Gov. Brown extends school closures

Governor Kate Brown announced during a press conference on Wednesday, April 8 that in-person classes in Oregon will be closed through the remainder of the school year.

"Schools and learning

will continue as best as we can using remote means," Brown said. Less than a month ago, Brown had ordered schools closed temporarily through April 28.

"My top priority will always be the health and safety of Oregonians," Brown said. "That is the forefront of my mind with every single decision that I make. To the best of my ability, I also want to provide Oregonians with as much information I have as quickly as possible so you may have some certainty in these very uncertain times. We want to give you the ability to make plans for your children's education and for everyone's health and safety, especially because I know that social distancing orders have required huge sacrifices from our children. Missing school is especially difficult on our students and on their parents."

In the first stage of switching over to distance education and remote means of learning, high school seniors take priority. Those students who were on track for graduation when schools were closed, will be given passing grades for their classes and will receive their diplomas.

"I refuse to punish students, many of whom have been in Oregon schools for over a decade, because they could not attend classes for a little over two months," Brown said.

Students who did not have passing grades will be the focus of efforts to ensure they can graduate.

"However, for those students who did not have a passing grade in mid-

Council approves vehicle camping at churches

Not everyone has a home to "stay safe" in during the coronavirus pandemic. To help the homeless, Brookings City Council unanimously approved overnight vehicle camping in church parking lots.

Councilors adopted, 5-0, a temporary emergency rule during a special meeting on Monday, April 6, allowing "camping by homeless on the property of religious institutions, limited to the period we are under the governor's 'Stay Home, Stay Safe' order for COVID-19." A Google search found 15 churches in Brookings.

The emergency rule includes provisions of Oregon Revised Statute 203.082 — "Camping by homeless on the property of religious institutions."

The new temporary rule states that churches must request a free permit from the city that would allow the church to have up to three vehicles in their parking lot each night. The church must provide campers with access to sanitary facilities, including but not limited to toilet, hand washing and trash disposal facilities. The church also has to update the city with the number of vehicles staying each night at the church.

Only churches with a permit would be allowed to offer vehicle camping. As far as the permits, "it should be real simple, more of a documentation so we know who is doing it," City Manager Janell Howard said, describing it as a "checklist."

The temporary emergency rule only had the three guidelines. For instance, the number of people allowed per vehicle or if a church representative has to be at the church overnight are not addressed. The finer details were left to the church to decide.

Handy heroes making needed sanitizer products

The lack of hand sanitizer hasn't stopped a local group from taking the matter into their own hands to solve a big problem. They decided to make sanitation gel and spray sanitizers themselves and distribute them for free to first responders, health care workers and facilities, essential businesses, like grocery stores and UPS and FedEx, and anyone else who needs them.

Josh Stout, the Director of Program Development for Reach Out World Wide (ROWW), is used to improvising when he helps out in disaster zones around the world. See our story "Reaching Out: Local man helps around the world" on currypilot.com.

"Gee, how could I apply what I learned here?" Stout asked himself while considering the COVID-19 pandemic. "We make our own hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies when I deploy with medical teams across the world. I talked with our medical people at ROWW and they sent me their recipes. Now I'm turning into a chemist and never expected it."

The products follow approved WHO specifications.

"We are quickly and efficiently producing sanitizer that is 95% alcohol — far exceeding the minimum level of effectiveness to kill viruses such as COVID-19," Stout said.

Gold Beach Fire Chief Tyson Krueger and Stout fronted the money to launch CLEAN 1 Initiative and soon received a substantial donation from Lowe's Home Improvement Stores because of their relationship working with Stout and ROWW over the years.

"COVID-19 has struck the world off guard and has many of us scrambling to find the necessities to protect ourselves and our loved ones," says their GoFundMe site. "Essential supplies like sanitizing spray and hand sanitizer are hard to find or even non-existent, yet crucial to our everyday safety as we fight this unprecedented virus. We are aiming to do our part to help curb the

"We are entrusting that they are going to do what is best for the community," said Mayor Jake Pieper.

Prior to the temporary rule, the Brookings Municipal Code only allowed sleeping in a recreational vehicle or travel trailer on private property with a residential unit or during construction, not connected to the city's water or sewer system and for not more than 14 days per calendar year.

Gov. Kate Brown issued the "Stay Home, Stay Safe" order on March 23, but it does not specifically address the homeless. Brown did not provide an end date for the order.

As of Tuesday, April 7, Curry County had three confirmed cases of COVID-19.

