High fire danger declared

High temperatures and worsening fuel conditions across southern Oregon have prompted the Coos Forest Protective Association to increase the fire danger level to "high" Aug. 28

"Live fuels are at the point

where they are available for fire to burn, which makes fires more resistant to control efforts," association spokesman Jef Chase said in a press release issued Aug. 27.

The high fire danger includes several restrictions: • Smoking is prohibited while traveling in forestlands, except in vehicles or improved roads, in boats, on the water, and in other designated area.

• Open fires, including campfires, charcoal fires, cooking fires and warming fires, are allowed only at designated and managed campgrounds.

• Powersaw use is allowed only from 8 p.m.-10 a.m. Each saw must be accompanied by one shovel and fire extinguisher of at least 8-ounce capacity. A fire watch of one hour is required

No tsunami sirens for Curry County

The Curry County commissioners have voted unanimously to discontinue supporting operation of the county's 17 tsunami sirens. So, what now?

In a presentation to the commissioners July 24 in Port Orford, County Emergency Services Manager Jeremy Dumire described the condition of the existing sirens, the costs to maintain them, and why

they're no longer the best technology to deploy as a tsunami-warning system.

The commissioners subsequently voted Aug. 7 to discontinue using the sirens for emergency warnings.

Dumire will repeat that presentation for Brookings residents this evening at 6:00 in the Brookings City Hall Council Chambers, 898 Elk Dr., during a regular meeting of the Curry County commissioners.

Dumire will discuss his previous recommendations to discontinue

using the World War II air-raid sirens, and elaborate on newer and more-reliable options.

To the south, Del Norte County's officials said they'll continue using local tsunami sirens for now.

Keeping tsunami sirens has been a topic of debate in coastal communities for quite some time, said Kymmie Scott, emergency services manager for Del Norte County.

Although Scott said she's has heard the arguments both for keeping and for discontinuing the tsunami sirens, she said it's best to have multiple methods to reach people in an emergency.

Of the 17 sirens in Curry County, only four are "reliably operational," Dumire said July 24. He placed the cost to fix just the head of each unit at \$22,000 - assuming all of the other components in the system are still operational.

To completely replace the sirens, with all new systems, would cost between \$50,000 and \$100,000, said Dumire. His department's annual budget is \$120,000.

According to Dumire, the two possible tsunamis are labeled local and distant. A local tsunami would occur following a major earthquake in the Cascadia Subduction Zone near the Oregon coast. A quake measuring 9.0 on the Richter Scale would be 900 times greater than the 7.1-magnitude quake experienced in southern California on July 5.

Superintendents share their vision for new school year

Teachers and community members listened intently as leaders of the Brookings-Harbor and Central Curry school districts outlined this year's goals and challenges for their staffs and students.

The setting was two separate back-to-school breakfasts Tuesday morning.

Brookings-Harbor School District

"I want to share with you my hopes and my fears," Brookings-Harbor Interim School Superintendent Chris Eberhardt told an audience that filled the high school's cafeteria.

"Education is about taking risks," he said. "We want our students to feel comfortable, even when they make mistakes."

He told the audience that reaching the school district's goals - such as lowering the student absenteeism rate and boosting math scores - is not something that can be done alone. "We have to do this together," he said.

"We have to be thoughtful about the importance of education. Every teacher in this room, and the community members, should be inspired that we do shape our young people's attitudes towards education."

Eberhardt said the local community's adults have the power to help young people perceive education. "That's what I want them to take with them when they walk out of here," he said. "This is a team effort. We can do great things if we roll up our sleeves and do the awesome work of public education."

Eberhardt said one of the primary challenges faced by Brookings-Harbor schools is helping students improve their math scores. "Everybody here is extremely supportive of preparing students for the future, so we have that already on a good note," he told The Pilot before his address.

"With that energy and excitement, and my passion for education, we can make a difference while honoring what works and evaluating what needs to be looked at."

During the breakfast, principals from Kalmiopsos Elementary School, Azalea Middle School and Brookings-Harbor High School introduced their new staff members.

Meantime, organizers of the annual KURY Radio "Stuff the Bus" school supply donation drive announced the effort brought in \$1,828 plus several boxes of school supplies, such as notebook paper, pencils and binders.

"The Salvation Army was

lead in donating backpacks for students," KURY's Sharon Toney said. "We collected 360 backpacks for students."

Added Toney, "This community is so generous, they come out in droves every year. This makes a big difference for our students."

