Treasurer's lawsuit against Boice dismissed Judge rules county treasurer did not have standing to file suit

A Curry County judge has dismissed a lawsuit filed by County Treasurer David Barnes against Commissioner Court Boice.

The suit alleged Boice improperly requested a payment of more than \$3,000 from the county for the reimbursement of legal expenses he accrued in a previous lawsuit between him and the county, which was decided in

2018. In the previous suit, other members of the board of commissioners and the former director of operations claimed Boice had travelled on business without first getting approval from the

board. They also alleged he had gone over-budget on his allotted travel expenses for the year. After hearing the case, Circuit Judge Andrew Combs ruled in favor of Boice, with no costs or fees being awarded to either side,

according to court documents. After the decision, Boice requested a payment from the county totaling \$3,288 for legal fees associated with the suit. Af-

Board votes to eliminate director of operations

The Curry County Board of Commissioners has eliminated the director of operations position from the county.

At a Wednesday meeting, the board voted 2-1 to eliminate the position. Brad Rueckert, who was the director of operations, will be transferred to a new role as the director of finance, and his salary will remain unchanged. As the director of operations, Rueckert oversaw all of the departments in the county, including economic development, parks, public health and roads, with a special focus on finance. Additionally, he served as the go-between for the commissioners and the leaders of each department.

Since the position was created in 2017, it has been somewhat of a revolving door, with four different employees in just four years, as well as a couple of name changes. Rueckert was hired in the fall of 2019.

Digging to piece together local history

Site near Bandon could put Coquille Indians in area 13,000 years ago

Almost everyone agrees, ancestors of the Coquille Indian Tribe were the first settlers in what is now the Coos Bay-Bandon region of Oregon.

What we may be learning is how long the Tribe has had a presence in the area.

For the last three weeks, archeology students from Oregon State University have been excavating a site near Devils Kitchen beach in Bandon. The excavation

is the fourth time OSU students have worked to learn about the history of the area, and what they have found could be extraordinary.

Loren Davis, a professor of anthropology at OSU, said artifacts found at the digs have been dated back 13,600 years.

This is the ancestors of the Coquille people," Davis said. "That pit in there goes down to 10-feet deep. Down there, we have radio carbon going back 13,600 years. If that's true, this would be the oldest archeological site on the coast of North America. We have more work to do."

On Monday, the students and Davis were back at the site, slowly removing soil inch by inch. The slow, detailed work is necessary to find, protect and record any signs of human activity. Davis said the archeology students look for things most people would miss. For example, a rock that looks to most like a rock,

could have significance to archeologists because it might show signs of one time being in a fire.

Students pulled out several fire rocks, along with charcoal, while excavating the site Tuesday. The whole time a representative of the Coquille Tribe was watching closely. The Tribe wanted a representative nearby to learn and to ensure artifacts were treated properly. If human remains had been found, and none have in the four years of digging, work would have stopped immediately.

Davis said students from OSU have dug at Devils Kitchen in 2000, 2011 and 2013. The 2021 dig is the first time many students have been outdoors doing a real excavation in more than a year due to COVID-19 restrictions. Davis said getting the students back out into the field is a big step toward making them archeologists.

"We get to be outside, you're working with other people and you live in a field camp," he said. "There's a lot to learn other than archeology."

At the site, students

slowly dig into the soil, placing all the dirt into buckets. Each bucket was then sifted through to look for even the smallest artifact. Davis said every piece that was found helps tell the story of the area.

"In the years, we were doing some testing to get an idea of what was here," he said. "During the excavation, we realized there was a really long record of people being here."

Davis said while the artifacts go back more than 10,000 years, most of the confirmed activity at the site is newer.

"The most intensive use of the site is in the last 3,000 years," he said. "It would be ancestors of the modern Native American people.'

While the students from Oregon State have permission to find, remove and map artifacts they find, Davis urged anyone else who finds artifacts to leave them where they are.

"Artifacts on public lands are protected by state law," he said. "What they can do is they can take a picture of it to enjoy it later. They can also contact the agency that owns the land. If you pick something

And every piece of that history is important to understand the people who came before us. As archeologists, the challenge is getting enough pieces to tell the story, Davis said.

"It's one piece of a larger puzzle of what people were doing," he said. "It isn't like one piece tells the entire story. We're trying to piece it back together again. We want to map where everything is in the ground."

