environmental group.

"The goal is to not have any trash, but there's always some," said Oregon State Parks Department interpretive ranger Jeff Gallemore. "We want to do the cleanup now, before the winter weather comes in and the tides move it out to sea.

"If we gather it all now after the summer's use, we keep it out of streams and the ocean.

"This year, event organizers are trying something different that will make the event a little more sustainable," Gallemore said. "They are asking volunteers to bring their own reusable bags, gloves, and buckets to use for the cleanup, instead of organizers providing new bags and gloves to participants."

Gallemore advised participants to wear sturdy shoes and dress appropriately for the weather. "In addition, bring your own reusable water bottle," he said.

"The idea is to reduce the amount of plastic waste produced by the event itself."

Hauling, disposal and recycling services are being donated by Curry Transfer and Recycling.

Brookings

Volunteers can come to the Brookings Rest Area across U.S. Highway 101 from Harris Beach State Park and Visitor Center. Gallemore is heading up the Brookingsarea event. "Look for signs directing you to the registration area," he said.

After checking in, volunteers will fan out to clean beaches at Crissey Field, McVay Rock, South Jetty, Mill Beach, Harris Beach and Whales Head Picnic Area. Brookings-area volunteers also can opt to clean along the Chetco River.

"Last spring, volunteers in the Brookings area brought in more than 500 pounds of trash," Gallemore said.

Gold Beach

Event registration is at the Gold Beach Visitor Center, at the south end of town on Shirley Lane, off of U.S. Highway 101.

The Gold Beach cleanup covers from Pistol River to Bailey Beach. Participants also can opt to clean their favorite stretch of the Rogue River.

"Last spring, the cleanup group in Gold Beach broke all records, with 133 adults and 34 youth cleaning 20 miles of beach," Gold Beach Visitor Center Director Debbie Branson said.

"They brought in 3,300 pounds of trash. It was amazing. We had a bunch of tires, which really added up."

Participants in the Gold Beach cleanup will receive a coupon for two free tacos from the South Yo Mouth food truck at 29900 Harbor Way.

The Chetco River Railroad Bridge

Brookings may have a street named Railroad Avenue, yet little evidence remains of any railroad enterprise on the scale of the Chetco River railroad bridge, which once connected Harbor to Brookings.

The railroad bridge was erected not long after Brookings Timber and Land Company merged in 1915 with a California firm that owned a large block of redwood timber, according to the book "Chetco: The Story of a River and Its People" by Mike Adams. The new firm was called the California and Oregon (C&O) Lumber Company.

The mill in Brookings already had an extensive rail system in place for moving logs from the north bank of the Chetco River to the mill pond about where the Fred Meyer store is today, at U.S. Highway 101 and Fifth Street.

Lumber left the mill via railcar headed for a piling and timber wharf that extended 1,200 feet into Chetco Cove. There, it was loaded onto ships and taken by sea to Oakland and southern Cali-

Without any major roads in 1916, the only way to travel and ship goods to and from Brookings was by ship.

So a bridge over the Chetco River was completed in 1916, along with a rail line south to Smith River Rowdy Creek. The Chetco River bridge was built without power tools. All work done by hand, according to Adams's book.

The railway and bridge were built to allow the shipment of redwood logs from California to the mill site in Brookings. Unfortunately, sales of redwood products did not take off as anticipated, leaving the mill yard with unsold surplus lumber.

Under financial stress, the mill shut down on June 18,1925.

In 1928, a fire destroyed much of the bridge, rendering it useless. A cement structure on the north bank of the Chetco River at its mouth is rumored to be a remnant of the bridge's foundation.

In 1936, the remainder of the railroad was taken apart and the rails shipped to Japan as scrap metal. The remaining railroad tracks in this area were dismantled during World War II to aid the war





Do dogs like golf? If you love police dogs or happen to be a K-9 at the Brookings Police Department, then the upcoming Prowl & Growl golf tournament at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 21 is your game. The tournament is being held at the Salmon Run Golf Course, located at 99040 South Bank Chetco River Rd., 3.2 miles upriver from Highway 101.

While the Brookings Police Department has had police canines for more than 20 years, the Prowl & Growl tournament originated about 15 years ago as a fundraiser to generate monies to support the program.

The City of Brookings does not budget for the K-9 Unit, according to Officer Zane Van Zelf, K-9 Unit Coordinator. "It is completely funded by this event and

violent or dangerous fugitives, making the apprehension safer for the police officers, as well as the suspects.

When police officers are manually searching for a potentially dangerous fugitive and suddenly come face to face with suspect, those encounters can potentially become extremely volatile, causing officers to resort to higher levels of force. 

covers about 6.5 million kilometers and is only about 50 meters deep, said Moore.

"As 'the blob' continued, because it did last for so long, we saw warming get down to about 200 meters," Moore said. "But (the current heatwave) is still covering a very extensive area in the Pacific Ocean."