After receiving a permit, city staff said they would not be driving around to each of the churches within the city limits to check on them. They would only do so if they received a complaint.

"As far as monitoring it's no different than any other abatement," said Tony Baron, City of Brookings Public Works and Developmental Services Director. "If it gets overused and abused — if they have five, eight, 10 RVs — we are going to get a call on it and we are going to abate it just as any ordinary nuisance abatement. I don't feel our department needs to go by every church every day to see how many RVs are parked there. When the issue

Council quickly appoints Alcorn to fill vacant seat

B rookings City Council wasted no time filling the seat vacated minutes earlier by Councilor Bill Hamilton during a special meeting on Monday, April 6. Brad Alcorn was unanimously appointed to the council.

Hamilton has served on the council for nearly eight years and the seat is up for election in November of this year. He submitted his letter of resignation on April 2 and with a 4-0 vote, it was accepted by

the council Monday afternoon.

Hamilton, who has a progressive disease and limited mobility, said via phone he was advised to step away from the council.

"My health is good but it was recommended that I slow down a little bit to keep my health good," Hamilton said. "I'd just like to thank all of you on the council and all of the staff at City Hall for an absolutely wonderful 8 years. It's been the thrill of my life to be there. It's the best experience I

could ever hoped to have. I praise all of you for the work we have done, that will continue to be done.

"I've enjoyed every minute of it. It's been a true honor," he added. The remaining four

councilors spoke fondly of Hamilton.

"I'm sorry this is coming this way, Bill. It's been a pleasure to work with you. Sorry to see you leave," Councilor Ron Hedenskog said.

"It's been a pleasure to sit next to you up here. Congratulations on your new retirement," Councilor Brent Hodges said.

"Thanks for everything and for being patient with the rookie councilman on the board and being patient with me and giving me good advice when I needed it," Councilor John McKinney said.

"We've been sitting together for quite a while man. I appreciate your willingness to serve in that capacity for as long as you did. If you've sat up here for a while you find out it's not super easy. I appreciate what you gave to the city," Mayor Jake Pieper said.

A vacancy on the council is normally filled with a majority vote of the council within 60 days. In this instance, they had until June 5. The process includes people submitting applications to the city recorder and then being interviewed by councilors during a council meeting. At that same meeting, the council makes an appointment and the person is sworn in.

Mayor Pieper, taking the lead, explained this was not a normal time. pointing to the coronavirus pandemic, and wanted to fill the seat immediately.

"We are all aware that something is going on and timely. We need all five chairs taken up here, you know, pronto," Pieper said. "There is a member of our community who has already shown himself to be pretty steadfast. New to the community but I think could bring needed experience and character

usual process of filling a council vacancy, Pieper strongly urged filling the seat with Alcorn, who was at the meeting. Brookings Councilors have filled vacancies similarly in the past.

"Obviously kind of the norm of taking applications and going through a process isn't really feasible right now," Pieper said. "I would ask the council to entertain making an immediate appointment of Mr. Alcorn.'

From there the appointment came quickly and without a word being spoken by Alcorn on the record. No application was submitted by Alcorn. He was not asked any questions. He was the only candidate brought up.

Alcorn, a retired Fresno Police Department officer, was serving on the Brookings Parks and Recreation Commission, is still on the Curry County Budget Committee and is a Curry County Sheriff's Reserve Officer and K9 Unit Supervisor.


Pieper concluded his push for Alcorn with 'Brad is here out of willingness. He's ready to go when we are."

The vote to appoint Alcorn was 4-0.

Alcorn addressed the council after taking the oath of office from City Manager Janell Howard.

"Regarding that oath, I have taken an oath before as a peace officer and I don't take that oath lightly," Alcorn said. "I recognize the responsibility that comes with it. I just want to assure all of you and this community that I will work extremely hard and make sure I can get up to speed on as many issues as possible so that I don't hold anyone back or slow anything down. I know that there are some things coming up that are very important and I will be as prepared as possible to understand all sides of these issues. I thank each of you for your commitment and as long as I can serve my community where I live, I will."

In other matters, Alcorn stepped down from his post on the Parks and Recreation Commission; and Councilors approved, 5-0, financing of smart water meters.

vaccine for fear

"When I am afraid, I put my trust in you" — Psalm 56.

Words like "global health threat," "death toll," "economic collapse," "shut down," and "social distancing," have become familiar in the past few weeks. The coronavirus pandemic has given birth to widespread fear and uncertainty. Questions abound. How many will die in the next few weeks? If the closures continue much longer, what will our country look like on the other side of this?