At Devils Kitchen, the archeology students were excavating a piece of land up above the beach. To their south ran Crooked Creek. Davis said it is likely the creek ran through the area they were digging at before it changed routes.

When the students finish their dig this week, they will fill in the hole. Davis said every dig is filled in for safety and aesthetics. While this group of students will return home for the rest of the summer, Davis and the Oregon State program will move to Eastern Oregon and start searching in a new location.

Guest Opinion Internet censorship: The real monopoly threat

"If [Donald] Trump and [Bernie] Sanders take the same position on Big Tech censorship," David Catron writes at The American Spectator, "the issue deserves serious attention."

He's right, but in pretty much the opposite of the way he intends. When the mainstream "right" and "left" agree on anything, that's almost always a blazing neon sign warning us that our freedoms are under threat.

Catron (and Trump and Sanders) want the U.S. government to seize control of social media platforms and dictate which users those platforms must accept and what kind of content those platforms must permit publication of. They don't put it quite that baldly, of course, but who would? Their cause is implicit in their criticisms of "Big Tech" as a "monopoly," which requires government regulation to promote competition in the "marketplace of ideas."

Social media platforms aren't monopolies. If you don't like Facebook or Twitter, you can go to Minds, MeWe, Diaspora, Mastodon, Gab, Discord, et al.

The U.S. government, however, IS a monopoly. Everyone's forced to "do business" with it, and in many areas, it forcibly forbids or limits competition with its own offerings.

Arguments in favor of government regulation of social media platforms aren't arguments against monopolies. They're arguments in favor of extending the government monopoly's reach into new markets. In this case, markets constitutionally protected by the First Amendment and by that amendment's codification in statute vis a vis the Internet, Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act of 1996.

Social media platforms' banning and content moderation decisions aren't "censorship." Censorship is "you can't say that."

"Foggy Dew" on your front porch at midnight, that's not censorship. I'm free to sing it on my own front porch, or on the sidewalk, or at karaoke night at the local bar.

By way of arguing the point, some of my friends point out that politicians bully major Internet platforms into "censoring by proxy."

The popular example is U.S. Representative Adam Schiff (D-CA) successfully leaning on Amazon Prime Video to remove "anti-vaccine" documentaries.

My friends are right. It's a problem. Politicians attempting to compel platforms to host speech they don't want to host is the flip side of the same problem, not a different problem.

Whatever the solution to that problem may be, repeal of the First Amendment or "reform" of Section 230 aren't part of it.

Ideally, bad actors like Schiff, Trump and Florida governor Ron DeSantis would be impeached and removed from office, or charged with conspiracy against rights (18 US Code § 241), or both.

Barring that, we should work to ensure that these evil-doers lose in Congress, in the courts, and at the ballot box. We mustn't sacrifice Internet freedom, or freedom of speech and press in general, to politicians and their schemes.

As Lake Powell dwindles, wonders open up

On May 9, protected by neoprene, I bobbed around in a flooded canyon in Utah's Lake Powell. The reservoir had fallen below 35 percent full, which gave me the unique opportunity to free-dive through an underwater bridge that was now suddenly within reach.

I eyed the 100 feet of sheer sandstone rising out of the water. For much of the past half-century, boats that entered upper Fiftymile Canyon in Glen Canyon National Recreation Area could blithely float over Gregory Natural Bridge with about 40 feet of clearance.

Not anymore. Two decades of drought had diminished the lake, and motorized river traffic could no longer float overtop.

Now, however, a new passageway to Fiftymile's inner sanctum was possible. That gave me a chance to become (possibly) the first person to pass under Gregory Natural Bridge since the archway was drowned 52 years ago.

Doing so would require swimning underwater while holding my breath, something I'd practiced over a decade and a half of visiting coral reefs. I'm far from a professional free diver, but I have been known to spend a minute or two communing with croaking toadfish 50 feet beneath the waves. I filled my lungs one last time and plunged down, scissor-kicking my way into the bracing, turbid water. I'd spent the previous week with 11 other Alaskans in southeastern Utah, negotiating the rapids of the Escalante River, an underappreciated gem that used to join the Colorado River

but now feeds into Lake Powell. The Escalante has traditionally been considered navigable only during its spring flood. But word had trickled out that pack-rafts and patience could get you down the last 40 miles of it before it reached Lake Powell, even during low flows.