The cause of the heatwave is attributed to a ridge of high pressure weakened the wind patterns above the Pacific Ocean.

Weak winds reduce the ocean mixing, which normally releases heat from the ocean surface and allows the ocean to mix with cooler waters.

Although early in the heatwave's existence, scientists are seeing some effects already, said Moore. Researchers have found tuna much closer to shore, smaller-sized krill, and isolated, harmful algal blooms.

A poor salmon season along the Washington, Oregon and northern California coasts this year also might have been attributable somewhat to the warming ocean temperatures. The very edge of the warm water is reaching near the shore and affecting marine life, changing their distributions, Mantua said.

Researchers have no way of knowing if the heatwave will continue, worsen or dissipate. Some elements of the previous heatwave are not present now, for example.

But it's going to depend on what happens with the weather patterns that favor these events, said Mantua. "Odds are pretty good that the weather patterns are going to change," he said.

On the other hand, "I could be wrong, though. We could see another set of weird things happen."

"improve recruiting and retention, and standardize firefighting efforts with partners. The volunteer firefighters will have real hands-on opportunities to train, which will build competence and confidence," said McCrae.

He compared the value of real-life training to simulations, akin to learning to use a firearm without actually training with a gun.

"There's the motto 'train as you fight." McCrae said. "If you are going to be fighting a fire, you need to train on an actual fire, something that's going to act similar to what you would be called to deal with in a real-life situation.

"The fire department has nothing like that. Burn-tolearn opportunities are rare because of safety considerations."

"Training is crucial for firefighters to make critical decisions in mentally and physically stressing situations while in the line of duty," according to a web blog about exercises held at the Port of Coos Bay last May.

Currently, the only training available locally is with a propane-fired training trailer, which officials said behaves differently from an actual fire. "The last time the training trailer was anywhere in the area, it was in Coos Bay about 18 months ago," Watson said. "Most of the volunteer firefighters are unwilling to travel that far for a four-hour training."

With live-fire training, buildings are deliberately ignited to give trainees opportunities to develop required critical thinking skills in a relatively safe environment.

The fire training component for the proposed training facility would use "Conex boxes," also known as intermodal containers, which can

be used for live-fire training with Class A fuels (ordinary combustible materials like cloth, wood and paper) as

well as propane. The containers also could be used to simulate searching for victims in smoke-filled

structures. A 20- by 20-foot training tower, with concrete foundation, "would allow firefighters to train with ladders and learn how to pull a firefighter through a window," Watson said. "It's basically a twostory stairwell."

The property next to the airport came to the City of Brookings with the land for the airport, originally given to Curry County by South Coast Lumber Co.

The firefighters' association would purchase equipment for the training site.

The current proposal does not affect the city's budget, said officials, because all of the costs would be within the public safety department's

Granted, it's early yet. There are plenty of games with tough opponents laying ahead for the Blue and Gold. But for now ...

Two games, two convincing wins: 54-6 over Gold Beach, and last Friday's 28-14 victory at Bandon.

A closer look reveals a depth at skill positions that has returned from last year. Perhaps most importantly, a team - and apparently a community - that has bought into second-year coach Shaun Bavaro's program.

It hasn't always been this

Brookings historically suffered through turnovers at the head-coaching spot.

That, in turn, created an atmosphere in which building any kind of momentum was a challenge.

For years, Brookings football fans enviously watched as the Gold Beach Panthers repeatedly captured league crowns and made five trips to the state championship. Why can't we?

It's truly too early, after just a couple of games, to say where this season may go. There are the same heavyweight contenders in Cascade Christian, Hidden Valley and St. Mary's to deal with. But for now, the feeling around town is upbeat. Bruin fever is starting to spread.

This Friday, Brookings looks to extend its win streak by hosting another 2A team, the Rogue River Chieftains, out of the Rogue Valley.

Bavaro has looked over

that team and sizes it up this

way:
"They operate out of a similar wing-T, or pistol, offense that we saw at Bandon. They use motion a lot to gain man advantages on the outside. Their quarterback is very good, they have great size up front and

solid running backs.
"On defense," said Bavaro, "they like four down men, with man coverage on the back end. Their linebackers fly to the ball very well, so they're hard to run against. We may need to look to the air more in this game."

Rogue River comes into Brookings 1-1 on the season, with a 24-8 win over Lakeview and a close loss to Culver, 16-19.

Last week, the Bruins got into penalty trouble, although that's not uncommon at this


early point in the season. Here's Bavaro's take on that:

"We continue to teach and develop our kids. It doesn't always show, but we are making small strides in that area - of course, never as fast as we coaches would like," he chuckles.


As for what most impresses him about this team: "To fix some things at halftime, like we did at Bandon, and then come out and play well, shows us that our kids are relentless.

"If we continue to have that (mindset), we will have a chance to win in any game we play."