Central Curry School District

In Gold Beach, more than 60 school district employees filled the Riley Creek Elementary School cafeteria on Tuesday for the district's annual breakfast.

"We're really excited about the work we have coming up this year," said Central Curry School District 1 Superintendent Tim Wilson, as he welcomed back teachers and staff.

"As with any school year, we always do something new," he said, introducing Central Curry School Board Chair Andy Wright. Wright followed with an update on the board's goals for the year.

"As many of you know, we have a focus on technology and infrastructure upgrades, and making it possible to integrate it into your classrooms," Wright said. "We're going to continue that as one of our core improvement goals this year. We're going to spend some money on it."

to) what these two schools will look like in 20 years."

Added Wright, "Public education is a complex, interesting world to operate in. It's tough.

"I think what you already know is, the end game is the meaningful work, and the impact you have on the thousands of kids who pass through this place over the course of your career. Thank you for your services." Gold Beach High School Principal Josh Metzger and Riley Creek Elementary School Principal Tom Denning introduced new staff members.

The high school has two new full-time teachers for math and science, and a music teacher they'll share with the elementary school.

Riley Creek has six new teachers.

"I'm not a very emotional guy," said Denning, "but inside, I'm ecstatic right now." He then introduced the new elementary school teachers. "I'm ecstatic about the quality of the staff we've hired this year."

Riley Creek Elementary has a new kindergarten teacher, a first-grade teacher, two second-grade teachers, a fifth-grade teacher, and a special-education resource teacher.

The new school year begins Sept. 3.

County supports fire training center

The Curry County commissioners on Aug. 14 unanimously approved a resolution to support a Rogue-Siskiyou Regional Fire and Training Facility project.

Curry County Emergency Manager Jeremy Dumire and Gold Beach Fire Chief Tyson Krieger had submitted a plan to build a fire training and emergency operations center in Curry County. The project would provide higher levels of protection to the community, but also could bring economic benefits as the facility developed into a regional training center for the Pacific Northwest.

Dumire identified the old Champion Mill site, on the south bank of the Rogue River up Jerry's Flat Road, about 5 miles from U.S. Highway 101 in Gold Beach, as a prime property for the facility.

The property encompasses about 150 acres and its owner

has already agreed to a sale price, the commissioners were told.

The site has a large water supply available because it is adjacent to the City of Gold Beach water plant.

In the past two years, Curry County, along with Josephine County, has seen the Chetco Bar, Klondike and Taylor Creek fires, which combined included some 400,000 acres, said Dumire.

"In terms of overall fire hazard, we tend to get the large fires," he said. "One of the issues we have is the lack of training available."

Currently, all of the training available to personnel for fighting structural or wildland fires is outside of the area. Firefighters are unable to get their needed training locally, said Krieger.

"We have the resources to be able to put on the classes here with Coos Forest Patrol, but also the Forest Service," he said.

The location is particularly suitable because in addition to

serving as a firefighting training compound, it can "include water rescue training with the two ponds, the Rogue River nearby for jet boat training, and the ability to house firefighters and incident management teams away from the fairgrounds, which have been taken over for the past two years," said Dumire.

Plus, the site is centrally located to where fire incidents occur, and the size of the property would allow for a heli-spot and helicopters staged on the south side of the property. There, they could store retardant, gel and AV-Gas for air resources inland and away from the coastal fog belt.

Plans for Phase 1 include a burn tower where firefighters can practice with live fire without having to wait for a "burn-to-learn" opportunity to arise.

In addition to firefighter training, proponents said the facility would benefit other emergency operations:

Law-enforcement capa-

bilities would be enhanced to provide tactical and firearms training, with a secure indoor shooting range and activeshooter training facility.

• In the event of a major incident, the planned facility could serve as a center for emergency operations for centralizing finance, logistics, operations, planning and communications.

• Search and rescue would benefit not only from water rescue training, but also by having a rappelling tower for cliff rescues.

• The facility could also offer training to regional agencies from as far away as Washington and Idaho, given the presence of a dormitory, commercial kitchen, classrooms and conference rooms.

The proposal has been in the making for more than three years through meetings with an informal advisory group that has been honing the proposal to the point where they are now "funneling their ideas into all working on the same concept," said Krieger in a phone interview.

"The informal group will give way to a more formal advisory group that will involve all of the emergency personnel stakeholders in the community, plus the (Bureau of Land Management) and Forest Service."