The world we knew has disappeared. Huge changes have happened in bewildering, quick succession. Will life ever get back to normal? And how do we cope?

Many are tempted to give in to despair. Others who have not been personally affected might think more of their safety than others' danger. We do our best to keep our distance and wash our hands and assume we will be OK. Possibly you, like me, have struggled with a mixture of both kinds of thoughts.

The only vaccine for fear is trusting God. A wise person once said, "I don't know what the future holds, but I know Who holds the future." The Bible has many promises that can help us deal with fear. Here are just a few: "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind" (2 Timothy 1:7).

"Peace is what I leave with you; it is my own

peace that I give you. I do not give it as the world does. Do not be worried and upset; do not be afraid" (John 14:27).

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me" (Psalm 23:4).

One of the things that strengthen our trust is knowing that God can bring good out of bad. Oddly enough, the shutdown has had some benefits. For example, people who live on the canals in Venice, Italy have reported that the water has never been cleaner. They can even see the fish.

Air pollution has been reduced. Many previously smog-filled Chinese cities are seeing blue skies. Researchers suggest that up to 100,000 premature deaths caused by air pollution in China could be avoided if the country would continue





March, and who need time to improve their grades in order to pass one or more classes needed for their diploma, I am asking school districts to focus their efforts finding creative ways to get these seniors the extra attention they need to get across the finish line," she said.

Not reopening schools, which have operating costs to ramp back up, will allow schools to invest time and resources into distance education and remote learning, Brown said.

At Central Curry School District 1, 36 seniors are in the class of 2020. Early

estimates indicate that less than five may be impacted, according to Superintendent Tim Wilson.

"We are confident that all will meet graduation requirements," he said.

Gold Beach High School seniors have all been contacted already and will be called again this week to discuss their situations. They will be the first to check out school devices if needed. The district is working with vendors to potentially purchase hot spots for those students most in need. Approximately 10% of seniors in CCSD1 do not have a cell phone or device.

"The governor's announcement wasn't a surprise, however, I will admit it was a difficult one to accept," Wilson said.

"We will move forward and hope that what we have learned from this pandemic will help us prepare for any future crisis.'

Brookings Harbor School District interim Superintendent Chris Eberhardt met with high school Principal DeAnne Varitek when schools first closed to see how many students were on track to graduate and which ones were not.

"Fortunately, we did this a couple of weeks ago,' Eberhardt said. "I just had a hunch we wouldn't be coming back to school. We've been in touch with every one of our seniors."

Students need to achieve a passing grade for each class they were enrolled in if the classes are required for graduation. In addition, if they need to make up credits from previous years, they have to fulfill those class requirements.

The school district has been reaching out again to students and families since last week for them to pick up the devices they need. The school district ordered 50 hot spots for internet access a couple of weeks ago.

"Seniors are our target audience for those," Eberhardt said.

Some of the hot spots will also go to staff who live in remote areas without access. In some cases. students and staff will need to travel to locations where they can get a cell signal to download materials and work offline.

Eberhardt predicted that all of the students could make up the necessary work to receive passing grades in 1 to 3 weeks, easily finishing by mid-June. Students will have until the end of August to complete work to still be considered part of the class of 2020, according to Brown.

School districts will turn next to making sure

students other than seniors are continuing to learn and don't fall behind. Some districts are considering an early start to the next school year if social distancing measures permit.

Meanwhile, school districts are continuing to provide other services to students, including meals and making sure that other basic needs are being met.

"Our numbers for meal home delivery continue to rise with currently 275 children being served in that fashion," Wilson said about CCSD1. "We are still taking applications via our website, Ray's Market, McKay's Foods and Riley Creek School meal site.'

Brookings Harbor School District nearly ran out of food earlier in the week, handing out just under 800 meals on Tuesday, April 7. On Wednesday, they put together 1,200 bags containing meals for distribution on Friday.


"Our staff is working their fannies off," Eberhardt said.

The meals are not just for school-age children, but all children aged 1 to 18. It takes several days to put the distributions together that go out two days a week.

"We just ordered 12,000 bags. It's a huge operation," he said.

Brown also extended the existing executive order for Oregon's post-secondary education system to continue following distance learning through the end of this academic term.

"Oregon's public universities are also committed to ensuring that incoming freshmen students who intend to enroll at our state institutions are considered fairly in light of the educational interruption they have endured in their final year of high school due to COVID-19," she said.