Upriver in the town of Escalante, a water gauge gave a reading of just half a cubic foot per second for much of our journey, which began at Fence Canyon, 40 miles down the river. Only the cumulative output of spring-fed side canyons kept us moving.

When we arrived at Lake Powell's "full pool line," where the reservoir used to start when Glen Canyon Dam was at capacity, we were in for a shock. It would have been impossible to guess that water once covered the banks; now, cottonwoods three stories tall bordered the river.

It would take us another day and a half of increasingly arduous travel to finally enter Lake Powell.

As the shoreline vegetation hrank, then disappeared, we gave up trying to float and began walking our boats. The braided river channel was choked with sediment that broke off from the banks in basketball-sized chunks. A rock pinnacle called Explorer Island was ringed with cracked mud studded with dry buoys. I've worked as a field ecologist for almost as long as the Western Rockies have been in a state of drought, but I've never seen a place so clearly in the throes of change. In 36 hours, we'd rewound the tape on 20 years of ecological succession from riparian forest back to mud. We were ready to quit sloshing through the Escalante River when we finally reached the depleted reservoir and our rented houseboat. Then it took us less than an hour to reach our goal, the place where Gregory Natural Bridge lurked beneath us. There, time compressed as I dropped underwater and passed through a shimmering boundary between the sun-warmed surface layer and the colder depths. Only then did the top of the archway come into view.

As I passed under it at about 15 feet, there was more overhanging sandstone. Low visibility obscured what was ahead, but I decided to trust my lungs and finned forward, following the gradual rise of the rock above me.

A diffuse glow became refracted light and then sunshine as I splashed back into the day. I was just 50 feet upstream, but once under the bridge and out the other side, I was in a world removed from where I had taken my last breath.

It was quiet, with no sound of boats or people. Around me rose a red-rock panorama that had been hidden away for years. It was glorious. True, it might be a tragedy for flat-water recreationists and businesses if climate change and over-allocation of water rights in the West doom Glen Canyon Dam, letting loose the Colorado River. But I can attest there would be marvels for visitors, and what a boon for nature that would be. *Tim Treuer is a contributor* to Writers on the Range, writersontherange.org, a nonprofit dedicated to spurring lively conversation about the West. 



ter the board voted against the payment, former County Counsel John Huttl approved Boice's request. Huttl explained his reasoning in a July 2019 memo to the former Director of Operations Julie Schmelzer.

"If it is not a public purpose, it can be considered an illegal gift...However, there is a public purpose to the expense, and therefore not a gift under that doctrine. The expense was to

conduct county business. That is not questioned," wrote Huttl.

Despite the judge's decision to not award costs or fees to either side, Huttl added that the county could reimburse Boice for legal expenses under a law that allows local governments to make payments "founded in justice and supported by a moral obligation."

Barnes, however, disagreed with Huttl's decision to approve the payment.

"The treasurer's office alleges that Counsel Huttl knowingly and willfully defied and overrode the order of Judge Combs...and applied his own standards of "moral and equitable" to improperly authorize payment to Mr. Boice, which by court order he was not eligible or due," wrote the treasurer's office in their complaint.

Nevertheless, Combs also dismissed the most recent case due to "procedural matters," and yet again, no costs or fees were awarded to either party, according to the June 21 decision.

One of the reasons Combs listed for dismissing the case was a suit against a commissioner on behalf of the county would have to come from the board of commissioners, rather than the treasurer's office.

The Oregon Department of Justice was also looking into the matter for criminal wrongdoing but has since dropped the investigation. "We have determined

that a criminal investigation would not likely lead to evidence that would support criminal prosecution relating to the reimbursement," according to a May 6 report from the assistant attorney general at the Oregon DOJ.

"County Counsel Huttl was acting within his authority when he issued his opinion that the reimbursement for costs was legal and Commissioner Boice's claim for payment could be approved; no crimes are implicated in his conduct."

Additionally, the report states Boice requested the payment through the appropriate channels and did not act outside of his official duties as commissioner in doing so.

In an interview with the Pilot, Boice said the decisions by the circuit court,

as well as the state DOJ are an exoneration.

He said the perpetual lawsuits and internal struggle are hurting the county's reputation.

"Commissioner [Chris] Paasch was in the courtroom to go against me, I mean, what does that say about the county government?" Said Boice. "It should have never happened, it all could have

been avoided." Paasch explained why he believes Boice should not have been reimbursed during a July 7 board of

commissioner's meeting. Typically, commissioners sign-off on county payments, he said. "On this payment in-

voice there is no commissioner approval, meaning that it was never shown to a commissioner for



"Just because he didn't get prosecuted does not mean that a crime was not committed," said Barnes.