Because the project would foremost provide training and support for emergency personnel throughout Curry County, county officials will advance the concept to the state fire marshal, the Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training, and the fire chiefs and law-enforcement agencies in Curry County to ask for their support.

"We're not asking you guys for funding, but for basically your signature and a nod of support for this concept here," Krieger told the county commissioners. "The more people who get behind the project, the more funding opportunities we can have to build this project."

Krieger said there already are grants in place to cover the initial portion of Phase 1. "Once we purchase the property, we will be able to apply for tons of infrastructure grants from the federal government, as well as some matching-grant opportunities," Krieger said in a phone interview.

"Construction for Phase 1 of the project will cost between \$2.5 million and \$3.5 million.

"There is no other facility like this that is all-in-one," he said.

evacuate to higher ground." That's because with a loca large subduction earthquake from a far-off location, such as the Japanese earthquake March 11, 2011. Dumire said emergency officials likely would have at least four hours' lead time to make notifications and evacuate areas at risk - primarily beaches, harbors and rivers.

The alternatives for a warning-siren system - doorto-door contact, and modern technology such as teleseason. The response: tourists

can sign up for FEMA alerts and the National Wireless Emergency Alert System, through which many people have received presidential alert tests. Those who have not received a presidential alert can contact their carrier to learn how to activate it by telephone.

As for a distant tsunami, Gold was told, emergency personnel would be able to evacuate tourists from shore areas that would be impacted.

tsunami, "Radio towers and electronic warning systems will likely fail," Dumire said. Emergency personnel would not have enough time to evacuate residents, because the tsunami would inundate the area within 10 to 15 minutes.

Local tsunamis "pose a greater threat to public health than distant tsunamis," he said, because of the limited time in which to act, and the likelihood that the warning systems would not survive or be activated by dispatchers.

The commissioners' resolution concludes that the existence of any kind of local warning system would not help in the event of a local tsunami.

phones and electronic alerts are much less expensive and likely more reliable than the sirens, according to the Curry commissioners' resolution.

Dumire described the reverse 911 system through Everbridge that the county currently is using, which costs \$6,500 a year. Residents can sign up to receive phone calls, texts and emails in the event of an emergency by registering at https:// member.everbridge.net/ index/892807736723773#/ login.

The question Commissioner Sue Gold asked during the Port Orford presentation was, "What about the tourists?" She noted that amounts to roughly 50% of the area's population during the high

I can feel the sadness and suffering of those displaced by the ever-increasing climaterelated "inconveniences." Imagine having an hour's notice to pack up your belongings and escape a wildfire. We have driven through more than one such event.

A visual that haunts me still is seeing families pull out of their driveways in Yukon, Canada with the back of their truck loaded with possessions, knowing that what remains

will be ash by morning. This happens hundreds of times right here in our nation,

as people scramble to figure out where their next meal will come from to feed their families. Watching the news of

Gatlinburg, Tennessee on fire hit my heart, as we worked with many of the smallbusiness owners who lost their shops; and some, even their cabins. This was not just a news story, it was as real-life to me as to those directly affected.

When storms hit the Florida coast and floodwaters rise inside living rooms, I can

visualize times spent with family on that very couch that is now ankle deep in yuck.

I have watched houses fall into melting glacier-fed rivers in Alaska because of extremely high temperatures melting the glacier a few miles upstream.

Those same families are now battling unsafe air filled with wildfire smoke. Friends have had to leave their homes and fly to the lower states to find clean air for their children who suffer from asthma.

I have heard personal stories of stranded polar bears in villages where I once walked. Those same villages now are

unable to get their subsistence salmon because the salmon are not returning.

As California and the west is burning, I can visualize natural places that will never be as they were. Just two years ago, we were evacuated from two wildfires here. It caused us great hardship that we are still trying to dig out from.

And now, we hear stories of "dead zones" off the coast where nothing lives, including the fish that feed so many fishermen's families.

Infrastructure is also greatly affected. Driving along U.S. Highway 101 from Brookings to Coos Bay is quite fright-

ening and gives a feeling of being unsafe, as you see where the road has fallen off the cliff towards the ocean.

We have many such stories too many to ignore. Yet, there are still deniers. Maybe due to fear.

Maybe because it is inconvenient. It certainly is inconvenient to the thousands already displaced in this country and millions around the world.

Please learn all you can before you decide how it will affect your family.