A North Carolina woman died, and her husband was rescued after the woman fell off a cliff near Natural Bridges on Monday.

On Monday July 12, the Curry County Sheriff's Office received information through the Brookings Police Department 911 center that a woman that had fallen off a cliff near Natural Bridges about 12 miles north of Brookings. Brookings's dispatch advised they paged out Brookings and Cape Ferello fire departments along with Cal Ore Life Flight Ambulance.

Curry County Sheriff's dispatch then requested the Curry County Sheriff's Office SAR rope team to respond along with the on-duty deputies.

Sgt. Maia Mello arrived on scene and contacted the caller, Kim Maloy, a family member who told Mello that her sister-in-law, 60-year-old Glenda Tucker from North Carolina, had fallen about 300 feet from a cliff into the ocean and that Maloy's husband was stuck on the side of cliff trying to get down to

where Tucker was. Mello got to the loca-

tion and from her vantage point saw Tucker floating face down in the cove area and notified dispatch that the female victim, Glenda Tucker was deceased.

Due to the location Tucker was at in the water below, a request was made to the Coast Guard for a helicopter and a swimmer to recover Tucker.

In the meantime, the Sheriff's SAR rope team and swimmers prepared to make the recovery in case the Coast Guard were not able to.

Trained first responders secured a safety line to a tree and descended to where James Maloy was and were able to get him back to safety.

The Coast Guard helicopter arrived and determined they could lower a swimmer outside the cove area where Tucker was and have the swimmer bring Tucker back outside of the cove to be hoisted to the helicopter. The Coast Guard rescue swimmer had to swim about 200 yards to reach Tucker.

Last week, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission approved a petition filed by five conservation groups to give marbled murrelets more protection by reclassifying them from threatened to endangered under the state's Endangered Species Act.

The $\hat{4}$ -3 decision comes two years after an Oregon judge ruled that the commission had violated state law by denying the petition without explanation in 2018.

"We're relieved that after so many missteps, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission will finally move forward with extending marbled murrelets the full protection of endangered status under state law," said Quinn Read, Oregon policy director at the Center for Biological Diversity. "These unique birds face serious threats in Oregon from climate change, ocean warming, wildfire and unchecked logging of their nesting habitat and should have been protected as endangered years ago."

The marbled murrelet is a small seabird that nests in old-growth and mature forests and forages at sea. Its population has declined dramatically in recent decades due to extensive logging in Oregon's coast range.

The bird was listed as threatened under the Oregon Endangered Species Act in 1995.

Habitat fragmentation, ocean warming, climate change and large-scale disturbances compound the existing threats and put this species' future in greater jeopardy.

According to the Oregon Department of Fish and

Wildlife's 2021 biological assessment, the marbled murrelet is considered one of the least resilient species to climate change and is at risk of being wiped out by a single catastrophic event, like wildfire.

Uplisting to endangered status requires the state to develop a management plan and survival guidelines, providing much-needed protection for the species.

"We applaud the commission for choosing to safeguard Oregon's imperiled Marbled Murrelet population and its fragile forest habitat by uplisting the species to endangered," said Danielle Moser, wildlife program coordinator for Oregon Wild. "This decision is not only in step with science and Oregon law, but also illustrates the commission's willingness to be conservation leaders in the fight against the extinction crisis."

The groups petitioned the commission to uplist the marbled murrelet in 2016.





"We take the kids through a fairly extensive program of: what a short story is, and how to write a short story," said Gautreaux. "If they already have a story, then they take it and run with it. If they don't, we help them develop an idea."

The stories the students produce are initially peer-edited, and then donate to a local charity of their choice. In past years, they have donated to Caitlin's Cause, a local charity for children with cancer, as well as the South Coast Humane Society.

Hall said she initially became interested in writing after her fifth-grade teacher gave her an assignment to write a fiction story. Soon to be in 8th grade, Hall said she carries a journal with her wherever she goes. She also participated in last year's book, with her short story, "A Star From Above," which is the prequel to "Time Zone." Hall said she plans to further develop the fictional world she created with these two stories and hopes to mentor future writers in the program. In hopes to gain more participation next year, Zocchi said they plan to accept poetry and other literary works.
